## Woman charged with attempted murder after shooting at ex

A 56-year-old Marianna woman is being held without bond after investigators say she shot up the home of her ex-boyfriend and tried to kill him by firing a gun through his bedroom door.

Shortly after deputies arrived, Brenda "Sissy" Toole was taken into custody without incident

after she stepped out of the broken back door of the home she had just ransacked, wine cooler in hand. It was a quiet end to a dangerous night.

Her ex escaped serious injury, suffering only a superficial wound when a bullet fragment hit his lower left abdomen.

Little was left intact inside the ransacked home. The incident report chronicled a long list of destruction, including a broken back door and broken kitchen window. Kitchen drawers were pulled out and emptied, dishes were broken and the contents of the refrigerator was tossed around the room. Condiments and liquids had been poured around the kitchen and living area. A ceramic stovetop was in pieces. The front of a flat screen TV was shattered. Virtually every decorative item in the house, including pictures, was destroyed.

Amid this mess, a Walther P38 9mm handgun with a jammed casing had been left on the counter next to the stove.

A man living on CR 274 called 911 around 9 p.m. on June 19 and said that a woman was at the end of his driveway firing a gun.

Deputies were en route when the man called again and reported that she was ramming his truck with her car.

A few minutes later, he told a dispatcher the woman was inside his home and shooting at him. He said he had barricaded himself in his bedroom. The dispatcher told the deputies she heard gunshots in the background along with a woman screaming.

After parking halfway down the driveway, Sgt. Jared Nichols and Deputy Bobby Sims heard the sound of breaking glass and the noise of items being thrown around as they approached the home on foot.

The dispatcher relayed a message to tell the man, who was still on the phone with her, to climb out the bedroom window. Instead, he exited through the back


## REPORT: Bristol felon took investigator's truck, used gun & badge to pose as undercover officer

Convicted felon Travis Allen has spent a lot of time in the back of patrol cars but in recent months, it seems he's been in the driver's seat.

Allen, 29, has been a frequent guest of the Liberty County Jail and has served time in prison for crimes including grand theft, credit card fraud, forgery and possession of cocaine.

Late last year, he was doing work on patrol vehicles used by Liberty County Sheriff's Office (LCSO). On Dec. 2, 2011, LCSO drug investigator Todd Wheatley dropped off his 2007 Chevy Tahoe at Allen's Bristol residence to have the emergency lights on the grill

repaired.

Not only did the lights get repaired, Allen took it for a test drive. And, according to the investigation conducted by the Franklin County Sheriff's Office, it was a heck of a

test drive.

A probable cause prepared by FCSO Sgt. Robert Shelley determined that Allen broke the law by falsely impersonating an officer and being in possession of a gun because he was a convicted felon.

Shelley said the judge refused to sign a warrant on the first charge because they had not caught him in the act of pretending to be a law enforcement officer.

"But he (the judge) did tell me he would sign a warrant for grand theft of a motor vehicle," Shelley said. But he said the Liberty County Sheriff's Office wouldn't agree to it and the charge was not pursued.

# Investigator's truck taken along with badge & gun

Allen was sentenced for the gun possession charge on June 4 in Liberty County, where he was already scheduled to be sentenced for a parole violation. He was ordered to serve two years for the gun charge.

An employee in the Franklin County Clerk's Office said a handwritten Notice to Appear was issued at the last moment on the gun charge.

Allen was whisked away from Liberty County and is now in the Department of Corrections Reception and Medical Center in Lake Butler until he is assigned to a prison.

The probable cause outlined Allen's alleged activities, including the following:

Allen met a woman at Harry's Bar in Carrabelle on the weekend of Dec. 3, 2011. Later that night they went to a bonfire in the woods where a group had gathered. Witnesses said Allen had a large ice chest filled with beer in the back of the Tahoe. Sometime during the evening, Allen turned on the emergency lights and sirens, causing some of the party-goers to panic and flee, according to his date.

The two stayed in touch on Facebook. She told investigators that when they met up about three weeks later, he was not driving the Tahoe. When she asked why, he said he didn't have it because he got in trouble for pulling people over on St. George Island.


He told her he was an undercover cop and had done drug busts for other counties. His story was believable, according to FCSO Sgt. Robert Shelley, because Allen took her to the Liberty County Sheriff's Office in Bristol. "He went through several ploys to convince her he was a Liberty County deputy, including acting like he went into the sheriff's office to get a gas card," Shelley said in his report. The woman said Allen would call her and "act like he was with the sheriff and the major."

In mid-December, the Franklin County Sheriff's Office began to look into Allen's activities after getting reports about a man in white Chevrolet Tahoe equipped with lights and siren who was selling drugs. They also got calls about a white male coming into bars, telling people he was an undercover deputy and asking a bartender to put a gun and badge behind the bar for safekeeping while he was in the establishment.

In late December at Club 98, Allen told a bartender he was an undercover deputy and that Franklin County Deputy Kit Mashburn had given him a ride that night to the bar.

When Mashburn learned his name was being used, he went looking for Allen. When he later found him at a bar and confronted him, Allen denied the allegations and denied having a badge or gun.

Investigators documented accounts of Allen's other activities in Franklin County.

On Dec. 14, Club 98 owner Jayson Woolever and FCSO Detention Deputy Freddy Kilgore were standing outside the bar looking at Kilgore's antique rifle. Allen stopped and spoke with them and asked Woolever if he wanted to see his gun. Woolever said he went with Allen to a truck, where Allen pulled out a 9mm Sig P220 that he said he got in a pawn shop. Woolever said Allen told him he was with the Liberty County Sheriff's Office and was led to believe he was a narcotics officer.

On Dec. 16, Club 98 bartender reported Allen coming in and handing over a gun for her to put behind the bar. It was in a holster with a badge that had a gold star design. The woman told him she was uncomfortable with guns and he assured her the safety was on. Because she believed he was a deputy, she said she did as he asked. She said others had heard him claim to be a law enforcement officer. She gave them the name of the woman he briefly dated and suggested they speak with her.

On Jan. 5, 2012, LCSO Investigator Todd Wheatley was interviewed and stated that he left his truck at Allen's residence on Dec. 2 and returned for it on Dec. 5.

On Jan. 10, 2012, investigators talked with the woman Allen met in Harry's Bar. She said she never saw him with a gun or a badge, but did say he sent her a photo to her phone of several files on a desk labeled Gulf, Calhoun, Liberty and Gadsden. The text read: "Four counties down, one to go. LOL."

### Woman charged when meth lab found in her Mossy Pond home

Over 20 ounces of meth oil, along with the supplies and ingredients to make more, was found when deputies searched the home of a Mossy Pond woman last week, according to a report from the Calhoun County Sheriff's Office.

32-ounce bottle of Coleman camp fuel commonly used to make meth were also discovered in the kitchen.

After those items were collected, Grumbling was arrested for the manufacture of methamphetamine.

Sgt. Jared Nichols then joined deputies at the scene and the search continued. Found at that time was the following:

After getting a tip that Brittany Grumbling, 24, had been manufacturing methamphetamine, Deputy Jody Hoagland learned that she had bought pseudoephedrine nine times over a four month period. The last purchase was June 18. One attempt to buy pseudoephedrine was blocked.

Deputies searched her NW Bar G. Ranch Road residence on June 20 and reported the following:

A plate that held a razor and white powder residue was found in open view on a computer desk.

Two 32-ounce bottles half full of liquid with a white substance at the bottom, identified as methamphetamine reaction vessels, were pulled out from under the kitchen sink.

A two-liter reaction vessel and a

A 20-ounce bottle that held a bi-level layer was found on a kitchen countertop.

A plastic bag discovered on a kitchen shelf held several lithium batteries with the lithium strips removed.

Two empty packs of lithium batteries were found hanging on a bedroom mirror.

A barrel near the rear of the home held what appeared to be burnt lithium batteries.

Grumbling was taken to the county jail, where she was charged with trafficking in methamphetamine (over 200 grams) and possession of meth oil. She is being held without bond.

# Telogia man in burn unit after gas grill explodes

A Telogia man is in the burn center at Shands Hospital in Gainesville after a six-foot-tall combination gas grill and propane smoker exploded when he tried to relight it.

Robert "Tater" Bradley, 42, was preparing the grill in his outdoor cookshed Saturday afternoon. He lit it and walked away to get a plate of fish as the grill heated up, according to his girlfriend, Cara Gowan, 45.

He returned to find the fire had gone out. Gowan, who was standing just five or six

feet away, said there was no noticeable gas odor from the grill. "He opened the door, went to light it again and it just exploded," she said. "The fire just about knocked him down."

She said he received deep second and third degree burns, with the right side of his face and arm getting the worst of it. "I could smell burning hair and skin," she said. She said he kept repeating "Call 911." She did, and then they removed his shirt as she tried to help him.

"He was in a lot of pain," she said. Liberty County Sgt. Jamie Shiver

responded to the scene and stayed with them as they waited for the ambulance to come from Bristol. "He did a really good job of keeping us calm and keeping Tater sitting down because he kept trying to walk around," Gowan said.

The 911 dispatcher instructed her to put a cold wet rag on the burns until help arrived. Bradley was transported to Tallahassee Memorial Hospital. Doctors there recommended sending him on to the burn unit in Gainesville due to the severity of his injuries.

"He's doing pretty good," she said

Monday evening. "Doctors are trying to decide which way to go on grafting," she said, explaining they don't yet know if they will use his own skin or work with pig skin. "They want to wait one more day and then look at it again before deciding," she said.

Bradley has had the large grill for over a year and frequently uses it. She said they believe the cooker exploded after the flame died out and fumes had collected inside, causing the explosion when he leaned in and flicked his lighter.

# FWC seeks assistance in the case of an illegal deer killed in Liberty Co.



Friday, June 8 around 6 p.m. a doe deer was killed and then dumped into a manhole near the Hwy. 20 bridge in Liberty County.

According to FWC Lt. Harry Parker, there were several people in the area when the incident occurred. There is a possibility that a white Z-71 pick-up truck with three individuals in it have knowledge of what happened. The truck is described as a 98-99 model, with an

extended cab and short bed. The driver is described as a short white male, approximately 5:6" to 5:8", slightly heavy with short brown hair and probably in his late teens.

One passenger was described as a tall white male with long dark brown hair, who is also in his teens.

The other passenger was a white female.

We feel confident that someone in

the area may recognize the individuals from the above description.

We are requesting anyone with information, to call our toll free number at (888) 404-3922 and we in turn will contact them. Anyone with information may remain anonymous if they wish.

This violation is of a concern because not only was an illegal deer killed during a closed season, but it was then simply discarded.

# Altha man killed in single-vehicle crash off CR 69A Thursday

A 54-year-old Altha man died early Thursday morning when he was thrown from his truck as it went off the road and overturned, according to a report from the Florida Highway Patrol (FHP).

Johnny L. Blackburn was killed in the 6:20 a.m. accident.

Investigating FHP Trooper C. Chapman reported that Blackburn, who was traveling south on CR 69A in a 1988 Chevrolet 3500 work truck with an attached welding machine/generator in the cargo area, entered a sweeping left curve and left the road.

When the truck traveled onto the west shoulder, Blackburn steered left and lost control of the vehicle. The truck returned to the southbound lane, rotated counter clockwise and overturned onto its left side, ejecting him. He was not wearing a seat belt.

The cargo area of the truck broke away from the front of the vehicle, stopping in the southbound lane. The truck came to final rest upright on the east shoulder of CR 69-A, north of CR 194.

The driver, who was found on the east shoulder of the road, was pronounced dead at the scene by the Calhoun County EMS crew.

Blackburn spent his life in Calhoun County and was self-employed as a welder. Family and friends gathered for his funeral Sunday afternoon at Altha Church of God. His complete obituary appears on page 17.



# No one can know how you voted unless *you* tell them

To the editor:

Election season is in full swing and with it, unfortunately, comes the rumor mill. I do not normally address such wild stories but it has come to our attention that the same rumors that ran rampant a few years ago are being stirred up again. These rumors are directed toward the process and integrity of the operation of the Supervisor of Elections' office. I now feel that I must address this to help our voting citizens know that they can have confidence in the security and secrecy of the ballots that they cast.

I have received calls from voters specifically asking if there was a way to see how an individual voted once his or her ballot was placed in the tabulator. The answer is a definitive NO! No one, not even me or my staff, can determine how you marked your ballot. The only way someone can know how you voted, is if you tell them. You have a right to a secret ballot and this office has diligently worked to uphold that right. If anyone tells you otherwise, it is simply not true.

To help voters have more confidence, I would like to briefly outline the process. First, all ballots are coded and printed by our vendor, Election Systems & Software. The left side of each ballot has timing marks which tell the ballot tabulation equipment (M-100 Optical Mark Reader) where the marked oval positions are. The timing marks also tell the M-100 reader the party code and the precinct identification. The marks are necessary to properly tabulate the ballot. There is nothing on the ballot connecting that ballot to you once it is placed in the tabulator.

Next, each machine (M-100) is loaded with a memory-coded card, which includes the election definition. The election definition is used to make sure the ballot is authentic. The public count number on the memory card must be at zero for the equipment operator to open the M-100 for voting. When the polls are opened and a ballot is inserted, the M-100 immediately tabulates the votes on the ballot and saves the results to the memory card. The M-100 does not and cannot scan a copy of the ballot and save it in any order on the memory card. Therefore, you cannot correlate a so-called "ballot copy" to any ballot that has fallen into the ballot box. I invite anyone to observe the opening of the ballot box after the polls are closed to see the total disarray the ballots are in. They fall into the box every way but straight.

Finally, I have heard reports that individuals can obtain daily results during early voting and determine how a candidate is doing as well as being able to see how someone voted. That is the biggest lie and probably the greatest insult to me and the integrity of this office. The fact is results cannot be obtained without leaving a clear indication on the audit log. Each M-100 terminal must be set to the "Closed" position before vote total results can be printed. When closed, the M-100 keeps a system audit log which stores and prints at the end of each

results tape. The log has the exact date and time the terminal was opened and closed for voting. This log will clearly indicate "Polls Closed" on the tape when the terminal has been closed for results. All terminals used for voting are closed and results printed on election night. One can clearly see that neither I nor anyone on my staff would jeopardize our job by doing such a thing for ourselves let alone anyone else. Therefore, as I said before, no one knows any results until the night of the election. As for seeing how someone voted, please see the previous paragraph.

I truly hope this will put to rest these types of rumors that only serve to undermine the election process as well as scare some voters into believing that someone can find out how they voted. These types of tactics are vile, but worse they violate Florida Statutes 104.061 and 104.0615.

If you should have any questions about voting or the process itself, please call my office at 643-5226. I will be happy to talk with you and even show you how the system works. Better yet, please come to the public Logic & Accuracy Test of the tabulation system that we conduct prior to every election. The L & A for the primary election will be held July 26 at 9 a.m. at the courthouse.

Just because someone says it, doesn't necessarily make it true. It is always better to get correct answers about elections from those who work in that profession everyday. Our job is to encourage all eligible voters to vote. It doesn't matter how you vote—by mail, early vote or at the polls—just go vote! When you vote, you can be assured that your vote will be kept secret and will be tabulated properly and will count. That's a promise!



# ASK THE OLD FARMER'S ALMANAC



More than 200 years ago, the Rosetta Stone was unearthed. Can you give me more details? —K. S., Denver, CO

The discovery of the Rosetta Stone in 1799 was nothing short of the key that unlocked the mysteries of Egyptian hieroglyphics. It was as though a French-English, English-French dictionary had been found, but this time, it was a three-way dictionary, one that had translated passages of a decree made in Memphis, the capital of ancient Egypt, from hieroglyphic to demotics and to Greek. The decree dated back to 195 B.C., the time of the coronation ceremonies for Ptolemy V. Some of Napoleon's soldiers found the slab buried in rubble near the Egyptian town of—you guessed it—Rosetta.

Napoleon was excited enough about the discovery to have copies made and passed out to various scholars of his time, in hope that a translation could be obtained. (The

original slab is now on display in the British Museum in London.) One of those copies got into the hands of a young boy, Jean F. Champollion (1790–1832), who vowed to teach himself to read the code. It took him 20 years and required the serious study of Greek, Hebrew, and Coptic (an Egyptian language derivative), but the French youth was ultimately successful. His cracking

of the code eventually led to a new wave of modern Egyptology.

*What was that story about Almanac founder Robert B. Thomas being thought dead before his time?*

Remember Mark Twain (1835–1910) who cabled from Europe to say, "The reports of my death are greatly exaggerated"? (Of course, he

had also been known to advise, "Get your facts first, then you can distort them as you please.") Well, the founder of The Old Farmer's Almanac had a similarly spooky experience when he became ill with smallpox.

Here's a selection from his memoirs written in 1839: "After tarrying a few weeks, and copying for the press my first Almanack, I went to the hospital in Worcester, situated on the hill a mile north of the street, and was inoculated with the smallpox by Dr. J. Green, Sen. When inoculated, I flattered myself and was flattered by the doctor, of being a good subject, and would have the disease light, having never exposed myself to heat and cold nor excessive labor, and had ever been temperate; but it turned out quite otherwise. I had the disease very severely. For many days my life was despaired of; and, in fact, it was, I afterward learned, currently reported in the neighboring towns that I was dead."

#### Solo Sail

On June 27, 1898, Joshua Slocum arrived in Newport, Rhode Island, in his boat *Spray*, completing the first solo sail around the world. He was "3 years, 2 months, and 46,000 miles from his last contact with the United States." On the last lap of his journey, off the coast of Brazil,



Slocum encountered a U.S. Navy vessel, the USS *Oregon*, which inquired whether he'd seen any Spanish men-of-war ships. This was Slocum's first news of the Spanish-American War, which had been declared soon after the sinking of the USS *Maine* in February 1898.

#### Summer Corn Cakes

- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt pepper, to taste
- 2 cups uncooked corn, cut from the cob
- 1/2 cup chopped scallions
- 1/3 cup diced red bell pepper

In a bowl, mix all of the ingredients except for the corn oil. Heat the oil in a skillet. Drop mixture by spoonfuls into the skillet, making individual cakes about 3 inches across. Cook for 2 to 3 minutes on each side, just until golden. Serve with sour cream and salsa. **MAKES ABOUT 15 CAKES.**

No fireworks allowed on the National Forests in FL

TALLAHASSEE – The National Forests in Florida Supervisor Susan Jeheber-Matthews is reminding visitors and campers that the use of all fireworks is prohibited on the Apalachicola, Osceola and Ocala National Forests.


Fireworks and other pyrotechnic devices are prohibited on national grassland and national forest lands year-round, regardless of weather conditions or holidays.

Regulations are enforced, and violation is punishable as a misdemeanor by a fine of not more than \$5,000 or imprisonment of not more than six months, or both.

Forest visitors are also reminded to ensure that all fires are extinguished and cold to the touch before leaving them.

# LCSO responds to questions about stolen truck, gun & badge

The Liberty County Sheriff's Office was not forthcoming when asked about the Travis Allen case but did agree to answer a list of questions submitted by The Journal.

That list of questions follows, along with the answers given. Several questions went unanswered. LCSO Spokesman Lt. Brigham Shuler called after the Journal received their responses and asked if we needed anything else. When it was suggested that more thorough answers would be helpful, he replied, "What you see is what you get."

*What charges does Travis Allen face in Liberty County for the theft of Todd Wheatley's truck?*

At this time Travis Allen faces no charges in Liberty County for theft of a vehicle. The entire case file was provided to the State's Attorney. After his review of the information Allen was charged with possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

*Where did Travis get the gun and badge and who do they belong to?*

We have no information about a Sig Sauer P220 weapon. LCSO does not own such a weapon. We are not missing any weapons or badges.

*Who is the owner of the 9mm Sig P220 gun that Travis showed to a witness outside a Franklin County bar Dec. 14?*

No response.

*When was Liberty County notified of the warrant?*

No response.

*Why was Travis never arrested on the Franklin County charges?*

We refer you to Franklin County Sheriff's office for comment on their investigations.

*What were the dates that Travis was last in the Liberty County Jail, what were the charges and how long was he there?*

Mr. Allen was sentenced in Liberty County Circuit Court on Sept. 6, 2008 for the offense of grand theft (passing worthless bank checks) and he was placed on probation. On Jan. 27, 2012 he was violated for failing to comply with the conditions of his probation. On Feb. 9, 2012 he was arrested by warrant and placed in the Liberty County Jail. In Circuit Court on June 4, 2012, he entered a plea admitting to the violation of probation. He also admitted to being in possession of a firearm in Franklin County. He was sentenced to 2 years in the Dept. of Corrections. On June 4, 2012 he was released

to the custody of DOC.

*How long has Travis been working with you as an informant?*

As a matter of policy we do not comment on confidential informants.

*How many cases has he assisted the LCSO with?*

Mr. Allen has been contracted to work in the past. He was paid for his work.

*What other jobs/services does he perform for the LCSO or Todd Wheatley?*

No response.

*Are any of these paying jobs and if so, how is he paid? (The FCSO report stated he was doing electrical work on the truck) Is he considered an employee of the sheriff's office?*

We have no information of him doing any work for other persons or agencies.

*How many county vehicles, and county employees' personal vehicles, has Travis worked on?*

No response.

*How many times over the past four years has Travis had use of county vehicles and for what purpose?*

No response.

*Has Travis ever been sent to refuel a county vehicle at the county fuel yard or any other place?*

Mr. Allen has never had a county gas card nor has he been sent to fuel yard to fill vehicles.

*Whose gas card does he use at the fuel yard or does he have his own?*

Mr. Allen has never had a county gas card nor has he been sent to fuel yard to fill vehicles.

*According to Franklin County's investigation, Travis sent someone photos of case files taken at the LCSO. How much access does/did he have to the agency's files? Did he also work in Todd's Wheatley's office?*

Mr. Allen has not had access to LCSO files.

*The report also noted that Travis admitted that he got in trouble for pulling people over on St. George Island in the LCSO Tahoe. What action did the LCSO take regarding that issue?*

We are unaware of Mr. Allen getting into trouble for stopping vehicles.

*Has Travis Allen ever worked as an informant with the Franklin County Sheriff's Office?*

No response.

*Is any disciplinary action being taken against Todd Wheatley?*

No disciplinary action has been taken on Deputy Wheatley.





# FWC, DEP, DACS to merge July 1

On July 1, officers and staff from the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and the Department of Agricultural and Consumer Services (DACs) will be combined with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) in a move directed by the Florida Legislature and approved by Gov. Rick Scott.

The 145 new sworn officers will don FWC uniforms and integrate completely into the ranks of the FWC, resulting in more efficient service to Floridians and visitors.

“We will have more field-level officers available to respond to calls,” said Col. Jim Brown, division director. “New and current FWC officers will be expected to patrol state forests, state parks, wildlife management areas and state waters as a more efficient and effective team.”

The reorganization will save the state more than \$3 million over the next five years and \$1.28 million in recurring, annual savings.

“Through rearranging extra management and support positions, the consolidation will establish additional patrol and first-response capabilities and expand law enforcement coverage,” Brown said.

The public can expect to see FWC officers in state parks and state forests and call upon them for help.

“We will continue to provide excellent resource protection, boating-and-waterways services and public safety protection,” Brown said.

People should report fish and wildlife crimes, boating violations as well as environmental crimes and state park and state forest issues to the FWC’s Wildlife Alert Hotline: (888) 404-3922.

DEP’s Bureau of Emergency Response (BER) will not move to the FWC, but will continue responding to emergency chemical spills and working with law enforcement on environmental crime matters at DEP. DEP’s emergency numbers, #DEP or 877-2-SAVEFL should be used to report environmental emergencies, such as oil and chemical spills.

“The consolidation of officers will provide a more extensive network of environmental crime law enforcement coverage throughout Florida,” said BER Chief Gwen Keenan.

In 2011 the Florida Legislature created a Law Enforcement Consolidation Task Force, which met to develop work groups and evaluate functions of several law enforcement agencies. Ultimately, it recommended that DEP’s Division of Law Enforcement be integrated into the FWC’s Division of Law Enforcement. It also suggested that some personnel from the DACs Office of Agricultural Law Enforce-

ment – the officers assigned to patrol state forests and the investigator responsible for commercial aquaculture violations – be incorporated.

“FWC officers in the field have been working alongside DEP and DACs officers for years,” Brown said. “The consolidation simply provides an official, more efficient method of serving the public.”





# New ambulance simulator gives realistic training to First Responders at Chipola

MARIANNA—Chipola College officials on Wednesday unveiled a new Ambulance Simulator designed to train first responders.

The Ambulance Simulator replicates the box of an ambulance with all the usual equipment in tight quarters for a patient and EMT or Paramedic students. The simulator is also equipped with video cameras to record students during training scenarios.

A human patient simulator will be used within the ambulance. The patient simulator can breathe, bleed and talk just like a real patient. Students will be able to perform basic tasks such as taking patient history, checking vitals, drawing blood and starting IV fluids.

Chipola instructor Josh Williams says, "This is a valuable tool in training first responders in a high stress situation." Instructor Keith Maddox says, "We can control the patient's vital signs and speech from a remote location and observe the student responses to each situation."

Vickie Stephens, Chipola's Dean of Health Science programs, says, "The new simulator is just one component of a three-year project focused on increasing the number of EMTs, Paramedics, Certified Nursing Assistants (CNA) and bridge students- LPN or Paramedic to RN. The main purpose of the program is to get people in the workforce trained for a career in health care within two years."

In addition to providing funding for the Ambulance Simulator, the funding also may be used to hire additional instructors as needed.

Prospective students may contact the One-Stop Centers in Marianna, Blountstown and Chipley to determine eligibility for assistance with program costs and other services.




## Warmer weather signals active time for gators & crocs

As the weather has heated up, so too have Florida's alligator and crocodile activities and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) reminds Floridians and visitors to be cautious when having fun in and around water.

Florida is home to two native crocodilians: the American alligator, which is found in all 67 counties and the American crocodile, which may be found in coastal areas of the Keys and in southeast and southwest Florida. Both species have shared Florida's waters with people for centuries.

The FWC recommends keeping pets away from the water. There are other precautionary measures people should take to reduce the chances for conflicts with alligators and crocodiles, and they are available in the Living with Alligators brochure at MyFWC.com/Alligator and the Living with Crocodiles brochure at MyFWC.com/Crocodile.

The FWC advises, if you have concerns with an alligator or crocodile that poses a threat to you, your pets or property, call the FWC's Nuisance Alligator Hotline at 866-FWC-GATOR (392-4286).

Alligators and crocodiles are an important part of Florida's heritage and play a valuable role in the ecosystems where they live.

door of the home. Toole followed.

Toole told deputies she had a gunshot wound on the inside of her leg and was taken to the emergency room for what turned out to be a superficial wound. Once she was medically cleared, she was taken to the county jail.

And her ex finally had a chance to tell about his terrifying night.

.....

The man said he and Toole had been involved in a relationship since April. She moved in with him, but on June 4, she suddenly moved out and returned to her home on Compass Lake in Jackson County.

He believed things were still fine between them until she shared that she was "dealing with a lot" following her husband's recent suicide.

Then things got worse. He said she called him on June 19 and accused him of making derogatory remarks about her to several people. He told deputies he tried to convince her that he had not done that, but she would not believe him. He said she told him that she would kill him and warned him "watch your back."

That night, he heard a vehicle pull up to his gate. Then he heard gunshots. Because of their last conversation, and the fact that he thought he recognized the headlights on the vehicle, he realized it was Toole.

She drove through his closed gate and came down his 150-foot driveway. He looked out the bathroom window to see her ram his Ford F350 with her 2011 Nissan SUV. The impact pushed the truck 52 inches.

Next, she drove behind the house and went up to his back door. It appears she fired a shot through the door and then used the gun to break open enough room to put her arm through and unlock it.

From behind the locked door of his bedroom, he shouted at her not to come inside. He repeatedly told her to "calm down."

She started firing at him through the bedroom wall and door.

Toole was shouting obscenities when the bullets started flying and repeated that she was going to kill

him, the man told investigators.

Four bullet holes were found in the wall to the left of the bedroom. Another was found in the man's bedroom door. One bullet went through the bedroom and out the front bedroom window.

The man told deputies he had armed himself with the .22-lever action long rifle he keeps in the bedroom.

He said that at one point, Toole kicked the bedroom door open but did not enter the room. The man took refuge in the bathroom and waited for deputies to arrive.

.....

While examining the scene, Lt. Mark Mallory searched Toole's vehicle. Toole's purse was in the front passenger seat. Inside was a cell phone and a wallet with Toole's driver's license and credit cards.

An empty nylon holster had been left in the front passenger floorboard with a box of 16 9mm rounds. Nearby was a spent 9mm casing. A single gunshot that appeared to have been fired from the inside went through the driver's door.

An empty 12 ounce bottle of Seagram's wine cooler had been dropped in the passenger floorboard. Another wine cooler bottle - the one she was holding when she emerged from the house - was found on the back porch, along with a spent 9mm casing.

While following the pattern of bullets inside the home, Mallory found a spent full metal jacket round on the floor of the master bedroom. He said it appeared that the bullet hit a metal door hinge, which caused the bullet to slow down enough to remain inside the bedroom.

One bullet hole was found in the metal pipe gate. A spent casing and one spent round were left at the gate in the middle of the driveway.

Assistant State Attorney Shad Redmond did a walkthrough at the scene before charges were determined.

Toole was charged with attempted first degree murder with a firearm, armed burglary with a firearm and criminal mischief over \$1,000.
