Kinard teen killed in crash with log truck

SCOTTS FERRY - Emergency responders lost one of their own Tuesday morning. Just 17 years old, Ryan Flowers had already gone on ride-alongs with local ambulance crews and helped out at the Kinard Fire Department for the past year and a half. He planned to be a paramedic.

"He was a prince of a young man," said his friend and neighbor, Jody Daniels. "He loved to help people. That's what his main goal in life was."

Ryan was on his way to school Tuesday morning when he pulled into the path of a log truck. He died in the collision.

He was eastbound on CR 392 around 7:27 a.m. when he made a left turn onto SR 71, crossing in front of a southbound 1998 Kenworth semi driven by Raymond E. Pelt, 45, of Eastpoint. The log truck slammed into the left front of Ryan's 1999 Ford F-150.

Both vehicles came to rest on the northbound shoulder of SR 71.

Daniels was the first one on the scene.

"I'd just driven through there three minutes earlier when I got

especially tough call for them to work. "We were shocked," Daniels said of learning who was in the wreckage, "but everybody put it aside and did what we had to do."

Later, people gathered at the Kinard Fire Department where local pastors met with them and they prayed together.

This wasn't just any accident. "It's bad enough when you're working on a young person," Daniels said, "but when it's one of your own...." He paused before adding, "It tore us up."

"He was like a little brother to me," Daniels said. "Just last night we were texting about football."

Daniels saw Ryan grow up. "I remember when I was in middle school and he was in Pre-K," he said, recalling the little boy's distinctive haircut. "He looked just like his daddy and he had a little mullet," he said.

Ryan was always quiet and shy. Daniels said he didn't realize how smart he was until he learned Ryan was the Valedictorian of his eighth grade class.



Driver pinned in wreck

A Bristol man was taken by emergency helicopter to an area hospital after being removed by rescue workers who found him trapped under his car Saturday afternoon on MLK Blvd. in Bristol.

Liberty County Sheriff's Office Sgt. Jody Hoagland waited with the injured

man, identified as 33-year-old Harvey E. Dawkins as an ambulance was dispatched. The vehicle was resting on its side, facing southeast, about 50 feet off the road. Dawkins, who was partially ejected out the front passenger's side window, was face down on the ground with the vehicle on his back, pinning him down.

While waiting for help, Dawkins told Hoagland that he knew he was going to jail because he had been drinking and his driver's license was suspended.

Volunteers from the Rock Bluff Fire Department used an axe to break out the windshield to allow paramedics to reach the injured driver.

He was flown from the scene by Air Heart 2 and taken to Bay Medical Center in Panama City.

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Woman admits drinking and driving following traffic stop

BRISTOL - A driver who was having difficulty staying on the road after coming over the Trammell Bridge into Bristol was charged with DUI following a traffic stop around 7:13 p.m. on April 26.

Liberty County Sheriff's Deputy Jarrod Taylor signaled for the driver to stop after seeing her swerve off the road twice, going six to eight feet over the white line.

Instead of pulling over, she stopped the vehicle in the road. A few moments later, she pulled off the road into the parking area in front of Severance Sign Shop.

The deputy noticed the strong odor of an alcoholic beverage as he walked up to the driver, identified as Laquita Marie Parramore, 60, of Bristol, as she was trying to fasten her seatbelt. A 12-pack of beer was in the passenger's seat.

Parramore agreed to take a roadside sobriety test but was unable to follow directions, according to the deputy's report. When she had difficulty walking heel-to-toe, she started to fall and then stated, "I can't do these tests. Just call my son to come get me."

She was placed under arrest for DUI. The deputy said she was "very dramatic" and "continuously crying," repeatedly asking him to call a family member to come get her.

En route to the jail, she soiled herself and when asked why it happened, she told the deputy, "Because I'm drunk."

While waiting to give a breath sample to determine her level of intoxication, Parramore stated, "Well, I'll probably be guilty because I was drinking and driving all the way to Shelton's Corner and back here." She added that she "only drank of couple of beers" on the way back.

Breath tests resulted in readings of .20. The legal limit is .08.

Reward offered in hunting camp thefts

Someone made off with hundreds of dollars' worth of property after breaking into a hunting camp off Melvin New Grade Road Thursday, according to the Calhoun County Sheriff's Office.

Three charged in attack on Blountstown pair

BLOUNTSTOWN - Three men have been arrested following an altercation at a Blountstown apartment on April 27.

Kenshawn Scott Jackson, 19, Blountstown, was arrested April 28 for battery.

Devonta Ross, 20, of Jacksonville, was taken into custody the next day and charged with battery with a burglary and battery on a pregnant victim.

A third man, Milton Higgins, 19, of Blountstown, was arrested for battery on April 30.

According to the arrest report from the Blountstown Police Department,

the men went to the apartment around 10 p.m. and began banging on the door and windows.


When a woman opened the door, Ross pushed her away and ran inside. He grabbed a man and dragged him outside, where three others - including Jackson - were waiting.

Witnesses said the men punched and kicked their victim in the face and torso as he lay on the ground. When the woman who had opened the door tried to intervene, she was shoved to the ground. When two witnesses came to see about the woman, who is pregnant, the four men fled on foot.

Man charged with battery in April 14 dispute

BRISTOL - The brother of a man in a dispute with another filed charges after he said he was injured when the two were arguing.

Deonte Deveaux reported that he went to help his brother, who was hit by the open door of a car driven by Edgar Baskerville, 24, of Bristol, on April 14.


Baskerville and Deveaux's brother, Andre Fountain began fighting. When Deveaux tried to break it up, he said Baskerville hit the accelerator, causing him to fall down and hurt his arm, which was caught inside the vehicle. The sheriff's office incident report noted Deveaux had scrapes on his left hip and both arms after being dragged for about three feet.

Fountain called the Liberty County Sheriff's Office the previous night to report that Baskerville had threatened to come to his home and fight him.

Baskerville was arrested on April 26 for battery.

He was arrested and taken to the Calhoun County Sheriff's Office, where he was charged.

Dog attack ends family argument

LITTLE NEW YORK - A man and his mother were taken to the emergency room with injuries following a family argument that ended with an attack by their Great Dane, according to a report from the Calhoun County Sheriff's Office.

Deputies arrived at the Aultman Drive residence in an area known as "Little New York" outside of Altha around 6:30 p.m. on Saturday in response to a domestic disturbance complaint when a man called to say his brother was trying to kill him and their mother.

The man said he and his brother were having words over cleaning the house when their mother stepped between them in an effort to keep the peace. In the midst of the argument, the family dog joined in. The dog bit one brother on the left side of his abdomen and his right hip. The mother's injuries were more extensive. The 50-year-old woman reportedly had bites to her left arm and right leg.

The injured man stated that his brother never hit him but he called 911 because he was afraid things were about to get out of hand.

Driver charged with third DUI

BRISTOL - A man found going 14 miles over the speed limit on Turkey Creek Road around 1:40 p.m. is facing several charges, including his third DUI.

Liberty County Deputy Jonathan Gentry pulled over a southbound pickup traveling 39 mph in a 25 mph zone in a residential area on April 26.

The deputy noticed the strong odor of an alcoholic beverage when he approached the driver, identified as Kevin Whited, 39, of Bristol.

Whited admitted to having a couple of beers earlier - with a nap in between the two, according to the report. He had one unopened beer in the truck, which

he told the deputy had been there two days and was hot. When the truck was last inventoried, the deputy found the beer was very cold.

Whited agreed to take a roadside sobriety test but when asked to stand on one leg, he said, "Just take me to jail for my suspended license. I don't want to do this."

He was charged with DUI, driving with license suspended or revoked with knowledge and refusal to submit to a breath test.

The report noted that his previous DUIs were in 1996 and 2008.

After reporting stabbing approx. two hours earlier
Teen charged with stealing wine from 1 store; shirt, cap from another

BLOUNTSTOWN - An 18-year-old was charged with two counts of retail theft, resisting arrest without violence and possession of alcohol by a person under 21 after a Dollar General store clerk noticed him taking swigs from a bottle of wine as he walked around the store Saturday night.

After just two minutes in the store, he left at 7:24 p.m. without making a purchase. The clerk followed him outside and saw him pull a black shirt and a cap from the back of his pants. He ran when the clerk called out to him.

Blountstown Police Officer Adam Terry caught up to Travis Reid Hays walking north on Charlie Johns Street. He was wearing the stolen shirt and cap.

After being identified by the store clerk, officers started to take Hays into custody but he resisted. He was held down on a patrol car as he was handcuffed. As soon as he got into the patrol car, Hays stepped through the handcuffs, bringing them in front of him.

He was held down a second time and handcuffed once again.

Video from the neighboring Harveys Supermarket showed Hays sticking a

bottle of wine down the back of his pants just 11 minutes before he went to Dollar General, where additional surveillance video was collected.

He was given a conditional release from jail following his arrest.

Earlier that day, Hays walked into Mo's Gas Mart with superficial wounds, according to the police report.

A store clerk called for an ambulance when Hays - who had been at the store just 10 minutes earlier - returned just before 5 p.m. and said he had been stabbed but claimed he had no idea how it happened.

The wounds were said to be superficial and officers did not rule out the possibility that they were self-inflicted.

Hays told officers he had been at "The Cut" off River Street, where someone stabbed him in the arm and tried to cut his throat. He initially stated he didn't know who did it; then, he told officers that even if he did know, he wouldn't tell them.

He was transported to the emergency room at Calhoun-Liberty Hospital, where he refused treatment after he was denied pain medication, according to the incident report.

Teen admits drinking before driving stolen Jeep into tree

BLOUNTSTOWN - A drunken joyride ended with a crash and an arrest Thursday for a teenager.

Blountstown Police Officers dispatched to a wreck at the intersection of River Street and Gadsden Avenue at 4:24 a.m. arrived to find a silver Jeep SUV had collided with a large oak tree. The driver was not present. A DNA sample was taken from some blood found on the steering wheel.

One of the vehicle's owners, Malcomb Snowden, was awakened at his Jeffrey Street residence by officers who told him about the Jeep.

When officers arrived at the home, they were met at the door by a young male - whose name is not listed because he is a juvenile - with a noticeable injury on his lip. The boy said he busted his lip after slipping and falling in the residence.

Snowden said he came home at midnight and went to his room to watch TV. He said the juvenile came to him around 12:45 a.m. to ask for the keys

because he was searching for his phone and jacket. Snowden handed over the keys and later fell asleep.

The keys were brought back and placed on the dresser. Snowden said he had not given anyone permission to use the Jeep.

When interviewed by officers, the juvenile admitted to getting drunk and taking the Jeep.

He was charged with grand theft, operating a motor vehicle on a suspended license with knowledge and leaving the scene of an accident.

Man arrested after trying to get pills with a fake prescription

BLOUNTSTOWN - A Bay County man was charged with attempting to traffic in narcotics and resisting arrest without violence after he tried to pick up 60 hydrocodone pills after a fraudulent prescription was called in to Golden's Pharmacy.

Calhoun County Sheriff's Office Lt. Jared Nichols was called to the scene after it was discovered that a false DEA number had been presented with the prescription.

The pharmacy staff took a closer look after learning that the suspect had come from Panama City to Blountstown to pick up a prescription that was allegedly called in by a Tallahassee doctor. It was later found that the caller had used the name of a physician who had left that practice several months earlier.

Around 3 p.m., Cody Morgan Albritton, 20, of Panama City arrived to pick up the prescription. Nichols returned to the store and approached the man to ask about the prescription.

Albritton could not tell him what doctor he had seen to get the prescription and when asked about his vehicle, he said he was walking and then said a friend had dropped him off.

When Nichols began to run a warrant search through dispatch, Albritton fled on foot across North Main Street. Nichols caught up with him at McDougald's BP and took him into custody.

He declined to answer questions and said he wanted to talk with his attorney, but did state that someone offered to pay him \$200 to pick up the prescription.

Hosford fourth-grader has tumor on adrenal gland and kidney Fundraising page set up to help with expenses for boy's surgery

Hosford residents Loretta Amanda Michelle Mayfield and Lucky Martin have set up an page at the online site, YouCaring.com, to help with the growing expenses they will incur during an upcoming trip to Cincinnati, Ohio, where her son will undergo surgery to remove a tumor.

Hosford School fourth-grader Jonathan Dart has a rare condition known as Pheochromocytoma, in which a tumor - most likely benign - secretes excessive amounts of the hormones epinephrine and norepinephrine, resulting in high blood pressure.

If left untreated, the condition can be life-threatening. It can cause stroke or damage the kidneys, brain or heart.

An estimated 800 cases are diagnosed each year in the United States.

"He is attending school now but cannot do any contact sports," his mother said.

They first learned about his condition after he was taken to Calhoun-Liberty Hospital with stomach pains. A CAT scan found the tumor.

The family returned to the hospital in Ohio late last month. "Doctors are waiting for many of the tests to come back," his mother said. "His body and bones are growing too fast. They believe that removal of the mass and adrenal gland might but an option. They are also running tests on the kidney to see if it will be removed also," she said.

They hope to raise enough money to help pay for their flight, food and accommodations while staying with Jonathan during his upcoming surgery, which has yet to be scheduled.

As Ryan got older, the two had more in common. Too much, it might seem, when it comes to hunting and fishing. In fact, Daniels pointed out, "He killed every deer around here. I encouraged his girlfriend to have him take her out more so the other hunters would have a chance."

Ryan lived past John Daniels Road in Kinard, near Daniels. On weekend nights, Daniels would hear Ryan's truck as he came home at 11:45 p.m. in time for curfew after visiting his girlfriend in Wewahitchka. If

you had a daughter, "Ryan is the kind of guy you'd want her to marry," he said.

By early Tuesday afternoon, more than 50 vehicles were parked at the home where Ryan lived with his parents, Chris and Lori Flowers, and his sister, Karissa.

Although his life was short, it

must have been a happy one as evidenced by a message he posted on his Facebook page to his emergency responder friends this past December: "This is


the best place on earth and I don't know where I'd be without them. All

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A final toast for the DOOLITTLE RAIDERS

On Tuesday, in Fort Walton Beach, the surviving Doolittle Raiders will gather publicly for the last time.

They once were among the most universally admired and revered men in the United States. There were 80 of the Raiders in April 1942, when they carried out one of the most courageous and heart-stirring military operations in this nation's history. The mere mention of their unit's name, in those years, would bring tears to the eyes of grateful Americans.

Now only four survive.

After Japan's sneak attack on Pearl Harbor, with the United States reeling and wounded, something dramatic was needed to turn the war effort around.

Even though there were no friendly airfields close enough to Japan for the United States to launch a retaliation, a daring plan was devised. Sixteen B-25s were modified so that they could take off from the deck of an aircraft carrier. This had never before been tried -- sending such big, heavy bombers from a carrier.

The 16 five-man crews, under the command of Lt. Col. James Doolittle, who himself flew the lead plane off the USS Hornet, knew that they would not be able to return to the carrier. They would have to hit Japan and then hope to make it to China for a safe landing.

But on the day of the raid, the Japanese military caught wind of the plan. The Raiders were told that they would have to take off from much farther out in the Pacific Ocean than they had counted on. They were told that because of this they would not have enough fuel to make it to safety.

And those men went anyway.

They bombed Tokyo, and then flew as far as they could. Four planes crash-landed; 11 more crews bailed out, and three of the Raiders died. Eight more were captured; three were executed. Another died of starvation in a Japanese prison camp. One crew made it to Russia.

The Doolittle Raid sent a message from the United States to its enemies, and to the rest of the world: We will fight.

And, no matter what it takes, we

will win.

Of the 80 Raiders, 62 survived the war. They were celebrated as national heroes, models of bravery. Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer produced a motion picture based on the raid; "Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo," starring Spencer Tracy and Van Johnson, was a patriotic and emotional box-office hit, and the phrase became part of the national lexicon. In the movie-theater previews for the film, MGM proclaimed that it was presenting the story "with supreme pride."

Beginning in 1946, the surviving Raiders have held a reunion each April, to commemorate the mission. The reunion is in a different city each year. In 1959, the city of Tucson, Arizona, as a gesture of respect and gratitude, presented the Doolittle Raiders with a set of 80 silver goblets. Each goblet was engraved with the name of a Raider.

Every year, a wooden display case bearing all 80 goblets is transported to the reunion city. Each time a Raider passes away, his goblet is turned upside down in the case at the next reunion, as his old friends bear solemn witness.

Also in the wooden case is a bottle of 1896 Hennessy Very Special cognac. The year is not happenstance: 1896 was when Jimmy Doolittle was born.

There has always been a plan: When there are only two surviving Raiders, they would open the bottle, at last drink from it, and toast their comrades who preceded them in death.

As 2013 began, there were five living Raiders; then, in February, Tom Griffin passed away at age 96.

The name may be familiar to those of you who regularly read this column; in 2011, I wrote about the role Mr. Griffin played at his son's wedding.

What a man he was. After bailing out of his plane over a mountainous Chinese forest after the Tokyo raid, he became ill with malaria, and almost died. When he recovered, he was sent to Europe to fly more combat missions. He was shot down, captured, and spent 22 months in a German prisoner of war camp.

The selflessness of these men, the

sheer guts ... there was a passage in the Cincinnati Enquirer obituary for Mr. Griffin that, on the surface, had nothing to do with the war, but that emblemizes the depth of his sense of duty and devotion:

"When his wife became ill and needed to go into a nursing home, he visited her every day. He walked from his house to the nursing home, fed his wife and at the end of the day brought home her clothes. At night, he washed and ironed her clothes. Then he walked them up to her room the next morning. He did that for three years until her death in 2005."

So now, out of the original 80, only four Raiders remain: Dick Cole (Doolittle's co-pilot on the Tokyo raid), Robert Hite, Edward Saylor and David Thatcher. All are in their 90s. They have decided that there are too few of them for the public reunions to continue. The events in Fort Walton Beach this week will mark the end. It has come full circle; Florida's nearby Eglin Field was where the Raiders trained in secrecy for the Tokyo mission.

The town is planning to do all it can to honor the men: a six-day celebration of their valor, including luncheons, a dinner and a parade.

Do the men ever wonder if those of us for whom they helped save the country have tended to it in a way that is worthy of their sacrifice? They don't talk about that, at least not around other people. But if you find yourself near Fort Walton Beach this week, and if you should encounter any of the Raiders, you might want to offer them a word of thanks. I can tell you from firsthand observation that they appreciate hearing that they are remembered.

The men have decided that after this final public reunion they will wait until a later date -- some time this year -- to get together once more, informally and in absolute privacy. That is when they will open the bottle of brandy. The years are flowing by too swiftly now; they are not going to wait until there are only two of them.

They will fill the four remaining upturned goblets.

And raise them in a toast to those who are gone.

Why should our country be the world's policeman?

The Washington neocons are beating the Syrian war drums. Almost daily, people like Senator John McCain are on television proclaiming, "Time for the U.S. to intervene in the civil war in Syria."

President Obama made the mistake of drawing a "red line" as a reason for the U.S. to intervene and help the rebel forces. Obama's red line was the Syrian government's use of chemical weapons against the rebelling forces.




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Action plans for 16 species – including burrowing owl, sandhill crane, fox squirrels – ready for review

Florida's wildlife diversity is reflected in the 16 species of birds, mammals, fish, frogs and snakes whose draft action plans are ready for public review and comment.

The Florida burrowing owl, Florida sandhill crane and Big Cypress and Sherman's fox squirrels are included in the third group of plans to conserve imperiled species unveiled this year by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC). The brown pelican, gopher frog, Florida pine snake, Florida mouse, Sherman's short-tailed shrew, short-tailed snake, Florida bog frog, Georgia blind salamander, Atlantic sturgeon, key silverside, saltwater top minnow and mangrove rivulus are also in this group.

The draft plans and the opportunity to provide input online can be accessed at MyFWC.com/Imperiled. The deadline for commenting on these plans is June 7. The fourth and final group of draft species action plans is scheduled for release in May.

The FWC will revise a total of 49 action plans covering 60 species based on the public's input. While individual species' action plans will not be approved by the Commission, they are the first step in identifying individual species threats and needs. The next step will be developing integrated conservation strategies that address shared priorities in areas such as wildlife management, habitat conservation and research that will benefit many species. Ultimately, the outcome will be an Imperiled Species Management Plan providing a set of tools that the FWC can use to work with the public and partners to ensure all 60 species are conserved as part of Florida's wildlife legacy. The final Imperiled Species Management Plan is scheduled for approval by the Commission in spring 2015.

"Conserving Florida wildlife requires attention to the diversity of species that inhabit our waters, land and air," said Claire Sunquist Blunden, the FWC's stakeholder coordinator for the Imperiled Species Management Plan. "We are excited about the public's opportunity to review these 16 draft action plans and suggest ways to improve them."

The Florida burrowing owl population, for instance, is projected to decline.



Conservation guidelines are suggested in the draft plan to help this pint-sized species averaging 9 inches in height. The only subspecies of burrowing owl east of the Mississippi River spends most of its time on the ground or taking refuge in its burrow. It is often found on farms, airports and golf courses that have replaced its historic Florida prairie habitat. The principal range of the Florida burrowing owl is peninsular Florida, but it can be found in isolated pairs and colonies as far west as Eglin Air Force Base and as far south as Key West.

For the Florida sandhill crane, which can stretch to nearly 4 feet tall, a key priority in the draft plan is to stabilize and grow its population by maintaining shallow wetlands for roosting and nesting and open habitats for foraging. Florida sandhill cranes are particularly at risk because of their low annual reproductive rate. Their population is concentrated in peninsular Florida, from Alachua County southward to the Everglades' northern edge. Available habitat has declined in those areas by 42 percent from 1974 to 2003. While this species is a candidate for federal listing, the FWC's proposed conservation actions may preclude the need for that.

There are two subspecies of sandhill crane in this state. The Florida sandhill crane, with an estimated population of 4,000 to 5,000, is a year-round resident that nests here during late winter and spring on mats of vegetation about 2 feet in diameter in shallow water. It

is joined every winter by 25,000 greater sandhill cranes – larger migratory birds that nest in the Great Lakes region.

The plan for the Florida sandhill crane proposes working cooperatively with ranchers, whose private lands are a stronghold of this species, and using traffic-calming measures such as cau-

tion signs to prevent vehicle collisions with cranes, which often forage along roadways.

Meanwhile, the Big Cypress fox squirrel is experiencing loss, degradation and fragmentation of its southwest Florida habitat, which is increasingly urbanized.

The Sherman's fox squirrel has similar habitat challenges over a wider swath of Florida, with its range extending from the Big Bend in north Florida into most of peninsular Florida. Biologists are in the process of gathering genetic information about the Big Cypress and Sherman's species of fox squirrels. Significant information about where fox squirrels are in Florida came after citizens responded to the FWC's request to report fox squirrel sightings online, resulting in 4,221 sighting locations logged from August 2011 to April 2012.



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
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Pied Pride: Northwest Florida's very own hand-painted bream

Some of my earliest and best memories are of hanging onto a cane pole for dear life and steering a big pied back to me. That thrill is still enough to make me drive two hours, bail a boat and fight mosquitoes all day.



unique? Without getting too science-y, Paxton speculates that it could be a number of factors from the geology of the river system to diet to sexual dimorphism, changes in coloration related to mating.

It's an experience I enjoy even more knowing that these colorful bluegills aren't found anywhere else.

after the fish leaves the water, so it's hard to get them on camera.)

I've heard for years that pied bream are unique to the Apalachicola system, but confirming that information proved to be harder than I thought. So I reached out to the good folks at the Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC).

Paxton confirmed that you won't find pied bream anywhere outside an area bordered roughly by the Apalachicola River to the east and the Chipola River to the west. He has taken them from the Dead Lakes in the south and Merritt's Mill Pond to the north.

The FWC, as it turns out, was way ahead of me on this issue. Chris Paxton, fisheries administrator for FWC's Northwest Florida region, is very familiar with the pied bream and provided me with a ton of information and the best pictures I've ever seen. (The vivid colors start to fade

Paxton said they're also found in Ocheesee Pond, but he suspects they were released there.

Interestingly, testing conducted by a University of Alabama researcher in '04 and '05 found that pied bream aren't genetically different from their more ordinary looking counterparts in the Apalachicola system.

So, why do they show the characteristic mottling patterns that make them so

he collected were sexually mature males. On the other hand, he said they found sexually mature males without the unique colors as well.

We might never know why pied bream bear their spectacular markings, but what's most important to remember here is that, like tupelo honey, they are another part of our natural heritage that makes the Apalachicola River region unique in all the world.

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
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FWC scientists discover new bass species

Scientists with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) have uncovered a new species of black bass in the southeastern United States. Scientists have proposed naming



the species' range. They found that the Choctaw bass inhabits coastal river systems in Alabama and along the western Florida panhandle, including the Choctawhatchee River.

the new species the Choctaw bass and recommended the scientific name of *Micropterus haiaka*. They revealed their discovery at a meeting of the Southern Division of the American Fisheries Society earlier this year.

FWC scientists first noted a DNA profile that did not belong to any recognized species while testing a bass specimen from the Chipola River in 2007, as part of a broader genetic study of bass.

"We didn't set out to find a new species," said Mike Tringali, who heads the genetics laboratory at the FWC's Fish and Wildlife Research Institute. "It found us."

After confirming the initial discovery, scientists searched for the DNA profile in bass caught in nearby rivers to determine

"We chose the name 'Choctaw bass' because the species' range overlaps the historic range of the Choctaw Indians," said Tringali. "As for our recommended scientific name, *Micropterus haiaka*, 'haiaka' is a Choctaw word that means 'revealed.'"

The American Fisheries Society must approve the suggested scientific name for it to take effect.

The Choctaw bass is very similar in appearance to its relative, the spotted bass. The physical differences between the two species are not easily seen with the naked eye, one reason they had never before been distinguished despite decades of bass studies in the region.

Experience alligator hunting; apply now to get your permit

Have you ever wondered how it would be to catch and bring into the boat a 10-foot gator? Well, here's your chance. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has more than 5,000 permits available to participate in the 11-week alligator season, which runs Aug. 15 - Nov. 1.

The application process is conducted in three phases and begins by submitting a no-cost application at any tax collector's office, license agent or through the Internet at www.License.MyFWC.com.

During the Phase I application period, alligator permits are issued by random drawing. Phase I ends May 12, and applicants are limited to being drawn for only one permit.

If selected, applicants have until June 3 to pay the cost of the permit. Otherwise, the permit will be placed back into the system, with the other remaining permits, to be sold in Phase II on a first-come, first-served basis beginning at 10 a.m. June 7 and continuing through June 12. Those who received a permit in Phase I and paid for it cannot apply during Phase II.

Any permits remaining after June 12 will be issued during Phase III on a first-come, first-served basis beginning at 10

a.m. June 14 until all are sold. Anyone can apply during Phase III - despite having already bought a permit in Phase I or Phase II.

Alligator trapping licenses and two hide-validation tags costs \$272 for Florida residents and \$1,022 for nonresidents. If you happen to buy an additional permit during Phase III, it will cost \$62, regardless of whether you are a resident or not. No other hunting license or permits are required to participate in the hunts.

Each permit enables you to take two alligators from whichever county or body of water you were awarded during a specific harvest period. To purchase a permit, you must be at least 18 years old by opening day, Aug. 15.

If you don't have all the gear necessary and you'd rather assist a friend who purchased an alligator trapping license, you can pay \$52 for an alligator trapping "agent" license. You don't even have to be 18 to buy one. This license entitles you to take alligators, but only when you're with a licensed person.

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


