

Altha woman charged with slashing man

An Altha woman was charged with domestic aggravated battery with a deadly weapon after her husband was slashed seven times with a knife during an altercation at their home.

Altha Police Chief James Baggett was dispatched to the NW Oak Street residence at 5:45 p.m. Saturday after a 911 caller reported a stabbing.

The police chief found the injured man bleeding from superficial wounds to his left arm. He declined medical assistance.

The victim said Margaret McCardle came home two hours late from work and pulled up to find him in the yard.

He told the police chief that when his wife got out of the car, she appeared very agitated, started cursing and yelled, "get out of my house!"

He stated that when he told her he was leaving with their child, she replied that he "would die" before that happened.

The victim said she followed him into the house, yelling at him and then started cutting him on the arm. He ran out of the house.

Neighbors reported hearing McCardle screaming for him to leave, and stated that he replied, "O.K."

After the two entered the home, witnesses said they heard her yelling and him calling out, "Please stop. Don't cut me. ...don't stab me," before he ran from the home.

A Paula Dean knife with blood on the tip of its five-inch-long blade was found on the kitchen countertop.

McCardle denied cutting her husband's arm, telling the police chief that the victim cut his own arm "and tried to make it look like I did it."

When asked how she got blood on her left arm, McCardle denied there was any until the police chief pointed it out. He photographed the blood on her arm, which had no injuries or marks, according to the arrest report.

McCardle was booked into the Calhoun County Jail.

Uzzell to Peddie: 'We do not have time to visit with you'

Liberty County School Superintendent Gloria "Gay" Uzzell has essentially told employees not to talk to School Board Chairman Kyle Peddie.

In an email sent late Monday afternoon, Uzzell instructed school district staff to refer Peddie to her office "if he approaches you at work." She pointed out that she is Chief Executive Officer of Liberty County Schools and in charge of personnel. "Managing personnel is not in the realm of a School Board member's duties," she wrote.

"We have much to accomplish prior to the beginning of the school year, and

impromptu visits by others need to be limited." She ended the email by stating, "So, please refer Chairman Peddie to me if he shows up to 'visit' or 'question' you at work and I will be more than happy to assist him."

Not surprisingly, the missive drew responses from both Peddie and School Board member Tina Tharpe.

Peddie responded to the superintendent with an email of his own at 6:24 p.m., noting that he was asked to come to the finance office to sign checks for the district Monday.

He said he discussed the upcoming budget with the new finance director and then went to the high school to donate some money to help pay for the softball team's championship rings.

"At no time did I direct district staff to do anything," he wrote. "There was absolutely no personnel management on my part. I will continue to visit schools as I wish, talk to staff without disruption to their job, and ask questions regarding anything I choose appropriate relating to the school system."

He concluded, "I've been doing this for 11 years without a single complaint until now. I, like you, have been elected to do a job for this school district. I'm doing my job...nothing more, nothing less."

The superintendent sent a blunt reply less than an hour later, noting that Peddie was at the finance office around 2:30 p.m. and then at the high school.

"Bottom line: We are busy working. All of us. We do not have time to 'visit'

with you," she wrote.

She reminded him that employees have been directed to call her if he approaches them and if he needs to speak with someone, she said she will set up an appointment for him.

"If you wish to take on the duties of Superintendent of Schools, feel free to put your name on the ballot in 2016," she concluded.

Tharpe emailed the superintendent later that evening to ask her to clarify her statement, writing, "...I don't think board members are required to go through the superintendent before visiting a school or administrative office."

The school board member went on to note, "Having 'your' personnel direct board members to you first before 'allowing' us to speak or meet is not acceptable regardless if it's me, Mr. Peddie or any other board member."

She expressed concern that the action may be a possible violation of school law and urged Uzzell: "Reconsider your directive to 'your' employees."

The superintendent's response? "The directive was regarding Mr. Peddie only. Please make note of to whom the email was directed."

CREDIT CARD QUESTIONS

Tensions have been mounting since a controversial June 4 school board meeting, when Peddie confronted the school superintendent about credit cards she had issued to her office without the board's knowledge or approval.

The card she used showed approximately \$12,000 in charges for many things that were not work-related, including over \$1,000 in purchases at two women's clothing shops at Pier Park in Panama City and more than \$1,000 in merchandise from Dillard's. The card was also used to buy an exercise video and pay for a hair appointment at Cost Cutters.

"There was travel, room service


Oct. 1 trial date set for suspended sheriff

Chipola students should apply now for financial aid

MARIANNA—Students planning to enroll in Fall classes at Chipola College are encouraged to apply for financial aid as soon as possible.

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) application should be completed no later than Wednesday, July 17. All required documents must be received in the Chipola College Financial Aid Office by Wednesday, July 24 in order to use Federal Financial Aid to cover Fall tuition and fees.

Dr. Jayne Roberts, vice president of Student Affairs, says, "Students should be sure to provide a correct mailing address and to check email

accounts assigned by the college. Those who miss the deadline will be required to pay tuition and fees up front, but may be reimbursed once financial aid is awarded."

Chipola is no longer participating in the Federal Direct Loan Programs which include Federal Direct Subsidized, Federal Direct Unsubsidized and Federal Direct Plus Loans. Student loans are available at several financial institutions and online.

charges and alcohol expenses at multiple hotels," Peddie said. One item that raised a few eyebrows in Liberty County was a lavish \$52 filet mignon breakfast ordered during a hotel stay in Tallahassee.

Uzzell has since paid for the items charged to the card that were determined to be personal. The school board has canceled the credit cards.

The school superintendent left during a break midway through the meeting, which she later described as "a witchhunt."

About a week after that meeting, she told The Journal, "I have committed no wrongdoing. The evidence speaks for itself. I do not feel it was appropriate for the chairman to bring it up. It was pretty brutal and I will not tolerate that treatment again. Our school board meetings are for school business,

not for accusations." The state attorney's office is looking into allegations against the school superintendent.

Investigators have reportedly conducted interviews with others in the county, but not with Uzzell. She said investigators asked to talk with her but she refused, stating: "My attorney advised me not to speak with them."

SUPERINTENDENT VS CHAIRMAN

"Kyle is overstepping his boundaries," said Uzzell. "He's not an investigator. He is being intrusive about questioning people. Employees are uncomfortable with it and they're contacting me," she said.

"Our other board members are very supportive. They always call and let the principals know when they want to come out and visit," she said.

"I'm done with him intimidating people," she said, adding that he was particularly "rude and abrasive" toward her. "I don't back down from him. I have to protect employees from him," she said. "Frankly, I'm just tired of it."

She added that before she was in office, "He would come to the district office about every day and micromanage. He wants me to shrink in a corner and let him run the district."

EDITOR'S NOTE: Last week's article on the school superintendent stated that Finance Officer Stephanie Hofheinz left her job after a confrontation with the school superintendent at a football game. Uzzell points out Hofheinz had already submitted her resignation before then. Uzzell also stated that she told a new finance officer that the district's individual insurance plan was \$50 a month but "I wasn't sure about the family plan." Finance Officer Paula Parrish indicated otherwise in the story.

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



STAND YOUR GROUND?

The George Zimmerman, Trayvon Martin event was one of those things that people wish had never occurred. It's tragic when any person is killed, but when a young man with his future before him is killed, the loss is felt more deeply, particularly by his parents, family and friends.

I won't, or can't offer an opinion of who was right or wrong because, unlike the jurors, I don't know the facts of the case. What I know is what I heard on television from the talking heads and "expert witnesses."

The trial was catnip for cable television. They couldn't get enough of the drama. The Internet news services weren't to be outdone; my Internet service was inundated with "breaking news" items. This unfortunate event was a classic example of how the news media can affect public opinion causing the public to polarize in their views and opinions.

I was surprised as to how many television attorneys and former prosecutors who, without knowing the facts of the case, would form opinions of who was or was not at fault. I attended the University of Miami Law School for a year. My quest for a law degree ended when the Air Force sent me to a NATO staff job.

One of the things I learned in law school was not to form any opinions until all the pertinent facts are known. As with the Zimmerman case, there are numerous facts and pieces of information, but usually 98% of the information has no bearing on the case.

Both Zimmerman and Martin are victims. Martin in that he lost his life. Zimmerman in knowing that he killed a teenager.

Tragic events like the Zimmerman case, aircraft accidents or any number of catastrophic events are, without fail, preceded by a chain of events, if broken, would have prevented the tragedy.

If either Zimmerman or Martin had been ten minutes early or late in their arrival in the apartment complex, the event would not have occurred. If Zimmerman had driven a different street or Martin taken a different route, the event would not have happened. But it was fate; the event did happen with tragic results.

Admittedly without factual information, I'll offer an observation that there was a question of self-defense for both participants. Martin had reason to fear Zimmerman. Martin did not know who Zimmerman was, why he was approaching Martin. Was Zimmerman a threat to Martin, perhaps someone with intent to harm or rob Martin?

Once together, apparently a confrontation ensued. Martin allegedly punched Zimmerman, knocking Zimmerman to the ground. Martin then allegedly straddled Zimmerman and began hitting him, allegedly threatening to kill Zimmerman.

Now the roles have changed. Zimmerman is the one in need of self-defense.

As I listened to the talking heads discuss this event, I wondered what I would do if I found myself in a similar situation. I have a license for a concealed weapon. I always have my pistol in my truck.

Well, with or without a license for a concealed weapon, it was

time to read **Florida Statutes, Chapter 776, Justifiable Use of Force** which states:

776.012 Use of force in defense of person.— A person is justified in using force, except deadly force, against another when and to the extent that the person reasonably believes that such conduct is necessary to defend himself or herself or another against the other's imminent use of unlawful force. However, a person is justified in the use of deadly force and does not have a duty to retreat if: (1) He or she reasonably believes that such force is necessary to prevent imminent death or great bodily harm to himself or herself or another or to prevent the imminent commission of a forcible felony; or (2) Under those circumstances permitted pursuant to s. 776.013.

History.—s. 13, ch. 74-383; s. 1188, ch. 97-102; s. 2, ch. 2005-27.

776.013 Home protection; use of deadly force; presumption of fear of death or great bodily harm.—

If a person does use deadly force, the law states: 776.032 Immunity from criminal prosecution and civil action for justifiable use of force.—


(1) A person who uses force as permitted in s. 776.012, s. 776.013, or s. 776.031 is justified in using such force and is immune from criminal prosecution and civil action for the use of such force, unless the person against whom force was used is a law enforcement officer, as defined in s. 943.10.

Television talking heads made a major issue of the fact that Zimmerman appeared to have only superficial head wounds resulting from the alleged assault by Martin. Those comments made me wonder how much of a beating must the victim endure before he or she can be in fear for their life. Must the victim incur brain damage before he or she defends his or her self?

Of course, people must avoid confrontations if possible. They should call the police if a confrontation is about to begin. Walk away. Drive away. Keep distance between themselves and the other person or people. Avoid exchanging words and insults.

But, if none of those precautions are working and a person is about to get his brains scattered in the parking lot, then it's time to "stand his or her ground."

If there is anyone left when the smoke clears, they can settle it in court.

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Boaters urged to go slow after sturgeon severely injures boy

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is urging boaters to go slow and be vigilant on the Choctawhatchee River. The request to go slow comes after a Bay County child was severely injured June 22 on a fishing trip with his family when a large Gulf sturgeon leapt into their boat, hitting three children.

One of them, Nathaniel Smith, who turned 8 last week, was hospitalized with skull fractures but is now recuperating at his Youngstown home. He is the son of Angela and Wilson Scott Smith.

"We were bream fishing and it started to rain, so we cranked up and the kids huddled under a tarp in the front of the boat," Smith said. "The sturgeon just came out of nowhere, and I yelled and tried to cut the motor but it was too late."

The sturgeon, which Smith believes was 3-4 feet long, grazed the back of the head of his nephew Austin and then hit his 16-year-old daughter, Amber, with enough force to knock her out of the boat.

Smith wheeled the boat around, pulled Amber aboard and then realized Nathaniel had taken the brunt of the collision with a blow to the head. The impact left Nathaniel unconscious. Doctors later determined he had two skull fractures.

Nathaniel was flown to Bay Medical Center Sacred Heart Health System in Panama City, then on to Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola and was released on July 2.

Scott said his son still has headaches but is recovering.



"I've fished the river before but I never even thought that a sturgeon might jump and hurt you. That's just something you don't ever expect to experience," he said.

While sturgeon strikes are rare on the Choctawhatchee, they have happened before. On Aug. 4, 2002, Brian Clements, who lived near Bozeman School at the time, was motoring down the river by himself when he caught the full impact of a leaping sturgeon in the middle of his chest. Clement spent a week in Gulf Coast Hospital with a cracked sternum and bruised internal organs.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) does extensive work on northwest Florida rivers with Gulf sturgeon. In 2012, the FWS estimated the population at 3,400 in the Choctawhatchee River and 500-1,000 in the Apalachicola River. The Suwannee River, in northeast Florida, has the most, with a population estimated at 10,000 to 14,000 fish. There have been numerous injuries to humans on the Suwannee from sturgeon strikes over the past several decades.

Scientists don't know why sturgeon jump or leap from the water.

Meanwhile, fisheries biologists say by the end of summer Gulf sturgeon will leave all northwest Florida rivers and head to the Gulf, where they will spend the winter. They say the best thing boaters can do is slow down, wear a life jacket and be observant.

Phase 1 Dove Club permit applications are due today

To me, the best part about hunting is not harvesting game – but spending quality time outdoors with friends and family. One of the best ways to do that is through dove hunting, which is part of the reason why great dove hunts are in such high demand but often difficult to find.

Outta' the WOODS

To help people find one of these hunts and for other reasons, the FWC created its Special-Opportunity Dove Club Program. It offers hunters the chance of experiencing exceptional dove hunting on the state's best public dove fields.

Dove Club permits enable one adult and one youth (under age 16) to hunt all scheduled dates for the dove field of their choice. Permits cost \$150 and enable both hunters to take a daily bag limit of birds. There are eight hunts on all these fields except Caravelle Ranch; it has six. All hunts are from noon until sunset and take place on Saturdays, starting Oct. 5 and ending Jan. 11.

Last year, 2,841 birds were harvested from six fields. This coming season, there will be six special-opportunity dove fields again scattered throughout the state.

Frog Pond North Public Small-Game Hunting Area (PSGHA) in Miami-Dade County was the top producer last year with 930 birds taken! Fifteen Dove Club permits are available to hunt its 50 acres.

Koon Farm dove field in Lafayette County came in second last year with 561 birds harvested off its 40 acres. There will be 13 Dove Club permits available to hunt there next season.

The dove field on Hilochee Wildlife Management Area, in Lake County, has 15 Dove Club permits available to hunt its 58 acres. Hunters there last season took 424 doves.

Hunters harvested 384 birds from Allapattah Flats PSGHA in Martin County, east of Lake Okeechobee. Thirteen Dove Club permits are available for the 40-acre field.

North Newberry PSGHA, in Alachua County, has 15 Dove Club permits on its 40 acres. That field produced 317 birds last year.

The remaining field, Caravelle Ranch in Putnam County, has a 140-acre dove field with 30 Dove Club permits available. Last season, 225 doves were harvested there from just the six-day hunt.

Dove Club permits will be issued by random drawing during Phase I. That application period runs through July 17.

After obtaining the correct application worksheet by going to MyFWC.com/License and clicking on "Limited Entry/Quota Hunts," you can apply for these season passes by filling out a single worksheet (with up to five dove field choices) and turning it in at any county tax collector's office, license agent or by going online to License.MyFWC.com. During Phase I, hunters may be awarded a permit for only one dove field.

If you are successful in getting drawn, you must pick up and pay for your Dove Club permit at any of the same places mentioned above by Aug. 7. Check for drawing results the fourth week of July by logging in to your customer account at License.MyFWC.com. Any applicant who provides an email address will be notified by the FWC if drawn as well.

Brochures on each of these areas are available online at MyFWC.com/Dove. Also at that Web address, beginning in late September, hunters will be able to find the most up-to-date information on these six special-opportunity dove fields, as well as Florida's other public dove fields. The website is updated every Thursday throughout dove season. Information includes dove densities, previous weeks' harvests and field conditions.

So if you'd like to join the FWC's Dove Club, you need to try to do so in July. Remember to introduce someone new to hunting when you can. As always, have fun, hunt safely and ethically, and we'll see you in the woods!

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Columnist Jim McClellan shares his thoughts on what Stonehenge was really supposed to be and explains, "The original drawings show a meat cooler and a fish-cleaning station out back." He laments the loss of its Calhoun County counterpart, Polehenge.

The Story of Polehenge


Near the English village of Wiltshire sits the ruins of Stonehenge, an ancient ritual site featuring giant stone pillars that rise up out of the ground, obviously built by humans, but with a purpose that still isn't entirely clear. There are lots of theories, of course. Some claim it was a burial site, while others say it was a pagan temple.

I don't buy any of that. In fact, I'm pretty sure it was a hunting camp that never quite got finished.

Now I'm no student of ancient British history (or prehistory as the case may be.) However, there was once a creation in southern Calhoun County that we dubbed "Polehenge" because of the striking similarities. I refuse to believe the two aren't related somehow.

As with its English counterpart, some of the details of the construction of Polehenge have been lost to time. The consensus among the experts – mostly my brothers, family friends and me – is that sometime in the mid-'80s, my father ran into a crew replacing telephone poles along Hugh Creek Road. Somehow, he convinced the foreman to give him several of the used ones, then follow him down to our camp and dig an equal number of holes in a roughly square pattern near the bank of the slough.

Who these people were and how Daddy

was able to press them into service remains a mystery. What we do know is that, a little while later, my brother Bill and his friend Chuck Reed showed up at the camp and were soon put to work setting the poles in the ground.

When they were done, Polehenge was born: Nine telephone poles rising from the mud bank (to different heights) and reaching for the sky (at odd angles). It was a sight to behold.

My brother Hentz was so moved that he shared an eerily accurate prophecy:

"I guarantee you'll come back here in 20 years and those poles will still be sitting there just like that."

He was right, mainly because Daddy had counted on this being a multi-generation project, one that would culminate with a camp atop the poles he planted. The rest of us just had to build it.

What he failed to take into account, however, is that his sons all remembered long nights with rats and snakes at the old camp. We weren't going to spend time and money just to give them a room with a view (not to mention the high ground if a fight broke out).

We were perfectly happy to keep on sleeping in our tents, so Polehenge remained unfinished and mostly untouched until it was finally torn down a few years ago. Sadly, it disappeared having never become a world heritage site, a national park or even a meeting place for drug-addled cult members.

But because of Polehenge, pictures of its forerunner across the Atlantic always leave me wondering what Stonehenge would have looked like if the ancients had ever gotten done with it.

FWC asks public to report mink sightings in Florida



Researchers report there are three known subspecies of mink in Florida.

Mink are rare in Florida, and wildlife biologists with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) are hoping to learn more about this small mammal. But they need the public's help to find out where it occurs. People can report evidence such as mink sightings, photos and road-killed specimens online.

Adult mink weigh 2-3 pounds and measure about 2 feet in length. Fur can be dark chocolate or a light rusty brown. Sometimes there is a patch of white along the chin and under the throat.

"We know that mink are more likely to be found in and near salt-marsh habitat on both coasts of Florida but the reports people provide will help us pinpoint where we do research," said Chris Winchester, wildlife biologist with the FWC's Fish and Wildlife Research Institute.

Winchester said there are three known

subspecies of mink in Florida – Atlantic salt marsh mink, Gulf salt marsh mink and Everglades mink. Although there is a scarcity of information about the three subspecies, only the Everglades mink is listed as threatened.

Some people confuse mink with other species such as otters and weasels, but whereas mink are quite small, otters typically weigh 10 to 30 pounds and are 3 feet or more long. Weasels look similar to mink, but are smaller and have brown fur along their backs and pale yellow fur along the entire belly.

Mink are strictly carnivorous, eating fish, frogs, crayfish, crabs and various birds and small mammals.

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


