

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

Man admits taking over \$13,000 from elderly relative's bank accounts

BLOUNTSTOWN - A 19-year-old Blountstown man is charged with exploitation of the elderly after he took \$13,200 from a relative's bank accounts over a three-month period, according to a report from the Calhoun County Sheriff's Office.

The victim reported that Frederick Baskette III had transferred funds from three of her bank accounts into his.

Records showed the first transfer was made on March 5 for \$400, with the transactions continuing through May.

When interviewed by Lt. Jared Nichols, Baskette admitted making the transfers without the victim's knowledge. He said he set up mobile accounts in the victim's name and made the transactions by cell phone.

He said the money was gone. When the investigator asked what he had done with it, Baskette told him that he had spent it on clothes, food, motels and gas. Baskette said he planned to pay the money back when he got a job.

Baskette had lived with the relative for about 10 years. The victim believed he got her account information by bank statements kept at her home.

Baskette was also questioned about the whereabouts of the victim's car. He admitted that he left it at a relative's home in Tallahassee because it was out of gas.

Baskette is currently on state probation for previous felony charges.

Recycling employee finds his own property while unloading metal

BRISTOL - Grand theft charges were filed against a Bristol man after an employee at Kyle Recycling in Hosford noticed some of his own property among a number of items brought in for scrap Friday.

Thomas R. Varnum was moving a load of metal when he recognized a homemade fire door, an aluminum mud flap holder for a semi and a working hydraulic pump with an attached hose that had been taken from his property on Second Street in Bristol.

He contacted the Liberty County Sheriff's Office about the property, which he valued at around \$600.

Sgt. Adam Walker spoke with Terry Armstrong, who brought the property in for recycling. She stated that she was collecting scrap metal to sell and her son, Anthony Forte, 41, invited her to a Second Street residence in Bristol to pick up some additional items.

She said they grabbed some old metal chairs, along with a Hydraulic Pump, some metal and a semi truck part that was alongside a shed on the property where her son and his wife had moved to just a couple of weeks earlier. She said she thought the items were his.

Just a couple of days earlier, Forte had been served with a domestic violence injunction barring him from coming within 500 feet of the Second Street residence.

~ Infrastructure repairs in nine affected counties now eligible for reimbursement ~

Federal public assistance approved for Calhoun County flood damage repairs

TALLAHASSEE - Federal public assistance has been designated for five additional Florida counties affected by recent spring flooding. Holmes, Washington, Bay, Jackson and Calhoun counties are now eligible to receive assistance to aid in repairing damage to public infrastructure.

The announcement follows the request for public assistance that was issued on Wednesday, June 11. Dixie and Suwannee counties were also included in the same request and are still awaiting determination.

Public assistance was previously designated on Wednesday, May 14, for Escambia, Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton counties.

Public assistance provides grant assistance for debris removal and

emergency protective measures. Costs for repair, replacement, or restoration of disaster-damaged, publicly-owned facilities can also be covered under public assistance.

Public assistance from the federal declaration comes in conjunction with the earlier approval of individual assistance for Escambia and Santa Rosa counties which was granted on Tuesday, May 6, and for Okaloosa and Walton counties on Monday, May 12. Residents and business owners who sustained losses in these counties can continue applying for assistance by registering online at www.disasterassistance.gov, by web enabled mobile device at m.fema.gov or by calling 1-800-621-FEMA (3362) or 1-800-462-7585 (TTY) for the hearing and

speech impaired.

From Monday, April 28 through Tuesday, May 6, a severe weather system brought torrential rains to the Northern Florida Gulf Coast. Governor Scott signed Executive Order 14-144, declaring a State of Emergency for 26 Florida Counties on Wednesday, April 30. Two Florida rivers, the Santa Fe and Choctawhatchee, reached major flood stage, while three additional rivers reached moderate flood stage and 14 reached minor flood stage.

Child holding loaded gun answers door for deputies

Man charged with making threat at gunpoint; 3 loaded weapons seized

ALTHA - When deputies went to the home of a man accused of making threats at gunpoint Friday, they were met at the door by an 11-year-old boy holding a loaded pistol tucked in a holster.

The youngster told Deputies Richard Mayo and Christian Smith his father was sleeping in his bedroom and he

had not been able to wake him up to come answer the door. The deputies offered to help the child rouse Matthew Yon, 34, but first, they asked if there were anymore guns in the house. There were.

After confiscating the loaded .22-caliber handgun from the little boy, a loaded black powder .50-caliber rifle was found in the living room.

The child then directed them to his

13-year-old brother's room, where they found a loaded .22-caliber handgun on a table by the bed where the boy was

sleeping.

Each of the handguns held six rounds.

After Yon was awakened, he told deputies he was aware the handguns were in the house.

He also acknowledged that earlier in the day, he had the rifle with him while he was out on his four-wheeler and had spoken with someone.

Deputies went to Yon's Altha residence

after receiving a report from a man who said he was checking on some property when he saw Yon looking at him through the scope of his rifle.

According to the victim, Yon threatened to "make you crawfish food" if he didn't leave the property.

Yon was charged with aggravated assault and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

Couple get in fight while watching 'Law & Order'

HOSFORD - Deputies arrived to find a distraught woman with a bloodied mouth yelling "he's going to kill me" after an argument with her husband escalated earlier this month.

The victim stated that she and Charles "Bob" Sewell, 58, were at home watching "Law and Order" together on June 4 when he became angry.

She said that her husband, who has a previous domestic battery arrest from five years ago, starts thinking about his time in jail whenever he watches a "cop show" and gets upset.

She said he blames her for sending him to jail and started an altercation that night. She said he threatened to kill her if she didn't get out of the house.

According to the arrest report, Sewell threw a perfume bottle and hit her in the neck, causing her to fall to the floor. She said while she was on the floor, he began kicking her in the back. When she got on her feet, he pushed her and then punched her in the face, causing her to bleed, she said.

She said she picked up a knife in the kitchen to get him to stop hitting her. She said she never pointed the knife at him, but did warn that if he ever hit her again, he would regret it.

When questioned by deputies, Sewell said he had been wanting her to leave the home for weeks because his doctor told him he did not need "this stress" in his life.

He said she "went off" and pulled a knife on him. He said he then "opened the door and put her out."

When she drove off, he called her and told her to bring the car back and threatened to have her arrested. He denied touching her and said she punched him in the head four times. Deputies did not find any marks on his body but there was a visible red mark on the woman's neck, according to the arrest report.

When asked how she got a bloody mouth, Sewell stated, "she must have fallen."

He was charged with domestic battery.

Son arrested after deputy hears him threaten mom

BLOUNTSTOWN - A 21-year-old Blountstown man was arrested Friday after his mother called the Calhoun County Sheriff's Office to report that he hit her on her backside and appeared to be under the influence of drugs when he came home the previous night.


She called for a deputy and said her son needed to pack up and leave her home.

Deputy Zach Whitfield entered the home and told Brion Alexander Hall to get his things and go. As Hall walked toward the back of the house, the deputy heard him threaten his mother, telling her, "Ma, you just wait. You as good as dead."

The deputy then stopped Hall and handcuffed him.


When asked what led to the dispute between them, the mother said her son had been disrespectful.

Brion Alexander Hall was charged with assault, domestic battery and violation of probation.



Tallahassee pair arrested for trafficking in cocaine after Liberty County traffic stop

BRISTOL - A Tallahassee pair who were traveling more than 27 miles over the speed limit as they made their way through Liberty County are facing several charges after cocaine, marijuana and MDMA (known as "Molly") were found in their rental car Saturday, according to a report from the Liberty County Sheriff's Office.

Deputy Josh Shepard and Deputy Colby Beck were running radar along SR 20 just west of Turkey Creek Road when a dark-colored westbound car sped past them.

The radar showed the car traveling 82 mph in a 55 mph zone.

Deputies noticed the car going over the white line as it passed them. When

the patrol car pulled in behind the vehicle, the driver crossed the center line twice and then went back over the white line at the outside edge of the road.

After the patrol lights were turned on, the rental car driver hit the brakes and made a sudden turn down Eric Drive without signaling before coming to a dead end.

When deputies approached the car, they smelled burning marijuana and saw a clear baggie of marijuana on the front passenger's seat.

The driver, Sakinah Sharif Britt, 25, and her passenger, Tallis Lewis, 28, were told to exit the car and placed in hand restraints.

During a search of the vehicle, deputies reported

finding the following:

- 4.1 grams of marijuana
- 4.5 grams of cocaine
- 2.1 grams of pure crack cocaine
- 25 grams of MDMA "Molly"
- drug paraphernalia, including digital scales, a razor blade and baggies
- \$140 in cash

Fifteen baggies of MDMA were packaged for sale. Three small baggies of cocaine were inside a larger bag of the drug. There were two bigger bags of cocaine, along with three rocks of crack cocaine.

Both were charged with trafficking in MDMA, intent to sell MDMA, possession of cocaine with intent to sell, possession of paraphernalia and possession of less than 20 grams of marijuana.



BRISTOL - A 25-year-old Bristol man was charged with possession of a controlled substance and possession of drug paraphernalia after a glass pipe with burnt residue and a small contact lens case containing 3.6 grams of meth were found in his pocket.

Ethan Depratter, 25, was pulled over June 6 after Deputy Jonathan Gentry saw him driving erratically along SR 20 near Joe Chason Circle.

According to the deputy's report, Depratter's vehicle crossed the center line with oncoming traffic five times. He was weaving across the lane and crossed the white line at the outer edge of the road three times.

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Chipola launches new two-day schedule for Fall

MARIANNA - Chipola College officials are rolling out a new academic schedule for the Fall semester which begins in August.

The new plan offers the possibility for students to register for a two-day schedule and attend classes only two days a week.

Dr. Sarah Clemmons, Senior Vice President of Instruction, says, "This new schedule will provide another option for students in addition to online classes, evening classes, and a three or four-day schedule. Other colleges with a two-day schedule option report that it is popular with students who wish to commute fewer days of the week. Longer class periods also may be better for courses scheduled in labs."

Typically under the old Chipola schedule, a three-hour class would meet three times a week for 50 minutes each time. With the new schedule, a three-hour class would meet only twice a week for 75 minutes.

Clemmons reports that not all student schedules will be able to plan a two-day schedule depending on the classes required for particular academic plans or courses already completed. Some courses offered are



single section or require various co-requisites depending on the student's major or chosen transfer institution.

Fall 2014 application deadline for new students is Aug. 6.

Savannah Meadowbeauty Wildflower alert

by Eleanor Dietrich, Florida Wildflower Foundation

Here is a third meadowbeauty that is very common in the Apalachicola National Forest in June. It responds particularly well to fire, so when you ride down one of the roads through the forest, and see an area that was burned earlier this year, you will notice a particular abundance of this tall pink flower throughout the understory of the tall pine trees, or throughout a savanna. This flower has the same flower structure you have seen in the other common meadow beauties – 4 large petals, large yellow stamens with hooked anthers at the end of each one, and an urn-shaped structure at the base of the flower that remains on the plant after the petals have fallen. The leaves are blueish green and small, clasping the tall flower stem.

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

Meth-making materials found at Telogia home

TELOGIA - One man was arrested last week after deputies served a search warrant at his home and found supplies needed for the "one pot method" of making methamphetamine.

Richard Jason Elhard, 32, was charged with possession of listed chemicals and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

Liberty County Sgt. Bobby Revell, Franklin County Deputy Sgt. Robert Shelly and members of the Liberty County Drug Task Force arrived at Elhard's River Burch Way residence at 12:01 a.m. June 11.

When Elhard answered the door, he was told the task force had information that he was making methamphetamine.

Deputies noticed a strong chemical smell when they entered the home, which indicated the use of ingredients found in the meth-making process.

Elhard initially denied that there was any meth in his home but as the search progressed, he told deputies he knew how to cook methamphetamine and talked about the ingredients needed.

A number of items essential in cooking meth were collected in the home, including lighter fluid, an instant ice compress, acid, two grinders with white powder residue, a bottle of acid and a bag with a white substance believed to be pseudoephedrine.

What was determined to be a reaction vessel was found in a trash can. The small amount of liquid inside the bloated plastic Gatorade bottle tested positive for methamphetamine.

During the search, a Remington .22-caliber rifle was found in a bathroom closet. Elhard stated he knew he wasn't supposed to have the gun because he was a convicted felon. He said he borrowed the rifle from his mother to protect himself from snakes.

Two are charged with domestic battery after five days of fighting

TELOGIA - A couple who said they had been fighting and arguing for five days were both charged with domestic battery Friday.

Bobbie Shepherd, 42, of Tallahassee, contacted the sheriff's office to report that she had been battered by her boyfriend, Trevor Kennedy, 22, of Telogia.

Kennedy denied putting his hands on her. The arrest report noted that he had numerous scratches all over his stomach, arms, neck and back, as well as what appeared to be a bite mark on his right arm. He stated that three lacerations on his right hand were caused by him punching a window in his house.

Shepherd had no visible injuries, but Kennedy acknowledged that he had poured a beer on her, pushed her to the ground and thrown sand into her face.

After one argument, she said she walked away and went down Merritt Trail to cool off. He said he went with her, hoping to calm her down.

The two resumed their dispute and had a scuffle on the trail after he grabbed her flashlight and threw it in the woods.

Kennedy said that's when he "put her on the ground gently" before throwing sand at her.

When they returned home, they had another altercation. Shepherd denied scratching or hitting Kennedy and told deputies the numerous scratch marks were the result of him "helping a friend move a car."

Woman in secluded area of park arrested with meth

BRISTOL - A late night meeting at Veterans Memorial Park resulted in the arrest of a Blountstown woman on drug charges after deputies noticed a suspicious vehicle parked in the back woodland.

Deputies have stepped up patrols in the area due to vandalism and stopped to check on two people who were seen standing outside a gold van around 10:30 p.m. on June 5.

Liberty County Sgt. Bobby Revell noted in his report that the pair grew increasingly nervous as he spoke with them. The woman was identified as Carol Martin, 46. The man with her was found to be Andrew Lanton, 32.

When asked if she would consent to a search, Martin stated repeatedly that she had no problem with him looking through her purse. When she dumped the contents of her bag on the ground, Revell found a small pill bottle that held a white power-like substance that later tested positive for methamphetamine. A piece of burnt tinfoil, like that commonly used to smoke methamphetamine, was also found with the contents of the purse.

Martin stated that Lanton called and told her he had gotten some meth and wanted her to come pick him up so they could go smoke it. She said she drove from Blountstown to Bristol with him, and they went to the back of the park so they could smoke. She said he told her to put the pill bottle with the meth in her purse.

Lanton said that she had called him and wanted to hang out. He said she picked him up and they were just riding out that night. He stated that he had no knowledge of the drugs in her purse.

Martin was charged with possession of methamphetamine and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Reeling from Virginia

Let's be perfectly blunt. Ever since House Majority Leader Eric Cantor lost his Virginia primary to the underfunded Dave Brat, we political pundits (yes, I'm a card-carrying member) have been publicly embarrassing ourselves. Within hours of the polls closing, commentators and analysts, none of whom had predicted Cantor's even being in trouble, were arrogantly telling the world exactly why long-shot Brat won -- and what his victory meant for Congress, the country and the Republican Party.

Sorry, but as somebody -- it was either Winston Churchill or Ozzy Osbourne -- wisely noted, the winners get to write history. That, in this case, would be Brat, who campaigned as an unwavering opponent of comprehensive immigration reform, calling it "the most symbolic issue that captures the difference between myself and Eric Cantor in this race, but it also captures the fissure between Main Street and Wall Street." He argued that Wall Street and "the Chamber of Commerce" both "want cheap labor, and that's going to lower wages for everybody else."

For House Republicans, for the foreseeable future, immigration reform legislation has become their third rail of American politics -- a place of danger to be carefully avoided as potentially fatal to their own political survival. Nobody can explain House Republicans better than Tom Davis, a former eight-term congressman from Virginia as well as onetime chairman of the campaign committee responsible for electing Republicans to the House.

Asked by Audie Cornish on NPR if tea party House Republicans were now confident that they were winning, Davis was candid: "Well, they are in many ways and having seen Cantor defeated sends chills down the spine of members when it comes to taking a vote on compromising or working with the president, because you can topple the

majority leader -- who is seen as the most conservative member of the Republican leadership, and he is not conservative enough. What does that mean for me?"

Immigration reform is officially dead, killed by House Republicans. The Democrats, with a president whose negative sixth-year job rating is a lot closer to that of the unpopular George W. Bush than to the soaring numbers earned by Bill Clinton and Ronald Reagan, don't have a historical precedent to give

them any realistic confidence about winning a third consecutive White House term in 2016. But the GOP now appears determined to snatch defeat from the jaws of potential victory by further alienating Latino voters, Asian voters and all voters who, for example, believe that we, Americans, don't punish children for the "sins" of their parents.



This value was well-expressed some 13 years ago by the governor of the first state to pass, by a vote of 142-1 in the state House and by 27-3 in the state Senate, a law to permit academically qualified high school graduates who were in the country illegally to pay in-state tuition at state universities. Here is what that governor said: "We must say to every child learning in (our) classrooms, 'we don't care where you came from, but where you are going, and we are going to do everything we can to help you get there.' And that vision must include the children of undocumented workers."

Those were the words of the governor of the first state in the nation to pass its own Dream Act, Republican Rick Perry of Texas. The year was 2001. Three years later, Bush would win 44 percent of the Latino vote against John Kerry. For a Republican Party that cannot even speak the words "undocumented workers," sadly, that past is not a prologue.

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Daddy's Tackle Box


Among the items that travel with me everywhere my truck goes are two tackle boxes – one for saltwater and one for freshwater. I supposed I could get by with one, but that would just make it harder to remember what I have and where I put it.

For example, I recently discovered I have a lifetime supply of 1/0 hooks because they kept getting shoved under other stuff. I kept thinking I was out and repeatedly bought more. On the other hand, I have no Gulp bait because I thought I just bought some recently. “Recently,” it turns out, was four months ago.

There's also another reason why I keep two tackle boxes. That's because one of them belonged to my father. In the 12 years since he passed away, I've held on to this cheap, green piece of plastic like it was filled with treasure. And to me, it is.

Despite the fact it's been stepped on, dropped and flooded, has no handle and never closes I can't bring myself to get a new one. Inside are the normal things: corks, line, hooks and split shot that I use and replace frequently. But there are also some timeless, hilarious reminders of my father that make me smile every time I see them.

First among them is a Hav-a-Tampa cigar, now crumbling inside its plastic packaging. It must have been his emergency back up, just in case his motor wouldn't start or he ran out while

the fish were still biting. The contents of the tackle box get shuffled around a lot, but every time I open it, I'm careful to put the cigar back in its place of honor up top.

There's also a box of fuses in there. I have no idea why. I can't remember a single thing on his boat that required an old-style glass fuse. Maybe it was for his Bronco or just something he happened to have lying around. In any case, if you're ever stuck in a vintage car with a blown fuse, I'm the guy to call.

In other compartments, there are glow-in-the-

dark corks, an ancient fly, a random lure or two and some rust stains that may or may not have been actual fish hooks at one point.

And then there's a round, plastic container filled with every size split shot I could possibly need. The only problem is that Daddy somehow managed to melt the container shut (likely with his cigar), fusing the plastic with the lead. I've used a few of the weights, but only after prying open the container and literally carving them out one at a time.

I have no idea where the tackle box came from, but in order of probability my best guesses are that somebody gave it to him, he found it on the roadside or Cary Yates sold it to him. The least likely possibility is that he proactively set out to buy it. (This is a man who carried a package of hooks in his wallet and made do with an old ammo can until the bottom rusted out of it.)

In terms of value, the box is the type of thing you wouldn't be able to give away at a garage sale. From a practical standpoint, I'd be better off spending five bucks on a couple of divided plastic containers.

However, as I'm writing this on Father's Day, I'm even more aware that no one can buy or sell what it really is – the memories of my father and his favorite activity, preserved in time and stored in a small plastic box.

That'll work just fine.


