Cross charged with battery on three women & sheriff's deputy

A 20-year-old Crawfordville man is facing charges of domestic battery by strangulation, three counts of battery, battery on an officer and resisting arrest with violence after deputies were dispatched to a disturbance last week.

Liberty County Deputy Heath Cutshaw responded to the 11 a.m. call reporting that a man was beating a woman with his fists on July 11 at a home on Gobbler Court, just outside the Bristol City Limits, according to information from the Liberty County Sheriff's Office.

He arrived to find a woman with a bloodied face on the ground outside the residence and saw the suspect, Brandon Scott Cross, standing over her, according to the arrest report. Cross began walking away from the injured woman when he saw the deputy. A witness nearby alerted the deputy that Cross had access to guns and could be leaving to get one.

Cutshaw called out for Cross to stop but he fled, leading him on a brief foot chase to a neighboring residence. Cross, who was screaming and cursing, began walking toward the deputy. As Cutshaw attempted to handcuff him, Cross pulled away. When the deputy saw Cross put his

Relatives attacked by man who thought 'aliens' were in the woods

A family dinner ended with an Altha man being taken to jail after he began acting erratically, injuring two people as he attempted to leave.

Justin Mikel Barker, 25, startled those gathered for a dinner July 6 when he began "acting paranoid," according to the arrest report from the Calhoun County Sheriff's Office.

Witnesses said Barker stated that they were being watched by something in the woods. He started using his phone to scan for images and thought he saw "things in the woods that were going to get them." He got his pistol from his vehicle and began walking around the yard to "protect them from the aliens in the woods", the arrest report explained.

When asked to put his gun back in the vehicle, Barker became agitated and decided to leave. He put

his two infant children in the vehicle and got ready to go, refusing to let anyone else drive. After the vehicle started, there was a struggle over the keys between him and another adult.

The children in the back were screaming as he began driving away but he did not get far. The passenger put the vehicle in park and after about 100 feet, they came to a stop with the gears grinding.

Barker fought when others tried to pull him out of the driver's seat, at one point making the threat, "I will cut your guts out!" A knife was removed from his pants as he was taken from the vehicle. While trying to restrain him, one person was elbowed in the face while another was bitten in three places before he was placed on the ground.

An ambulance was called when Barker went into convulsions; when he stopped, he said he was thirsty. The EMS crew then called for a deputy.

One of those at the scene had a contusion to the right arm, right side of the torso and two fractured ribs on the right side.

Another person had bites on the left arm, left shoulder and left side of the torso.

Barker was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon without intent to kill, felony battery, domestic battery and two counts of child abuse without great harm.

He is being held without bond.

Calhoun man charged in crash injuring two; Trash bag of suspected 'Spice' found

Kenneth Gatlin, 61, of Blountstown was charged with driving with a suspended license, habitual traffic offender and careless driving in an accident that left one of his passengers seriously injured when he lost control of the car in Leon County early Sunday morning.

According to a report from the Florida Highway Patrol, Gatlin was traveling west on SR 20 at the intersection with Raymond Cochran Lane around 12:30

a.m. when the 2003 Taurus he was driving went off the right side of the road. The car collided with a ditch and a standing tree on the north shoulder of the road.

Gatlin was not injured but his two passengers were. Lucy Mathews, 39, of Blountstown was hospitalized with serious injuries. Another passenger, Terry Tillman, 35, of Winter Haven had minor injuries and was also

taken to the hospital.

FHP reported that the accident was not alcohol-related.

Additional charges are pending the results of lab testing after troopers discovered a large white trash bag filled with what was described as "multiple smaller zip-lock bags of a green leafy substance," believed to be "Spice" or synthetic

marijuana about five feet north of the car.

A second small plastic baggy that held two pills identified as acetaminophen and oxycodone hydrochloride was found around five feet east of the car.

Troopers learned that Gatlin's license had been suspended since July of 2005 and he was currently on Habitual Traffic Offender status.

Gatlin denied ownership of the pills and synthetic marijuana. He was taken into custody at 2:41 a.m. on July 15 and booked into the Leon County Jail.

Bike rider carrying rifle arrested for possession of gun and drugs

A convicted felon barred from having a firearm was arrested July 11 after a deputy aware of his arrest background noticed him riding down CR 73A with a rifle case strapped to a bicycle basket.

Nicholas Tucker, 31, told deputies he was on the way to a friend's house. When they inquired about the case, he said he was taking his father's .22 to show to his friends. Deputies found the Remington .22 held seven rounds

of ammunition with a loaded round in the chamber. When asked if he had anything else illegal, Tucker pulled out two bandanas from the pocket of his cargo shorts. Wrapped inside was a pipe with suspected methamphetamine residue. The contents of a black bag on his belt included a metal tube with suspected marijuana residue.

A Royal Crown bag found in the bike basket held a small digital scale and a green metal tube with a bag of suspected methamphetamine residue. Some suspected marijuana was found inside a plastic container in another bag in the basket.

Tucker was arrested and the gun was turned over to his father.

He was charged with possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine), possession of less than 20 grams of marijuana and possession of drug equipment.

His bond was set at \$5,000.



Haney charged with possession of drugs after having seizure

A man who received medical help after having what was suspected to be a drug-induced seizure is now facing charges.

A relative called for help after seeing Jimmy Haney, 37, experience a seizure while sitting in a truck in the back yard this past February.

A deputy arrived to find Haney unconscious on the ground beside the pickup as he was receiving assistance from an ambulance crew. A small pipe was found under Haney's right leg. Inside the truck, the deputy found a cigarette pack that held what later tested positive at the FDLE lab for synthetic cannabinoids.


Haney was arrested July 10 and charged with possession with intent to sell Schedule III or IV drugs and possession of drug equipment.

His bond was set at \$7,500. He was released from custody July 12.

Man charged with attack on girlfriend as she was driving

A 39-year-old Kinard man is being held without bond after an attack on his girlfriend which resulted in a charge of domestic battery by strangulation, according to a report from the Calhoun County Sheriff's Office.

Zeikel Paul Pitts was arrested Saturday after his girlfriend told a deputy he began choking her

while she was driving. She said the attack followed accusations that she had been involved with someone else and that she had been "stalking him with an audio placed into his jaw," according to the deputy's report.

She said that when she stopped the vehicle in the road, Pitts snatched the keys, got out and came to the driver's side, where he pulled her out and threw her to the ground.

Pitts later told a deputy he had been drinking and was upset because his girlfriend wasn't taking him seriously. "Take me to jail if you want," he told the deputy, adding, "I jumped on her because she is part of the reason I don't have my kids."

The woman's injuries were documented and included abrasions on the left side of her neck and injuries to her right hand. The dirt was disturbed in an area in the yard where she said the altercation happened and "a significant amount of hair" was found there.

Florida Phlox Wildflower alert

This pink wildflower (*Phlox floridana*) blooms from spring through fall and is can be found in sandy areas and open forests. The flowers have five spreading petals that often have darker pink markings at the base of each one. The shades of pink may vary from light to dark and are rarely white. The leaf-like structures (bracts) at the base of the flower are covered with small glandular hairs.

Local teachers get an energy education

GRACEVILLE - Nearly 300 teachers became the students from across northwest Florida and Alabama at an energy education workshop co-hosted by West Florida Electric Cooperative (WFEC) in June.

"I really enjoyed this conference, and as a new teacher, walking into a classroom without many supplies, this conference was very worthwhile," said Carol Boswell, who is a seventh grade teacher at Vernon Middle School. She will begin her first full year of teaching this month.

The second annual Empower Energy Education Workshop provided fun, engaging, fast-paced activities about electric generation and distribution with a focus on energy education. Attendees received the tools and curriculum necessary to integrate the activities into their classrooms. These materials, aimed at K-12 students, include hands-on activities designed to teach tomorrow's leaders about all energy sources - from fossil fuels to renewables. The curriculum was developed by the National Energy Education Development (NEED) Project. The Empower Energy Education Workshop is part of an initiative to promote a balanced approach to energy education in the classroom.

NEED equips today's teachers with knowledge and work skills, training teachers to teach energy from a balanced perspective and promote an energy conscious and educated society. They have designed an objective, multi-sided energy education program used in more than 65,000 classrooms nationwide. These resources meet students' diverse needs and learning styles and are correlated to the National Science Education Content Standards, as well as state standards.

"One of our founding principles as a cooperative is providing education and learning to our members," said Russell Dunaway, WFEC Executive VP & CEO. "As the electric utility industry continues to change due to innovations in technology, we believe it is imperative to ensure educators have the information and materials needed to inform future

generations about the types of energy available, where it comes from, how it is generated and also how it impacts their families, our economy and quality of life."

The conference also provided attendees an opportunity to network with other teachers, sharing ideas and building lifelong connections. Boswell stated the connections she was able to make with some of the other teachers were important to her as a new educator.

Each teacher who attended received a kit with experiments and resources they can use with their students in the classroom environment. In fact, the teachers who attended Empower participated in these hands-on projects and experiments themselves - they even wrote, acted or sang in skits illustrating the energy information and principles they learned over the three-day event.

"I plan to use the materials with my fourth grade science students to introduce topics in a visual way that will help them remember the materials more easily. When students are able to SEE what we are discussing right in front of them, it is much more memorable," said Nirra Poret, a veteran teacher of 14 years from Riverside Elementary School.

The co-op will provide scholarships to local educators to the workshop again next summer.






The U.S. leader knew better: "I think they like me a lot in the U.K."

This morning, there were two dozen home-grown tomatoes on my doorstep. I arrived home to see Winn-Dixie bags hanging from my door, and I almost lost control of my lower extremities.

I come from country people. And country people regard tomatoes as holy things.

Country people get excited about things like tomatoes. We are also the kind of people who show our love in strange ways, using things like vegetables, casserole dishes, love-notes, or saturated fat. Sometimes we use all four.

There was no note attached to these tomatoes, which struck me as odd. A secret tomato-admirer, perhaps.

I brought the bags inside. I opened them. There were tomatoes of every shape and color. Yellows, greens, reds, and even purples.

Purple tomatoes, my mother once told me, were magic tomatoes. "You've hit the tomato jackpot," my mother would say, "if you come across a tomato so full of magic that it's turning purple."

I have a thing for tomatoes—magic or otherwise. My mother used to grow them in the summers of my youth. If I close my eyes I can still smell the greenery in her garden. Her small patches of tilled earth were surrounded by chicken wire, and hair clippings.

The clippings were mine. Back in those days, my mother used to cut my hair with dull scissors on our back porch.

In fact, this was the primary reason for my traumatic childhood. My haircuts were a cross between Bozo the Clown and an International Billiards Federation regulation cue ball.

Often, people at school would say things like, "Hey, who cuts your hair? Ronnie Milsap?"

Directly after my weedwacker haircuts, my mother would gather hair clippings into a dustpan and scatter them in her garden. The idea was that the human scent scares away vermin like raccoons, rabbits, and various civic-level politicians.

And it worked like a charm. Her tomatoes were county renowned.

Thus, my earliest memories are of overflowing baskets, loaded with bright reds, yellows, and magic purples. I'm talking tomatoes so plump they require PG-13 ratings.

So now you know how country people show love. Homegrown okra, collards, zipper peas,

purple hulls, white corn, green peanuts. And sacred tomatoes.

These days, a man can't find garden-grown fare just anywhere. Most tomatoes, for instance, don't come from gardens, but from nuclear facilities in Beijing. They are pink atrocities that taste like possum flop.

So when a man finds a real tomato, he must seize the moment.

That's exactly what I did. For breakfast, I made a tomato sandwich the same way my dirt-farmer ancestors have been doing the since the invention of the rock.

My family has long standing rules for tomato sandwiches, which are simple:

- Start with Colonial, Bunny, or Sunbeam bread. In a pinch, Wonderbread will do, but try not to make it a habit. Also, leave whole grains out of this fight.

- For mayo: Duke's or Blue Plate. Avoid Miracle Whip—which science has proven is not actual mayonnaise, but sweetened industrial pump lubricant. And here's another tip: always use more mayonnaise than your doctor says you should.

- Lastly, your shirt should be ruined by the time you're finished eating the sandwich. If it's not repeat the above steps.

I've changed my shirt eight times today.

It might sound silly, but these tomatoes make me remember things. They make me remember the sort of folks I come from. And they make me remember how times were long before people texted at stop lights.

They make me remember a time when the only electronic devices we had were made by Philco or General Electric. A time when people still read Sunday papers. When the only coffee maker my mother used was a Corningware percolator.

A time when love wasn't sent via email, text, or emoji, but in Winn-Dixie bags of produce.

Speaking of which, I reached into the bottom of the Winn-Dixie bag and I found a note written on a piece of legal paper. I must've missed it. "Dear Sean," the note read. "I bought these for you, I thought you'd enjoy them."

"Love, your wife."

Well.

Dear Jamie, I wrote this for you. It's nothing compared to a tomato, but it will have to do.

Love, Sean.

Liberty County gets \$50,000 grant to study water systems

Gov. Rick Scott announced that more than \$1.6 million has been awarded to support projects in rural communities across the state.

This grant funding was provided through the Rural Infrastructure Fund to help with the planning, preparation and financing of infrastructure projects in rural communities.

These projects will result in job creation, capital investment and the strengthening and diversification of Florida's rural economies. During Gov. Scott's time in office, every county has had a decrease in unemployment and every region in Florida has experienced job growth.

Cissy Proctor, Executive Director of the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, said, "The Rural Infrastructure Fund is an important economic development tool used to benefit our state's rural communities allowing them to attract businesses and create jobs. Rural communities provide

unique assets that play a vital role in our economy and we are proud to partner with them to help accomplish their economic goals."

The City of Fernandina Beach, Liberty County and the City of Marianna have been selected to receive Rural Infrastructure Fund grants.

•Liberty County (\$50,000) – To aid future expansion for the Hosford and Telogia water systems to support commercial development. The funds will be used to cover the costs of a feasibility study.

•City of Marianna (\$735,885) – For the construction of a water main, which will connect the existing system at the intersection of Old Cottdendale Road and State Road 276 to allow for warehouse expansion.

•City of Fernandina Beach (\$882,622) – To develop and construct a new general aviation terminal building at the Fernandina Beach Municipal Airport.

Chipola's Jeff Johnson is named NJCAA Baseball Coach of the Year

MARIANNA — Chipola College baseball head coach Jeff Johnson has been named the NJCAA D1 American Baseball Coaches Association National Coach of the Year.

"It feels good to get it man," said Johnson. "As always when you get an award like that with the many great coaches as there are at our junior college level, it's special. It takes a lot of great players and a lot of great assistant coaches to help as well. I'm just proud to receive the honor."

Johnson led his team to back-to-back JUCO World Series titles after ending the national tournament with six straight wins including two against No. 1 Walters State and one against 2017 runner-up San Jacinto. It was Johnson's third JUCO title (2007, 2017, 2018). Chipola finished the season at 49-17.

Chipola won its second straight title with a 10-7 win over Walters State (TN) in the title game of the National Tournament on June 2. After dropping the opening game of the World Series to Walters, the Indians avoided elimi-

nation in six consecutive games to win the title, becoming just the fourth program in tournament history to achieve the feat.

Chipola also was the first program to win back-to-back NJCAA World Series championships since Grayson (TX) in 1999-2000.

Chipola Sophomore Morgan McCullough won three individual awards at the tournament – Outstanding Defensive Player, Outstanding Hitter and Most Valuable Player. Philip Sanderson won the Outstanding Pitcher award.

He allowed only one earned run in 13.1 innings.

Five Chipola players were named to the All-Tournament Team: Edmond American, Trevor Holloway, Morgan McCullough, Francisco Urbaz and Alex Webb.

Coach Jeff Johnson was awarded the Bus Bergman Coach of the Year Award for the second consecutive season.

hand in his pocket as though reaching for a weapon, he stepped back and drew his taser. Despite a warning from the deputy that he would use the weapon, Cross would not comply and was shot with the taser. He was then handcuffed, examined by EMS and taken into custody.

The report said Cross also hit two women who had tried to intervene in the attack on his girlfriend.

Cross was charged and booked into the Liberty County Jail. His bond was later set at \$35,000.
