### **UF** instructor sues university president

HE SOUGHT RECORDS ABOUT GATOR GROWL FUNDS IN SUMMER.

A UF instructor sued UF President Bernie Machen on Wednesday, alleging he illegally withheld public records.

This summer, teaching associate and doctoral candidate Charles Grapski requested Machen's documents regarding the relationship between UF and its oldest leadership honorary, Florida Blue Key. He specifically sought information concerning the use of tuition-funded Activity & Service fees to subsidize tickets for the FBK-funded Gator Growl.

A response to Grapski from Machen's email address stated there were no such documents in his office. It added, "There is no intent



you and the president."

Grapski said the requested documents must exist because some of them are e-mails he himself sent to the president and responses he received back.

to schedule a meeting with


Machen's office also appointed an advisory committee for FBK's Homecoming events, so he should at least have the committee members' letters of appointment, Grapski said.

"To say that there are no documents is a lie," he said. "The refusal to comply with the public-records request has been stonewalling me from finding out what's really going on."

Grapski is seeking details on how administrators approved Student Government's subsidization of Gator Growl tickets. As of

**STUDENT GOVERNMENT,** FBK TO SHARE SUBSIDY.

Key Florida Blue Student Government teamed up Wednesday to make all Gator Growl student tickets available at the \$5 subsidized price.

Student Body President Joe Goldberg said he saw a number of students at the University Box Office leave Wednesday when the teller said Growl student tickets had jumped to \$18, the regular price, after the original allotment of student tickets sold out.

"I really don't want any students to get turned away," he said. "We want to make sure all students get to see the show."

Student Senate decided to subsidize 15,000 student tickets during the summer, taking \$140,000 out of SG reserves and lowering the price to \$5.

Goldberg said FBK, which runs Growl, and Student Government Productions will split paying the \$13 subsidy for the remainder of student tickets. Last year, about \$80,000 was taken out of SGP's budget for the same reason.

Goldberg said because SGP's budget was approved a year ago, Student Senate was not needed to make a decision on the matter.

Students who purchased tickets at regular price can go to the FBK offices in room 312 of the Reitz Union, show their ticket and receive a refund.

Gator Growl Producer Robert Carmody and SGP Chairman Joey Van de Bogart both said they were supportive of the decision.

# Gator Party senator guilty of two election violations

A Gator Party senator was found in violation of two election codes during Wednesday's Elections Commission meeting.

Rawlings-area Sen. William Perry was found guilty of destroying his opposing party's campaign material before the election.

Perry said Victor Bard, a former Impact Party Senate candidate, approached him while he was talking to a potential voter.

Impact alleged that Perry Student Government smacked the party's ad out of Bard's hand, crumpled it and offered it back to him.

Perry said Bard reached around him to hand the listener an Impact advertisement and he pushed Bard's hand out of his face.

"I always talked to the person after he would talk to them," Perry said in defense. "There was never an instance where I took material from him."

The punishment for the newly elected senator is a formally written apology to Bard.

"We just lament the fact that possibly someone like this will be representing the Rawlings area," Impact President Thomas Jardon said in an earlier interview before Perry










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# **Nobel honors Gator grad**

■ 1965 ALUMNUS IS SECOND TO WIN PRIZE.

The Gator Nation will extend to Sweden when a UF alumnus collects the 2005 Nobel Prize in chemistry.

It was announced Wednesday that Robert H. Grubbs, 63, won the prize for his work with two other scientists. Grubbs earned a bachelor's degree from UF in 1963 and his master's degree from UF in 1965.

He is the second person to graduate from UF and go on to win a Nobel Prize.

While at UF, he worked with chemistry professor Merle Battiste.

"I was his mentor," said Battiste, who found out his student had won science's highest prize at about 6 a.m. Wednesday.

"I knew it would happen sooner or later, but now that it has happened, it's a shock, a good shock," he said. "It's a great day."

Grubbs received the prize for his work on metathesis, a complex reaction by which carbon compounds exchange one of their elements for an element of another carbon compound.

The reaction is much like a dance where the couples change partners.

Grubbs developed a catalyst that enables scientists to use metathesis to create the specific compound they need more ef-

UF Alumni ficiently, with less potentially hazardous waste.

"He developed catalysts that were stable and robust but still reactive, so they could create new compounds, create better ways to synthesize old ones and prepare polymeric materials," Battiste said.

According to a press release from the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences, which awards the prizes, "this represents a great step forward for 'green chemistry,' reducing potentially hazardous waste through smarter production."

The catalyst Grubbs developed is being used in both academic and industrial labs, Battiste said.

It is also utilized extensively in pharmaceuticals, plastics and food preservatives.

Battiste remembers Grubbs as a hard worker who was enthusiastic about chemistry. They would often stay long after their work was done to have a Coke and talk about chemistry.

"It was an exciting time," he said.

While Grubbs was at UF, he did research in mechanistic organic chemistry and worked with small ring compounds.

The prize going to a UF graduate just goes to show that if you give someone the right start and the right guidance, you never know where they might end up, Battiste said.

When Battiste saw the work Grubbs was doing in the 1980s and 1990s, he said he knew it was only a matter of time before Grubbs would receive the prize.

Grubbs received his doctorate in 1968 from Columbia University and now works at the California Institute of Technology.

The prize will be awarded in Stockholm, Sweden on Dec. 10. Grubbs, Yves Chauvin of France and Richard R. Schrock of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology will share the \$1.3 million award.

The only other UF alumnus to win the Nobel Prize was Marshall Nirenberg in 1968 for physiology and medicine for his work in the discovery of DNA.

The officer had given him verbal orders to stop before Chadwick fled the scene.


After the officer caught Chadwick, he found a camera, a camera case, 30 CDs, sunglasses and sneakers on the property.

# Urkel actor to speak on life before, after television

Whether or not he did it then, he'll do it at UF this month.

Jaleel White, better known to many as the character Steve Urkel from the sitcom "Family Matters," is scheduled to speak at the University Auditorium on Oct. 27 at 8 p.m.

The event is sponsored by Accent, UF's student-run speakers' bureau.

The former TV star's outrageous portrayal of the character Urkel on "Family Matters," a comedy about the daily life of a black family living in the Chicago suburbs, was a popculture phenomenon during the show's run from 1989 to 1998.

Urkel was famous for his thick-rimmed glasses, suspenders with pants pulled up to his chest and obnoxious snorting laugh.

While White probably will not show up to his speech dressed as Urkel, he will discuss his experience growing up as a child TV star and how he was typecast as his character when the show ended. He also will offer general advice on writing for television and recount his story of entering the real world after graduating from college.

This will be White's first time speaking to a crowd of students on the lecture circuit.

Accent also will bring speaker Kyle Maynard to the Reitz Union Grand Ballroom on Nov. 1 at 8 p.m.


Maynard's lecture, entitled "Success Without Excuses," is based on his experiences living with a congenital defect that left him with underdeveloped arms and legs.

# Senate breaks District D tie, elects new president

At the first Student Senate meeting since the Fall election, a tie for a District D seat was settled and new Senate leaders were appointed early

They tied in last week's election with 444 votes each, but in the Senate chamber, Lloyd-Montgomery won by a large margin.

She was replaced by her longtime right-hand man, former Senate President Pro-Tempore John Boyles. Boyles ran uncontested.

Sen. Mike Patrone ran uncontested for president pro-tempore.

Boyles said anyone eligible to be a District E or F senator can apply and Senate will vote on the winner in two weeks. Applications for the judiciary and the rules and ethics chairs are due today.

Wednesday, SG's donation totals at least \$195,000, according to FBK President Brian

The payment was illegal, Grapski said, because it went to FBK, a private organization that is not eligible for A&S Fee allocation, per Florida statutes.

Grapski wrote Machen via e-mail that "it is a known and established fact that it (SG) is under the control of the political

arm of Florida Blue Key," referring to a 1998 Alachua County court order addressing FBK's political power.

UF administrators declined comment.

Public records, as defined in Florida statutes, include the business correspondence of public officials "regardless of the physical form, characteristics or means of transmission.'

The statutes also state "each agency must provide reasonable public access to records electronically maintained."

Grapski said Machen's office has been

more dismissive of public-records laws than any previous administration.

He cited provost-search meetings Machen held out of state that Florida residents did not have reasonable access to.

Grapski said Machen also censors emails released to the public without basis.

"He has let it be known that he does not like Florida public-records laws, and he has taken actions to show that he does not believe they apply to him," Grapski said.

Grapski said he hopes that after his legal action, the president will end his pattern of noncompliance and acknowledge his duty as a public official.

"Bernie Machen is attempting to run the University of Florida as if he were the CEO of a private corporation," he said.

was sworn in Tuesday as Rawlings senator.

Perry was also found guilty of not notifying Supervisor of Elections Daniel Maland of an advertisement sent via the Facebook. The messages Perry sent to people using the Facebook were labeled as paid political advertisements.

For that violation, Perry was reprimanded by the Elections Commission.

Gator was found not guilty of breaking election codes for putting up a campaign advertisement banner on the SG-sponsored poles at the Plaza of the Americas.

During an Aug. 31 meeting with party leaders, Maland said the poles were off limits for campaign advertising.


But when Impact wrote an election complaint about the Gator Party banner, they put the incorrect statute on

the form, which disqualified the complaint.

For the same reason, Impact's complaints against organizations on Fraternity Row for political advertisements on Greek houses was withdrawn before the meeting.

Impact party leaders said they withdrew the complaint because they knew it would not be heard. Its sexualharrassment complaint may be heard at a later date by a different body.

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

# Media focus on Miller masks important trial

The Editorial Board has been mulling over how it feels about New York Times reporter Judith Miller and her plight to protect her source.

We're still not sure about all the details, but since we're in the journalism business, we thought we would add our voice to the jabbering multitudes.

Bear with us. Before we jump into the fray, we're going to have to lay out the facts.

Here's what we know

Miller talks to Vice President Dick Cheney's chief of staff "Scooter" Libby. News reports fail to pinpoint.how Lewis such a highly ranked official received an 8-year-old's nick-

Someone leaks the identity of CIA operative Valerie Plame to columnist Robert Novak, who prints the information in an apparent act of idiotic malice. Plame's husband had recently debunked some of the administration's biological-weapons claims. Novak still won't give up his sources.

Miller never writes about it.

Prosecutor Patrick Fitzgerald thinks Libby is involved, so he asks Miller to talk about her conversations with him. Miller refuses because she had a confidentiality agreement with him.

Miller goes to jail. Almost three months later, Miller agrees to testify because Libby called her and gave his heartfelt consent. Critics say Libby offered his consent a year ago and ask why Miller waited.

After all, there must be something sinister.

But Miller's rebuttal is that an official release signed through lawyers could have been pressed upon Libby. Furthermore, she said she would be putting too much pressure on her source if she called to confirm whether he really wanted her to go through with it.

The Editorial Board has a few conjectures to throw your

One: Maybe Miller is just a crazy, overzealous reporter who has a creepy kind of self-control. And two: Who cares?

This media frenzy is seriously out of control.

Take a look at all the stories about Miller in the last few weeks. Only a few actually mention what the real case is about. The rest regurgitate all the "suspicious" questions that surround Miller's decisions.

This Editorial Board is beginning to think the media created the anonymous critics on their own. It's like a sick fervor of

So much of the surrounding press has focused on whether Miller was sincere that we've lost sight of why the grand jury wanted her to testify in the first place.

The real meat of this case is that some government officials connived to ruin a woman's career, and possibly put her in mortal danger, because they couldn't take the heat from her husband's criticism.

What kind of government is that? And why is it so scared of criticism? Only the guilty try to stifle the opposition.

With the way this case is going, we're beginning to believe the Bush administration has succeeded in just that. We've all been sidetracked from the serious criticism this case may shine

And why isn't the media more focused on Novak?

The Editorial Board supports source confidentiality, but we never know how we'll act when faced with such an ultimatum. Most journalists would probably have called Libby after he signed the release instead of patiently waiting for him to come

But we shouldn't harp too much on Miller's actions. It's over; she testified. Let's focus on how this case will end.

# Name-calling isn't answer to diversity

olitical cartoons are supposed to provoke response. But when a cartoonist is passionate about an issue, his message of artistic civil disobedience must be clear and precise. The response it provokes can never be, "Huh?"

The word cracker has a dual history. Black people used it to fight racist whites and the n-word. It's an angry word born of angry circumstances

Its roots lie in the Middle English for braggart (see Shakespeare's "King John"). It was originally used to describe rural, poor whites in the South. Some Southerners still call themselves crackers. There's a style of architecture called Florida Cracker. This definition does not involve racism.

I doubt Andy Marlette was referring to President Machen's geographical roots or architectural tastes in his cartoon showing Machen with a cracker for a head. We must remember that words like "cracker" and the socalled n-word, whose modern variant Marlette recently used, have histories.

I've been called the n-word, both with -r and -a. The former hurt and came after "you;" the latter was friendly and followed "my." The word was given to me, in a sense, but it's not mine to use freely.

You see, I'm not black. The word doesn't have the same history for me. My hurt was not the same hurt a black person can feel.

Some black people, and others, deplore all use of the word. Others set it to beats, rhyme it creatively and use it in funny and insightful ways

When a reporter asked Muhammad Ali how it felt to be such a prominent figure, he said, "Did you just call me a

That's funny. But only if you know that Ali was called

Vikram Rangala Speaking Out the n-word many times, with hatred behind it, and he responded by showing the world how pretty, witty and great black people can be.

In the end, I think the n-word debate is a black thing, and the rest of us should stay on the sidelines.

Using any word without appreciating its history weakens your message. I assume Marlette's cracker crack refers to what the Gainesville Sun called "a dearth of black people in (Machen's) Cabinet."

A fair criticism, but Machen did not seek that situation, and amid complex challenges, he is working for diversity and asking essential questions like why hundreds of minority students who meet UF admissions standards choose community college.

Lately, I have fewer black and poor students — which sucks — because our system blocks them somewhere between their high schools and my classroom. If I'm part of that system, am I also guilty? What do you call a brown cracker? A Triscuit?

Sometimes, systemic flaws conspire to keep people out of classrooms - and Cabinets. Our response must be to open pathways through those barriers, which is exactly what Machen seeks with initiatives like the Florida Opportunities Scholarship.

Cracker isn't a precise or useful criticism when the challenge is this complex.

We share a common challenge: to tunnel through barriers left by history and habit, to grab hands and pull each other through. Instead of name-calling, we must look for the shafts of light and dig with all our might.



For Cope, it's all in a night's work as house emcee of Thursday Night Live at Coconuts Comedy Club, 7417 W Newberry Road.


For the best — and sometimes the worst — in raw comedic talent, student comics and comedy clubgoers alike look no further than Gainesville's local comedy hot spot.

UF economics major Raju Vyas performs stand-up not only for the challenge but for the intangible rewards.

"Making people laugh can be the most amazing feeling in the world," Vyas said. "If you bomb out there, it can also be the worst feeling."

Vyas noted that the Gainesville comedy scene is unique because comics are invited to attend a workshop at Coconuts every Sunday to brainstorm jokes and perform material for other comedians.

The workshop helps new comics iron out kinks in their routines as well as gain valuable constructive criticism

Ultimately, Vyas said he feels it takes a certain kind of person to perform in the high pressure and highly critical stand-up atmosphere.
"If you're passionate, confident

Cope agreed that although alltypes of comedians are given a shot at performing for a live crowd, true comedians have innate talent.

"In order to be a good stand-up comic, comedy has to be in your blood," Cope said.

While comics sweat it out under the bright stage lights, club patrons enjoy laughs from small café-style tables with candlelit centerpieces that give Coconuts a big-city club ambiance all within Gainesville city limits.

On Friday and Saturday nights, club-goers can enjoy professional comedy acts brought in from throughout Florida.

# Quest for best barbecue leaves mouths watering

Whether you're tailgating hours before kickoff or watching the game from your couch, barbecue is the staple ingredient of Saturday football games, and Gainesville serves up the best.

To pick the best local barbecue restaurant, I chose among Gainesville's culinary greats: David's Real Pit BBQ, Sonny's Real Pit Bar-BQ and Newberry's Backyard Bar-BQ.

Saturday, when the Gators were away, I got take-out from all three restaurants and gathered a group of hungry friends who needed no persuasion to be my fellow food critics.

The drive to Newberry's Backyard Bar-BQ was about 10 minutes outside of Gainesville, not too far but not exactly in my backyard.

The service was a little too casual; customers eyed the clock while waiting for their food or for someone to take their orders.

But in its defense, Newberry's was busy on game day.

The long line inside the restaurant wasn't for dining in but carryout, and the phone rang constantly.

Back at the apartment, in front of the television, we pigged out (pun obviously intended).

The homemade, foot-long onion

rings from Newberry's were a hit; delightfully crispy and greasy.

The spare ribs rivaled Sonny's. Both restaurants' ribs were meaty, juicy and didn't need much barbecue sauce to enhance their flavors.

Newberry's baby-back ribs were decent but rather small for a full rack.

However, Sonny's ribs were fall-off-the-bone,

melt-between-my-teeth tender.

As far as side dishes go, David's Real Pit BBQ was the only place that served macaroni and cheese, but it wasn't much more than a packet of certainly taste them. Easy Mac.

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

# Avoid John, find Juan

Having never heard the John Butler Trio prior to reviewing this album, I had no idea what to

Needless to say, it was a surprise when the twang of a country guitar was followed by some horrific attempt at rapping. It wasn't a good surprise either. As dreadful as this opening was, it got no better; being followed by a long and pointless when-will-itend guitar solo.

Fortunately for the John Butler Trio, nothing on the album sinks as low as the nadir that is its first track. That isn't to say we're talking about a good record here — it's far from that. The rap goes out the window and is replaced by some nondescript crooning from Butler, who sounds like a blander version of Incubus' Brandon

Musically, the country influences and unwelcome solos remain and are joined on other tracks by some overwrought strings. Lyrically, it regularly wades into melodramatic and moralistic ground.

There is little to recommend in this album. It lacks originality, sincerity or anything distinctive. The only bright spot is "Damned to Hell," a strippeddown, lo-fi ramble which is a welcome change from the other bloated and overproduced tracks. Avoid.

onto an unsuspecting public last year was bound to generate interest in similar acts.

The question is, is its DFA Records stablemate The Juan Maclean worthy of such attention?

The answer is both yes and no. There's nothing here quite as refreshing and catchy as the ubiquitous "Daft Punk is Playing at My House," although the third track, "Give Me Every Little Thing," comes close.

There are, however, nine tracks fusing electro, Detroit techno, house, disco and funk to great effect.

But while these are most definitely songs you can dance to, there are enough chilled-out moments - particularly "In the Afternoon," whose opening is reminiscent of Air - to make it suitable for home listening.

In fact, maybe The Juan Maclean would have done well to let the bass loose on a couple of tracks and produce some real floor-filling anthems.

Nevertheless, this is a consistently good record. Those interested in dipping their toes into dance music, but embarrassed about not knowing DJ Sneak from DJ Spooky, should check out "Less Than Human."

In the end, the key to any successful sexbuddy relationship might just be a friend without benefits to listen to your complaints rather than a friend with benefits who's on the same page.

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

There's a new music club in Gainesville, and it's not a venue.

The latest chapter of the Music Entertainment · Industry Students Association is opening this month at UF.

The organization, which started in 1979 as an off shoot of the Music and Entertainment Industry Educators Association, focuses on preparing students for jobs in the music and entertainment "Careers in businesses. entertainment

"Careers in entertainment often seem so far off," said UF's MEISA founder Matt them tangible and attain-Jones. "We're here to make them tangible and attainable."

**UF's MEISA founder** MEISA already has two chapters in Florida at the University of Miami and Miami-Dade College and more than 20 nationwide. Bringing it to Gainesville seemed natural to Jones.

"The people here have a passion for innovative music," he said. "Our dynamic local scene pushes students to want careers in this industry."

MEISA will hold meetings every other Wednesday and will feature speakers from local radio stations and venues. Once they raise enough money, Jones wants to bring in music and entertainment industry members from New York and Los

Angeles.

There are no membership fees. The first meeting date has not yet been scheduled, but fliers will appear on campus soon, Jones said.

The organization is geared toward all types of music and entertainment-based jobs, including musicians, promoters, journalists, venue owners, roadies and future executives. The meetings will address everything from "intellectual property to rock journalism,"

Iones said.

The organization is also meant to give students experience while still in school. Jones said members of the local music community have expressed interest in using MEISA as a way to recruit interns.

"If they [students] want to get a job in the entertainment industry, they need a way to discover the realities of the field," he said. "It's not all autographs and brown M&M's.

Jones, who co-founded The Local Brew concert series and UF's marijuana law-reform group NORML, books and promotes concerts through Student Government Productions and the Reitz Union

# Portis works to improve passing

If only Josh Portis could throw the ball well. The concept seems simple enough, but Portis has struggled with passing thus far.

His speed provides the Gators with an obvious perk when he enters games, but Portis has logged 21 rushes to just six pass attempts. Compound his throwing troubles with fumbling issues, and you get a work-in-progress.

"Our quarterback has to be able to do more than run the option," Coach Urban Meyer said. "He has to be a well-balanced guy."

The good news for the Gators is that Portis' passing has improved somewhat.

"He's better now than he's ever been, but he's still not a polished passer," said Meyer, who added that Portis will play against Mississippi State.

CRAWLING OUT OF THE GATES: UF may want to kickoff to start the game Saturday.

The Gators have been anemic on opening drives this season. In their four games, not counting Tennessee, UF's opening drives have resulted in three punts and a blocked punt.

"Awful," Meyer described it. "I think the ideal one was against Tennessee when we kicked off, played good defense, returned a punt and two plays later we're down to the 20. I'm very concerned about [opening drives]."

INJURY UPDATE: Wide receiver Jemalle Cornelius continues to recover from a sprained left ankle.

Though he has been prac-



ticing with an ankle brace, Meyer pects him to play against Mississippi State Saturday.

"Jemalle

is still sore, but we're counting on him going," he said.

Center Mike Degory (ankle and MCL) returned to practice for three quarters of Wednesday's session.

After leaving the game against Alabama on Saturday, offensive linemen Tavares Washington (shoulder) and Jim Tartt (ribs) also should play against the Bulldogs.

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# **Defense readies for All-SEC RB**

**UF ASSISTANT COACHED** MSU RUNNING BACK LAST SEASON.

Jerious Norwood won't be taking anyone by surprise this year.

Last season, the Mississippi State running back seemingly came out of nowhere to lead the Bulldogs to an upset of UF.

While former Gators running back Ciatrick Fason put up a 16carry, 143-yard performance, those numbers paled in comparison to Norwood's 174-yard game, which included a game-winning 37-yard touchdown run.

"Jerious Norwood surprised us last year," defensive end Jeremy Mincey said. "The coaches told us about him, but since nobody knew his name we really didn't take him seriously."

This season, everyone in the Southeastern Conference knows the First Team All-SEC running back by name.

Last season, linebacker Brandon Siler could only watch from the sideline as the speedy 6-foot, 204pound back shredded the Gators play after play.

"He is a pretty shifty, pretty good running back," Siler said. "We have got to get him down if we want to win this weekend.'

Just one of many interesting subplots to UF's homecoming game is whether the Gators defense will be able to stop Norwood, after allowing Alabama's Kenneth Darby to run for 101 yards last week.

But perhaps, the most interesting subplot of all is UF running backs coach Stan Drayton, an assistant at Mississippi State last season, facing his former pupil.

If anyone knows how dangerous Norwood can be, it is Drayton.

"Jerious is a game breaker, there's no question about it," Drayton said. "He changes the tempo of the game, and when he steps on the field, the speed of the entire game changes.'

The Gators' front seven did a decent job containing Tennessee's Gerald Riggs Jr.

But UF's run-stoppers had a tougher time with the quicker Darby.

Norwood is a similarly speedy back, clocking in at 4.47 seconds in the 40-yard dash, but he also has

the ability to shed defenders in the open field.

"Sure, Jerious might be a little skinny," Drayton said. "He looks a lot like Markus Manson at about 205 [pounds].

"He's not a real big kid, but he is going to hit you with some speed and make you miss.'

Does Drayton have any advice for stopping his former player?

"The only way to stop him is to rally," he said. "You play disciplined defense, and you cover your gaps.
"You just need to make tackles

in the open space."

Drayton revealed that the defense has spent all week practicing on making open field tackles and the linebackers, especially, have worked on gang tackling.

This homecoming weekend could be difficult for Drayton, as he will be reunited with friends in Norwood and Bulldogs' coach Sylvester Croom.

"I keep in contact with both Jerious and Coach Croom," Drayton said. "Coach was the only person who ever took me aside and showed me the cut-throat nature of the business, and I'll always appre-


Drayton keeps in contact with his former star, saying he calls Norwood about once a week.

"We're very good friends who will keep in touch for the rest of our lives," Drayton said.



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
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# Gators offensive line struggles with pass protection

INJURIES, LACK OF CHEMISTRY CONTRIBUTE TO GROUP'S WOES.

After taking one step forward against Kentucky, UF's offensive line took two steps in the wrong direction in Tuscaloosa. It took Alabama all of one play to exploit what has become a thriving point of inconsistency in the Gators offense.

With quarterback Chris Leak in the shotgun on the first play from scrimmage, Tide defensive end Mark Anderson broke through the line and sacked Leak, who fumbled the ball before it was pounced on by a UF offen-

The sack was the first of four the line would give up, and by the time the elephant had stampeded through the trenches, the Gators ran into the locker room leading the Southeastern Conference in sacks allowed with 18. Through just five games, perhaps a more troubling statistic for the offensive line, which lost left tackle Jonathan Colon and right guard Mo Mitchell to graduation, is how itgave up only 19 sacks in all of 2004.

"We need to work harder on technique and get better at how we compete, but there's no magic to it," offensive line coach John Hevesy said. "The way we are not protecting Leak and giving up sacks, it's disgusting right now, and nat has to change."

Hevesy's offensive line at Utah was revered by Coach Urban Meyer as one of most wellcoached units he had seen. The Utes offensive line was one of the more athletic groups in the country, paving the way for Meyer's spread offense in the Mountain West Conference. However, Hevesy has struggled to find such consistency and athleticism because of inju-

"Five guys work together all week in practice, and then the game comes around and you lose two of them and that sets everything off sync," he said. "It's not an excuse, but we have to learn to compete a little harder and work a little harder."

Gators Offensive line

Both of UF's starting guards, senior guard Tavares left Washington and redshirt freshman right

guard Jim Tartt, were limited in the Alabama game with elbow and rib injuries, respectively. Also, senior center Mike Degory has missed time at practice this week nursing an MCL and ankle, but all three are expected to be back for the Mississippi State game.

While backup guards Drew Miller, a sophomore, and Steve Rissler, a junior, seemed to hold their own against the Crimson Tide, the lack of chemistry on the interior line has hurt the running game and pass protection.

"It definitely hurts because of how we have had to rotate them inside," Hevesy said. "It's like a marriage. You kind of know and expect how your wife does things. When you're a left tackle, you expect to know how your left guard does things.'

The Gators' troubles up front raise even more questions because of how much was invested in their returning leadership throughout Meyer's spring practices. Four out of five starting spots on the line belonged to seniors at the beginning of the year.

Tackles Lance Butler and Randy Hand, along with Degory and Washington, might have to increase their leadership with the Gators facing off against some of the SEC's most talented defenses.

"I think the big thing is that the mistakes we are making are simple," Degory said. "It seems like everything is caving in, but we just have to come out and prepare more."

Running backs coach Stan Drayton believes Manson is ready to jump-start UF's rushing game.

"He's game-ready; there's no question," Drayton said. "He's a tempo changer. He gets into the ball game and the speed of the game changes.'

"I'm going to put him in position this week during practice to grab the bull by the horns and just run with it."

As Manson redshirted last season, the UF sideline was abuzz with accounts of his explosiveness. But after a spring of promise, the redshirt freshman fell to fourth on the Gators depth chart during the summer. By UF's season-opener against Wyoming, he watched from the sideline as true freshman Kestahn Moore lined up at tailback for the Gators first play from scrimmage

"I was wondering why I wasn't playing," Manson said, "but I couldn't fault anybody but myself for that."

While his maturity level and understanding of the offense hindered Manson's playing time, Meyer said the freshman simply couldn't hang on to the

"In high school, they really didn't teach us how to hold the ball," Manson said. "It didn't matter, but up here, they put an emphasis on holding the ball the way they want."

Trying to break the back's fumbling ways, coaches drilled Manson on keeping his wrist above his elbow to lock the ball in place as he ran.

> Manson said he has mastered the technique and Drayton

believes the freshman could become the aggressive type of back the Gators desperately need. "Let's take away a little of that finesse part of it," Drayton

said. "I don't care if you can shake and bake. If there's a lane, I want you to take the lane. Let's

create bad [pursuit] angles because you're exploding through holes and breaking tackles."

Now, Manson finally has an opportunity at becoming the 20- to 25-carries-per-game workhorse Meyer said the Gators have needed all season. It's a role Manson believes he will fill just fine.

"I did it in high school," Manson said. "So why


Add to that home games against one-loss Vanderbilt and undefeated Florida State and you've got five easily losable


People talk about how Ron Zook got a raw deal for taking over a UF team devoid of any
