HURRICANE WILMA

Storm trounces South Fla.

While attending classes, many students from South Florida had their minds on the welfare of their families back home as Hurricane Wilma pummeled the region.

Wilma sped across the state Monday with 125 mph winds, killing at least six and knocking out power for 6 million residents.

Whitney Lawson's family and dog, 7-year-old Scooter, were locked down in Pembroke Pines when the eye of Wilma passed through.

The 19-year-old UF advertising major called home Monday to see how the area had weathered the storm. She said her father described their neighborhood as "a war zone" and that all the landscaping was demolished.

"My mom said Scooter was freaking out, but they'd gotten drugs for her ahead of time, like tranquilizers," she said. "But she was still really nervous."

Jimmy Kaphusman, a UF building construction major whose family also lives in Pembroke Pines, said the winds were strong enough to wreck his family's new RV.

A 25-foot boat was blown into their trailer being stored alongside the RV.


"The boat's engine went through the side of our camper," Kaphusman said.

Dean Lazar, of Cooper City, said his house had the type of damage that's typical of hurricanes.

"Our pool is screened in," Lazar said. "Or was screened in, because it is now all in our pool, which has turned green."

The UF mechanical engineering major said his father's prized orchid garden was also ruined.

Still, not all students were plagued with worry.

Student fees will increase

UF tuition for the 2006-07 fiscal year may rise within the next few weeks when the University Athletic Association and Student Health Care Center staff ask for a hike in the tuition-funded Activity & Service Fee.

The A&S Fee Committee, which is composed of three faculty members and four from Student Government, which controls and allocates A&S fees, met last Thursday with Student Senate

Budget & Appropriations Committee Chairwoman Jackie Pace to discuss the next fiscal year's A&S Fee budget.

Pace presented a \$12 million budget to the committee, which will meet Thursday to discuss how much more students will pay per credit hour.

This budget is nearly \$1 million higher than last fiscal year's. The fee can only be increased a maximum of 5 percent yearly, or about 95 cents per credit hour.

The budget committee is in charge of allocating the money to hundreds of student organizations. The committee began special-events hearings for events such as Hispanic Heritage Month and Islam Awareness Month on Oct. 16.

But on the same day, the power in the budget committee shifted when some senators voted to break the rules and remove committee member Sen. Lola Bovell. She was voted out of the budget committee and replaced by two students who had no voting experience on the committee.

The Replacement & Agenda Committee, which appoints all SG committee members, vot-

UF prevents legal downloading of file-sharing software

■ **THE ICARUS SYSTEM DOES NOT ALLOW 'FAIR USE.'**

UF's homegrown network-monitoring software has become a point of contention for students who say the program prevents them from

legal downloading activities and infringes on their rights.

ICARUS, which is largely responsible for the prevention of peer-to-peer software usage on campus, has outraged a number of students who claim it violates their rights.

But despite protest, the patent-pending program may soon be available to universities nationwide.

In creating ICARUS, UF's initial

inclination was to develop a program that would solve network congestion, said Mark Hoit, the interim

associate provost for information technology.

"Based on that bandwidth needed, we looked at the Web traffic and determined that a lot of it was due to illegal file sharing," Hoit said. "It was more cost effective to

limit students from downloading things they shouldn't be downloading."

Materials science and engineering student Zachary Harper said his biggest problem with ICARUS is that the software doesn't discriminate between copyright infringement and fair use.

Harper, who is part of the facebook.com group STOPICARUS,

said he feels UF should permit the usage of legal peer-to-peer, or P2P, file-sharing programs like BitTorrent.

BitTorrent, an open-source file-sharing program, is used by legitimate enterprises to distribute computer-game demos, open-source operating systems, such as Linux,

Alcohol safety week begins

A cup of beer is set at one end of the table. A ping-pong ball is bounced toward it from the opposite side. If the ball lands in the beer, a person must down the whole thing.

Beer pong is a classic example of a game that results in binge drinking, said SFCC counselor Lesley LeBaron, who added she hopes to educate students about risks associated with drinking games and other types of alcohol abuse.

SFCC will participate in the National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week with an event Wednesday focused on healthy and safe drinking decisions.

“A student will drink more in college than at any other point in their life,” LeBaron said. “It seems to be a part of college student life — some rite of passage.”

The recognition week began in 1983 by Bacchus and Gamma

Peer Education Network and is the largest such event in higher education facilities.

The focus of the event is not on prohibiting drinking but on choosing to drink in less harmful ways, said Drew Hunter, president of Bacchus and Gamma. The program is designed to put the decision back in student hands.

This year’s theme is “iChoose.” SFCC students can sign a pledge saying they choose to take care of themselves and their friends, not to allow others to pressure them into drinking or drinking excessively, and to stay safe by not drinking in excess, not driving after drinking and

not riding with a driver who has been drinking.

The event is from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the S-Building breezeway. Free pizza and soda will be served.

Caboose gets spruced

In a small town west of Gainesville, less than a mile from the town's only stoplight, past the Cross Creek Baptist Church and surrounded by huge fields of grass, sits a tired, old caboose.

But it won't look old for long.

Eight UF students have been spending their Saturdays in the small town of Archer, donating their time to restore an antique caboose. Once the last car on a train that may have roared through North Florida, it now sits in City Recreational Park.

Members of the "Caboose Project," led by UF graduate student James Marini, are working to restore the antique caboose so it can eventually be turned into a concession stand for park sporting events.

This project is a small part of Archer's efforts to improve its youth recreational programs and give children in the area something to do.

Leon Wetherington, the project's faculty adviser, was contacted by City Commissioner Roberta Lopez and asked to take on the project.

Wetherington, who holds a doctorate in building construction, has personally invested \$1,100.

"He's always pushing us to give back to the community," Marini said.

All eight of the project's crew members are taking Wetherington's superstructures course at UF. Marini volunteered to take on the role of project manager.

"It's our own project, so if we want something done, we have to do it," Marini said.

The caboose, which has been painted bright red on one side, suffered years of vandalism and neglect.

Pictures of the caboose from less than a month ago tell a grim story. Broken windows, rotting wood and graffiti made it look less like an antique and more like a junkyard mobile home.

Around Gainesville Inside, the walls are black from a fire and wood has been torn away by termites.

Cynthia Tucker, an entomology expert from UF, was brought out to investigate the damage. The crew learned that extensive extermination would be necessary.

The biggest challenge of the project, however, has been the wood framing, Marini said.

On one side of the caboose, all the old framing had to be removed before a new wall could be installed.

Marini said he thinks it will be at least another month before they can finish the project.

"Our goal in this is to make it structurally sound, and that's what it's going to be," Marini said.

Marini said he hopes the project will be symbolic to the city of Archer as railroads have played a significant role in shaping the city.

The crew can be found hammering away Saturdays at the City Recreational Park, 13975 SW 174th St., in Archer.

Students' thoughts with families in storm, not classes

Sophomore Kent Russell, whose parents live in Coral Gables, didn't go out of his way to check up on the storm's effect.

"If it was bad, my dad would've called me," Russell said.

And aside from plummeting temperatures, students in Gainesville saw few effects of the hurricane.

The sun was shining down on campus by 1 p.m., contrary to the stormy forecast. Monday's lower-than-average tem-

peratures came as a surprise to some students.

"Thank God Mom brought my warm clothes up," 20-year-old Rachel Petrofsky said to her father on her cell phone. "It's so ridiculously cold."

Nevertheless, Alachua County residents should be aware of hazardous weather watches.

A fire-weather watch goes into effect Tuesday when critical fire-weather conditions are expected. National Weather Service officials predict long periods of low humidity and increased winds from

the northwest that will create dangerous fire hazards.

Unlike Wilma's two-day pounding of Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula, the hurricane's Florida foray was a hit and run. The storm's relatively fast speed helped hold its rainfall to less than the 10 inches feared.

"There's really no good scenario for a hurricane," National Hurricane Center meteorologist Mark McInerney said. "Just a lesser of two evils."

The first to feel Wilma's wrath was the Florida Keys, which immediately lost power. The only route to mainland Florida, U.S. 1, was cut off by floodwaters.

Water from a 9-foot storm surge rose quickly in the low-lying island chain, rapidly reaching the tops of cars four blocks inland and seeping into homes that owners thought would never flood.

The storm's reach was so great that it left homes and businesses without power as far north as Daytona Beach, an eight-hour drive from Key West.

A tornado spun off by the storm damaged an apartment complex near Melbourne on the East Coast, 200 miles from where Wilma came ashore.

The eighth hurricane to strike Florida in 15 months made landfall around 6:30 a.m. near Cape Romano, an uninhabited island south of Naples in Collier County on Florida's southwest coast.

As it moved across the state, Wilma flattened trees, broke water mains, turned debris into missiles and lit up the sky with the blue-green flash of popping transformers.

The insurance industry estimated the insured losses in Florida at anywhere from \$2 billion to \$9 billion. Officials said it was the most damaging storm to hit Fort Lauderdale since 1950.

and other free software.

However, ICARUS was designed simply to monitor the network, not filter the actual content, Hoit said. Therefore, it is impossible for ICARUS to determine whether BitTorrent is being used for legitimate or infringing purposes.

That imprecision of ICARUS is precisely the problem, said Nicholas Stack, a pre-law and philosophy senior.

Stack, also a member of STOP ICARUS, said one of his issues with the program is that it detects a violation and cuts off the person's Internet connection automatically, without determining the legitimacy of P2P usage.

Stack said he feels this is a violation of the Student Code of Conduct.

He said his biggest issue with ICARUS is if a student is caught sharing files, even for legitimate purposes, the student is required to visit the DHNet Web site and sign an online form with his UFID and admit to doing something wrong, thus incriminating themselves without a hearing.

"I understand what they're trying to do, but it just seems like they're violating the Student Code of Conduct," Stack said.

ed 4-1 to suspend SG rules requiring Bovell, the most experienced candidate, to stay on the committee, said chairman Sen. Mike Patrone.

Sens. Rachael Sandelli and Jesse Kirsch were appointed as members to the budget committee to replace Bovell, who had been in SG for a year and a voting budget committee member for six months.

However, Senate President John Boyles said he has seen multiple occasions when the rules are

suspended in order to vote for the desired member.

"It's not a matter of tenure," he said. "It's happened a number of times."

Boyles said he had to calm some who thought the committee made the wrong choice.

"There have been a lot of emotions going around," he said. "I'm trying to take care of it and make sure everyone is on the same page."

Boyles said he voted to remove Bovell from the committee because Patrone told him she did not want Bovell on her committee.

Patrice did not return repeated phone calls Monday.

Replacement & Agenda voting member Sen. Allison Cullin said she voted against bending the rules.

Student Government

"There's no method for overturning tenure," Cullin said. "It's a big deal to suspend the rules. That's why I voted against it. The rules were written for a reason. It's just a big deal and something that should not be messed with."

Cullin was Bovell's lone vote of support during the meeting.

"I'm just a big believer in experience," she said.

Kirsch is Patrone's fraternity brother, and sources told the Alligator that Sandelli is Patrone's former girlfriend. As chairman, Patrone had no voting power to pick Kirsch and Sandelli.

Patrone said personal relationships were not discussed when the decision was made.

"Rachel (Sandelli) is just one of my friends, just like the rest of Senate," he said. "I consider a lot of them my friends. Obviously, a lot of us in Senate hang out together. There's definitely camaraderie."

Sandelli has been involved in SG since the start of Summer B, and Kirsch was voted into Senate during Spring 2005. Kirsch said he has attended all of the Budget & Appropriations Committee meetings since Summer B.

Bovell has been in SG at least a semester longer than either of the new committee members.

But Bovell said the decision won't affect her.

"I don't need a position to serve the students," she said. "I just feel that the organizations themselves feel that people on the committee should have experience."

Quick fix

SG officials misled in limiting speaker funds

Student Government has attempted the unthinkable: fiscal responsibility.

As with most of its brushes with the monetary beast, SG only superficially addressed the problem. In fact, we think it might have made things worse.

The SG Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee enacted a rule that student organizations can spend only 50 percent of their event budgets on speakers.

Enforcing a cap on such events isn't a terrible idea; it just gets sketchy when it's unclear what the remaining 50 percent will be spent on.

Since the Asian American Student Union is so outspoken on the issue, we'll use it as an example. For Kaleidoscope Month, the group is asking for about \$10,000. They want to spend about \$8,000 on a band, but the new rule will allow them to spend only \$5,000.

Where will the remaining \$5,000 go?

Committee Chairwoman Jackie Pace said the rule hopefully will bring a variety of activities at events.

What sort of activities is Pace hoping for? An arts-and-crafts session with a local clown?

As budgets get higher, more can be spent on a speaker. But more must also be spent on undefined "activities."

Let's be realistic. Students come to events for two reasons — the speakers and the food. With organizations now limited on spending for both, they don't have many options left.

Maybe they should hand out the extra money to students at the events. That would add variety.

Such a blanket rule is unnecessary. Committee members should be deciding how much to allocate on a case-by-case basis. Many groups probably blow their budgets on poorly chosen speakers, but SG cannot assume all organizations are likewise guilty.

This rule enables the budget committee to be more careless with specifics. Instead of looking at whether the event is worthwhile and fiscally responsible, the committee can just take the easy road and cap the speaker allocation at half.

On the other hand, this rule might also make the committee's job more difficult.

If organizations are set on acquiring a certain speaker, they could balloon their budget proposals until the 50-percent mark is at what they need. Instead of estimating the total amount of money they need for the event, they will base their proposals entirely on the speakers' fees. This inflation would force SG to cut budgets significantly.

SG's fiscal problems are not based on the internal expenses of student organizations. They are tied to SG officials' careless expenditures.

Furthermore, officials increase many organizations' budgets every year. Do all of them deserve to be increased? Are increases necessary to every group's goal?

Rules do not solve most of SG's fiscal problems. Officials must take the responsibility onto themselves.

But as much as we disagree with the budget committee's new rule, we also think organizations should comply. They can object all they want, but they shouldn't refuse to follow the committee's budget outline.

SG can't be blamed for refusing funding if students don't draw out their proposals in the correct way.

We're glad the budget committee is taking steps to be responsible with student funds, but it needs to take another step back to see the bigger issues.



Gators remember Georgia game, Zook one year later

Despite a subpar offense and a load of injuries, the Gators feel better heading into Saturday's game against Georgia than they did a year ago.

On the Monday before last season's Georgia game, Ron Zook was fired, leaving the Gators to play one of their biggest rivals in a state of disarray. The Gators lost 31-24, and it was the toughest week in some of the UF players' careers.

"It was tough knowing that you look around the room and a lot of people that are here aren't going to be there anymore," senior linebacker Todd McCullough said. "We just kind of circled the wagons and realized that the only people that were important were the people in the room and their families. It was a tough experience for all of us last year."

The ensuing hangover from the firing showed in the first half of the game, with the Gators entering halftime trailing, 21-7. But after the first half, the Gators rebounded, outscoring, though not defeating, the Bulldogs during the second half.

UF went on to win its final three games under Zook, but lost to Miami in the Peach Bowl. By then, however, Zook was already gone.

"Everybody was kind of down, and out last year," defensive end Jeremy Herring said. "We were thinking, 'our coach is gone, what are we playing for?' We were just out there. We gave it what we could for him."

Receiver Jemalle Cornelius said that if the Gators had an extra quarter or two, the game could've been a lot different since momentum seemed to switch at halftime.

But time ran out.

"It just seemed like everything was going in slow motion," Cornelius said. "We had a lot going on that week. A lot weighing on people's minds, and I think we were still in shock that first half."

Cornelius said a lot of players spoke about the dilemma at halftime, but he couldn't remember any specific words of encouragement.

Senior safety Jarvis Herring said the first half may have helped the Gators grow up.

"I don't even know what was

going on then. I think guys were still feeling sorry for themselves," Herring said. "Everything just started clicking. Guys started growing up from the moment. You saw the last part of the season. Everybody went [hard] from then on. I guess it was learning our lesson during the game."


Mincey said the players started getting closer after that game.

Center Mike Degory was waiting for someone to take charge in the first half, but no one did. In the second half, the whole team did.

"I don't think it was anybody," Degory said. "I think it was kind of a collective thing. Offensively, we started moving the ball well and the defense shut them out. It kind of just was looking like we were looking for that spark and we kind of got that spark."

McCullough, however, refused to use Zook's firing as an excuse for the team's poor first-half performance.

"That still gets back to blocking and tackling and all that," McCullough said. "Push that aside. You're not out there worrying what your coach is going to do during the game. Morehead returns to Gainesville

For the second time in three years, Coach Carolyn Peck is banking on Tashia Morehead's experience to help jumpstart the UF women's basketball team.

After starring at UF for two years after a successful stint at the junior college level, Morehead couldn't cut it in professional basketball.

Selected by the Washington Mystics in the third round of April's WNBA draft, the former UF forward was cut less than a month later, leaving her with unfinished business in basketball and school. Morehead decided to return to Gainesville to complete her bachelor's degree and serve as an undergraduate assistant to Peck.

"The motto is once a Gator, always a Gator," Morehead said. "I didn't have anything else to do, so I might as well contribute in any way possible."

After being drafted, she was given a chance to make it in the WNBA, playing two preseason games and logging 11 minutes against Houston and Los

Angeles.

But for Morehead, the transition was too tough, and she was waived a day after the final preseason game.

"The biggest difference between collegiate and professional would be having competition every night," said Morehead, who played against WNBA stars Chamique Holdsclaw and Sheryl Swoopes. "There's not a time where you can have an off night or cruise."

So Morehead, who averaged 9.4 points per game last season at UF, jumped at the opportunity to come back and help the Gators rebuild.

Serving as a mentor to the largest freshman class in the team's history, she expands on what Coach Carolyn Peck says in practice.

"Being that I was under Coach Peck and played under her rules and under her style of play, I'm most helpful for her freshmen," Morehead said. "This

atmosphere is something new to them. It's a comfort zone for them to have someone their age to relate to."

Peck is also hoping that Morehead can show UF's upperclassmen players how to serve as leaders.

"She is one player who had great respect from the rest of her team," Peck said. "I think that will help our seniors understand the value and the importance of what their leadership is going to mean for these freshmen."

Morehead's peers are already buying in.

"I think that's going to be a phenomenal addition to us," senior Brittany Davis said. "She's a great motivator. She's good at getting people to learn what they need to do."

But Morehead hasn't forgotten about her dreams to play pro basketball, and she plans to give the WNBA another try after she earns her college degree.

"I would try to get back, why not?" Morehead said. "I would take the same mentality in as I did last time, except now I have the experience. I'll be more prepared and I'll know what to expect."

With UF suffering from a rash of injuries that were partially to blame for its two losses this season, Meyer said the Gators needed a break.


"It's been seven weeks of straight football especially the last three with two on the road," Meyer said. "It's taken a toll on our team. We have very little depth."

Determination, hard work pay off for UF fencer

Watch out, Zorro. UF senior Leigh Schrimpf could give you a run for your money.

One of the stars of UF's fencing team, Schrimpf earned two national medals at the North American Cup Division II and III fencing tournament in Miami on Oct. 7-10.

"For someone that didn't participate in

high school athletics, she wasn't exactly accustomed to the feeling of victory.

"I've gone to a couple of [tournaments] before and I've always done really terribly," she said. "There are usually about anywhere from 80 to 90 people you're competing against, and I always finished like 60th."

The fencing team is one of the most successful sport clubs at UF. Like many other club athletes, Schrimpf and her teammates have to pay their own way to tournaments

and pay for their own equipment.

Schrimpf competes in epee, one of three fencing styles. She said she believes that most people have a misconception about the sport.

"People assume that we're like swash-bucklers and we go around hanging from the ceiling [swinging] from chandeliers," she said. "At UF, we've got a very athletic and even, at times, an acrobatic style of fencing."

Schrimpf became interested in fencing when she saw a flier looking for interested students. In high school she was known for academics, not athletics.

In fact, she had never played a sport in her life before taking up fencing.

"When she first came to UF, she was absolutely the furthest thing from an athlete that you could imagine," fencing coach Bruce Capin said. "She has worked very hard to turn herself into an athlete."

She held the lowest rating, an "E", going into the tournament, but still had to fence against some experienced competitors.

"A lot of those kids have been fencing for five, six, seven years everyday, getting lessons everyday that cost hundreds of dollars. You can't do that here," Capin said. "So for her to beat some of those people who are trained with better fencers or have a better coach is nothing short of amazing."

"It's not supposed to happen. When you experience stuff like that, that's why you coach."

Her third and sixth place finishes at the tournament earned her a C-rating, meaning that she now can enter Division I tournaments.

If she succeeds at a Division I tournament, she will be added to the national points list, which can put her on the path to the Olympics.
