



MURDER SUSPECT CAUGHT


The man who police believe brutally murdered two SFCC students was arrested Tuesday.

Police arrested 19-year-old Leo Lansing Boatman of Largo, Fla., who allegedly shot Amber Peck

and John Parker, both 26, with an AK-47 assault rifle while camping in the Ocala National Forest last week, police announced at a press conference Tuesday night.

"I had the devil in my front seat," said Joey Tierney, who went to police after realizing he crossed paths with Boatman.

"In my opinion, I believe that

20-year-old Tierney, who gave

he's a serial killer and a heinous individual," said Maj. Chris Blair of the Marion County Sheriff's Office.

Police acted on the tip from

Boatman a ride after seeing him standing on the side of the road in the forest Wednesday.

"He just looked like a nice guy. He was calm," Tierney said at the press conference.

Tierney said he regularly spots people stuck in the woods and that Boatman looked harmless in his Abercrombie & Fitch sweater.


However, Tierney saw a story on television Saturday about the murders and said he "got cold chills."

"My heart felt like it was going to stop and like I was going to faint," he said.

Boatman allegedly took a taxi from a Wal-Mart in Silver Springs

SG treasurer resigns unexpectedly

Student Body Treasurer Lindsay Cosimi, the No. 3 official in Student Government, resigned from her post Tuesday.

Senate President John Boyles read her resignation letter at Tuesday night's Student Senate meeting, which Cosimi did not attend.

"It is with great sorrow that I formally give you my resignation from my position as Student Body treasurer," Cosimi wrote in her letter. "I wish all the members of Student Government every good fortune. The people I have served with in this administration are truly honorable, and I would like to thank all for allowing me to serve with them."

Cosimi could not be reached for comment Tuesday.

Boyles said he did not know why Cosimi unexpectedly resigned, but speculated that she may be experiencing "something dramatic, something rough."

However, he later added, "She's fine."

With a concerned expression, Boyles asked all senators to keep Cosimi and her family in their thoughts. She will appear before the Senate next week to explain her actions, Boyles said.

Student Body President Joe Goldberg and Student Body Vice President Joyce Medina did not attend the meeting, either.

Goldberg will replace Cosimi as interim Student Body treasurer until next Tuesday, when senators will vote on three candidates chosen by Cosimi or Goldberg.

In a phone interview before Tuesday night's meeting, Goldberg said Cosimi's resignation was a surprise.

"You never expect something like this," he said. "I can't remember it ever happening."

UF WebMail servers crash Tuesday

Students were temporarily without UF WebMail Tuesday, after two of the service's servers fell off a delivery truck.

In response to increasing student traffic, officials have been modifying the system since Fall.

The additional servers that broke last week were reordered, but administrators thought WebMail could do without them until the weekend, said Marc Hoit, UF's interim associate provost for information technology.

At 11 a.m. Tuesday, WebMail crashed due to an overload of traffic. From 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., the two new servers were installed, bringing the service's arsenal to nine servers.

The system crashed again later Tuesday afternoon and was restored that evening. Hoit was unable to explain the second crash by press time.

In the past, students were able to automatically forward e-mails sent to their WebMail accounts to alternative clients like AOL. Last Summer, administrators disabled that option because clients flagged UF messages as spam and rejected them.

Officials have since encouraged students to use a stand-alone e-mail program, such as Outlook Express or Thunderbird, to access their WebMail to lighten the burden on UF's service.

Hoit stressed that this is strictly optional, and

Drop/add almost over

■ STUDENTS CAN CHANGE CLASSES UNTIL THURSDAY

Barely into the third day of the semester, ISIS is already jam-packed with students eager to drop a class quicker than their New Year's resolution.

The drop/add period, which ends Thursday at 11:59 p.m., is designed to give students a chance to check out potential classes and pick their favorites before committing.

But some students say the four-day period isn't nearly long enough to weed through the bad classes.

"One of my professors is going to be gone for the first week of class, so I'll have no idea what the class is like before it's way too late to drop it without being fined," student Raphael Diaz said.

Diaz, 22, transferred to UF last Fall from Miami Dade College where he said the drop/add period lasts two weeks.

"Two weeks may be too much time, but I wish I had longer than four days to decide," he said.

Other students face similar problems.

Some who have a three-hour block

Friday won't be able to attend the class before the drop/add period is over.

Assistant University Registrar Rick Ragan said the Registrar's office acknowledges this problem and does not penalize students who wish to drop a class that doesn't meet before the drop/add period ends.

"If that's the first time the course has met during the semester, typically that's understood, and they'll be able to drop it without difficulty," Ragan said.

Student senators in the past have argued to extend the drop/add period an extra day to avoid such cases.

"It has been discussed, just never put into official policy," Ragan said. "It may happen at some point. Logically, it would solve those few cases."

Jason Nanna, a telecommunications senior, said he's also experienced problems with the drop/add period.

"I was looking for this class I wanted to take, and the only time I saw it open was the last night of drop/add, so I picked it up having never been," Nanna said. "I wanted to drop it, but couldn't do so without losing my money."

He took the class and ultimately dropped it at the end of the semester.

Remaining registration start times for this semester are today, 5 p.m. to 3 a.m., and Thursday, 8 a.m. to 11:59 p.m.

Nursing receives a boost

Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida donated \$120,000 Tuesday to nursing schools at UF and the University of North Florida; both have teamed up to counter a statewide shortage of nurses.

Each school received a \$600,000 gift from the insurance company and \$420,000 from the state.

UF President Bernie Machen and UNF President John Delaney accepted the endowments at Shands Jacksonville.

"There's a tremendous nursing shortage, and we're trying to do our best to resolve that issue," Blue Cross spokesman Mark Wright said.

The nursing deficit in Florida is estimated at 34,000 nurses and expected to reach 61,000 by 2020 as baby boomers age, according to a Blue Cross press release.

Prospective students are willing to fill that hole, but there aren't enough resources to teach them.

UF's nursing program admits fewer than half of its qualified applicants due to insufficient faculty, said Tracy Brown Wright, spokeswoman for the UF College of Nursing.

UF nursing junior Abigail Plum said UF students are being tapped to solve the shortage issue.

"They're definitely putting more pressure on us to continue our education and get our Ph.D.s so that we can train more nurses," she said.

Blue Cross is one of the largest insurance providers in the state.

Hence, it has a stake in the amount of nurses that Florida schools produce. Like UNF, the company is headquartered in Jacksonville.

"If you have a sufficient supply of well-trained, well-qualified nurses, you have fewer medical errors," said Catherine Kelly, Blue Cross's vice president for public affairs in Florida.

With more nurses on the market, she added, hospitals' recruiting costs go down, as do the health care costs Blue Cross covers.

The insurance provider has coordinated with Florida schools in other ways, including promoting nursing programs to kindergartners and creating materials that solicit nursing careers to males and minorities.

UF will invest the grant in its nursing doctorate consortium. This program transmits lectures via videoconference to students at colleges throughout North Florida, greatly multiplying UF's doctoral graduates in nursing.

UNF will use its gift to build a simulation lab that will also be available to UF students at Shands Jacksonville.

Lottery leaves winners 'Lost'

■ THOUSANDS PLAY NUMBERS FROM A T.V. SHOW.

Six predestined numbers — 4, 8, 15, 16, 23, 42 — brought \$156 million to Hugo "Hurley" Reyes, a character on the ABC television show "Lost."

However, the money also brought a string of incredibly bad luck into the life of Hurley and those around him.

On Jan. 7, 1,637 Floridians played these fated numbers in hopes of millions, said Alfred Bea, communications manager at the Florida Lottery.

But if they aren't careful, they and all lottery winners could end up just like Hurley — lost.

Nearly one third of all lottery winners go bankrupt, according to the Certified Financial Planner Board of Standards Inc. Web site.

The yearly payments prove cumbersome for some winners. The People's Lottery Foundation, a company created to give loans to winners if they run out of money early, was created for this reason.

Millions still play in Florida, even though the odds of winning the lotto jackpot are 1 in 22,957,480, according to the Florida Lottery Web site.

Bea said he sees the lottery as a fair chance for everyone to win millions.

"That is the beauty and the fairness of the Florida lotto game — every combination of numbers has an equal chance of coming up," he said.

Bea said people pick numbers from random billboards or TV shows such as "Lost."

All numbers are worth trying, he said.

Suzanne Mullins, a 1993 jackpot winner from Roanoke, Va., destined to receive 20 annual payments of \$47,778.84, took out a loan in 1998 for \$197,746.15. She still owed \$154,147 in November 2004, according to The Associated Press article on the Ringle Associates Web site.

Gerald Muswagon, a Winnipeg, Canada, \$10 million winner in 1998, hung himself Oct. 2, 2004 after spending all of his

winnings in just 7 years, according to the Brandon Sun Web site.

Because most winners do not receive guidance on how to invest their money, handling the millions is more of a detriment than a help, according to the Investment News magazine Web site.

Amber Brice, an avid lottery player, "Lost" fan and college student, said her parents have played the lottery every week since she was a little girl.

"Every time I go to the gas station, if I have a spare dollar, I play it," she said.


Even though Brice knows lottery winners have problems, she said it will not stop her from playing.

"You never know when you are going to win," she said.

The most recent Florida winner, April Martin, 20, was the first resident of Okeechobee to ever win the lottery, and decided to split the \$46 million among her four siblings and parents. She also decided to take the money in 30 payments, according to a press release on the Florida Lottery Web site.

"This is going to be an amazing Christmas," April said in the press release.

Unlike Hurley from "Lost," Martin's winning numbers were 3, 4, 5, 9, 44 and 51. No word how long these numbers' luck will last for Martin.

AIDS prevention programs ineffective, study says

■ THE UF REPORT LOOKED AT 354 PROGRAMS.

A recent UF study on AIDS prevention campaigns found using scare tactics to tackle AIDS is unsuccessful.

The study, which was the largest analysis of AIDS prevention programs ever done, used information from 354 HIV prevention

programs worldwide.

It concluded that specific groups of people must be targeted for AIDS prevention campaigns to be effective. Simply telling people the dangers of AIDS has no impact on condom use, according to the study. It also found that campaigns should give people more detailed advice on condom use in realistic situations.

UF associate professor of psychology Dolores Albarracín headed a research team in the study.

risk.' That's ineffective," she said.

Albarracín said the campaigns need to be based on inducing behavioral skills so condom use becomes automatic.

"Ideally, you shouldn't do it if you're drunk, but if you do it, these are alternate courses of action to take," she said.

The study suggests that campaigns target people based on sexual orientation, gender, age, ethnicity and high-risk groups.

"You need to educate people rather than scare them," said Bailey Hancock, vice president of the UF chapter of Vox: Voices for Planned Parenthood. "If health educators actually used the study to help them better educate people, they could be much more effective."

The researchers developed a chart with how-to instructions on approaching each group for

optimal impact. Condom use increased with every demographic when the approaches were used.

Albarracín said middle schools and high schools are the best places to start successful AIDS prevention campaigns. She warned that condom use becomes particularly scarce among college students in new relationships.

"What typically happens is people start using condoms," she said. "[Then] as soon as the relationship is defined as more formal, the condoms go out the window."

Song and dance kick off King Week

The packed church also featured various singing groups and a drum performance.

The Rev. Gordon Tremaine, who presided over the event, spoke of Martin Luther King Jr.'s accomplishments.

"He could be committed to peace while remembering what it was like to be ravaged," Tremaine said.

Hanrahan urged the crowd to find a meaningful role and to exemplify King's teachings.

"It is extremely important that we try to live that and that all of us participate in the holiday and recognize the

importance of Dr. King," she said.

The keynote speaker for the King Week Kickoff Program was the Rev. Adrian S. Taylor, pastor of the Springhill Missionary Baptist Church, who focused on community mobilization.

"There are some things you can do for yourself," Taylor said. "We don't have to wait for someone else to do something for us. That wasn't Dr. King's dream. Dr. King's dream was that we would work together to help each other."

Other speakers included Pastor John Banks from the Wesley UM Church, the Rev. Milford L. Griner of the MLK Commission of Florida Inc., and City Commissioner the Rev. Jack Donovan.

Local school children and church choirs assisted in the kickoff, with performances by the Mount Moriah Baptist Church Men's Choir, a drum group from Charles W. Duval Fine Arts Academy, the Joseph Williams Elementary School Chorus and the Mount Olive AME Youth District Choir.

Spike Lee to speak at UF

Spike Lee, political film director, producer, writer and actor is scheduled to speak Feb. 1 at the Stephen C. O'Connell Center.

The event, "An Evening with Spike Lee," is sponsored by Accent, Student Government's speaker's bureau, and will kick off Black History Month. The event is free and open to the public. Doors open at 7 p.m., and the speech will begin at 8 p.m.

Accent's expenses total \$25,000 for the speech. This includes about \$4,300 for advertising and flyers, \$4,850 for travel and hotel accommodations and a \$6,000 nightly fee to rent out the O'Connell Center, according to the Accent contract.

"We chose to bring Spike Lee because we felt that it would be something different and because he is someone who has a unique perspective into life," said Evan Tyroler, Accent chairman. "We felt that he would talk about everything and anything that's on his mind."

Tyroler said Lee is not necessarily on the speaking circuit, but he does speeches often.

"We hope he will give the audience insight into his life and talk about what he's currently working on, including his new movie 'Inside Man' starring Denzel Washington and Jodie Foster," Tyroler said.

Tyroler said Accent has begun to release his name through advertisements, including a banner on an RTS bus on campus.

Many of Lee's films incorporate poverty, racial urban crime, politics and complex issues on the role of media in contemporary life.

Other considerations for speakers included Barack Obama, US senator from Illinois, Magic Johnson and Martin Luther King III.

"We feel Lee will speak about Black History Month and what it means to be African American," Tyroler said.

There will be a question-and-answer session following Lee's speech.

Brick Oven pizzeria loses lawsuit to developers

Brick Oven Pizzeria is being forced out of their Gator Plaza location, a University Corners developer said.

The restaurant, which has been serving pizza and pasta since Spring 2004, lost a lawsuit against University Corners on Tuesday, developer Frank Darabi said.

"The judge gave them 30 days to close," he said.

The developers have been negotiating with Gator Plaza tenants to end their leases or move into a planned three-block complex at University Avenue and Southwest 13th Street. Plans for the building include luxury condominiums, restaurants and stores.

"It was unfortunate," Darabi said. "I offered them good money, but they filed lawsuit against us."

The developers have reached agreements with 16 of the 18 tenants, including Burrito Brothers, which has served locals for decades.

Maui Teriyaki, the other business still negotiating with developers, is open despite dwindling parking

options.

Construction workers began demolishing the two-story parking complex behind Gator Plaza Tuesday afternoon.

The lack of parking is one of the reasons Maui Teriyaki is in the process of filing a lawsuit against University Corners, according to a complaint.

The removal of the parking lot violates their lease, which only allows for the relocation of parking areas.

Darabi said University Corners has offered Maui increasing amounts to end the lease, but the restaurant consistently asks for more.

"In the last letter I received from their lawyers, they were asking for \$500,000," Darabi said.

But the widespread chain Subway, one of the tenants that settled with developers, ended their lease for \$175,000.

Although there is no parking, customers find ways to dine at Maui Teriyaki.

"I'm doing pretty good. They park across the street," said Loida Marzke, who owns the restaurant with her husband, Steve. "People are going to support me."

into the forest Jan 3.

"He knew where he was going or where he was traveling to," said Detective Sgt. David Hopkins. "We believe he came upon them in the trail."

There, police believe he shot Peck and Parker five to seven times in total, said Capt. Tommy Bibb. Boatman allegedly tried to sink the bodies in a pond near the campsite, according to the report.

The victims' families discovered the bodies in the forest Saturday.

Police visited Boatman, who attempted to mislead them by showing them a pellet gun he said was the weapon he had taken into the forest, Bibb said.

However, police interviewed a friend of Boatman's uncle, who said he had loaned Boatman an AK-47 assault rifle during the time the murder took place, according to the report. Boatman then returned the rifle Friday.

Police also traced the purchase of the pellet gun and found it was a bought a day before the

murders, police said.

The bullet casings found where the murders took place were airlifted to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement in Jacksonville and were matched to the AK-47, Blair said.

Police do not have a clear motive but said that Boatman went

to the woods solely with the intent to kill.

Detective Sgt. David Hopkins described Boatman as a "sociopath"

during the press conference.

Boatman allegedly had a conversation with an acquaintance, indicating that he had killed someone, according to the arrest report.

The report stated Boatman allegedly said to his friend, "I wouldn't kill a bum because they would have nothing to lose. I went out there and came across two preppy kids and killed them."

Boatman has a long history of criminal offenses dating back to an arrest for arson when he was

11, according to a criminal history report from the FDLE.

His record also includes arrests for burglary, assault, carrying a concealed weapon and indecent exposure, according to the criminal report.

Boatman was arrested Tuesday in Pinellas County for possessing an illegal weapon,

but will be charged with two counts of first-degree murder, according to police.

Police said he would be transferred overnight to Marion County.

For now, the families of the victims said they are glad police have captured someone in connection with the murders.

"Our family is grateful that this killer has been caught, and now we can focus on remembering," Parker's sister Bethany Parker said.

"I think that they have done a wonderful job and we're just so happy that he's behind bars," said Peck's aunt, Norma Patterson.

Officials urge students to cut traffic by checking mail with other programs

students can theoretically rely on a souped-up WebMail for all their e-mail needs.

WebMail uses a complex system of servers to manage its high traffic flow. A "load balancer" acts as an operator and directs

e-mails to the most capable server at a given instant, Hoit said.

He described a potential method that may help to avoid crashes like Tuesday's.

The next time WebMail's traffic approaches capacity, it may convert to a mode that lets a student log in only after another student logs out, much like admission to a packed nightclub.

Mike Rollo, UF's associate vice president for student affairs, said students who want to avoid the WebMail tumult can access their UF mail from elsewhere on the Internet.

Programs such as Yahoo! Mail and Gmail are capable of retrieving messages from the WebMail server and bringing them to the user's in-box. The process is different from forwarding and does not require the user to

log on to WebMail.

For instructions on how to set up this feature, students can visit it.ufl.edu, click the "Email/Gatorlink Configuration" link in the left margin and scroll to the bottom of the screen.

"One of the things we want folks to do is to become a little more sophisticated in the ways e-mail works," Rollo said.

Flip-flop Padilla transfer hurts President's credibility

It is a long and sordid affair, but the story of Jose Padilla probably begins on May 8, 2002, when he was arrested in connection with the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks despite being perhaps the most pitifully unconvincing terrorist in recent memory.

In one noteworthy anecdote, Padilla (apparently pronounced "puh-DIL-uh" and not rhyming with "Korea," "tortilla," "Maria" or "logorrhea") quite seriously presented al-Qaeda lieutenant Abu Zubayda with "laughably inaccurate" blueprints for the construction of a nuclear warhead, mistakenly downloaded from a comedy Web site.

In June 2002, President Bush ordered that Padilla be held as an "enemy combatant" rather than a civilian terror suspect. The designation "enemy combatant" comes from the Authorization for Use of Military Force, a joint resolution passed by Congress on Sept. 17, 2001, that empowers the president to "use all necessary force against those nations, organizations, or persons he determines planned, authorized, committed or aided the terrorist attacks that occurred on September 11, 2001."

Padilla was subsequently tossed into a South Carolina military brig, held without charge and denied legal counsel.

The mouths of civil libertarians everywhere hung agape.

To summarize the administration's argument: all that the president needs to do to deprive an American citizen of all of his constitutional judicial rights is to term him a magical "enemy combatant." That process, of course, should not be subject to judicial review.

Donna Newman, who somehow managed to become Padilla's attorney despite the fact that authorities were holding him incommunicado, filed a petition for habeas corpus that eventually made its way into the hands of J. Michael Luttig and a three-judge panel for the 4th Circuit. The panel, somewhat unsurprisingly, denied the petition, agreeing fully with the administration's opinion.

But the story didn't end there.

Members of the Bush administration must have realized that if they ever had to justify the Padilla detention to the Supreme Court, the odds would be stacked against them. So when the appeal was kicked up to the high court, Attorney General Alberto Gonzalez announced that Padilla would no longer be held in connection with the Sept. 11 attacks and so could be transferred back to civilian custody.

Which prompted the question: Why had Padilla been locked away for so long in the first place?

A 4th Circuit panel, headed again by the once-lenient Luttig, wrote a scathing opinion denying the transfer and scolding the Bush administration for its shifting tactics. In a 5-4 decision, the Supreme Court eventually overruled the panel, okaying Padilla's transfer.

By rendering Padilla's pending Supreme Court case irrelevant, the transfer decreases the probability that the Supreme Court will ever decide whether the executive branch had the authority to hold Padilla in military custody for over three years. But the move comes at a cost.

Now even hard-line Bush stalwarts and far-right conservative politicians must reevaluate their steadfast confidence in the discretion of an imperial presidency.

Once again, this administration's credibility is at stake.

It is a thrilling narrative, made all the more so by the potential erosion of our own civil liberties and the mounting power of a pre-Orwellian state.

But for now, we can only watch, wait and hope that this administration learns the error of its ways before our Constitution is irrevocably spoiled.

Charges signal trouble for Congress

Last Wednesday's front-page picture of Jack Abramoff in *The New York Times* depicted a man who could have come straight out of "The Godfather." The grim facial expression, black trench coat and throwback-to-the-forties fedora are clear illustrations of the prominent Republican lobbyist's famously flamboyant personality.

But this particular getup of Abramoff's isn't such a big fashion faux pas as it may seem. The gangster image his clothing portrays happens to be remarkably consistent with the shady situation in which he currently finds himself. Abramoff pleaded guilty several days ago to charges of conspiracy, fraud and tax evasion. He also admitted to providing favors in the form of golf trips, sports tickets and monetary campaign contributions to lawmakers in Congress in return for special treatment for himself and his clients. The scandal was instantly threatening to a staggering number of power brokers in Washington — particularly Republicans — because so many of them negotiated and interacted with Abramoff in the past.

As Abramoff increasingly becomes a political liability, a disturbing number of politicians are showing signs of nervousness. Republican Speaker of the House Dennis Hastert has distanced himself from the lobbyist by donating \$69,000 worth of Abramoff's campaign contributions to charity. President Bush has done the same with \$2,000 of similar contributions from Abramoff. Rep. Tom DeLay of Texas now faces an even more uphill battle due to his close alliance with the lobbyist in the past. Other politicians who have been implicated include Republican Rep. Bob Ney, of Ohio, conservative strategist Grover Norquist and Georgia candidate for Lt. Gov., Ralph Reed. The charges have been even more far-reaching: David Safavian,

former head of the White House Procurement Office, has been arrested in the course of the investigation, and even Karl Rove has been linked to dealings with Abramoff.

In a statement that harkened back to Nixon's pledge to get to the bottom of the Watergate break-in, White House spokesman Scott McClellan condemned Abramoff's actions, calling them "unacceptable and outrageous," even as a number of President Bush's close aides and colleagues face implications of criminal wrongdoings, as do several Democratic leaders. Democrats, nonetheless, have been quick to jump on the scandal as indicative of what they call the Republican "culture of corruption," and are expected to make this a main pillar of their campaign in the 2006 midterm elections.

Perhaps the Democrats are right about the "culture of corruption." But if charges against Democratic leaders as well as Republicans are true, perhaps it is also a culture of hypocrisy and a culture of cover-ups. The values we all officially champion — integrity, honesty, responsibility — seem to be largely absent from Washington today. While I am very glad the Abramoff corruption charges are being uncovered at all, it is disheartening that politicians seem to be pinning all the blame on the lobbyists when the guilt may in fact also rest with many of their own ranks.

It is a rare occasion indeed when I agree with something Newt Gingrich says, but his statement a few days ago regarding the scandal was truly on target: "You can't have a corrupt lobbyist unless you also have a corrupt member and a corrupt staff."

Committee forms to fix campus one step at a time

After reading Student Body Treasurer Lindsay Cosimi's resignation letter, Student Senate President John Boyles announced the creation of a temporary Campus Improvement Committee

Previously, senators who changed their majors were obliged to resign according to the Student Senate statutes.

Goldberg said he thinks Cosimi was the best treasurer he had ever seen.

"She cares tremendously about the student body," he said. "She has worked extremely hard."

Medina refused to comment on Cosimi's departure Tuesday night.

Cosimi's departure means senators must work alongside a new treasurer at a critical time.

Organizational hearings, in which the approximately 400 UF student organizations receive their budgets for the coming year, will take place mid-semester.

Budget & Appropriations Committee Chairman Ryan Moseley said he is nervous about successfully running SG finances without Cosimi's guidance.

"It's definitely going to be tough," Moseley said.

Former Student Body Treasurer Dennis

Ngin, Cosimi's predecessor, said at this point in his term a year ago, he was working with student organizations to formulate their budgets for the upcoming year.

However, Student Sen. Laura Gonzalez said she thinks the transition will be smooth.

"I don't think Lindsay is going to recommend anyone who she doesn't think will make a smooth transition," noting it will probably be someone with budgeting experience.

"Knowing Lindsay personally, I know this had to be a decision that she did not take lightly," Gonzalez added.

Sen. Allison Cullin said she does not know who has enough experience to replace Cosimi.

"All the [positions dealing with finances] are a little more high stress," Cullin said. "I think she is a lovely lady, very well-dressed. I won't miss being mistaken for her," she said, pointing out they are both blonde.


During her SG tenure, Cosimi helped create the Museum Nights program and the popular New York Times/USA Today Readership Program. She has been active in SG since Summer 2002.





New Orleans begins reconstruction with big plans

NEW ORLEANS - This city is dreaming big as it puts together a blueprint for its rebirth in Hurricane Katrina wake, considering such audacious ideas as recreating a long-gone jazz district, building a network of bike paths and commuter rail lines, and establishing a topflight school system.

In the coming days, beginning Wednesday, a commission appointed by Mayor Ray Nagin will unveil a grab bag of ideas that could become part of the master plan for rebuilding the devastated city, a

task unparalleled in American history.

Committees and subcommittees of the Bring New Orleans Back Commission were invited to think big, with little regard for the price tag. That will be dealt with later, when New Orleans and other parts of the Gulf Coast divvy up the \$29 billion in federal aid designated for hurricane recovery and reconstruction.

"This isn't about us asking for \$1 billion to build three more Superdomes and five more airports," said Michael Arata, chairman of a subcommittee that looked at rebuilding the city's film and music industries.

"These are projects by real New Orleanians that will have real benefit and affect the lives of the people of New Orleans."

He added, "This process allowed people to kind of speak their dreams, give words to their greatest concepts and greatest hopes for this city."

At the heart of the proposals is one critical, and controversial, recommendation: All parts of the city — even the devastated Lower Ninth Ward and other neighborhoods that were submerged to their rooftops — should be given a chance to rebuild.

The Urban Land Institute caused a stir

late last year when it issued a report urging the city to put its resources into rebuilding non-flooded areas. The institute warned that if New Orleans tried to rebuild everything, the city would be condemned to a slow, patchwork recovery.

Foremost will be proposals to fix and improve the city's defenses against floods and restore environmental features such as barrier islands and wetlands that act as buffers against the Gulf of Mexico, said Doug Meffert, a Tulane University coastal researcher who worked on the recommendations.

Deportation sparks debate

MIAMI - The US government's decision this week to quickly deport 15 Cubans whose boat reached an abandoned bridge in the Florida Keys left many Cuban Americans in Miami frustrated with a Republican administration they have long supported.

Coming on the heels of more stringent deportation policies for Cuban migrants and amid a wave of GOP calls for tighter immigration enforcement, some community leaders wondered whether Monday's deportation will cost the party support among one of its staunchest bases.

"This will have an effect of reducing the numbers of Cuban-American voters that would blindly follow a Republican candidate," Cuban American National Foundation president Francisco "Pepe" Hernandez said. "Cubans are going to realize that both parties come when they need us but tend to forget our pledges when they don't."

The migrants were returned Monday after the government concluded that the partially collapsed bridge they landed on, which no longer connects to any of the Keys, did not count as dry land.

Under the current "wet-foot, dry-foot" policy, Cubans who reach US soil are allowed to remain in the United States; those stopped at sea are sent home.

On Tuesday, many Cuban Americans expressed anger at the group's swift deportation.

"It was a total abuse, how all these Cubans were treated. They landed on our territory only so that we can send them back to hell," said

Armando de Cristo, 66, a Miami city employee who fled Cuba 30 years ago.

Republicans have enjoyed solid Cuban American support as far back as the Kennedy administration, which many exiles blamed for the failure of the Bay of Pigs. That support solidified after the Clinton administration's decision to seize Elian Gonzalez.

Elian, now 11, set off a seven-month custody battle after he was rescued off the Florida coast in 1999 during a failed attempt to reach the United States. His mother died at sea, and his Miami relatives and Cuban exile groups fought to prevent his return to Cuba. He was reunited with his father in Cuba after an armed federal raid April 22, 2000, on his relatives' home.


Florida Congressional representatives Ileana Ros-Lehtinen, Lincoln Diaz-Balart and Mario Diaz-Balart, all Cuban American Republicans, urged the White House on Tuesday to support a review of the policy.

Sen. Mel Martinez, R-Fla., went a step further, calling for a broader overhaul of the US-Cuba immigration policy.

"The policy is wrong and it ought to be changed. It's unilaterally violated by Cuba, while we observe the most painful part of it," he said, referring to the repatriation of those stopped at sea.

But the issue has become thorny for Republican politicians, as the party has become increasingly split over immigration, said Damian Fernandez, director of Florida International University's Cuban Research Institute in Miami.

In recent years, the wet-dry policy has become more stringent, and the number of Cubans attempting to immigrate has continued to rise, Fernandez said.

LaPorta, O'Day receive honors; UF ranked No. 3

STAFF REPORT

Preseason accolades continue to pour in for the UF baseball team.

First baseman Matt LaPorta and relief pitcher Darren O'Day were each named to the Louisville Slugger Preseason All-America Team, produced by Collegiate Baseball newspaper.

LaPorta was named to the first team and

O'Day made the third team.

LaPorta and Adam Davis also have been named to a trio of other preseason All-America squads, and the Gators rank No. 3 in Baseball America's Preseason Poll.

LaPorta, a junior, was the Southeastern Conference Player of the Year last season while leading the Gators in batting average (.328), home runs (26) and RBI (79).

O'Day, a senior, finished the season with a

team-low 2.87 ERA en route to an 8-3 record.

UF opens its season at McKethan Stadium with a three-game series against Cincinnati on Feb. 10.

TENNIS TWO-STEP: Both the UF men's and women's tennis teams are No. 2 in preseason polls.

The men were runners-up in the File Collegiate Tennis Rankings released Tuesday

by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association—the highest UF has ever been ranked in the ITA's preseason poll.

Sophomore Diana Srebrovic led the women as the No. 1 singles player in the country, according to the poll.

Srebrovic is the fourth UF women's player to earn the ranking since 2002.

Noah plays pretty

■ SOPHOMORE FORWARD LEADS GATORS FAST-BREAKING ATTACK.

Maybe it's the hair.
Maybe it's his enthusiasm and interactions with the crowd.
Or maybe it's his hustle and endless determination.

Any way you slice it, Joakim Noah has been hearing it from opposing fans this season.

The crowd at Stegeman Coliseum in Georgia was particularly brutal during the Gators' win on Saturday.

"The whole crowd chanted, 'You're so ugly,'" Noah said. "I think I missed a couple of free throws because I had to get back on track."

Noah told his girlfriend later about what the crowd had been saying about him.

What did she have to say in response?

"She said I was the prettiest thing that ever happened to the Florida Gators," Noah said.

But the last time the Gators squared off against Mississippi State in the regular season, Noah was far from pretty.

In fact, it's a game that Noah would likely prefer to forget.

Not only did the Gators end up on the wrong end of a 71-57 score in Starkville that night, but Noah found himself overmatched by a monstrous Bulldogs frontcourt.

"He, individually, last year at Mississippi State, allowed [them] to set a shot-blocking record for their school," UF coach Billy Donovan said. "They had 13 blocked shots, and 10 of them were from him."

Seven of those blocks came from a departed 7-foot monster by the name of Marcus Campbell, who also poured in 13 points and grabbed 11 boards in the game.

"It was tough, I wish [Campbell] was back," Noah said. "He dunked on me; I've been hearing about it all week. I'm ready to play though. I'm really ready to go, and they have to play us in our house."

And the Bulldogs will be entering the Gators house tonight, as they take on UF in the O'Connell Center.

That dreary night in Mississippi now seems like an eternity ago for Noah.

He was pressed into service in that game last year after starting center Al Horford and backup Chris Richard fell into early foul trouble. But this year as a starter, he has flourished, averaging 12.6 points and 5.5 rebounds a night.

While his teammates might not know exactly when they noticed his improvement, they know what he is capable of.

"I don't know if there is one particular moment that I can pin my finger on," junior guard Lee Humphrey said. "But over the summer when we were playing pick-up, he definitely looked

He injured the hamstring during practice for the All-American Bowl, yet still dazzled fans with 50-yard throws at the game on Saturday.


Hurting or healthy, he's still on campus.

Meyer searches for stability at linebacker

Urban Meyer realized the Gators had depth issues at the linebacker position when he converted fullback Billy Latsko to the position last summer.

He realized the Gators had a huge problem at the linebacker position when Latsko then became the second string outside linebacker for much of the season.

With National Signing Day about three weeks away, UF

will look to address their needs at linebacker with this season's recruiting class.

The Gators have already received a trio of verbal commitments at the position in Dustin Doe, Brandon Spikes and junior college transfer Larry Grant.

Grant, a five-star prospect out of City College of San Francisco, could immediately challenge for a starting role.

"I don't think you bring in a junior college player unless you think he is immediately going to hit the two-deep, plain

and simple," said Scout.com recruiting analyst Scott Kennedy. "I think they expect him to come in and play and play early."

At 6-foot-3, 225 pounds, Grant certainly has the size to play the position, but he is also one of the fastest linebackers in the country, running the 40-yard dash in 4.45 seconds.

While some analysts believe Spikes grades out to be a defensive end on the collegiate level as a result of his 6-foot-5, 235-pound frame, Kennedy disagrees.

"Normally, I would see a guy the size of Brandon Spikes and say he's definitely playing

good, and I thought he was going to be very good because he's so talented for his size. He's got great hands. He runs the floor so well, and I think that's probably his biggest asset."

Noah's ability to effectively run the floor at 6-foot-11 led Donovan to compare him to one of the best col-

legiate big men in recent memory.

"One guy that comes to mind, and I don't think he's as good as he was in college, is Marcus Camby," Donovan said. "I thought Camby was a great runner in transition and could really get out."

Noah's speed and high energy level lead him to tire more easily than most of his counterparts, a fact that both he and Donovan acknowledge.

"The biggest thing with Jo that makes him an effective runner is he runs and plays to complete exhaustion," Donovan said. "There are times I look at him and I think, 'How can that guy be that tired?'"

Add Noah's motor to the speed of his teammates, and UF's supposed scoring deficit resulting from the departures of Matt Walsh, David Lee and Anthony Roberson has been more than filled by a much more up-

tempo style of play.

"I think that this year, with Taurean Green orchestrating the game, he plays with that tempo, and he's going to play to the tempo that fits everyone's style," Noah said. "Coach told us before the season even started that this is going to be a ping-pong game."

That ping-pong game was on full display against Georgia last weekend, as the Gators scored 90 points

after putting up just 50 in their trip to Athens the previous season, despite Roberson, Walsh and Lee accounting for 41 of those 50 points.

Now, Noah has replaced Walsh as the one who has to incur the wrath of opposing fans.

But Noah isn't ready to fully accept Walsh's role of SEC's most-hated.

"I don't know about all that," Noah said. "Matt got it pretty bad."

"Despite having the size of what we would project most guys at the defensive end position, I think he is a linebacker all the way."

The Gators will likely look to A.J. Jones from Tampa's Middleton High to round out the linebacker position.

While small for his position at just 190 pounds, Jones is a very instinctive linebacker.

He ranks 14th in the nation at the position, according to Scout.com.

Jones will make his college decision on Jan. 18 on Fox Sports South's "Countdown to Signing Day."

"I think they are real good with A.J. Jones," Kennedy said. "I don't think there are too many spots left open, and I would expect one of those spots to be filled by A.J. Jones."
