



# Moseley wins, completes Swamp ticket

It was deja vu all over again for ecstatic supporters of Student Government's newest leaders, as the Swamp Party's Student Body treasurer candidate Ryan Moseley blew his remaining competition out of the water early this morning.

Moseley, who faced Unite Party candidate Lola Bovell in a runoff race for SG's No. 3 office, garnered 57.5 percent of the vote in an election with a relatively low turnout of 4,607 voters.

His opponent garnered 41.2 percent of the vote.

Swamp's other executive candidates, John Boyles and Lydia Washington, won the respective offices of Student Body president and vice president during last week's general election.

About 10,000 students cast

ballots in that race.

The general election also determined about half the members of Student Senate.

SG's newly elected officials will control nearly \$12 million in student money.

"I am excited, impassioned and ready to go," Moseley said after his victory. "I am very surprised."

Nearly 200 Swamp and Unite supporters turned out to the Reitz Union's Orange & Brew on Wednesday night, where SG Supervisor of Elections Erika Kane announced the winner just past midnight.

This week's runoff was forced when neither Moseley nor Bovell secured 50 percent of the vote during the general election. Independent treasurer candidate Susan Henriques, who received 22 percent of the vote, hampered their efforts.

Although last week's totals were not enough to win him the treasurer office, Moseley came

# Sex plays seek the grades

Clad in a miniskirt and a mesh top, a chemistry student waltzed into Kenneth Merz's office at the end of finals week.

Merz, then at Pennsylvania State University, wondered if her intentions were to use her feminine wiles to get a better grade.

Merz, now a UF chemistry professor, rushed to his office door, avoiding a potentially incriminating — or awkward — situation.

The college cliché of women using their assets to improve their grades might just be true. And, if Merz had succumbed to mesh and mini, his university would have allowed it — with a frown.

UF, like Penn State, allows relationships between faculty and students, but they are strongly discouraged, according to the UF General Counsel Web site and the Penn State staff handbook.

The General Counsel Web site lists the only requirement: If a conflict of interests arises, there must be a "resolution."

UF Provost Janie Fouke said that if a pro-

fessor had an amorous or sexual relationship with a student, he or she would be using "extremely poor judgment."

"If our policies allow it, I would think they need to be reviewed," Fouke said.

Merz, whose experience at Penn State happened 10 to 12 years ago, said that even though the student was not wearing the correct attire, the situation remains apocryphal.

"So much of it is a he-said, she-said type of situation," Merz said.

In the past, student-teacher relationships were commonplace, said Larry Schnell, a UF journalism professor.

"When I was in school, it happened all the time," he said. "We didn't think the same in the '70s. We have totally different standards now."

About 25 years ago, David Denslow, a UF economics professor, received a rare solici-

# Photos protest abortion

University Police guarded the Plaza of the Americas today and Wednesday as UF's Pro-Life Alliance and The Center for Bio-Ethical Reform members displayed gory photos of an aborted fetuses and genocide.

The photos were meant to show and explain abortion and equate it to genocide, which is defined as the deliberate and systematic destruction of a racial, political or cultural group. The display created a controversy among UF students.

The police asked some protesters, who opposed the display by holding a tarp over the photos, to leave the area. Before that, a man read dead baby jokes to passersby.

Michael Schrimsher, regional director

for the center, said that although the protesters have a right to freedom of speech, they are not permitted to exercise their rights within the zone of the Center for Bio-Ethical Reform's display.

"Only pictures can adequately show the truth," he said. "We want people to see what it's like to make a bad decision."

**On Campus** The Center for Bio-Ethical Reform brought the project to UF in 1999 and has more recently flown banners above the campus and driven trucks displaying pictures of a 10-week abortion.

Latrice Hankerson, a women's studies junior, was shocked when she stepped up to the fence to see the photos.

"These pictures give me nightmares,"





# Kennedy Jr. criticizes media for ignoring environment

The media is not doing its job in educating the public on critical environmental issues, Robert F. Kennedy, Jr. said at the Phillips Center for the Performing Arts on Tuesday.

"We have an indolent and negligent press that has simply let down the democracy," said Kennedy, a noted environmental lawyer, radio host and New York Times best-selling author.

In his speech, titled "Our Environmental Destiny," Kennedy told a crowd of about

1,200 that there is no such thing as a liberal media in the U.S., only a capitalist media run by large, multinational corporations.

"Most Americans know more about Brad and Jen than they do about global warming," he said.

Kennedy emphasized that environmental issues are not partisan issues, and that Democrats and Republicans generally have the same core values.

"There's nothing radical about the idea of clean air and clean water for our children," he said.

Laurie David, environmental activist and wife of "Seinfeld" creator Larry David,

introduced Kennedy in a speech about the future implications of global warming.

"Hurricane Katrina is just a glimpse of what's to come," David said.

After the show, the crowd moved to the Phillips Center lobby for a book signing in which Kennedy signed copies of his newly released New York Times best-seller, "Crimes Against Nature."

The event was part of the kickoff for the Levin College of Law's 12th annual Public

Interest Environmental Conference and cost about \$15,000, said Nicole Trueblood, vice chairwoman of promotions for Accent, Student Government's speaker's bureau.

"It's amazing that we actually are able to bring a Kennedy to the University of Florida," Trueblood said.

The event was sponsored by Accent and the Levin College of Law.

Fourth-year environmental engineering major Mike Friedlander said he came to the speech to learn more about environmental issues.

"I hope his words and his method are momentum for change," Friedlander said.

# Flamenco dancers bring Spanish folk dancing to UF

With every twirl of her fingers and each colorful spin, Tamara Millar clapped her hands, clanked her heels and danced to the strum of a guitar.

Millar, 37, was one of three flamenco dancers from the Flamenco del Sol Dance Company, the group that entertained about 100 people Wednesday night in the auditorium at UF's College of Public Health and Health Professions.

Vuestra Alianza Española, or VALE, a UF-sponsored club, spent about \$900 to put on the second annual show, and President Desiree Zerquera, 23, said it was well worth it.

VALE is UF's only club that focuses on Spanish culture strictly related to Spain.

Flamenco is a traditional gypsy dance of Andalusia, Spain, and is believed to have originated in India. It is considered the most-developed folk dance anywhere, Millar said.

A dancer, teacher and choreogra-

pher for more than 20 years, Millar and her husband are co-directors of the dance group. Although she said they spend most of their time on the road, they love every minute of it. She said flamenco is very rich in Arabic roots and is her "favorite thing in the whole world."

Her flashing smile on stage put sentiment into action.

The audience seemed just as pleased as they cheered on Millar, the other dancers and guitarist with shouting and clapping. Several students in the crowd even joined the dancers on stage at the end of the performance.

With about 140 active members, VALE provides students with unique opportunities, such as trips to St. Augustine, which has a history of Spanish colonization, Zerquera said.

Rhonda Umbrecht, a UF graduate now employed by UF's College of Business, found out about Wednesday's event through friends in the organization.

"I thought it was a great illustration of Spanish culture," she said. "The girls were lovely."

## Sustainability strategies key to making UF a Top 10

Leadership in sustainability could give UF the edge it needs to be a Top 10 public university.

Sustainability, the movement to use resources efficiently, aims to break the linear "take-make-waste cycle" our society has perfected, said Dedee DeLongpre, the director of the Office of Sustainability.

"Sustainability gives us another lens through which to look at leadership," DeLongpre said. "It is the ultimate leader-

ship."

Since taking office in 2004, UF President Bernie Machen has made sustainability and fostering a greener campus his priorities by creating DeLongpre's position.

DeLongpre hosted an open-ended discussion Wednesday with members of the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, the UF Physical Plant Division and experts in the field of biological sciences to brainstorm ideas and plan a two-day sustainability conference.

She said the October conference, which UF will host, hopes to inspire other Florida universities to initiate research in the field of

sustainability by celebrating UF's explosive research and education in the field.

DeLongpre envisions a future in which UF officials integrate sustainability education into the university's undergraduate curriculum.

One way administrators plan to do this is by creating a Faculty Fellow in Sustainability.

UF Provost Janie Fouke is currently seeking an existing faculty member to be the fellow.

DeLongpre said Machen discussed the university's achievements and progress in sustainability at the 2005 conference. DeLongpre began in her position last month.

She asked for suggestions and feedback about this year's conference as she zipped through a slideshow that mapped out the conference's planning process.

The conference will be Oct. 25 and 26, kicking off National Campus Sustainability Day.

out on top during that race as well with 4,400 votes.

Due to concerns with technical accuracy, the results of this Spring's election have yet to be validated, but Moseley said he is looking forward to accomplishing the goals set forth on Swamp's platform.

"It's what turns me on. It's my passion," he said. "I think this \$12 million is one of the best ways students get to see services from the University of Florida."

Moseley, now a student senator, is chairman of the Budget and Appropriations Committee. He will begin his duties as Student Body treasurer in May, facing a projected SG deficit of about \$309,000 and dwindling reserve

funds.

However, with his experience as budget committee chairman, Moseley said he is prepared to take on the task.

Though she did not leave the Orange & Brew a winner this morning, Bovell comforted her supporters outside the restaurant.

"It's OK. It's OK," Bovell said, while hugging Davier Rodriguez, a close friend who burst into tears as

he heard the results.

"Lola has put her heart and her soul into this," he said before the results were announced. "She has a passion that is beyond words — passion for what she wants to accomplish."

Other supporters hugged Bovell and chanted, "We love Lola," while Moseley supporters broke into a rendition of Swamp's theme song.

"We want the Swamp," they

chanted.

Student Body President-elect Boyles, meanwhile, hugged Moseley after his victory and said he is excited for the upcoming year.

"I think he's going to do an absolutely amazing job," Boyles said Wednesday afternoon, adding with a cheeky grin, "I'm glad that the Swamp family is united."

she said. "It's obnoxious, it's upsetting, and it's so sickening. It's an invasion of my mind."

Hankerson is pregnant and is choosing to keep her baby. She believes that women have the right to decide if they want an abortion.

"I don't think it's murder, but it's not something I could emotionally do," she said. "I couldn't live with myself. I would always wonder who that baby was."

Sara Hanson, president of UF organization Vox: Voices for Planned Parenthood, said she felt the display was an inaccurate scare tactic used to sway the abortion opinions of ignorant students.

"I think it's bullshit," she said. "Frankly, they have all kinds of lies in the photos and in the pamphlets."

She said the organization was instructed by the Planned

Parenthood Federation of America to have no engagement with the Genocide Awareness Project, because the nature of the display could lead to heated debate and violence.

In response to the project, a meeting and movie will be held tonight in the Reitz Union for members of Voices for Planned Parenthood and those interested in hearing the other side of argument to vent about what they saw and heard Wednesday and today.

Aleksandra Lewandowski, 21, a member of Pro-Life Alliance at UF, will not attend the meeting because she believes in what the Genocide Awareness Project stands for.

"Murder is murder," she said. "If people realize that a baby is a human, they might not be so nonchalant about killing it."

However, campus Rabbi Jonathan Siger believes that comparing genocide to abortion is a false analogy.

"Last time I checked," he said. "There is not a great fetus civilization or race of fetuses."

tion. A student walked into his office and asked him if he knew of anyone who could photograph her for a medical textbook.

Denslow said this was the most overt and only directly sexual come-on he has ever received for a better grade.

Schnell said the problem with a student-teacher relationship is that it presents a conflict of interest. The professor would have to abstain from evaluating that person in order for the relationship to continue, he said. As long as there is any real involvement in a close relationship, the teacher should not instruct the student, he said.

However, some students do not take no for an answer.

"I'll do anything — anything," a student said.

David Leverenz, an English professor at UF, recalled a retired colleague's risqué story of a female student trying to use her sexuality to get a better grade.

The story shocked Leverenz when he heard it, but he recalled the "faculty flasher" when he was at Rutgers University and quickly changed his mind. The student at Rutgers used to run across the quad and flash faculty for fun.

**Special Report** Leverenz said no instances of sexual innuendo have happened to him because of how he approaches his students.

"It's all about setting boundaries," Leverenz said.

Even with set boundaries, the relationship can still be ambiguous.

A student, who wished to remain anonymous, already had an A in her class — and a relationship with her instructor. She said it was just a one-time thing.

"It was just a thing, and then it happened," she said. "I knew better than to pursue anything. It was just one crazy night."

She added that if she had another good-looking instructor that she met outside of class, she might do it again.

Because most professors agree dating one of their students would make it harder to objectively evaluate them, Web sites such as [www.rateyourprofessors.com](http://www.rateyourprofessors.com) present an entirely new side of student evaluation toward their teachers.

The site is designed to evaluate a professor or teaching assistant's teaching and grading ability, but comments sometimes sneak into the steamy side. The chili-pepper icon on the Web site signifies that a teacher is "hot." This direct innuendo could be simply due to the quality of teaching or how the instructor looks.

Prabhu Venkataraman, a TA who has a "hot" rating on the Web site, said the scale is measured by the vibe a teacher gives off. Venkataraman said a student tried to bribe him with money, and he hopes that he did not give off that vibe.

"Students are pretty good at reading their professors," he said.

However, Matthew Blake, a UF journalism professor who received an average rating on the Web site, said the authority figure versus pupil presents an unusual relationship.

"Sometimes it is difficult to tell if it's flirting or if they are just being friendly," Blake said.

# Dad accused of baby's death

A homeless man is accused of killing his 7-week-old infant by giving her an overdose of Children's Benadryl and suffocating her with blankets on Tuesday, according to a Gainesville Police report.

Lee Sukhoi Harris, 32, was living in St. Francis House with his wife when he gave his daughter, Kadena, four doses of 1.5 milliliters of Children's Benadryl and a 0.625 milliliter dose of Infants' Motrin.

Kadena's mother, 27-year-old Christine Harris, screamed for help when she realized that Kadena was not breathing, said Kent Vann, executive director of St. Francis House.

"Someone tried to resuscitate the baby before they went to the hospital but had no luck," Vann said.

Infants are especially sensitive to the effects of antihistamines, and the drug should not be used on newborns, according to Rxlist.com

Harris told police he gave Kadena the medication because she was upset and he wanted to get some sleep, according to the report. Harris also said he folded three baby blankets four times and put them over Kadena's face to muffle her cries, according to the report.

Vann said Harris and his wife started living in St. Francis House in January while Christine was pregnant.

It is the first time an infant has died in St. Francis House, Vann said.

"We never had a problem with [Harris]," he said. "We've never even had to call the police."

Harris was charged with child abuse and is being held on \$250,000 bond at the Alachua County Jail.

The College Republicans use the acronym PETA as a way of showing students it's OK to eat meat. The national organization PETA, on the other hand, opposes the use of animals for human purposes.


However, members said they're not out to mock the real PETA, but to show appreciation for meat.

### Legislature ponders bill removing UF funding

It seems like every day we hear more bad news for UF's financial situation.

The poor just keep getting poorer.

This time, a bill before the state Legislature, if passed into law, could significantly hamper UF's ability to garner funds.

Currently, the state matches private donations above \$100,000 by a certain percentage. The greater the donation, the greater the percentage the state provides, and donations of \$2 million or more are matched dollar for dollar.

The bill in question removes the requirement from the state to match private donations. Specifically, the bill will replace the word "must" with the word "may," as in: The state may match private funds if it feels like it.

The bill is doubly bad for the already financially strained university. Most obviously, it has the potential to directly cut state funding. But there are subtler forces at work here as well.

The current matching-funds guarantee by the state serves as a powerful tool to encourage patrons to donate greater sums to the university. As Chris Brazda, spokesman for the UF Foundation, said, "If you're a donor, you want to see your donation go as far as it can. Doubling your money is pretty attractive."

Especially when you're trying to get buildings named after you.

Without assured matching funds from the state, the expected benefits from donating drop off sharply. That's a bad thing.

Maybe the state will continue to match the funds for some time in the future, regardless of the change. But even if it does, there will be some small doubt in patrons' minds that deters them from donating as much.

And right now, that's a doubt we can't afford to let them have.

## Moseley Victorious

The voters have spoken. On Wednesday night, we got the announcement that Ryan Moseley will become the next Student Government treasurer.

But while voters were confident in the Swamp Party candidate's abilities, we still have our misgivings.

It wasn't so long ago that Moseley oversaw the organizational budgeting process that seemed perpetually doomed to fail. Twice he presented the budget to the Student Senate, and twice it was flawed. The third time, Moseley accidentally distributed the wrong budget.

Call us old fashioned, but we expect more from our SG officials. Bungled budgets are serious problems for someone seeking to control the purse strings for SG's \$12 million in funds.

Even though Stan

Beckerdite and SG Finance eventually took the blame for the errors, Moseley should have exercised his discretion and at least taken the time to look over their numbers.

We hope that he'll take care to be more judicious and responsible as treasurer than he was as budget chairman.

The treasurer position has been plagued by mismanagement, and we're seriously concerned about the possibility of more off-campus private pig roasts making it through SG's funding process.

But the most important thing Moseley can do is to avoid becoming a rubber stamp for his party's agenda. The fact that his party will be in power doesn't release him from his responsibilities to the student body.

That's something that every SG politician should keep in mind.

# Anti-abortion activists need to get their facts straight first

The CBR claims that abortion is "universally available" and that "abortion is legal through all nine months of pregnancy in all 50 states."

Oh, really?

Actually, abortion in America is only allowed up to the 24th week of pregnancy, and several states all over the nation have passed laws that restrict it to much earlier than that.

Over 1,300 anti-choice measures were considered in state legislatures in the past two years alone. In fact, just a few days ago the governor of South Dakota signed into law a nearly complete ban on all abortions, including women who have been victims of sexual violence such as rape or incest.

Fully 87 percent of counties in America do not have an abortion provider at all.

Not only is abortion not universally available, its availability is more threatened now than it has ever been since the 1973 Roe v. Wade decision that made abortion legal.

Legality becomes irrelevant when so many women nationwide don't have access to abortion services at all.

The CBR's pamphlet goes on to vilify and castigate women who have exercised

their legal right to choose abortion.

Of women who opt for an abortion procedure, rather than carrying an unplanned pregnancy to term and giving up the baby for adoption, the pamphlet says their "narcissism [is] shameful beyond imagining."

The pamphlet also claims that women who receive abortions are so "ashamed of their conduct" and "desperate ... for anonymity" that they hide their faces when entering and leaving facilities that give abortions.

I would argue that this is more to shield themselves from the rabid and insensitive onslaught of anti-choice protestors they are likely to encounter, who hurl accusations and epithets instead of the reassurance and assistance they promise.

The reality is that abortion is an extremely contentious topic; the views on both sides of this debate are heated and passionate. Usually, those who have strong beliefs about abortion are stuck on those beliefs, unwilling to budge — and that's OK.

However, for those of you who may be on the fence, don't allow the propagandist

display to be the only thing that shapes your views on abortion.

Have the presence of mind to see the other side and to get all the information before you decide where you stand.

Vox: Voices for Planned Parenthood, UF's resident pro-choice organization, will be holding a meeting Thursday in Reitz Union Room 355 at 7:00 p.m.

We will be discussing the pro-choice side of the debate, the GAP display, its implications and our response.

I encourage all of you who may not have a clear idea of what you believe about abortion to attend.

We support a woman's right to choose, but we also believe in prevention.

We support comprehensive sex education, responsible sexual behavior and widespread contraceptive access.

Don't let the Genocide Awareness Project display be the last word you ever hear on the debate surrounding abortion. Take this opportunity to hear both sides of the story.






# Activists threaten faculty expression, officials say

## ■ SOME SAY THAT ACADEMIC FREEDOM IS IN DANGER.

A powerful wave of American religious conservatism is threatening professors' freedom of expression, officials from three state universities agreed at a Wednesday forum at UF's Emerson Alumni Hall.

"Academic freedom" is an ambiguous term — conservatives use it to describe a student's right to challenge professors' liberal views, while academics say it protects their own rights to expression.

Hudson Rogers, associate provost at Florida Gulf Coast University, offered a concise definition.

"It is an understanding that creativity and openness of inquiry are best allowed to grow in an atmosphere of low supervision," he said.

Florida State University Provost Lawrence Abele said three wealthy organizations — the Scaife, Lynde and Henry Bradley and John M. Olin foundations — fund the widespread movement to monitor the views expressed in college classrooms.

One such activist group is the Foundation for Individual Rights in Education. Abele said a student at UF caught the group's attention

when his professor's skepticism of the "Just Say No" anti-drug campaign upset the student's

parent.

FIRE is one of many myriad groups with similar missions that

have emerged this decade.

In spring of 2005, state Rep. Dennis Baxley, R-Ocala, proposed

a bill that would curb what he called the "leftist totalitarianism" of university professors. Abele said Baxley plans to reintroduce his bill this spring.

But UF General Counsel Pam Bernard said another threat to faculty freedom comes from within the university.

Tenure at UF is tied to "collegiality," or good relations between faculty. This may encourage conformity and stifle debate, she suggested.

Speaking as a professor who is asked to be a team player, Bernard said, "Aren't you really telling me that I need to be quieter — that I need to not debate with such passion?"

During a question session at the latter half of the forum, UF Associate Provost Joe Glover questioned the freedom faculty have in the research they conduct.

Years from now, when human cloning is legal but taboo, Glover said, researchers may face societal pressures not to experiment with the technology. Journalism Dean Terry Hynes' echoed Glover's question.

"I think when we move out on the cutting edge, we're often bleeding at the same time," Abele responded with a smile.

He said faculty should push open the debate on a controversial issue before acting on it.

# Students assist city campaign

Students may not have swarmed to the city election polls Tuesday, but they made a difference in Gainesville politics.

From local high school students to a UF doctoral candidate, students waved signs, knocked on doors and helped orchestrate UF administrator Jeanna Mastrodicasa's win over former City Commissioner Tony Domenech.

"They brought energy — the footwork, the passion," said Mastrodicasa, associate director of the UF Honors Program.

Students made up more than half the number of people who regularly attended campaign meetings, said Bob Karp, Mastrodicasa's campaign manager.

"This was an amazing effort by students," said Karp, who has worked on several city campaigns in the last 10 years. "This was the most number of students on a campaign that I've worked on."

Karp said students brought fresh ideas to the effort.

"They have a lot of new ways to contact voters," he said. "I never knew about Facebook.com, but they posted things on Facebook and got the word out for Jeanna."

While students were active in campaigning efforts, they went to the polls in what is believed to be only moderate

numbers.

Voter turnout at on-campus polling locations was the lowest in the city. Only 392 people voted at the three on-campus polling locations.

Citywide voter turnout was about 16 percent, but only 3.88 percent of registered voters on average cast a ballot in the precincts with on-campus voting locations.

The lowest turnout, aside from these locations, was about 5.5 percent in precinct 23, just south of campus.

Karp said with Mastrodicasa winning by about 1,000 votes, the student votes probably didn't determine the outcome, but they helped her win.

"It clearly provided an extra cushion for her win," Karp said.

Mayor Pegeen Hanrahan, whom Karp also helped with her 2004 city election victory, said she also had a lot of students help with her past campaigns.

"Our campaigns really enforced the idea that students are really important in the life of Gainesville," Hanrahan said.

And she said it's important to court the student population.

"Every single vote counts, and every voter's interests count," Hanrahan said. "And students make up a huge percentage of voters in Gainesville."

Student issues played a key role in Tuesday's election. Domenech campaigned on a promise to remove students from single-family neighborhoods.

He also strictly opposed extending bar closing hours, a reversal in his position from his previous failed attempt in 2005 to return to the commission.

Mastrodicasa said she planned to enforce already existing city codes to regulate student renters' behavior. She is open to extending bar closing hours, but only if alcohol is not served after 2 a.m.

"Tony Domenech ran against students, and it completely backfired. It mobilized more students to vote against him," said Dan Cienia, a UF political science doctoral candidate who helped Mastrodicasa's campaign.

The poll numbers back Cienia's belief.

At the Reitz Union, 96 percent of the ballots were cast in Mastrodicasa's favor.

She also won 67 percent of the votes at the Harn Museum and 71 percent of the votes at the Phillips Center for the Performing Arts, both student-heavy precincts.

# Farm tractors can kill

## ■ FARM LIFE CAN LEAD TO DANGEROUS SITUATIONS.

UF graduate Todd Martin is no stranger to the dangers of farm life.

His friend's father was killed when he reached for something stuck in a corn harvester, caught his clothes on the machine and was pulled into it.

"You just got to work intelligently," Martin said. "Take that extra step to not injure yourself while working on your equipment."

This week is National Agricultural Safety Week, an information campaign intended to shatter the misconception that farms are only about serene landscapes. The UF College of Agricultural and Life Sciences and the Florida Farm Bureau Federation have information available that promotes the practice of routine farm-safety behaviors.

Martin has met other farmers whose arms were pinched off while roping cattle. He also said children are often unaware of the threats of large animals and tractors.

Carol Lehtola, an associate professor in the agricultural and biological engineering department said, "Agriculture is not as pastoral as everyone thinks it is from all the commercials and so forth, but it is a dangerous industry."

Agriculture is one of the most dangerous occupations in the U.S.

and considered more dangerous than mining.

Lehtola said tractors account for half of all agricultural-related fatalities and injuries. The top tractor-related injuries and deaths occur when tractors overturn, run over people and collide with motor vehicles on public roadways.

"John Q. Public doesn't realize that people can fall off those tractors, and it can be a deadly business out there," Lehtola said.

National Agricultural Safety Week targets farmers, ranchers and hobby farmers. Lehtola said people who farm as a hobby do not usually acknowledge that the information available to professionals applies to them, too.

"Regardless of the size of the tractor, all of the same principles apply," Lehtola said.

Lehtola, co-writer of a Web site on how to childproof farmsteads, said adults need to teach their children farm-safe behaviors. She said the average age of a person who is run over while riding on a tractor as an extra passenger is 7.

"Machines have no memory and no conscience," Lehtola said. "They don't care who you are or what they cut."

### Eddie C's showcases local and national acts

There's only one place in Gainesville where bands playing their first show share the stage with national acts and fans fresh out of high school rub elbows with their parents' peers.

Eddie C's Hot Rock Lounge on South Main Street is a nationally known music venue, which serves as a launching pad for emerging local bands and gives virtually any local band stage time regardless of experience.

"We give high priority to local bands. We don't even need to listen to their demos," said Eddie Clark, the president and promoter of Eddie C's. "We're very approachable."

This welcoming attitude is not an act of desperation, but an honest investment into the local music scene. When it comes to out-of-town bands, Eddie C's is fairly picky, relying on MySpace.com to evaluate talent and to pair the outside band with local groups.

Eddie C's has consistently booked the most bands in Gainesville since local music Web site Gainesvillebands.com has been keeping records. The desire of bands to play there can be attributed to a few charac-

teristics that sets Eddie C's apart from other Gainesville venues, Clark said.

"We've got the best sound and light system," he said. "We're the only venue, probably in Florida, that offers DVDs of the band that they can take home with them for \$20."

Through its Web site, Eddie C's is quickly becoming a nexus for the local scene. Streaming videos, downloadable MP3s and podcasts of local bands give artists a variety of channels to spread their music while also offering fans, as well as the curious, a way to investigate and enjoy what local musicians are creating.

Although Eddie C's is primarily a rock 'n' roll bar, bands of all genres are invited to play.

"We don't try to box ourselves in to one type of music," Clark said. "A lot is dictated by what the local bands are producing."

Lately this has meant mostly metal, and although Eddie C's is fairly nondiscriminatory in which local bands can play there, Clark admits that the bar is "trying to move to a happier sound."

Brian Conlin, the bassist and vocalist of local hard rock group Out of Season, agrees that the types of bands he's played with at Eddie C's have been "just about

everything."

This is one thing Conlin likes about Eddie C's because it makes for a more diverse audience each show.

"There's always a different crowd," he said. "A nice mix."

Eddie C's is actually a two-room venue: part neighborhood bar, part college-town hangout.

This peculiarity juxtaposes college students rocking out with their friends and a middle-aged crowd socializing and shooting pool.

Andy Shaara, 52, is a regular at Eddie C's and the owner of the downtown nightclub Decadence. Shaara said why he comes to Eddie C's, "To party and listen to music."

This curious clientele contrast is actually an advantage for business.

"You need a steady crowd to keep the place open," Clark said. "Believe it or not, a lot of them listen to [the bands]."

Although Eddie C's may be somewhat underrated in the local music scene amidst downtown venues, its attitude toward Gainesville groups ensures its place in the local musical milieu.

"They take care of the bands," Conlin said. "They're really nice — sound guys, light guys, they're all nice."

## Venue gets back to roots

Say kids, it's time the old Florida Theater changes hands once again. After a brief stint as Graffiti Beach, Gainesville's largest privately owned club, The Venue, is returning to its original use.

After purchasing The Venue in January, owner Alex Guba and his wife Edina said want to appeal to the largest audience possible.

Local band Velvetreen Pink and special guest R. Star kicked off the first local jam at The Venue on Sunday. The free concert was one of several events the club is promoting in an effort to bring live music back to this historic setting.

Ultimate fighting, Chippendales and concerts appealing to multiple genres are scheduled to appear at the venue soon, said manager Michael Ciaranella.

"We're trying to give people an option," he said. "We're going back toward the old Florida Theater where it provided entertainment for everyone."

Ciaranella, more popularly known as "Pickles," has managed bars for the past 21 years. He said it's important to market to certain demographics in Gainesville while trying to appease as many of them as possible.


Proof of recent success includes "The Venue Presents Froggy's," an event put on with the help of promoters involved in Greek life. With live music on the main stage, a beer pong room and \$3 Jager Bombs, The Venue packed in almost 1,500 people last Friday, Guba said.

Built in 1928, the building needs some remedial work, including a more updated look, he said. Guba's vision stems from his work experience with Miami hot spots. Guba and his wife are currently working with several promoters to put Gainesville back on the map as a central location for live music, said Alicia Karlin, promoter for The Venue and chairwoman of Student Government Productions.

"The sound is amazing — it feels like you're playing at the Red Rocks," said Ryan Star, an acoustic performer at Sunday's show.

The 28-year-old is based out of Soho, N.Y., and came down especially for the concert. He said he's been selling out most venues in New York, which are way too small. Star said he would love to come back and play The Venue in Gainesville, which is also home to Star's favorite band, For Squirrels.

You can expect Froggy's to continue on Fridays, as well as an indie night on Saturdays, said Karlin. True local fans of Gainesville music can look forward to Sister Hazel, who will be performing on the very stage where they recorded their video for "All for You." # Comedy fails to launch

When attending a so-called romantic comedy, one usually expects to see something that is somewhat romantic and at least vaguely comedic.

The results, however, do not always meet the expectations.

In "Failure to Launch," opening Friday, Matthew McConaughey stars as Trip, a 30-something boat salesman who still lives with his parents.

Trip has no trouble attracting the ladies, but his unwillingness to commit has left him without a relationship for years. When he wants to drive women away, he brings them home to meet mom and dad, and his horrified dates never bother him again.

Fed up with the situation, his folks secretly hire Paula, played by Sarah Jessica Parker, who has the unusual profession of luring men like Trip out of their childhood homes for good. Paula confidently guarantees that she'll have Trip in love with her and out on his own within a couple of months.

Of course, Trip soon finds out about this little arrangement, and he's hardly thrilled with the situation.

It turns out that Trip has fallen in love

with Paula, and naturally, Paula is in love with Trip.

The movie continues as one would expect: Trip's feelings are hurt, Paula feels guilty, they stop speaking and so on. Three guesses as to how it ends.

In theory, perhaps, the premise of "Failure to Launch" could turn out a clever and interesting story. In reality, the film is so packed with lame subplots and wannabe-comedy that there is little room for character development or any kind of genuine emotion.

Its eagerness for hilarity relies on the tired themes of standard goofball sidekicks, sexual mishaps and bizarre run-ins with nature.

The feeble attempts at deepness, like Trip's former fiancée and Paula's lingering need to fix these men, fall flat.

The bottom line: This poorly told romantic comedy might garner a few cheap laughs with certain crowds, but don't look for anything more than that. For those wanting sophomore humor this Spring Break, including Mockingbird CPR and accidental paintball shootings, check it out. Otherwise, save your cash for a comedy that's actually funny.

# Book on UF SG absurd

History is littered with the charred husks of ideas born of good intentions that didn't pan out; neo-conservatism, Skip-It and "Superbabies: Baby Geniuses 2" are recent examples. To that list of noble failures add 2002 UF graduate Kenneth Kerns' debut novel, "Reunion at University Avenue."

Everything about Kerns' novel is likeable in theory. The protagonist, presumably modeled after the author and former Student Government outstanding senator of the term, pens a successful book about his experiences with the petty ridiculousness of SG politics and is targeted by his spiteful peers as a result. Kerns' novel reiterates points about the cronyism, narcissism and all-around absurdity inherent in UF's playpen for aspiring bureaucrats.

All of which is well and good. Until you read the thing.

This book exemplifies one of the few instances when a reader can actually judge a book by its cover. No one should expect Tolstoy when a stretched, pixilated, Google Images copy of Stadium Road adorns a book titled after University Avenue.

Granted, Kerns obviously tackled this project on his own and handled

both writing and editing. But sometimes it's hard to overlook multiple sentences with missing verbs. Or when proper nouns like "Chinese" aren't capitalized. And even these problems would be negligible had they not occurred so frequently as every two pages.

The book is funny, though. Not so much funny-ha-ha, but funny-what-the-hell-is-this. For instance, lines like, "You can choke on nuts and survive," and "Dabnabit! You boys mean tell me you messed with my thar crime scene?!" provide comic relief to what is otherwise a mostly cliched thriller.

Ultimately, the book's good intentions become mired in a swampy bog of indecipherable grammar, too many characters modeled after Kerns' acquaintances and a mystery that isn't worth solving.

But if a tale involving booby-trapped Reitz Union stairs and attempted vehicular manslaughter on the Plaza of the Americas sounds interesting, by all means pick up No. 1,624,084 on Amazon's best-seller list and help a member of the Gator Nation overtake "Glory Filled the Land: A Trilogy on the Welsh Revival of 1904-1905."





## Jackson sits, Webb improves stock at UF Pro Day

■ THE FORMER UF WIDE RECEIVER IMPRESSED A JAGUARS ASSISTANT COACH.

One wanted to risk it, the other did not.

Chad Jackson, the former UF receiver who was electronically clocked at 4.32 seconds in the 40-yard dash at February's NFL Scouting Combine, chose not to run again at Wednesday's UF Pro Day, held annually for scouts to gauge interest in prospects.

Former UF cornerback Dee Webb improved his 4.41 combine 40 time to a 4.38 Wednesday.

According to his agent, Mike Huyghue, Webb is projected as a top-50 pick in April's NFL Draft.

"I think he's easily in the top 50," Huyghue said. "I think he's going to be one of the better corners."

Webb was recently investigated after a gunshot was fired from his apartment, but no charges were filed.

He addressed the incident to teams that inquired, but he didn't want to discuss the incident further Wednesday. Huyghue told reporters that Webb would not answer any questions related to the incident.

"I'll just keep that in confidence between me and [interested teams]," Webb said. "I really don't want to talk about it."

Huyghue described it as a dumb

mistake about which Webb explained when asked.

Webb still has the weapons, which are common items for NFL players, Huyghue said.

"But there won't be anymore incidents; I can tell you that," Huyghue said. "Let's just say lock and key."

Webb admitted Wednesday that

he had his mind set on jumping to the NFL before UF's season ended.

"I kind of had my mind made up as I was going through the season," he said.

Webb, who said he felt uncomfortable when he ran at the combine, may have improved his stock with his time Wednesday.

"I think [running again] says a

lot about the player because teams come here to see guys compete," Huyghue said. "I think players forget that sometimes. There's not a lot of advantage from withholding your services."

But Jackson and his agent, David Canter, felt that Jackson had nothing to gain by running again, so the receiver participated in other

workouts.

"I'd say now he's probably locked himself into the first round, barring anything catastrophic," Canter said. "I think that teams realize it's very possible that he's the best receiver in the draft."

Canter also criticized UF coach Urban Meyer for not using Jackson's speed better and getting his client punished too often on short, underneath routes.

Jackson's average yards per catch dwindled from 22.3 in 2004 to 10.2 in 2005.

"I'm glad he's alive, and I'm glad he won't be running any more 5-yard curls," Canter said.

Jackson attributed his projected draft status to his 40 time in Indianapolis.

"It was very big," Jackson said. "That's what everybody wanted me to run. That's what everybody wanted to see — my speed."

Jaguars receivers coach Steve Walters worked with Jackson on Wednesday and even broke down film with the receiver. Walters was impressed not only by Jackson's character and skill, but also his knowledge of the game.

Other former UF starters participated in the event, including offensive linemen Mike Degory, Lance Butler and Randy Hand, cornerback Vernell Brown, safety Jarvis Herring, linebacker Todd McCullough and defensive lineman Jeremy Mincey.

Canter also represents Mincey and said the lineman has positioned himself to possibly be taken on the first day.

## Gators starting five rack up conference accolades

### Noah receives All-SEC First Team honors

For a squad whose success hinged on cohesive team play, members of the No. 16 Gators received some individual recognition on Wednesday, as a team.

All five of UF's starters were honored in some form or another when the Southeastern Conference awards were announced. Power forward Joakim Noah led the group as the only UF player named to the All-SEC First Team.

"It's a great feeling to be in that position," Noah said. "I would have never really dreamed of it, especially after what happened

last year."

Noah's rise came after a year in which he averaged just 3.5 points and 2.5 rebounds per game.

This season, he's averaging a team-high 14.1 points (SEC 10th best) and 6.5 rebounds (12th best) while shooting 71.6 percent from the field.

Fellow sophomores, point guard Taurean Green and power forward Al Horford, were each named to the second team, while forward Corey Brewer was named co-Defensive Player of the Year, along with Louisiana State freshman Tyrus Thomas.

Thomas was also named SEC Freshman of the Year, becoming the third consecutive LSU player to win the award.

Thomas' teammate Glen Davis was named SEC Player of the Year.

Joining Noah and Davis on the first team were Alabama's Jermareo Davidson and Ronald Steele, Vanderbilt's Shan Foster, Tennessee's Chris Lofton, Arkansas' Ronnie Brewer and LSU's Darrel Mitchell.

Davis, Lofton, Ronnie Brewer and Steele were the only unanimous selections.

Somewhat surprisingly, LSU coach John Brady, who led the Tigers to an SEC regular-season title, was

named the conference's Coach of the Year, winning over Tennessee's Bruce Pearl.

A season after the Volunteers finished 14-17 (6-10 SEC), Pearl led No. 14 Tennessee to a 21-6

(12-4) record this season and a first-place finish in the SEC East.

For his accomplishments off the court, Lee Humphrey was named SEC Scholar-Athlete of the year.

An applied physiology major, Humphrey has a 3.74 GPA and was also named a Second Team Academic All-American last week.

"My parents always kind of instilled in me that grades are important," Humphrey said. "You need to take care of your school work and you need to do that first, and that's kind of what they taught me."

Noah and Green also were selected to the United States Basketball Writers Association District IV squad.

District IV is comprised of teams from Florida, Kentucky, Alabama, Georgia, Tennessee and Mississippi.

## Freshman golfer looks to follow mother's footsteps

Most athletes do not start their careers until they're actually out of the womb. UF freshman golfer Mallory Blackwelder is not

your typical athlete.

"Both [UF assistant] coach [Robin] Walton and I have known Mallory for quite a long time," UF women's golf coach Jill Briles-Hinton said. "Her mom was walking down the fairway in [an LPGA tourna-

ment] ... and was leading the event going into the final round, and she was extremely pregnant."

Seven months pregnant to be exact. "I've always kidded Mallory that she always liked to play golf," said her mother, Myra. "What was really neat about it, as I was headed to the 18th hole, there were about 20 pregnant women sitting in lawn chairs that came out to watch me play."

Myra joined the LPGA Tour in 1980 and won Rookie of the Year honors. Seven years later, she competed while pregnant, and although she is now retired, she still participates on the Women's Senior Golf Tour.

But the craze for carting clubs doesn't cease with the women of the clan.

Blackwelder's brother, Myles, is a member of the Georgetown golf team, and her father, Worth, is a caddy on the LPGA Tour.

Despite the family business, Myra and her husband felt adamant about offering their children a choice.

"We felt it wasn't wise to push," Myra said. "In her first amateur tournament, [Mallory] didn't want to do it because I think she felt intimidated. I said, 'Mallory, look, you'll have a lot

of fun with it. I'm going to make you play this first one, but if you don't like it, I won't make you play another [tournament].'"

Luckily for UF, Blackwelder enjoyed that first outing. Earlier in the spring season, she led the Gators in stroke average. So far, she is the only golfer to win an individual title, taking first place in the Lady Wildcat Invitational on Oct. 2.

"She's a very bright young lady," Briles-Hinton said. "She's got good fundamentals. She's a fighter. She's a hard worker and she knows how to think around the golf course. I'm thrilled she's here and decided to come play for us."

Had it not been for that first tournament when she was 11, Blackwelder might be spiking balls instead of shooting them.

"I really liked volleyball," she said. "I would have played in high school, but it was during golf season."

While in at Woodford County (Kent.) High, Blackwelder was named Kentucky's Miss Golf in 2004 and chosen as a two-time All-State golfer. She was also elected to the high school's student council.

Blackwelder said she believes that her extracurricular involvement in high school

helped prepare her for the demands of a collegiate sport.

"I used to go to high school early, before classes started, to have meetings," she said. "And I'd have to stay after school to have meetings and then go to practice. So it's kind of the same because this takes up a lot of time and that did as well."

After high school, Blackwelder considered playing elsewhere, such as Kentucky (her mother's alma mater) and Vanderbilt, but her deciding to go to UF was ultimately a no-brainer.

"The school's great and just the tradition," she explained. "The girls are great. I love all of them."

While some athletes in Blackwelder's position may feel pressure to live up to their parents' accomplishments, she considers their experience as an asset.

"It's been cool, growing up with them," she said. "A lot of my good friends in high school drove for two hours to come take lessons from my mom, whereas I could, if I really needed to, just go in the backyard and mess around."

Once Blackwelder began to play competitively, she and her mother quickly defined their dual relationship of instructor-student and mother-daughter.

"We made a deal when she started playing," Myra said. "If she didn't play well, I would be quiet, and when she was able to process what I wanted to teach her, she would let me know."

Blackwelder's ultimate goal is to follow in her mother's footsteps and become a member of the LPGA Tour, perhaps with a special caddy by her side.

"If my dad's still able and willing to do it, that'd be great," she said. "He's caddied for me in a few tournaments, and it's been really good."

"A lot of people ask all the time, 'Is it annoying to have your parents as your teacher? Would you be able to have them as your caddy?' But I get along great with my parents."

As for her time at UF, Blackwelder could not be more enthusiastic about achieving her goals and leaving a lasting impression on the program. With a grin on her face, she rattles them off without hesitation.

"I'd love to be a part of a national championship team," she said. "I've got one tournament win already. I'd like to have as many more as I can. All-American is a good goal and an individual national championship would be awesome."

# 'Bama's VanBrakle baffles UF in three-game sweep

You would think that the UF softball team remembers Alabama senior pitcher Stephanie VanBrakle.

VanBrakle, a two-time All-Southeastern Conference pitcher and Southeastern Conference Tournament MVP last season, defeated the Gators twice in a three-game series last year. This season was no different as UF (17-9, 0-3 SEC) lost 1-0 to VanBrakle and the No. 5 Crimson Tide again on Wednesday, sealing the three-game

series sweep for Alabama.

"Hopefully, not face Stephanie VanBrakle," Walton said. "It's a little bit to do with us, but she's

really good."

Even without facing VanBrakle, however, UF's bats must improve to win in the SEC.

"Our bats weren't alive, and our hitters need to be more aggressive," senior outfielder Lindsey Cameron said. "Every loss is always a letdown, but it shows what you need to improve on. It's tough because it is SEC play, but we just move for-

ward and need to get better."

Even with the Gators' lack of hitting, UF's pitching staff can be proud of its performance. Freshman Stacey Nelson pitched two games and only gave up four runs in 12 innings.

"Stacey Nelson has done an excellent job and she certainly hasn't pitched like a freshman," Cameron said. "Our pitchers really showed some character. They kept us in the battle, which is a really good sign."

Walton agrees, but said he still sees room for improvement from his young staff.

"[The pitchers] competed well," he said. "I think they'd agree with me that we still came up a little bit on the short end on the stick. I was proud of their effort. But in the end, if we only give up one run, we need to win those ballgames."

The Gators may be dissatisfied with the results, but they still respect Alabama.

"We weren't surprised," Cameron said. "Alabama is a really strong team, and they've been to the [College] World Series. We knew it was going to be a battle. It just didn't work out the way we wanted to."

# Gators pitch through adversity to sweep series

Inning after inning, the No. 15 Gators pitched and fielded themselves into trouble. And inning after inning, they pitched and fielded themselves out of it.

UF pitchers stranded 12 UNC-

Greensboro runners in the Gators' 3-1 victory against the Spartans (3-10) on Wednesday, finishing a two-game sweep at McKethan Stadium.

Despite 16 Spartans reaching base, Brian Jeroloman's two-run single in the first inning proved to be enough to finish off the Spartans.

For the second consecutive game, the Gators (11-6) received a strong

performance from a freshman starter. Left-hander J.K. LaCoste tossed five scoreless innings to pick up the win, allowing UNC-Greensboro to scatter six hits and two walks.

After battling to be the Sunday starter for the Gators this season, LaCoste helped his case with Wednesday's performance.

"[I had a] couple of rocky in-

nings, but I felt that in the end, I located my fastball the way I wanted to and pitched the way I wanted to," LaCoste said. "It helped, but I have to work on a lot of things to secure that position."

For the game, the Spartans actually outthit the Gators 10-8.

The Gators also committed three errors in the ballgame — all by shortstop Adam Davis — to the Spartans' one.

"Our pitchers are stepping it up big time," Jeroloman said. "They really want it more when the bases are loaded with no outs."

The Gators held a 2-0 lead into the fourth inning when outfielder Gavin Dickey blasted his fourth home run of the season, a solo shot past the bleacher seats in left-center field.

The four home runs tie a career-high for Dickey, who leads the team in homers this season.

Dickey said that his lead in long-balls could be most attributed to the absence of UF slugger Matt LaPorta, who is still suffering from a strained oblique muscle.

"When that guy comes back, it is just a matter of time before he can go off and just hit any amount," he said. "I am, by far, not a home run hitter by any stretch."

UNC-Greensboro scored its lone run in the seventh inning. After a sacrifice by Spartans designated hitter Guy Welsh moved runners over to second and third, catcher Adam Deleo grounded out to drive in second baseman Greg Feltes.

UF reliever Josh Edmondson pitched three scoreless innings to pick up his second career save in

as many nights, filling in for injured closer Darren O'Day, who sat out a second straight game with back spasms and should return to the lineup this weekend.

For the second consecutive night, the ballgame ended when Deleo grounded an Edmondson pitch into a 6-4-3 double play.

Second baseman Matt Gaski, whose father, Mike, is the Spartans' coach, had a pretty uneventful offensive series going 0 for 4 at the plate with a couple of walks.

He did, however, hurt the Spartans with his glove in both games. After making a lunging stop of a groundball headed for right field with a one-run lead in game one on Tuesday, Gaski followed up with a better play on Wednesday.

With a runner on third and the Gators leading 3-1 in the seventh inning, UNC-Greensboro's David Adams hit a fly ball into shallow right field. Gaski dove for the ball and made an over-the-shoulder catch to quash the Spartans' rally.

"He owed his dad that one," UF coach Pat McMahon joked. "His dad was getting on him pretty good about that play afterwards."
