Towing, safety at odds

Roaming tow trucks often leave people in Gainesville stranded, sometimes late at night and with no idea how to reclaim their vehicles.

A recommendation by Gainesville's Public Safety Committee prompted city commissioners on Monday to request changes to roam towing rules, making life easier for the illegally parked.

Roam towing is when tow companies find and remove illegally parked cars without the car having been called in on a complaint. These companies are usually under contract with property owners.

The public safety committee's recommendations include:

- Adding the address and phone numbers of tow companies to roam towing signs.
- Asking people with towed cars to call ahead before picking them up.
- Posting directional maps to tow yards on roam towing signs.

"What brought us to this point are people who find themselves without a car in the late hours of the night," said Gainesville Police Lt. S.A. Scott, who helped advise the commission on tow-related safety issues. "We're afraid people might get into dangerous situations."

The recommendation to have people with towed cars call ahead was made to lower incidences of

Students, faculty remember attacks



UF stood still Monday morning as students, faculty and administrators took a moment of silence to honor the victims and heroes of Sept. 11, 2001.

UF President Bernie Machen and Provost Janie Fouke joined University Police officers at a flag-lowering ceremony outside Tigert Hall. Officers clad in full uniform stood with black stripes over their badges to indicate mourning, and they saluted three half-staff flags in memory of those who died.

The campus bustled with activities all day Monday to commemorate the fifth anniversary of the attacks that killed nearly 3,000 people in New York and Washington, D.C.

Members of various Jewish groups set up a 5-foot-tall replica of the twin towers on Turlington Plaza. A foam wall called the "good deed wall" linked the two wooden towers.


To participate in the good deed project, participants wrote down a good deed they planned to perform on a piece of paper. Then, they attached the paper to a photo of a Sept. 11 victim and fastened it to the wall adjoining the model twin towers.

More than 1,100 good deeds were posted by the end of the day, said Rabbi Berl Goldman.

"We did this with a hope that these universal acts of hope and kindness will collectively transform this dark day of 9/11 into positive energy, with the goal that one day we'll live in a world where 9/11 won't even be a possibility, let alone a reality," Goldman said.

A block north, members of UF's College Republicans read the names of people who died during the Sept. 11 attacks in a midday ceremony on the Plaza of the Americas.

"It's one of those things where you don't expect people to sit down and listen to two hours of readings, but for



SNAP use increases*Popularity follows better service*By **PAULA BOADA**

UF's free late-night taxi service is a little closer to living out its namesake.

It still won't appear at the snap of your fingers, but the Student Nighttime Auxiliary Patrol has doubled its phone lines and available dispatchers to speed up its service.

Since those changes were made last winter, more people have taken advantage of the service.

"I don't think it's because demand has risen. I just think it's because the opportunity to get through the phone lines has gotten greater," University Police spokesman Captain Jeff Holcomb said.

According to Holcomb, SNAP answers 290 to 300 phone calls a night

and transports more than 3,000 people every month.

The most common complaints students make about SNAP are tedious hold times on the phone and long waits for vans, said UPD officer Jacob Pruitt, the liaison between SNAP and the student body.

SNAP is run by students and supervised by UPD. It is available to UF students and faculty and their guests.

Cayla Townes, an anthropology senior, has used the service to get back to her dormitory late at night.

"It was really nice having SNAP come and get me when I didn't have a ride around campus," Townes said. "It not only helped me out, but it made my parents feel more at ease knowing I wasn't walking back to my dorm alone at night."

UF students are creating an alternative yearbook, "The Black Book," that showcases the university's minority organizations.

The president of the book's publishing company was inspired to create the book after finding out that the Black Student Union was allotted two to four pages in the UF yearbook.

"That's just not enough space," said Desiree Chase, president of Intellectual Ink Publications.

"[The book] is dedicated to featuring the programs, people and organizations that serve as resources and inspiration for black students," said Chase, a UF junior.

The book will list more than 66 black and minority organizations.

"It's a way to get our name out to the community and let them know what we're about, which is achievement," said Paul Drayton, 20, president of the Zeta Phi chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Inc.

It will be an annual **Multicultural Affairs** publication, scheduled for release sometime in the Spring.

The bulk of the cost to distribute the book will come from advertisements. Advertising prices start at \$100.

Students and student organizations can purchase ads at a discounted rate that starts at \$65.

Presale of the book will begin Oct. 7 at Soulfest 2006, a multicultural event in Dickinson Hall.

The book will initially cost \$30, and its price will increase throughout the school year. It should not exceed \$45, Chase said.

UF student Timothy Benson ended up with four stitches in his head after he called UCF student

Erin Foley fat Saturday night, according to an arrest report.

Enrique Brao of Orlando said his friend Benson got into an argument with a group of four girls outside the Copper Monkey Restaurant and Pub near the UF campus.

Benson asked the group to quiet down while they stood out-

side the bar. They became angry and circled Benson, Brao said.

"They started all yapping and screaming at him," he said. "And then [Foley] came around the side and hit him on the head with a beer bottle."

Valerie Nicole Teman, a witness, told police Foley hit Benson after he called Foley fat, accord-

ing to the report.

"I could see the gash immediately on Tim's head," Brao said.

The group of girls tried to leave the scene after they realized what had happened, he said.


Brao followed them until they passed a police officer by the Salty Dog Saloon, and he pointed them out and explained the fight

to the officer, he said.

Police arrested Foley at 10:30 p.m. on charges of aggravated battery, according to the report.

Brao said Benson is feeling better after having had a headache.

"It could have been a lot worse than it was — I think he realizes that," Brao said.

SG political parties hold events to draw students

As Student Government's Fall election draws near, political parties are turning to students for help in drawing up their platforms.

The Action Party is in the midst of a weeklong event called "Students

Want Action Week," which kicked off with a tailgate before Saturday's football game. Party officials set up tables at West University Avenue and spoke to about 1,000 students, party leader Tommy Jardon said.

Chris Chase, the party's vice presidential candidate, said he got feedback from students about issues he had never thought about before.

For example, a Muslim student said that because UF's dining halls are not open before sunrise, he was unable to eat before dawn to prepare

for the fast during Ramadan. Chase said the student's concerns prompted him to consider religious sensitivity as a possible issue for SG.

"I want to make sure the plat-

form I'm running on is student-based," Chase said.

The Swamp Party is also emphasizing student outreach in creating its platform. Unlike Action, Swamp has not released any plans for the semester.

In order to gather platform ideas from students, the party held a platform workshop Monday afternoon.

Party leaders wrote down ideas proposed by nearly 50 Swamp candidates and 10 other concerned students at the meeting, party leader

Keith Hardwick said. The workshop was a great success, Hardwick said, but declined to reveal the ideas.

Unlike other parties, which attempted to garner student ideas and support, the Pants Party held a "stratery" meeting Sunday night.

"As far as seeking out serious ideas, the party still holds the position that there's too much seriousness in SG," Pants Party vice presidential candidate Bruce Haupt said. "We don't want to dilute our message of fun."





Top 10 two-step

Machen must deliver on promises to students

What kind of university is this? Now, more than ever, it's an important question.

UF is at a crossroads. We can remain what we are now — a prestigious "Public Ivy" with bargain-basement tuition — or we can follow UF President Bernie Machen on his quest for the elite Top 10. We can't do both. And sooner or later, we have to make a choice.

It's a divisive issue with good arguments on both sides.

Critics of Machen's plan insist that UF is already a great bargain. They're right. In this year's U.S. News & World Report rankings, UF tied with four other public universities for 13th place. All four have higher tuition than UF — in some cases, much higher.

At Penn State, for example, students pay \$11,024 a year — more than triple the cost of attending UF. The University of Texas charges more than double what we pay. If UF students are getting a comparable education at a fraction of the cost, some say, why mess with a good thing?

Then again, Machen makes the Top 10 sound like a great place to be. True, UF would have to raise tuition to get there. But think of everything we'd get in return — smaller classes, more academic counselors and fewer sections taught by teaching assistants. Sounds pretty good, doesn't it?

Unfortunately, the plan isn't unfolding quite the way Machen promised.

On Sept. 1, the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences announced it would replace only 26 of the 80 professors expected to retire in the next three years — meaning more work for CLAS faculty members who stick around. By last Friday, some professors were already looking for new jobs.

Who can blame them? After all, no one wants to do more work for the same pay. But the real victim here is the student body. With fewer professors, we'll have more and more TAs teaching bigger and bigger classes. In other words, we'll get the opposite of what Machen promised us.

Of course, bigger classes won't impress the rankings people either. That's why the administration's decisions have been so hard to understand lately — somehow, they manage to hurt students and UF's ranking at the same time.

Case in point: Starting this semester, UF will award incoming National Merit scholars less than half of what they used to get.

"Boo hoo" you might think. "Those poor National Merit scholars."

But recruiting them — lots of them — is one of the few goals Machen has actually accomplished in his Top 10 campaign. The people at U.S. News & World Report love that kind of thing. So cutting back now seems downright perverse.

Here at the Alligator, we're all for boosting UF's standing in the college rankings. Our classes are too big. There are too many TAs teaching upper-division courses. But changing UF won't be cheap.

If Machen and company expect middle-class students and their families to foot the bill, they need to show us they can deliver their promises. (Smaller classes, not bigger ones, would be a good start.) Otherwise, we're left holding the bag — paying higher tuition with nothing to show for it.

So far, we're not convinced. Mr. President, the ball's in your court.


But that changed with the debut of Facebook's seemingly invasive — and vastly unpopular — news feed feature.

Friday's opinion column "Capital punishment is costly, immoral," demonstrates abominable use of both logic and ethics.




students to walk by and just for a second think about it, I think it meant a lot,” said Ben Grove, the group’s treasurer.



City weighs options for stricter towing rules

people arriving at unattended tow yards.

“Our company doesn’t have people here at all times after hours,” said Mike Weber, the owner and operator of Superior Towing in Gainesville. “We want them to call ahead so somebody will be there for them.”

Between February and July, there were 15 verified complaints filed against tow companies with roam towing contracts in Gainesville, according to a city document.

In July, the commissioners called for amendments to Gainesville’s trespass tow ordinance, requiring companies and drivers to register with the city and for drivers to photograph cars before they are hauled away. These measures are designed to cut down on operators who wrongfully tow.

So far, said Scott, most companies have been willing to cooperate.

“These [city] rules benefit tow companies in the long run,” Weber said. “When you do the right thing, it does catch on.”

Part of the safety committee’s recommendation to ease Gainesville’s tow woes also includes publicizing parking information for citizens, according to the document.

“It’s like driving down the road,” Weber said. “You need to know the speed limit, the rules. Parking is a privilege, not a right.”

He protested terrorists who he said attacked him and put his cat in a box on Aug. 19. The event, he said, inspired him to run for president.

The self-proclaimed “shaman of the green people” elicited confused stares as he waved an American flag and asked for pagan women to join with him in fleeing the state.

“He wasn’t invited,” Richard said.

Despite the commotion, the groups that were invited drew curious students who wanted to

learn more.

A hibiscus plant, a fig tree and a mulberry tree sat in pots on the Edible Plant Project’s table. Project member Michael Adler, a UF zoology alumnus, told curious students about his group’s efforts to plant crops throughout the city for consumption.

What sets the Radical Rush apart from other rushes, Adler said, is that people get a chance to “make the world a better place.”

Richard said the Radical Rush, in comparison with Greek rushes, has more meaning and less ceremony.

“We don’t make people dress up in evening dresses,” Richard said.

Szelena Gray, a UF religion senior at the Feminist Activists Creating Equality table, said Radical Rush is more inclusive than Greek rushes around campus.

And Kealan Partlow, a member of Gainesville’s chapter of the Industrial Workers of the World said the rush “is more focused on positive change.”





In historic building, organic treats are served fresh

■ BAKERY OFFERS ART, TEA AND COFFEE WITH STYLE.

A local bakery owner from Hawaii brought the "aloha spirit" with her to Gainesville.

"It's a word that encompasses caring," said Laura High, co-owner of the 2nd Street Bakery.

High, 32, wants her bakery to be a place for Gainesville residents to gather.


"You might just be serving them coffee, but you're a part of their daily bread," High said.

The bakery, which opened in July, is nestled near the intersection of Northwest Second Street and Northwest 16th Avenue near Main Street.

Susan Granade, Joan Reisinger and High, all owners of the bakery, chose to open their business in a historic building off the main road because they wanted to interact with the neighborhood, High said.

Granade, 40, said the bakery is unique because it has a fresh atmosphere unlike most commercialized establishments.

"It's not just a stale environ-

ment that you can get anywhere else," she said.

The three, with the help of their landscaper and landlord, have

turned the weed-infested shell of an old petroleum station into a colorful coffeehouse and bakery. The building is a mix of brick and

orange-painted cement blocks, the roof arched and trimmed with yellow-green paint. Outside sit three tables, soon to be shaded by an

awning.

The inside has accents with these colors, as well as periwinkle, but most of the walls are white — which High said reminded her of flour.

Glass mosaics and portrait paintings by local artists cover the walls. The owners allow artists to hang and sell their art without a fee.

Paper menus boast pastries, breads, teas, specialty drinks and smoothies. All the food is organic, including the coffee, which is also fair-trade and shade-grown.

All the food is made daily from scratch, High said, and the leftover food is donated to local organizations like St. Francis House, a homeless shelter.

Not many students have been to the bakery, which High blames on its distance and lack of advertising.

However, a group of graduate students have discovered the bakery, which they use as a meeting space.

A book club also meets there Tuesdays.

"I think it's very avant-garde," book club member Joan Froede, 66, said of the restaurant. "I think other places will follow."




Web site links Gators to Gators around the world

Soon, accessing the Gator Nation will be a whole lot easier.

Beginning Sept. 16, University of Florida alumni, students and friends of the university will be able to upload their own personal video and photos related to their experiences at UF via **goGatorNation.com**, a new Web site that aims to highlight interesting facts about the university and its alumni in a fun and engaging way.

"GoGatorNation.com is designed to be a social network and to work in conjunction with the activities of the UF Alumni Association," said Joe Hice, associate vice president of marketing and public relations. "It's basically a Gator Facebook."

Hice says highlights of goGatorNation.com are "orange-and-blue nuggets" that serve to spotlight contributions of the Gator Nation that many wouldn't otherwise know. As people view the site, the

"nuggets" will appear from within the video, from behind a photograph and in other unexpected ways.

For example, Hice said, goGatorNation.com will feature facts about the university such as the \$518 million in research grants awarded to UF in 2006, as well as information about former students such as the two UF alumni who are now in the NASA astronaut program and UF graduate Robert Grubbs, who won the 2005 Nobel Prize in chemistry.

The site is an expansion of the Gator Nation campaign introduced a year ago to highlight a broad range of the university's academic and research accomplishments, Hice said.

"We were looking for a way to get alumni and members of the Gator Nation even more involved in the campaign," he said.

Visitors to the site also will be able to watch some of the Gator Nation TV com-

mercials, listen to new radio spots, and chat with alumni and friends through a message board.

"The interactive part is the ability to upload your own Go Gator commercial. It's the next step of what we started a year ago," Hice said, referring to the Gator

Nation campaign that included TV and radio commercials aired during athletic events as well as "The University of Florida is the Foundation for the Gator Nation" banners placed across campus. Also in July, the university introduced a new signature as part of the Gator Nation campaign.

A collaboration among three media companies – Fletcher Martin, 352 Media Group and the UF Digital Worlds Institute – the goGatorNation.com site design will be ever-changing, Hice said.

"We wanted to create something so it surprises every time," he said.

UF researcher given endowed professorship

Her research will complement patient care in the UF McKnight Brain Institute's Center for Taste and Smell, which treats patients suffering from smell and taste disorders or loss of taste due to disease or cancer therapy.

Dentistry professor receives NIH grant

Barbara Hastie, a research assistant professor of community dentistry and behavioral science, received a five-year, \$805,194 National Institutes of Health grant to study ethnic differences and genetic factors in acute postoperative pain and analgesic response. In addition, Hastie is the recipient of the 2006 "Future Leaders in Pain Management" small grant award from the American Pain Society. This award is given to three researchers from around the country and is aimed to advance pain research. Hastie will investigate ethnic differences in pain and side effects using the Third Molar model.

New and improved 'Noles hope to reignite rivalry

It doesn't matter how lopsided the competition is — if it's UF-Florida State, it's a rivalry.

Although the No. 6 Gators haven't lost to FSU since Halloween in 1994, the schools' feud hasn't been muffled, and neither have Seminoles' fans.

"I think we could not play Florida State for 10 years, come back, and it'd still be a great rivalry," UF coach Mary Wise said. "Certainly there will be fans in Tallahassee who will come out just to cheer against the Gators, and I know that our booster club will fill a bus just to cheer against the Seminoles."

So even with 14 consecutive wins against the Seminoles, the Gators expect a tough road match when they face FSU at 7 tonight.

Senior libero Rhian Davis believes screaming fans and loud pep bands are just what UF needs to prepare for Southeastern Conference road games.

"It doesn't matter if it's volleyball or cricket — the whole town will come out and cheer for them," Davis said. "It's a great environment because it's hostile, and that's good for us to be put in."

On the court, the Gators face a much harder opponent than recent Seminoles teams. One such team ecstatically celebrated winning one game in a 3-1 loss to UF.

FSU enters the match with a 6-2 record and is fresh off a road win against South Carolina.

"[FSU coach Todd Kress] has got some terrific talent, especially in-state talent," Wise said. "Our experience has been: Florida players playing against the Gators, we will definitely get their best shot."

One such talent is senior middle blocker Sarah

Griffin, who leads the team in kills (87) and blocks (28.5).

Also, junior outside hitter Makini Thompson comes off a 21-kill performance against the Gamecocks.

Still, the Gators lead FSU in kills per game, assists per game, blocks per game and fewer errors per game.

And UF has accomplished this against arguably tougher competition, facing three ranked opponents to FSU's one.

UF's greatest advantage is its defense, which has 18 kills per game to the Seminoles' 12.5.

A big reason for this is UF freshman libero Elyse Cusack, who averages at least two digs more per game than any FSU player.

Once again, Wise will mark the progress of junior middle blocker Kisyia Killingsworth in her new hybrid position.

Converting to a part-outside hitter position, Killingsworth continues to acclimate herself to hitting higher balls and facing more blockers. However, Wise said opposing teams are already marking her a top priority.

"With [Jane Collymore's] graduation, No. 1 on the scouting report is Kisyia Killingsworth," she said. "There is no hiding No. 34."

Wise's inspiration for the transition came as much from the gridiron as it did the hard court.


"Take the best athlete, and give the best athlete the ball — sounds kind of familiar doesn't it?" she said. "We're just taking a page out of a football playbook."

Junior Angie McGinnis is five kills shy of breaking Lenee Hill's school record of 154 career kills by a setter.

The Gators also look to continue their 36-match winning streak against Florida teams, though most Gators said they give that little thought.

"I feel like streaks are silently held tallied until you break them, and then [the media] want to pull out every streak you just broke by a loss," Davis said.

The Gators begin their SEC schedule this weekend when they travel to Georgia on Friday and South Carolina on Sunday.

Harvin honored for UCF game

■ THE UF FRESHMAN HAD 99 RECEIVING YARDS.

The word on freshman sensation Percy Harvin is spreading quickly.

After dazzling UF fans with his playmaking ability, the wide receiver was named the Southeastern Conference Freshman of the Week on Monday.

Harvin caught four passes against Central Florida for a team-leading 99 receiving yards. He also rushed for 11 yards on two carries.

In the first quarter, Harvin caught a short pass from quarterback Chris Leak, turned upfield and eluded several UCF defenders en route to a 58-yard touchdown — the first of his collegiate career. Another big play — a 54-yard run on an end around — was called back.

"He's dynamic and fast but there's a lot of fast people out

there that aren't quite as competitive," UF coach Urban Meyer said. "There were a couple of times during two-a-days where we had to physically pull him out of a huddle."

For the season, Harvin's 201 all-purpose yards trail only senior wide receiver Dallas Baker for the team lead (204).

He is also second to Baker with 132 receiving yards, and his 69 rushing yards place him third on the team. He is averaging 11.5 yards per carry.

Meyer said he plans to get the ball in Harvin's hands even more in upcoming games.

"The goal for players like that ... is eight to 10 [touches]," Meyer said.

"They're primo guys and we'd like to get them to touch the ball more."

UF TO PLAY KENTUCKY AT NIGHT: ESPN has picked up the rights to UF's home game against Kentucky on Sept. 23. Usually an afternoon game, the Gators will instead play the Wildcats at 7:45 p.m.

CHANGING OF THE LEFT GUARD:

Freshman offensive lineman Maurice Hurt took over for starting left guard Jim Tartt in the second quarter against UCF.

The reason for the change was two-fold, Meyer said.

He wanted to get Hurt some valuable experience, but he also didn't want to overwork Tartt, who is recovering from a shoulder injury.

"We've been able to play those young players, we just haven't been giving them the environment," Meyer said. "Jim Tartt is a starter at left guard."

FICKLE AT NICKEL: While senior Tremaine McCollum is the primary nickel corner this season, junior safety Reggie Nelson has been seeing some playing time at the position.

Junior Kyle Jackson replaces Nelson at free safety in those situations.

"Reggie is one of our premiere players," Meyer said. "Kyle Jackson is a guy with a lot of experience and he is actually playing pretty well right now."

Harvin has big-play capabilities, but can he shine in prime time?

I hope fans got a good look at Percy Harvin during the first two games.

His big plays were the highlights of the combined 76-7 showcase.

On those knee-buckling runs and catches, the freshman proved he could live up to the hype — against two teams with directional names.

You won't be seeing them as often beginning this weekend against Tennessee.

Chris Leak will aid in Harvin's slow descent back to Earth.

In his final game against Tennessee, in front of his family, the senior will find his experienced go-to guys.

Dallas Baker is UF's top receiver. He's played at Neyland Stadium before and can step up for big games.

Andre Caldwell is on his way back from a broken leg. Coach Urban Meyer has called the junior "rusty," but another week of preparation will only help Caldwell shake that off.

Meyer has also said Jemalle Cornelius needs more touches.

He's right.

In two games, Cornelius has four catches for 103 yards.

In two games, Harvin has drawn comparisons to Reggie Bush.

But not even Bush dominated his entire season as a freshman.

Excuse my colleague for being so oblivious.

Perhaps he has spent too much time watching his beloved Tim Tebow hold a clipboard on the sidelines to notice what everyone else with two eyes has witnessed these first two weeks of the season.

Percy Harvin is more than ready for Tennessee and the rest of the Southeastern Conference big boys

Just ask Harvin.

"I'm real anxious," Harvin said. "There's a lot of people that think a freshman can't step it up on the big stage, so I'm just anxious to prove everybody wrong."

Every time he touches the ball, you just can't help but sense that something big is about to happen.

In his first two games, Harvin has carried the ball six times for 69 yards — an average of 11.5 yards per carry. And don't forget about his 54-yard run that was called back against Central Florida.

That same game, Harvin ran a short slant route and turned a small gain into a 58-yard touchdown catch.

Blink an eye and Harvin is sprinting by you faster than Tennessee coach Phillip Fulmer at an all-you-can-eat buffet.

But since Nick-el Coverage wasn't able to grab Harvin in his fantasy college football league (good luck with Drew Weatherford), he has apparently

Sure, Harvin has dominated against slower Conference-USA defenses. But with a 4.3 second 40-yard dash, he'll still be the fastest guy on the field come Saturday, and

If the Gators are able to get Harvin the ball in the open field, there is no game plan that can prevent Volunteers defenders from getting juiced out of their ugly orange cleats.


They could double team the freshman, but the ensuing abuse Dallas Baker and Jemalle Cornelius would inflict on the Tennessee defense would be too extreme for live television.



UF duo recalls UT ill-fates

■ ANDRE CALDWELL AND RAY McDONALD WERE INJURED LAST YEAR.

With apologies to "Anchorman's" Vince Vaughn, on Saturday, redemption will be spelled "UT."

When the Gators play Tennessee, wide receiver Andre Caldwell and defensive end Ray McDonald hope to finish what they started against the Volunteers last year.

Both went down with leg injuries in the Gators' 16-7 win. Both haven't fully recovered yet. Both haven't forgotten what happened.

After UF's 42-0 win against Central Florida on Saturday, Caldwell and McDonald met.

They spoke as one.

"We were like, 'You know we've got to ball this game, right? Because we got hurt last year. We've got to step it up and make up for what happened last year,'" McDonald said. "He was like, 'Yeah, I know, I know.'"

There's more to that short confirmation.

"This is a big redeeming game for us because we both went out with injuries," Caldwell said. "We're going to bounce back."

Something taken for granted, a missed block, allowed a Tennessee special teamer to slam into Caldwell's right leg on a kickoff return.

"Watching him get carted off against Tennessee really hurt because he got carted off on kickoff return, a team I was a captain of," safety Tony Joiner said. "It really disturbed me seeing that."

Caldwell rehabbed and made it back into the starting lineup against Southern Miss. But he didn't break out until the UCF game, when he grabbed a 25-yard touchdown pass from Chris Leak with four seconds left in the first half.

"When I saw him score that touchdown

pass," UF coach Urban Meyer said, "that meant he's back."

Two UCF defenders sandwiched Caldwell on the play. The junior had to be helped off the field by Leak.

"That was a big confidence booster just to get one knock and get in the end zone," said Caldwell, who finished the game with four catches for 51 yards and two touchdowns. "The hit knocked me out. I actually don't remember making the catch."

McDonald's nightmare season started against Tennessee last year, when he partially tore his right ACL. He reappeared against LSU, but couldn't stay healthy. McDonald would partially tear his left ACL against Florida State and miss the Outback Bowl.

The Belle Glade native finished 2005 with eight tackles, one sack and three surgeries.

"I really wasn't the same after I got hurt in the Tennessee game last year," McDonald said. "This game means a lot to me."

McDonald said he was rusty in UF's opener but worked the kinks out for game two.

From what Meyer has seen, McDonald hasn't turned loose yet.

"I still don't think you've seen Ray [at 100 percent]," Meyer said.

McDonald could have echoed Caldwell's comments as the team started preparing for Tennessee.

"I'll never forget what happened," Caldwell said. "It's a tragic injury, but that's football. I'm just looking for sweet payback."

The 1966 season was a year of firsts for the UF football program.

Led by Heisman Trophy winner Steve Spurrier, the Gators finished the season 9-2 and defeated national power Georgia Tech in the Orange Bowl, UF's first win in a major bowl game.

Spurrier won the Heisman that year, despite throwing for just 2,012 yards and 16 touchdowns. The previous year, Spurrier became the first UF player to ever finish in the Top 10 in voting for the award, checking in at No. 9.

He was one of two first team All-Americans on the 1966 squad, along with center Bill Carr, who was the offensive captain in the Orange Bowl win.

Spurrier made his mark in a late October home game against Auburn, where he threw a touchdown pass, ran for another and kicked a game-winning 40-yard field goal to give the Gators a 30-27 win and run their record to 7-0.

The Gators rose to No. 7 in the Associated Press poll after the win but were knocked out of the rankings after losses to rival Georgia and in-state foe Miami in two of the season's final three regular-season games.

Still, the 8-2 regular season record was good enough to earn a trip to Miami for the Orange Bowl against No. 8 Georgia Tech, one of five bowl games UF coach Ray Graves would lead the team to in his 10 years at the helm (the Gators would win four of them).

In the 1966 postseason game, freshman running back Larry Smith set an Orange Bowl record by running 94 yards for a touchdown.

During the run, however, Smith could be seen hiking up his pants as they gradually fell to the ground.

Gators debut seasons

Through its first 36 holes of the season, the UF men's golf team shot a 606 (+38) at the Inverness Invitational in Toledo, Ohio.

The Gators finished the two-round day in a tie for fourth place with Georgia and four strokes behind first-place TCU.

Billy Horschel led the way for the Gators with a seven-over and finished in a five-way tie for fifth.

After struggling in the first round, Horschel started his front nine in the second round with consecutive birdies to put him at two over.

He then gave those strokes back with a bogey and two double bogeys as he finished off at three-over for the round.

Junior Manuel Villegas also played well. He chipped in a 74 (+3) in the first round and a 76 (+5) in the second to finish the day in a 10th place tie at eight-over.

Freshmen Tyson Alexander, Andres Echavarría and Tim McKenney made their first collegiate appearances.


Alexander fared best with a second-round eagle and shot a combined 155 to finish in a tie for 33rd.

"With a lot of young guys out there, we obviously had some significant jitters today," Coach Buddy Alexander said.

"We began on the most difficult part of the course and it was rough in the beginning, but our guys hung in there after some poor starts.

"We're going to have some growing pains, and today was part of the process."

The men's golf team will return to Inverness today to play its final 18 holes of the tournament.

WOMEN TIED FOR SEVENTH

The women's golf team finished in a three-way tie for seventh and shot a 596 (+12) at the Branch Law Firm/Dick McGuire Invitational in Albuquerque, N.M.

As they stand, the Gators are 21 strokes off first-place Arizona State (-9), which leads comfortably by eight strokes over second-place South Carolina.

Junior Sandra Gal led the scoring with a combined -4 (142) to put her at sixth place for the first two rounds.

Gal birdied nine holes in the tournament.

She was able to overcome a tough back-nine in the second round. She double-bogeyed the 12th and 13th holes but then bounced back to par the next four holes and birdied 18.

The Gators wrap up their tournament today at 3 p.m.

UF teeming with playmakers as Vols loom ahead

■ THE GATORS BOAST A VETERAN OFFENSE.

The question has become nauseating.

Can Urban Meyer's vaunted spread-option offense work in the Southeastern Conference?

After UF's 2005 offensive struggles, the simple answer might have been that it can't. The truth, however, might have been that the Gators lacked the arsenal needed to showcase Meyer's elements.

"Last year sometimes we had one receiver," Meyer said. "And when I talk about receivers, I mean Division I-A, University of Florida, Ike [Hilliard], Reidel [Anthony], Jacquez [Green], Dallas Baker type players — the type of players that change games."

But with the emergence of serious playmakers across the board early this season, Tennessee (UF's opening SEC opponent) might have to ask itself this question: Who are we going to stop?

Between Baker, Jemalle Cornelius, Cornelius Ingram and freshman sensation Percy Harvin, the Gators boast ample firepower.

Throw in Jarred Fayson, Kenneth Tookes, David Nelson and Riley Cooper and the potential gets scary.

But apparently, that isn't enough for Meyer.

He said he still wants three more

wide-outs. He believes that distributing the ball among his playmakers isn't an issue.

"I've been involved in game plans where you look at each other and ask, 'Well, who do we want to touch the ball?'" Meyer said. "We're not in that case now, especially because we have unselfish players. Not one player has come into my office asking, 'Why am I not doing this?' Last year that seemed to be a problem, especially because guys that weren't playmakers were saying they wanted to get the ball. I haven't had one issue of that this year. They're starting to believe in the team concept."

While the emergence of multiple dependable targets has been fundamental in the development of the Gators offensive system, it starts with the quarterback.

Chris Leak continues to elevate his play, as he has passed for 600 yards and seven touchdowns in the season's first two games.

"You need your quarterback involved," Meyer said. "[Former Bowling Green quarterback] Josh Harris did that, [former Utah quarterback] Alex Smith did that and Chris Leak is going to do that. He has the knowledge and the leadership to do that."

Much of what Meyer wants to do with the ball is predicated on the quarterback's ability to make the defense respect the run, leading to the thinking that Leak isn't the best choice at quarterback because of his grooming as a pocket-passer.

However, that isn't the case, ac-

ording to Meyer.

"Chris is not an option quarterback. That's fine — we understand that," Meyer said. "But he's effective with quarterback runs when he does do it. That's significant because it limits the looks you can see on

defense."

Leak's increased aptitude with the playbook — he scripts the first 12 plays of the game with the coaching staff Thursdays — along with the threat of shovel passes, option and reverse pitches to wide receivers

has led to an early indication of what UF's spread should look like.

The game is on.

Who do you want to stop?

"It's a lot of fun," Cornelius said. "That's the way it's supposed to look at a D-I school."

Spread 'n' Shred no longer put to bed, Gators offense finally has cred

The Gators have enough receivers to populate a small country.

Need speed? Let me introduce you to Percy Harvin, Andre Caldwell, Jarred Fayson, Jemalle Cornelius and Riley Cooper.

Need hands? Step right this way and feast your eyes on Dallas Baker and Cornelius Ingram.

The Gators (no matter how much Coach Urban Meyer tries to deny the obvious) finally boast that go-to back.

DeShawn Wynn has put his Checkers value meals on the backburner, Meyer has Wynn's doghouse up for auction on eBay and the senior is ready to run the ball 20 times a game.

Chris Leak is, well, Chris Leak.

I don't know what these facts mean to

you, so I'll go ahead and do the thinking for you: The Spread 'n' Shred is back. Resurrected. Resuscitated. Revived. Retooled. Ready to go. Can you feel Phillip Fulmer squirming?

"They have a lot of offensive weapons," the Tennessee coach said. "I think [they have as many as anyone in this league]."

Fireworks are legal in Knoxville, and good thing, too. Saturday, UF will unveil Meyer's most potent spread offense to date. As shocking as it might sound, Leak's polished precision and subsequent

potential make Alex Smith's production at Utah seem about as exciting as a party streamer.

And yes, former Utes' receivers Steve Savoy and Paris Warren were nice, but UF's receivers make Meyer's Utah wide-outs look and sound like Black Cat duds.

Warm up the cannons, align the mortars and prep the Molotov cocktails because the only team capable of stopping UF's attack is, well, UF (think inexperienced offensive line).

Don't get me wrong — Meyer's 2006 attack differs from his 2004 Utes rampage. The Gators will use a hybrid between the true spread and a traditional NFL offense.

You will have reverses, end-arounds (maybe Harvin and Fayson throw a pass or two?) and a myriad of schemes to stretch

the field from sideline to sideline and end zone to end zone. At the same time, you will continue to see Billy Latsko at full back and Tate Casey at tight end. And Meyer will ensure Leak relies on his drop-back passing strengths. It won't be until 2007 when UF's playbook is dominated by Tim Tebow option runs and passes.

However, this reality will not translate into inferior 2006 statistics or results. Like Meyer says: The spread offense is whatever your players do best. In this team's case, that means you will see 50-yard bombs to Cornelius and Caldwell instead of 40-yard scampers by Leak.

Offense is offense no matter how you get it. And with UF, you have enough weapons to irk the Department of Defense.
