




Biotech blows Bush away

Gov. Jeb Bush is a recently converted Gator fan — and not just because of UF's winning basketball team.

Bush, who visited Gainesville on Wednesday, said he became a UF fan thanks to the university's innovations in bioscience. He spent the day attending the grand opening of a UF research complex and giving a speech at a conference at the UF Hilton.

On Campus "This is a heck of a lot more exciting than an undefeated basketball team," Bush said at the opening of UF's new Cancer and Genetics Research Complex. "It just blows me away."

Although officials have been working at the new center for about four months, UF's vice president for research finally cut the ribbon on the \$84.5 million complex Wednesday afternoon.

Bush was invited because of his contributions to Florida's bioscience industry, which he worked to develop when the state's "economy was in a slight economic downturn" from its lack of tourism after Sept. 11, he said.

During his speech at the ceremony, Bush said UF's new complex is the biggest research building in the state of Florida — although its size will soon be surpassed by a research building in Palm Beach.

The complex boasts a five-story wing of the UF Shands Cancer Center and a six-story Genetics Institute wing, according to a press release.

Bush joked that while he could never explain the science behind the centers, he hoped their scientists could. In an

Survey's goal requires 7,000 more responses

An online Student Government survey about UF tuition policies has generated thousands of responses since it was released last week, the survey's designers said. But one survey official said the questionnaire's design could impact student opinions.

The survey, which was e-mailed to the entire student body, asks students for their opinions on tuition increases.

Student Body President John Boyles, who designed the survey with SG Cabinet member Ian Kaufer, will present the survey's results at the next meeting of UF's Board of Trustees on Nov. 30.

As of Tuesday afternoon, 3,300 responses had been submitted, Kaufer said. Boyles said his goal receiving 10,000 responses by Wednesday.

At the top of the survey is a list of five facts, which include information about UF's value as ranked by national publications. But an official in UF's Survey Research Center said the facts could "conceivably influence someone taking the survey."

Scott Richards, who coordinates programming and research at the center, said giving students information they may not have known could impact their opinions.

Boyles said the purpose of the introductory facts was to "inform students of issues surrounding (tuition increases)."

"When they are making these thoughts," Boyles said, "we want them to have the ability to be informed of these decisions."

Kaufer said he met with Chris McCarty, who directs the

GPD to purchase Segways for easier crowd navigation

Gainesville police officers may soon be using customized Segway Personal Transporters to uphold the law.

The city's Public Safety Committee decided on Wednesday to let the City Commission give final approval to spend

up to \$12,000 for two Segways for the police department.

"They are relatively cheap, and there's really no downside to them," said Capt. Rick Hanna at the meeting.

Police Chief Norman Botsford said officers needed a better way to move among large crowds downtown and at events like football games.

The city commissioners at the meeting

gave their approval with few questions.

Commissioner Jack Donovan asked, "Do they have sirens?"

Police Capt. Rick Hanna replied: "They will put anything on them that you want to pay for."

The Segways police officers hope to get are not ordinary units.

They are the specialized x2 Police edition, which have all-terrain tires and can be loaded with up to about \$3,000 in options on top of the suggested retail price of \$5,895.




State university board to vote on Machen's plan

UF President Bernie Machen's plan to tack \$1,000 a year onto students' tuition could take its first step toward approval at today's Board of Governors meeting. The Board of Governors will be voting for or against the plan.

Machen's Academic Enhancement Program, which is the first of its kind in Florida, aims to bypass state laws that prevent universities from setting their own tuition rates. He plans to use the additional money to hire faculty and advisers.

He will phone from Beijing — where he's promoting UF to international students — to make his proposal to the body that oversees the state's 11 public universities. He wrote in

an e-mail that he expects the board to approve his request. If the program is accepted, it will head to the Legislature for final approval by May.

Board of Governors Chairwoman Carolyn Roberts said she'll support the plan on two conditions. First, the money

must be put toward new advisers and faculty. Additionally, she said, students who can't afford the added expense shouldn't be forced to pay it.

The board will also consider authorizing each university to set a technology fee, which would be an annual charge capped at \$10 per credit hour. The money would go toward campus technology, but the Legislature must approve the program first.

'F Book' returns to popularity as historical guide to UF

■ **THE UF TRADITIONS BOOK HAS SOLD 900 COPIES.**

Apparently some traditions never die.

After more than 40 years, the "F Book" is back and working as a guide to the Gator Nation. A mixture of scrapbook and student

guide, the book outlines the basics of being a student at UF.

Although the book was given to all incoming freshmen during their Preview sessions this year, more than 900 copies of the book have been sold so far.

"Once we put it online, it really took off," said Brent Fisher, software manager at the UF Bookstore.

A portion of book sale proceeds will go to the Student Alumni Association scholarship fund.

The book includes five chapters covering topics like lost traditions, student life and modern traditions.

"As a piece of history, each 'F Book' tells us a lot about the student culture of the time," said UF Historian Carl Van Ness. "The world of a freshman prior to World War II was far removed from the students who came after the war and would totally seem alien to a student in 2006."

The 2006 edition marks the first time the book has been published since its publication was stopped in 1960, when the Office of Student Affairs started producing a student handbook instead.

Inspiration for the original "F Book" came from former Dean of Students Robert C. Beaty, who edited the Georgia Institute of Technology's "T Book" before he came to UF, Van Ness said.

The Alumni Association hopes

that future students will use the revived book as a way to enhance their UF experience.

"This is their initial link to the Gator Nation," said Laura Lentz, the UF Alumni Association's assistant director. "We currently are the only school in the country with a book as extensive as the 'F Book.'"

The "F Book" costs \$8.95 at the UF Bookstore. Students can receive a free book by joining the Student Alumni Association.





Firefighters in tune with instrumental tradition

■ FRIENDS, CO-WORKERS HONE PIPING SKILLS.

J.D. Perryman's face tightened as he filled his bagpipe with deep, long breaths.

His fingers squeezed and quivered from the force he put on the chanter, the recorder-like piece on which he played the melody, and a loud, sustained note bellowed and bounced off the fire station nearby.

Robin Hendrickson, Perryman's best friend and teacher, closed his eyes and dipped a finger into the top of the pipes to tune them.

"Ong-ong-ong-onnnnnn," he sung, helping Perryman find the note for his bass pipe.

For the two men, this was business as usual at the firehouse.

Perryman, 38, works as a firefighter at Gainesville Fire Rescue Station No. 2 on Archer Road, and Hendrickson, 50, is a program manager for Alachua County Fire Rescue. The two friends have played bagpipes together for three years.

"If I had to teach anyone, this would be the guy," Hendrickson said about Perryman. "A, he loves it. B, he feels the music."

The friends met in 2003 when Perryman attended a firefighter's funeral. For the ceremony's finale, a bagpipe rendition of "Amazing

Grace" was played through a boom box. Perryman wanted to give funerals the real thing.

He sought out Hendrickson, who at that time had 10 years of experience with the bagpipes, and begged him for instruction.

Three years later, the two are still practicing and playing as part of the Honor Guard, which plays for special events like the Firefighters Ball and funerals.

When the two play, they dress in full Scottish attire, including a Royal Stewart Tartan kilt and a black military tunic.

However, during practice, the two keep their normal clothes on in case the station is called for an emergency.

The two said bagpipes have been a firefighter tradition ever since Irish and Scottish immigrants began running fire brigades in the United States in the 1800s. The custom still stands today, although pipers are much less common.

The two practice at least once a week whenever Perryman's shift, 24 hours every three days, and Hendrickson's shift, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, coincide.

Each practice session consists of about an hour of practicing without the bag and about an hour with it. They explained that tuning the bagpipes is the longest and hardest part, especially in Florida where the heat and humidity can make the pipes unstable.

Perryman, an avid musician, still

has problems with the bagpipes after three years of practice.

"Here's a famous quote: It takes seven years to make a piper," Hendrickson said. "Piping's really a pain in the — it's really difficult."

Friends of the pair can attest to the difficulty of the bagpipes. They've listened to hours of the loud

noise the instrument produces.

"He walks around playing his flute for hours on end," said firefighter Rusty Barrett as he prepared the station's dinner of salad, steak and buttered potatoes. "We make some snide jokes, like, 'Here comes that piccolo player.'"

"Our wives aren't crazy about

it," Perryman said. "That's why we practice it together."

Perryman said Hendrickson is a very strict teacher. Once a lesson is mastered, Hendrickson quickly moves on to another part.

"The second he knows anything, I try and destroy him so he doesn't get a fat head," Hendrickson said.

SEC championship game tickets on sale Monday

■SOME ARE UPSET WITH UF'S TICKET ALLOTMENT.

On Monday, a blood-pumping, heart-pounding, sweat-pouring, reach-for-the-finish battle of the index fingers will begin at 6 p.m.

At that time, UF students with credit cards in hand can order tickets to see the Gators play in the 2006

Southeastern Conference Football Championship game — or attempt to do so. Only about 1,500 student tickets will be available.

According to student ticket manager Mark Gajda, the tickets will be sold for \$35 each through the G.A.T.O.R.S. automated ticket-sales phone system.

Students should be prepared to compete with about 35,000 others for a ticket, Gajda said.

Accommodating 99 people at once, and taking 2.5 to three minutes

per call, the phone service will sell all the tickets in about 3.5 hours.

"It's tougher because there are more people that want to go to a championship game, especially when our team hasn't been there in a number of years," Gajda said.

Belinda Luu, an economics junior, says she wants to go to the game but hadn't realized so few

student tickets would be sold.

"I think that's kind of ridiculous because there are 50,000 students at UF, and not very many people are going to be able to go," she said.

Patrick Rivas, an economics junior at UF, agreed.

Rivas said it isn't fair that UF only gets 1,500 student tickets. There are almost 50,000 undergraduate students at UF, compared to the University of Arkansas' roughly 14,000 undergraduates. So UF should get a bigger proportion of

student tickets for the championship game, he said. Rivas said he wants to buy a ticket but intends to sell it if he gets one.

"I would go, but no one else is going to be able to actually get tickets, so I'll probably end up selling it anyway," Rivas said.

Students, regardless of whether they are season ticket holders, may attempt to order one ticket by calling (352) 384-3262 or 1-877-428-6747 from 6 p.m. until the tickets are sold out.

States move toward mandatory HPV immunizations

A human papillomavirus vaccine that also helps prevent cervical cancer in women may soon become an immunization requirement for some school-aged children.

Recently, the Michigan Senate has approved Gardasil, made by Merck & Co. Inc., as a routine immunization for girls entering the sixth grade. Meanwhile, Florida has yet to consider making the HPV vaccine mandatory for schoolchildren.

"Florida has it on its agenda," said Anna Giuliano, an interdisciplinary oncology professor at the University of South Florida.

However, Florida still has to create legis-

lation and build up resources at the Florida Department of Health before the vaccine could become mandatory, she said.

"It hasn't been put forward in the Legislature," Giuliano said.

The main influence on state immunization laws comes from the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices, which consists of 15 experts chosen by the secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

"They're like an arm for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention," said Sherry Windham, immunizations program coordinator for the Alachua County Health Department.

"They'll make recommendations, and each state takes from that recommendation to

decide what's mandatory," she said. "It'll take several years for it to pass through, because you will have a lot of resistance by parents who don't believe their children will be sexually active."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that more than 6 million people in the United States are infected with

HPV every year.

HPV is the most common sexually transmitted infection in the United States today, according to the Food and Drug Administration.

Despite recommendations, the HPV vaccine isn't free. Currently, it is available at the UF Women's Clinic at \$120 per shot, and the procedure requires three shots over a six-month period. The vaccine is not available at the Alachua County Health Department.

Whether or not Florida becomes the next state to approve the vaccine for schoolchildren, Gardasil is still recommended by many health professionals.

"I definitely plan to acquire this for my 22-year-old," Windham said.

What election?

White House already back to its old tricks

Last week, George W. Bush held a press conference. He called the Democrats' election victory "a thumping" and promised to work with his opponents in Congress "to find common ground in the next two years." It sounded pretty good at the time.

Unfortunately, the president's flirtation with bipartisanship lasted about a week.

On Wednesday, he nominated John Bolton as ambassador to the United Nations, despite objections from Democrats — and a handful of Republican senators, one of whom said confirming Bolton would "fly in the face" of voters' wishes. But Bush didn't stop there.

He also nominated Kenneth Tomlinson for another term as chairman of the Broadcasting Board of Governors, which directs American TV and radio broadcasts overseas. A minor position, maybe, but Tomlinson doesn't deserve it — in 2004, he used the board's resources to run a private horse-racing operation out of his office.

That's right. Horse racing. But he's tight with Karl Rove, so why let a little thing like corruption stand in the way of another term?

Believe it or not, it gets worse. When the Senate Judiciary Committee reconvenes, Bush plans to renominate four judges the committee rejected earlier this year.

One of them helped the Pentagon finesse its way around laws prohibiting torture. Another is considered unqualified by the American Bar Association. And, of course, one of them is a lobbyist for the energy industry. These aren't just bad judges — they're awful.

In fact, Republicans on the Judiciary Committee have already said they won't be confirmed. So what's the point? It seems Bush is spoiling any chance of effective bipartisan government just for the hell of it.

If this week is any indication of how the White House intends to "find common ground" with Democrats in Congress, buckle your seat belts. The next two years could be a pretty bumpy ride.

Research roulette

For enterprising reporters, the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences is the gift that keeps on giving — every time it seems the CLAS debacle can't get any worse, it does. The administration is always standing by with some new scheme, some new bungle. You can set your watch by it.

This week, a member of the CLAS Assembly confirmed what we've long suspected — that UF expects CLAS departments to offset budget cuts with corporate research partnerships. Of course, there aren't many to be had for English and religion, two of the fields hit hardest by the five-year plan. That's what worries us.

Chemistry, psychology

and physics are moneymaking departments. They can rely on patents, research and other sources of income to stay afloat. But the humanities — English, history, foreign languages — aren't so lucky. They need university funding, and lots of it.

Unfortunately, it seems a well-rounded liberal arts education doesn't fit into UF's research-oriented, sink-or-swim mentality. That's a shame, because the humanities are as important now as they've ever been — and turning UF into a high-class vocational school would be a huge mistake.

When administrators talk about running UF like a business, we hope this isn't what they mean.

Press keeps military from doing its job

The press is an important institution. Those in power must have the consent of the governed, and the media keep the governed informed about the accomplishments — and the dirty secrets — of those in charge.

But the system isn't perfect. There are secrets the press can't find. Also, because of the benefits it gets from a major news story, the press may blow things out of proportion for the sake of business.

So you have to use your judgment and decide for yourself what really matters.

The biggest problem with the press, at least in America, has to do with war. War is a horrific undertaking in any circumstances, and people don't like to read about it. They become unhappy with their government and want the fighting to end.

So military leaders must choose tactics not for effectiveness and efficiency, but for how they'll play in the papers. It's a lose-lose situation — they take relatively ineffective action, and the headlines still aren't that great.

The result is a war that doesn't seem to go anywhere. The people are angry at the politicians for leading them into a conflict they see as pointless and interminable — but they never let the powers that be fight it the right way in the first place.

In this situation, we're unable to win. And since Vietnam, the first prolonged war to include a major media presence, we haven't.

This is our second try at a Gulf War, and while I believe we should be there, I also believe our leaders are too scared to do what is necessary to get the job done.

The kind of war we needed would have had a higher rate of casualties, but would be years shorter, with a much lower overall death toll and clearly accomplished goals.

That couldn't happen in modern America, because the path to such a victory is paved with gruesome headlines and gory pictures that we, the people, can't stomach.

So we vote in new politicians to bring our troops home. Many people have concern only for our brave soldiers when they make that kind of decision. But consider

the consequences.

As we leave Iraq — which we'll start to do in the next year — we show our enemies we won't fight a war, and that U.N. sanctions are meaningless. Celebrities and anti-war activists assure them that we will rein in the most technologically advanced military, with the most talented soldiers in the world, because the American people won't face war.

Bui Tin, the North Vietnamese officer who accepted surrender from South Vietnam, said: "Every day our leadership would ... follow the growth of the American anti-war movement. Visits to Hanoi (by American activists) gave us confidence that we should hold on in the face of battlefield reverses. We were elated when Jane Fonda ... said at a press conference that she was ashamed of American actions in the war and that she would struggle along with us."

It may be too late for Iraq, but America will have more conflicts to face. Think about what's at stake and whether we're demonstrating strength — or vulnerability — to those who would destroy us.

Column

What makes some stories news?

If you ever want to get a roomful of shy journalists to break the ice and start talking, bring up the topic of news judgment. The process of deciding what's news and what to prioritize in print is among the most vexing questions facing the media.

While the topic is always fodder for debate, six guiding principles have been codified into a set of commandments known as news values.

First, **proximity**. For the Alligator, this means covering stories that relate to campus issues at UF. Readers often ask, "Why does the Alligator ignore issues facing East Gainesville?" The answer is that the Alligator's focus is on the lives of students.

Next, **timeliness**. Breaking news or "hard news" better be in the paper the morning after it happens, because it spoils fast. But sometimes the Alligator doesn't hear about a story until too late. On other occasions, stories competing for the same limited space overshadow a scoop.

Then there's **prominence**. Alligator reporters will pat you on the back for the four touchdowns you threw in your flag football game — but the Sports page will actually write about UF quarterback Chris Leak's four.

Let's not forget **impact**. If your landlord raises your rent, the Alligator will sympathize with you. But if it's a trend across Gainesville, the Classifieds won't be the only section discussing it.

Of course, **controversy** is important too. The media love it. In a recent story, the Alligator incorrectly reported that no one showed up to protest Andrew Card's speech at the Stephen C. O'Connell Center. The College Democrats had staged a protest and were understandably upset by the omission. The mistake was unintentional — no red-blooded reporter would fail to capitalize on a good story.

Finally, there's **unusualness**. Dogs bite people

every day, but an old adage says, "When a man bites a dog, that is news."

Typically, the more aspects of news value a story has, the more likely it is to get printed. Take the Danny Rolling coverage, for example. It had all six.

There are also outside pressures that affect

news judgment. The Alligator, like most newspapers, aims to inform and entertain its audience. Generally, that means publishing what the public wants to read. But the Alligator can't shirk responsibility for occasionally telling readers what they should care about.

Take the Gainesville City Commission's recent hikes of landlord permit fees. The cost increase is likely to trickle down to student renters, so it's an important story. It's not sexy, but who else is going to tell UF students what they need to know?

While the Alligator often sets the agenda for what is news, it also reacts to what the public considers news.

After business lecturer John Hall behaved erratically during a class, some readers likened the Alligator's coverage of the story to kicking a man while he was down. But the buzz started on Web sites like CollegeHumor.com and YouTube.com before the Alligator jumped on the bandwagon.

News judgment is an important question at any newspaper. It's an ongoing challenge at the Alligator, so you can expect to hear more about it from me in the future.

STUDY ABROAD Students seek unique spots

Deciding what to pack can be a mystery. For just a few short months, Stephanie David will travel the countries of South America, and she knows she probably won't need her favorite red shoes or her closetful of clothing, because some days she will have to forfeit showers and clean clothes to experience another way of life.

David, a family, youth and community sciences junior, is just one of many students to study abroad in "nontraditional" countries, such as those in Latin America and Asia.

"I want to get back to the heart of what studying abroad is all about," David said. "Not that America is the same as Europe. I feel that South America is more challenging because it's so different."

More American students

like David are studying abroad for academic credit.

There has been a 144 percent increase during the past decade, according to Open Doors 2006, an annual report on international education released Monday.

The most popular destinations for UF students include Italy, the United Kingdom, France and Spain.

While the favored destinations are European, the demand for nontraditional countries has increased in recent years.

Students studying in Latin America constitute 14 percent

of students nationwide studying abroad, with Argentina seeing the largest increase — 53 percent, according to Open Doors.

Study abroad in Latin American countries is definitely a trend, said Angela Grindal, a UF study abroad adviser.

"Students go because there is a need for volunteers, for social justice studies and for medical studies in poor countries," she said. "Also, the cost is less expensive to go to Argentina than Western Europe."

Grindal said she estimates that about 50 percent of students studying in Latin America have already been to Western Europe.

Kirsten Eller, a UF study abroad adviser, said more people are also studying in Asia than in the past.

"People are realizing the business purpose," she said. "Chinese is spoken by a billion people."



AIDS speech to focus on cases in black women

More than 100,000 cases have been reported in Florida. That's not the number of cases of Gator fever, but something more serious — AIDS.

AIDS Address 2006, a UF event designed to inform students, faculty, health practitioners and the public about prevention programs, will be held today.

On **Campus** "Florida is consistently ranked in the top three states with new cases and overall cases of AIDS," said Brian Dodge, an assistant professor of public health programs.

The address, sponsored by the College of Public Health and Health Professions, will be held at 1 p.m. in Room G301 of the HPNP Complex.

Gina Wingood, associate professor at the Emory University Rollins School of Public Health and the Emory Center for AIDS Research, will speak.

Wingood's research focuses on prevention programs.

Dodge said Wingood will discuss the highest-ranking subgroup of HIV and AIDS cases: black women.

interview after the opening, he noted several achievements the state Legislature supported in the field of bioscience. It granted \$45 million to "advance research agendas at UF and FSU," he said.

Bioscience "puts the state in better shape, and UF is the centerpiece of that," he said.

Dr. Doug Barrett, UF's senior vice president for health affairs, said the new building epitomizes the "essence of collaboration" among scientists.

Bush said research initiatives need to continue "so Florida becomes the envy of the states."

"It looks really cool," he said.

Earlier that afternoon, at the 2006 BioFlorida

Conference at the UF Hilton, Bush discussed the importance of the bioscience industry in Florida. He addressed more than 400 public officials and representatives from bioscience companies, who dined on sirloin steak and Key lime pie before Bush spoke.

During his speech, Bush said he was proud of the great successes UF had achieved in biotechnology. That research field uses biology to manufacture drugs or other products.

He said most universities tend to "toot their horn louder than they need, but UF doesn't toot their horn loud enough."

"UF is a world-class institution and it's time to let the rest of the world know it," he said.

UF Survey Research Center, before distributing the surveys to make sure their statements were as unbiased and neutral as possible.

Richards said a way to avoid bias in the surveys is by using a "split sample." In a split sample, half of the surveys would be distributed with the fact list and half would not.

Kaufman said he originally planned to distribute the surveys using a split sample, but because of limitations with the online software used for the

surveys, he was unable to.

"While we did include (the fact paragraph), and we recognize there might be a little bias, we tried to include statements about tuition just to be able to provide some basic information about tuition rates and create

a neutral paragraph," he said.


Boyles said the statements are meant to educate students by providing "pieces on each side of the argument about tuition."

Boyles said the surveys allow students to voice their opinions on what they hope to gain from UF.



"It's like Ultra, but it's not that big," UF senior Scott Zeigler said. "It's kind of better that way. You can find your friends, and it's not as hectic."


As night fell, flashing glow sticks lit the air, and the main acts took the stage.



"The whole experience ends up being worth the trip," she said.





The old saying goes, "One person's trash is another person's treasure." But Alachua County Commissioners, the county's Office of Waste Alternatives and the Florida Museum of Natural History venture to say, "Why can't it be both?"

The eighth annual recycled art competition "Trashformations" will take place through Nov. 30 at the Florida Museum of Natural History.

For the contest, students in middle school, high school or college are invited to transform their trash into artwork by using any recyclable items and their own creativity.

Judging for each category is based on creative expression and the innovative use of recyclable materials. The entries must be composed of at least 70 percent reused or recycled items. Materials can include things like plastic bottles, PVC, cardboard, burlap, broken tiles, steel, copper wire and aluminum cans.

"No two entries are ever the same," said

Melissa Palmer, an Alachua County waste alternatives specialist and the event's coordinator. "We have had everything from banana trees to angels to mosaic busts in the past."

The judging, which will take place tomorrow morning, is mainly conducted by art professors, museum curators, art appraisers and gallery owners. An awards ceremony for the winners, their friends and their teachers will be held Friday from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.

About 40 students enter the competition each year, but more are expected to enter this year because it is the first year that middle schoolers can compete.

"I think this program is an excellent way for students and the public to see the value in trash, while giving the students a great opportunity to showcase their artistic talent in the community using nontraditional materials," said Palmer.

Although the deadline for submissions has already passed for this year, the competition is still an excellent opportunity for interested students and friends to marvel at the beauty of trash as it becomes art.

Cursive performs at UF, promotes religion-themed album

Omaha, Nebraska. It's the largest city in the Cornhusker State, a major supplier of steaks and the home of the College World Series of baseball. It seems an unlikely birthplace for some of the biggest names in indie music.

Cursive is just one band that's come out of Omaha — it stands among the likes of Bright Eyes and The Faint, among others.

But Cursive has certainly seen its fair share of the road, bringing its brand of thematic indie rock all over the nation and abroad.

Well into their fourth month of touring supporting "Happy Hollow," Cursive will come to Gainesville for a free show at the Reitz Union Rion Ballroom on Tuesday.

One-man band to jam at UF

Get ready to feel the grass between your toes and dance through a night of musical wonderment, because one-man jam band Keller Williams is coming to UF on Friday.

Make sure not to confuse him with Keller Williams the realty group, or Kellen Williams the overhyped guitarist known for his acoustic Ludacris cover songs.

Williams' latest album, "Grass," is different from his others. It is a bluegrass album he created with friends Larry and Jenny Keel. He said bluegrass and the music he plays live are "two totally different animals," so he is continuing his tradition of playing one-man shows.

Williams is known for the diversity of his musical skills, which range from an ability to mimic the flugelhorn vocally to a talent for making one guitar sound like 20 with his electronic looping skills.

"It'll have lots of instruments, lots of electronics, lots of attention deficit disorder stuff," Williams said of the show.

He chooses his set list from all of the songs from his 10-year career. He tries not to duplicate shows in the same city. He also never repeats a set two nights in a row for what he called "repeat offenders."

"College campuses often offer a happier, more energetic vibe because of the students," Williams said.

He explained that performing at a university is different from playing at other venues. He said that when he pulls up to a college campus, six or seven smiling students are waiting, eager to move

equipment — a sharp contrast to the "grumpy, old union workers" that often welcome him at other venues.

"Students are young and hungry," Williams said. "They want their minds fed with different beats and things."

That's one of the reasons Student Government Productions chairman Robbie Moreno chose Williams to play at UF for \$12,000.

Everyone respects a one-man band, and both the students and the community can appreciate Keller's music, Moreno said.

"Anyone who likes music can find something they like in Keller's music," Moreno said.

Ten years ago, Williams was playing 200 shows a year and was barely making ends meet. Now he plays 100 shows a year and has more free time to work on his music and spend time with his family.

Williams said that his quality of life is much better now.

Williams won't be sticking with the bluegrass theme for his next album, "Dream," due to be released Feb. 6.

He has been working on "Dream" for three years and is excited to release it.

Many of Williams' favorite artists, including Bob Weir, Bela Fleck and Jeff Sykes, will be joining him on the record.

Last month, SGP brought fellow jam band The String Cheese Incident to campus. Williams opened for them during the beginning of his career.

Moreno said that the hippie vibe of the shows so far this year is coincidental and that there is much diversity to come. He hopes to get as many students as possible to come to the free show Friday at 7 p.m. at Flavet Field.

UF suffering from turnover woes

■THE GATORS HAVE COMMITTED 56 TURNS IN THREE GAMES THIS SEASON.

The number of turnovers in each game reads like numbers on a lottery ticket.

22. 14. 20.

That's 56 turnovers the UF women's basketball team has committed through its first three games, including its opening exhibition loss to Team adidas/Premier Players.

While some mistakes are expected from a team featuring five freshmen and four sophomores, sloppy play will not cut it if the Gators anticipate earning consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2002.

Coach Carolyn Peck said that after facing a zone defense from North Florida, the Gators struggled in the first half against the man-to-man defense that Xavier brought.

She said her team is learning when players should cut and when to pitch the ball back outside to avoid turnovers from errant passes.

In order to improve the Gators' focus and turnover issues, guard Sha Brooks said that more inten-

sity is needed.

"It is a transition (for the freshmen)," Brooks said. "Of course we're going to have some games where we don't have intensity, but everybody has to be able to pick each other up. Intensity for us is very important because if one person is hyped and ready to play, it rubs off on everyone else."

FEROCIOUS DEPREE: Before the season started, junior Depree Bowden knew she'd be counted on for her defensive abilities. After two games, she is already meeting expectations.

Against UNF and Xavier, Bowden totaled eight steals. She is the Gators' third-leading rebounder at four per game.

Bowden was a starter for the Gators last year until she was replaced by Brooks early in the season.

Even though she mainly has been lauded as a defensive stopper, she's contributed offensively with 12 points per contest, second best for UF.

Bowden has shown little trepi-

dation in getting after the ball, as she has already collected several floor burns this year.

"She was all over the floor," Peck said. "We've got to get everybody playing with that intensity all the time."

Bowden tries to up the energy level every time she's out on the court.

"I'm just trying to bring up as much energy as I can," she said. "Anything I can do to just get pumped up because when we get pumped up, we get ready to play. And we need that every game."

INJURY UPDATES: Freshman Jennifer Mossor is still recovering from a stress fracture in her left foot, but Peck said Monday that Mossor is out of her boot and can now "do some things on the court."

Before the injury, Mossor was the leading candidate for starting point guard.

Senior Briana Phillips also tweaked her back in the second half against Xavier but should play this weekend in the Timeout for HIV/AIDS Classic.

Peck also said freshman LaToya Bullard, who has dealt with nagging issues with her back and hamstring, is day-to-day. Bullard had a strong collegiate debut last weekend as she helped the Gators run a faster-paced offense. Bullard is averaging 6.5 points, two steals and 20.5 minutes per game.

Bowden receives payout to bow out

■ BOOSTERS GAVE THE FIRED COACH \$537,500.

TALLAHASSEE — Florida State offensive coordinator Jeff Bowden received a \$537,500 payoff from the school's boosters to resign following several seasons of declining production.

The settlement was revealed Wednesday when the school released a copy of the agreement Bowden's attorneys reached with the university and its boosters. The resignation takes effect Nov. 26, a day after the season finale against UF.

Bowden — youngest son of Coach Bobby Bowden — retains his present \$141,000 salary until his contract expires next August. He then will receive annual payments of \$107,500 until August 2012.

The agreement was signed by Jeff Bowden. Also signing it was Andy Miller, president of Seminole Boosters, Inc., FSU president T.K. Wetherell and

Athletic Director Dave Hart Jr. Wetherell and Hart would not comment.

"It's not like we stand on the sideline on these things," Miller said. "What we try to do is provide the university, the people in charge of these decisions, with the resources to make the calls they need to make."

The agreement does not preclude Jeff Bowden from getting another job. He will still receive biweekly payments of \$4,135. It does preclude Bowden from suing the school.

When Siler was a freshman in 2004, he performed admirably in place of an injured Channing Crowder, eventually being named the top freshman in the Southeastern Conference.

Spikes hasn't played nearly enough to garner that kind of acclaim this year, but he has drawn rave reviews from the coaching staff, most notably for his ability to carry his 6-foot-3, 240-pound frame and still be extremely agile.

"I've never had (a linebacker) that size," Strong said. "He does a good job of carrying his weight, and he's a load in there."

Spikes, who called all of his family and friends thinking he'd be starting last week, is just happy to get his shot.

"They always say, 'Be accountable for your position,'" Spikes said. "I feel like whenever my number is called, I'm going to get in and get the job done as Siler would do. I feel like it's like high school: Just play ball. Just play."

Atkins of punching her and trapping her in his car for 20 minutes. No arrests were made, and Atkins asked for his release from the team. His request was granted.

* UF defensive tackle Steven Harris: Meyer suspended Harris from the season opener for violating team rules. Meyer also dismissed Harris from most of spring practice due to personal reasons. Harris' grades might have played a factor.

* Former UF defensive tackle Marcus Thomas: The senior's dismissal from the team prior to the Vanderbilt game ended a season-

long saga. Thomas tested positive for marijuana twice and was suspended a controversial total of three games. He went from being a team captain to off the team in a span of six days.

* UF wide receiver Nyan Boateng: Last week, a female UF student stabbed Boateng, according to a police report. Though the receiver denied the claim, he was indefinitely suspended from team activities. Meyer said Boateng would return this week.

From the outside, it appears that the players are mostly to blame, but don't let Meyer off the hook.

Meyer said he doesn't live in a sheltered world and knows what's going on.

But he has failed to nip this in

the bud. Instead, issues lingered and players made more poor decisions and received the same consequences — short suspensions for first-timers.

Yet fans still adore Meyer. In an alligatorSports.org poll last weekend, 73 percent of voters said they would rather have Meyer coaching UF than Steve Spurrier.

So why does Meyer still have a through-the-roof approval rating?

At 9-1, the Gators have clinched a berth in the SEC title game for the first time since 2000.

In another first since Spurrier left, the Gators will be in the BCS hunt after Thanksgiving.

In other words, it doesn't mean a thing if they still get that championship ring.

Moss suspended for game against Western Carolina

UF coach Urban Meyer announced Wednesday that starting defensive end Jarvis Moss has been suspended for Saturday's game against Western Carolina for an undisclosed violation of team policy.

"He's suspended for this game," Meyer said. "If he does everything right, he'll be back (for the Florida State game)."

Meyer refused to comment on why Moss was suspended but said he was disappointed with the lineman's decision-making.

"You really challenge and question how that can happen at this time of year," Meyer said.

Moss blocked a potential game-winning 48-yard field goal by South Carolina's Ryan Succop on Saturday.

Sophomore Derrick Harvey will likely take over for Moss at defensive end, with senior Ray McDonald at the other end spot. Seniors Joe Cohen and Steven Harris will probably start at defensive tackle.

Two weeks ago, defensive tackle Marcus Thomas was dismissed from the team.

Last Sunday, Meyer talked about

how proud he was of Moss.

"He had a lot of issues that probably won't ever be told unless he wants to tell them," Meyer said in his weekly teleconference. "He's a guy I like to have around my family. He's a guy I like to have in front of my defense. I couldn't say that a year and a half ago. He's a guy that had a lot of issues."

"I'm awfully proud he's on my team, and he's going to be a great success in life. He not only turned around his football (career), but his life."

NO-BRAINER: With the Gators' depth issues on the defensive line as of late, Meyer was toying recently with pulling the redshirt of freshman defensive tackle Lawrence Marsh.

A broken right hand that Marsh suffered on Tuesday made that decision a lot easier.

"It's almost for sure he's going to redshirt now," Meyer said.

Spikes making statement

■ THE FRESHMAN MAY START AGAINST WESTERN CAROLINA.

He announced his arrival as subtly as a freight train pulls into the station. And for the Southern Miss player who was in his path, it likely felt like he'd been hit by one.

With one crushing blow in early September, freshman linebacker Brandon Spikes made it known that he would be a force on the college scene after being a top-flight recruit and a U.S. Army All-American coming out of Shelby, N.C.

"First play — boom. Got the tackle." Spikes said. "And, I hit the guy and brought-it to him. Coaches kind of liked that, and the older guys really liked that."

Spikes was limited primarily to special teams duty through the meat of the Gators' season, but he has been called on in certain situations when players were injured or needed a breather. Most notably, Spikes

came in for junior Brandon Siler against South Carolina last Saturday after Siler's knee injury rendered him ineffective.

Spikes recorded three tackles, including a game-changing tackle for loss on South Carolina's final possession, as the Gators held on for a 17-16 win.

With Siler still banged up, Spikes might have to start Saturday against Western Carolina.

"He did a good job of going in place of Siler," UF co-defensive coordinator Charlie Strong said. "The thing he's done is he's worked and put himself in that position. ... I feel very comfortable with him starting Saturday. He understands the system and knows what we're trying to do."

Spikes' emergence has reminded some of another Brandon who stepped in to replace an experienced linebacker, and that would be the man he's replacing: Siler.

Wins no excuse for suspensions

But a two-week string of press releases concerning suspensions or dismissals looks to have been snapped.

Still, three days remain for the streak to continue.

After Wednesday's practice, UF coach Urban Meyer spoke about the one-game suspension of Moss, a defensive end, in terms of the UF program.

"It could be worse," Meyer said. "I can tell you the names of some schools that are really struggling. The Gators aren't. The Gators are going to go get their 10th win somehow. We're going to get our 10th win this week."

I could care less about how the Gators

will manage without Moss against an I-AA team that allows 200 rushing yards per game and has lost to

Elon and Liberty. The real problem is the exponentially growing number of off-field

incidents at UF.

The Kenneth Tookes-Dee Webb rifle episode in February served as a premonition instead of an isolated incident.

Since spring practice began, four other players have had disciplinary issues:

* Former UF cornerback Avery Atkins: He missed several practices during the spring due to personal matters. Later in June, the mother of Atkins' child accused
