



Gas tax passed; implementation date set

■ THE TAX WILL LAST 11 YEARS.

A 5-cent per gallon gas tax in Alachua County has been approved and an implementation date set.

In a 4-to-1 vote, Alachua County

Commissioners gave final approval to a 5-cent increase in the gas tax for the county Tuesday. County Commissioner Lee Pinkoson voted against the tax.

"I think we're making a mistake," Pinkoson said.

Pinkoson said a better tax would be a sales tax. He said an increase in sales tax in the county would raise more money.

However, Commissioner Rodney Long

said he approved the measure because it was a tax on people who use the roads the most.

"I drive an SUV. I should pay more," he said.

The 5-cent increase brings the total gas tax for the county up to 12 cents, the maximum allowed, according to

Mark Sexton, the spokesman for Alachua County.

The tax is expected to generate \$5.5 million annually and is set to last 11 years.

The money generated by the tax will be used for several transportation-related projects, such as repaving and resurfacing roads in the county and its cities.

Some of the Gainesville roads expected to benefit from the tax are Northwest 16th Avenue and Northwest 43rd Street.

No more land lines in dorms

The only use UF sophomore Pauletta Findlay found for the phones in the Jennings Hall dorm rooms last year was when she and her friends used them all simultaneously to call for tickets to Gators football games.

"I used to use all the phones off of the floor, especially when I went over my minutes," she said.

However, students living in residence halls won't be able to use Findlay's strategy after the break between summer terms.

Beginning Friday, phone lines will be removed from every dorm room on campus except for the rooms of resident advisers, said RA Nikea Aytes.

Aytes, a UF sophomore, will start as a Jennings Hall RA on Monday. She said the phone lines are being taken out due to lack of use.

"The residents I've talked to are not angry," she said. "They are just like, 'Why?'"

Aytes said all RAs are given a pager for emergency reasons, but the room phone will be used for backup.

"Whenever we are on call on weekends and nights, or if there is a lockout or emergency, the person at the front desk will call the room phone," Aytes said.

She said the cost of living in residence halls will supposedly go down, but Housing and Residence Education officials were unavailable for questioning.

Senior Marina Foote, an RA at Broward Hall, said most freshmen coming in summer B will not even

Starbucks taking over Java City

Mironack said an official date hasn't been set for the switch, but it will probably start at the end of summer or in early fall.


During that time, a temporary coffee kiosk in the food court would provide students with their caffeine fixes, he said.

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
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
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
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Crist cutting UF's tuition program could hurt CLAS

■ UF BUDGET CUTS COULD KEEP CLAS IN DEBT.

With an accruing \$4 million debt, financial difficulties are nothing new for UF's College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. But in the face of Gov. Charlie Crist's avowed veto of the Tuition Differential Program, things could go from bad to worse.

"It's hard to envision how you'd pour more resources into CLAS when you have problems throughout the entire university," said Faculty Senate Chairman Rick Yost. "The Five-Year Plan obviously doesn't go away."

But because Crist said he will veto the program, UF President Bernie Machen said serious budget cuts are in UF's future, which won't leave much wiggle room in CLAS' Five-Year Plan.

CLAS Interim Dean Joe Glover declined to comment.

The Five-Year Plan was put into

place September 2006 to mitigate some of CLAS' money problems by cutting funds from departments that don't provide much research revenue.

Yost said he had hoped the tuition increase would be the fix-it CLAS needed to hire more faculty.

Many of the overcrowded CLAS classes are needed to fulfill general education requirements for undergraduates, he said.

In a Board of Trustees meeting June 15, UF President Bernie Machen said UF would begin revising the budget with a hiring freeze.

Yost said faculty once looked forward to 9 percent salary raises with promotions, but those might no longer be possible. Scrapping those raises could put \$1 million to \$2 million back into the budget, he said.

Reba Bandyopadhyay, a UF astronomy professor, said CLAS

couldn't solve its debt by cutting from departments with less research revenue.

CLAS is the core of the university, she said, and cutting faculty positions will only perpetuate problems for students.

She said her ideas for reducing CLAS' debt, such as eliminating the Bright Futures Program and reducing student admissions, aren't popular.

But it's up to the state to decide Bright Future's fate, and Machen said cutting back on admissions would be a last resort.

Bandyopadhyay said UF isn't in a position to disregard last resorts.

"If we can't afford to have them in decent class sizes, and they can't graduate because they don't have the classes they need, we just shouldn't let as many people in," she said.

Professors call Moseley out on course pack investigation

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In an investigation dated June 1, 2006, then-Student Body Treasurer Ryan Moseley investigated 10 professors whom he cited as directly profiting from course pack sales to students.

But some professors said the report is inaccurate due to its lack of interviews with the professors investigated and the publishing company.

In a written statement, Keith Dungan, founder of Faulkner Press — the publishing company in question — stated that Moseley's report was also inaccurate because he failed to contact his company for correct information.

"It is regrettable that Mr. Moseley, in the course of his investigation a year ago, did not see fit to pick up the telephone and contact any of the professors named in the report," Dungan wrote. "If Mr. Moseley had conducted

a proper investigation, or if Mr. Moseley had simply double-checked his own arithmetic, he could have reduced the number of inaccuracies which his report contains."

But Moseley, who is serving as Student Body President, said he never said it was a complete report, but simply a collection of data to expose the UF administration to student complaints about the prices of course packs, he said.

Usually the packs are required materials for a class that feature the professor's syllabus, readings, test-taking programs and more. But because some contain a one-time access code, students cannot reuse them or sell them back to bookstores.

Moseley said his main interest with the report was making sure the opportunity to take required tests was available to all students.

UF regulations state that all required course materials must be available to students for free in some form, such as through course reserves

or WebCT.

Students with financial problems must have the same opportunities to access required information or assignments.

Marc Hoit, interim associate provost for UF's information technology department, said the trouble with placing the packs on WebCT is that other universities without the WebCT program can't utilize the packs for their classes.

"It's like a Mac and a PC," he said. "If you write a program for one, you can't really use it for the other system."

He added that when the packs are placed

on CDs, the program is ideally accessible from anywhere and can easily be sold to other universities.

UF regulations allow for professors to profit from course pack sales at other universities but not sales from UF students.

Problems arose through disclosure forms that professors are required to fill out describing any conflicts of interest, including financial ones, such as profitable gain from their students through the sales of course packs or text books.

However, Angel Kwolek-Folland, interim associate provost, said the few professors who have been found profiting from their course materials were simply unaware of UF's regulations.

UF Provost Janie Fouke said she agreed Moseley's report was incomplete, but was also previously under the impression that regulations were simply not being uniformly followed.

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First stage of GPD expansion nearing completion

■ THE PLAN FOCUSES ON COMMUNITY SERVICES.

The Gainesville Police Department GPD has taken on an expansion project to improve its community-oriented policing, the first of its kind on this scale, said Sgt. Art Adkins, head of the Administrative Support Unit.

Capt. Tony Jones, community relations coordinator, agrees.

"There are not many programs of its kind out there," Jones said.

The new building is almost completed as the first part of this major expansion. They hope to be moved into their new quarters by the middle to end of next month, Adkins said.

The unit will move to the old Walker Building, which is next to the current GPD facility on Northwest Eighth Avenue. The building has been under construction for about a year, including blueprints and the actual work, he said.

The only things that remained the same in the building

were the existing walls and the roof support, he said.

The first leg of the new expansion is estimated to cost \$1.5 million. By the time the whole expansion is done, the total project cost is estimated at \$10 million.

The project is the largest expansion project undertaken by the City of Gainesville in the last 15 to 20 years, Adkins said.


The master plan will include eight new programs that allow for a foundation for mediation or a neighborhood advisory board, Jones said.

At the June 12 Student Senate meeting, Capt. Rick Hanna described a new training facility being developed as part of the expansion.

Hanna, project manager for the facility, said it will feature computer classrooms, a defensive tactics lab and training areas designed as residences, schools and hotels.

Jones said, "[This project] means greater services that we will be able to offer the community."

Course reserves to go online

A new system to make it easier for professors to provide information to students about their classes was tested this week with rave reviews.

The new system, called Ares, allows library staff to receive requests from UF faculty to pull information, such as textbook chapters, journals and articles that are on reserve in the library, for their classes.

Students can then view materials their professors have placed on reserve through personal accounts online, said Michelle Foss, the head of Interlibrary Loan and Course Reserves.

One professor wrote a note to library staff saying he never used the old course reserves system, Docutek, because he didn't want to have to go into the library. Now that there is the new online system, he is on board.

"He called the system 'seductively easy,'" Foss said. "If someone who has never used it before says that, we are pleased."

Other features of Ares include message boards for students and professors to communicate and a direct link to the Copyright Clearance Center to ensure UF libraries are in full compliance with copyright regulations, said Judith Russell, dean of university libraries.

Professors can also upload their own material, and students will receive e-mail notifications when the materials have been posted.

All faculty and students can create accounts using their UFID and password, regardless of whether they had a Docutek account, Foss said.

Funding for Ares is part of the libraries' budget, and there are two full-time staff members and three graduate students who maintain the system, Russell said.

A series of training sessions for faculty is scheduled through June and August, said Barbara Hood, public information officer.

Faculty members who are not able to attend one of the sessions can view a one-minute training video at <http://ares.uflib.ufl.edu>.

"We are very excited to offer this service to the faculty and students," Foss said. "It's easy to use and has all the features we need."

Multicultural groups get secretary



Minorities see rise in sunburn rate

Stanley Norwood is constantly in the sun due to his job as a UF Physical Plant groundskeeper.

Norwood, a black man, usually gets sunburned twice a year on his arms and feet, but instead of using sunscreen, he only wears a hat.

"Wearing sunscreen is just something that isn't on my mind," he said.

But according to a study released by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, it should be.

The frequency of sunburns in minorities has increased, with more blacks and Hispanics reporting getting sunburned than non-Hispanic whites.

The CDC study, conducted in 1999, 2003 and 2004, showed that 45.6 percent of Hispanics and 50.4 percent of blacks reported having one sunburn the preceding year, while only 35.6 percent of non-Hispanic whites did.

"I think the rise of sunburn rates in minorities might be because anti-sunburn information and commercials are aimed more toward Caucasians, who are more victims to sunburns traditionally," said Maureen Miller, health educator for the Student Health Care Center at UF.

She said anti-sunburn information and products need to be more tailored toward dark-skinned individuals because they don't see it as an issue.

UF sophomore Ashley Scott, who is black, never wears sunscreen, but she admits she has burned a couple of times in the past.

"Since I'm dark-skinned, the thought of getting sunburned rarely crosses my mind, and it's too late when it does," Scott said.

Junior Pricila Perez is from Miami and is of Panamanian and Cuban descent. She knows the risks of skin cancer, she said, and in addition to using sunscreen, she also wears hats.

"I apply sunscreen almost every time I go out," Perez said. "I'm protecting my skin now so that I can have healthy skin in the future."

Ah, break week. We've been looking forward to you for so long. Summer A finals and papers are coming to a close, and we can finally kick back, turn up Avril Lavigne's new CD (although Sk8er Boi is still our favorite song) and relax. But before you completely blow out of town for the beach or a bar or a bigger city, take a few minutes and enjoy this farewell edition of...

Darts & Laurels

We open with a the-party's-over DART to professors who profit from selling their coursepacks to UF students, which is prohibited by UF law. But somehow, a handful of professors sidestepped the rules. It's just cruel and unusual punishment for these professors to get cash in their pockets from their monopolies over students' course material choices. What kind of lesson does this teach us? That some people in this world are greedy. Hopefully the report recently released by Student Body President Ryan Moseley, who began the investigation when he was treasurer, will mean sayonara for professors' ill-gotten gains.

And here we have an it's-about-time-poor-grades-got-the-boot LAUREL to the UF Board of Trustees for approving a regulation which will require all Student Government-funded organizations' officials — including student senators and the executive board — to maintain a minimum of a 2.5 grade point average, up from the past requirement of a 2.0 GPA.

Some Student Body leaders in recent memory have had trouble keeping their grades up — and have lost their positions because of it. You may remember former Student Body Vice President Lydia Washington and Treasurer Lindsay Cosimi stepped down because of academic reasons. All SG leaders should remember they are here for an education, not to pad their resumes. Their class work should be their first priority. If our leaders can't handle a 12-page paper, how can we trust them with SG's \$12 million budget?

Here's a can-you-hear-me-now LAUREL to UF dorms for getting rid of in-room phone lines. Only resident advisers would still have active phone lines in their rooms in case of emergencies. But RAs aren't around all the time and cell phones don't always work, so steps need to be taken to ensure everyone's safety.

And let's face it: No one used them anyway, in this age of cell phones and Instant Messaging. This should save UF a ton of money — with 3,453 dorm rooms on campus, that amounts to a lot of lines. It's only fair, however, for those savings to be passed on to students in the form of lower rent.

Up next, it's a good-bye-coal-hello-cleaner-power LAUREL to the Gainesville City Commission for voting to receive proposals for the creation of a biomass fuel-powered plant. The last thing this city needs is a smoke-belching coal-fired plant, a technology that is outdated and decidedly un-green. We're proud to live in a city that keeps its residents' and the environment's best interests in mind.

But then we have an adios-dinero DART to the Alachua County Commission for approving a countywide 5-cent gas tax, which will be implemented Jan 1. The tax, which is expected to generate \$5.5 million a year for 11 years, is probably not high enough to generate the money necessary for repairing the county's pothole-ridden roads. And it definitely isn't high enough to influence people to drive less.

Gainesville would only receive 38 percent of that money — even though Gainesville almost certainly has a higher percentage of the street strife. Hell, University Avenue alone could use that much money in repairs. If the county is serious about fixing the roads, it's going to take more than five cents per gallon.

Crist should take a cue from Britain

With Gov. Charlie Crist's looming veto of the Tuition Differential Program, things are getting increasingly complicated. The blame and anger for last year's budget cuts inflicted on the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences was usually reserved for UF President Bernie Machen. But with stubborn Crist in Tallahassee, Machen seems to be the university's closest ally.

As a result of the cutbacks, I have to deal with angry students who do not have summer library privileges because they are not currently enrolled in classes. I am not sure who to point the finger at, UF's administration or Crist.

When Machen made the assertive comment, "They ought to give me more money, I don't care how they do it," I loved his determination, but the stench of greed was inescapable.

As tends to happen repeatedly in politics, this is a choice between the lesser of two evils, and next to Crist, Machen becomes our hero.

From speaking with students and reading local newspapers about the topic, students are heavily in favor of a tuition increase as long as we see results in the classroom.

Former Student Body President John Boyles wrote a highly persuasive article in May printed in The Gainesville Sun and other Florida newspapers. Urging Crist and students to support the Tuition Differential Program, he cited many of the typical arguments for the increase, including the need for more advisers and classes. Student Body President Ryan Moseley supports the increase as well.

With legislators in Tallahassee also putting up a fight, Crist is alone on this one. It has become the people against Crist, and we won't back down. But Crist claims

that he is working to protect the people — or his constituents anyway — from high tuition.

In light of recent international political history, this situation is a bizarre political *deja vu*. If you are up to date on your British politics, you can't help but notice the irony.

In 2004, British Prime Minister Tony Blair created a great deal of trouble in the UK with his proposed tuition increase for university students. His proposal for "top-up fees" was very similar to the Tuition Differential Program — its goal was to increase funding for faculty, class offerings and facilities. Yet Blair's adversaries and constituents adamantly opposed it.

Those most angry about the fees were those who would most benefit: university students. Students thought the increase in tuition would prevent those in lower-income brackets from attending college, an argument similar to Crist's.

According to a 2006 article in the UK newspaper The Independent, after years of falling budgets, universities are finally getting more money since the top-up fees were introduced. Although the first year after the fees were implemented showed a slight drop in student numbers, ultimately there has been an increase since the bill was passed.

Blair was right to increase tuition. Now if only Crist would be as reasonable. Crist's arguments against the tuition hike are half-baked. He is fighting not only students, the media and legislators in Tallahassee, but history as well.

Program for visually impaired rewarding

I appreciated the article in Tuesday's Alligator by Jennifer Bingaman about the blind students rock climbing. This summer program is put on by the Division of Blind Services in Gainesville.

Every summer, the Division of Blind Services (DBS) coordinates a Summer-Transition Employment Program (STEP) for high school students who are blind and visually impaired. This year our program will run from June 16 through June 22. It is designed to provide blind and visually impaired high school students with the skills and experience needed to prepare for the world of work and independent living.

STEP takes into account each student's individual needs based on a comprehensive assessment of their skills and career interests. The program has been developed to be ongoing, and students may return each summer through graduation. Along with receiving skills training, students have an opportunity to participate in real work experiences.

As the STEP liaison, I have been involved in the planning of our summer program with one of our local vision teachers, Susie Breier. We have also contracted with a local orientation and mobility instructor, Eric Hicks. We are excited about running our week-long program in the UF dorms for the fourth summer. Our high school students will stay for a week, giv-

ing us the opportunity to provide a variety of activities. Students will have leisure activities as well. They will prepare meals, do laundry and learn to get along with each other in close living quarters.

This is a great program, and I am pleased to be involved with STEP. These opportunities provide students with the experience and confidence needed to be successful in the workforce while living an independent life as they transition from school to work.



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

realize that phone jacks used to be in the rooms.

Milan Patel, a student from Tallahassee who will be starting at UF in the fall, heard about the change from a friend at UF. Patel, who will be staying in Graham Hall, called the line removals a disruption of privacy.

"I don't like it," the future chemical engineering major said. "That means you have to give your cell phone number to everyone."

Another incoming freshman from Tallahassee, Sean Logan, said the change is unsafe. Logan will be living

in Simpson Hall in the fall and was here Monday for Preview.

"If your cell phone wasn't working, you would have no way to call for a medical emergency," he said.

Foote said in the case of an emergency, students are more likely to get an RA for help instead of calling 911 on their land lines.

On Campus "In emergency situations, that's what RAs are for," she said. "They have the appropriate protocol."

Senior Chris Rokicki, the hall director of Weaver Hall, said community phones would remain in each living area, but keeping a landline in each room is too big a cost.

It brings to mind success, and "it's a good feeling," Tucker said.

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
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

"SHOUT! The Mod Musical" will be running at the Hippodrome until July 1.

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
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The Shamrock shuts down taps

The Irish pub will relocate downtown — renamed

A wooden sign at The Shamrock Irish Restaurant and Pub engraved with the Irish greeting "Céad míle fáilte" — a hundred thousand welcomes — was taken down from its place on the wall behind the bar Thursday night.

A queue of patrons mourned the pub's final evening and lined up to give owner Paul Brophy a hug. Others belted karaoke tunes out wistfully, such as "Lean On Me," symbolizing the end of an era for the popular neighborhood hangout.

The Shamrock has closed its location on West University Avenue and will be reincarnated downtown with a new name: Brophy's Irish Pub. The new location will be in an unused retail space on the bottom floor of a city-owned parking garage, at Southwest Second Street across from Market Street Pub.

On Thursday, loyal customers packed the pub, spilling out onto the sidewalks as The Shamrock opened for the last

time. Sandwiched between a left-wing bookstore and an authentic Lebanese restaurant two blocks from campus, the bar was an easy stop coming from UF or downtown Gainesville.

"Location's everything. This was a place where unique people could come together and just be a family," said Adam Lishawa, a customer of the pub.

The bar hosted an ensemble of patrons as diverse as the neighborhood itself.

"Here we have an eclectic crowd," Brophy said. "We're hoping to have the same thing down there."

Family Ties

The Shamrock's tight-knit atmosphere reflected the fact that it was very much a family business. Brophy and his wife, Noeleen — the bar's owners — relocated to Gainesville from Dublin in the 1990s with their six children and have operated the bar since 2000. All of the Brophys' children have worked at the bar during

the last seven years.

"It was a safe, relaxing place. The bartenders and the regulars knew each other on a personal basis," said David Anastis. "It was like friends getting each other drinks."

Noeleen Brophy recalled that before the pub first opened, her children and some friends they recruited painted the pub's cinder block walls the emerald green color that covers it today. Customers pitched in to clear empty glasses off the bar and clean up on busy evenings, such as The Shamrock's annual St. Patrick's Day celebrations, she said.

Irish Roots

Brophy's Irish Pub will have more of the feel of a traditional Irish pub than The Shamrock did. It will feature a bigger interior space, finished hardwood floors, wood trim, booths seating up to ten people each, a longer bar and will offer a wider selection of beers, Brophy said.

"Everything will be brand, spank-

ing new except for the people," said Brophy's son, Ciaran Brophy. The new pub will still have many of the features that made The Shamrock a hit, such as free wireless internet, live music, karaoke and a patio setting for outdoor socializing.

It will still be open seven nights a week, the same crew will tend the bar, but the new location will have a smaller kitchen and will offer a more limited dining menu, Brophy said.

Brophy's Irish Pub will contribute to and feed off of Gainesville's busy downtown nightlife scene. No specific date is planned for the opening of Brophy's, but the owners expect it to take place within the next month as work is still being done on the interior decorations.

A new bar and restaurant will open at the now former location of The Shamrock on West University Avenue.

Although many patrons lamented The Shamrock's closing, there was also enthusiasm for the new pub.

"This was a comfortable place to drink with an intelligent crowd. The drinks are well priced," Mike Dewitz said. "This whole atmosphere is amazing. I'm going to do everything I can to support this place."

"It's sad to see it moving downtown, but that's not going to stop us from coming," Joe Rosen said.

Freshen decor for new season

College students experience terminating leases as often as new classes, from the dorms to a corporate apartment to that dream house in the student ghetto.

With a new place only a semester away, a little time and money can contribute to a more positive living experience.

Warning: Landlords usually have very strict rules on what is permitted and not permitted on the property.

"I run into the same problems because it's the first time most of them (students) have lived on their own," said Nancy Batey, landlord of Oak Haven Apartments in Gainesville.

Once the rules have been addressed, it's time to let the creative juices flow.

To save money on furniture, students can shop at Wal-Mart, Target, TJ Maxx, arts and crafts stores and thrift stores, said Linda Cox, an art and design specialist at Michaels, an arts and crafts store in Butler Plaza.

To create a theme or just add a

bit of color, Cox suggested hanging up decorative beach towels instead of posters. Towels and flags can also be used as curtains if hung vertically with clothespins.

"You don't want to get curtains that you can only use on a certain window," she said. "The idea is to buy things that you can still use after you move out."

Personalizing a room can also help a student call it home. Make copies of your favorite pictures — this will prevent damage to the originals — and create a mural or a collage. Or just hang the prints by clothespins on a clothesline, Cox said.

To temporarily affix items to the walls, students should use sticky substances or hooks that will detach without damaging the wall.

Camille Rusch, a UF junior in interior design, said she sympathizes with the need for a creative outlet.

"It seems like an obvious topic, but it can be hard for some to be creative and to be cheap," Rusch said.

Tenants can unleash their inner artist by drawing with colored chalk, which washes off most surfaces, or putting up paper on a wall, she said.

Plants can bring fresh colors and aromas, so buying new decor may not be necessary. Cox said that many students don't realize what they leave home.

During her college days, Cox said she made a desk by using an upside-down snack tray as a tabletop over a stack of cheap storage bins.

"You'd be surprised with what you can do with your imagination when you learn to look at things a new way."

Although it was a four-day festival, there wasn't peace and quiet yet on day five of the Bonnaroo Music and Arts Festival.



The Santa Fe Community College student stayed behind to catch the Sunday headliners The White Stripes and Widespread Panic.


The 80,000 allotted tickets were oversold and this year was of the most successful festivals said Ken Weinstein of Big Hassle Media.

Longest day of summer today; shorter nights to follow

It's hot. It's sticky. It's Gainesville, and it's the summer solstice.

Today is a significant day for the sun, the Earth and plenty of cultures and religions.

But try telling that to Milap Patel, a UF freshman who will not be celebrating the dawn of summer.

Patel, 18, crunches calculus problems in Little Hall inside a classroom without air conditioning.

The physics student does not

have warm feelings for the heat.

“I'm just dreading what's to come,” he said. “It already seems like the middle of summer.”

Today is the longest day of the year in the northern hemisphere, said Francisco Reyes, an associate scientist at UF.

Nights will become shorter, and sweltering daylight hours seem to endlessly drag on because more direct sunlight beams down, he said.

During this time of year, the sun is navigating from the southern hemisphere to the northern hemisphere.

Locations south of the equator, such as Australia, are experienc-

ing the beginning of winter, while spots in the northern hemisphere, such as the United States and Europe, spring into their summer, he said.

Mike Barker, 27, a UF graduate student, said there are four solar episodes that split the year into different seasons: the summer solstice, autumnal equinox, the winter solstice and the vernal equinox.

The tilt of the earth, which causes seasons to change, is about 23 degrees. This tilt remains fix-

ated on the North Star 365 days a year.

Two days of the year, during the spring and fall equinoxes, the sun

will rise and set at its most eastern and western locations. This makes the day and night nearly equal in length, Barker said.

During today's summer solstice, the sun will appear and disappear over the horizon at its most northern points.

Rising at 6:29 a.m., the sun will

a haze of dust around scuffling feet.

But he said he would do it again because, “Bonnaroo was just that great.”

Against the Machine's Tom Morello in the Tool song “Lateralus.”

“It really blew us all away,” Thomas said. “Nobody knew that was going to happen, and it was exactly what everyone wanted to hear. I have never heard a crowd cheer that loud.”

Thomas said he had been to three other Tool shows including last summer's performance at Coachella, a festival in California.

The other major attraction was the much-anticipated reunion tour of The Police.

The Police performed Saturday night, kicking off bands such as Gov't Mule and The Flaming Lips.

Wayne Coyne, lead singer for The Flaming Lips, said this was the smoothest Bonnaroo yet because of the great weather. The farm stayed dry almost all weekend, only raining lightly for a few minutes Friday evening.

But festival attendees would have liked to see a little rain.

It was extremely hot, reaching temperatures in the high 90s, and the dryness kept

make its slow journey across the sky, and then finally sink at 8:32 p.m.

In a land-locked city such as Gainesville, it can be hard to appreciate rising temperatures. The average high for the month of June is 90 degrees, according to MSN's Web site.

Holloway believes the transition will be a smooth one.

“I worked with the girls when Coach Jones passed away, and it was a rough transition at first,” Holloway said. “We have very different coaching styles, Coach and I. But the girls began to adapt and warm up to me, then we were able to do some great things.”

“I’m excited about working with them, and I think they’re excited about working with me. They just want to be one of the best programs in the country, so we’re on the same page with that.”

Holloway said coaching both sides

will have its benefits. The athletes will be able to profit from more specialized training and individual attention.

His style is highlighted by a self-proclaimed aggressive approach and a heavy emphasis on practice.

Track coach to take on double duty

■ HOLLOWAY WILL COACH BOTH THE MEN'S AND WOMEN'S TEAMS.

After the death of UF women's track and field coach Tom Jones in March, Athletics Director Jeremy Foley knew he would have big shoes to fill.

On Tuesday, the search ended here in Gainesville when Foley announced that Mike Holloway — the current men's coach — would assume the coaching role for both programs.

"When we set out to find a coach to lead our women's program, we knew that we already had a special candidate right here in Gainesville with Mike Holloway," Foley said. "Mike has shown the ability to mentor world-class athletes on the men's side, and we strongly believe he will do the same with our women's program."

Holloway becomes the first head coach in school history to take the reins for both programs.

Additionally, he is the ninth head coach of a women's program that dates back to 1973.


For Foley, the decision came after realizing 13 of the last 16 NCAA indoor and outdoor titles were won by combined programs.

"We took a look at the situations of the other top track and field programs across the country and realized that combining our men and women's programs gives us the best opportunity to be successful," Foley said.

Holloway's résumé is a strong one. In the last nine years, he has led UF athletes to 12 NCAA titles and witnessed 14 school records in the indoor and outdoor events of 400 meters or less.

Holloway expressed confidence in his ability to lead both programs and said the job offer came as no surprise.

"I was aware of the opportunity, and I'm very excited," Holloway said. "I think it's a wonderful opportunity, and I'm ready to turn my attention to the UF track program as a whole."

Basketball team makes trip to White House

The Gators men's basketball team was one of 28 NCAA championship teams honored on the White House South Lawn on Monday.

The championship teams spanned eight athletic conferences, 14 states and 21 schools.

The Gators presented the nation's 43rd president with

a No. 43 UF basketball jersey and took a team portrait with him.

While Coach Billy Donovan and Assistant Coach Lewis Preston made the trip, there were several familiar faces missing, notably the '04s.

After winning their second consecutive national cham-

ionship, UF juniors Joakim Noah, Al Horford, Corey Brewer and Taurean Green decided to forgo their senior seasons and move on to the NBA.

Brewer, Horford and Noah are expected to be top-10 picks in next Thursday's draft.

With the stars of the past two seasons working out this summer to improve their draft stocks, Walter Hodge, Dan Werner, Jonathan Mitchell, Marreese Speights, Jack Berry and Brett Swanson were on hand to soak up the spotlight.



Why he'll go early: Horford appears to be the most NBA-ready of UF's draft-eligible players, and he is one of the safest picks in the entire draft. He is an excellent rebounder, runs the floor as well as any big man in the draft and has strong shot-blocking skills. He has an improving offensive game in the low post, draws a lot of contact and finishes well. He is a good passer, and Billy Donovan praised him constantly on his coachability, basketball IQ and work ethic.

Why he'll fall: While Horford is a great bet to be a solid NBA player, he doesn't have the superstar upside teams may want from a top-five pick. His free throw shooting is below average, and his jump shot could use some work. He also has a tendency to disappear at times.

Brewer also moves well without the ball, and he is tough to guard off of screens. His jump shot improved every season in Gainesville.

Why he'll fall: Brewer has been trying to bulk up, and he desperately needs to do so to be a factor in the NBA. He needs to work on his jump shot, as he is a very inconsistent outside shooter. He often makes poor decisions. He has horrible ball-handling skills for a swingman and turns the ball over far too much.

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
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
