Obama sworn in as 44th U.S. president

WASHINGTON — Before a jubilant crowd of more than a million, Barack Hussein Obama claimed his place in history as America's first black president, summoning a dispirited nation to unite in hope against the "gathering clouds and raging storms" of war and economic woe.

On an extraordinary day in the life of America, people of all colors and ages waited for hours Tuesday in frigid temperatures to witness the moment as a young black man with a foreign-sounding name took command of a nation founded by slaveholders. It was a scene watched in fascination by many millions — perhaps billions — around the world.

"We gather because we have chosen hope over fear, unity of purpose over conflict and discord," the nation's 44th president said.

The presidency passed to Democrat Obama from Republican George W. Bush at noon, marking one of democracy's greatest gifts: the peaceful transfer of power.

But a stark transfer all the same. In one of the new administration's first acts, Obama ordered federal agencies to halt all pending regulations until further review — this after Bush's final weeks raised heated debate over rushing new rules into effect on the way out the door.

Obama plunges into his new job in earnest on Wednesday, meeting with his economic team and Iraq advisers while Congress gives his economic revival plan a going-over and takes up the nomination of Hillary Rodham Clinton to be secretary of state. Her confirmation has been held up for now by Republican concern over the foundation fundraising of her husband, the former president.

The new president had been buoyant and relaxed through the three days of pre-inaugural festivities. But he seemed somber as he stood on the Capitol steps, placed his left

UF students pack Orange and Brew for inauguration

As millions of people gathered in the nation's capital to hear the voice of America's new president, about 100 students packed UF's Orange and Brew Tuesday to celebrate the Inauguration

Ceremony from afar.

Students began camping out for the event around 11 a.m., staking claim to the tables, couches and floor spots with a good view of the projector screen.

The mood was festive, and students munched on chips and cookies while some posed next to an Obama cardboard cut-out

near the entrance.

As the room packed tight, backpacks littered the floor and attendees shed their coats and hats.

Erin Bouldin, a UF professor in the department of epidemiology and biostatistics, said she's hopeful for what Obama can bring to the

country.

"It's just really exciting. I'm happy," she said.

"I think he'll do great things, but even if he doesn't, I'm happy that we have the opportunity to feel this unity."

Allyson Hall, a UF professor in the department of public health and health professions, sat on the

floor near the restaurant's stage, texting a friend in Washington, D.C.

Hall said she worked with the Obama campaign but has followed Obama's journey for years.

"This is an awesome moment,"

Mom says car stolen with boy inside

LONGWOOD, Fla. (AP) — A woman whose son was found outside a Longwood home told authorities that her car was stolen with the child inside it when she quickly ran back inside her house.

According to a 911 call released Monday, 24-year-old Julinia Moreno told emergency officials that the errand took "five seconds." Investigators had originally said Moreno left her son in the car while she went to a party at an Altamonte Springs house.

Moreno's son was found in the yard of a Longwood home. He was crying, cold and soaking wet.

Mich. police: Boy, 8, spent 10 days with dead mom

ROMULUS, Mich. (AP) — An 8-year-old boy lived for more than a week with the body of his dead mother before telling a concerned shopkeeper his mom was "in a better place," police said.

The woman, 41, apparently died Jan. 9 in their apartment in the Detroit suburb of Romulus, and the boy survived in part by eating dried rice, butter and flour, authorities said.

Police did not release the names of the mother and child, who moved from Louisiana after surviving Hurricane Katrina in 2005. Foul play was not suspected in the woman's death.

Lee Saco told The Associated Press that the boy and his mother came into Romulus Liquor regularly for about a year and a half. But four times during the past

week the boy walked about a block to the store by himself.

"I questioned him, 'Where is your mom?'" Saco said about the boy's first solo visit, in which he bought snacks with cash.

Saco, who co-owns the store with his brother Sam, said his concern heightened on Monday when the boy tried to buy \$40 worth of grocery items with his mother's credit card. Saco then asked the boy if he could speak to his mother.

"Is she alive?" Saco asked the boy.

"She's in a better place," the boy replied, who later told Saco he'd tried to revive his mother by pushing on her chest in an apparent attempt at CPR.

LOCAL Students receive mystery message

"The monkey got out of the cage."

This mysterious phrase appeared on the cell phones of UF students, faculty and staff in the form of a text message Tuesday night.

Sent from the five-digit phone number 65586, UF spokesman Steve Orlando confirmed the text came from Mobile Campus, a national system UF uses to update students about campus emergencies.

Mobile Campus labeled the text messaging blip as "improper use" and locked its system to review all logs to find who sent the message and how it was sent, Orlando said.

Ian Fisher, a UF law school student said he first learned about the text through an instant message.

"My friend IM-ed me freaking out, and my roommate came in and showed me his phone," Fischer said. "I got the text at 8:45 p.m. on the dot."

He thought it was scary the emergency system could be hacked into, he said.

UF student Kamay Lafalaise said she was watching presidential inauguration coverage when she received the text.

Lafalaise said she thinks the text was a racist jab against President Barack Obama.

"I am an African-American, and I am offended," she said. "I don't want the person who did this to get away with it. It's immature."

Although she knew she would not get a reply, UF student Nancy Barker said she responded with a text of her own.

"I said 'President Obama will be a great leader regardless of ignorant and immature texts,'" Barker said.

Orlando said UF has no indication that the text was sent from the UF Alert System.

All that was known as of Tuesday night is that somehow the Mobile Campus system was used. There is a possibility right now that this incident goes beyond the University of Florida, he said.

UF announces new veterinary forensics program

■ CLASSES WILL BE OFFERED NEXT SPRING.

Soon the DNA collected from hair strands will identify more than just human culprits thanks to a new UF department

The veterinary forensics program, which was announced on Thursday, was created in order to investigate crimes made against animals as well as to prosecute those who do the crimes, according to a UF health news press release.

Dr. Bruce Goldberger, the director of the William R. Maples Center for Forensic Medicine at

UF, said the university was able to pilot the new program through the \$150,000 donation from the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

On Campus

Goldbergersaid forensics specialists, along with a vet from the society, have worked on the development of veterinary

forensics for the past year.

"We birthed a new field here at UF," he said.

Classes for both graduate and undergraduate students will be offered next spring.

Although certificate programs are now available to those already practicing veterinary medicine, students will eventually be able to obtain a degree in veterinary

forensics. However, Goldberger said that this will take a few years to develop.

Goldberger said that the new expertise that UF can now offer will help lessen the country's problem with animal cruelty.

"There are thousands of cases across the country," he said. "We are developing the skills and tools to solve them."



'Dirty Jobs' host describes disgusting experiences

Mike Rowe is in a bat cave, gas mask strapped to his face, and he's surrounded by 40 million Mexican free-tailed bats during breeding season.

And they're not pleased by his presence.

"They're expressing their displeasure in a rain of feces and urine and placenta," Rowe told a crowd of about 1,750 at the Phillips Center for the Performing Arts Tuesday night.

Rowe, host of Discovery Channel's "Dirty Jobs," shared stories of unsanitary experiences and hard-earned wisdom with an adoring crowd for about 45 minutes before taking questions from the audience.

He started his speech, fittingly enough, with a story about sheep testicles finding their way into a man's mouth.

While filming an episode for Dirty Jobs in Colorado, he said he was helping a rancher remove the tails and testicles of sheep.

He said he expected the rancher to use rubber bands to cut off the circulation of the appendages, which Rowe said was the PETA-approved method of removal.

Instead, Rowe said, the rancher pulled out a knife and cut the first sheep's tail off.

Then, after the animal's legs were spread, the man cut off a piece of its scrotum before plunging his face

into its groin, sucking out the testicles and spitting them into a bucket.

Rowe said he had to stop the cameras at that point.

"This is just not gonna play in what you call the blue states," Rowe

joked.

Rowe also delved into his colorful past, which included stints in the Baltimore Opera Company and as a salesman on QVC.

He said he joined the opera com-

pany just to get his Screen Actors Guild membership and for the girls, who dressed like "French country prostitutes."

One day during a long performance when he wasn't needed for

a few hours, Rowe said he ventured across the street, still dressed in his Viking garb for the show, to the Mount Royal Tavern to drink beer and watch football. When he got there, however, the TV was turned to QVC instead of football.

Rowe said the bartender bet Rowe \$100 that he couldn't audition for a job at QVC and get a callback.

"I said the last thing in the world I could use is a job, but I could sure use \$100," Rowe said.

Rowe auditioned the next day and got the job.

He said he stayed with the company for three years, getting fired multiple times and learning a lot about TV in the process.

Throughout his speech, Rowe also plugged his Web site, mikeroweWORKS.com, which is dedicated to the celebration of hard work and getting people interested in jobs that will help the U.S. rebuild its crumbling infrastructure, he said.

He finished his speech by reading a letter he wrote to President Barack Obama, who was sworn in earlier in the day.

The letter urged Obama to create more jobs in skilled trades that would allow the U.S. to make more products within its own borders.

Ben Brunson, a UF animal sciences senior, said he thought Rowe was eloquent and hilarious.

"Everything he said made me laugh," he said.

"It's the best show I've seen since I've been here (at UF)."

According to an Accent contract, Rowe received \$60,000 for the event.


His inaugural speech inspired and his calm demeanor awed. People the world over were given renewed faith in the power of democracy, but is this faith premature?

State lobbyists address cuts at Senate meeting

State budget cuts were the center of conversation during Tuesday night's senate meeting, as visiting state lobbyists announced that upcoming increases in tuition will not be covered by Bright Futures.

State lobbyists from Tallahassee spoke to student senators of the effects recent budget cuts will have on Bright Futures and UF's tuition.

But, according to lobbyist Ron LaFace, tuition increases will also bring positive results to the students such as more classes, professors and advisors.

LaFace referenced the resolution advocating the protection of Bright Futures passed by senators before break and later mailed to Tallahassee.

"Student support is always crucial," LaFace said. "(Florida Legislators) are responsive to the student voice."

Senate President Jordan Johnson also announced the cre-

ation the Student Budget Cut Task Force. The committee will work with both UF's Faculty Senate and administration to ensure UF programs remain unaffected by budget cuts.

Although senators agreed on the importance of keeping tuition costs low, some did not see eye-to-eye on recommendations made by the Replacement & Agenda committee to fill vacant senate seats and committee chair seats.

Orange and Blue Senators Ben Cavaturo and Mark McShera composed a four-page minority report documenting their reasons for dissatisfaction with the nominations.

Despite the minority's disapproval, the original nominations were passed.

A Gainesville man was arrested after he was accused of stealing empty kegs and selling them to a convenience store for cash.



Second Baby Gator care center opens

More adults than kids crowded the classrooms of UF's new Baby Gator Child Development and Research Center on Tuesday night.

The center, which opened its doors on Jan. 5, is the second of its kind on UF's campus and offers child care for children up to 5 years old.

About 35 people gathered on the ground floor of the Human Development Center at UF's Health Science Center to officially celebrate the center's opening.

Several UF administrators and staff watched as the new facility's directors, Pamela Pallas and Lisa Roberts, cut an orange and blue paper-chain ribbon made by children at the center to officiate its opening.

After the ceremony, visitors snacked on fresh fruit, shrimp and cheese as they toured the new classrooms and their accompanying observatory rooms.

"The need for child care here is significant," said Kyle Cavanaugh, senior vice president for administration at UF, in a speech at the ceremony.

Cavanaugh said the facility went beyond just child care, offering a place for recruitment and retention of staff and students at the Health Science Center.

He said unlike the Baby Gator Center on Village Drive, parents must be associated with the College of Medicine or the College of Public Health and Health Professions in order to enroll their children in the program at the new center, which is on Newell Drive.

Dr. Kayser Enneking, assistant dean of clinical affairs, said funding for the center was a big issue.

"Most of it came from the group practice funds and didn't cost more than \$300,000," Enneking said. "It's very cost-efficient."

Most faculty in attendance agreed that the benefits of the Baby Gator Center would outweigh the cost.

"We will more than recoup the upfront cost by retaining the best people," said Michael Good, interim dean of the UF College of Medicine. "This facility is long overdue on this campus."

Ind. man indicted in hoax

PENSACOLA, Fla. — An Indiana financial adviser has been indicted on federal charges that he intentionally crashed his airplane in an attempt to fake his death.

Marcus Schrenker, 38, was also indicted by a federal grand jury Tuesday with making a fake distress call.

His arraignment is Thursday. He remains jailed after being released from a hospital.

Authorities say Schrenker slashed his wrist when he was discovered Jan. 13 hiding at a campground near Tallahassee, two days after his small plane crashed in Santa Rosa County.

Authorities say he parachuted out over Alabama and fled on a stashed motorcycle.

In Indiana, he is accused of two felony counts alleging that he worked as an investment adviser without being registered. He is the subject of more than a half dozen civil lawsuits in several states.

UF student chosen as youngest "Survivor" contestant

UF sophomore Spencer Duhm fulfilled one of his lifelong dreams this past fall.

But it wasn't the fake internship in Chicago he told his friends about.

Duhm, 20, was cast in October for the newest season of "Survivor," the youngest person ever to appear on the reality game show in which contestants compete in the wilderness for \$1 million.

However, throughout filming, Duhm kept his involvement a secret until the cast was released on Jan. 13. The Chicago internship was his alibi.

"I always planned on applying as soon as I became old enough," said Duhm, who was 19 during the filming of the show.

This was the first season CBS lowered the

age limit for applicants from 21 to 18.

Duhm, who said he was obsessed with the show, said he's been a fan since its debut in 2000.

He said the show appeals to him because of its intense competition as well as the mental and physical tests the contestants go through.

While appearing on the show has always been an ambition of his, Duhm said he didn't do it just for the experience; he planned to win.

"Everything is a competition to me," he said. "I knew there would be some instances where I would have to lie, and I wasn't going to try to be everyone's best friend."

Duhm's familiarity with the intricacies of the game was perhaps his biggest advantage going into "Survivor," he said. But his experiences on sports teams, including the UF crew team, taught him to deal with the mental ups

and downs that accompany challenges.

"As I watched the contestants on previous seasons, I knew that if they could do it, then I could definitely do it," Duhm said.

But however prepared he felt going into the show, Duhm said he couldn't entirely relate the experience to anything else.

He said even the physical demands of crew couldn't compare to "Survivor."

"In sports you're expected to exert yourself in practice and during competitions," he said. "But on 'Survivor' there is no reprieve and no escape."

To participate in the show, Duhm withdrew from his classes last semester. But the telecommunications major said temporarily leaving UF wasn't a difficult decision as soon as his parents lent their support.

UF political science major David Carlson,

also a member of UF's crew team, said Duhm has key characteristics that would allow him to be successful on the show, including a personable demeanor and fanaticism.

"He's the biggest 'Survivor' fan I know," Carlson said. "If we were ever out of town for crew, we would always have to be back at the hotel and quiet by 8 p.m. so he could watch the show."

Duhm was one of 16 contestants chosen for season 18, which was filmed in Brazil, and while he doesn't know who won yet — the winner is announced on the finale in May — he does know what he would do with \$1 million.

"I want to help my parents retire and pay for graduate school," he said. "And the crew team really needs a new boathouse."

The 18th season of "Survivor" premieres on CBS on Thursday, Feb. 12.

Residents take sides over Gaza

Gainesville residents stood with students on both sides of the Israeli-Palestinian demonstrations as the groups sparred last week over the controversial Israeli offensive against Gaza that ended Monday.

The 23-day Israeli offensive that resulted in the deaths of about 1,300 Palestinians and 13 Israelis caused debate in Gainesville and abroad.

"I think it's important that we all support each other," said Rabbi Yoni Kaiser-Blueth of Hillel. "I've seen quite a bit of solidarity on this issue."

But Dennis Shuman, a Jewish supporter of Gaza who has lived in Israel, disagrees.

Jewish people support Israel simply because of their religion and culture, he said.

"Jews put on blinders," said Shuman, 62. "Sometimes, when it comes to family, it's 'my family, right or wrong.'"

Korin Weinstok, 24, community coordinator at Congregation B'nai Israel updates the Jewish community on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

"I try to keep the community informed because I know that the press

has a very specific point of view," said Weinstok. "All my e-mail updates come from official and reliable sources such as the Israeli Embassy."

Israel completed its objectives in Gaza and agreed to a ceasefire afterward, she said.

were organized by community and religious centers such as Hillel, while Palestinian supporters came from varied backgrounds and organized outside of the mosques.

"The mosques typically don't like to take political positions," said Abdul Hamad, 22, a recent UF graduate, "especially after the scrutiny they received after 9/11."

Individual Muslim community members, along with Jews and Christians, organize demonstrations, said Ammar Attia, who sometimes lectures at The Islamic Center of Gainesville or the Hoda Center on

Fridays, the Muslim day of worship.

The cease-fire has not stopped Gaza demonstrations, Hamad said. A forum to discuss the situation in Gaza is being organized and will be held in the coming weeks, he said.

Muslim demonstrators also received support from activist organizations such as Veterans for Peace and from involved citizens.

One such citizen, Elizabeth Corie-Jones, has been an activist since the Vietnam War.

"I have 11 grandkids," said Corie-Jones, 73. "And so it hurts me to think of children dying."

On Jan. 13, Joe Fuller, a member of Veterans for Peace attended the Palestinian-Israeli rallies held in the Bo Diddley Community Plaza.

When it began to rain, Fuller shouted for the Pro-Israeli demonstrators to take shelter with him and the other pro-Palestinian supporters under the covered stage area.

While many of the Palestinian supporters backed up to make room, none of the Israel supporters took shelter from the downpour.

"That's part of the problem," said Cliff Stafford, an observer who works construction in Gainesville. "One of them is too stubborn and the other is too aggressive."

Hamas claims victory in Gaza

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip — Waving green Islamic flags atop the ruins of Gaza, Hamas proclaimed victory in rallies attended by thousands of supporters Tuesday, saying it survived Israel's military onslaught despite the destruction and massive death toll suffered by Gazans.


Beyond its fiery words, however, Hamas offered no plans for rebuilding Gaza, which suffered some \$2 billion in damage during three weeks of fighting.

Gaza's borders with Israel and Egypt, largely sealed since the Islamic militants seized power 19 months ago, remain closed and are unlikely to open unless the militants relinquish some control.

Israel has also claimed victory, but neither side was the clear winner.

The fighting killed some 1,300 Gazans, the vast majority civilians, and thousands of Palestinian homes were destroyed. Israel emerged from the war with relatively few casualties — 13 dead, including 10 soldiers — but halted fire before reaching its objectives. No internationally backed truce deal is yet in place to prevent Hamas rocket fire on southern Israel or arms smuggling into Gaza.

George W. Bush returns home

■ HIS DEPARTURE
DRAWS MIXED REACTIONS

WASHINGTON — Leaving the White House for the last time on Tuesday, President George W. Bush blew a kiss out the window of his presidential limousine, a gesture that capped an eight-year administration marked by two wars, recession and the biggest terrorist attack on U.S. soil.

Bush's exit was bittersweet. He left office with low approval ratings, but he remained upbeat, smiling and joining in the celebration of President Barack Obama's ascent to rock-star status, even as he faces daunting challenges, especially a depressed economy.

This Inauguration Day was about more than the traditional transfer of presidential power.

When Bush clasped Obama's hand before beginning his journey home to Texas, their handshake marked the first time that the executive branch of government has been handed off to a black president.

If there were any hard feelings between the incoming 47-year-old Democrat and the outgoing 62-year-old Republican, they weren't apparent in the Bush send-off at the steps of a helicopter on the Capitol grounds where the two men parted ways.

After the inauguration ceremony, many in the crowd at the Capitol cheered loudly and waved goodbye at Bush's helicopter as it flew over throngs of people gathered on the Mall to witness history.

But not everyone was respectful. Weary of Bush, some people in the crowd chanted "Na-nah-nah, hey, hey, hey, goodbye"

when they heard a television broadcaster announce, "George Bush is no longer president of the United States."

Bush actually began the first few minutes as an ex-president listening to a musical prelude at the swearing-in ceremony. Obama had not yet taken the oath of office, but while the musicians played, he became president at noon EST, according to the Constitution.

Keeping with a White House ritual, Bush left a note for Obama in his desk in the Oval Office, wishing him well.

"I won't provide any details, but the theme is similar to what he's said since election night about the fabulous new chapter President-elect Obama is about to start, and that he wishes him the very best," outgoing White House press secretary Dana Perino said about the note.

Boats scour river for plane parts

NEW YORK — Authorities using sonar in the search for the missing engine from US Airways Flight 1549 detected something about the size of the massive aircraft part deep in the frigid, murky Hudson River on Tuesday, but divers ran out of daylight before they could locate the object.

Crews will resume their search Wednesday. Police have already located several pieces of debris from the flight, including 35 flotation seat cushions, 12 life jackets, 15 pieces of luggage, two brief cases, 11 purses, 15 suit jackets and shirts, four shoes, and two hats, according to NYPD spokesman Paul Browne.

The missing left engine, however, is the most coveted prize. Investigators will examine it along with the plane's attached right engine to better understand how the jet conked out Thursday after hitting a flock of birds.

All 155 people survived the miracle crash landing on the river, and US Airways said Tuesday that not even a pet perished.

New York Police Department harbor officers working with a sonar expert from the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration got a reading on an object 16 feet long and 8 feet

wide in about 60 feet of water north of the Intrepid Sea, Air and Space Museum, near where the plane made its emergency landing.

The engine is about the same size as the object picked up by sonar.

Swift currents made it impossible to drop a robotic device with a video camera to confirm whether it is the engine, and evening fell before divers could find anything.

The developments came as hero pilot Chelsey "Sully" Sullenberger attended President Barack Obama's inauguration. All the media-shy Sullenberger would say is, "I'm not allowed to say anything."

Since the crash landing, the NYPD has recovered more than 40 pieces of the aircraft, including four window exits and an access panel door. All the debris and passengers' belongings are being turned over to the National Transportation Safety Board for its investigation into the crash landing.

Blagojevich gives Senate no answer

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Illinois Gov. Rod Blagojevich on Tuesday missed his second deadline for filing formal answers to an impeachment charge, with a Senate trial over his ouster now less than a week away.

The second-term Democrat, whose criminal lawyers quit his impeachment defense in protest of the trial's rules last week, had until 4 p.m. to file a request to dismiss the charge and kill the Senate proceeding.

Had he done so, senators, sitting as judges in the trial, would have voted on whether to grant the request.

As a result of his inaction, the Senate will presume that the governor pleads "not guilty" to the charge and move toward opening the historic trial on Monday, said Toby Trimmer, spokesman for Senate

President John Cullerton.

Spokesman Lucio Guerrero said he didn't know what Blagojevich would do.

"He hasn't filled me in on his plans," Guerrero said.

A newly sworn-in House voted 117-1 Jan. 14 to impeach Blagojevich on a charge that he abused his power as governor. Blagojevich was issued a Senate summons that day and had had until Saturday to file a document answering charges in the case, but did not, Trimmer said.

Blagojevich was arrested Dec. 9 on a federal complaint that he tried to trade government action for campaign contributions or a high-paying job, and in one case, in exchange for firing unfriendly newspaper editorial writers.

Federal prosecutors have until April to indict him on the charges.

Chicago lawyers Ed Genson, Sam Adam and his son, Samuel E. Adam, gave up an impeachment defense on Friday, with the Adams comparing the process to a "lynching."

Genson distanced himself from such talk but said the Senate trial's outcome was a "foregone conclusion."


Genson said he would still defend Blagojevich on the federal corruption charges.

Among complaints outlined in a statement to the Chicago Tribune, the Adams said they were not given subpoena power to call and question their own witnesses at the Senate trial.

Obama takes historic step as first black president, calls for unity

hand on the Bible used by Abraham Lincoln and repeated the inaugural oath "to preserve, protect and defend" a Constitution that originally defined blacks as three-fifths of a person. A deafening cheer went up.

"What is required of us now is a new era of responsibility — a recognition, on the part of every American, that we have duties to ourselves, our nation, and the world, duties that we do not grudgingly accept but rather seize gladly," Obama said. "This is the price and the promise of citizenship."

Tuesday was a day of high spirits — jarred by sudden concern about the health of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, a legendary Democrat who is suffering from brain cancer and was rushed to a hospital from a Senate luncheon after the swearing-in. "My prayers are with him and his family and (Kennedy's wife) Vicki," Obama said. Later, fellow Sen. John Kerry of

Massachusetts said Kennedy was laughing and joking at the hospital and itching to get back to work.

On the inaugural parade route, Obama and his wife, Michelle, climbed out of the heavily armored presidential limousine and walked a few blocks along famed Pennsylvania Avenue, waving to adoring crowds under the watchful eyes of security agents.

Obama wove a thread of personal responsibility and accountability through his inaugural address, an 18-minute sermon on civic duty. A liberal Democrat proposing billions of dollars in new spending, Obama nonetheless spoke of the limits of government.

"It is the kindness to take in a stranger when the levees break, the selflessness of workers who would rather cut their hours than see a friend lose their job which sees us through our darkest hours," he said. "It is the firefighter's courage to storm a stairway filled with smoke, but also a parent's willingness to nurture a child, that finally decides our fate."

Obama's 10-year-old daughter, Malia, aimed a camera at her father as he spoke. Michelle leaned onto the edge of her seat, body tensed and brow knitted.

"Starting today, we must pick ourselves up, dust ourselves off and begin again the work of remaking America," Obama said.

He alluded to the inability — or unwillingness — of Americans to adjust to the passing of an industrial-based economy. "Our economy is badly weakened, a consequence of greed and irresponsibility on the part of some, but also our collective failure to make hard choices and prepare the nation for a new age," he said. With that, the 47-year-old former Illinois senator transformed himself — from a candidate claiming his campaign is about the voters to a president promising to put the nation in the people's hands.


Unlike most predecessors, Obama takes office with his agenda in many ways set for him.

An economy that seems more forebod-

ing than at any inauguration since Franklin D. Roosevelt took office in 1933, with some 11 million people now out of work, and trillions of dollars of stock market investments lost. Two wars, one in Iraq that most of the country has long wanted over and another in Afghanistan that is spiraling downward and needs an overhaul. The continuing fear that another calamitous terrorist attack is not out of the question.

More inspirational than prescriptive, Obama's inaugural address only glancingly mentioned a series of promises from his campaign: to get the U.S. out of Iraq, stabilize Afghanistan, create jobs, "restore science to its rightful place," boost the use of alternative energy, address climate change, transform schools, manage government spending wisely and oversee a more bipartisan, less-divisive approach to policy-making.

To a world eager for his leadership to replace Bush's, Obama had welcome words: "We are ready to lead once more."





Gators hope history doesn't repeat itself

Last season, UF was crushed by the weight of its own success.

After starting 18-3 and climbing back into the Top 25 with a 22-point blowout win at home against No. 13 Vanderbilt, UF imploded, losing its next two games (Arkansas 80-61 and Tennessee 104-82) and eight of its final 11.

The Gators went on to get steamrolled in the first round of the Southeastern Conference Tournament by Alabama and wound up missing out on the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1998.

Now, as the team prepares for its second SEC road test tonight at South Carolina (12-4, 1-2 SEC) at 7, UF will try to learn from the mistakes of the past.

The Gators (16-2, 3-0 SEC), who are currently riding a 10-game winning streak, checked back in to the national rankings this week at No. 24, and this time around, they are looking at things with a bit more perspective.

"It's kind of scary — kind of the same situation as last year," forward Dan Werner said. "I'm excited, but I'm also kind of nervous. Hopefully we don't follow that path. We had some early success and we let it get to us a little bit."

"After that Vanderbilt win, I think we got kind of big-headed,"

UF re-entered the rankings for the first time since their 57-55 loss to Florida State on Dec. 7.

"After that Vanderbilt win, I think we got kind of big-headed," Nick Calathes said. "We let a couple games slip away, and we weren't focused. We thought we were already in the NCAA Tournament and had it all figured out."

The next two weeks should provide a clearer picture of how this season will be painted.

UF will play three of its next four games on the road, including

Injuries to veterans mean more air time for the freshmen, starting in the first road meet of the season at Fayetteville, Ark., against the Razorbacks on Friday.


So, what's the recipe for a better re-

Billionaire Ross becomes Dolphins' majority owner

MIAMI—New Miami Dolphins majority owner Stephen Ross won't mess with success: He says Bill Parcells will remain in charge of the football operation.

Ross, a New York real estate billionaire, completed his purchase of 95 percent of the franchise for \$1 billion Tuesday, with Wayne Huizenga retaining a 5 percent interest.

Ross then addressed the subject of Parcells' status. The sale triggered a clause in Parcells' contract allowing him to leave and still receive the \$9-12 million remaining on the four-year contract he signed a year ago.

"Parcells is in charge," Ross said in a conference call. "He's staying, and I think we're very fortunate to have someone like Bill Parcells, who I think people have come to recognize as probably the best football mind in America."

Thanks to Parcells, Ross takes over with the franchise's fortunes on the upswing. When the first phase of his purchase was completed last February, the Dolphins were coming off a 1-15 season, worst in team history. Under the new Parcells regime, they improved to 11-6 this season and

made the playoffs for the first time since 2001.

Ross said he's 100 percent certain Parcells will stay for another season.

"I feel very, very comfortable with him, and I think he feels comfortable with me," Ross said. "I think we've developed a good rapport."

"Bill Parcells thinks like a businessman: You don't solve all your problems with money; you solve them with brains."

In February 2008, Ross bought 50 percent of the franchise, Dolphin Stadium and surrounding land from Huizenga for \$550 million, with an agreement to later become managing general partner.

Ross closed on the purchase of an additional 45 percent Tuesday. That part of the agreement received pre-approval from the NFL in October.

Huizenga, 71, became sole owner of the Dolphins in 1994. A year ago he said it was time for someone else to assume control.

General manager Jeff Ireland, scouting players preparing Tuesday for the Senior Bowl in Mobile, Ala., said the sale won't affect the way he, Parcells and coach Tony Sparano go about things.

"It doesn't really change what

I do, it doesn't change what Tony does, it doesn't change what Bill does," Ireland said. "We've got to win games."

Ross plans to meet Friday with Parcells, Ireland and Sparano, and

said he foresees no changes on the football side. He said he found the atmosphere at the Dolphins' recent playoff game electrifying and wants to build on this season's success.

"That is the most important thing, and the thing that drives me — creating and being part of a winning organization," Ross said. "There is nothing more important than that."

The trio scored 47 of the team's 61 points against Georgia.

"When you lose a key person like Jenn, it can take away from your confidence, and I just really commend our team for not allowing that to happen," Butler said.

ing nationally televised contests against Vanderbilt and Tennessee.

The Gators' three conference victories this season have come against Mississippi, Auburn and Arkansas, which are a combined 2-7 in the SEC — one of which came when Mississippi beat Arkansas at home in Oxford last week.

The players are saying all the right things, but how the Gators will handle success is yet to be seen.

In the eyes of UF coach Billy Donovan, concerns over rankings aren't representative of the program he has built in Gainesville.

"Duke, North Carolina and UCLA, I don't think they ever talk about their program being ranked. They think it is something that is supposed to happen," Donovan

said. "I think with our team right now, they should expect that and it should have no bearing on how we perform, prepare or practice."

RESUME BUILDING: UF is 27th in the most recent RPI rankings but has the

105th-ranked strength of schedule (out of 343 teams). The SEC is sixth in the RPI and

is currently sitting behind the Pacific-10 Conference. The Gators' opponents have the most combined losses of any team currently ranked in the Top 25 with 146.

UF is currently tied atop the SEC East standings with Kentucky (14-4, 3-0 SEC), which dropped Tennessee from this week's Top 25 poll with an 18-point road victory courtesy of junior Jodie Meeks and his school-record 54 points.

last two games?

Two: Alex Tyus and Nick Calathes.

Still, Donovan called out his rising contributor after a 10-point, four-rebound afternoon against the Razorbacks.

"Maybe more so than any player I've ever coached, he needs to get a whole lot better handling success," Donovan said. "Earlier in the year, when anything went

well for him, whether it be a day of practice or a game, you can rest assured the next day coming was going to be a loss of focus and a loss of intensity and a loss of work ethic in a lot of respects."

"You gotta go through some experiences being young, and his biggest challenge to me is being able to handle a level of success and contribution to our team and not allowing himself to think he's got it all figured out."

And it didn't stop there.

Donovan continued to rail on his talented newcomer as well as freshmen big men Allan Chaney and Eloy Vargas about how the trio doesn't fight enough through fatigue.

Whether it's tough love or if Donovan is really frustrated could be debated. It certainly wouldn't be a surprise if he is simply trying to keep his young player humble.

Regardless, Kadji might be starting to figure it all out. He recorded only one block against

Arkansas but played crucial defense against Razorbacks star big man Michael Washington while Tyus was hampered by foul trouble.

Do you think that will be the last time Kadji is called on for crucial minutes? It's doubtful.

But he doesn't have it all figured out yet. Freshmen rarely do. But his commitment to improving may go hand-in-hand with UF's win total.

"Some players see (a bar-

rier), and they fight through it and overcome it," Donovan said. "Other guys, they never quite get over the hump."

I'm a firm believer in a similar notion that, when challenged, a person can choose one of two paths — push through or give up. Donovan believes Kadji will choose the former.

UF fans will have to hope he's right because it's very likely the Gators' postseason success rests on the young man's shoulders.


