**Motorist charged in scooter death case**

Four months after Monica Toliver struck a scooter with her Lincoln Town Car into his scooter, resulting in the death of a UF student, the Gainesville Police Department issued a warrant for her arrest.

The warrant was issued Wednesday after results from a toxicology screening came back negative, Sgt. Joe Raulerson said. The results proved that Toliver's erratic driving was not a result of drugs or alcohol.

On December 2, Toliver, 40, was driving east on West University Avenue when she hit the side of a Gainesville Regional Utilities truck that was stopped at a traffic light, the report stated.

She continued to drive up onto the sidewalk and hit Michael VanWagner's Yamaha scooter, throwing him and the scooter into the crosswalk at Northwest 17th Street.

17th Street.

According to the report, Toliver continued driving and hit the back of a 2001 red Dodge Ram that spun the truck onto the east corner of the sidewalk.

Toliver sped up and drove her car two more blocks before it stalled out in the left

**Feminists protest patterns in layoffs**

Local feminists protesting what they see as a racist and sexist pattern in layoffs at UF presented the university with a statement signed by about 240 supporters Wednesday around noon.

Between 10 and 15 supporters handed the statement to Jeanna Mastrodicasa, UF's assistant vice president of student affairs, with the intention that it would be given to UF President Bernie Machen, said UF journalism sophomore Bethany Koch, spokeswoman for the group.

"Only 34 percent of full-time faculty are women, and 25 percent are of minority background," the statement read.

"Yet 61 percent of the layoffs have been women, and 54

percent were people of color," it continued.

The numbers were provided by UF's chapter of the United Faculty of Florida, Koch said.

"Our intention was to inform Bernie Machen that we're not going to stand for this," Koch said.

**On Campus**

According to UF records, eight faculty, seven of whom were women, and 66 staff were laid off as a result of the last round of budget cuts. Two of the faculty members, both foreign-born women, were reinstated last month after challenging their layoffs. Two other faculty were fired in their place.

Presenting the statement was part of a project for a community class offered by Gainesville Women's Liberation called Women's Liberation: Where Do I Fit In?

**'Lock It or Lose It' campaign promotes locking car doors**

In summer of 2008, Kevin Reilly left the hatch on his 1999 Dodge Durango unlocked.

When he returned to his vehicle, he found that his iPod, radar detector, stereo and speakers had been stolen, worth about \$600 total. It was the second time Reilly, the UF student body president, had been a victim of car burglary. He was just

one of the hundreds of victims in 2008.

"I'm vigilant about it now," he said.

Sixty percent of the 1,400 burglaries in Gainesville last year involved cars, and many began with

unlocked vehicles and rolled down windows, according to GPD.

While this is on par with the national average, Audrey Mazzuca, a GPD crime prevention officer, is hoping to drop the number of thefts through the "Lock It or Lose It"

campaign, which is meant to raise student awareness on the issue.

Thieves have admitted to focusing on students as easy targets with high payout, according to Mazzuca.

**Man arrested in connection with 'fake crack'**

A Gainesville man was arrested Tuesday after he told police officers he was selling fake crack cocaine.

According to the GPD arrest report, an officer approached Louis Williams, 42, who was standing in the middle of a busy street at about 6 p.m. Officer Brett Kikendall saw a thin stick behind William's ear that is used to clear crack pipes.

When the officer asked if Williams had drugs, Williams voluntarily stated that there

was a crack pipe in his pants pocket as well "fake crack," the report stated.

Williams said that because "times are hard right now," he had been cooking fake crack cocaine with baking soda and candle wax. Williams' "fake crack" was found inside a napkin in his pocket. According to the report, the fake drugs were the same size and shape as that of the crack cocaine that is sold in street level transactions. Williams was charged with sale or possession with intent to sell counterfeit drugs.

## Woman's tofu license plate curdles in Colorado

DENVER (AP) — One Colorado woman's love for tofu has been judged X-rated by state officials.

Kelly Coffman-Lee wanted to tell the world about her fondness for bean curd by picking certain letters for her SUV's license plate.

Her suggestion for the plate: "ILVTOFU."

But the Division of Motor Vehicles blocked her plan because they thought the combination of letters could be interpreted as profane.

Says Department of Revenue spokesman Mark Couch: "We don't allow 'FU' because some people could read that as street language for sex."

Officials meet periodically to ensure state plates stay free of letters that abbreviate gang slang, drug terms or obscene phrases.

The 38-year-old Coffman-Lee says tofu is a staple of her family's diet because they are vegan and that the DMV misinterpreted her message.

# Proposed organic farm bill causes controversy

Internet chatter has some local organic farmers concerned about a food regulation bill moving through Congress.

E-mails claiming that organic farming could be outlawed by the bill have been sent out to activists and farmers over the past several weeks.

The Food Safety Modernization Act of 2009 was proposed in response to recent health issues such as the Georgia peanut butter scare and was introduced to the House of Representatives by Rosa DeLauro, a representative from Connecticut. It is one of several proposed bills addressing food safety.

Locally based organization Florida Organic Growers and UF's Center for Organic Agriculture have questioned the e-mails' fiery accusations while remaining cautious about the bill's final form.

According to a chain e-mail, the bill is sponsored by Monsanto, a multinational corporation which produces genetic seeds and the herbicide Roundup, with the intent of forcing organic farmers, even backyard growers, to use chemical fertilizers and insecticides. The connection to Monsanto is drawn through DeLauro's husband, who

worked as a political strategist for the company, according to some reports. Two YouTube videos are also linked in the e-mail.

"Buried in the bills are regulations that criminalize all aspects of organic farming by categorizing the practice as a source of seed contamination," according to one video, a camera recording of a news anchor on Free Speech Internet Television.

But Marilyn "Mickie" Swisher, director of UF's Center for Organic Agriculture, has read the nearly 19,000-word bill, and couldn't find any mention of the criminalization, she said.

While she is admittedly not a legal expert, Swisher felt comfortable saying that the bill would not affect backyard gardens and was likely less threatening to small-scale farmers than reactions suggest.

She also spoke against connecting Monsanto with the bill.

"We make people devils by association," she said. "I don't like what your preacher says, so I don't like what you say.' It's the same thing."

According to Marty Mesh, director of the Gainesville-based, statewide Florida Organic Growers, the problem is broad wording and "one-size-fits-all legislation," which could apply the same fines and regulations to small-scale farms as it would to corporate operations.

"A \$1,500 fine could have a small effect on a large industrial farm, while it may threaten to put a small grower out of business," he said.

But Mesh believes that any ill-will that the bill shows towards organic farmers is an accident and would be worked out if it became law.

# Grad job options slim

To combat the strain of unemployment, young adults are making life-changing decisions and increasing their debts simultaneously, according to a national study released Wednesday.

"I would say young people are the proverbial canary in a coal mine," said Anna Greenberg, senior vice president of Greenberg Quinlan Rosner, the research company that conducted the study for Qvisory.

Since its launch about six months ago, Qvisory, a non-profit online advisory organization, has formed an online community aimed at helping young adults with their money, work and health concerns.

On Wednesday, the organization launched services to reduce financial stress on young adults, including credit counseling, an online records storage service and first-home ownership advice.

Greenberg said when the recession hit more than two years ago, financial experts should have recognized the struggles of young adults foreshadowed the future downturn of America's economy.

She said young adults are particularly vulnerable to the shifting economy because they rely on part-time work and have the highest unemployment rate. The study found about 20 percent of young adults are currently unemployed versus only 7 percent of adults of ages 30 and older.

Along with relying heavily on credit, young adults face increasing debts from student loans, first-home mort-

gages and car loans.

"They're basically getting by with plastics," Greenberg said.

Although 71 percent said they cut back on expenses, 41 percent of young adults admitted they sometimes only pay the minimum amount on credit card bills, while nearly one-third said they have paid a bill late. Sixty-eight percent reported having the same or more debt than last year.

"They're digging a hole that's going to be very hard to get out of," she said.

In addition to racking up debt, 20 percent of those surveyed said they or a family member have left college or transferred to a less expensive school.

Young adults are two-and-a-half times more likely to lose their job than older employees.

The impact on this age group has not gone unnoticed at UF, where about 11,200 students flocked to the university's two-day career showcases in fall 2007 and spring 2008 combined.

For the 2007-2008 academic year, the Career Resource Center reported a 24 percent increase in visits in career counseling, a 16 percent increase in employer visits and a 24 percent increase in individual employment interviews.

Despite being unsure of current hiring capabilities, companies still return to the career fairs, said Ja'Net Glover, assistant director of career events.

Glover said UF's strong alumni network has also brought employment opportunities to students. Still, she encouraged students to be flexible with job opportunities and open-minded to alternatives like working for the government or non-profit agencies.

# Rent hike causes Wendy's franchisee to pull Reitz location

UF and Wendy's are breaking up, and it's not on the best of terms.

Carl Hoover, franchisee for the Reitz Union Wendy's, said he's disappointed in the way negotiations with Aramark, UF's food service provider, transpired.

He said the increase in rent and an added utilities charge were too steep, and thought that after 14 years of good relations with UF, the university would have had more interest in keeping the chain on campus.

"They just raised our rent so much they pushed us out of business," Hoover said.

Reitz Union director Eddie Daniels said Wendy's' on-campus sales have been lagging.

"I'm not sure what's happened over the last few years," Daniels said. "Subway has grown every year and Wendy's has been pretty flat."

This runs counter to the rumor, propagated by students and campus tour guides, that the Reitz Union Wendy's is the busiest in the world.

Hoover said some of his other Wendy's franchises in Gainesville make more money than the one on campus.

He said, if anything, the Wendy's at the Reitz Union has the highest rent of any Wendy's in the world.

"There's no one that pays as much," he said. "Not even close."

If all goes according to plan, Hoover will close his Wendy's, the restaurant named for founder Dave Thomas' daughter, Melinda "Wendy" Morse, a UF alumna, on May 1.

Either a Burger King or a Cheeburger Cheeburger will replace it. The Burger King at Broward Dining Hall could become a Green Street Diner in 2012, according to UF's food service contract.

Meanwhile, Subway will move downstairs and Papa John's Pizza could take its place. Nature's Table might fill the other open basement spot, and Freshens will likely remain open, edging out Jamba Juice.

Pollo Tropical will replace Cap-eesh, and Noodle Bar will become AFC Sushi.

The changes are part of a \$2.3 million Reitz Union culinary makeover. About \$1.7 million will come from Aramark and about \$600,000 will be funded by UF.

# Parts of Santa Fe River expected to flood by Friday

Due to increased flow from northern rivers, parts of the Santa Fe River are expected to flood by Friday, according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

"It could stay flooded out for awhile," said Karen Parker, spokeswoman for the commission.

Areas near Hildreth and Fort White are at a high risk for flooding, with a 32-mile segment of the Santa Fe River from River Rise in O'Leno State Park west to the where it joins with the Suwannee River declared an idle-speed, no wake zone Tuesday. This requires boaters to go no faster than required to maintain steerageway and headway.

However, Parker said boaters should try to stay off the river during these conditions,

as currents are strong and boaters could collide with fast-moving debris.

"You could be idling along and have

something slam into your boat," she said.

Major flooding is predicted around April 18, with the Santa Fe River near Fort White rising to about 34 feet, 10 feet above flood level. Parker said officers from the commission will patrol the river to help people if they become stranded.

On Wednesday, the part of the river near Three Rivers Estates inched over the 19-foot flood level and is predicted to keep rising, according to a press release.

## Group advocates water conservation

### ■ MOST INDOOR WATER IS USED BY TOILETS.

The Regional Utilities Committee made a stink about conserving toilet water at a meeting Wednesday afternoon.

James Heaney, UF professor and chairman of the Department of Environmental Engineering Sciences, described how water is wasted.

Most indoor water is used by toilets, he said, and older toilets waste a lot.

New toilets use about 2 to 3 gallons of water per flush, he said, as opposed to 4 to 7 gallons used by older toilets.

"You think toilets are unglamorous?" he said. "It's the largest water user in the world."

The committee also heard a presentation by Gainesville Re-

gional Utilities representatives Rick Hutton and Jennifer McElroy, who discussed the water wasted by sprinkler systems.

Hutton suggested an irrigation maintenance incentive system where people would receive a rebate for having their sprinkler systems checked for leaks and adjusted.

"You pretty much have to get serious about conservation," Hutton said.

Rob Brinkman, president of the local Sierra Club branch, proposed a tax on new homeowners who want to install sprinkler systems.

"I think we ought to impose fees on things we want to discourage," he said, "and I really think we need to discourage the use of irrigation systems."

Conservation measures will be discussed and voted on in a future meeting.

# County Crunch

## Projected cuts could close county parks

As UF faces the daunting prospects of massive budget cuts, Alachua County's own financial crisis has ballooned to a projected \$12 million deficit.

The lack of funds stems from new reports revealing stagnant property values of houses in North Central Florida projected for the 2009-2010 fiscal year.

Prior to the announcement made Tuesday, county commissioners were already bracing for \$10 million in funding cuts — a staggering figure in its own right.

According to an article in the Gainesville Sun, a plan has been drawn up focusing on potential areas of the budget in which funds could be cut back. Some of the ideas tossed around range from closing county parks to cutting back on road maintenance, none of which interests county commissioners as they seek to avoid cutting back essential services. While steps have already been taken to slash funding, including money allotted to building projects, social service agencies and the health department, these measures only account for a small portion of the \$12 million deficit.

One alternative that would serve as a cure-all would be to increase the property tax rate — an option requiring a 4-1 vote by county commissioners.

The Editorial Board sincerely hopes that Alachua County can formulate a plan to remedy the county's budget crisis without sacrificing quality of life for area residents. Closing down county parks would severely disrupt a sense of community fostered in many towns around the county.

While a property tax hike hardly constitutes a sexy solution to an unfortunate situation, such a response would seemingly be temporary as opposed to closing parks indefinitely.

## Surf's Up

Free from the risks of bone-crushing shark bites and devastating sunburns, the latest surfing sensation sweeping the world has less board and more couch.

According to an article on NYTimes.com, the phenomenon of "couch surfing" allows for world travelers to provide each other a place to crash so long as they reciprocate for someone else in the future — all for free. Started as a non-profit, CouchSurfing.com seeks to bring people from across the globe together to create a better understanding of different cultures.

For example, an American visiting Rome might stay in a spare bedroom for two months, or a Chinese man traveling to England could potentially sleep on the floor in a flat for one night.

Not only does the company help global jet setters connect with people around

the world, they also work to ensure the safety of all parties involved. Billing their safety system as a "circle of trust," CouchSurfing.com offers users piece of mind through their vouching and verification system. Under their system, individuals registered on the site can be vouched for by established members and can become verified by providing detailed personal information.

The Editorial Board thinks couch surfing is a wonderful opportunity for anyone and everyone to see the world and meet new people. What better way to immerse one's self in a foreign culture than staying with a local through couch surfing? 

## Dogs may chase tails due to higher cholesterol levels

■ 30 DOGS WERE TESTED.

A recent study suggests dogs may not be chasing their tails for the thrill of the catch but as a result of high cholesterol that could lead to more serious diseases.

A research team of veterinary medicine at Uludag University in Bursa, Turkey, found that dogs with a compulsive tail-chasing habit also had a high level of cholesterol, according to an article in the "Journal of Small Animal Practice."

A total of 30 dogs were tested; half had the obsessive habit and tested with significantly higher cholesterol than those that did not engage in the behavior.

Dr. Clint Greene, a veterinarian at Haile

Plantation Animal Clinic, said he could see how the connection was made. He said the reason for the behavior may be blockage in arteries of cell membranes, which affect the flow of brain hormones responsible for mood and actions.

Elevated cholesterol levels are genetic in certain breeds, he said. But dogs that have diets high in fat and meat are prone to higher cholesterol.

Hypothyroidism and Cushing's syndrome are two diseases associated with high cholesterol. Typically, both diseases show up in middle-aged dogs and the treatments are a life-long commitment.

Some symptoms of these diseases are hair loss, cold intolerance and sleepiness, Greene said. These add stress to the dog both mentally and physically, and tail chasing is a sign of irritability.

Cushing's syndrome is a condition in which the body produces excess cortisol, a hormone that plays a major role in metabolism and response to stress. It can cause abnormalities such as diabetes, congestive heart failure and enlargement of the abdominal organs, Greene said.

Typically, veterinarians start testing for abnormalities when dogs are around 7 or 8 years old, he said. When the dogs are younger, high cholesterol is usually a temporary effect after a meal.

Dogs don't get cardiac diseases or heart attacks from high cholesterol like humans do, he said, so it's less likely for the owner to set up an appointment specifically to check their dog's cholesterol.

"It's a signal for a greater problem," he

said.

Julie Levy, a professor at Maddie's Shelter Medicine Program at UF, said compulsive tail chasing is initially viewed as a response to an environment, such as dogs who live in crowded kennels.

It also can be a response to an unhappy or unstable situation.

But Levy can see where there would be a connection. She said she's never heard of a study like this before, but is very interested to learn more about it.

She said elevated cholesterol will cause a hormonal imbalance which can lead to behavior changes. The important thing is to be aware of the dog's behaviors and take notice if there are any changes.

"Providing the dog with a more enriched environment is essential to the dog's health and happiness," Levy said.

son, but he said being part of the LGBT community lets him know he does have a family.

"This is a part of me," he said. "I don't want to hide it."

Many students like Velasco find comfort in attending the month's events and talking to other students who have experienced similar struggles.

But the issues surrounding their lives don't disappear after April, Lauteria said.

"There should always be discussions about combating homophobia and creating acceptance on campus," he said.

Velasco said UF is already a more accepting environment than he was used to, but he does experience times when he feels like an outcast.

Walking to class one day, he made his way through Turlington Plaza when he was bothered by protesters, he said.

"There were these super reli-

gious people who were condemning everybody," he said. "That day I was really outraged."

When it comes to opposition, Velasco advises students to find somebody to talk to who supports them and not to take it too seriously.

Pride Awareness Month will end with closing ceremonies on April 20.

In the weeks that remain, socials, forums and performances will be sponsored by the Pride Student Union, Multicultural and Diversity Affairs, Greek Pride and several Greek organizations throughout campus.

## Concert series to offer free shows from May to October

Downtown Gainesville will be a melting pot of musical styles for the next six months.

Every Friday from May to October, the Bo Diddley Community Plaza, on the corner of Southeast First Street and West University Avenue, will host a different local band each week as part of the 2009 Let's Go

Downtown "Free Fridays" Plaza Series.

This year's free shows, which run from 8 p.m. to 10 p.m., will feature 30 bands, with genres ranging from blues to "cosmic Americana."

The showcase will kick off May 1 with the 6th Street Rhythm & Blues Review, a mix of blues, old-school R&B and jazz.

Guitarist Bill Barnard said his band has played the event for a few years, and the tight-knit atmosphere of Gainesville makes it fun.

"It's downtown, it's outside. It's a good place for people to come hear music," he said.

On June 5, the concert will be a Bo

Diddley Tribute. Diddley, the rock icon and Archer resident for whom the venue was renamed after his death, will be honored by the community while members of his family and band perform.

events coordinator for Gainesville's Division of Cultural Affairs.

Ballard said another highlight will be a performance by Black Violin, a two-person hip-hop violin group who competed on the show "America's Got Talent."

"We're very excited about them," he said. "They gave us a good break because they're from Florida and they like to play here."

The city will pay each performer \$400-\$500, which varies based on the band.

Last year, between 300 and 700 people attended the concerts per night — about 10,000 total.

turn lane to Northwest 15th Street.

Witnesses said that Toliver seemed obviously in control of her car and that she appeared to be trying to flee after hitting the three vehicles.

She was charged April 2 with vehicular manslaughter, leaving the scene of an accident with a death and leaving the scene of an accident with property damage.

After the accident, Toliver told police that she only remembered hitting the GRU truck, Raulerson said.

She said she had no idea she hit the Dodge Ram or scooter, even though VanWagner was thrown onto her windshield.

She also told officers that the reason she hit the scooter and the Dodge Ram was because her brakes stopped working.

A certified mechanic conducted an inspection of Toliver's car and verified that the brakes worked properly, according to the report.

Commonly stolen items include MP3 players, GPS systems, laptops, cell phones, purses and loose change.

"When people leave their loose change in plain view it gives thieves a reason to explore," she said. Re-

cently, a thief stole only \$3 in loose change from a vehicle.

GPD spokesman Keith Kameg believes that there is a connection between the poor economy, drug use and the increase of stolen change, he said.

"Most auto burglaries are the bottom-feeders of our criminals," he said.

GPD makes several recommendations to prevent theft beyond making sure to lock doors and roll up windows.

Park in well-lit areas, away from shrubbery, and don't park a small vehicle between two larger ones. Detachable stereo face plates should be removed and stored in a secure place.

"Loud stereos advertise your sound system to criminals," she said.

Those who use a sunshade should not back into parking spaces; it hides thieves from passers-by.

Mazucca warns that burglars operate at all hours. "They are crimes of opportunity, during day-


time or nighttime criminals will take advantage of it," she said.

Mazucca has been coordinating the campaign with local media and businesses, but not everyone is cooperative.

"The apartment complexes want to create the illusion that everything is fine, when they are not," she said.

# Q & A

## with JASON ESTALA costume designer

Behind every great production is a great costume designer. After all, what would *Sex and the City* have been without Patricia Field's stylistic talents?

For UF's rendition of "Pride & Prejudice," M.F.A. student Jason Estala is in charge of bringing the characters' wardrobes to life. After only two years at UF, Estala's skills and creativity led him to the position of head costume designer for this large-scale production.

**What was the most difficult part of designing the costumes for "Pride & Prejudice"?**

The size of the cast. This is a huge show, and all the costumes had to be fitted to each person. Ninety percent of this production was built from scratch. I have spent a whole school year's worth of time on this show.

**What has the design process been like?**

I was assigned to do this show last semester. I started doing all the research and started sketching then. During winter break, we went

to New York to get fabric from the Garment District. As soon as we got back to school, we started making the costumes. We document the whole process to show how we do things from the first patterns to the final details.

**What kind of research did you have to do?**

I read the book and the play, because they really are two different pieces of literature. I saw all the movies and looked at a lot of costume books. I really had to break down each character to figure out what they would really wear.

**Tell me about the costumes for the show.**

I was really inspired to make this like an English rose garden. There are a lot of pastels and florals — very earthy and organic. I have the Bennets in lighter cottony fabrics, because I feel like they don't follow the rules. The other characters are in more structured patterns and richer fabrics — silk and taffeta — to symbolize wealth and rigidity.

**How much creative freedom do you have as a costume designer?**

A lot more than you would think. It's really about telling a story. I take the designer's vision and interpret it. I got to play with color, fabrics and motifs.

**What is the importance of costumes in a show?**

Especially in a show like this, it really sets the era and shows the difference in social class. I tried to create a closet for each character, so that their clothes looked like something they would have picked out. I even have the older people in older fashions, because I imagine they wouldn't be wearing the latest fashions.

**What is your favorite costume in the show?**

Each one is special to me, but I really love Lady Catherine De Bourgh.

She wears a regal purple-striped dress.

**How did you get into costume design?**

I learned to sew when I was really young in El Paso, Texas. My mom was a seamstress, and she taught my siblings and I to sew. She said it was a skill we had to learn and with me, it just stuck. In high school, I was an actor, and I made my own costumes, that's really how it started. At New Mexico State University, I taught band, and I made flags and color guard halftime-show costumes.

**How have your previous design experiences influenced what you do now?**

It got me to see things not for what they are, but for what they could be. I have worked in basements and churches with no air conditioning. Sometimes all you have is what you have, and you just have to make it work.

**How does working at UF compare?**

We are lucky to have a lot of space and good resources and equipment. My colleagues are amazing too. I couldn't have done this show without them, really.

**What are you looking forward to in your career?**

Learning more. I still have so much more to experience and see. I don't think I will ever be satisfied. I learn every day.

**Would you consider fashion design or costume design for movies?**

I would do both of those as side projects, but I really love the theater, because day-to-day you never know what is going to happen. Each show is different. I get to create these fantasy worlds and recreate history. It's something about the storytelling that I just love.

**What is the biggest payoff?**

To see your vision on the stage, singing, dancing and walking. It's weird because part of you just wants to say, "That's mine, I did that," but it really is about the whole show.

## Death of Polaroid is end of an era

For most, the start of the new year signaled a fresh beginning, but for Polaroid film it marked the end of an era. Last year Polaroid announced that it would stop making instant film, and it should be phased out of stores by 2009. To many people in this digital age, Polaroids are no more than ancient relics, but to those in fashion, art and photography industries they are very much alive.

"It is going to be bad for art to not have Polaroid," said Thomas W. Southall, curator of photography at the Harn Museum of Art. "The aesthetic of the Polaroid has proved to be irreplaceable. Digital has the same instant gratification, but it's pixilated."

Many famous artists have used instant film over the years, including Andy Warhol and Ansel Adams. Adams became a consultant for instant film's creator Edwin H. Land in 1948. He helped test the product, and over 35 years took hundreds of instant photographs. Adams wrote thousands of letters about his findings that helped Polaroid develop.

Warhol took hundreds of Polaroids of celebrities and anonymous subjects and then transferred the images onto silk screens. The more Warhol used instant film, the more he began to like the effects of Polaroids on their own.

"Polaroid has very fine grained, weird beauty," Southall said. "Each one of those snap shots is unique."

Many artists chose Polaroids because the images could not be re-

produced, which is something that cannot be said about digital prints, Southall said. Each Polaroid is as distinctive as a drawing.

"The fact that the picture in your hand is the object that was exposed to the light, that is unique in its history and existence," said Douglas Whitaker, president of the UF Photography Club.

Many amateur photographers have fallen in love with instant film as well.

"I take Polaroids to capture moments," said Susan Jane Phelan, who has been using different types of Polaroid cameras since 2000. "Each photo I have reminds me of a certain time in my life."

In the fashion industry, Polaroids served practical purposes. At fashion shows they were used backstage to keep track of looks before models hit the runway. Many modeling agencies liked to take Polaroids to get instant feedback of how a model photographs.

Polaroid's announcement came as big shock to many.

"People were totally freaking out," said Jilliane Pierce, who interned at Marie Claire magazine last summer and used Polaroids to catalog clothing samples that came into the fashion closet.

"The fashion industry does not like change," she said. "Change in

the clothes is enough."

Now the closets of agents, casting directors and designers are filled with just as many boxes of stockpiled Polaroid film as Prada shoe boxes.

There are those who refuse to just watch instant film expire quietly. One group, the Impossible Project, acquired Polaroid's film production equipment in Enschede, Netherlands. They do not plan to recreate Polaroid film, but instead develop a new type of instant film by 2010, according to the Impossible b.v. Web site.

"There are glimmers of hope," said Whitaker. "I hope one of these projects comes to fruition."

Fuji will still be producing instant film but as of now it will not fit into traditional Polaroid cameras, only wider format Fuji cameras.

Polaroid has also introduced a new type of digital camera, the Pogo, which they are advertising as a replacement for instant film cameras.

"Those cameras serve a purpose, but I personally don't think they are indicative of a coming revolution in photography," said Whitaker.

Whitaker said digital cannot replicate the anticipation built when waiting for a Polaroid to develop.

As stockpiles of instant film dwindle, each picture becomes more precious for Polaroid enthusiasts. For now all they can do is wait for new developments. In the meantime, they can celebrate 60 years of rich instant-film history in the only style appropriate—by shaking it like a Polaroid picture.



Stephanie Brombacher was one out away from her first career loss.

After giving up two home runs in as many innings, the undefeated sophomore pitcher had to watch from the dugout as her teammates — including her roommate — brought UF back from a 3-2 deficit against FSU.

In front of the second-largest crowd in UF softball history, Megan Bush stepped up to the plate with two outs in the bottom of the seventh inning and tied the game at 3-3 with a solo home run off the scoreboard.

"I pretty much knew she could do it," Brombacher said. "I love her. She's my roommate. I owe her whatever she wants."

Bush's homer sent the game into extra innings. Two innings later, Francesca Enea's leadoff home run gave No. 1 UF (40-3, 18-1 Southeastern Conference) the 4-3 victory against No. 21 FSU (29-13) at Katie Seashole Pressly Stadium on Wednesday night.

UF has made a habit lately out of coming from behind and putting games away late, as Enea's shot to left field was the team's second walk-off home run in three games. Right fielder Kelsey Bruder hit a walk-off grand slam to beat Mississippi State on Saturday.

"We like to make things exciting," Enea said. "We know that we can go out there and beat teams, but sometimes we like to go out there and mix it up."

For the second time this week, the Gators rushed out of the dugout to celebrate their walk-off win by dogpiling one of

## Team set to focus on SEC

When quarterback Tim Tebow and linebacker Brandon Spikes announced they would stay at UF for their senior seasons, the Gators became a favorite to win their third national title in four years.

That chance was part of what brought them back, and they have been talking about it all through spring practice.

"We just talked about getting a three-peat," Spikes said. "We have the whole defense back, and you win championships with the defense. So we have a great chance of doing it."

Spikes' math is a little off, as the 2007 season ended with a Capital One Bowl loss instead of a championship. But it's fitting that he considers that as a lost season — an anomaly wedged between titles.

That year started much like the 2009 season will, with UF coming off a championship, but the team suffered. There weren't enough leaders, and coaches say there was a sense of entitlement throughout the squad. Spikes and Tebow are determined to keep that from happening again.

"We know the standards are high because we're bringing everybody back on defense," Spikes said. "People are expecting us to play well, but our thing is that we can't get complacent. We know we're good, but we have to keep working."

Winning another title wasn't the only thing that convinced Spikes to stay. His brother, Breyon Middlebrooks, is serving

## Tucker explodes with 11 RBIs on three HRs

### Freshman slugger breaks Gators record

The ball has been looking bigger to Preston Tucker lately, and he made the ball appear smaller to Central Florida's pitchers Tuesday.

"It looks like I'm seeing a beach ball coming at me," Tucker said.

After a walk and a ground-out in his first two plate appearances, he started his record-setting night with a grand slam to right, putting the Gators ahead 5-3 in the fifth. That wasn't

enough for him, as he added a 3-run blast to left field that put the game out of reach.

And he still wasn't done.

When Tucker walked to the plate with the bases loaded in the seventh, he didn't disappoint.

This time, he sent the ball over the center-field fence for his second grand slam of the game. Tucker's two grand slams marked only the third time the feat had been accomplished in the Southeastern Conference, and it was the first time it has happened since 1987.

The Gators (21-11) cruised

to beat the Knights 16-3 on Tuesday night behind Tucker's bat in McKethan Stadium.

The three-homer night is just the latest in a series of huge offensive performances from the freshman slugger.

In the last five games, Tucker has hit 14 for 21 with six home runs and 23 RBIs.

The recent power surge from the lefty first baseman has provided UF's lineup with the pop it has been lacking all season.

The rest of the team only has hit 19 home runs compared to his 7, and no other player has more than 30 RBIs on the season.

The closest player behind him is Avery Barnes with 26 RBIs, just three more than Tucker had in the last five games and 13 fewer than Tucker's season total of 39.

Tucker also made it into UF's record books with his 11 RBIs, breaking Barnes' single-game record of 10.

"In order to be a good team, you got to pitch and play defense, but you got to have a well-rounded lineup," UF

# Phillips gets medical redshirt to return for final year

■ THE KICKER MISSED JUST ONE FIELD GOAL LAST YEAR.

When UF hosts FSU on Senior Day in November, kicker Jonathan Phillips will be recognized for playing his last game in The Swamp.

Again.

When the 2008 season ended, Phillips considered his career as a Gator to be over. He had already spent four seasons in Gainesville, and he was ready to move on to law school.

But coach Urban Meyer had an idea to give Phillips one more season. He wanted Phillips to apply for a medical redshirt for 2007, when he missed most of the season with an injury.

"It came up right before the (Southeastern Conference) Championship because Coach was thinking about it, and there was a lot of negative feedback that I wouldn't be able to get a medical redshirt," Phillips said. "Just after signing day, I went in and talked to some people, and I asked Coach if it would be okay to go for it anyway."

When Meyer gave him the go-ahead, Phillips filled out the paperwork and wrote a letter explaining the circumstances of his injury. He wasn't expecting

much, but during spring break, Phillips got some surprising news in a call from Meyer.

He had been granted a redshirt and will be eligible to help the Gators defend their national title.

"Last year went so well that I figured, 'Why not do it again?'" said Phillips, who's currently working toward a master's degree in real estate.

Phillips was 12 of 13 on field goal attempts last season and connected on 78 of 79 extra points — the lone miss being a blocked PAT that proved to be the difference in a 31-30 loss to Mississippi. His solid performance made him a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award, given to the nation's best place-kicker.

But 2009 won't just be a casual stroll down memory lane for Phillips. UF lost experienced long snapper James Smith and holder Butch Rowley to graduation, two essential parts of Phillips' field goal operation.

"This year, the biggest challenge will be the whole field goal unit," Phillips said. "Last year, I had James Smith and Butch, who had been snapping and holding for three or four years. Now we have two new guys, so we have to work on that. Butchie and Smitty made everything easy on me, but now I have to get used to the new guys."

John Fairbanks (field goals) and Mike Williamson (punts)

will take over the snapping duties, while punter Chas Henry and receiver Cade Holliday are vying for the holder spot.

And Phillips is still working his way back into playing shape. After last season, he said he wasn't kicking as regularly as he usually would, and he was a little

rusty when he started up again.

His goal for this season is to become a go-to player in close games. Last year, he only attempted two field goals of 40 yards or longer, hitting from 40 and missing from 42.

"A lot of times people assume I can't kick that far because I

haven't in a game," Phillips said. "On a good day, I can hit a ball from 60 yards-plus, but once you get back that far, it's just a consistency issue."

"I'm confident that if an opportunity ever presents itself when we really need it that we'll take that chance."

# Tough times impact baseball's opening-day salaries

NEW YORK — The recession has hit baseball salaries.

Teams cut payrolls for their active rosters and disabled lists by \$47 million from opening day in 2008 to the first day of this season. That comes out to a drop of 1.7 percent.

"Clubs were cautious all winter with regards to the economy and were concerned the economy might have an impact on club revenue," said Bob DuPuy, baseball's chief operating officer. "The spending reflected that for

many clubs."

The drop is the first since 2004 and just the second since the 1994-95 strike.

Looking at payroll team by team, 16 of the 30 major league clubs cut payroll. Among those who lowered spending — the mighty New York Yankees.

While the Yankees led the major leagues with a \$201.4-million payroll, they trimmed salaries by \$7.6 million from the start of last season.

The difference is that while they added high-priced free agents C.C. Sabathia, A.J.

Burnett and Mark Teixeira, they also let Jason Giambi, Bobby Abreu and Carl Pavano leave, watched Mike Mussina retire and more than halved pitcher Andy Pettitte's guaranteed pay.

Others cut more, led by San Diego (\$30.9 million), the Chicago White Sox (\$25.1 million), Detroit (\$23.6 million) and Seattle (\$19.1 million).

The 14 teams that increased salaries were

led by American League champion Tampa Bay (\$19.5 million), the Chicago Cubs (\$16.5 million), Florida (\$15.0 million) and World Series champion Philadelphia (\$14.7 million).

"The company would have had every right to reduce the payroll until the new owner came," said Cubs general manager Jim Hendry, whose team is in the process of being sold.

And while the 10 highest spenders lowered payroll by an average of \$7.8 million, the 10 lowest raised spending by an average of \$4.5 million.

# Gators get versatile Ajagbe to orally commit for 2010

■ THE HIGH SCHOOL JUNIOR CAN PLAY FOUR POSITIONS.

In the early race for the top 2010 recruiting class, the Gators increased their lead Tuesday with the oral commitment of Gideon Ajagbe.

Ajagbe, an athlete from Coconut Grove Ransom Everglades High, is UF's ninth commit, putting the school ahead of Southeastern Conference rivals Alabama and LSU, which have seven and six recruits, respectively.

Ajagbe is also the seventh player in UF's class on the Rivals250, an early ranking of the nation's best juniors on the recruiting Web site Rivals.com.

Ajagbe waited until he received his

ACT test results, which he described as "well above the requirement," to commit.

The Gators offered him a scholarship last summer before his team started two-a-days.

"I want to come to the spring game, then come this summer to Friday Night Lights. I also want to talk to an academic adviser."

Ajagbe plays running back, linebacker, safety and special teams for Ransom Everglades, a team with only 23 players.

"I've learned to play every position because of the lack of numbers," he said.

UF assistant coach Vance Bedford, who recruited Ajagbe, told the prospect UF

wants him to play defense.

"I'm being recruited as a linebacker, mostly outside. I don't have an inside linebacker's body. I actually don't have an outside linebacker's body, but hopefully I'll get there," the 197-pounder said.

The UF coaches want to put weight on Ajagbe without sacrificing his speed. He runs a 4.6-second 40-yard dash and competes in the 100-, 200- and 400-meter dashes for Ransom Everglades.

He said his track schedule, coupled with the five-hour drive between his Miami home and Gainesville, makes it difficult to attend UF spring practices, but he hopes to visit campus soon.

"I want to come to the spring game, then come this summer to Friday Night Lights. I also want to talk to an academic adviser," he said.

Ajagbe showed why college coaches

recruit him as a linebacker during a game against Coral Shores his sophomore year. Ransom Everglades was kicking off and the return man broke three tackles before encountering Ajagbe at the 30-yard line. Ajagbe's hit gave the kick returner whiplash, leaving him lying in a crumpled heap on the sideline.

Ajagbe has offers from FSU, South Florida, North Carolina and Boston College, but he feels UF is the best team in the nation and liked the way the coaches recruited him.

"None of (the UF coaches) pressured me. That was also a big factor," he said. "They let me know they're there, and they wanted me to be a Gator, but it was ultimately my decision."

O'Sullivan to give some lesser-used pitchers a chance to throw. O'Sullivan got to see Kevin Chapman, Will Jolin, Lee Reumann and Chas Spottswood on the mound.

The four relievers had combined for only 15 appearances before Tuesday, and it was the first appearance for Reumann, a walk-on freshman.

The innings thrown by the rarely used pitchers filled the innings usually taken up by Tony Davis and Billy Bullock, allowing them to get rest heading into UF's weekend series at Auburn.

O'Sullivan did use Anthony DeSclafani (3-1, 3.49 ERA), who is often called upon late in games, for 2 1/3 innings to get the win.

"I think (DeSclafani) is a key to our staff right now," O'Sullivan said.

"He's started, (and) he's come out of the pen. I feel confident pitching him at the start of the game, the end of the game or in middle relief."

a life sentence for a first-degree murder conviction, and using a pro contract to hire a lawyer for an appeal has always been a priority for Spikes.

But Middlebrooks took a load off Spikes' shoulders when he was making his decision.

"I spoke with him when I was going through the process, and he just told me to follow my heart," Spikes said. "He didn't want me to make any decisions on his behalf or on what he did in the past. I felt like coming back would benefit me more."

With their decisions behind them, Spikes and Tebow can get back to the task at UF.

According to Tebow, the key is to keep a narrow focus on the Southeastern Conference.

"The SEC is our No. 1 goal," Tebow said. "It's our conference, and it's what we want to

win. It's what we take the most pride in because we feel it's a great conference, one of the best in the country. If we win that, we think we deserve to be in a big game."

**MEYER BREATHES SIGH OF RELIEF:** After Monday's practice, coach Urban Meyer had a tough time getting to sleep.

"We left practice, and I had to take an Ambien that night because (defensive end Justin Trattou) went down, (tight end Desmond Parks) went down and (offensive lineman) James Wilson went down, all the same day," Meyer said.

But after examining all three, Meyer said none of the injuries were serious, and Trattou (shoulder) and Wilson (foot) may be able to return before the end of spring practice.

Parks will miss the rest of spring practice with a dislocated kneecap, a much better diagnosis than Meyer expected, as Parks was carted off the field Monday.

# Marlins' offense clicking in three-game sweep of Nats

■ FLORIDA SCORED 26 RUNS VS. WASHINGTON.

MIAMI — Even to Dan Uggla, the Florida Marlins' numbers are a bit surprising.

Uggla hit a tiebreaking 3-run double, Chris Volstad was almost flawless after a shaky first inning and the Marlins beat the Washington Nationals 6-4 on Wednesday to complete an opening three-game sweep.

Florida scored 26 runs in the series, and the Marlins' starters went 3-0 with a 3.06 ERA.

"Everyone in this division, this league knows the kind of hitters that we have in this clubhouse," Uggla said. "Are we going to score 8-10 runs a game? Odds are, no. ... But we've got guys up and down the lineup that can swing the bats."

John Baker added a pair of run-scoring singles for the Marlins, 3-0 for only the second time. The other was in 1997, when Florida won the first of its two World Series titles.

Volstad (1-0) struck out a career-high seven, allowing 2 runs — one earned — and two hits in five innings. Emilio Bonifacio went 2 for 4, lowering his average to .571, with 2 runs and his fourth steal for the Marlins, who hit .313 with 14 extra-base hits in the series.

"It's a tough pace to continue," Florida manager Fredi Gonzalez said. "Good pitching will beat good hitting anytime, and we're going to run into some tough pitchers who'll shut the offense down. But we'll keep riding it for right now."

Matt Lindstrom issued a bases-loaded, one-out walk to Adam Dunn

in what became a 32-pitch ninth before hanging on to convert his first save chance of the season. He struck out Josh Willingham for the second out, then got Austin Kearns to line out — on a nifty sprawling grab by left fielder Brett Carroll — to end it.

"Two feet either side would have tied it or we would have taken the lead," Nationals manager Manny Acta said. "We had the right people and we had good at-bats."

Volstad walked four Nationals, and four Marlins relievers combined to walk six more. The Marlins are now 9-32 all-time when allowing 10 or more walks.

"It's very frustrating," Dunn said. "We had our chances to win this game, and we let them slip."

Uggla's well-placed fifth-inning liner off Daniel Cabrera (0-1) put Florida in control. Ross Gload led off with a single and scored on Baker's second RBI hit of the day. Three batters later, Uggla delivered to right-center, driving in Baker, Hanley Ramirez and Jorge Cantu for a 5-2 Florida lead.

Cabrera allowed 5 runs and seven hits in six innings.

"I think everything was good," Cabrera said, "until the fifth."

Washington had a chance in the sixth against Florida's bullpen, loading the bases with one out off Andrew Miller. From there, Kiko Calero came on and retired a pair of pinch hitters, first Ronnie Belliard by strikeout and then Josh Bard with a lazy fly.

"For me, that was the game," Gonzalez said.

Florida made it 6-2 in the seventh, when Ramirez's second hit of the day brought home Bonifacio. Washington got the run back in the eighth, when Alberto Gonzalez hit

a two-out single, allowing Dunn to score.

"I'm happy with the way we are swinging the bat," Acta said. "We just got completely outpitched by them. They do have a very good

starting rotation, and it showed."

Volstad allowed the first two batters to reach, and both scored.

Cristian Guzman singled on the game's first pitch, went to second when Elijah Dukes walked and

scored after center fielder Cody Ross caught Ryan Zimmerman's fly, then threw the ball to first in an attempt to double off Dukes. No one was at the bag, and the ball rolled into the dugout.
