UF gets more student vaccines

■ SHCC WILL ADMINISTER ABOUT 1,600 THURSDAY.

UF will conduct another mass vaccination for the H1N1 flu virus Thursday after receiving a shipment of 1,850 doses Monday afternoon.

The free vaccines will be administered to students at the Student Health Care Center between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. To sign up for a vaccination, students must register at shcc.ufl.edu/h1n1/.

There will be 100 slots every half hour, which means up to 1,600 students will be vaccinated Thursday. The rest of the doses will likely be given to the Health Science Center for students and health care professionals, said Kat Lindsey, SHCC marketing coordinator. UF also has about 100 doses left from the last vac-

ination session.

Monday's shipment included both the nasal mist and injectable forms of the vaccine.

About 500 of the doses are mist, Lindsey said.

Health care workers will be stationed outside the SHCC ad-

vising students which form they should receive, she said.

She said many people think the nasal form of the vaccine is more dangerous, but SHCC workers will try to dispel that rumor.

Because they expect a larger number of students, Lindsey said there will be one or two extra nurses on hand to administer vaccines.

Survey suggests 'gay is OK'

A study by a UF professor shows veteran support for the "don't ask, don't tell" policy, which restricts gay and lesbian citizens from military service, has fallen sharply in recent years.

Only about 40 percent of Iraq and Afghanistan war veterans supported "don't ask, don't tell" in 2006, compared to 75 percent of service members in 1993 when the policy was introduced, according to the study by Bonnie Moradi, an associate professor of psychology.

The study shows 28 percent disagreed with it and 33 percent had no opinion or were unsure.

Moradi conducted the study with military sociologist Laura Miller of the RAND Corp., a non-profit research institution.

Moradi said in an e-mail that one of the most important findings of the study was that knowing a gay or lesbian member of a military unit did not affect its cohesion.

Moradi said the study showed about 20 percent

of the military personnel surveyed knew someone gay or lesbian in their unit, and over half of those service members said the presence of the gay or lesbian member was well-known in their unit.

"When I was out on the field in Central America, I served in combat zones where the last thing you were going to do was worry about the sexuality of your fellow soldier," said Paul Ortiz, a UF history professor.

Ortiz, who served in Central America as a member of the U.S. Army in the 1980s, said the growing number of veterans who disagree with the nation's "don't ask, don't tell" policy is indicative of changing attitudes toward gays and lesbians in the military.

"You have people who have done two tours and won bronze stars and purple hearts, and then their immediate superior finds out that they're gay and they're discharged," he said.

Ortiz said the policy is especially problematic



Satchel's owner passionate about pizza, art

Satchel-el: a small, often cloth bag.
Or, an artist who owns a one-of-a-kind pizza joint in Gainesville.

The second definition may only be useful to Alachua County residents, but those who know it dine in the product of a man's passion for art and pizza.

The beginning

Satchel Raye, 41, was born in Gainesville to devout Southern Baptist UF alumni. Raised in Jacksonville, he spent much of his time in Gainesville, visiting family and becoming a Gators fan.

When he was 16, Raye got a job at an Italian restaurant, Gubbio's, to save money for a car.

Bruno Santioni, an Italian immigrant whose family ran the restaurant, became like a second father to Raye, teaching him to spin pizzas and make dough. Many of the recipes at Satchel's are based on what he learned from Santioni.

Raye continued to work at Gubbio's until graduation, then he applied to one college, UF.

"One week after high school, I was living in Gainesville, going to Summer A," he said.

But soon, Raye became unhappy at UF. Like Jacksonville, he said, Gainesville was too big and too crowded. He decided it was time for a break and returned to Gubbio's to work as a server.

The world and travel

After giving art school a try, Raye returned to UF to receive his art degree. Soon, he saved enough money to travel in America, Europe and Asia.

In Thailand, Raye met a Buddhist monk and went through a religious experience that challenged his Christian roots. Raye said he learned much about true love and devotion in Thailand.

When Raye returned to the states, he received a phone call from a friend he met in France and was invited to go to Jamaica for a short "vacation."

Raye stayed in slums with impoverished people, far away from the tourist-attracting areas and modern conveniences.

"We had to walk to get water," he said.

Upon his return, Raye decided to experience homelessness himself.

"I was maybe 25 at the time, and I was homeless by choice," he said. "It was probably the best three months of my life."

He lived on lawns and in homeless shelters in Atlanta. He met many Vietnam veterans and many

alcoholics.

At the end of his homeless stint, Raye said the generosity and camaraderie of the homeless showed him that friends and passion — not money and property — were the key to success.

Pizza and art

Raye moved to Gainesville and began working for Leonardo's Pizza by the Slice in 1993 and continued there until 2001 — at one point, he lived on the Leonardo's roof — and got in touch with art. He met his wife, Caroline, when they both worked there and married her in 1998.

In 2001, she gave birth to a son, and Raye quit Leonardo's when his hours were cut.

He felt it was unfair for a long-time employee with a baby to have his income reduced. After a year, he knew it was time to take a chance and open up his own pizza shop.

"I was determined; I had to do it," he said. "I just happened to catch [the previous owner] at the right time," he said. "It was just luck." On March 7, 2003, Satchel's Pizza opened its doors.

Raye only expected it to be a small enterprise, but the restaurant has become immensely popular.

"This place is like his canvas," said Danny Lore, the night manager of Lightnin' Salvage, a trinket shop located behind the dining room. "There's always a work in progress," he said.

Lore said he has never worked for anyone more family-oriented than Raye, who works hard to make the working environment at Satchel's as family-like as possible.

Raye puts money into retirement and health funds for his employees and gives them paid vacation and benefits. He feels it's important to give employees wages they can live on.

His devotion to his staff and customers has paid off. The wait can be more than an hour on weekends, and the restaurant doesn't even offer breadsticks because there isn't room in the ovens for them, Raye said.

"I like the sound of the dishes clanking in the dishwasher," Raye said. "I like the people. I like the food."

Group gives 'courage' awards

Calm and powerful.

The words describe Rosa Parks, a black woman who refused to give up her bus seat to a white passenger in 1955, and they describe locals who win the yearly Rosa Parks Quiet Courage Committee award.

Each year, the committee honors local civil rights activists with the Quiet Courage award, which recognizes people who fight for justice and equality by exhibiting the same kind of courage that Rosa Parks exhibited.

"Usually, when you think of someone who is courageous, you think of someone who is loud," said Karen Cole-Smith, the committee's second vice-chair. "But Rosa was not boisterous. She was quite, calm and powerful."

This year, the committee has chosen four recipients for the Quiet Courage award: Cora Roberts, of Gainesville, Carol Thomas, of Alachua, Mary Hall Daniel, of Hilliard, and UF religion professor Gwendolyn Zoharah Simmons, of Gainesville.

Simmons was 18 years old when she first

got involved in the Civil Rights Movement. As a teenager, she marched with Martin Luther King Jr. and participated in nonviolent sit-ins with SNCC, the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee.

In 1964, Simmons organized a voting campaign in Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia.



Parks

Currently, she is one of the few people on campus speaking out about the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, she said.

"I'm still an activist even though I went back to school," Simmons said. "I'll never get that out of my blood, being an activist because we can bring about change. I saw it with my own eyes."

All five award recipients will be honored on Nov. 29 at 4 p.m. The memorial and award program will take place at Compassionate Outreach Ministries, 320 SE 43rd St., in Gainesville.

Locals energized for solar tariff program

Locals are jumping to become part of the solar energy program that earned Gainesville a national award earlier this month.

Gainesville Regional Utilities received national recognition for its efforts with its Solar Feed-in Tariff program, which allows residents to produce their own solar energy and sell it back to the company for about a 5 percent profit, according to GRU spokeswoman Melanie York.

When the award was announced, local interest spiked, she said, adding that the program is full until 2016.

According to York, Gainesville is the first city to in the country to start a program like the feed-in tariff.

Although the program is only running in 19 commercial systems,

including Santa Fe College, another dozen or so will be constructed soon, said Rachel Meek, a GRU employee in the conservation department.

"Right now, we're helping to stimulate solar energy. As the market levels out, it becomes much more economical for everyone," Meek said.

While Meek said GRU expected this program to be a success, the company did not expect it to happen so quickly.

Local News Within a week, the 2009-2010 year was filled up with companies that wanted solar energy in their buildings.

"It happened very, very fast. It was kind of crazy at that point in time. We filled so many applications in such a short amount of time," Meek said.

GRU was recognized by the Solar Electric Power Association and won the SEPA Award for Solar Business Achievement in the area of Community Outreach and Public Awareness.



Major teaches students to protect their turf

■ ABOUT 15 TO 20 STUDENTS ARE PURSUING THE MAJOR.

Dew covered the ground and fog hung over the Naples golf course.

Colby Paiva watched as deer appeared and began to eat the grass.

After taking in the scene at his summer internship, Paiva realized he made the right choice in pursuing a career in golf and sports turf management rather than attending nursing school.

"I won't see this at a hospital," Paiva said.

Paiva, a UF senior, is one of about 15 to 20 students majoring in golf and sports turf management, a four-year program requiring 120 credit hours.

His love of the outdoors drove him to change his career path, and Paiva hopes to become a golf course superintendent.

Jason Kruse, an assistant professor for the program at UF, said that, as a superintendent, Paiva would manage the entire landscape of a golf course.

Kruse said the major also prepares students for careers as athletic field managers and managers for residential and commercial landscaping companies.

The major is part of a statewide program, which means students can also earn the degree from research centers

in Fort Lauderdale and Milton, Kruse said.

Kruse said students in this interdisciplinary program take classes in entomology, environmental horticulture and agribusiness along with turfgrass culture classes — where students learn how to grow and maintain turfgrass — and management classes.

Students gain experience through internships at golf courses or athletic fields.

Kruse said they also help paint and prepare Florida Field for football games and maintain an on-campus golf green known as the Envirogreen.

"Students that are successful in this typically have a lot of pride in their work," Kruse said.


Paiva said this feeling motivates him to work long days and hours on the course.

"And you have to have a lot of pride in your work because, if you don't, it will show," he said.

Paiva remembers the pride he felt when a member came up to him during his internship in Naples and complimented the course's appearance.

"For me, it's kind of cool that I can build something or take care of something that challenges people," Paiva said.

given the trouble the U.S. military is having with troop shortages and an inability to find enough eligible citizens to serve in the armed forces.

When he served in the military, Ortiz said he and his fellow soldiers knew they had some gay comrades but did not talk about it.

"What you do on your own time is what you do on your own time," he said.

Joseph Delloso, president of UF Human Decency Now, said the shifting attitudes within the military are promising.

Human Decency Now is a student organization promoting LGBT rights.

While he was pleased with most of the study's findings, he said it was a little disheartening to see that many still support the policy.

Delloso hopes it will be repealed soon,

as public and military opinions seem to support allowing gay and lesbian service members to serve openly.

No Telling When Obama must follow through on promise

A recent study by UF professor Bonnie Morad, in cooperation with the RAND Corp., a nonprofit research institution, revealed that veteran support for the “don’t ask, don’t tell” policy has fallen sharply since it was introduced in 1993. By 2006, only about 40 percent of Iraq and Afghanistan war veterans supported it — down from 75 percent in 1993.

This is an important signal to those seeking a reversal of the policy, as the country clearly trends toward full acceptance of openly gay service members. Yet there is still resistance; this 40 percent figure could represent roughly a million active and reserve service members and overshadows the 28 percent who explicitly disagree with the policy (while 33 percent have no opinion or are unsure).

President Obama has shown little action on his campaign promise to end “don’t ask, don’t tell,” but he publicly renewed his vow to end it last month, according to The New York Times.

Just don’t ask him to tell you when. The president offered little in the way of a timetable during a speech before the Human Rights Campaign, the largest gay advocacy group seeking a repeal of the policy.

Advocates also argue that Obama’s promises of cooperation with the Pentagon and with leaders in the House and Senate to repeal the policy still stand in contrast with 10 months of limited action (or in most cases, inaction) on issues affecting the gay community.

Yet Obama’s passionate affirmation of the need for change, accompanied by strong statements like “I will end ‘don’t ask, don’t tell,’” produced roars from the crowd.

And after months of anxious waiting, changes could be just around the corner. Legislative initiatives are making headway, as a bill was recently introduced in the House to repeal “don’t ask, don’t tell,” and a similar bill may soon be introduced by Sen. Joe Lieberman in the Senate (can we count Lieberman as bi-partisan support yet?).

According to CBS, the policy may be repealed as an amendment to the 2011 Defense Department budget bill.

Rep. Barney Frank, the first openly gay congressman, supports this tactic, as he likens the effort to the hate crimes amendments that extended protections to gay and lesbian people.

However Democratic policymakers choose to attack the issue, they better act fast. Resentment among the party’s liberal base is growing as campaign promises go unmet, and a number of activists are pursuing a financial boycott of the Democratic National Committee, the Obama campaign and other democratic organizations.

With waning military support for the policy, and with legislative openings to repeal it approaching fast, we wonder: Who cares if openly gay soldiers serve in the military? The majority of the American people don’t. Even a majority of self-described conservatives support open service for gays in the military, according to a 2008 Washington Post poll.

Non-partisan groups like the American Medical Association have recognized the damaging effects the policy has on gay service members and the Military. The AMA voted last week to join efforts to repeal “don’t ask, don’t tell” because of ethical dilemmas for gay service members and the doctors who treat them, according to The Associated Press.

It’s clearly time to repeal “don’t ask, don’t tell,” and, in doing so, recognize that it is rooted in the prejudice of a passed era.

For friends in need, love can ease pain

It’s difficult when a friend tries to take his or her own life. You try to look at them with kind, nonjudgmental eyes, but you know that your face will betray you with a panicked look of fear.

You try for a smile, shooting for somewhere between the wide, insincere smile a portrait photographer relentlessly coerced out of you in seventh grade and the concerned smile of a mother watching her kid play his first soccer game. It doesn’t work out like that. The former comes out, then the latter, and then you decide that now isn’t really the time for smiling anyway.

You search for something with which to break the silence, something that doesn’t sound too consciously casual, but not heavy-handed, either. Possibilities flicker through your mind:

“How are you?” seems like kind of a dumb question.

“Are you all right?” sounds too medical and intrusive.

“So, what’s new?” — oh God, how the hell did you even let that one cross your mind?

Your friend must have seen the look on your face and breaks the silence for you with a “hello,” followed by a hushed “thank you for visiting.” You quickly say that it’s no problem and sit down beside them, groping for anything resembling a coherent sentence.

You want to ask why, because you just don’t understand any of this. All the clichés that you castigated your mutual friends for trotting out. “I would have never guessed” and “Last person in the world I would’ve thought” are just a breath away from escaping from your own mouth.

And you instantly hate yourself for it, but for a brief moment, you mentally entertain the most self-centered line of questioning: Didn’t you know how much this would hurt us? Why weren’t we worth living for?

Instead, you settle for a simple, “Do you want to talk?” A head shake.

“Do you want me to stay?” A nod.

“Hold your hand?” Their hand inches over to yours, and

you take it.

You pause, and sort of blurt out, “I love you.”

You say it again — this time, without your voice cracking and with each of the three words getting its own syllables — and add, “I’m here for you, okay? Just let me know if you want to talk, and I’ll listen.”

Your friend smiles wanly and thanks you in a way that lets you know that they’ll take you up on your offer sooner rather than later, but for now, they’d really just rather take in the quiet.

You know that, within the hour, you’ll be in a mostly one-sided conversation that will shatter your heart in such a way that you’ll occasionally forget how to breathe. You know that you’ll do your best, with varying degrees of success, to appear calm and collected. You hope that, when your face makes your broken heart far too evident, it’ll read more as an earnest, desperate compassion and not as being in way over your head.

And you know that saying “I love you” is not a panacea that makes everything better, as if it were a magical phrase that will make your friend comically slap their forehead and say, “Really? Well, shit, I guess I’m fixed!”

But you say it anyway — in part because, at least for this moment, it’s all you’ve got. But mostly you say it because it’s true, and maybe a little selfishly, you’re saying it as much for yourself as you’re saying it for them — as if saying it now, urgently, could retroactively make up for all the times you said it ironically or in a half-assed way these past years.

You don’t understand. But you want to try.

You gently tighten your grip on their hand and whisper it quietly but fiercely.

“I love you. You’re loved, and I love you.”



FSU post play poses tough test

■ THE GATORS HOST THE NO. 15 SEMINOLES TONIGHT AT 7.

Coach Amanda Butler has the utmost respect for FSU's inside game.

But it's not something she's trying to mimic for the UF women's basketball team (1-0) when it hosts the No. 15 Seminoles tonight at 7 in the O'Connell Center.

Butler praised FSU's post players Jacinta Monroe — a 6-foot-5 preseason All-Atlantic Coast Conference first-team selection — and 6-foot-4 Cierra Bravard but said she's not necessarily using them as a blueprint for what the Gators' post game should look like.

Monroe scored 18 points in 34 minutes in UF's 72-57 win in Tallahassee last year.

"As talented as Jacinta and Cierra are, we don't really have any players that look like them or play like them or their games are like them," Butler said. "Certainly we talk about the challenges that what they're able to do pose for us, but we also have to talk about the things we do well and the challenges that poses for FSU."

To combat a Seminoles defense that allowed just 10 first-half points to UNF on Saturday, the Gators may go with a smaller and quicker lineup — as opposed to trying to out-physical their opponent — and rely on perimeter shooting.

In its 85-63 season-opening win against Stetson, UF freshman Jennifer George showed flashes of being a force to be reckoned with in the paint, leading the team with 21 points and adding five rebounds and two steals.

The Seminoles (1-0) should prove to be a tougher test for George than the Hatters, and the challenge

Looking ahead not always bad

With Florida clinging to a 17-14 lead against South Carolina at halftime, defensive coordinator Charlie Strong knew exactly how to get his defense back on track after the worst half of football his unit has played this season.

"We were playing a little off pace — a little bit — and we knew once we calmed down, settled down, coach was telling us how this was going to be a championship game," junior-cornerback Joe Haden said. "He's

like, 'This game is going to lead us to a championship,' so people were just playing with so much emotion."

His unit responded by allowing the Gamecocks to gain just 41 yards of offense in the second half.

Senior linebacker Ryan Stamper also heard Strong's message loud and clear.

"(He was) just letting us know we're not playing the way the Florida defense is suppose to be played," Stamper said. "We've got to come out and play the second half better or our season is over. We're going to the SEC Championship, but we've got other goals after that, too, so if we lost this game that wouldn't have happened."

There are only two possible goals Stamper could have been alluding to: winning a national championship or going undefeated.

No other goal would have been ruined by Florida losing that game on Saturday.

And if that's what it takes to motivate the team, what's

Allen will have yet another knee surgery

Florida redshirt sophomore Adam Allen will undergo his third surgery on his left knee next week, a team source confirmed Monday.

Allen, who redshirted last season after being diagnosed with a sprained knee in a scrimmage on Oct. 24, 2008, has developed a degenerative cartilage condition. As a result, the bones in his left knee grate against each other upon movement, causing severe pain.

He had surgery last year on Dec. 30 and sat out the rest of the season before having a second surgery this offseason. Although nothing

will be made official until after the procedure is over, Allen will likely miss significant time this year, if not the entire season.

The 6-foot-8 forward sat on UF's bench in a warm-up suit in the Gators' exhibition games and season opener Sunday, but he has not practiced with the team. UF coach Billy Donovan said he was cleared to exercise and do some light running when practice started in mid-October, but the bone-on-bone condition has proven difficult for Allen to overcome.

"You feel terrible because he's a great kid and he could help our team," Donovan said Oct. 17. "He's a good shooter. There's a lot of really positive things with him and about him. It kills you as a coach just to see."

"It's a hard thing for him. He's there at practice every day, and he's got to sit there for two hours and you know he wants to be out there playing. It's killing him. And that's a hard thing mentally for a young kid to look at that and just say, 'Geez, I may not be able to do this again.'"

Allen played in all 36 games his freshman season (2007-08), averaging four points per game and shooting 42.1 percent from 3-point range.

will be taking Saturday's performance and building off it against the much more physically gifted FSU frontcourt.

The team will be relying on its ability to generate offense off turnovers, as Florida recorded 14 steals against the Hatters.

And while UF finished Saturday shooting 50 percent from the field, the team will be looking to play even more to its shooting strengths.

"We didn't even shoot that well against Stetson, so I feel sorry for Florida State (tonight) because I'm pretty sure we'll be on fire," center Azania Stewart said.

Stewart played against Monroe in Belgrade, Serbia, at the 2009 World University Games and said it's more exciting for her

to play against high-quality post players like Monroe.

Stewart will also be fueled by the motivation of what was in her eyes a subpar performance against Stetson.

"To be honest, it wasn't a good game," Stewart said. "I can't dwell on that. I have experience here. I'm only a sophomore, but I played well against them last year."

Last season, in the Gators' road win in Tallahassee, Stewart tallied six points and four rebounds in 12 minutes of action.

She has advised George to establish her presence early and not let herself get caught playing defense too close to the hoop.

The team can say goodbye to

first-game jitters, but the intra-state rivalry will certainly field a different atmosphere than the season opener.

"It's the biggest game so far, so there's a different nervousness that comes with that," guard Susan Yenser said. "We are just going to go out there and focus on executing what we want to do instead of catering to what they want to do."

Florida will hope to repeat its success of a year ago.

The then-unranked Gators defeated a ranked Seminoles squad, but the biggest contribution came from now-departed guard Sha Brooks, who led UF with 24 points in last season's upset.

Senior forward Sharielle Smith had the team's second-highest output last year, scoring 15 points on 5-of-7 shooting.

1 Mark Ingram (17) 1,297 rushing yards, 6.7 yards per carry, 10 TD, 25 receptions, 225 receiving yards, 3 TD



Ingram stays atop the alligatorSports Heisman Watch for the second consecutive week. Alabama is undefeated, and the sophomore running back went for 149 yards and two touchdowns in a win against Mississippi State on Saturday. He is fifth in the nation in rushing yards and has been incredibly efficient at 6.7 yards per carry. As long as the Tide keep winning, Ingram will continue to receive plenty of first- and second-place votes.

2 Kellen Moore (14) 172.49 passer rating, 2,558 yards, 67.7 completion percentage, 32 TD, 3 INT, -7 rushing yards, -0.3 ypc, TD




Moore continues to distance himself as the best quarterback in the nation statistically. He is first in passer rating and touchdowns and ranks in the top 10 in completion percentage. His three interceptions are tied for the fewest among quarterbacks with at least 200 attempts. Boise State is still undefeated, which helps his case, but as long as Alabama remains undefeated, it will be hard for him to pull away from Ingram and establish himself as the best Heisman candidate.

3 Toby Gerhart (8) 1,395 rushing yards, 5.3 ypc, 19 TD, 8 receptions, 87 receiving yards



Gerhart is a workhorse. The senior averages more than 26 carries per game, and he has posted huge numbers, including 401 yards and six touchdowns in the last two weeks — wins over Oregon and USC. His 19 rushing touchdowns rank second in the nation behind Navy quarterback Ricky Dobbs. Gerhart is finally getting the national love that he needs for a Heisman campaign, but it might not be enough for 7-3 Stanford.

4 LaMichael James (5) 1,193 rushing yards, 7 ypc, 11 TD, 11 receptions, 128 receiving yards



LaMichael is making everyone forget about LeGarrette. Oregon sits atop the Pacific-10 Conference in large part due to James' ability to step in and be a difference maker as a freshman. He rushed for 150 yards and three scores in a 44-21 win against Arizona State this week and has now gone over 150 five times this season. His 7 yards per carry ranks fourth among BCS runners and seventh overall. James is hurt by the fact that he didn't become the Ducks' No. 1 back until Week 3, though that makes his yardage total even more impressive, as he still ranks 10th nationally.

5 Tim Tebow (4) 154 passer rating, 1,730 passing yards, 64.6 completion percentage, 12 TD, 4 INT, 604 rushing yards, 3.5 ypc, 10 TD



Tebow makes our list despite garnering a vote from only one of our panelists. The senior quarterback is putting up pedestrian numbers week in and week out, but the Gators are still undefeated and No. 1, which is helping — if not entirely making — Tebow's case. He has gone three straight games without turning the ball over and has passed and run for a touchdown in each of those contests.
