



# Community shaken by earthquake in Haiti

■ **TWO UF STUDENTS WERE IN HAITI WHEN THE EARTHQUAKE TOOK PLACE.**

UF graduate students Roman Safiullin and Jon Bougher were due to return from Haiti Tuesday.

But after an estimated 7.0-magnitude earthquake shook Port-au-Prince Tuesday, their whereabouts had yet to be determined Wednesday.

"Everybody is trying to figure out where they might be," said professor Churchill Roberts, their adviser.

Roberts said he spoke with the families of the two students and no one has been able to get in contact with them after Tuesday's disaster.

Safiullin and Bougher were in Haiti filming a documentary about an organization building a school at an orphanage.

The film is part of their thesis work in The Documentary Institute at the College of Journalism and Communications.

The organization, Planting Peace, was founded by Aaron Jackson and John Dieubon.

Roberts said he was able to get in contact with some friends and

colleagues of Dieubon, and they told him Dieubon was unhurt during the earthquake.

"We think because our two students are with this guy that they're OK too," Roberts said.

Roberts said the students, who had been in Haiti since Sunday, were staying five to 10 minutes away from the airport in Port-au-Prince.

He said he heard the airport did not suffer as much damage as some other structures in the area and hopes the students were lucky enough to escape major harm.

"We're all hoping for the best," Roberts said. "We are all quite anxious and concerned. We won't rest until we've heard the definite word that they're OK, but we [didn't hear] any bad news [Wednesday]."

Other UF students are also waiting for news of their families and loved ones.

Perpétua Chéry, a UF junior, heard news about the earthquake Tuesday at 5 p.m. and has been trying to contact her family since then.

She learned the condition of her grandfather in Haiti from a cousin in France.

"This is really frustrating," Chéry said, "Since we're having difficulties getting communication with Haiti."

She was still awaiting news on the rest of her family Wednesday.

An e-mail sent by UF President Bernie Machen Wednesday said two UF faculty members in Haiti, Florence Sergile and Ed Hanlon, are safe.

UF organizations and local Red Cross and Salvation Army chapters are asking students to donate money.

Del Villasane, an emergency services intern at The American Red Cross's chapter in Gainesville, suggested students make monetary donations so charities can effectively use the money to meet the food and medical needs of Haitians.

Steve Dick, development director for The Salvation Army of Florida, agreed with Villasane.

"At this point, because of the chaotic situation, they are still trying to determine people's needs," Dick said. "The most quick and efficient way is monetary donations."

Student Body President Jordan Johnson said he wants students to know Student Government will support and assist any students and student organizations wanting to help.

He said the tragedy in Haiti has personally touched many students' lives, and he encouraged them to be there for one another and make

# Police issue arrest warrant for Gators linebacker

## Doe failed to complete service hours

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of former Gators linebacker Dustin Doe after he failed to complete court-ordered community service hours.

The warrant was issued Jan. 5, four days after Doe helped push the Gators to

victory in the Sugar Bowl.

According to court documents, Doe was found guilty of driving with a suspended license last August.

Doe was sentenced to 29 hours of community service and six months of unsupervised probation.

According to Alligator archives, Doe pled guilty to driving with a suspended li-

cense and driving without a valid license.

His first charge came with a sentence of a year of unsupervised probation, a \$300 fine and 16 hours of work detail.

The second charge resulted in six months of unsupervised probation, another \$300 fine and another eight hours of work detail.

Doe, who has played for the Gators for three seasons, was temporarily suspended from playing with the Gators in July and from participating in the first game of the 2009 season, according to Alligator archives.

Doe paid all of his fines but failed to complete his service hours in the time allotted, according to court documents.

### New York City's 'skinniest' house sells for \$2.1 million

NEW YORK — A town house dubbed New York City's skinniest house has sold for \$2.1 million.

The red, 9½ foot wide, 42 foot long brick building in Greenwich Village was built in 1873 on land used as an alley between homes. The town house was listed for sale last August at \$2.7 million.

The two bedroom, two bath home last sold in 2000 for \$1.6 million.

A plaque on the narrow Bedford Street

home notes poet Edna St. Vincent Millay once lived there; so did anthropologist Margaret Mead.


The newly-sold building was listed on real estate Web sites Wednesday as a rental available for \$10,000 a month.

## Fla. teen pleads no contest in brother's death

CORAL SPRINGS — A 15-year-old boy who police say fatally stabbed his younger brother in a fight over loud music has pleaded no contest to manslaughter in a deal with prosecutors. Under the deal, William Gorzynski will be committed for up to 12 months to a juvenile detention facility, followed by supervised release until his 19th birthday.

On Monday, prosecutors charged him as an adult, but the deal allowed him to be sentenced as a juvenile. They say if he commits a new crime while in custody or under supervision, he could face the full sentence of the adult manslaughter charge up to 15 years in prison.

Gorzynski entered his plea Wednesday.

Police say the boy fatally stabbed his 14-year-old brother on

## Most school districts support Fla. grant plan

TALLAHASSEE — Fifty-nine of Florida's 67 school districts have joined Florida's application for federal "Race to the Top" grant funds, but union leaders in only five districts support it.

The deadline for signing memorandums of understanding expired at midnight Tuesday.

The Florida Education Association had urged its local teachers union leaders to oppose the plan.

It will require merit pay plans based on student test scores, which most unions have strongly opposed.

Florida is seeking up to \$1 billion. If approved, districts would get 90 days to sign merit pay deals with their unions or lose funding.

The eight county districts declining to participate are Bradford, Broward, Collier, Holmes, Lee, Okeechobee, Polk and Sarasota.

## Police employees fired over fake report

HOLLYWOOD, FLA. — Five

people have been fired from the Hollywood Police Department after an investigation into a fake police report.

Hollywood officials say they received their termination letters on Monday after meeting with Police Chief Chad Wagner.

The employees, including three officers, have been on paid leave since July after a dashboard police video surfaced showing officers faking a police report so another officer wouldn't get in trouble for rear-ending a woman's car in February.

A six-month internal investigation and state review found the officers violated department policies.

Prosecutors are reviewing the case to determine if criminal charges are warranted.

Union officials, meanwhile, criticized the firings, calling them a political maneuver to save face.

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# Floridians to get tax holiday for first time in 2 years

■ **TAX BREAK COULD COST THE STATE ALMOST \$44M.**

Two years ago, Gov. Charlie Crist and state legislators nixed the back-to-school tax-free holiday because state revenues were low.

But now, as state revenues are


projected to rise, they are trying to reenact the 11-day tax break.

According to the latest executive summary of the Office of Economic & Demographic Research, Florida's revenue is predicted to be about 6.6 percent more than it was last year.

But reviving the tax break could cost the state nearly \$44 million.

Fandre Miron, an executive manager of the Softlines clothing line for Target on Archer Road,

said she looks forward to the tax holiday.

"I think it's a great idea, especially for parents who have more than one kid," she said.

But not every store gets to enjoy the advantages of the back-to-school tax break.

The general manager of The

Florida Book Store, Nandy Ferguson, said college bookstores don't benefit as much as stores that cater to high schools, middle schools or elementary schools.

"It's always a week or two too late for our students to take advantage of it," she said.

During a press conference Jan. 4, the governor and state legislatures said that they want to restore the tax break because it will generate economic growth in the future.

However, UF economics professor Mark Rush doesn't agree.

Although he hasn't seen the study yet, he said he thinks only some of the state revenue loss will be recouped in the future.


He also thinks the governor and legislatures could have ulterior motives for restoring the tax break.

"It's popular with the voters, which makes it popular with the politicians," he said.

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# Federal funds will help make homes energy efficient

Low-income homeowners in Gainesville may be eligible for federal grant money to help make their homes more energy efficient.

Gainesville Regional Utilities will use \$528,500 in federal energy-efficiency grants to more than double the number of low-income

homeowners who can participate in the company's Low-income Energy Efficiency Program, according to a news release.

With additional funding from GRU, LEEP is expected to use \$800,000 to help 276 homeowners this year.

"It empowers our customers to walk them through an energy-efficiency program," said Vanessa Aragon, a GRU residential efficiency

program coordinator.

Last year, GRU helped 114 customers make their homes more energy efficient by replacing air conditioning and heating systems, adding insulation and replacing water heaters.

The program provides an average of \$3,000 in improvements to each home.

But the program isn't just a service to the community, Aragon said. LEEP also helps GRU by reducing the company's energy demands.

To be eligible for the program, customers must own and live in the home and meet income qualifications based on current U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's low-income guidelines.

# Professor discusses criminal-identification technology

Scientists will never have spidey senses.

Simon Cole, a professor of Criminology, Law and Society at the University of California, Irvine, said new technologies, such as DNA analysis, offer false hope that crimes can be stopped before they happen.

Cole spoke about criminal identification technologies to an audience of about 100 at Pugh Hall Wednesday night.

"People now want to predict crime with a 'crime gene,'" he said.

However, he warned the audience that using technology to catch criminals before they commit a crime is something that only happens in fiction.

He said movies such as Tom Cruise's futuristic thriller "Minority Report," in which police watch crimes occur before they happen, help to promote the idea that crime prevention is possible.

This idea has been around for nearly as long as crime has been around, he said.

In the last 10 years, he said, people have turned to DNA analysis to find characteristics that

would indicate whether certain people are more prone to commit crimes than others.

However, he advised the people in the audience not to get their hopes up about the discovery of a

crime gene or any technology that would identify future criminals.

"It's never worked in the past,"

he said.

At different times in the last 120 years, scientists believed that eugenics analysis, racial characteristics and fingerprinting would also help to catch criminals before they acted, he said. None of these methods worked to prevent crime, and many attempts led to gross civil rights violations, Cole said.

"I hope I've conveyed a healthy skepticism," Cole said, adding that technology is not infallible.

Oscar Molina, a sophomore psychology and criminology major, said he was impressed with the lecture.

"What I learned was that the field of criminal identification is evolving," Molina said. "We had fingerprints at one time. Now we have DNA. What will we have in the future?"

The Center for the Humanities and the Public Sphere sponsored the lecture. It was the first speech of the Caleb and Michele Grimes Conference on Liberal Arts and Public Affairs.

Bonnie Effros, director of the Center of the Humanities and the Public Sphere at UF, said four more lectures about criminal identification will be given in coming months.

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# LOCAL Robberies inspire crackdown

The Gainesville Police Department is revamping its security measures in the wake of two home invasion robberies.

GPD is set to release a full report, including plans and statistics, next week.

"We have two overarching goals: Reduce crime and improve customer service," said GPD Capt. Ed Book.

The new initiatives came in response to several factors, including increased crime levels last year, Police Chief Tony Jones' installation and recent arrests within the police department.

The reorganization began Jan. 4, the same day Stacey Brown, 20, of Gainesville, was shot and killed in a home invasion robbery.

Just a few weeks earlier on Dec. 22, Meng Mu Shin, a 36-year-old UF doctoral student, was shot twice in a similar robbery.

Due to a high correlation between drug use and sales and home invasion robberies, Book said GPD is reaching out to apartment managers in order to identify potential drug dealers.

Last fall, GPD placed an additional 30 officers

on the street. Now, officials are debating how many of those should return to their previous administrative positions.

GPD is using information and recommendations from the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives alongside its own internal committees to create these proposals.

The Alachua County Sheriff's Office said it is not making any significant changes to its task force.

"We haven't had a recent surge in crime like the city of Gainesville has had," Sheriff Sadie Darnell said. "I'm very satisfied with our level of work."

University Police Lt. Robert Wagner said changes will have no effect on UF's policies.

"The numbers are what they are," Book said. "We need to be an effective, ethical organization, and we need to be accountable."

# Gainesville residents to root for Arbor Day

# Torture never justified in war

There are a good number of people who believe in the hypothetical situation that torture is justified in the ticking time bomb scenario. That is, a nuclear or biological weapon is about to detonate and kill thousands, maybe millions of people.

This is presented as a no-brainer — sacrifice one to save thousands. What's not as obvious to the casual observer is that this is little more than a fairytale used to justify the abandonment of American principles and morals.

Let's look at what would be needed to make this scenario plausible. First, we have to capture a terrorist with all the pertinent information. Second, the capture has to happen in that narrow window of opportunity before the attack occurs. Third, we need to know about the plot and know this terrorist, this person, has the information we need. Fourth, we need to know enough about the plot to anticipate and identify those responsible, but for some strange reason, we are missing several key details that we can only obtain by torturing this person.

For those who still think this scenario is a possibility or even probability, let us look to our own experience with terrorism. If we had caught one of the Sept. 11 hijackers just prior to the attacks, should we have tortured him to get him to give up information? If you support the ticking time bomb scenario, you would. I might not believe in torture, but there is a very powerful part of me that still wants those men to suffer as much as possible and for us to do what ever we can to prevent that attack.

The only problem is we did catch one of the hijackers— Zacarias Moussaoui. The FBI field


supervisor in Minneapolis went as far in his warning as to say that he was "trying to keep someone from taking a plane and crashing into the World Trade Center." Moussaoui was released because there wasn't sufficient evidence.

This is the ticking time bomb scenario. We knew al-Qaida was planning something and we arrested a terrorist with the pertinent information. Yet we didn't know it. Hindsight is 20/20, and in the covert underworld of black ops and terrorism, nothing is known for certain. Our intelligence agencies are not omniscient.

We can't operate from the position that we can kill, torture and imprison the world's terrorists. Torture is designed to win battles, not wars. Think of the past great powers that relied heavily on torture to wage war: The Nazis, the Soviets, the Japanese, the French in Algeria, America in Vietnam. How did those wars go?

The blowback effects of torture were summed up perfectly by journalist Mark Danner. In November 2003, he asked a young Iraqi from Falluja about the rising resistance to the U.S. presence. The Iraqi said: "It is a shame for the foreigners to put a bag over their heads, to make a man lie on the ground....This is a great shame for the whole tribe. It is the duty of that man, and of that tribe, to get revenge on this soldier... Their duty is to attack them, to wash the shame. The shame is a stain, a dirty thing — they have to wash it. No sleep — we cannot sleep until we have revenge. They have to kill soldiers."

donations.

"Every little bit counts," Johnson said. "This certainly is a major tragedy."

Aleks Bacewicz, president of the Global Haiti Initiative at UF, believes it is important to raise awareness of Haitian issues, especially now that the current crisis is brought to the forefront.

Jose St. Louis, a UF sophomore who has family living in Haiti, was immediately affected by the earthquake.

Because communications systems are down, there is no way of ensuring their safety.

"With Port-au-Prince being the most populous city and the death toll estimated in the hundreds of thousands, it's inevitable that my family would know some of the people who have been affected," St. Louis said. "This has really made me sit back and be thankful for what I've got because I realize how many small things fell in place in order for me to be here right now."

Medicine who participate in Project Haiti, a medical mission trip that takes place every spring, are

collecting donations on their Web site, [projecthaiti.sites.medinfo.ufl.edu](http://projecthaiti.sites.medinfo.ufl.edu).

Trip leader Daniel Lombardo said the organization will soon start collecting bottled water, medicine and canned goods.

"We're going to be facing probably the biggest health crisis we've seen there for years," he said.

Angela Pierre, public relations executive for Club Creole, a Haitian cultural club, said there will be a drop box in the club's office on the third floor of the Reitz Union where students can donate canned

goods and medicine.

Club Creole began tabling on Turlington Plaza Wednesday to raise awareness of the tragedy and collect donations to aid in the relief efforts.

Haiti has recently suffered many other natural disasters, including Hurricane Hannah and Tropical Storm Ike, both in September 2008. It is the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere.

"Haiti is accustomed to having a few bad times," Pierre said. "We will rise. Maybe not tomorrow, or this year, but we will rise."

## Matt Kurz One sings, plays all for show at The Atlantic

Matt Kurz is a busy man. He's the lead singer of the Matt Kurz One. And also the bassist, guitarist and keyboardist. Kurz sings scratchy, intense punk funk songs with a fiery slant reminiscent of The Who and James Brown.

He'll be playing at The Atlantic on Saturday at 10 p.m. Tickets are \$6.

**Wouldn't it just be easier to be in a band and not have to do everything?**

Bands can be a real drag. I was in a couple bands that did really well, but right at the pay-off period they disbanded for what I found to be really, really dumb reasons—considering the amount of work we had put in to get to that point. I've always been interested in being a one-man band, and since I turned 17 I've been in nine or 10 incarnations of what I am today.

**How did you get started?**

I lived in Richmond, Va., for a year, and that year was pretty sad and amazing at the same time. I didn't know anyone or have any friends, so I pretty much just locked myself in the attic of the house I was living in, and that's where I

taught myself to play the bass with my foot and stuff like that.

**Did you have an epiphany moment when you figured out you could tape drumsticks to the head of your guitar and play the keyboard?**

Pretty much everything I figured out how to do was complete, stupid coincidence. First, I started bashing the headstock of the guitar on a keyboard set to drum noises – that's how I played the cymbal. I figured out I could bash a high hat instead, but I started chipping my guitar, so I taped a drumstick to it. Eight months later it occurred to me, 'Hey dummy, you can play notes instead of cymbal noises (on the keyboard)!'

**What about playing the bass with your foot?**

I was playing guitar one day, and I laid the bass down precariously on the floor in front of me. I happened to look down, and the bass was just where it is when I play it now (at shows). I was like, "No way," and I just started hitting my foot on it and it worked.

**And the sock, necessary or not?**

You just don't want blisters and calluses on the underside of your big toe, and it also keeps my foot warm. There are so many good reasons for the sock.

**Is there a reason you don't use effects pedals or pre-recorded tracks when you play live?**

To me that kinda feels like cheating. If I fell back on those things I might not have ever achieved my goal of being a full one-man band that I set for myself when I was 14. Also, I'm one of those people that if I touch small electronics, they explode and freak out.

**What do you say to people who automatically assume you're doing some kind of gimmick?**

That kinda stuff drives me. If there weren't as many naysayers I'd probably be a lot less active. I love that it's a fight. I love turning the crowd.

**Is this your life's work? Is there a legacy you want to leave behind?**

Life's work is not a bad way to describe what I'm doing. I'm barely getting by on this thing, but it's worth it to me. When I'm eating Ramen noodles and worrying about my dishwashing job at home, the kinda solace I give myself is that, like, 14-year-old Matt Kurz would be stoked about what I'm up to right now. The idea was never to make a million dollars or sell out stadiums. The idea was, 'I'm going to be able to do that one day.' And I am able to do that, so as far as that's concerned, I am satiated.

# Groovaloo freestyles, defies gravity in shows

Gainesville, it's time to groove. Groovaloo, a 28-member dance company known for throwing caution and choreography to the wind, is performing tomorrow night at the Phillips Center for the Performing Arts.

The company head-spun its way into America's hearts after jaw-dropping performances on NBC's "Superstars of Dance," as well as on the live finale of this season of "So You Think You Can Dance."

But when you catch a performance by the Groovalos, expect the unexpected. Traditional choreography is considered a foreign concept, and the dancers aren't afraid to test the laws of gravity.

Based out of Los Angeles and founded in 1999, the Groovalos have created an artistry that sets powerful beats to the personal stories of the performers. The shows are themed around trust and courage, as the performances are directly based on the struggles and triumphs the dancers have experienced.

"The best way to describe our show is visually stunning," said Bradley "Shooz" Rapier, the founder of the Groovalos. "We break the stereotype of what people think hip-hop is."

Rapier's own entrance into the hip-hop world was unexpected. Growing up in Canada, he was the only African-American in his school and was never really introduced to the concept of formulaic dancing. Rapier finally discovered a passion and skill for movement in 11th grade at his high school dance when he was invited to join a street dance group.

Originally on a career path to becoming a doctor, Rapier decided to move to Los Angeles and find dancers who shared the same fire for movement. After holding 'weekly jams' at his house and bonding with fellow dancers, the Groovalos were born.

"I formed the Groovalos so I could be surrounded by dance at all times," Rapier said. "I

wanted to create not only a dance community but also a dance family."

In 1999, the Groovalos found success after winning first place at the American Street Dance Championship and have since found national fame.

The group is now touring nationally in order to share its street dance culture. The group's performances use voice-overs to share the personal experiences of the dancers and integrates words with a unique form of movement. When the Groovalos perform, you hear what you see.

"It's a true story of our group and how we journey individually," Rapier said. "The spoken word of our show explains what you're seeing. It might

be funny, touching or traumatic, but you see our experiences lived out on stage."

In every movement or action, the Groovalos use a mantra to help explain their inspiration to the audience: "Life isn't always choreographed... sometimes you have to freestyle."

"We use this as a metaphor for life," Rapier said. "You don't always know what is ahead of you, but you have to keep going and find a purpose. That's what we try and share with the audience."

The Groovalos will spin into the Phillips Center Friday at 7:30 p.m. Tickets can be purchased at the Phillips Center Box Office or any Ticketmaster location. Student tickets can be purchased for \$10.50.

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

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## Gators prepare for Summitt, No. 4 UT

The rumblings of the thunderous locomotive you will hear tonight belong to Tennessee and its women's basketball program.

Coach Pat Summitt, the NCAA's all-time leader with 1,019, is the architect and conductor that has been driving the program since 1974 and is rolling into Gainesville to pit her No. 4 Volunteers (14-1, 2-0 Southeastern Conference) against the Gators (9-7, 2-1 SEC) at 7 tonight in the O'Connell Center.

It may be just another SEC game, but even the Gators can't ignore the heightened media attention that follows Tennessee.

"Because it's Tennessee, it motivates us a lot more," senior Sharielle Smith said. "It gets us basically in the mindset of 'OK, this is Tennessee. We've gotta step up our game.' Our intensity has to be there the entire game for us to succeed."

Last season, UF pulled off a 66-57 upset over the Volunteers in Gainesville, but Tennessee has dominated the all-time series 38-3.

"They're super talented," UF coach Amanda Butler said. "They've got the best coach in the history of ever. Are they the standard by which we all measure ourselves? Absolutely."

Coming off a sub-par year, where they exited the NCAA tournament in the first round, the Volunteers have a sophomore-dominated team, led by preseason All-SEC First Teamers Angie Bjorklund — averaging 16.5 points per game and draining 49 percent of her three-pointers — and Shekinna Stricklen, who is second on the team with 14 points per game to go with her 6.6 rebounds per contest. Sophomore Glory Johnson compliments them with 12.7 points per game and 8.0 boards a game.

With a lineup that features every starter at least six feet, Tennessee poses an immediate size problem for the smaller Gators, whose only such starter is center Azania

## UF looks to improve performance on bars

### Event was team's worst in opener

Struggles on the uneven bars cost the Gators their season opener against Oklahoma in Norman, but the team is not dwelling on last week's results.

Despite a total score of 48.175 on the bars — by far the team's lowest-scoring event of the meet — Florida feels confident moving forward with the season.

The biggest issue the team had on the bars, which was their first event of the meet, was with handstands, an area they

have been working on this week.

"We didn't hit any of our handstands and had two falls," UF coach Rhonda Faehn said. "If you're going up against a top-10 team on the road, you can't expect to win like that."

# Griffin to have season-ending surgery on kneecap

## No. 1 pick has not played this year

LOS ANGELES — Blake Griffin's first season with the Los Angeles Clippers is over before it even began.

Griffin will have surgery on his broken left kneecap, keeping the No. 1 draft pick out for at least four more months, the eternally star-crossed Clippers announced in a statement Wednesday.


Griffin hasn't played a regular-season game yet for the Clippers after injuring his kneecap in their final preseason game

Oct. 23, wincing in pain as he landed after a dunk. After resting the stress fracture for several weeks, the former Oklahoma star recently increased his workload in rehabilitation by running on a treadmill.

But the power forward recently developed pain in his knee while jumping in a pool, and an examination Tuesday revealed his recovery wasn't progressing properly.

"It's a little disappointing, because he brings so much to the table," Clippers coach Mike Dunleavy said on a conference call. "As a group, we're coming together better

all the time, and adding that talent to our lineup was something we were looking forward to."

Griffin won't be back until next season.

"I think the reaction is going to be one of disappointment, but he hasn't been here

After a loss in Memphis on Tuesday, the Clippers will play at New Orleans on Wednesday night before returning to Los Angeles for a road game against the Lakers on Friday. Dunleavy hadn't spoken to his team since learning

all year," Dunleavy said. "We've just got to move forward and do what we were planning on doing anyway — making the playoffs."

Being the top pick hasn't been such an honor in recent NBA drafts. Griffin is the second No. 1 selection in the past three years to miss his entire rookie season with an injury.

Greg Oden, the Ohio State center chosen by the Portland Trail Blazers in 2007, had microfracture surgery on his right knee three months after the draft. Last month, Oden also broke his left kneecap and was lost for the rest of this season.

ey to his program, but something has to change.

Maybe a portion of a coach's buyout clause could go to the players he leaves behind.

Or force coaches to make an announcement that they're open to taking another job at least one calendar year before they sign with another program. Any coach who breaks this rule gets hit with a multi-million-dollar fine.

It's a tough situation to fix, but it's not fair to the players.

In this case though, I think the move is good for the Tennessee program in the long run.

In his FanHouse column on Tuesday night, Clay Travis — who wrote a book about the Vols' 2008 season — detailed how Kiffin had ruffled some players' feathers by abandoning Tennessee's traditions.

Citing senior center Josh McNeil, Travis wrote about how Kiffin frequently showed the team highlights of USC players rather than Vols legends, didn't want to take part in the custom of reciting General Neyland's maxims before games, brought in the Trojans' chants and at one point said, "Well, whatever Tennessee's been doing isn't working anymore, so we're coming up with something new. Get used to it."

After a lifetime of living in the South, I feel it's safe to say Tennesseans wouldn't take too kindly to a fast-talking city-slicker from California doing that sort of thing.

The UT program is a proud one, which makes Kiffin's jump to a bigger pond all the more maddening, but the Vols deserve and need a coach who will embrace them and their traditions.

In the short term, of course, this is terrible for Tennessee. A hire has to be made fast to avoid a signing day disaster, and there aren't a ton of good candidates out there. Depending on who's hired, this sets the program back a few years.

Kiffin robbed the cupboard of bigtime assistant Ed Orgeron and his father, defensive mastermind Monte Kiffin, leaving the Vols in shambles and giving USC a quick rebound after Pete Carroll's departure.

There's not much of a downside for the Trojans, unless Alligator photographer Harrison Diamond's prediction that Monte will "die of dysentery on the wagon ride to California" comes true.

Stewart.

Unable to match the Volunteers' size, Florida will have to play its best for 40 minutes, relying on keeping the ball and getting Tennessee out of sync offensively in an effort to score transition points.

The Gators come in averaging more steals per game (9.9) than their opponents and will have to play tough defense to slow a team that averages 79.6

points.

Turnovers have been a hindrance for the team all season. UF averages 19.4 per game — nearly six more than Tennessee — and had 16 in the first half against Georgia on Sunday.

"That can't be an issue this game because the majority of the time when we turn the ball over, that's extra points for them — it's like we're spotting them points,"

Smith said. "With Tennessee, you can't afford to have those."

For a team that outscores its opponents by an average of 22 points, the Volunteers won't need any extra help from the Gators to gain a big lead.

Otherwise, UF will be notch No. 1,020 in Summitt's belt.

"For us as a team that's trying to get to the top, there's only one way to get there," Butler said. "You've got to go through people like that, you can't go around them."



# Johnson awarded for stellar year

NEW YORK — That blur speeding away from opposing defenses and running off with The Associated Press 2009 NFL Offensive Player of the Year award is Tennessee Titans running back Chris Johnson.

Considered the fastest man in pro football, Johnson was uncatchable in setting a league mark for yards from scrimmage (2,509) and becoming the sixth player with a 2,000-yard rushing season.

He is the first NFL player to finish with at least 2,000 yards rushing and 500 receiving (503).

That earned the second-year pro 38½ votes Wednesday from a nationwide panel of 50 sportswriters and broadcasters who cover the NFL. Johnson easily beat New Orleans quarterback Drew Brees, who received nine votes.

"I kind of realize what I did and I feel like I had a dream season," said Johnson, who scored 16 touchdowns (14 rushing), second to Minnesota's Adrian Peterson, and tied the NFL mark with six consecutive games rushing for at least 125 yards.

Johnson, who has run a 4.2 in the 40-yard dash and believes he'll remain the NFL's fast-

est player unless a team signs Usain Bolt, has bigger dreams, too: breaking Eric Dickerson's single-season rushing record of 2,105 yards, and winning the league MVP award.

"I didn't even get one vote at all [for MVP]," Johnson said. "Like the season I had, it seemed like, 'What more do they want me to do?' That just felt like rookie of the year; it's a quarterback thing I guess."

Of course, if Johnson keeps posting phenomenal numbers, all kinds of honors and records should keep coming.

"That gives me something to look forward to next year," he said before focusing on Dickerson's mark. "You go for 2,000 yards. I don't know what you can really say that makes you

want to work harder or anything like that, so it's kind of a good thing and a bad thing, me not getting the record."

Johnson's production was even more impressive considering the Titans began the season with six straight losses. He was a key reason for Tennessee's turnaround to 8-8.

Johnson became the first player to run for three TDs of 85 yards or longer in a season; no NFL player had done that in a career. He'll start next season with a streak of 11 100-yard rushing games. Barry Sanders holds the record with 14-straight games in 1997.

No one has rushed for 2,000 yards twice in a career. Titans coach Jeff Fisher says it would be unwise to bet against Johnson setting that precedent, too.

"I think he's one player that has a chance to do it again. He's young," Fisher said. "He's special. He has the potential to go the distance and change games and do those kinds of things."

Johnson is the first Titan to win the honor, but the third player in franchise history. Quarterback Warren Moon won in 1990 as a Houston Oiler, and Earl Campbell took the award from 1978 to 1980 with the Oilers.

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
