Nursing student holds signing for first book

UF junior Laura Francois has a two-sided story.

She's a nursing major, and she wrote a book.

Francois released her first novel, "Reckless Perfection," in December and held her first book signing Saturday from 1 to 3 p.m. at Books Inc. on Northwest 13th Street.

"Reckless Perfection" is a 235-page story of four high school girls and their relationships and experiences.

Francois said she started writing the story in a notebook when she was in eighth grade and let her friends read it and make comments in the margins.

She said she rewrote the book about five times since she started writing, especially after she encountered new high school experiences.

"That really motivated me to continue to write," Francois said.

She said some parts of the book are based on her experiences or those of friends and family, but most of the story comes straight

from her imagination.

"I put myself in a situation, and it's like a movie playing in my

head," she said.

When Francois was finished with the story about a year ago, she

submitted it to Legacy Publishing, an Orlando-based company.

She said when she heard the

news that the company agreed to publish the book, she was ecstatic because getting published was always one of her greatest dreams.

"Just to have that big one accomplished is an amazing feeling," Francois said.

She said her family and friends supported and prayed with her every step of the way.

"I couldn't do it without God and my parents," she said. "It definitely wasn't a solo project."

Sandra Garzon, fellow nursing student and a friend of Francois' since high school, said writing is something Francois is very passionate about.

"Every time she starts talking about the book, you can see how excited she is," Garzon said.

Francois said she will continue writing after she graduates.

She has already written the sequel to "Reckless Perfection" and started working on the third installment.

"I think writing is a part of me," Francois said. "I can't let that go."

The book is being sold at Books Inc. and at the UF Bookstore.

Law school gets clinic grant

■ THE COLLEGE WILL PAIR WITH SHANDS TO OPEN A DOMESTIC ABUSE CLINIC.

The UF Levin College of Law received about \$500,000 from the U.S. Department of Justice to fund a new kind of clinic for victims of domestic violence.

The Intimate Partner Violence Assistance Clinic, opening in May, will be located in the obstetrics, gynecology and pediatrics clinic at Shands at UF.

Victims will receive medical treatment, meet with housing and mental health counselors and seek legal consultation.

Teresa Drake, the clinic's director and a former assistant state attorney, said the clinic involves a combined effort from the law school, the UF College of Medicine, Shands HealthCare and Peaceful Paths Domestic Abuse Network.

No similar clinic exists on any other campus in the country, and the collaboration could provide a model for future clinics, Drake said.

"We've got people around the country watching us," she said.

In order to meet the grant's objectives, curricula for the college of medicine and the law school will include domestic violence education and defense training, Drake said.

She said clinic staff will also reach out to the community to inform people about the clinic.

Drake said the clinic's obstetrician-gynecologists will begin training to learn how to screen for domestic abuse in March.

She plans to bring medical and law students together on community service projects so they can start working and learning from one another.

"The idea is to train these two critical professions to recognize and be able to react when they come across victims of domestic violence," Drake said.

He says he looked at the animal for "not even a fraction of a second" before turning tail and heading back upstairs. He says he doesn't mess with deer, especially big ones.


The animal also was spooked and barreled through a closed window to escape.

Planes bring wounded from Haiti

FORT LAUDERDALE — A group of 33 wounded evacuees from Haiti arrived in Broward County, accompanied by former U.S. presidential candidate John Edwards.

A C-130 carrying the group arrived Saturday morning at Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport. The

Broward Sheriff's Office reports 15 of the passengers were critically injured.

Edwards, a former senator from North Carolina, has been in Haiti helping with humanitarian efforts and rode with a child taken to Broward General Medical Center for treatment. Others were taken to various hospitals in Broward and Miami-Dade counties.

The sheriff's office reports that planes with wounded evacuees have been arriving for the past week. Another seven injured people, including two children, arrived Sunday morning.

Rare dinosaur skeleton turned over to researchers

GREAT FALLS, Mont. — A rare and nearly complete dinosaur skeleton stolen from private property in Montana and stored in an evidence locker for more than two years has been turned over to researchers.

Scientists at the Black Hills Institute of Geological Research in South Dakota say the 70-million-year-old turkey-sized predator could be a new species of raptor.

"It's a mean and nasty little dinosaur," said Peter Larson, president of the institute. "Even though it's not very big, you wouldn't want to meet it in a dark alleyway."

Researchers say it's unusual to find the skeleton of a meat-eating dinosaur, and especially one that's so small.

The commercial fossil hunter who dug up the dinosaur removed it without the knowledge or permission of the property owners. Nathan Murphy was convicted last year in state court of felony theft for taking the raptor fossil from a ranch in northern Montana and sentenced to 60 days in jail.

Larson wasn't upset at the delay in getting the fossil.

"What's a few years here and there when you're talking about a dinosaur that's 70 million years old," he said. "It's more important to do things properly and make sure the proper owner was identified."

After surviving a merger, the party has spoken.

UF adds to poster collection

UF now boasts the largest Mexican film poster collection of any public institution in the U.S.

The Efraín Barradas Mexican and Cuban Film Poster Collection opened to the public on Jan. 15, and the official dedication was Friday.

Ramón A. Figueroa, associate professor of Spanish at Millsaps College in Jackson, Miss., recently donated his collection of 378 film posters to the Latin American collection housed in Smathers Library. He asked that the collection be named after Efraín Barradas, professor of Spanish-American literature and Latin American studies at UF.

Figueroa and Barradas met at the University of Massachusetts, where Barradas was a teacher and Figueroa was studying for his bachelor's degree.

The posters are from the 1940s and 1950s and consist of primarily Mexican films, although there are some Cuban film posters, as well.

James Liversidge, curator of popular culture collections, described the collection as eclectic and said he believes it is a perfect fit for UF.

"This gives us major focus and puts us on the map," he said.

Upon learning of the donation, the library received a \$4,500 grant to preserve the posters.

John Freund, chairman of the UF Libraries Preservation Unit, found preserving this collection to be a daunting task.

He and a student volunteer worked to unfold the posters, flatten the edges and smooth the creases, which took about 90 hours, he said.

"The biggest problem was the size," Freund said. Each poster is stored in its own protective casing, which will prevent damage. In addition to preserving the posters, the library has digitized versions of the collection.

Hard copies of each poster are numbered, stored alphabetically and are available in the library for research purposes.

The collection will be on display in Smathers Library until Feb. 28.

Weekend events raise \$6,300 for Haiti relief efforts

Within three days, three local events raised about \$6,300 for Haiti.

A concert featuring local bands and free beer at Brophy's Irish Pub Friday night collected about \$1,500.

Most of the money was collected through the \$5 cover charge and donated to Partners In Health and Doctors Without Borders, which are organizations that provide medical care in countries affected by war, disasters or poverty.

About 250 people attended.

David Sutton, co-organizer of the event, spent last summer installing clean water filtration systems in Haiti and decided to organize the concert a week in advance.

Meredith McCall, a Gainesville musician, helped plan it.

She found four acoustic performers and two bands to perform.

Josh Roberts was the first performer and began by singing "Save Me" by Dave Matthews Band.

"I could never think about what it would be like to have no place to go, everything around me is destroyed and some of my family members were missing," Roberts said. "There's no health care; there is nothing for the broken legs, the broken backs, the cuts."

The five other performers were To All My Dear Friends, Fast Lane, Monster, Meredith (of Redboy) and Erica C (of The Wooden).

Gainesville resident Andrea Cellini, 31, came because she wanted to

support Haiti.

"I feel they've always had a rough time in Haiti, and this is the roughest they've faced in a long time," Cellini said. About 300 other locals hoping to help Haiti attended Club Creole's Spring Gala and Proj-

ect Haiti fundraiser Saturday night at the Turkey Creek Golf & Country Club in Alachua.

Club Creole is a UF Haitian cultural organization, and the event auctioned off Haitian paintings. It raised more than \$3,000 for Project

Haiti's medical mission trip to Haiti in March.

Jemima Douyon, a UF sophomore born in Haiti, said almost every Haitian person at the fundraiser knew someone affected by the earthquake.

"Five people died that I know," Douyon said.

The event included a showing of a video taken near Port-au-Prince moments after the earthquake. The audience issued a collective gasp as a scene depicted a motionless, dust-encrusted hand protruding from rubble.

Aaron Jackson, the keynote speaker of the gala and co-founder of Planting Peace, a nonprofit organization that promotes health and safety around the world, spoke at the event.

He has spent about a week in Haiti helping with relief efforts and also encouraged gala attendees to do their part.

About 400 students attended a \$5 pancake brunch Friday to benefit Gators United for Haiti.

The event raised about \$1,800 and was hosted by Kappa Alpha Theta and Sigma Phi Epsilon, said Rachel Bevans, Kappa Alpha Theta president.

Bevans said the event also received support from people who are not involved in Greek organizations.

"It's more about making a difference than having a social hour," Bevans said.

Sigma Phi Epsilon president and finance junior Mike Eisen said the event was a good way to raise money while opening it up to as many people as possible.

"So many people were killed, injured and left homeless," Eisen said. "With the resources we had here, we figured we could make something of a difference."

Invisible Children has taken the top spot to win \$1 million in Chase Bank's Community Giving Facebook promotion.

Chase posted the final votes early Saturday morning. Invisible Children, a nonprofit working to aid children in war-torn Northern Uganda, topped the leaderboard with 123,990 votes.

Invisible Children announced Wednesday it would donate \$100,000 to support relief work in Haiti.

Stephanie Alman, president of the UF chapter of Invisible Children, said the chapter would not receive any of the contest money.

"We raise money from our own schools and we do fundraising on a smaller, grassroots level," Alman said.

They narrowly beat Isha Foundation Inc., which had 122,742 votes. Isha works to provide health care and community development in rural communities.

To Write Love on Her Arms placed third with 96,145 votes. The organization helps people struggling with depression, addiction, self-injury and suicide.

Import cars face off

The smell of alcohol, burnt rubber and gasoline filled the air Sunday at Gainesville Raceway as about 200 competitors and 1,500 spectators showed up for the 101st Import Face-Off.

The event comes to Gainesville twice a year and hosts more than 20 events annually nationwide. And according to director Cliff Wallace, it is the only event of its kind to survive the recession.

"Every other event has gone bust," he said. "But if they keep coming, we'll keep doing it."

Dwight Baldwin, co-owner of Stage 6 Motorsports in Jacksonville, blames dependency on foreign oil for the drop in attendance and prize money.

Baldwin said E85, which is 85 percent ethanol and 15 percent race gas, is a viable option to cut the cost of expensive fuel.

"You can make really good power on it. The problem is it's hard to come by," he said.

However, he thinks it will become more readily available in the near future.

But for now, cars are an expensive hobby. People like Vic Miraflor, 42, of Orange Park, spend thousands of dollars rebuilding and modifying cars for speed.

His '95 Honda Civic ran a 10.23 second 1/4 mile at 144 miles per hour on Sunday. To put that in perspective, Motortrend.com lists the 1/4 mile time for a Ferrari 599 as 11.3 seconds at 126.4 miles per hour.

Despite the cost, Miraflor said he loves what he does.

"When I'm stressed, I just go to the garage and start working on my car," he said. "I focus on one thing, and everything else just goes away."

Philadelphia airport worker plays prank on high schooler

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A college student returning to school after the winter break fell victim to a prank at Philadelphia's airport by a Transportation Security Administration worker who pretended to plant a plastic bag of white powder

in her carryon luggage.

The worker is no longer employed by the TSA after the incident this month, a spokeswoman said.

Rebecca Solomon, 22, a University of Michigan student, wrote in a column for her campus newspaper that she was having her

bags screened on Jan. 5 before her flight to Detroit when the employee stopped her, reached into her laptop computer bag and pulled out the plastic bag, demanding to know where she had gotten the powder.

In the Jan. 10 column for The

Michigan Daily, she recounted how she struggled to come up with an explanation, wondering if it was bomb-detonating material slipped in by a terrorist or drugs put there by a smuggler.

"He let me stutter through an explanation for the longest minute of my life," Solomon wrote. "Tears

streamed down my face as I pleaded with him to understand that I'd never seen this baggie before."

A short time later, she said, the worker smiled and said it was his.

The worker "waved the baggie at me and told me he was kidding, that I should've seen the look on my face," she said.

Haiti cartoon wasn't meant to offend

nant when a leader doesn't try to convince the public why he's right. When the opposition came out and painted health care reform as a radical, un-American piece of legislation aimed at destroying the American family and who knows what else, D.C. There is something to say about the audacity of fighting back.

Gun control article unoriginal

Corporations entitled to free speech

Last Thursday, the Supreme Court got it right. When the Supreme Court was created by the Founding Fathers, it was not intended to promote social justice or uphold

laws that are popular with much of the public. The Supreme Court instead serves to ensure that laws follow the Constitution strictly as it is written.

When the federal government oversteps its constitutionally prescribed powers, it is up to the judiciary to keep those federal power grabs in check. Free speech, a cornerstone of the Bill of Rights, should be protected. The 5-4 majority struck down needless campaign finance laws because, as argued by Justice Anthony Kennedy in the majority opinion, corporations and other for-profit and nonprofit organizations have every right to free speech and expression. In sum, he says "no sufficient governmental interest justifies limits on the political speech."

Using money to fund issue ads telling voters to support or vote against a candidate is free speech and is now protected as such.

Interest groups are vital to politics because they give people a collective voice in Washington, D.C., to represent their interests. Blue-collar workers, white-collar workers and opposing interests, business and labor and other interests will now have more robust representation in Washington, D.C. Interest groups are necessary for the vitality of democratic governments, and limiting their free expression is limiting the ability for many Americans to have ample representation in government affairs.

The decisions handed down by the Supreme Court are not always popular with some, but when they restore free speech rights and allow freedom of expression for groups that give representation to many Americans, then you know they are doing their jobs.



Haitians must choose between quake and flood zones

GONAIVES, Haiti (AP) — For a generation, people have fled the floods that routinely wash across this city for the relative safety of Port-au-Prince. Now, they're fleeing back.

By busload and car, aboard smashed pickup trucks and dirty motorcycles, an estimated 50,000 to 100,000 people have poured out of the earthquake-devastated capital and into the region around Gonaives, a city inundated by flood waters and mudslides not once but twice in the last six years. And nobody knows how long they'll stay.

Maire Delphin Alceus's daughter, Katya, was among the thousands killed in Gonaives and the surrounding Artibonite area by the floods of 2004's Tropical Storm Jeanne. The family left to seek better fortune and schools in the capital,

returning for visits — including one in 2008 that coincided with more floods, from Tropical Storm Hanna and Hurricane Ike.

Then, in last week's killer quake, Alceus's 26-year-old son, Woodley Saint-Pierre, was crushed when their rented house in downtown Port-au-Prince collapsed. Her half-sister also perished, and with her the family's livelihood, since she had kept them going by buying clothes and perfume in Miami for resale in Haiti.

So it was back to Gonaives. "Living in Port-au-Prince is a problem. Going to Gonaives is another problem. Everywhere you go is a problem. If I could, I would have left this country and been somewhere else by now. But I have no way to do that," Alceus said.

Gonaives, a city of some 300,000 people on the coast 60 miles (100 kilometers) northwest of Port-au-

Prince, was completely cut off in both the 2004 and 2008 floods, separated from the rest of Haiti by a lake, the flooded plain of Savanne Desole, that swallowed part of the main north-south road. It took days to ship in aid. And it is still a disaster area 1½ years after the last floods.

A replacement road was completed in late December, just ahead of a Jan. 1 address President Rene Preval delivered in Gonaives, cradle of Haiti's 1804 independence from France, result of the only successful slave rebellion in modern history.

But the new road is much lower than the high-water mark left by the last storms, and would disappear again if the floods returned.

The old Alceus family home, a two-story structure with a peach-

colored facade in the poor neighborhood of Raboteau, now houses eight people. It sits amid a grid of wide unpaved streets and stately balconies where armed gangs battled police, U.S. soldiers, U.N. peacekeepers and each other before and after the 2004 ouster of President Jean-Bertrand Aristide. Dressed in white, fresh from evangelical church, Alceus said she didn't want to return north but had no choice. Her cash was spent and all her half-sister's merchandise was lost in the quake.

Alceus is now raising her nephew, Godson Macdavid Desire, 5, found by neighbors in the wreckage of the family's Port-au-Prince apartment when they heard him begging for water from beneath the rubble. He doesn't know his mother is dead, and Alceus covers his ears when she discusses it.

"An earthquake comes not so often, but floods can come any time.

Every year (in Gonaives) you have six months of panic," said Pascale Lefrancois, a U.N. humanitarian affairs coordinator in the region.

U.N. workers, themselves balancing continuing threats of disaster and the funerals of co-workers and friends, were still trying to get a firm fix on the exodus to the Artibonite. The presence of these internal refugees seems not to be choking the dusty streets of the city yet, but is felt in one key indicator: Prices for such basic food as rice and corn have shot up more than 25 percent since quake survivors began arriving on Gonaives' doorstep.

The new arrivals appear to have spread far and wide, in city homes and villages among the denuded mountains, whose rampant deforestation, from overfarming and the cutting of trees for cooking fuel, has cleared a path for the region's destructive floods.

order to make Gainesville a better place."

Lowe is running against four opponents: Monica Cooper, Don Marsh and Richard Selwach.

While Lowe maintains that he is confident in his campaign, he said he will not be complacent.

"We'll run a very organized and active campaign that's respectful of Gainesville," he said.

Jeff Lane, who attended the opening, offered Lowe the endorsement of the Gainesville Professional Firefighters, praising his

commitment to law enforcement.

Lane, who said Gainesville is facing its most difficult times since the 1970s, believes Lowe has all the right attributes to lead the city.

"Challenging times require experience in city government," Lane said.

"[Lowe] has the ability to bring many divergent points of view to a consensus. I think he's the best candidate," he said.

Parsons beats buzzer to sink Gamecocks

Chandler Parsons can't help but feel a little lucky.

Less than three weeks after hitting a 75-foot game-winner at N.C. State, the junior forward nailed a three-pointer from the left wing as time expired to give Florida a 58-56 win against South Carolina on Saturday night in the O'Connell Center.

"I'm the most blessed player in this country, I swear to God," Parsons said. "I just keep asking myself, 'How does that happen to me?' Honestly, I was just in the right place at the right time."

After the 21-footer found nothing but net, Parsons ran down the court before being mobbed by his teammates, eventually finding himself buried at the bottom of a dogpile for the second time this month.

The Gators (14-5, 3-2 Southeastern Conference) needed Parsons' buzzer-beater to hold off the Gamecocks (11-8, 2-3 SEC), who took a 56-55 lead with five seconds left on a layup by guard Devan Downey.

Downey, who led all scorers with 36 despite facing double teams throughout the night, raced the length of the court, blew by UF's entire team and dropped in a tough layup off the glass.

UF coach Billy Donovan said he worked in practice on late-game situations, like the one the Gators faced after Downey's layup, setting up his team to run the length of the floor and get a shot up with 10 seconds remaining.

It didn't work as well in practice as it did against the Gamecocks.

"Erving Walker three times in a row was pulling up and trying to take jump shots at the end

I'm still hazy on the rules and tactics of the game, but one look at the dedication from the players involved is enough to make me give rugby a chance.

And the Gators provide a great place to start. Their A-squad is undefeated, and with wins against Tennessee and the Seminoles in the last two weeks, their chances of reaching the sport's 16-team nation-

George's block helps hold off South Carolina

It wasn't the 40-point win Jordan Jones might have liked against her former team, but she'll live with the outcome.

UF guard Trumae Lucas drained the go-ahead pull-up jumper with 17.7 seconds left to give the Gators (11-9, 4-3 Southeastern Conference) a 59-56 win over South Carolina on Sunday.

It was Florida's ninth game this season decided by single digits (4-5).

"It was tough seeing familiar faces," said Jones, who transferred to UF after her freshman year at USC. "It's just a good feeling, kind of justifying why I came here."

Forward Jennifer George finished with a career-high six blocks, including one on USC guard La'Keisha Sutton with nine seconds left. Gamecocks center Kelsey Bone grabbed the ball in time for one last shot, but it clanged off the rim and UF forward Sharielle Smith corralled the rebound.

UF outblocked USC 9-0.

"I just try to use my strength," George said. "Just trying to push by the paint and use every bit of myself to get up on them."

The Gamecocks (10-9, 3-4 SEC) fell behind by 13 after Lucas sank two free throws with 9:28 left in the first half. Jones added a three-pointer 69 seconds later before USC went on a 15-4 run to close out the

half.

Bone, the SEC's top rebounder, had a game-high 11 boards and almost matched her season average (14.5) with 14 points in the first half on 5-of-9 shooting, including a 4-of-5 effort at the free-throw line.

Foul trouble in the second half kept her scoreless for 18-plus minutes, but she made an immediate impact once Florida's Azania Stewart fouled out. Bone finished with 19 points, and Sutton (15) and Valerie Nainima (12)

Gators send off seniors with wins against Tigers

Men top Auburn for first time since 1999

The men's and women's swimming and diving teams celebrated the careers of 15 athletes Friday against Auburn on Senior Day.

And they did it with wins.

In the final meet of the season at the O'Connell Center Natatorium, the men's and women's squads beat the Tigers by scores of 162-138 and 185-115, respectively. The Gators' men's squad (8-0, 3-0 Southeastern Conference) stayed undefeated with the victory while the women improved their record to 9-2, and 3-1 in the SEC.

"It was a real exciting meet for the seniors and the whole team," UF coach Gregg Troy said. "We've got a close group, so when the seniors get excited with their parents here it rubs off on the rest of the team."

Using that excitement, the Gators swam a total of 40 NCAA provisional-qualifying times. The men's team ended the day winning nine of 16 events, while the women won 10 of 16.

With the help of the seniors, the men's team topped defend-

ing national champion Auburn for the first time since the 1998-99 season. Senior Shaune Fraser led the way, winning the 100-yard (47.00) and 200-yard butterfly

(1:44.37) and placing second in the 100-yard freestyle (43.82), all NCAA provisional-qualifying times.

"It's always a bittersweet mo-

ment," Fraser said. "The past four years have been the best of my life."

Also swimming strong for the men's team was senior Omar Pinzon. Pinzon won three individual events in NCAA provisional-qualifying times in the 100-yard

backstroke (47.46), the 200-yard backstroke (1:42.80) and the 200-yard individual medley (1:47.91).

"Pinzon swam real strong today and Fraser's just been good all season long," Troy said.

On the women's side, senior Gemma Spofforth placed first in the 100-yard backstroke (53.03) and second in the 200-yard backstroke (1:56.61), both NCAA provisional-qualifying times.

In fact, Spofforth's 100-yard time was only .02 seconds away from the NCAA automatic standard. On the diving board, senior Kara Salamone took the one-meter diving title (303.97) and placed second in the three-meter diving event (292.81).

"The women's side was real good through the whole meet," Troy said.

One thing Fraser and Troy both mentioned is the importance of staying focused on the little things and technical issues as there is only one meet remaining for the men's squad — Saturday at Tennessee — before the post-season starts.

"We want to carry the momentum into SECs and then the final step of our season, the NAAs," Fraser said.

■ **THE FRESHMAN HAS WON THE ALL-AROUND TITLE IN EVERY MEET.**

The Gators went into Memorial Coliseum wanting to prove they could excel away from the friendly confines of the O'Connell Center.

Friday night against No. 12 Kentucky, Florida did just that, as it won their dual meet, 196.050-195.350. The win gave No. 4 Florida (2-1, 2-0 Southeastern Conference) its first road victory.

Freshman Ashanee Dickerson continued her early-season surge and walked away with another all-around title Friday. Her total score of 39.25 made Dickerson three-for-three in all-around performances this season.

"She's a robot," UF coach Rhonda Faehn said. "I think her beam was better than her score reflected and her floor routine was the best one she's done so far this year. She just keeps showing improvement and she's only going to get better."

After an uncharacteristic 8.75 on the bars by senior Amanda Castillo, the team was able to rebound nicely, and it finished the event with a 49.05 and a .400-point advantage after

one rotation.

It was a lead the Gators would not relinquish.

Going into the final rotation of Friday's meet, the Gators made sure there were no

costly errors this time around. On the beam, senior Courtney Gladys bounced back from a shaky routine against Arkansas and scored a 9.825, which tied with freshman Liz Green and Kentucky's Storey Morris for first place in the event.

The team's 48.750 on the beam, despite being its lowest team score of the meet, was still good enough for the Gators to hold off the Wildcats and come away with the team's second-straight victory.

"It was a complete 180 from the first road meet," Gladys said. "We're definitely heading in the right direction for the rest of the season."

of the clock," Donovan said. "That's the worst thing you can do in that situation. You have to drive the ball to the basket."

Walker put Donovan's advice into effect Saturday night. Despite being the team's hottest shooter in conference play, Walker took the quick inbounds pass from Dan Werner, sped down to the free-throw line, drew the defense and dished it off to a wide-open Parsons.

"That was an unbelievable shot but an even better pass," Parsons said.

Parsons missed his first three shots from beyond the arc on the night, but he said the last one felt good as soon as he let it go — unlike his other last-second

shot this season.

"I'm not gonna say the N.C. State one felt good off my hands, but this one did," Parsons said. "This one definitely felt good. No matter how many I miss, I'm gonna keep shooting."

Starting for the third-consecutive game in place of Werner, Parsons finished with 10 points and 10 rebounds for the fourth double-double of his career while playing a team-high 36 minutes.

Three other Gators finished in dou-

ble figures, led by Kenny Boynton's 14 points.

Boynton shot just 5 of 13 from the field and 0 of 5 from beyond the arc, but he went 4 for 4 from the free-throw line, including three clutch shots late.

Down 54-52 with 11 seconds to go, Boynton drew a shooting foul on Gamecocks guard Ramon Galloway. The freshman went to the line and drained all three free throws, giving the Gators a one-point lead.

"One thing that's going to be lost in this game is the fact that a freshman walked up to the free-throw line and made three free throws with 11 seconds to go down by two," Donovan said. "That says a lot about him as a player, his focus and what kind of player he is."

wide postseason tournament look good.

"The college level is really the base level for growth in rugby (in the US) at the moment because that's where it's developed," UF A-side captain Neal Dupree said. "I think you're really seeing the beginning of something new that's going to be sticking with the American sports culture."

The camaraderie element is also interesting. After Friday night's matches, the two teams hit the pub together.

"In the game, you were hitting someone in the face and now you're sitting down having a drink with them," Dupree said. "It's a powerful chemistry that the sport maintains. The level of respect for going out on the field is something I think you don't see in most American sports."

The game is entertaining, even for those who don't grasp its intricacies.

also scored in double-figures for the Gamecocks, who were second in the SEC in three-point shooting at 47 percent, but went 5 of 16 from beyond the arc (31 percent).

"Kelsey is so talented," UF coach Amanda Butler said. "She's the total package because she's big, she's strong, and she is so skilled. The more we could get her off the floor, certainly that improved our chances."

With Stewart limited on the offensive end by fouls, other Gators stepped up in the second half. Lucas scored nine second-half points, and Lonika Thompson hit back-to-back three-pointers to sustain a four-minute 9-4 UF run while Bone was benched due to foul trouble. Smith and Lucas led the Gators with 11 points each.

Florida cleaned up its play with four turnovers in the second half compared to 12 in the first half.

At the men's basketball team's matchup with South Carolina on Saturday, Butler encouraged fans to come out for her team's game as well, and she thanked the O'Connell Center crowd of 2,053 after the game.

"[The fans] were as much a part of the win as George's block at the end," she said.
