Public safety group looks into shooting

■ MACHEN CALLED FOR THE INDEPENDENT INVESTIGATION.

An independent investigation into the March 2 University Police shooting of a UF graduate student at Corry Village is underway, said UF President Bernie Machen in an e-mail to students, faculty and staff Friday.

Margolis, Healy & Associates, a public safety organization specializing in school security, is working with the Florida Department of Law Enforcement to collect data and interview witnesses to resolve concerns about the shooting of Kofi Adu-

Brempong, Machen said.

Adu-Brempong, the 35-year-old Ghanaian graduate student who faces charges of resisting arrest and aggravated assault, was shot in the face by UPD officer Keith Smith after a two-hour standoff.

Although he was initially placed in critical condition after suffering hand and jaw injuries, he is now able to communicate with hand gestures and facial expressions, said Larry Turner, Adu-Brempong's lawyer.

In a phone conversation, Machen said students who have information regarding the inci-

Site offers parking

A Web site created by UF students could ease the pain associated with finding parking in Gainesville.

Sargent White, a UF masters student in finance and information systems, joined about six of his friends to launch ParkontheFly.com in December to give users the chance to use cell phones or computers to reserve parking spots in lots across the city.

The site is hosting a kick-off promotion today in an empty lot at University Avenue and Southwest 13th Street.

Users who park in the lot near McDonald's get two free weeks of parking.

After registering with ParkontheFly.com, users can go to the site and click on a map with one of seven lot locations to reserve a spot near their destination. The locations range from lots downtown to Southwest 34th Street. With a credit or debit card, they pay 40 to 80 cents per hour to lot's owner and can print out passes, White said. ParkontheFly.com may receive a portion of profits.

On the Web

Scott Fox, transportation services director, said the system could impact the university's sustainability campaign.

"Do we want to encourage and promote more students driving instead of riding bikes, carpooling and commuting options?" Fox said.

Google pushes broadband

Google plans to make broadband Internet look slow, and Gainesville might be one of the first cities to surf the new ultra-high-speed Web.

Google wants to provide Internet speeds more than 100 times faster than what most Americans have access to with new fiber-to-the-home connections, according to the company's corporate Web site.

The goal is to make Internet access better and faster for everyone, but the company first needs to build and test the network. Gainesville has applied to be one of the trial locations.

Cox Communications Premier Internet service, which costs about \$65 per month, offers speeds up to 20 megabytes per second, according to the company's Web site. Google's experimental network will deliver

speeds of one gigabyte per second, meaning Google's network would be 50 times faster than what's offered in Gainesville.

These speeds parallel the network on UF's campus, which runs at about one gigabyte per second, according to Dave Pokorney, UF's assistant director of network services.

Pokorney said Google's potential Internet network would be like going from rid-

key. He returned the truck to the lot, but police believe he stole it overnight using the duplicate key.


The dealership owner drove to the man's address and found the truck parked about 10 blocks away.

Devotees of Fla. man say they ingested snail mucus

MIAMI (AP) — Devotees of a man claiming to practice a traditional African religion said they had to ingest the mucus of a Giant African Snail that sickened them. Federal authorities in January raided the Miami man's home after receiving complaints. The man has not been criminally charged, but prosecutors and state and federal wildlife agencies are investigating. The Giant African Snail is prohibited in the U.S. without special ap-

proval.

Experts said it devastates new ecosystems. The snail grows up to 10 inches long, can reproduce on its own and can even eat plaster.

The man said he meant no harm, and his religion uses the snails in healing ceremonies.

Followers said they got violently ill, losing weight and developing strange lumps in their stomachs.

Police: Woman in bust hid nearly \$26,000 in bra

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — A fraud bust, indeed: Spokane County sheriff's deputies said a woman was hiding nearly \$26,000 in her bra when she was booked into jail for investigation of theft. Lukeisha A. Harris was one of three Seattle-area residents arrested Friday as part of an alleged fraud ring. Deputies said they used phony Oregon driver's licenses and counterfeit credit cards to obtain cash advances from Spokane banks.

Sheriff's spokesman Dave Reagan said the three were arrested after a worker at one bank reported that they tried to obtain money using a stolen credit card. The investigators followed the ring to two other banks before making the bust.

Reagan said that during a search at the Spokane County Jail, guards found that the 24-year-old Harris — who is 6 feet tall and 400 pounds — had the cash hidden in her bra, along with bank receipts.

It was not immediately known Saturday if Harris or the other suspects had lawyers.

Police: Man, 77, ate hidden pot stash in squad car

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — Police in Iowa City accused a 77-year-old man they arrested on traffic charges earlier this year of swallowing his hidden mari-

juana stash while seated in a squad car. Authorities served an arrest warrant on misdemeanor marijuana charges Thursday on Howard Switzer, and later released him on his own recognizance.

Police said they observed Switzer making an illegal left turn on Jan. 31 and arrested him for driving with a revoked license. They say that while Switzer was in the back of the squad car, he reached into a coat pocket, pulled out a plastic tube containing marijuana and swallowed most of the contents. They said he also dropped the tube and a glass marijuana pipe on the floor of the car. Authorities said Switzer has two previous marijuana convictions.

Authorities: Neb. man too drunk for DUI sentencing

PAPILLION, Neb. (AP) — Authorities said a 30-year-old man showed up so drunk for his sentencing for drunken driving that he missed his hearing and now faces even more time behind bars. Authorities said Jason Botos was driven to the Papillion courthouse on Thursday by his father, who needed help from deputies to get his son out of the vehicle.

Prosecutor Ben Perlman said Botos was so drunk he couldn't attend the hearing, so the judge issued a warrant. Deputies arrested Botos in the parking lot.

Another hearing is set for Tuesday. A jail spokeswoman said Botos remained in custody Friday. Botos' attorney didn't immediately return a call.

Botos had pleaded guilty to misdemeanor drunken driving in a September 2009 collision with five other vehicles.

Inmates let the dogs out

Keith Skipper has taught MoJo, a 1-year-old Basenji and Italian greyhound mix, everything he knows.

He's taught him how to obey basic commands. He's taught him how to play nicely with other dogs and people. He's even taught him how to jump through a hula hoop 3 feet off the ground.

Skipper, an inmate at Gainesville Work Camp, spent eight weeks training MoJo as part of Paws on Parole, a program that pairs inmates with rescued dogs from Alachua County Animal Services.

On March 5, Skipper watched MoJo graduate. "It's a great, great program and a real win-win situation," said Hilary Hynes, Alachua County Animal Services public education program coordinator and Paws on Parole organizer.

Each class consists of six inmates partnered with six dogs. For eight weeks, the inmates spend about seven hours per day training their dogs, teaching them basic commands, obedience and social skills assisted by two professional trainers.

The dogs are put up for adoption for a \$45 adoption fee once they graduate.

The program was founded a year ago, and since then, 36 dogs have graduated.

Sgt. Eric Wooten, work squad sergeant and

Paws on Parole organizer, said inmates learn patience and accountability by training the animals.

"It's a lot of responsibility, having to care for another," Wooten said.

The dogs become more adoptable through their training while the inmates learn how to properly handle and care for the dogs, Hynes said.

"[The inmates] are just fantastic. They are great with the dogs," Hynes said. "I'd hire any of them as a dog trainer."

Many dogs that enter the program have been abused or abandoned. Through the training, the inmates help the dogs overcome some of these behavioral and psychological problems.

All six dogs in the latest graduating class were adopted before they completed the program.

Steven Sanchez came from Altamonte Springs, Fla., to pick up his graduate, MoJo. After finalizing paperwork, and buckling on a New York Yankees collar, MoJo was a member of the Sanchez family.

"We can't wait to have him for years to come," he said.

City fire chief to resign, begin county position

After nearly 25 years with Gainesville Fire Rescue, Fire Chief Bill Northcutt will resign this month to work with the Alachua County Fire Rescue.

Northcutt's current salary with the city is \$113,061. As Alachua County's chief of fire rescue operations and deputy director of the Department of Public Safety, his salary with the county will be \$107,000 a year.

The slight decrease will be offset by pension benefits as well as valuable personal and professional gains, Northcutt said.

"I think it provides me a lot of

opportunities I wouldn't otherwise have," he said. "Salary is not everything."

He will oversee services the city doesn't supply, such as supervising ambulance and emergency medical transport.

Northcutt, 53, has been Gainesville's fire chief for more than four years and the deputy for about six.

"Prepare yourself for where you want to be so that you're ready when the opportunity comes," Northcutt said. "Because if you're not ready, you won't be able to take advantage when it comes your way."



Five Race for District 4

Gainesville voters will elect a new Gainesville mayor and a new member to the City Commission's District 4 on Tues-

day. District 4 includes most of the UF campus. The District 4 seat opened when current Commissioner Craig Lowe announced his resignation in order to run for the mayoral

seat. The mayor seat will be open when Mayor Pegeen Hanrahan completes her final term. She met Gainesville's two-term limit. The following are brief platform sketch-

Penny Wheat

Penny Wheat served two 8-year terms as a board member of the Alachua County Commission from 1986 to 1994 and from 1996 to 2004.

Wheat's platform focuses on ecological sustainability and preservation. She said maintaining pure water in Gainesville a top priority. She said cleaning the Cabot-Koppers Superfund site on Northwest 23rd Avenue is critical for maintaining a clean water supply in Gainesville.



Randy Wells

Randy Wells is running on a platform of sustainability and promotion of small businesses.

If elected, Wells said he will work to encourage UF students to remain in Gainesville after graduation. Promoting student-run small businesses in Gainesville will help the area economically, he said. Wells also supports the Gig4GNV, a campaign to bring Google's high-bandwidth pilot program to Gainesville.



Nathaniel Sperling

Nathaniel Sperling, the youngest candidate in the District 4 race at 24 years old, graduated from UF in 2008 with a degree in history.

Sperling said the Gainesville City Commission needs to learn from its mistakes to improve the local economy. Sperling added he wants to work with UF's administration to ease campus parking tensions. He also wants to address the high cost of utilities and power in Gainesville.



Mason Alley

Mason Alley is running on a platform about employment.

East Gainesville is another important issue for Alley, who added permitting the status quo is unjust.

"Too many people are willing to keep Gainesville exactly as it is," he said. "When you say you want to keep Gainesville exactly the way it is, you're saying that you want to keep people exactly where they are. I want justice, so I want jobs."



Pat Fitzpatrick

Pat Fitzpatrick wants to end poverty in Alachua County.

"Students should vote for me [so that] hungry children can eat," Fitzpatrick said.

Fitzpatrick, who has been involved in social work for more than 40 years, said taking care of the poor should be the commission's top priority. His campaign platform centers on eliminating the St. Francis House's meal limits, which has a limit of 130 meals per day.

Campus may have been quiet during Spring Break, but the Gainesville Raceway was not.

The 41st annual Gatornationals drag racing competition took place Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

About 100,000 tickets were sold, and the event brought dozens of drivers from all across the country to participate in one of the National Hot Rod Association's most prestigious events.

Gatornationals held races for several classes of vehicles, which included motorcycles, funny cars, and alcohol-burning dragster cars.

The dragsters, which are known as "top fuel" vehicles, can reach speeds of more than 300 mph and sounds exceeding 120 decibels.

They can be heard more than five miles away.

"If you've got delicate ears, you'd better stay away from here," said 72-year-old Gene Wester, who has worked at the event for 14 years.

Though he is not a racing fan, Wester said he keeps coming back to work each year because he loves the people the event attracts.

"I love the smells and the sounds," he said. "It's in your blood."

Top fuel racer Tony Schumacher won his category Sunday with runs that reached speeds of 324.98 mph and 322.04 mph, according to a release on the NHRA Web site.

Students to rally against UPD

Almost two weeks have passed since the University Police Department shooting of UF graduate student Kofi Adu-Brempong on March 2, and students plan to show their views on the incident.

On Tuesday, The Coalition for Justice Against Police Brutality, a group of students and community activists, will be leading a rally to protest the UPD shooting.

Protesters will meet at 11 a.m. on Turlington Plaza and march to the University Police Department and Emerson Alumni Hall to share their concerns with UPD and the Board of Trustees.

Justin Wooten, the rally organizer, said the protest will let students and other residents express their opinions about the charges brought against Adu-Brempong and to protest the university's handling of the situation.

Wooten said university administrators typically do not like dealing with controversial issues because of their sensitive and difficult nature.

"The more people who come out and show their support, the more of an impact it will have on them," Wooten said.

UF spokeswoman Janine Sikes said the university appreciates student efforts to express their opinions through events such as rallies.

"Certainly, we embrace their ability to express their concerns in that way," Sikes said.

Dave Schneider, another organizer of the rally, said the group will ask for the punishment of Keith Smith, the UPD officer who shot Adu-Brempong, and for a thorough investigation of the shooting.

Matthew Wooten, a UF alumnus who had a class with Adu-Brempong but did not know him personally, said he thinks the entire incident and UPD's response is suspicious.

Wooten said he saw enough of Adu-Brempong to understand he had physical disabilities.

He said he didn't think Adu-Brempong could stand without his cane, let alone attack five police officers.

"I think something really crazy happened, and I smell something really fishy," he said.

Schneider said there have been instances in the past in which UPD has dealt with students in a questionable manner.

"This is unacceptable, and we're not going to stand for it anymore," he said.

dent are encouraged to contact the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, and anyone who helps the investigation will be offered legal protection and immunity.

"We were advised by several people that some students were afraid to speak," he said. "We certainly don't want them to worry and not come forward."

Student feedback to UF administration about the incident has been surprisingly low, he said.

The e-mail needed to be sent before the end of break so those returning from vacation would be aware of how the administration is handling the situation, Machen said.

"Due to the unprecedented nature of this incident, I believe, and [UPD] Chief Linda Stump agrees, we must go to extra lengths to fully analyze every aspect..." he said.

Though the results of the investigation could produce some policy changes, Machen said UF is unlikely to restrict gun use by UPD officers.

Machen has advocated student firearm restrictions during his presidential tenure at the University of Utah — which allows guns on campus — and during his time at UF, but he said UPD needs guns to maintain order.

"I don't support applying a [gun] ban to police officers," he said.

Turner said two sheriff's deputies continually guard Adu-Brempong while he recovers at Shands at UF.

Bond is being held at \$10,000, but it will not be posted, Turner said. As long as Adu-Brempong is under the custody of the department of the jail, his medical expenses are covered by the state and not his own insurance, he said.

"If the government shot him, they should pay to fix him," he said.

The Lowe Down

Voters should elect Craig Lowe for mayor

Tuesday, Gainesville voters will decide the city's next mayor, and residents who live near the UF campus will also decide who will fill a City Commission spot.

For commission, The Editorial Board endorses Randy Wells, who supports the city's anti-discrimination ordinance, equal rights for domestic partners, diversity training and city support of annual Pride Days.

He also supports environmental protection and closing the Cabot/Superfund site. Wells serves on the City Planning Board, chairs the Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Board and the city's Affordable Housing Advisory Committee. Wells would make an excellent commissioner, and we trust him to represent us.

For mayor, The Editorial Board strongly supports Craig Lowe. In his three terms as a commissioner, Lowe earned our trust and proved he cares about people and the environment.

His platform includes pushing the Environmental Protection Agency to clean up the Koppers Superfund site, developing the local economy, supporting small businesses and defending the jobs of the city's first responders, so firefighters and police can focus on helping people. He also serves as chair of the city's Equal Opportunity Committee and led a successful campaign against the discriminatory Charter Amendment 1 last year, which would have deleted protection for transgenders. He's also involved in and has received awards from several local human rights and environmental organizations.

While amendments to the anti-discrimination ordinance will not appear on ballots this election, candidates' positions on the issue are a way to gauge their ability to represent Gainesville.

Richard Selwach opposed the anti-discrimination provisions and supported the amendment that would have deleted them. According to an e-mail sent out by the Human Rights Campaign, Monica Cooper proved she wasn't familiar with the amendment or the ordinance. When the interviewer asked Cooper's stance, it was clear she didn't know Charter Amendment 1 failed or even existed. Don Marsh plans to "fix the transgender bathroom ordinance." When the HRC interviewer asked to speak with him, he said Craig Lowe would "probably represent [the campaign's] interests better than [Marsh] could."

These candidates' ignorance of or insensitivity to such an important civil rights issue is alarming, and Lowe's record of supporting equal rights assures us he is the right candidate.

The fifth candidate, Ozzy Angulo, supports the city's anti-discrimination ordinance and has good ideas about supporting small businesses and protecting the environment, but he opposes the Project Grace one-stop homeless center, which is a necessary step in helping Gainesville's homeless. He also lacks Lowe's experience and positive political history.

Don Marsh also opposes the center, saying it would attract "societal malcontents." We won't elect a mayor who feels that way about the homeless. Lowe has supported the center and worked to convince the commission to support it.

His experience in city government and his continued support of human rights endeavors make him the clear choice.

Lowe would be the city's first openly gay mayor. Gainesville has already established its reputation for being a progressive city, and electing a gay mayor would be a step in the same direction. Of course, we would not suggest that this is the reason voters should choose Lowe, but it is another advantage to a candidate we would support regardless of his sexual orientation.

Lowe has also reached out to students and encourages their involvement in the political process, as opposed to Cooper, who said UF students "act like little children." We admit students don't always make the best decisions, but we don't to be represented by someone who doesn't respect or understand us.

We're certain Craig Lowe does both, and we wholeheartedly endorse him and Randy Wells for tomorrow's election.



Student plays volleyball in buff

One UF student left behind his clothes and his worries about tan lines when he headed to the Lake Como Nudist Resort near Tampa for a nude volleyball tournament at the beginning of Spring Break.

Daniel Phillips, the founder of Naturist Gators, a group representing college-age nudists in Gainesville, participated in the 9th annual Super Bowl South Volleyball Tournament, held from March 4 to March 7.

Phillips was the only member of Naturist Gators who attended the tournament, so he joined up with the Pennsylvania-based Tiki Tomba volleyball team, which won the tournament's novice division.

Phillips said the win was unexpected because it was the first time the team practiced volleyball together.

Through Naturist Gators, Phillips does more than attend volleyball tournaments.

He hopes to educate others about a nudist lifestyle and wants to fix misconceptions about nudists.

"We are not exhibitionists," he said. "We only get naked where it is legal and socially acceptable."

Eli Porr, a member of the Tiki Tomba team and a communications senior at East Stroudsburg University in Pennsylvania, was raised in a nudist colony.

He remembers playing volleyball, both with and without clothing, since he could walk.

Despite the nature of the game, players are allowed to wear clothing, he said.

Porr has seen women wear sports bras and shorts and men wear hats and shoes.

For Audra Kern, an English and communications major at East Stroudsburg University and a member of the Tiki-Tomba team, the tournament was her first experience playing naked volleyball in Florida.

ing a skateboard to riding a rocket ship.

Ted Kellermann, Gainesville Regional Utilities Internet service director, said Gainesville would be a great city for Google's network because, like the country, it has a suburban and rural mix.

Kellermann said it would cost Google about \$1,500 per home to install the new network throughout the city, but he said Google would benefit from selecting Gainesville because UF students and researchers will best utilize the service by developing new ultra-high-speed applications.

Kellermann said local support would increase Gainesville's chance of being selected.

Interested students can join Facebook group Gig4GNV.

The new network will have open access, allowing consumers to choose from multiple providers like Cox, AT&T and GRUCom. Google intends to offer services at competitive prices, according the company's Web site.

Gators land first NCAA Tournament bid since 2007

After two disappointing seasons and a long two-day wait, Florida is back in the NCAA Tournament.

The Gators (21-12, 9-7 Southeastern Conference) will be in the Tournament for the first time since winning back-to-back national championships in 2006 and 2007. UF received a No. 10 seed in the West Region and will play seventh-seeded BYU in Oklahoma City on Thursday.

If the Gators beat the Cougars (29-5), they would face the winner of No. 2 seed Kansas State vs. No. 15 seed North Texas.

"We're very, very excited, and grateful for the opportunity," UF coach Billy Donovan said in a statement. "I'm most excited for our players having a chance to experience this. For most of them, this is something they haven't been through yet. They've worked so hard from day one, and it's great to see them rewarded."

"We'll get to work on BYU right away. They come from a great league, have a great program, and it's a very difficult opponent for us."

Although Florida received a No. 10 seed, the team entered Sunday night's selection process completely unsure whether it would even make the field.

An early exit from the SEC Tournament on Friday night, coupled with several other bubble teams performing well in their conference tournaments, had many experts projecting the Gators would make a third straight National Invitation Tournament.

"It was a stressful 48 hours not knowing if we were in or out," junior forward Chandler Parsons said. "We're really excited to be a part of it. For most of us it's our first experience with the NCAA Tournament. We don't just want to go and play one game. We want to prove we're deserving of being

Tourney berth comes as a shock

Wow. I had looked down and thought I needed to have my hearing checked, and I'm pretty sure you had a similar reaction.

Did I just hear "Florida" on the TV? I flipped back 30 seconds on my DVR and thought maybe I needed to have my eyes checked, too.

The team everyone had pegged not to be in the field of 65 made it. CBS later revealed Florida was the fourth-to-last at-large pick.

The Gators didn't have to sweat too long as they watched the selection special Sunday, getting picked as the No. 10 seed in the second region announced.

UF will face seventh-seeded BYU on Thursday with a possible second-round matchup against No. 2 seed Kansas State.

Not that BYU will be an easy upset.

All five of the Cougars' losses came against teams in the NCAA Tournament field. They lead the Mountain West in scoring (83 ppg) and three-point shooting (42

percent).

BYU guard Jimmer Fredette averages more than 20 points per game and shoots better than 45 percent from the field and from three-point range.

But today, you should remember waking up on the right side of the bubble and be a little more grateful Billy Donovan stuck around in Gainesville.

This season may have been one of Donovan's best coaching performances.

That may sound strange considering his back-to-back national titles a few years back, but those squads were some of the best college teams ever. I find it more impressive when coaches get more out of less.

I wouldn't say Florida overachieved, be-

UF takes national title

Behind seven individual All-American performances, the UF men's track team won the 2010 NCAA Indoor Championships in Fayetteville, Ark., this weekend.

It's the first indoor championship for the program and the 23rd national championship in school history.

"I'm extremely proud and very excited about everyone in the program," coach Mike Holloway said. "It's great to see hard work come together, especially when it comes together for a championship."

The women finished fourth, their best since 2005, and had four All-Americans.

The men finished with 57 team points, holding off Oregon and defending national champion Texas A&M, which both fin-

ished with 44 points for second place. The women scored 33 points, finishing behind first-place Oregon, Tennessee and LSU.

Freshman Jeff Demps set a school record in the 60-meter dash preliminaries, running a 6.56. He ran a 6.57 in the finals to win the event and give the Gators 10 team points. Senior Jeremy Hall finished sixth in 6.66 seconds, scoring three team points.

Tony McQuay joined Demps and Hall in winning All-America honors.

The freshman finished third in the 400 with his 45.74 and scored six points for the Gators. He finished eighth in the 200, running it in 20.80 and recording his second

Charleston Southern hands No. 6 UF first home loss

Charleston Southern's cleanup hitter beat Florida from the mound instead of the batter's box Sunday.

Junior Tyler Thornburg, who hit fourth in all three games against No. 6 UF (11-3), took the mound in the third matchup and struck out 11 in a complete-game effort while limiting the Gators to a season-low three runs and seven hits. The performance took 158 pitches (101 strikes).

The right-hander baffled UF hitters for most of the day, and the Buccaneers (6-10) were able to steal the final game of the series and hand the Gators their first home loss of season by a score of 6-3 on Sunday.

"He was throwing all three pitches (fastball, breaking ball and changeup) for strikes," sophomore Preston Tucker said. "He's got three pitches that he's got good command of, and he pitched really well."

Despite going deep into pitch counts and running up Thornburg's pitch count, the Gators couldn't force the Buccaneers to use their bullpen.

"We do that with most pitchers, especially if it's a Sunday game and the team has a blown-out bullpen," Tucker said of a CSU team that threw out four bullpen pitchers Saturday. "You just try to run the pitch

count up, but he stayed out there and did real well."

Thornburg also helped give CSU a 1-0 lead in the first with a sacrifice

fly to drive in Brantley Meier.

The Buccaneers scored two more off sophomore pitcher Tommy Toledo in the third thanks to a two-run

homer from center fielder Jon Matthews that curled just inside the left-field foul pole to make it 3-0.

But things took a turn for the

worse in the fourth when Toledo was struck in the face by a comebacker. He left the game and was rushed to the hospital after lying motionless for about three minutes.

A UF spokesman said Toledo sustained facial fractures and a broken nose, and he was released from Shands at UF on Sunday evening.

The Gators bounced back from the incident in the bottom of the inning, loading the bases with no outs. Left fielder Tyler Thompson hit a sacrifice fly to score one, but the next two batters, Bryson Smith and Kamm Washington, struck out swinging to end the threat.

"It hurt a ton," Tucker said. "You don't know how many opportunities you are going to have in a game, and unfortunately that was one of the few we got and we didn't cash in."

Florida attempted to rally one last time in the bottom of the ninth with the score 6-2, but it was only able to plate one run.

"He never gave us a chance to get the tying run up to the plate," UF coach Kevin O'Sullivan said. "That's about as gutsy a performance as I've seen in a long time."

The Gators won the first two games 6-0 and 12-2, and they'll try to bounce back from the loss Monday against Army at 6:30 p.m. Sophomore Anthony DeSclafani will start.

No. 4 Gators take series with finale win against Rebels

After going just 3 for 14 with runners in scoring position in Game 2, Florida got the big hits right when it needed them Sunday.

Less than 24 hours after turning 22 base runners into only four runs in a 6-4, extra-inning loss, the No. 4 Gators (18-3, 2-1 Southeastern Conference) were able to score five runs on just four hits as they salvaged a home series win with a 5-3 victory over Ole Miss (16-10, 3-2 SEC).

Although UF matched its SEC loss total

from each of the last two seasons after just three games, coach Tim Walton is still pleased with his team's performance.

win after you lose," Bush said. "You want to show that that pushed you and that it's really fueling you for games to come."

there."

Florida's beefed-up nonconference schedule was part of the reason it made the field over a team like Mississippi State, which beat UF on Friday and Vanderbilt on Saturday but did not make the Tournament.

UF closed out its season in unimpressive fashion, losing four of

its last five games and falling out of the SEC Tournament with a second-round loss.

But its early season wins against FSU and Michigan State, along with a 75-62 victory over Tennessee, were enough to help the Gators get back into the Tournament.

UF will share a bracket with fourth-seeded Vanderbilt, one of four SEC teams to make the

field. Kentucky is the No. 1 seed in the East Region, and Tennessee earned the sixth seed in the Midwest Region.

Although a more competitive

SEC helped boost their strength of schedule, they helped themselves by scheduling nonconference opponents like Syracuse, Michigan State, Richmond and Xavier — all NCAA Tournament teams.

UF finished the season with the 56th-best RPI in the nation and went 3-8 against top-50 RPI teams this year.

Even in their losses, the Gators played nearly every opponent

close. They lost to Syracuse, Xavier and Kentucky by 12 points — their largest margin of defeat all year.

"We're all excited to be in the NCAA Tournament. It's such a great feeling," said senior forward Dan Werner. "That being said, now we need to turn our focus to BYU and need to come with right mindset and take full advantage of this opportunity."

cause this program should expect to compete for a NCAA Tournament bid every year. But it wasn't easy with this bad of a shooting team.

While there are still some eyebrow-raising moves — Dan Werner playing in crunch time and an improved Ray Shipman seemingly not getting enough minutes — the longest-tenured Southeastern Conference coach took a team of basically five guys to the Big Dance.

And he may have clinched this bid back in November with back-to-back wins over Florida State and Michigan State. The selection committee looks at a team's whole body of work, and UF is sure glad that is the criteria after losing four of its last five.

Donovan found a way to keep his players in nearly every game down the stretch. UF's biggest losing margin was 12-point losses to No. 1 seeds Syracuse and Kentucky and No. 6 seed Xavier.

But the best thing about the NCAA Tournament is the clean slate. Win six games and you're the champ.

If Florida finds some consistent scoring late in the games, it could be a force and make an unbelievable journey to the Sweet 16.

Would I count on it after UF's first 33 games? Absolutely not, but stranger things have happened, and they do call it March Madness for a reason.

The most important part is getting to the dance, and finally Florida has gotten an invitation.

Sometimes it's better as a surprise.

All-American honor.

"(McQuay) may be one of the best freshman I've ever had, and he proved that this weekend," Holloway said.

Senior Calvin Smith ran the 400 in 46.60, finishing eighth, and ran the 200 in 20.67, good for sixth place. Smith finished his UF career with 15 All-America titles, the most in school history and one more than decathlete Mike Morrison.

McQuay and Smith joined Preston Wilson and Jovon Toppin in the 4x400 relay. The unit finished fourth with a time of 3:05:78, earning an All-America honor.

Sophomore Christian Taylor defended his triple-jump title, winning the event with a school-record jump of 17.18 meters. He finished second in the long jump in 7.93 meters.

Omar Craddock, who joined the team in January, landed 16.15 meters in the triple jump to place seventh and be named an All-American.

Kemal Mesic finished second in the shot put. The junior threw 19.26 meters while earning his

third All-America title.

As expected, senior Mariam Kevkhisvili won her third-straight indoor shot put title. Her 18.59 meter throw was a personal best and secured her 13 straight event title.

Junior Charlotte Browning also earned All-America honors, finishing first in the women's 1600-meter run with a time of 4:35:66.

Shara Proctor took home two All-America titles in her senior season. She finished third in both the long jump and the triple jump, recording 6.64 meters and 13.71 meters, respectively.

Junior shot putter Keely Medeiros also earned All-America honors with her eighth-place throw of 16.44 meters.

"Our seniors were able to accomplish their goals," Holloway said. "When we recruited them, they talked about winning a national championship and now they have that monkey off their back."
