Graduate students project threatened

■ UF MADE A POLICY BANNING SPONSORED TRAVEL TO HAITI.

When Jon Bougher and Roman Safiullin went back to Haiti earlier this month, they shot about 12 more hours of footage for their master's thesis documentary, which follows Planting Peace, a philanthropic organization.

Unfortunately for the two UF graduate students, not one minute of the footage will be allowed in the final cut, rendering their thesis project incomplete.

In February, the university established a policy banning UF-sponsored travel to Haiti, so all the material gathered after the earthquake cannot be used in the students' final project.

According to UF spokesman Steve Orlando, the university's travel policy is meant to ensure student safety. The university is not certain students who travel there would have access to food, water and shelter, Orlando said.

"If you're watching CNN and watching Anderson Cooper in Haiti, the network is providing for his needs," Orlando said. "Two students going down there might not be getting the same access to those resources."

The thesis presentation is scheduled for April 15, and Bougher and Safiullin are concerned about whether they will be allowed to graduate because they feel their project is unfinished.

"It's very unfortunate that a university that has very high standards wants us to submit something very incomplete," Safiullin said. "That's not journalistic."

Bougher, who was recently named the Outstanding Master's Student in the College of Journalism and Communications, said he and Safiullin are more concerned with their work than with taking a shot at the university administration.

"As journalists, our goal is to get the best story possible," he said. "We're not trying to give the university a black eye; we're just trying to make the best film that we can."

In an e-mail to the College of Journalism and Communications faculty, Churchill Roberts, co-director of the Documentary Institute, said the students had two choices — they could either submit a thesis that didn't have any post-earthquake footage or abandon the thesis track and fulfill their degree requirements by taking comprehensive exams.

According to Roberts, both options "raise serious questions about academic integrity."

Linda Hon, the executive associate dean of the College of Journalism and Communications, and Debbie Treise, the college's associate dean for graduate studies, met with Roberts to discuss alternative ways the students could complete their thesis work.

Hon, through her assistant, declined an interview and said she "doesn't feel that she can respond since this is a university policy."

Roberts, who called the situation "a terrible embarrassment" for the university, said Bougher and Safiullin are more than capable of filming in Haiti. While the welfare of students is paramount, the university is setting a dangerous precedent by not allowing student journalists to travel to disaster areas, he said.

"That's what attracts journalists," he said. "If this is the university's knee-jerk reaction every time there's a natural disaster, they might as well close the door to the College of Journalism and Communications."

For now, Roberts said he is focused on making sure Bougher and Safiullin graduate and produce the best product they can.

"I would give anything to find a solution that would be acceptable for the university and for [the Documentary Institute]," he said.

Fall tuition increase likely

By this fall, UF's tuition will likely increase by 15 percent in order to bring it closer to the national average, according to UF President Bernie Machen.

The hike could accompany a switch to block differential tuition, which benefits students who take 15 or more credit hours per semester and would create a more steady revenue stream for the university.

Under block differential tuition, the state could increase tuition by 8 percent, and, according to Machen, UF would then increase tuition by 7 percent, which brings the total increase to 15 percent.

The 8 percent increase affects the tuition cost per credit hour while the 7 percent increase is based on a 15 credit hour course

load, which means students get a better value by taking 15 credit hours or more.

A bill related to the change in tuition policy for Florida public universities is currently being debated in the state legislature.

Before the change is made at UF, the bill must be approved by the Legislature and signed by the governor. UF would need to notify parents if administrators wanted to implement the change in the fall.

According to Machen, block tuition encourages students to graduate faster.

Currently, 58 percent of students graduate in four years, he

said.

As the cost of education becomes more of a burden for students, Machen said he hopes they will want to play a bigger role in the university's budgeting process.


"The student voice is important," he said.

Different budget proposals are being considered in both houses of the Florida State Legislature, and more budget cuts could be on the horizon.

Machen emphasized that there are some areas of the budget he would prefer not to cut.

"It is our preference not to make any more personnel or program cuts," he said.

At this month's Board of Trustees meeting, he expressed his concerns about cutting employee health and retirement benefits.

Counselors see increase in eating disorders in spring

After packing on the pounds during colder months and concealing the weight under heavy winter clothing, students begin to lose weight fast before summer.

"Leading up to the end of spring, we get more students who want to control their body image," said Liz Lagasse, a nutritionist at UF's Student Health Care Center who counsels students about nutrition and healthy dieting.

She said there has been a spike in appointments at the center before summer.

While most people have some distress about their appearance in shorts and bathing suits, it's especially troubling for those who suffer from eating disorders, she said.

"It's easy to imagine how the pressure to look good can trigger someone to go to the extreme to fit in and look the part," she said.

When Lagasse gets students who are overly worried about their body image and seem to have the potential to develop an eat-

ing disorder, she counsels them, offers to be a model of healthy self-esteem and teaches them to talk about themselves with respect and appreciation.

Marissa Noelte, a health science major and Student Recreation and Fitness Center employee, said she has overheard girls saying they are getting in shape for summer.

"If I wasn't secure in my body image, I would probably fall into that trap of being super thin because of what I see in magazines and on TV," Noelte said.

Eating disorders include anorexia, bulimia and binge eating disorder.

"It's not an easy issue," Lagasse said. "It cannot be cured by one word or a quote."





Incoming freshman gender gap follows national trend

Nicholas Slater was sitting in his health class of about 50 students when he noticed something bizarre about his class.

"I'm a guy," the UF psychology and sociology sophomore said. "I look around, and there's only four other guys in here."

But he said he didn't mind being surrounded by more women in the classroom.

"It's kind of nice," he said, with a laugh. "To be honest, I wouldn't want to go to a university with a lot of guys."

Slater picked up on a national trend that is growing at UF. National college enrollment is now 57 percent female and 43 percent male.

According to UF spokesman Steve Orlando, six out of 10 new UF students will be women in fall 2010, which is the largest gender gap favoring female students that UF has ever had. UF's fall 2009 enrollment was 54 percent female and 46 percent male, according to the UF Office of Institutional Planning and Research.

UF is aware of the gap but not doing anything to balance the numbers, Orlando said. But he said the school isn't discriminating against male applicants.

"Boys wouldn't be admitted because they're boys," he said. "Girls are being admitted because they are doing the things to be admitted and boys aren't."

New Alachua County health program director takes office

The Alachua County health program Choices (Community Health Offering Innovative Care and Educational Services), which provides health care services to the county's working uninsured, got a new director Monday afternoon.

Bob Bailey, who has a master's degree in health administration from the University of

Cincinnati, said he has worked in health care for more than 35 years.

Bailey has lived in Gainesville for three years working for AvMed Health Plans.

Before that, he worked for various health management organizations in the Philadelphia area for 12 years.

Bailey, who began his first day in office Monday, was hired about two weeks ago to replace the previous director, Lorraine Austin.

Austin left four months ago for a different position.

Bailey said he wants to extend the benefits

offered by Choices to more eligible citizens in innovative ways, such as mobile health screenings.

"We want to get similar benefits to people in other parts of the county who may not have the quality of care as those in Gainesville proper," he said.

Bailey's appointment comes on the heels of Congress' historic passage of the Health Care and Education Affordability Reconciliation Act, which will reportedly extend health care coverage to 32 million Americans.

According to a press release, Bailey's starting salary is \$66,146.

Mayor recalls climate summit at coffee house

Mayor Pegeen Hanrahan was one of 80 mayors the White House invited to attend the Copenhagen Climate Conference in December, and she almost missed her chance to attend the international summit.

Hanrahan recounted that her December trip to Denmark to attend the conference meant to act as an international successor to the Kyoto Protocol Monday evening to about 30 people at Volta Coffee, Tea & Chocolate.

As Hanrahan recalls, she almost forgot to collect her conference passes before her trip across the globe.

The international conference was held in Copenhagen from Dec. 6 to Dec. 18 with Hanrahan attending the conference from Dec. 14 to Dec. 17.

Her trip was funded by Local Governments for Sustainability, a

membership association of more than 600 U.S. local governments committed to protection and sustainability.

The talk at Volta, which was sponsored by Alachua County Young Democrats, also included a Q-and-A session where members of the audience questioned the mayor about Gainesville's sustainable future.

Derek Helmick, a UF senior and member of Alachua County Young Democrats, asked Hanrahan what she thought the most effective use of her time was as mayor.

Hanrahan cited reducing Gainesville's reliance on coal.

"To up renewable energy to 26 percent is a pretty cool thing," Helmick said, referring to Hanrahan's plan for a biomass power plant for the city.

Danielle Emenhiser, 23, a UF alumna and president of Alachua County Young Democrats, said she felt it was important to have

a mayor who attends conferences like the one in Copenhagen.

"Gainesville has become world renowned for environmental efforts," she said. "I think it's an incredible opportunity."

Jon Reiskind, 69, chairman of the Alachua County Democratic Party, also attended the talk.

He said although the event was sponsored by a Democratic organization, its message was for

all citizens of Gainesville.

"We're not talking about a Democratic issue," he said. "We're talking about an international issue."

"It's just a great way to bring together residents from different areas," Babcock said.

It takes about a year to organize the event, and although small details like arranging the music can be stressful, the final product is the most rewarding part of Babcock's year.

"It's a stress that's worth it," she said. "It's an experience that's

worth it."

The audience especially appreciated the event's diversity.

Sriyani Dissanayake, a mother of a dancer in a classical Indian dance club Gator Natyam, enjoys UF's diversity.

"I like all kinds of music and dance, so I'm enjoying [the showcase]," she said. "I'm glad you are having this type of event for students to enjoy."

Siobhan Parker, a zoology ju-

nior, came to support her friends in the Brazilian Capoeira performance and was excited to see a variety of acts at the show.

"That Indian dance — I've never seen anything like it," she said.

Residence Hall Week does not just involve performances and activities. It has also raised more than \$600 for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation, said the philanthropy director Bethany Marchwinski.

Suicides should inspire compassion

Six Cornell University students have committed suicide since the start of the school year. Two of the six took their lives earlier this month.

This has placed the issues of suicide and depression as topics of national conversation — a rarity, given how the mere mention of those words in everyday conversation often yields discomfort, a tense hush and a hurried change of subject. This is a terrible reality, given that few topics could benefit more from open, honest discussion than those two.

Consider that some of the cruelest and most vicious forms of depression don't make you feel too weak to get out of it, they make you believe a way out of it doesn't even exist. Depression doesn't make you think that the supposed "selfishness" of suicide is justifiable, it gets you thinking that you're such a burden to the people you care about that removing said burden is the most selfless thing you can do.

By no means am I trying to romanticize suicide. Few would ever seriously suggest that there's anything romantic about the emotional writhing that prefaces a suicide attempt or the heartbreak that's born from it. Fewer still would have attempted it themselves, or has held the hand of someone they love who had attempted it, or had to say goodbye to someone they love who completed an attempt.

I am suggesting, though, that some compassion and understanding is called for — or, at least, something more than the accusations of weakness, cowardice and selfishness that sometimes accompany a discussion of someone taking their own life.

Is the idea to mitigate how tragic suicide is by framing it as a moral failure? That doesn't work — ask someone who has lost a best friend, a child or a significant other and see how much mitigation actually occurs.

Or is the idea to make suicide such an embarrassment that nobody does it? That doesn't work, either — you can't shame the hurt out of someone, and adding a layer of "feeling bad for feeling bad" does little more than further isolate someone

who already feels alone.

It's not contingent upon any of us to take ownership of anybody else's happiness. It's an unfair responsibility to place on oneself, and it's unfair to place an expectation on somebody to "get better" on someone else's terms or timetable.

However, we do have a responsibility, in whatever way we can, to

make it clear that we are here for each other. That feelings of loneliness, frustration and fear are universal and bind us together in a sometimes horrible, sometimes beautiful sort of way. That failure is an entirely natural part of living, and it's rarely final or irrevocable. That the love we offer each other is not dependent on any artificial, quantitative measure of success — and more importantly, that our love is offered not just when it's convenient or easy to do so.

And that it really, honestly is OK to talk about it aloud.

I don't pretend that tossing around words like love is some automatic, magical solution. Suicide is a complex problem for which there are no simple answers. And it's inappropriate to use the deaths of six students to draw presumptuous conclusions while their loved ones and their campus are all still mourning.

But if nothing else, the tragedy in Cornell is a reminder, however awful, that everybody has their own stuff going on — their own private battles that they're quietly fighting, their own personal hells they're enduring without any outward sign that something's wrong.

When we speak of love, I have to imagine that that in part means acknowledging this and giving each other the dignity and decency of treating each other accordingly. And cynicism or fear of triteness aside, I really don't think we can be guilty of having too much love.

Reed's transition to tight end key for UF's offense

at quarterback, and that was evident at Monday's practice. Florida's first team worked

primarily out of the I-form, and Reed even took snaps out of a Wildcat formation and managed

the offense for two series at the end of practice.

On a run up the middle, he

MOORE M.I.A., BUSHELL RETURNS: Receiver Carl Moore, an expected starter for next season, wasn't at Monday's practice. Moore practiced Saturday, and receivers coach Zach Azzanni and a UF spokesman declined to specify whether his absence was due to injury or off-field issues.

Maddox takes over at third

It took Austin Maddox three years to forget how to play third base.

And it took him just two days to relearn the position.

After starting the season splitting time between catcher and first base, Maddox could be making his fifth-straight start at the hot corner tonight when No. 8 Florida (18-5) takes on No. 4 FSU (19-4) at 7 in Jacksonville.

"It felt a little weird because I haven't

played there in so long," Maddox said. "But I'm getting used to it."

Usual third baseman Bryson Smith has not played since March 20, when he dislocated his finger against Mississippi State.

Needing a replacement, coach Kevin O'Sullivan asked Maddox to field ground balls the Monday after Smith's injury. Maddox played third base for a short time as a ninth grader at Eagle's View Academy, but

his play as a catcher drew scouts' attention so the position did not stick.

"To be honest with you, there was no hesitation at all when Bryson hurt his finger as to what we needed to do," O'Sullivan

said.

Last Wednesday, just two days after he began practicing third base,

Maddox started against Florida Gulf Coast. In the first at-bat of the game, he fielded a grounder and gunned it to first to record the out.

During that sequence, Maddox flashed the cannon that made

him a coveted recruit. He was once clocked at 94 mph as a pitcher, and his strong arm is an asset at third.

"If I can keep the ball in front of me, I've got a good enough arm where I can pick it up and throw (runners) out," Maddox said.

Despite playing four games at the position, Maddox has rarely been tested so it is unclear if he can be UF's long-term third baseman.

Maddox has recorded only five assists and already has an error. Moving to his left while tracking a ground ball Sunday, Maddox botched an attempt to scoop the ball and then could not locate it as it rested on the infield grass.

Maddox was able to recover, cleanly fielding two ground balls to help end the inning.

Already leading the Gators with seven home runs and batting average of .378, Maddox could be even more valuable as an everyday third baseman. He started the season splitting time between designated hitter and first base, and Florida was not getting much productivity out of its third baseman during that stretch.

Before dislocating his finger, Smith hit .255 and committed four errors in 16 games.

But with Maddox now at third, O'Sullivan can add his next-best batter to the lineup as DH. In Maddox's first three games at third, the strategy was unsuccessful as four players combined to hit 1 for 10 out of the DH spot.

Then on Sunday, Tyler Thompson showed how much Maddox's position change could help the Gators, going 3 for 5 as the DH and scoring two runs.

An extra bat could provide a boost to the UF's offense, assuming Maddox can shore up his defense.

"I feel like I've been doing pretty well over there," Maddox said. "I'm getting more comfortable every day. The more I play over there, the more comfortable I'm going to get."

Florida hopes to learn from mistakes against Oregon

Turnovers, poor defense have led to losses

Florida knows what it does wrong in losses, but the young team can't seem to avoid making those mistakes.

In its four defeats this season, three against ranked opponents, UF has committed 83 turnovers, allowed 61 goals and failed to capitalize on its scoring opportunities.

The Gators (6-4, 0-2 American Lacrosse Conference) will look to avoid that kind of play tonight when they host Oregon (4-6) at 6:30.

Of the teams' four common opponents, they each defeated Jacksonville and St. Bonaventure but lost to North Carolina and Johns

Hopkins.

In a matchup of similar teams, Florida will emphasize keeping its focus in the face of adversity, should it fall behind.

"We compete for a half or a cer-

tain amount of time, and then we don't," UF coach Amanda O'Leary said. "I'm not going to make excuses for it, as a group we need to figure out how to overcome those obstacles and beat these higher

ranked teams, and learn how to win and compete at that level."

The Gators' inconsistency began in February when they would take leaps forward then revert to old mistakes.

After it won the first two games of the season, UF suffered its first loss — a crushing 18-5 blow from

North Carolina. The Gators won the next game, but dropped the next two games.

A three-game win streak followed the losses, but UF's run had to end, and Ohio State were the one to do it.

Freshman midfielder Caroline Chesterman called the loss "a heartbreaker" and said her team allowed its opponent to capitalize on its mistakes, as the Gators turned the ball over 17 times.

"It's frustrating not being able to perform as well as you know you are able to, but there's nothing you can do except," Chesterman said. "We're going to learn from what happened against Ohio State, fix those things and try to win against Oregon."

In its losses, UF has especially struggled on the offensive side. The Gators have scored double-digit goals just once in their losses, something they have done in all six of their wins.

Against the Ducks, O'Leary's squad is going to have to be ready to handle the pressure on offense.

"We need to execute just a solid offensive game plan, (because) their defense slides very early to double teams," she said. "Defensively, we're going to need to come out and play a solid defense. It's just the same old thing that we try to do in every game."
