# City sees increase in citizen-reported crime

After the Gainesville Police Department saw an increase in crime from 2008 to 2009, the city has seen another increase, and this time, it's a good thing.

GPD Cpl. Tscharna Senn said there has been an increase in the

number of crimes reported by citizens, and this initiative has helped curb the city's climbing crime rate during the past three months.

While the University Police Department had a decrease in crime from 2008 to 2009, GPD had a 7.6 percent increase.

Senn said Chief Tony Jones put more officers on the street to tackle

the crime rate.

"We're dealing with crime differently," Senn said.

Senn said that she believes these

changes are responsible for the decrease in crime that GPD has seen in the past three months.

There has been a 7.42 percent reduction in violent crimes and a 2.5 percent decrease in property crimes, she said.

According to UPD Capt. Jeff Holcomb, the crime rate on UF's campus dropped 18.5 percent in

2009.

Theft is the most common crime on campus, and Holcomb said the best way for students to avoid becoming victims of theft is through education.

He said students need to protect their belongings and secure their property when leaving it unattended.

## People file, protest taxes

■ **A UF PROFESSOR OFFERED TAX TIPS FOR STUDENTS AND PARENTS.**

It's the one day throughout the year that causes everyone to cringe — unless you work for the IRS.

Happy Tax Day, Gainesville.

For students who have worked at all in the past year and had taxes withheld from their

paychecks, today is the last day to file taxes to receive a refund.

There are several tax credits available for college students, or their parents if they claim them.

The American Opportunity Credit provides a 100 percent tax credit for the first \$2,000 of tuition and a 25 percent credit for the next \$2,000.

The Lifetime Learning Credit is equal to 20 percent of tuition and related ex-

## UF approves Haiti footage

*The travel ban remains*

The UF graduate students who filmed post-earthquake footage in Haiti will be able to use their video for their master's thesis documentary.

Jon Bougher and Roman Safiullin reached an agreement with the UF Board of Trustees Wednesday allowing them to use the footage despite the fact that it was shot after the university established a policy banning UF-sponsored travel to Haiti.

UF spokesman Steve Orlando said an investigation showed that UF funds and resources were not used in the students' travel or work.

The students will include a statement saying the video was not funded, sanctioned

or approved by UF, Orlando said.

Safiullin said it was a relief to know the university understands the importance of the footage and the need for its inclusion in the documentary, which describes the philanthropic organization Planting Peace.

But the travel ban remains in effect, and Safiullin said he will continue to speak out about the ban and work with student organizations who are involved in Haiti relief causes.

Bougher said he feels the travel ban is overly restrictive and denies graduate students

and faculty the opportunity of doing work in Haiti.

The news that Bougher and Safiullin would be able to use their footage was accompanied by news that their adviser, Churchill Roberts, the co-director of the Documentary Institute, is undergoing an investigation by the Office of Human Resource Services, according to Bougher.

Roberts said he has been questioned about whether he encouraged or helped fund the students' return trips to Haiti.

Roberts said he was unclear where the students got the money for the trip, and the decision to return was their own.

"My job was to help them produce the very best thesis they could," Roberts said.

Orlando said he cannot comment about an ongoing Office of Human Resource Services investigation.

■ **Tater not: Deputies find cocaine posing as spud**


ATHENS, Ala. (AP) — Limestone County authorities have arrested a man they said tried to disguise five ounces of cocaine as a baked potato. Sheriff's Lt. Lance Royals said they got a tip Monday afternoon that a man in a silver Mustang had cocaine.

When investigators approached the man in a parking lot outside a restaurant, he said he had nothing illegal. Investigators searched the car and found a carryout plate with chicken, rice and what looked like a foil-wrapped potato. The foil contained five ounces of cocaine. The 21-year-old originally gave a false name and said he lived in Huntsville but couldn't remember the address, but Royals found out his real name.

### Woman walks across Fla. to raise awareness on sexual abuse

Lauren Book-Lim is cultivating two things: sexual abuse awareness and a bad case of shin splints.

In recognition of Sexual Assault Awareness Month, the 25-year-old's 500-mile walk across Florida will lead her through UF Friday morning, where she will talk about the sexual abuse she endured as a

teenager and encourage those who have been abused to seek help.

"It's time to shed the shame," she said in a phone interview Wednesday. "It's always OK to tell someone about [abuse.]"

Her trek, called, "Walk in My Shoes," began April 2 in her home town of Aventura, near Fort Lauderdale, and is scheduled to end at the Florida state capitol building in Tallahassee, where she will lobby for the passage of legislation intended to protect children from sexual abuse.

At 9 a.m. on Friday, students will be encouraged to walk with Book-Lim from the Reitz Union to the Plaza of the Americas, where she will speak, said Sarah Kunkler, a UF sophomore and spokeswoman for the event.

Book-Lim, who is averaging about 28 miles each day, said it has been exciting to see people across the state tell how they escaped abuse.

# City to review votes today

Originally slated to be Gainesville's opportunity for a political intermission, the next few days will instead play a pivotal role in deciding who will be Gainesville's next mayor.

Today at 5 p.m., the City of Gainesville Canvassing Board will reconvene in order to review provisional ballots cast in Tuesday's mayoral election between City Commissioner Craig Lowe and Don Marsh. As of Tuesday night, Lowe holds a 35-vote lead over Marsh.

At stake are 21 provisional ballots, which are ballots cast by people whose eligibility to vote are uncertain.

The Canvassing Board will review the ballots to make sure that they can be used in the election data, said Alachua County Supervisor of Elections Pam Carpenter.

Even if all 21 provisional votes are validated and given to Lowe, it would only give him 50.2 percent of the vote, which,

compared to Marsh's 49.8 percent, is less than the half-percentage-point margin required by law to bypass a recount.

Without a clear majority, a mandatory recount would need to take place, which would likely occur Friday when the Canvassing Board meets at the Supervisor of Elections Operations Center.

A manual recount will be conducted if the margin between the two candidates is a fourth of a percentage point or less, while a machine recount will be conducted if it is between a fourth of a percentage point and half of a percentage point.

According to Eric Conrad, Lowe's campaign spokesman, Lowe will be in attendance for Thursday's canvassing meeting. It could not be determined whether Marsh would be present at the meeting as well.

Should there be any irregularities with the recount process, Conrad said the campaign would not hesitate to pursue legal action but feels confident that the current outcome will stand.

# Acupuncture recipients limited by blood law

Plasma-donating acupuncture patients are feeling the pinch.

When Morgan Guoan visited the DCI Biologicals plasma-donation center on Northwest Sixth Street in Gainesville, she was asked to leave because she had undergone acupuncture therapy in the previous 12 months.

"As soon as I said I had acupuncture, they denied me and told me I couldn't come back for a year," she said.

Guoan, a second-year veterinary student at UF, is not the only acupuncture patron who has recently been denied the chance to donate plasma, said Candice Nelms, an acupuncture physician in Hollywood, Fla.

Nelms, a graduate of the Dragon Rises College of Oriental Medicine in Gainesville, recently received a form from DCI Biologicals asking her to confirm that she used clean needles on one of her former patients who wanted to donate plasma.

The form, called "Certification of Sterile Technique During Body Piercing, Tattoo or Acupuncture Procedure," stated that federal law prohibits anyone who gets acupuncture from giving plasma until at least 12 months later unless he or she can prove the needles were sterile.

For Nelms, receiving such forms

is both unnecessary and insulting.

For the last 13 years, every acupuncture needle used in Florida has been, by law, just as sterile as the needles used to draw the blood of people who donate plasma.

The Florida Regulation of Professions and Occupations statute 457 mandates all acupuncture needles be sterile and disposable.

Despite the law, it is not uncommon for acupuncture patrons to be denied at plasma donating centers in Gainesville, Nelms said.

"Some people have had horrible experiences and have felt harassed, and others have simply been denied immediate service," she said.

The fact that acupuncture is associated with tattooing and piercings is also upsetting because neither tattoos nor piercings are medicinal,

Nelms said.

Nelms, who is licensed to practice acupuncture anywhere in the U.S., wrote a letter to the DCI Biologicals staff asking them to either update their policies or "face potential complaints of discrimination."

LifeSouth Community Blood Center has no qualms with acupuncture patients donating, and there is no deferral period.

The American Red Cross Web site also states that acupuncture does not prevent a person from donating plasma.

Representatives from DCI Biologicals at the Gainesville office and national office refused to comment.



# Indian dance team wins title despite lack of funds

## It practices on basketball courts

The best Indian dance team in the U.S. practices wherever it can find an open floor.

Without a reserved indoor studio or Student Government funding, members of GatoRaas have spent months perfecting their high-energy choreography in residence hall basements and on vacant basketball courts.

As they prepare for the Volunteers for International Student Affairs (VISA) Talent Show in the O'Connell Center tonight at 7,

the 16 dancers are no strangers to financial obstacles.

"We try to move around to whatever is available, but there's never much space left," GatoRaas manager Monica Patel said.

Holding 16-inch Dandiya sticks, the characteristic props of Raas dancing style, the dancers' bare feet slam the pavement non-stop in sheer dedication for three to four hours, three times a week.

Raas, which originated in India's western state of Gujarat, has exploded onto the collegiate scene and represents a fusion of tradi-

tional and modern dance moves.

The GatoRaas team is a subdivision of the Indian Student Association, which falls under the umbrella of VISA. They will dance a portion of the India Inc. routine during the talent show, which will feature about five other Indian dance teams.

"We receive some funds through VISA, but by the time it gets down to our club, there's barely anything left," captain Sunny Patel said.

Members of the GatoRaas team, led by Sunny Patel and Shivani Amin, have paid out of their own pockets to make the treks from Gainesville to Texas, Indiana and Miami only to meet success.


They won first place in Dallas at the Raas All Stars national competition on April 3, first place at Miami Mayhem regionals in March, and third place at Indiana's Raas Royalty regionals in February.

GatoRaas is the first Indian dance team to win first place at an intercollegiate dance competition, but they can only compete a few times a year.

The team only has two chances to get judged because flying out to the competitions is a big burden, said captain Sunny Patel.

"I hope we can become our own official club under SG to get funded," Sunny Patel said. "After all these wins, maybe they'll see we are a worthy investment."

**PURPOSE:** The Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization (MTPo) for the Gainesville Urbanized Area has scheduled a public meeting to receive input concerning the proposed Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for Fiscal Years 2010/2011-2014/2015. The TIP is a staged implementation program of transportation projects consistent, to the maximum extent feasible, with the Alachua County and City of Gainesville comprehensive plans.

Projects in the proposed TIP are also consistent with the Gainesville Metropolitan Area Year 2025 Transportation Plan-The Livable Community Reinvestment Plan. This plan identifies transportation system modifications expected to be needed to serve projected volumes and patterns of traffic through the Year 2025. Final decision regarding all projects contained in the TIP will be forwarded to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) by the adoption of this TIP document.

The Federal Obligations Report is included in Appendix C of the TIP. This Report shows the expenditure of federal funds within the Gainesville Metropolitan Area from October 1, 2008 through September 30, 2009.

This map only shows some of the transportation projects scheduled during the next five years. The proposed TIP also includes other projects such as: bicycle/pedestrian; project development and environmental studies; resurfacing/repaving; school safety concern; transportation enhancement and transit projects, including transportation disadvantaged projects.

THE MEETING ROOM WILL BE OPEN AT 2:30 PM FOR THE PUBLIC TO REVIEW THE PROPOSED TIP AND STAFF WILL BE PRESENT TO ANSWER QUESTIONS.

All persons are advised that if they decide to contest any decision made at this public meeting, they will need a record of the proceedings and, for such purpose, they may need to ensure that a verbatim record of the proceedings is made, which record includes the testimony and evidence upon which it is to be based. All interested persons are invited to attend and be heard. This planning program is required in order to receive federal and state funds for transportation projects.

## Media should focus more on war-crimes

Recently, a video was released by WikiLeaks from an unknown source showing the killing of Iraqi civilians by American troops from an Apache helicopter July 12, 2007.

Their excuse for firing the shots was they "mistook" a journalist's camera for either an AK-47 or a rocket launcher, and they "thought" they might be insurgents. The horrendous 17-minute video shows real footage of the heinous crime that makes anybody with a true moral conscious question whether these "soldiers" were in a sane state of mind.

While watching the horrific video, I kept thinking these troops were acting like they were playing a video game. They were basically shooting at anything that moves.

According to more than one news source, the Apache helicopter killed 12 Iraqis and was equipped with Hellfire missiles and .30-caliber machine guns. Even when a minivan showed up to rescue the victims, shots were fired at the driver from the Apache helicopter.

I was outraged by the video — not necessarily shocked — because the U.S. Army has a history of slaying innocents and has always labeled it as "collateral damage." Since the war started in Iraq, civilians — including journalists, farmers, doctors and children, to name a few — have been ambushed and caught in the line of fire by military forces.

Among the 12 Iraqis killed on that tragic day was Namir Noor-Eldeen, a prominent photojournalist who worked for Reuters.

Though he was only 22 when he was killed, friends and coworkers describe him as a well-respected, brave human being who left behind an incredible body of work that documents the reality of war in Iraq. Another

victim was Saeed Chmagh, a Reuters driver and assistant. He was 40 years old and left behind a wife and four children. Along

with the dozen deceased Iraqis, two children were wounded.

I could not help but think about these two human beings who had nothing to do with insurgency and did not even have weapons.

They were normal, hardworking men with families, values and passion for their profession. How come these acts of murder are not covered by the U.S. media? Why do so many Iraqi victims get killed this way and their stories go untold?

Don't they deserve to be recognized and known for who they were, rather than be lumped together and become just a statistic?

Nobody can deny that these war crimes are serious violations of the Geneva Convention, and I defy anyone who says otherwise. These violators need to be put on trial; justice must be served. They owe it to the families of the deceased.

I am not surprised this did not get enough media coverage. When it was shown on the news, the footage was covered by a black box across the screen.

News reporters claimed it was out of respect for the victims' families. I am sure their families want the world to see this shameful atrocity that led to the loss of their loved ones forever, but typical American media gives precedence to celebrity news over exposed government cover-ups and war crimes.

# Clinton holds conference call

In an effort to promote his global humanitarian causes, former President Bill Clinton held a phone news conference with student reporters across the nation Wednesday.

Speaking from the Clinton Global Initiative University Meeting in Miami, Clinton discussed topics ranging from health care to education and current events.

He also encouraged people to participate in public service.

"The point is that everyone can make a difference," said Clinton, who called service an essential ingredient to being a good American citizen. "You don't need a lot of money to do good."

According to Clinton, the Clinton Global Initiative has assisted in improving the quality of life for 220 million people in more than 170 countries.

Calling his work as equally rewarding as his eight-year tenure in the White House, he said his humanitarian efforts allow him the opportunity to go to remote places and interact with more people than he could while serving as president.

"I'm very happy to be doing this," he said.

When speaking on political issues, he praised President Obama's efforts to get health care reform passed, something Clinton failed to do while in office.

He attributed the passage to a "better" Congress and the dire urgency within the country to have expanded health coverage.

"If you want to change things, you have to be willing to pay the price of time," he said.

Clinton also spent time discussing education and calling for efforts to curb rising higher education costs.

He said the costs of education are rising faster than the costs of inflation.

"The one thing that nobody disputes is that we have the best education system in the world," he said, calling it the crowning jewel of American society.

However, he said the opportunity for education is being priced out of students' hands.

Although he praised the efforts of the Clinton Global Initiative, especially those in the earthquake-ravaged nation of Haiti, Clinton stressed the need to expand commitment to public service.

In doing so, he does not want to lose what he called a sense of personal intimacy with those whom the program is helping.

He remains optimistic for the program's future. "We'll find an answer to keep this thing going," he said.

# Dead man wins Tenn. mayor race

TRACY CITY, Tenn. — A dead man has been elected mayor of Tracy City, Tenn.

Carl Robin Geary died suddenly a few weeks ago. But he received 268 votes anyway in Tuesday's nonpartisan election.

Geary beat out incumbent Barbara Brock with 85 votes in the two-candidate race.

An election administrator, Donna Basham, said Wednesday she wouldn't speculate on why Geary won the race posthumously but noted his death had been widely reported at the time in this corner of southeastern Tennessee.

She says the city council will now have to appoint a mayor to the four-year term.

Brock had been appointed mayor 16 months ago when the previous mayor died.

She says she thought she had done a good job but added voters wanted a return to the past.

UF students and residents from around the Gainesville community took a look back at the civil rights movement Wednesday night.

Mike Honey, award-winning historian of the civil rights and labor movements and president of the Labor and Working Class History Association, spoke to an audience of 60 at the East-side Recreation Center in east Gainesville.

The event, sponsored by the Samuel Proctor Oral History program, focused on the social change enacted by Martin Luther

King Jr.

He discussed how this change is relevant during the Obama administration.

In Honey's book, "Where Do We Go from Here: Chaos or Community?" he talks about King's

goal of unifying people by increasing economic equality and advocating in support of civil rights.

"It's very important to understand King in a way that most people usually don't," Honey

said.

"King always had a broad agenda for social change and dedicated his life to it," he added.

Throughout the event, Honey said achieving peace is just as

important an aspiration now as it was during the civil rights movement.

"If you can keep people divided, you can keep them weak," he said.

During the event, the audience joined Honey as he displayed his musical talents by performing a song entitled "Keep Your Eyes on the Prize."

After his performance, he discussed how the problems addressed by King are still evident today.

Honey said the United States leads the world in incarceration rates.

He questioned why it isn't leading in its ability to provide jobs.

"History doesn't repeat itself," Honey said. "King dedicated his life to push people to be able to go as far as their potential can take them, so that new history can be made."

As a part of Honey's trip to Gainesville, the historian said he plans to speak with graduate students Friday about their personal theses.

Honey was not paid for his Gainesville appearance, according to Paul Ortiz, director of the Samuel Proctor Oral History Program.

# Officials: Police coerced boys in New Jersey gang rape case

## Raped child's sister also charged

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — The two youngest boys charged with gang-raping a 7-year-old girl last month may have been pressured into confessing and implicating

others in the case, according to two people with firsthand knowledge of the police interrogations.

Two men — 20-year-old Gregory Leary and 19-year-old Timear Lewis — and three boys, ages 13, 14 and 17, have been charged

with rape at the March 28 party. The girl's sister, who police say sold her to the men during a party in a vacant apartment, was charged with promoting prostitution, aggravated sexual assault and other crimes.

Four days after the party, the 13- and 14-year-old who live near the gritty public housing complex where police

say the assault took place were brought in for questioning.

Kevin Main, who represents the 17-year-old and who has reviewed the police interrogations of the boys and the 15-year-old girl, told The Associated Press that investigators put words in the boys' mouths and led them to believe they wouldn't get in trouble.



# Background Check

University Police Department officers have to jump through a couple of hoops before they are allowed to patrol the campus.

Part of the hiring process includes allowing prospective officers to admit to committing any illegal acts that were not reported to the police.

The applicants are encouraged to honestly answer a list of questions related to their past conduct because they are expected to answer those questions again during a lie detector test.

One question asks whether they have ever stolen anything from an employer.

According to UPD public information officer Jeff Holcomb, officers are instructed to own up to stealing anything at all — even pens and pencils — because any discrepancy with the lie detector test could indicate deception.

UPD's personnel file for Keith Smith, the officer who shot Kofi Adu-Brempong last

month, indicates he admitted to inhaling whippets, a method of getting high by inhaling gases from whipped cream dispensers, several times in the past.

Another officer who entered Kofi's apartment, William Sasser, admitted to driving under the influence sometime between the

ages of 16 and 20.

In addition to answering the questions, applicants for UPD must complete a basic recruit training program at a certified school, after which they must pass the State Officer Certification Examination.

Every four years, police officers are required to go through a mandatory re-training to maintain their certification.

Holcomb said all officers go through basic training in areas such as firearms and defensive tactics.

"Beyond that, it can go a hun-

dred different ways," Holcomb said.

After basic training, officers can choose to become certified in areas such as administering a breathalyzer test, working as a school resource officer or working with a canine unit.

Holcomb said the UPD officers do not all have the same specializations, but the department has officers with a broad spectrum of certifications on duty at all times.

"We don't necessarily need all 90 officers certified to operate the breath-

alyzer," Holcomb said. Holcomb said UPD has officers certified to be members of a Critical Incident Response Team to ensure they do not have to wait for someone from another crisis agency to respond to an event on campus.

"We want to have someone trained to be able to respond," Holcomb said.

Holcomb said UPD looks to hire officers who have achieved all of the required certifications and have some sort of secondary education degree.

The five officers involved in the shooting have varying educational backgrounds.

Officer Keith Smith graduated with a degree in criminology from UF, Detective James Mabry graduated with a degree in criminology from Florida State University and Lt. Stacy Ettl graduated with a degree in criminology from Saint Leo University.

Officer William Sasser completed the corrections academy program at Lake City Community College and received a law enforcement certificate from Santa Fe Community College, while Sgt. William Ledger did not receive a college degree.

"Experience is great if they've got it, but again, it's not necessarily required," Holcomb said.

Holcomb said all officers are prepared and trained to identify when the Baker Act needs to be enforced, or when a person can be involuntarily hospitalized after becoming a danger to themselves or others.

In 2006, he was given the University of Florida Police Department Chief's Letter of Commendation.

He was the Skyy Night Club head of security before working at UPD. Before becoming an officer, he allowed someone to buy him gas when he knew it wasn't that person's credit card, inhaled whippets several times, took his brother's friend to a house that "may have had marijuana to sell." He had the highest number of physical arrests for his shift during 2008. He was reprimanded in Oct. 2007 when he was in a chase with another vehicle that failed to stop behind the stop bar at an intersection. In 2009 an investigation was conducted when he participated on three occasions in November 2008 in conduct unbecoming of a public employee by his failure to either stop inappropriate actions or remove/prevent himself from being a party to these actions.

# UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA POLICE DEPARTMENT

After looking through the personnel files of the five officers involved in the March 2 shooting of graduate student Kofi Adu-Brempong, Alligator reporters Chelsea Keenan and Matt Harringer summarized their law enforcement backgrounds.

He attended remedial training in February 2010 after he handcuffed a student to a stop sign while he was directing traffic because the student would not stay on the sidewalk. He was given a 16-hour suspension without pay in January 2006 and taken off Field Training for six months after he found underage students drinking outside of Tigert Hall and did not write an incident report or put their fake IDs into evidence. He caused \$6,000 worth of damage in a motorcycle accident while escorting the senior Gators football players bus — it was his second crash in 2009. He was given a written reprimand in 2006 for having personal cell phone conversation after pulling someone over.

# Palin rallies tea partiers

BOSTON — Sarah Palin rallied the conservative tea party movement near the scene of its historical inspiration Wednesday, telling Washington politicians that government should be working for the people, not the other way around.

Addressing roughly 5,000 people, the 2008 Republican vice presidential nominee accused President Barack Obama of overreaching with his \$787 billion stimulus program. She also criticized the administration's health care, student loan and financial regulatory overhauls.

"Is this what their 'change' is all about?" Palin asked the crowd on a sun-splashed Boston Common. "I want to tell 'em, nah, we'll keep clinging to our Constitution and our guns and religion — and you can keep the change."

Tea partiers planned to meet for a final rally in Washington on Thursday, coinciding with the federal tax-filing deadline. Local events are also planned in Oklahoma, Ohio and other locations.

Palin put her own spin on Tax Day, saying, "We need to cut taxes so that our families can keep more of what they earn and produce, and our mom-and-pops, then, our small businesses, can reinvest according to our own priorities, and hire more people and let the private sector grow and thrive and

prosper."

She also played to the crowd by trotting out a trademark line as she lobbied for more domestic energy production.

"Yeah, let's drill, baby, drill, not stall, baby, stall — you betcha," Palin said, though Obama recently proposed to expand drilling off the Atlantic, and Gulf coasts.

The gathering intended to hark back to 1773, when American colonists upset about British taxation without government representation threw British tea into the harbor in protest — just a mile from the site of Wednesday's rally.

Americans are paying lower taxes this year, but that is not expected to last. In the next few years, some increases will come as part of the national health care overhaul.

The modern tea party movement claims both Republican and Democratic members and is punctuated by those who question the legitimacy of Obama's presidency. Some doubt he was born in the United States, as his birth certificate shows.

A New York Times/CBS News poll posted online Wednesday night found that an overwhelming majority of tea party supporters believe Obama doesn't share the values of most Americans or understand the problems of people like them.

penses, with a credit maximum of \$2,000.

If students haven't filed taxes yet, there are still options.

Garry McGill, a professor at UF's Fisher School of Accounting, said students can file a simple extension form, which can be downloaded from the IRS Web site, [www.irs.gov](http://www.irs.gov).

Some Gainesville residents who feel they've been "Taxed Enough Already," will rally at the Bo Diddley Community Plaza from 4 to 6 this afternoon.

Laurie Newsom, vice president of the Gainesville Tea Party, said the rally aims to show local politicians that there are conservative activists in Alachua County.

"Not only are [taxes] too high currently," Newsom said, "but they're going to be onerous with all the new federal legislation."

But a recent study by the Tax Policy Center, a Washington research group, found that because of tax credits, about 47 percent of the population would not have to pay any federal income taxes for 2009.

Newsom said the study shows just how unfair the tax burden is on the wealthy and businesses.

"Small businessmen are being crushed by taxes like the Florida Unemployment Compensation Tax," she said. "People are happy to pay for police protection, the military, et cetera. They're not happy to pay for unemployment benefits that last for two years."





## bombs away!

# Mixing liquor and beer makes explosion

When you finish your final tests and papers, it's important to start your end-of-semester celebration the right way. Start it off with bombs. Bombs are an easy way to take simple ingredients, most of which you already have, and transform them into an exciting, entertaining drink.

To execute a bomb, all you need to do is fill a shot glass and drop it into a beer. There's plenty of room for creativity and invention, but here are a few classics to get you started:

### • Irish Car Bomb

½ shot Irish cream, ½ shot Irish whiskey, 12 oz Guinness

This is a drink that demands chugging. Float the whiskey on top of the Irish Cream in a shot glass, and prepare the beer in a pint glass. When you bomb the shot into the beer, drink as quickly as possible; the longer you wait, the more the Irish cream will curdle, tasting worse and worse as the seconds tick by.

### • Beer Buster Bomb

1 shot vodka, 12 oz beer, 2-plus dashes Tabasco sauce

Although many people drink the Beer Buster as a cocktail, it is more effective when bombed. Pour the beer, add the Tabasco sauce, then bomb your shot and chug. The hot sauce, which is a freshman-year favorite among my friends, will burn your mouth, throat and stomach as it goes down, releasing endorphins and making you a real man.

### • Sake Bomb

1 shot warm sake or soju, 12 oz Japanese lager, 1 pair of chopsticks.

The sake bomb – pronounced sah-kay, not sah-key – is good to set up for several friends at once. Pour your beer, then set the chopsticks across the top of the glass. Balance the sake shot on top of the chopsticks, then count to three in Japanese: Ichi, ni, san, KAMPAI (Cheers)! When you yell “Kampai,” pound both fists on the table. The impact will knock the sake off of the chopsticks and into the beer.

### • Fire Bomb

¾ shot dark rum, ¼ shot Bacardi 151, 12 oz amber lager

Float the 151 on top of the rum in a shot glass, light it on fire, and drop it in your beer. The caramel notes in the amber lager will complement the dark rum and burnt flavors nicely. Be careful when you play with fire.

### • Belfast Car Bomb

½ shot Kahlua, ¼ shot Irish cream, ¼ shot Irish Whiskey, 12 oz Guinness.

### • Cherry Bomb

¾ shot cherry vodka (or vodka with a splash of grenadine), ¼ shot Irish cream, 12 oz chocolate stout.

Keep in mind, as every bomb you drink will be the equivalent of two standard drinks, pacing yourself becomes very important. Also, with a shot glass floating in the bottom of your drink, there is a possibility of chipping a tooth. Play it safe – better to let that last ounce go than risk tooth-to-glass contact.



## Athletes play by own rules in dating game

When Ray Shipman came to UF in the summer of 2008, he had expectations of becoming the big man on campus. Shipman was Florida Mr. Basketball and Gatorade Player of the Year in 2008 and came to UF surrounded by much hype. Like many other college students, his perception of what college life was like came from sensationalized depictions in movies and television.

"You watch movies, and girls are throwing themselves at you. It's like that, but not to that extent," the UF sophomore shooting guard said.

Shipman recently declared his intentions to transfer out of UF in hopes of more playing time, but his two years in Gainesville give an interesting look into what dating is like for an athlete at Florida.

In high school, Shipman never had a girlfriend, but he was no stranger to the company of the opposite sex. Coming to UF escalated Shipman's womanizing to another level.

"When I first got up here, I was pretty bad," he said. "Every girl wants to know who the new dude is on campus. Girls see an athlete who is tall and dresses nice, and they like that type of stuff. Most of the time, girls come to me."

Shipman meets girls mainly through Facebook, where he says they're often more open and comfortable, clocking in more than 60 female friend requests a day.

"If they fit the part, I would send them a message and see where that goes," he said.

And Facebook wasn't the only way Shipman was meeting girls. He was balancing texting anywhere between five to 10 girls at a time and lining up potential hookups via his teammates.

"A lot of the older players show you around. If my teammate is with a girl and it's not really serious, they end up switching to me," he said. "And now that I'm older, I introduce them to the new players. Some teammates of mine, some other athletes, they don't really care [that girls hook up with other players]. That's not my type. That's nasty. But some freshman [players], they'll hop right on it."

The promiscuity of those groups is a reason why Shipman is a big proponent of safe sex. He said not wearing a condom is "just stupid" with all the health risks that come along with casual sex, which can be

just as common on the road.

"A girl will hit you up when they see you're coming to town. They'll try to come to your hotel room," he said.

Nothing is out of bounds for some girls who Shipman said are only interested in one thing: sleeping with an athlete.

"There are girls that go out there for athletes. They do that intentionally," he said. "Maybe it's the crowd or the games."

But the ladies who often hook up with Shipman's teammates run the risk of becoming well-known inside those players' social circles.

"Girls get reps," he said. "Sometimes I feel sorry for girls because they don't know it."

And as an athlete gets more reps on the field of play, they deservedly get more attention as their skills elevate to higher levels. Shipman says that he can see the same correlation in his dating life.

"The Caucasian girls tend to notice the basketball players more," he said. "The African-American girls don't really know if you score or not," Shipman said. "They go on the basis of 'He's an athlete. He's attractive.' But then the better you get, they start noticing. It's a big difference."

However, not all girls let things like points, rebounds or playing time stop them from their pursuits.

"Some girls don't even care what you do, as long as you're an athlete. They don't care how many points you score," he said.

Dating girls who are attracted mainly to fame and status is not without its repercussions. Shipman explained that girls becoming attached is a common problem.

"That's been a really hard thing for me. You can tell when she is trying to get to that next step," he said. "Usually I try not to get too attached. You've got to let the girl know that it's not serious, that you don't want to be tied down. They usually catch on."

But not every girl takes rejection so easy. Shipman's car has been vandalized four times since he came to UF.

Whether it was the difficulty of removing scratches on his car or just the maturity that comes with age, Shipman is no longer the philanderer that he was during his freshman year. Because of his escapades, he started to earn a bad reputation. He is now dating one girl exclusively, and it is quite serious.

"I got attached to the girl I'm with now. That caught me off guard," he said.

Athletes like Shipman are often lionized for their on-field accomplishments and charged with the responsibility of being role models for the community. But what's often forgotten is that they're only kids. They're teenagers just like the rest of the Student Body.

They're playing the same game off the field as their fellow students—just with different rules.



# Prevent all-nighters, unnecessary stress during finals

The end is near.

With the last full week of school upon us, the end of the semester marks a time when students wait until the last minute and stay up all night cramming for final exams and projects. To help stay sane during exam week, here are some tips from UF registered dietitian and nutritionist Janis Mena and Tina Long, health promotion specialist at UF's GatorWell. People don't plan to fail; they fail to plan.

The first piece of advice GatorWell offers is don't put yourself in a position to pull an all-nighter because you may not be alert and focused by the time of your exam. Unfortunately, if you haven't managed your time well or have spread yourself too thin, staying up late and hunkering down on your schoolwork may be your only op-

tion.

Before you hit the books, have a plan. Use the last full week of school to prioritize how and when you will finish everything you need to get done, Long said.

Long recommends finishing the most immediate and urgent assignments first.

In addition to planning each individual task, plan to have at least a five-minute break every hour. According to suite101.com, breaks help clear and relax the mind during long study sessions. For future semesters, Long said that if you are a full-time student, treat it as a full-time job. Although you may not have class 40 hours a week, schedule your extracurricular meetings and study time along with the amount of class time you have so that it equals to 40 hours a week, she said.

Although this strategy sounds restricting at first, the more organized you are will give you more time for other things, she said.

"Most of us at some point in our lives will have to transition into a 40-hour work week anyway," Long said. "By prioritizing and commit-

ting 40 hours a week to studying and class, you will have more time for leisurely pursuits on weekends."

## Food and Drink

If you plan to study for extended periods of time, especially late at night, you'll need to give your body the proper fuel.

### 1. You can drink caffeine, just limit how much you take in.

Drinking a couple of pots of coffee over several hours isn't the end of the world, Mena said. But bingeing on energy drinks like Red Bull, Monster and Doubleshots will make you crash and keep you awake long after you've gone to bed.

Caffeine-habituated individuals can experience "caffeine withdrawal" 12-to-24 hours after the last dose of caffeine. It resolves within 24-to-48 hours. The most prominent symptom is a headache. They can also feel anxiety, fatigue, drowsiness and depression.



According to the American Heart Association

### 2. Eat more protein and less carbs.

Simple carbohydrates, like chocolate and sugar, give you a quick boost in energy and will make you crash just like caffeine.

Instead, eat more protein like a meaty sandwich, nuts or cheese as protein will be a more consistent source of energy without the crash. Mena suggests eating snacks every three hours you are awake so that you stay focused and don't under or overeat.

### 3. Drink plenty of water

Just like when you exercise, drinking plenty of water will keep your stamina up when you study.

### 4. Block it out

Now that you have your game plan and have plenty of food and drink to keep you going, it's time to eliminate distractions. Log out of Facebook, Twitter, YouTube and turn off your phone and find a quiet place to study.

If you are worrying about other stressors like having your car towed

outside of Library West and cannot concentrate on studying, take care of those other things first, Long said. Suite101.com recommends avoiding studying in cozy places like your bed or couch as you will be more likely to fall asleep, and switch study spaces every so often to stay awake and focused. Study groups can be helpful as long as the group does not distract you from concentrating and getting your work done.

Also, classical music has been long viewed as a study aid in relaxing students and drowning out other distracting noises.

### 5. It's not the end of the world

According to Long, keeping a positive attitude and putting things in perspective in the long run will help you focus and not become too stressed out during long study periods.

"At the end of the semester, we may have to do things that we don't love, but there's always a means to an end. Treat each thing as a learning experience. Also, ask yourself, 'What's the worst that can happen?'" she said. Even if a class is failed, it can always open the door to new opportunities.



## UF's offense sparks doubleheader sweep of FSU

■ THE GATORS SCORED 17 RUNS IN TWO GAMES.

Although Florida's bats have been the team's strong suit all season, hitting alone usually isn't enough to get the job done against ranked teams.

But it was all the Gators needed Wednesday night.

On a day when the pitchers were average and the fielders struggled, the offense carried No. 3 UF (32-4, 12-2 Southeastern Conference) to a doubleheader sweep of No. 19 FSU (36-10, 8-4 Atlantic Coast Conference) on Wednesday in Tallahassee.

"We swung the bat arguably as well as we swung all year long," UF coach Tim Walton said. "This offense puts a lot of fear in people, and we score a ton of runs and really swing the bat with authority."

Despite facing off against a pair of pitchers with ERAs less than 1.50, the Gators' bats pounded out 17 runs against the Seminoles.

Every player in the starting lineup had a hit in the doubleheader, with six different Gators contributing multiple RBIs.

"We don't depend on one single person," said Kelsey Bruder, who had two RBIs. "We have such a strong lineup that at any point anyone can contribute."

UF wasted little time getting the offensive onslaught started, scor-

ing four runs in the second inning of Game 1 on RBI hits by Ensley Gammel, Brittany Walker and Aja Paculba, who ran her hitting streak

to a career-best 16 games. First baseman Megan Bush added a three-run homer in the top of the third to give the Gators a 7-0 lead, and

it looked like Game 1 could end by run-rule. But the Seminoles battled back, scoring three in the third and one in the fifth to cut Florida's lead

to three.

The Gators tacked on an insurance run in the sixth, and with two on and one out in the bottom half of the inning, Gammel came in to relieve ace Stephanie Brombacher. She retired five of the last six Seminoles to close out the game, securing UF's 8-4 win.

"I've seen some good things from her," Walton said. "I've been very pleased with the way that things have been working, and hopefully she'll continue to do good things."

In Game 2, the Florida bats quickly picked up where they left off, scoring in the top of the first on a fielding error by FSU.

After the Seminoles tied the game in the second, the Gators exploded for four runs on five hits in the top of the third, scoring on an RBI single by Francesca Enea, a sacrifice fly by Bruder and a two-run home run by Brittany Schutte.

Although the Seminoles responded in Game 1 to make it interesting, Gammel kept them at bay in Game 2, allowing just a single additional run in the bottom of the fifth.

Florida put the game away shortly thereafter, scoring four in the top of the sixth on RBI hits from Enea, Bruder and Schutte, plus a sacrifice fly from Paculba to stretch the lead to 9-2, which would eventually become the final.

The only downside to the afternoon was Florida's fielding.

Five different Gators committed errors Wednesday in the team's first action since recording five errors in a weekend series against Arkansas.

## Smith excels despite pain

For senior Maranda Smith, the pain is always there. It's just a matter of how much it hurts.

But she doesn't let that stop her.

When No. 4 Florida won its seventh Southeastern Conference title March 27 — its first since 2007 — the pain was almost too much for the three-time All-American from Placerville, Calif.

"We had to shut her down for almost the full week after that," UF coach Rhonda Faehn said. "Even then, the last couple of days heading into regionals, she was in so much pain she just couldn't really do anything."

Smith's right shoulder began hurting

after her freshman year at UCLA, but she thought nothing of it at the time because she was focused on a stress fracture in her right shin — an injury that required a rod to be inserted to repair.

During her first season at Florida in 2008, she had the shoulder looked at because it started to hurt again. It turned out she had a torn labrum, but she decided to compete through the injury.

Last offseason, she had surgery to repair the labrum and started rehabbing the next day.

After six weeks in a sling and months

# Knight picks Kentucky

LEXINGTON, Ky — John Calipari's rebuilding project at Kentucky is well under way.

The Wildcats signed center Enes Kanter and received a commitment from guard Brandon Knight on Wednesday, two players Calipari hopes can step in and fill some of the holes left by the defection of five players to the NBA.

Knight, a McDonald's All-American and a two-time Gatorade National Player of the Year, donned a blue Kentucky hat after making his nationally televised announcement at Pine Crest High in Fort Lauderdale.

"I just chose Kentucky because I felt it was a place that had great players, a great environment and a place where I can elevate my game," Knight said on ESPNU.

Knight chose Kentucky over Syracuse, Connecticut, Kansas and Florida. The 6-foot-3, 185-pound guard was ranked the No. 1 prospect in the country by Rivals.com.

He averaged 32 points a game last year

at Pine Crest and ended his high school career as the second-leading scorer in Florida history.

Knight will have some big shoes to fill at Kentucky, which loses three players to graduation and could have five underclassmen — guards John Wall and Eric Bledsoe, forward Patrick Patterson and centers DeMarcus Cousins and Daniel Orton — leave early to head to the NBA. The departing underclassmen were the core of a team that went 35-3 and won the Southeastern Conference tournament before advancing to the regional finals of the NCAA tournament.

Knight cited the success young point guards have enjoyed in Calipari's "dribble-drive" offense — namely Wall and current NBA stars Derrick Rose and Tyreke Evans — as a major factor in his decision.

"The things that's done with previous players ... I think that's what entices a lot of players with that situation," Knight said.

# Howard donates to Haiti

■ HE GAVE \$100,000 TO RELIEF FUND.

ORLANDO — Orlando Magic center Dwight Howard has started a fund for at-risk children around the world, beginning with a \$100,000 donation for young earthquake victims in Haiti.

The Magic's All-Star center and teammate Adonal Foyle formed "The Dwight Howard Fund" announced Wednesday. Howard has tapped Foyle's Kerosene Lamp Foundation to manage the fund for him.

The fund will start an online fundraising campaign to help match Howard's contribution for Haiti, with a minimum donation of \$2.99. The January earthquake in Haiti killed a government-estimated 230,000 people and left more than a million homeless in the Caribbean nation.

"I was personally moved to do something international after spending time in

South Africa last summer and finding out the impact I can make on kids from a different culture and place," said Howard, referring to the NBA's Basketball Without Borders program. "Haiti seemed like the perfect place to start and a place that really needs the help."

"They were a poor country and then they had the devastating earthquake, so they need a lot of help. There have been a lot of relief efforts in Haiti already but there's still a lot of work to do there, especially with the children."

Foyle, who hasn't played this season but has been touted by Magic coaches as a strong mentor for Howard, was recently inducted into the World Sports Humanitarian Hall of Fame. He founded the Kerosene Lamp Foundation to empower youths to grow into healthy and well-educated adults.

Howard already had established The Dwight D. Howard Foundation, Inc., which helps youths at home through scholarships and community-based programs.



of rehabilitation, Smith was ready to return to competition in time for her senior season.

But the pain was still there.

"My shoulder still hurts when I drive my car, turn the steering wheel or open a door, and in gymnastics obviously," Smith said. "It was kind of disappointing because I thought with the surgery, it wouldn't hurt as much, but it probably hurts more than it did last year."

That didn't stop Smith all season, and she certainly wasn't going to let it slow her after the SEC Championships.

With all of the injuries she has fought through, Smith is accustomed to not being able to practice as much, but the restrictions she faced following SECs were particularly hard.

"It was just frustrating that I had been doing so well all season, and then when I'm supposed to feel my best and it's the most important time of the season I wasn't able to train very much," Smith said.

Doubt started to set in for her the Wednesday before the team left

for Salt Lake City, when she was unable to practice her bar routine because of "excruciating pain" in her shoulder.

"I just had to stress to her again that she's been doing this for so long and for so many months that her body knows what to do and that she has to allow that in her mind," Faehn said.

After the practice day, Smith relaxed and blocked out the pain. She felt confident again, the most confident she has felt all season.

Smith went out on the floor in the Huntsman Center and turned in a 9.9 on all three of her events — floor, vault and bars. Afterward, she said it was probably the best performance of her college career.

# Dolphins trade for Marshall, make him highest-paid WR

■ MIAMI TRADED ITS 2010 AND 2011 SECOND-ROUND PICKS.

MIAMI — Bill Parcells, who knows a thing or two about talented, temperamental receivers, decided Brandon Marshall is worth the trouble.

Parcells and the Miami Dolphins also decided Marshall is worth two second-round draft picks.

Miami acquired the high-maintenance Pro Bowl wideout Wednesday for a second-round pick next week and another next year.

The Dolphins signed him to a four-year, \$47.5 million contract extension with \$24 million guaranteed, making him the highest-paid receiver in NFL history.

Marshall fills the Dolphins' most glaring need: a go-to guy who will loosen up defenses for their potentially potent ground game and young, strong-armed quarterback Chad Henne.

However, the former UCF star returns to the Sunshine State with plenty of issues. While he caught at least 100 passes each of the past three years and made the Pro Bowl the past two seasons, Denver was willing to trade Marshall because he became a chronic headache.

He has a history of domestic violence, clashed with coach Josh McDaniels and was summoned to the

office of NFL commissioner Roger Goodell.

That didn't dissuade Parcells, who has had mixed results working with headline-making receivers Terry Glenn in New England, Key-

shawn Johnson in New York and Terrell Owens in Dallas.

The Dolphins' Marshall plan is unknown because the ever-secretive team didn't comment beyond a brief news release.

Miami's receiving corps wasn't too productive, either. The Dolphins totaled two touchdown passes of 20 yards or more last season, fewest in the NFL.

Speedy Ted Ginn Jr. has been a

disappointment since Miami took him with the ninth overall draft pick in 2007. Ginn and the other wideouts — Brian Hartline, Davone Bess and Greg Camarillo — combined for six touchdown catches last year while averaging just 11.6 yards per catch.

"We need big playmakers," general manager Jeff Ireland said in February. "We need players that make chunk yardage. We need players that score touchdowns. We need to get more production out of the wide receiver position."

Last year, Marshall caught 101 passes, including an NFL-record 21 against Indianapolis, for 1,120 yards and a career-high 10 touchdowns.

Marshall signed his \$2.521 million tender Tuesday to facilitate a trade. His final destination was a surprise, because the Dolphins had indicated little interest.

In March, the Broncos slapped a first-round tender on Marshall. Teams were unwilling to part with a first-round pick as compensation, mindful that his resume included as many missteps as touchdowns.

Because of Marshall's legal record, he's one strike from a year-long suspension. He was suspended for the 2008 opener following a series of disputes involving a former girlfriend. Last summer, he was suspended by the Broncos for throwing a tantrum at practice during training camp, when he was unhappy with his contract and the team's medical staff.
