Professor wins \$30,000

Rea Award is given annually

UF professor Mary Robison turned her short stories into tall stacks of cash.

Robison recently received the prestigious Rea Award for the Short Story along with \$30,000.

The award is given annually by a panel of three judges and is sponsored by the Dungannon Foundation. It goes to authors who have made a significant contribution to the short story as an art form, according to the award's website.

Robison, who has focused primarily on novel writing as of late, did not expect to receive the award because she had not written a short story in some time.

"I couldn't have been more surprised," Robison said. "I hadn't written a short story in a while. I thought it was a mistake."

She was also surprised by the prize money.

"There was some mention of getting my address to send me a check," she said. "I said 'Oh God, there's money involved?' They told me, 'Yes, in fact, there's \$30,000.'"

Robison has been referred to as

a minimalist author, though she is hesitant to label herself as such.

"[Minimalist] sounds to me like you haven't worked very hard," she said. "It sounds like you're doing the minimum. It's more about selection and choosing exactly the bits of description you need in the story."

Over the course of her career, Robison has published four short-story collections: "Days," "An Amateur's Guide to the Night," "Believe Them," and "Tell Me: 30 Stories."

Some of her short stories were originally published in The New Yorker, The Paris Review, Esquire, GQ and Harvard Magazine.

Robison has also published four novels, including "Why Did I Ever" and the critically acclaimed "One D.O.A., One on the Way," which was featured on Oprah Winfrey's 2009 summer reading list.

Apartments fill vacant rooms

The students may be out of town, but apartment owners aren't worried.

Because most local apartments require that tenants sign one-year leases, which includes the summer semester, area apartment owners are not concerned about finding tenants for the summer, said Andres Tinoco, a leasing and marketing manager for University Commons.

Furthermore, despite a decreased enrollment at UF, the overall vacancy rate for area apartments is trending downward.

The apartment vacancy rate in March, the last month of available data, was 11.9 percent, down from last year's 13 percent.

Massachusetts woman pleads guilty to impersonating an FBI supervisor

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — A Massachusetts woman pleaded guilty to impersonating an FBI agent after fooling her former neighbors in northern Virginia into taking jobs as her assistant.

Twenty-nine-year-old Brenna Reilly of Holyoke, Mass., was living in Arlington last year and told neighbors she was the FBI's director of forensics.

Two neighbors agreed to work as Reilly's assistant. She gave them tasks that included

writing condolence letters to family members of slain agents. But Reilly was never an FBI agent, the jobs were phony and the assistants were never paid.

Peter Carr, a spokesman for the U.S. Attorney in the Eastern District of Virginia, said it remains unclear why Reilly conducted the hoax.

Following Tuesday's guilty plea, Reilly faces up to three years in prison.

Republican Party sells Crist portrait for \$7,700

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Republican Party can't seem to get over being jilted by Gov. Charlie Crist.

The party said Wednesday it's sold an oil painting of Crist for \$7,700 on eBay. Spokeswoman Katie Betta said the buyer was a registered Florida Republican who wanted to remain anonymous.

In a letter to members, the party sought donations to help "move forward from the sordid legacy of Charlie Crist and Jim Greer," the former party chairman.

By surrendering his party registration to run without affiliation in his bid for the U.S. Senate, Crist created a three-way race in November when he'll likely face the new darling of Florida Republicans, former House Speaker Marco Rubio, and the Democratic nominee. U.S. Rep. Kendrick Meek is the front-runner.

NOAA expert to lead post-spill seafood tests

PASCAGOULA, Miss. —

The federal government says a top fisheries science expert will lead a program to test and report risks to fish and shellfish from the Gulf of Mexico oil spill and cleanup.

The National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration says Nancy Thompson will lead the program to test and report risks to fish and shellfish from the Gulf of Mexico oil spill and cleanup.

Thompson is director of NOAA's Northeast Fisheries Science Center in Pascagoula, Miss.

NOAA fisheries official Eric Schwaab says Thompson's work will allow the Southeast laboratory's director, Bonnie Ponwith, to focus on other oil spill duties and on regional fisheries management.

NOAA is analyzing water, fish and shellfish from Louisiana to Florida.

NOAA will use the information to decide where and how to stop fishing and whether seafood is safe to eat.

Fla. men indicted in Ala. pharmacy burglaries

FORT PAYNE, Ala. — Officials say at least eight Florida men tied to a drug and theft ring have been indicted on federal charges related to two 2009 burglaries at Sylvania Pharmacy in DeKalb County.

DeKalb County Sheriff Jimmy Harris said in a news release that hundreds of pills were taken during the burglaries, including hydrocodone, oxycodone, naproxen, diazepam and lithium.

For the January 2009 burglary, Mickey J. Lemons, Richard Allen Crain, John Darrow Maddox and Joshua North, all of New Port Richey, Fla., were charged with stealing and possessing with intent to distribute hydromorphone and hydrocodone.

For the July 2009 burglary, Lemons and Darrell Andrew Sedilko Jr., Shawn Michael Baker and Daniel Lee Johnson, all of New Port Richey, were charged with stealing and possessing with intent to distribute oxycodone and hydrocodone.



Center to house joint research

■ CENTER'S DESIGN AIMS TO PROMOTE TEAMWORK.

UF President Bernie Machen and other UF officials dedicated the Biomedical Sciences Building Tuesday.

The building's innovative design is intended to encourage scientists of different colleges to work in teams, according to a UF press release.

The building's work spaces are mostly open and lack the confined offices that characterize most laboratories. The building's labs feature large windows that are supposed to make the environment more well-lit and comfortable.

Aside from promoting shared space, the open design is also expected to encourage the sharing of ideas, according to a press release.

The facility, which was completed in October after about three years of construction, will house research centers and programs such as the UF Diabetes Center of Excellence, the Center for Translational Research in Neurodegenerative Disease and the Rehabilitation Research Program.

The \$90.5-million, eight-story building is located on the northeast corner of Center Drive and Mowry Road.

Crist registers as an independent

Change reflects run for Senate

ST. PETERSBURG — Calling it a “no-brainer,” Gov. Charlie Crist stopped into the elections office in his hometown Wednesday to officially declare his political indepen-

dence.

Greeted by a gaggle of reporters and TV cameras, Crist sat down and signed documents changing his status on the voter rolls from “Republican” to “none.” It reflects his decision to run for the U.S. Senate as an independent after polls showed him

falling far behind Marco Rubio in the race for the GOP nomination.

“It’s very liberating,” the always ebullient governor said afterward. “For me it was a no-brainer. It was just the right thing to do.”

By leaving the Republican Party, Crist now must wage a war on two fronts against Rubio and likely Democratic nominee Kendrick.

UF alumna wins \$1,500 in contest

About seven years after graduation, one UF alumna is mastering the art of professional social networking.

The National Society of Collegiate Scholars named Jamie Nacht Farrell as the society’s most active alumna on Brazen Careerist, a social networking tool.

Brazen Careerist is based on a feed of top ideas, similar to Facebook’s news feed, that employers peruse before hiring, said Janine Deegan, a communications coordinator for Brazen Careerist.

The award is a \$1,500 scholarship that Farrell said she will use to become certified in Six Sigma, a management tool designed to increase corporate efficiency.

Farrell is an executive marketer for higher education companies, and she receives two to three six-figure-salary job offers a week, she said.

Farrell, who graduated from UF in 2003 with degrees in psychology and education, attributes the job offers to social networking. In particular, she said her presence on LinkedIn, another professional social networking tool that focuses on sharing job experiences and online resumes, has been helpful.

“Probably the best thing I did was that I got heavily involved in LinkedIn right after I graduated,” said Farrell, who owns a home in Palm Beach and lives in Dallas. “For anyone in college, LinkedIn has by far been the most helpful in networking and social media.”

Brazen Careerist is a good tool for people between the ages of 25 and 40, Farrell said.

She won the award on Brazen Careerist because she used a number of different social media tools to connect with people on the website.


“She was the most active person, using the most tools to connect with people,” said Deegan. “She got a lot of people into the group. She used a blog, Twitter and other social media. She did a lot to get people buzzing.”

The award was created to encourage graduates of the National Society of Collegiate Scholars program to connect with each other and create professional relationships, said Deegan.

“Brazen Careerist allows people to be more than a resume,” Deegan said. “It lets employers hire them for their ideas more than work experience.”

Tampa to host RNC

TAMPA— After trying and failing — twice — to land the Republican National Convention in this Gulf Coast city, a group of community leaders and GOP insiders finally succeeded Wednesday afternoon.

"We are very proud to call and tell you that Tampa is the host city," Republican National Committee chairman Michael Steele said during a conference call.

Cheers and ear-to-ear grins filled a Tampa conference room, located on the 21st floor of a downtown high rise.

"We are looking forward to working with you," Al Austin, the host committee chairman, told Steele on the phone. "We are going to hit the road running tomorrow and start the fundraising. We look forward to this fantastic opportunity."

A Republican National Committee panel recommended Tampa during a closed-door meeting, rejecting Salt Lake City and Phoenix. The decision came amid calls from Hispanic groups and others to boycott Arizona after it adopted a law to crack down on illegal immigrants — although Steele insisted that the Ari-

zona immigration uproar played no part in the convention choice. He said it was "purely a business decision."

"It's a very exciting time for a city," he said.

"You can do pretty well for yourself, renting out your home," he said. "I don't know how many hotel rooms Tampa has available, but they will be eaten up pretty quickly."

Man arrested in shooting

■ VICTIM WAS SHOT IN ARMPIT.
BULLET REMAINS IN LOWER BACK.

A suspect was arrested Tuesday in connection to a recent shooting of a Gainesville man who remains in recovery.

Anton Watson, 30, is being charged with armed burglary and attempted murder, according to a Gainesville Police report. Bail is set at \$200,000.

At 11:25 p.m. on April 1, police responded to a call that someone had been shot at Sherwood Apartments, 3557 SW 19th Ave. Officers found Farouk Kamma II being loaded into an ambulance to be treated for a gunshot wound, the report stated.

Kamma later told police he had been in his home with his girlfriend and their son when someone knocked on the door asking for a girl named Shaunda, the report stated.

Kamma told the man there was no one inside by that name, but a second man came up and put a semi-automatic handgun in Kamma's face, according to the report.

Kamma said he was shot through his door as he pushed against it to keep the two men from forcing their way inside. The bullet pierced his right armpit and remains lodged in his lower back, the report stated.

During police interviews, Kamma said he thought he recognized one of the men from high school, and named Watson as a suspect. He then identified him in a picture lineup, the report stated.

Watson was arrested by GPD and, after being read his rights, admitted to having been at Kamma's apartment that night.

He said while he was there, two men did threaten Kamma at gunpoint. But Watson denied being one of them, although he gave no reason for failing to report the crime sooner, the report stated.

The Wrong Cards

Tea Party is a few cards short of full deck

Just when we thought the Tea Party movement could not get any more ridiculous, one company has started selling its own take on the Iraqi Most Wanted Playing Cards, except they feature politicians.

The company, Shenandoah Valley Tea Party Patriots Inc., claims the politicians in the 54-card deck are the “most dangerous progressives in Washington who are up for re-election” and encourages local tea parties to buy the cards so they can sell them at rallies.

The deck features eight Republicans and 46 Democrats, with John McCain as the ace of spades and Nancy Pelosi as the joker. The company suggests that people should mail their cards to the politicians with a message saying they will be calling their bluff on election day.

Most of those letters will probably be met with little more than an eye roll before being promptly thrown in the garbage by congressional interns, but it would not be the Tea Party if they did not throw in a couple of cheap shots.

We can't help but notice the prejudiced undercurrent. Barney Frank, a prominent and openly gay representative from Massachusetts, is portrayed as the deck's queen of hearts. It is this kind of immature behavior that makes the entire movement seem more like poorly veiled hate than legitimate politics. It has to stop.

The political divide in America is hitting an all-time high, and it baffles us that this is considered acceptable. While the Tea Party claims to be grassroots with members from all political parties, all we ever see are people holding up racist signs and calling people names.

Yelling Fire

We thought plans for a fire assessment fee died years ago, but the Alachua County Commission is pulling out the Jaws of Life to try and make its recent version of this terrible idea a reality.

Unlike property taxes, which are calculated based on the assessed value of a building, the proposed assessment is a “per-dwelling” fee – a catchall that would include apartments – calculated based on the size of a building and whether it's in an urban or rural area.

Homeowners living in unincorporated Alachua County could end up paying more than \$200 a year for the fee, regardless of the value of their homes. This would decrease taxes on high-value homes while increasing them for lower-value homes. For such a progressive county, it

sounds like a regressive tax.

The county says the assessment would raise about \$8 million every year, but it is unlikely that fire services would see a budget increase. When the city considered a \$30-per-house fire assessment fee in 2008, it was clear it was just trying to free up general fund money for Gainesville Police Department.

If we knew this money would ensure firefighters would get the best equipment and training then we might grin and bear it, but we don't think this is the case. We understand it costs money to put out fires, and the last thing we want to see is underfunded first responders. But this assessment sticks the bill with the wrong people, and we want to see it go up in smoke.



Kagan's experience is not a problem

As someone who is fascinated by the U.S. Supreme Court, I've been consuming every bit of information about President Obama's recent nominee, Elena Kagan. Unfortunately, it seems as if the Alligator's Editorial Board has not consumed even half of that information.

Tuesday's editorial, "Poor Judgment," displayed poor judgment questioning Kagan's nomination on unsubstantial grounds and misrepresented what little facts that were cited. The main complaint seemed to be that Kagan "has no experience as a judge, federal or otherwise."

Perhaps it would have been helpful to mention that former President Bill Clinton nominated Kagan for a federal judgeship in 1999. Her nomination was stalled by a Republican-controlled Congress that did what every partisan Congress does when a president of the opposite party is nearing the end of his term: delay voting on a court nomination in the hopes that its party will win the White House and then nominate someone with its ideological views. Kagan's nomination was not rejected. It died out because a president's unconfirmed nominations expire at the end of the presidential term. Because the next president was a Republican, presumably Kagan would not be nominated for another federal judgeship, so she pursued another legal career path.

Ultimately, what the writer failed to understand is that Kagan's lack of experience as a judge is not the end of the world. In addition to former Chief Justice Earl Warren, more than one-third of all Supreme Court justices, including the late Chief Justice William Rehnquist, did not serve as judges before joining our nation's highest court. In fact, Kagan's experience as solicitor general is actually more applicable to serving as a Supreme Court justice than most judgeships. The solicitor general represents the U.S. government in up to two-thirds of all Supreme Court cases each year. As such, the solicitor general has more experience with the Supreme Court and insight into its decision-making process than most judges at any level, aside from the Supreme Court justices themselves. In fact, the solicitor general is often referred to as

"the 10th justice." True, Kagan has served in this position for a little more than a year, but in that year she has held her own in oral arguments against the court's fiercest justice, Antonin Scalia—a feat that should not be minimized.

The Editorial Board's characterization of former President Eisenhower's comment about the late Chief Justice Earl Warren was also irresponsible and misleading. Eisenhower said appointing Warren was the "biggest damned-fool mistake I ever made" not because Warren simply shifted the court's politics but because Warren shifted the court in a liberal direction that Eisenhower—a Republican—disagreed with. We would expect a Democratic president to feel the same way had he or she selected Chief Justice John Roberts and Associate Justice Samuel Alito, given that these two conservatives have facilitated a massive rightward shift in their four years on the court.

Furthermore, the writer's concern that "[t]he last thing the court needs is an unknown quantity shaking up the system" is quite an exaggeration. That line makes Kagan sound like a radical extremist yearning to burst free from her current mold. You know, the mold she's been in for the past 50 years, just waiting until she has that chance to be nominated to the Supreme Court and then she can do whatever her radical heart desires.

It's fine to raise legitimate questions about how many cases Kagan might have to recuse herself from given her position as solicitor general, or to ponder the implications of having an Ivy League-educated court when most Americans don't attend Ivy League schools. But the questions this editorial raised about Kagan's experience were unfounded and presented without context. Because most student readers probably use the Alligator as their only news source, the editorial did the university community a significant disservice.

They should be looking out for America's best interests—including financial interests. We are now witnessing in Europe what happens when governments run out of other people's money to borrow and spend. Our federal deficit last


month was four times higher than it was in April 2009. We are headed in the wrong direction. We are different from Greece in degree, but not in kind.

Student Alliance Sen. Alan Yanuck, representative for the Keys Residential Complex, pressed Goldstein about the issue of fairness.

"Many of the people who voted for me have said that these tickets are not a good idea," Yanuck said. "No students are more important than any other students."

Safety was Goldstein's primary concern.

"Knowing who's sitting closest to the speaker helps us," he said.

Although security has always been a concern, U.S. Sen. John Kerry's 2007 appearance at UF, during which a UF student was Tasered by university police, underscored event organizers' need to know who is sitting close to the speakers, Goldstein said.

Marketing strategies target summer transfer students, freshmen

62nd Blvd., does not have a problem with vacancies. Until December, it was at 100 percent capacity, said Rob Wright, a property manager at the apartment complex. Wright added that since December, the Woodlands has only had a few empty units remain.

"We've had a handful of vacancies that have come to us, so it's not a problem," Wright said. "We go on campus and pro-

mote the apartments. We know that a lot of transfers come in Summer A."

University Commons, located at 2601 SW Archer Road, is also successfully getting people to sign leases.

Some apartment managers are using financial incentives to attract tenants. University Commons, for instance, takes 10 percent off the lease price if the renter signs within 24 hours of coming in and pays by the first of every month, Tinoco said. Other apartments offer special rates specifically for the summer months.

"A lot of students will take into that," Tinoco said. "It entices a lot of students."

University Commons has filled most of its units because students mostly sign one-year leases, Tinoco said.

Around Gainesville

"We have a lot of people looking for sublets," he said. "They're trying to find people to fill their spots. The units are mostly filled up from the previous year of leasing."

The Woodlands of Gainesville attempts to attract incoming freshmen by passing

out promotional material during orientations, Wright said.

University Commons preemptively recruits new tenants by visiting local high schools that have good relationships with the university, Tinoco said.

"Nowadays, the savvy people are going to the Internet. People aren't going to pick up a newspaper the way they used to," Tinoco said. "People Google 'Gainesville apartment.' We are going to the Internet to get those people."

Pulitzer Prize winners, authors meet for story summit

Dust off your morals and pray for calamity. Ellis Amburn, former editor to the stars and author of seven biographies, is just one of the 30 writers coming to a workshop at the UF.

"You must be spiritually connected with a power greater than you to have a theme and a set of moral values against which to judge experience," he said. "Calamity makes you eligible for a spiritual experience."

Weimer Hall will be echoing with the voices of five Pulitzer Prize winners and 10 UF alumni Friday to Sunday at The Storytellers' Summit. A welcome reception at 6 p.m. in Ustler Hall kicks off the summit Friday at 6 p.m. in Ustler Hall.

"Because of the economic problems around the United States, the newspapers and others who sponsor writers' workshops have been dropping out," journalism professor Mike Foley said. He decided to team up with William McKeen, UF department of journalism professor and chairman, to start the summit.

"It turned out to be a pretty impressive array," he said.

Michael Connelly, best-selling crime author and UF alumnus, Rick Bragg, Pulitzer Prize winner and author of "Somebody Told Me," and Roy Peter Clark, director of The Poynter Institute, will be speaking at the summit, among others.

"Even those without Pulitzer Prizes are terrific writers," Foley said. "They are also willing to share their success in terms of how they learned to write, and all of them, as I know, are really good at it."

After 20 years in the editing business, Amburn was attracting the bestsellers from Hollywood.

Amburn credits the success of his books to his moral values and spiritual connection with a higher power. Both of which he said came to

him late in life.

The two-day summit features book signings, storytelling sessions and group sessions. Topics at each session range from visual storytelling to writing gonzo biographies. A cocktail and networking reception is scheduled for Saturday.

Amburn will be speaking Saturday about his transition from editor to author, his experiences editing Jack Kerouac's last two books and writing about Roy Orbison, Buddy Holly and others.

He attributed his transition from editor to author to

his work ghostwriting for Shelley Winters and Priscilla Presley. After completing "Elvis and Me" with Presley and "Shelley: Also Known as Shirley" with Winters, Amburn left editing to work on "Shelley II: The Middle of my Century."

"I evolved by chance and destiny," he said.

He has been the ghost writer for a multitude of celebrities and written seven biographies, one of which he wrote under a pseudonym. Amburn, who lives in High Springs, is currently working on a biography of Tim Tebow titled "Finish Strong." The book is scheduled for release in a year and a half, Amburn said.

Although Amburn said writing a book isn't as hard as people think, he does offer some advice to students. "Your true style is in the letter you write your mother," he said.

Mike Foley, former editor of The St. Petersburg Times, said he hopes attendees, estimated at around 150 people, will leave with a value for the art of storytelling. "I think it is the salvation of journalism," he said.

Facebook update frustrates some loyal users

Privacy issues raise concerns about the site's safety

Just when the e-dust settled and pretty much everyone forgot that the "old Facebook" looked like, the unstoppable website did it again. The company's new changes to profiles' information section strip users of any sort of individuality and beg the question: Really?!

"That was unbelievable," Toledo said. "I wasn't expecting that at all. I was just surprised I kept throwing strikes in the warm-up pitches. I was shaking up there, to be honest, but that was a cool feeling."

Catcher Mike Zunino said watching Toledo walk back on the mound was special.

"I got chills out there when he went out there and got that standing ovation," he said.

Zunino greeted Toledo at the mound before he started warming up. The two slapped gloves and Zunino told him

Brooks nears UF games-played record

■ SEC TOURNEY TO BEGIN TODAY.

For 188 consecutive games, senior Corrie Brooks has shown up at the ballpark on game day and done whatever her coaches and teammates asked of her.

Whether the Gators needed a big-time play at third base, a clutch game-tying or game-winning hit in the bottom of the seventh, or even an extra outfielder or reserve pitcher, Brooks has always been there.

And when the No. 6 Gators (42-7, 20-4 Southeastern Conference) take the field to play Auburn (30-23, 11-17 SEC) today at 2:30 p.m. in the first round of the SEC tournament, Brooks will once again be there for the 262nd time in her UF career, putting her only 11 behind Ashley Boone for the all-time Florida games-played record.

"I think it is significant because that just says something about how great of a team

we are," Brooks said. "I've gotten the opportunity to play that many games because our teams have been good enough to make it that far, and it definitely says a lot for me to be a starter on that good of a team."

It's been 824 days since Brooks last missed a start on Feb. 9, 2008 against Memphis—the fourth game of her sophomore season.

Perhaps not coincidentally that was about the same time Brooks started bringing her lucky gator head to the games, a tradition she's kept alive ever since.

"One of the times I was working at the gator farm they had a few alligators that people had brought in, and they were just throwing away the heads and feet and everything, and I said 'Well I'd like to have one of these,'" Brooks said. "So I took it to the taxidermist and got it

done and since then I've just brought it on every road trip and everything."

And while not many people usually get to experience alligators that up-close and personal, for the residents of the small town of Christmas, that closeness with nature is just the way of life.

The 3.6 square-mile town that's last recorded population was 1,369 is what has made Brooks into the person she is today—a girl who says her main hobbies are hunting, fishing and riding four-wheelers and horses.

"That's pretty much just from living out in the country and having really nothing else to do," Brooks said. "We have a pond with catfish in our back yard and growing up with a family that was raised outdoors and having them pass that stuff along to me led to me taking it up and that's what I like to do."

It is that upbringing that has led Brooks to pursue a degree in Animal Science,

Tyus' plan to stay should shock none

For some reason we were all surprised.

Most of us assumed the 6-foot-8 power forward who couldn't buy playing time late in games would opt to enter the NBA Draft and would forgo his senior season.

But Alex Tyus never really had much of a choice but to return to school, although his father, Thomas Tyus, gave off another impression.

"I don't think he has anything to gain by returning to the University of Florida basketball wise,"

Thomas said to the Orlando Sentinel. "I just feel he just has not developed his full potential. ... He can go back and get his degree any time."

If Tyus hasn't fulfilled his potential in the 70 games he has started during the last two seasons, I don't know if he ever will max out his talent.

On a squad that narrowly made the NCAA Tournament last season, Tyus averaged 11.8 points per game (fourth highest on the team), while committing three and a half turnovers for every one assist he dished out.

Those aren't exactly the numbers team executives like Pat Riley are looking for in a first-round draft pick.

With that being said, we should commend the rising senior's decision because it was the right one.

When he entered his name into the crashshoot that is the NBA Draft, Tyus said he would not

to have fun.

The pitcher received a similar warm greeting when he walked off the mound after pitching a scoreless, yet far from flawless, frame. Coach Kevin O'Sullivan admitted he grew emotional watching Toledo pitch.

"As a coach, you get a little choked up," he said. "I mean, you know how tough it was to get back up here. To be honest with you, if it was up to him, he probably would have been ready to go (last weekend) at Alabama. He was chomping at the bit."

O'Sullivan said he wanted to hold the pitcher until he could throw in a home game. The coach does not know whether Toledo will stay in the bullpen or become a starter like he was before the metal plates were put in his face.

Toledo needs to rebuild his arm strength as if he was back in spring training, O'Sullivan said.

On Toledo's first pitch, Owls third baseman Nick Burkhalter hit a hard line drive just left of the pitcher for a single. Nathan Pittman hit Toledo's third pitch just as hard to the right for a line out.

Toledo said he did not think about his injury on the mound, though.

FAU third baseman Joey Burkhalter followed his teammate with a single to right-center. After throwing just his fourth pitch in almost two months, Toledo received a visit from Zunino.

The catcher told him to keep the ball down and called for a breaking ball. Toledo recovered, throwing a strike.

"I know he's thrown about three or four bullpens, but to be as pinpoint as he was, that was the Tommy Toledo of old right there," Zunino said.

Zunino helped his hurler in the next at-bat, picking Burkhalter off at first. Toledo then struck out Anthony Mesa with a slider to end the inning, igniting the crowd in the process.

"That was a pretty cool feeling," Toledo said. "I'm excited to get it over with, but it was probably one of the best feelings I've ever had here at Florida."

His teammates greeted him with a similar reception.

leave UF unless he was guaranteed to be a first-round selection. He stuck by that sentiment.

ESPN's Chad Ford and Andy Katz both believed it was very possible he would go undrafted and advised Tyus to return to school when making their NBA Draft projections. With only 60 players drafted into the NBA each year, Ford had him as the 116th best player on his board.

Taking all that into account, nobody should have been caught off guard to learn of his return last weekend.

Tyus did the same thing he did last season when he threatened to transfer.

But this year's decision will benefit the team more than it does Tyus.

The Gators will now bring back all five starters from last season and are poised to be a top-three team in the Southeastern Conference next year.

CBS's Gary Parrish ranked Florida as the 10th best team in his pre-season top 25, which was released yesterday.

On the other hand, Tyus' decision to return won't necessarily help his draft stock much.

He will be spending most of his time at power forward next season, despite contending that his natural position is at the three. But Chandler Parsons has already won that role after a stellar junior year.

And it's not like Tyus won't have competition at his position. For some reason coach Billy Donovan didn't trust him at the end of games as he opted to use Dan Werner in crucial situations most of the time instead.

This year Tyus will have to compete with UF's new five-star recruit Patric Young for time in the front court.

Still, coming back was his only option and the team will be better for it. Tyus on the other hand, I'm not so sure about.

Magic look to stay sharp during possible long layoff

ORLANDO — Team Sweep has more time to do some housecleaning.

Waiting around for its next opponent again, about the only questions the playoff-perfect Orlando Magic face are when and where they will begin the Eastern Conference finals. Fourteen straight wins — including 8-0 in the postseason — have left the Magic beaming with confidence ahead of another lengthy layoff.

But the time off provides no assurance of continued success.

“The one thing you have to understand about playoff basketball is you’ve got to get beyond the last game and the last series,” Magic coach Stan Van Gundy said. “It has no meaning for the game or the series coming up, whatsoever. So you go in with good confidence, you get a little rest, but it will come down to how you play

in the next series.”

Orlando proved prior perfection — or imperfection — doesn’t guarantee anything last year, when it squeaked out two series before toppling the unbeaten Cleveland Cavaliers in the conference finals. Now Boston leads the Cavaliers 3-2 in the best-of-seven series after winning 120-88 on Tuesday night, and Orlando is the team with time to wait and watch.

The earliest Orlando will play again is Sunday, and it could be as long as next Tuesday — eight days between games. The Magic would have home-court advantage against Boston but would start on the road against Cleveland.

Van Gundy gave his team two days off — again — after dusting aside Atlanta in the most lopsided four-game sweep in NBA playoff history. The Magic will return to practice Thursday and try to avoid the kind of overconfidence and

complacency that led to Cleveland’s downfall last season.

That might be the only thing Van Gundy doesn’t seem concerned about.

“I’ve said the one thing that I have real confidence in with our team is our mind set, our preparation and what we bring to the game in terms of energy and intensity will be very good,” he said. “If we get beat and when we get beat, it will be just because somebody outplays us. It’s not going to be because our guys aren’t ready to play. I really have confidence in that.”

The motivated Magic have played like a team on a mission lately.

It had blowout wins of 43, 14, 30 and 14 against Atlanta. It got Dwight Howard out of his foul-trouble funk, and they’ve locked opponents down defensively.

Still sometimes viewed as the irritating interloper that derailed a LeBron James-Kobe Bryant showdown in last year’s NBA Finals, Orlando enters the conference finals as the favorite to squash such talk again. The Magic haven’t lost since its regular-season matchup at San Antonio on April 2.

“I just think if we do the things we’ve done to get us to this point,” Howard said, “we should beat anybody.”

They’re also in better position to do so this year.

Point guard Jameer Nelson, sidelined the first three rounds last season with a right shoulder tear, is healthy again and playing like he was when he earned a spot on the All-Star team in 2009. The addition of Matt Barnes has given

the Magic a gritty defender, and newcomer Jason Williams has anchored one of the deepest benches in the league as the backup point guard.

For all the questions about how Vince Carter would replace Hedo Turkoglu in the lineup, that has been almost a non-issue through two rounds. Carter is in the conference finals for the first time in his career, averaging 16.9 points per game in the playoffs.

Although perfection isn’t likely to last in the next round, striving for it is helping the Magic stay focused.

“I’d like to go 16-0,” Carter said. “When you’re playing this well, you don’t want to lose. You want teams to always have fear in their minds and think to themselves, ‘We can’t beat these guys.’ You never want to have a nick in your armor.”

Gators ready for SECs

The UF track and field teams head to Knoxville, Tenn., today to compete in the Southeastern Conference Outdoor Championships on a mission: bring home championships.

Second isn't an option.

"We felt like we let ourselves down last year," UF coach Mike Holloway said. "We were second in everything, with the exception of the regional meet. In every one of those instances, we could have won the meet. This year, we are making sure we're at our absolute best."

The men's team finished the first part of its mission at the 2010 NCAA Indoor Championship — now, it looks to do the same in Volunteer country.

Although the men's team finished second last year, the women's team is looking to defend its outdoor title from a season ago.

The men's team is seeking its first SEC Outdoor Championship since the 1987 season, while the women's team is seeking the prestigious "Triple Crown" after winning the 2009 SEC Cross Country Championship and the 2010 SEC Indoor Championship.

The "Triple Crown" has only been accomplished once in school history when the women's team did it in the 1996-97 season.

The Gators head to Knoxville as two top-10 programs, ready to face the stiffest

competition in the country.

The men's team is ranked third nationally, the highest-rated SEC men's team. The women's team is also in the top 10, coming in 10th nationally, second in the conference behind No. 2 LSU.

The SEC boasts some of the most elite track and field programs in the country, with eight men's teams ranked in the top 25. The SEC has four programs represented in the women's top 25.

The Gators come to the Outdoor Championships looking to defend nine individual titles from last year's outdoor meet.

Other Gator All-Americans including thrower Mariam Kevkhishvili and jumper Shara Proctor look to defend their titles and continue their outstanding performance this season.

"We're going to do what we always do," Holloway said. "We're going to take care of the Gators."

UF tennis teams to begin NCAA Championships

The No. 3 Gators women's tennis team (24-2) has been named champions twice this season and now the mission to win the third and most important championship begins Friday.

The Southeastern Conference's regular-season and tournament champions' first challenge on the path to the NCAA Championship will come Friday at 2 p.m. against Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference champion South Carolina State (13-5)

South Carolina State is on a current four-match winning streak that began with a road upset over ECU 4-3 on April 12.

Florida's current 17-match winning streak began in February with a shutout of in-state rival FSU. Part of the streak can be attributed to the Gators dominance at home, where they are undefeated.

After finishing the regular season with a three-game road trip and playing the SEC tournament in Athens, Ga., the players are excited to be back on their home court in Gainesville.

"That's a huge advantage to have all the Gainesville Gators fans right behind us, cheering for us," No. 9 freshman Lauren Embree said.

Embree, the recently-named SEC Player of the Year, has excelled at home. Seven of Embree's 16 wins at the No. 1 spot in singles this season came at home after the rough three-loss performance at the ITA Team Tournament in Charlottesville, Va.

Embree is not the only Gator with an impressive win streak heading into Friday.

SEC Freshman of the Year Allie Will has yet to be defeated in the dual-match season in singles play. Will posts a 20-0 record at the No. 2 position this spring.

If the Gators continue their dominance at home and defeat South Carolina State, they will face either Washington or Utah on Saturday at 3 p.m. in the second round.

The No. 6 Gators men's tennis team (19-4) will also be hosting South Carolina State (14-10) in the first round on Saturday at noon.

Florida is looking to bounce back from a 4-0 loss in the SEC tournament championship to No. 2 Tennessee.

Despite falling just short of two goals for this season — the SEC regular-season and tournament championships — UF men's coach Andy Jackson has a positive outlook heading into the NCAA Tournament.

"Hosting is something that was a goal and it's hard-earned, so we're excited about that," Jackson said.

If the men's squad defeats South Carolina State, it may face a familiar foe. No. 31 Auburn is also in Gainesville to face Troy in the first round.

UF won both meetings against the Tigers this season. On March 12, Florida defeated Auburn 5-2 in Gainesville. In the SEC tournament, the Gators won the rematch with Auburn 4-1 in the SEC tournament semifinals in Lexington, Ky.

Wade appears in court

■ **THE NBA STAR IS DEALING WITH MULTIPLE LAWSUITS.**

MIAMI — Taking notes as potential jurors answered questions, Miami Heat star Dwyane Wade watched silently Wednesday as trial proceedings began in a \$25 million breach-of-contract lawsuit filed by former partners in a failed restaurant venture.

A panel of six jurors were selected after about five hours of questioning. Opening statements are expected Thursday.

The lawsuit — one of many Wade is dealing with this offseason, including a bitter divorce and custody case in Chicago — is over the defunct deal over what was to be a chain of D. Wade's Place restaurants. The former partners claim he broke a contract by demanding higher compensation and then abandoning the deal in 2008, shortly after two of the short-lived restaurants opened.

Wade contends he was within his rights to terminate the arrangement and is also seeking damages from plaintiffs Mark Rodberg and Lauren Hollander because of what he "believes to be the wrongful use of his name attached to a restaurant," said Michael Kreitzer, an attorney for the 2006 NBA Finals MVP.

Wade's celebrity factor was evident,

though order was constant. Jury selection largely revolved around whether the selected residents of South Florida — where Wade has starred for seven years — would be swayed by his basketball exploits.

The suit was filed in December 2008, alleging Wade Global Enterprises — owned by Wade and Andrews — made "unjustifiable and unreasonable" demands such as a 30 percent ownership stake in the restaurant enterprise. The original deal, according to the suit, called for Wade to receive a 10 percent stake and Andrews a 2 percent share.

"My clients claim substantial damages, substantial damages in this case," Bales said. "Would any of you have a problem awarding substantial damages if and only if you feel the evidence warrants and requires substantial damages?"

Wade was in court earlier this week in Chicago for more hearings involving his lengthy divorce and custody fight with estranged wife Siohvaughn Wade.

The next hearing in the divorce case is scheduled for May 28, though that could change.

Until then, Wade's full attention is expected to be on the breach suit, which is scheduled to last two weeks and with as many as 62 possible witnesses. Including the former owner of Kentucky Fried Chicken, John Y. Brown.
