



Murals honor struggle for social equality

Twelve columns of the Rosa Parks Downtown Regional Transfer Station were dedicated Tuesday to honor prominent civil rights leaders.

Over the last five weeks, the columns, located at 700 SE Third St., were painted with vivid murals that depict various landmarks in the struggle for social equality.

Park's refusal to give up her bus seat, Dr. King's speeches, the March on Washington, the desegregation of schools, and the bus boycott are all represented. The final column features portraits of U.S. Presidents Abraham Lincoln, John F. Kennedy, Barack Obama and Sen. Robert Kennedy.

Massachusetts-based artist Alan Pearsall was commissioned by the City of Gainesville Parks, Recreation & Cultural Affairs Art in Public Places Trust Advisory Board to create the murals, which wrap around the columns.

The wraparound design is meant to encourage visitors to walk around and read the accompanying narratives that explain the painted scenes, Pearsall said.

"Accessible to old and young alike, the history can be gathered in a creative way by viewing, reading or both," Pearsall said in a written statement.

Pearsall could not attend the dedication ceremony as he was recently involved in an automobile accident. He is expected to make a full recovery.

Jelesia Milton, a junior at P. K. Yonge, accompanied

Court justices approved

After a moment of silence, senators unanimously passed a resolution during Tuesday's Senate meeting to honor Lamar Abel, a former UF football player who died over the weekend.

After the tribute to Abel, senators debated over and approved Student Body President Ashton Charles' nominations for the five justices of the UF Supreme Court.

"They are all really qualified individuals," said Vice President Marcus Dixon. "They have proven to be leaders in Student Government and around campus."

Members of the Student Alliance party ques-

tioned the qualifications of the five nominees, asking them if they had read any UF Supreme Court cases and the UF constitution.

Chief Justice David Nigliazzo's appointment sparked some debate when it was revealed he had not read the full text of the constitution. Student Alliance Senate leader Jonathan Ossip said his party wanted to be sure the justices were qualified before approving them.

UF rugby to be on NBC

It's fast. It's exciting. It's violent.

UF's rugby team is going to Columbus, Ohio, on June 2 to participate in the first USA Sevens' Rugby Collegiate Championship Invitational.

Rugby sevens, a rugby style debuting in the 2016 Summer Olympics, mixes football and soccer, said Noah Walker, UF' rugby club's president.

"It's got a lot of potential to catch on with the explosion of violent sports like MMA and football with its deep-

seated fanbase already," Walker said. "People like to watch people hit each other, outrun each other, so I think it's got a great chance of really gaining hold at the national level."

The tournament, which will take place from June 4 to 6, will be broadcast on NBC, NBC

Universal Sports and Hulu. The event is also expected to be a prime opportunity to scout talent for the national rugby sevens team, Walker said.

Man cited for illegally selling snakes online

MIAMI — A Miami man has been cited with three misdemeanors for illegally selling snakes on Craigslist.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission began investigating 20-year-old Miguel Ruitort after receiving a tip he was selling the reptiles online without the proper licenses.

An undercover wildlife officer purchased two pythons from him Friday.

Authorities say Ruitort told them he didn't have the

licenses to sell the reptiles.

Ruitort faces three misdemeanors including selling wildlife without a license, possessing reptiles of concern without a license, and selling reptiles of concern to an unlicensed person.

Two people attacked by dog in Fla. Gulf coast

SEMINOLE — A man is in critical condition at a Gulf coast hospital after being mauled by his own dog.

Richard Gordon Blackey was attacked early Wednesday morning in his Seminole home just west of Pinellas Park by his 95-pound pet dog. A sheriff's office spokesman says 51-year-old Blackey is being treated for severe bites across his arms, neck and chest.

Blackey's girlfriend, 35-year-old Melissa Howell, sustained a small bite on her thumb while trying to subdue the dog.

She called police, who were able to trap the dog, Mickey, inside the bedroom. Animal services removed the dog from the home.

Paramedics treated Howell and Blackey on the scene.

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
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


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Restaurant cuts hours, live music due to complaint

Forced to close its doors after 4 p.m. now, the Fat Tuscan Café may have to close forever if its zoning code doesn't change.

The Italian-American restaurant on 725 NE First St., which regularly features live guitar music, had its last evening performance Friday. Until further notice, it will be closed on Sundays and after 4 p.m. every other day due to a noise complaint from a resident.

The original zoning code did not allow the café to be open after 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday or be open on Sundays. But around December 2009, owners Michelle Reeves and Marianne Toppino started to keep the café open Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays until around 8:30 p.m.

"We needed to bring in some more income with the economy the way it is," Reeves said. "[The longer hours have] been carrying us through the recession."

Gainesville Code Enforcement officer Todd Martin issued a noise complaint citation after a call from a nearby resident May 15 during a

night of acoustic music. The café had until May 21 to comply with its zoning code.

Neither the resident who complained nor Martin could be reached for comment.

"Now, we have to go to the City Commission and ask them to let us do what we're already doing," Reeves said.

Collin McLeod, 24, of 738 NE Second St., shares a fence line with the Fat Tuscan. He said the restaurant's noise has never bothered him.

"Honestly, Eighth Avenue is more annoying with ambulances and cop cars than the Fat Tuscan," he said.

Elijah George, 27, of 114 NE Seventh Ave., who owns a lot adjacent to the café, said he was unaware the Fat Tuscan had live music on weekends but said noise from Sky Bar on University Avenue bothers him.

"I know a lot of people complain about that in the neighborhood," George said. "But they never shut that down."

The café may not last through the summer if it is not able to hold evening hours, Reeves said.

Bus customer demands refund for missed flight

He was trying to make a flight out of Ft. Lauderdale to Colombia. The bus service offered a "first class coach" trip from Gainesville to Miami for \$20. He took the trip; he won't ever do that again.

Alberto Arcieri, a 65-year-old retired Gainesville resident, bought a GatorBus ticket to Miami for May 14. He had also bought a ticket from the Aires airline.

The bus was supposed to arrive in Miami at 8:30 p.m. It didn't get there until 1:30 a.m., Arcieri said.

"Everything from that trip was awful," Arcieri said. "We arrived there at 1:30 in the morning. I had to be at the airport by 2 in the afternoon, but I felt so sick that I had to cancel."

The bus company responded to his complaints of breakdowns and lack of air conditioning with an e-mail saying that mechanical breakdowns are common in the transportation business.

The company gave Arcieri a refund for the \$20 he spent, but he wanted to be paid back for missing his flight.

Previously, Arcieri's wife, Marla,

and his daughter, Lina, had taken GatorBus to Miami before taking a flight to Colombia. When they re-

turned to Miami, they found an e-mail sent two days before the bus was supposed to take them home to Gainesville. The e-mail explained, "Due to high demand for private bus charters GatorBus will not be providing service for the month of April."

Buses carrying more than nine passengers must register with the Department of Transportation, a department official said. Although the GatorBus website lists its name as GatorBus, LLC, no transportation services were listed as GatorBus in the DOT's Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration data-

base. The GatorBus website said it is a subsidiary of the Empire Coach Lines, which did have a listing in the department's safety database.

Empire Coach Lines, of Orlando, operates 12 buses.

Nine have been inspected with four total violations in the past two years.

The violations ranged from inoperative brake systems to a cracked bus frame.

The DOT database recommended the bus service be inspected.

GatorBus representatives did not respond to repeated requests for comment.

Hair clippings to be sent to Gulf

The infamous Deepwater Horizon oil spill is sending an estimated 5,000 barrels of oil into the Gulf of Mexico every day.

Gators for a Sustainable Campus is giving UF students the opportunity to help do something about it.

Today at 11 a.m., the group will be giving students free haircuts on the Plaza of the Americas as a part of a hair collection to aid oil spill containment efforts on the coast of Florida.

"We wanted to be a part of this effort at UF to make sure that if oil reaches our shores, we are prepared," said Chris Cano, a former member of the group who will be participating in the event.

The hair that is cut will be collected and placed into nylon oil-containment booms, which are long, snake-like stockings stuffed with absorbent material that may be placed along the shorelines of the Gulf of Mexico.

Though it may seem unconventional, human hair is a good material for the booms because it absorbs oil particles.

The group won't just be collecting hair, however. It is also hoping that donating hair will lead students to become more active in the relief effort and the sustainability cause.

The group will place a table next to the barber shop

chair where they will ask people to make a phone call to President Obama.

Heading the relief effort is Gators for a Sustainable Campus member Melanie Richards, who got the idea for hair collection from students at Florida International University in Miami.

Richards also has been working to get local hair salons involved. Avante Garde, Downtown Barber Shop and Salon at 716 have committed to donate their customers' hair, according to the release.

"This is an easy way for students to get involved in the oil relief effort," she said. "The government and BP are not doing enough to fix this situation, so we are taking things into our own hands. If you care, donate hair."

Though collection of hair has been given a newfound prominence due to the catastrophic Gulf spill, the idea is not exactly new.

Hair For Oil Spills was a plan originally devised nearly a decade ago by California-based nonprofit organization Matter of Trust.

Study shows babies learn while sleeping

Babies can soak up knowledge like sponges even when they dream.

Newborns were found to display a basic form of learning during sleep, according to a Columbia University study, which was published May 17 in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences and is the first to show learning during sleep.

Dana Byrd, a UF psychology researcher and co-author of the study, and other researchers studied 1- to 2-day-old babies in New York City to find out how they learn so much from their surroundings while sleeping up to 18 hours per day.

Byrd said the researchers played a tone, followed by a gentle air puff to the babies' eyelids. After about 20 minutes, 24 of the 26 babies squinted when they heard the noise alone, without having the puff of air.

It's possible this research method could help detect children at risk for autism, dyslexia and cerebral palsy, which affects motor control.

"Your baby can and will be learning during sleep," Byrd said.

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

Forget Nothing

Remember the purpose of Memorial Day

The weather is going to be great, but you may want to think twice before cracking open a beer and having a pool party this weekend.

Monday is Memorial Day, and we encourage everybody to take the time to honor the people who died for our country, not the least among them Lance Cpl. Philip Paul Clark, an Alachua County native and 2008 Buchholz High School graduate who died on May 18 while serving in Afghanistan.

Clark's body is going to be escorted into town today by the Alachua County Sheriff's Office, and his funeral service will be held at Queen of Peace Catholic Community on Friday at 9:30 a.m.

While Clark's sacrifice is especially meaningful, millions of Americans have died fighting for their country since they day it was founded. It might be a good time to remember that by visiting memorial displays at Kanapaha Park on Tower Road or the Veterans for Peace's tombstones on Northwest Eighth Avenue and 34th Street. It might not go down as your happiest Sunday afternoon, but our fallen soldiers deserve to be remembered.

This is not the time to talk about whether we should be in the two wars we are fighting. It is not the time to curse politicians, and it certainly is not the time to protest. There are another 364 days in the year for that. It is the time to think about Philip Paul Clark and the other soldiers who gave up their lives so we could live ours.

Come Monday we should all take a break from our opinions and remember that people have died fighting for us not because they had to but because they chose to.

The Savvy Modern Online Politico

I love a good Internet political meme. Most political junkies have their inner circles of friends on an email list-serve that they use to distribute particularly funny or applicable memes. It can be a very enjoyable hobby. For those shaky on the definition, a meme is a concept that is spread via the Internet, text message or other digital media. In most cases, the concept is novel, or a novel reformulation of an existing concept, that is quickly and easily spread from person to person. Internet. The citizen must be able to use the Internet for valid political information without falling prey to soundbites and trolls.

The soundbite is a popular tool used by some to distort the message of a politician or meaning of legislation. It is used by both sides to simplify an argument or tint a quote or speech. The Internet can expose or promulgate the soundbite — the savvy Internet politico has determined how to differentiate the two.

The Internet has also given a home to the country's political trolls. These are the people who wish to be in the political arena but have no solid arguments of their own. Thus, they turn to petty personal attacks in online chat forums and comment sections for attention. Freedom of speech should always be protected, and trolls have the right to troll, but the modern online politico knows to take these fire-starters with more than a grain of salt.

After seeing the column 'Sexual health care on the cheap' in the May 13th edition of the Alligator, we'd like to remind readers that the UF Student Health Care Center also offers a full range of sexual health care services available to students.

UF students pay a health fee in their tuition that helps support the SHCC. Visits to a primary care provider, and most of the practitioners in the women's clinic, do not require additional payment. Patients won't have to endure a long wait if they call first (352-392-1161) to make an appointment. Often, students can get an appointment the same day they call!

SHCC provides testing for sexually transmitted infections and results are always confidential - not even parents can see the results, unless patients give written permission.

For the comfort of our patients, all staff at our women's clinic are female. Students can get prescriptions for birth control or other medications filled at our pharmacy on-site. Some of these medications are offered at discount prices for students. Tests and medications do require payment, but the SHCC tries to keep prices at or below community rates.

Another big bonus of using the Student Health Care Center is that students are assigned to a team of health care providers and will see these same doctors and nurses throughout their time at UF. Wouldn't you like to know the person helping you manage your health,

instead of wondering who you're going to see and whether he or she will understand your individual needs? And SHCC is located right on campus - our main location is on Fletcher Drive near the Hub and football stadium. You can fit an appointment in between classes.

In fact, this year British Petroleum has already committed more money toward helping animals dying from contact with oil and chemical dispersants than any other corporation or government in the world.

Why? Because we care.

BP may care more for these helpless and gentle creatures than the boot-wearing naysayers in the American political system. President Obama and the Democrats are facing a tough campaign this fall for control of Congress and are likely to back away from publicly supporting intensely communal animals like waterfowl, due to rising public resentment for the word "socialist."

Sea turtles skew older and conservative, with their rock-solid breed-

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Military chief calls for end of gay ban

PETERSON AIR FORCE BASE, Colo. —On the eve of a vote to end the military ban on openly gay service members, the nation's top uniformed military officer repeated his support Wednesday for repealing the "don't ask, don't tell" policy.

"Personal opinion? I believe it's time. I believe we need to change it," Adm. Mike Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, told about 500 service members at Peterson Air Force Base. However, Mullen stressed that the change had not yet been approved. And if it is, he said he wouldn't make any final determinations on how to implement it until the military studies the issue and gets input from troops.

The Senate Armed Services

Committee plans to vote Thursday on overturning the ban. The proposal would overturn the ban but allow the military to decide when and how to make any changes.

Mullen talked about the likely repeal in a question-and-answer session with the troops. His visit sparked a response from GOP Rep. Doug Lamborn, who represents the area. Lamborn told reporters a repeal of the ban should not even be considered until the military has completed its study.

Mullen also addressed 1,001 graduating cadets at the U.S. Air Force Academy. He urged the new officers to have the "strength of character" to support whatever decision is made.

captain and tournament director, said NBC has a history of promoting Olympic sports, and this event should bring rugby to the American public.

"Many of the players playing on the weekend will have a great shot at playing for the USA in 2016 in Rio," Lyle wrote in an e-mail.

The UF squad, as well as the other 15 teams in the tournament, were chosen because they are expected to attract a large audience, said Jim Hinkin, competitions manager for USA Sevens.

"Rugby is closely related to football," he said. "We wanted rivalry schools from good football traditions. That's why we have Florida and Tennessee."

UF's team ended the year ranked 15th by American Rugby News with a 17-2 record. A three-point loss to Tennessee, who is in the same tournament bracket as Florida, kept UF out of the Sweet 16. The teams will meet on June 5.

"Our preparation has been pretty intense," Walker said. "We don't want to look like fools on national television. We don't want to get gassed easily on national TV, so we've been conditioning a lot."

USA Sevens is paying for transportation, food, hotels and other team expenses, which makes the experience even more unbelievable, Walker said.

"There's a lot of excitement," he said. They're treating us like it's an [international] tournament."



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

Gardening in home is easy, cheap

Want to learn how to grow weeds? Have you been itching to use your green thumb this summer? Then I'm here to tell you that it's not only easy, it's fun and affordable.

After a lengthy sojourn to a couple local garden centers, I came to the blistering realization, thanks to a Master Gardener at the UF/IFAS Alachua County Extension Office, that this particular type of sowing endeavor is not as difficult as one would imagine.

♦ Step 1: Finding a place for your garden

All of the shrubbery mentioned herein can be conveniently planted in an affordable gardening container.

The sun is (obviously) a primary factor when gardening, so you need to decide where to plant first. If you have a south-facing balcony, you will most likely have the best exposure.

For those of you who are living in dorms, you may only have access to a window. A house plant is probably your best option.

♦ Step 2: Choosing the right soil type

Most plants prefer neutral to slightly acidic soil that is well drained. Professional soil mixes found at garden centers should work fine.

♦ Step 3: Picking which plants you want to grow

Don't get complicated. Ask a gardener what works best. Some varieties:

Annals complete their life cycle in one year and are generally used for color. Impatiens, petunias and pansies are a few examples. Perennials flower every year and are primarily used to add color to a space. Butterfly plants, you guessed it, attract butterflies. Milkweed, pentas and salvias are only a few of the varieties you can plant. If you're looking to witness the entire circle of life, the passion vine attracts caterpillars.

Edible plants include herbs such as basil, parsley and cilantro. Herbs are easy to grow and can be added to any meal - even your Ramen noodles. Another variety of edible plants are vegetables such as tomatoes, eggplant and peppers. If you're lazy, house plants are the way to go. They're easy to grow and maintain.

♦ Step 4: Buying your plant supplies

Talk to some experts. Garden Gate Nursery, located off of Northwest 43rd Street and Harmony Gardens, located off of Northwest 13th Street, are among the garden centers in Gainesville.

If you have extra cash and are feeling a little more adventurous, there's a hydroponics store in town called the Gardener's Edge, located off of Northwest Eighth Avenue.

Home brewing, a complicated but rewarding endeavor

With all sorts of extra time on your hands during Gainesville's off-season and a serious prerogative to stay indoors, why not try your hand at some new hobbies? How about making your own alcohol? Part chemistry, part cooking, part art and part drinking, home brewing is a great way to pass those extra hours of summer daylight.

My passion for brewing started with winemaking last summer. Since then, carrots, strawberries, apples, blueberries and honey are only some of the ingredients to fall prey to my hobby. Regrettably, wine must age before drinking it, and although I have several dozen bottles of homemade booze in my kitchen cabinet, I'm still playing the waiting game. Bowing to my impatience, I turned to beer, which can be ready to drink in as little as a month.

First, let me dispel any misconceptions you may have: Brewing is

as easy as following instructions. Add certain ingredients to a big pot at the appropriate time and then transfer to different containers according to a schedule. A few weeks later, you call your friends and drink the beer. If you can do that, you can brew.

The first step in making delicious homemade alcohol is buying a brew kit. Although it's possible to brew using no specialized equipment, you should learn to rely on skill, tools and measurement rather than luck. Hoggetowne Ale Works is Gainesville's only brewing supply store, and it has everything you need to get started. Brewing kits start at just \$69, a very student-friendly price. And if you take care of it, the equipment will last forever. Case in point: I use my dad's kit he purchased more than 30 years ago.

Once you have your kit, the ingredients to make a batch of beer – five gallons – will cost between \$25 and \$50. It sounds like a lot, but beyond your start-up costs that's well under

\$1 per 12-ounce beer, and unless you make some very poor decisions your beer will taste a lot better than the cheap stuff you might find in a keg.

For your first recipe you'll use malt extract and fermentable sugars already removed from the grain. Think of it as buying a can of corn instead of chopping the kernels off a cob – it saves a lot of time and gets you consistent results.

Once you're comfortable with the general process and familiar with the nuances of your equipment, you can integrate actual grains and other ingredients into your recipes. This makes brewing more difficult but allows for unlimited creativity and customization.

Along with brewing kits, Hoggetowne Ale Works offers hops, grains, recipes, specialty ingredients, winemaking supplies and, most importantly, expert advice. Everyone who works at Hoggetown is a brewer and works hard to make your life easier, offering consultation and

Droney Woods Sound Tour brings nature, music together

Electric hums echoed down gravel paths, through trees and over creeks as a crowd meandered its way through the woods of southwest Gainesville on a steamy Saturday afternoon.

They congregated under bamboo shoots and sat among monkey grass to watch Andrew Chadwick as he hooked up his typewriter to a contact microphone and began typing, the percussive sounds of the punching keys amplified by a nearby boom box.

In his right hand was a children's accordion, which he used to complement the typewriter's chatter, both sounds being pumped through the Kanapaha Botanical Gardens by his speaker in a scene that recalled Ken Kesey and the Merry Pranksters.

Chadwick was the first of about 10 performers stationed throughout the gardens as part of the Droney Woods Sound Tour, an audio tour of the gardens featuring synth pop

and experimental electronic musicians from around Gainesville.

"I love nature and doing electronic music," said Christopher Miller, 41, who organized the tour. "There is a juxtaposition of sorts. It's two things that shouldn't be together." Miller said the tour was the first of its kind in Gainesville and was modeled after a similar tour on the banks of the Santa Fe River in Worthington Springs, organized by Loren Knack.

Miller was able to organize the tour with the help of his uncle, Don Goodman, the founder and director of Kanapaha Botanical Gardens. As he wiped sweat from his forehead after the tour, he said he planned to do another in the fall when the weather gets cooler.

Knack, who performed under the name "Ironing" on Saturday, set up five tape recorders in a ring around the 52 attendees who sat in the filtered sunlight under an oak tree. Each recorder played a different sound: static, accordion, chirping frogs or clicking sounds. Some sat admiring the scenery; others sat with their eyes closed.

"I think that [the sounds] the musicians

bring are not of nature, but they complement it," he said. "It kind of helps people focus on what's around them."

Paul Pino, a 21-year-old art student at UF, played a series of notes in the pitch of B flat from his MacBook for his performance. A pitch, he said, that is present in nature.

"Alligators go crazy around B flat," he said, also noting scientific studies that have found pitches of B flat resonating from black holes.

Pino timed his song to the beat of a bamboo fountain in the garden, which was designed to scare away deer with a loud thump every 30 seconds when it had filled with water. He said he chose to perform in the area next to the fountain because he wanted his environment to be a part of his music.

"It was definitely a way of interacting with your environment," he said. "No one could overpower the sound of the environment."

Other musicians played their music through Honeytone portable amplifiers, which were just loud enough to break through the midday buzzing of cicadas. Chadwick, who performed with his typewriter, said he preferred playing outdoors to indoor venues.

Vinyl records see resurgence, boost in retail sales

While a penchant for minimalism and convenient digital technology drives the majority of music sales (or lack thereof), a growing number of music fans are returning to a bulkier but more interactive format – the vinyl record.

Lily Darnell became interested in collecting records after finding a cardboard box stuffed with '70s-era folk-rock in her parents' garage.

"I feel like MP3s made me lose out on any sort of physical interaction with the music I was listening to. I decided to get into records so I could get back to really hearing music," Darnell said.

Darnell is not alone, either. According to the Recording Industry Association of America, records are the only physical music format to experience any growth in sales. From 2007 to 2008, vinyl LP and EP sales rose by 124 percent – a figure which, though significant, may be modest since it doesn't account for used or independent record sales. Digital sales rose by only 30 percent.

The boom in record sales is showing locally as well. Hear Again Music & Movies owner Andrew Schaefer saw a growth in record sales over the past four months.

Schaefer formerly expected about equal sales in movies and music, but thanks to the vinyl-revival, records now outsell both

CDs and DVDs.

"People have been growing up listening to mp3s for the past 10 or 15 years – when they hear the uncompressed [vinyl] format it's an eye-opener. People feel ripped off by the compressed version of their favorite albums," Schaefer said.

Vinyl collectors tend to describe the sound of records as opposed to digital for-

mats as richer, warmer and fuller. Analog records produce a wider range of frequencies that CDs and mp3s cannot reproduce. Digital-music proponents tend to dismiss this claim by saying the frequencies are inaudible. However, some suggest that the frequencies are felt rather than heard.

"Records have a more omni-dimensional sound that really fills the room a lot better.

LPs sound warmer, and you are more likely to notice subtle sounds and instruments," Schaefer said.

Another appealing aspect of the vinyl sound is referred to as surface noise – the hum of the needle along the record grooves and the occasional crackling sound unheard-of in the comparatively sterile digital format.

"It's sort of a warm, fuzzy sound. I love it," Darnell said.

Because turntables are notoriously difficult to operate while driving, digital music remains popular due, at least in part, to its portability. Labels like Sub Pop now include digital download with most vinyl record sales.

iTunes tried to join the analog-trend by promoting "iTunes LPs," which bundle artwork, lyrics and videos with full album downloads instead of its typical single mp3 downloads. This particular digital LP promotion failed to generate any noteworthy trend, however.

The introduction of mp3 technology spelled the end of the CD around 2001. Declining CD sales pushed a recording industry response to thwart a beast that proved unstoppable – online music sharing.

"What's also great about vinyl is that people are finally contributing to the artists they love again and supporting local stores," Schaefer said.

"If you want to hear an album the way it's meant to be heard, listen to it on vinyl."

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UF's Johnson falters in 10-6 loss to LSU

■ UF WILL FACE NO. 15 ARKANSAS IN AN ELIMINATION GAME TODAY.

HOOVER, Ala. – The pie has soured for Brian Johnson.

About three weeks after receiving the traditional cream-filled dessert to the face in celebration of a dominating effort against LSU (37-20), the UF pitcher lasted just 3.2 horrific innings in Wednesday's rematch.

Johnson, who hit a grand slam and allowed two earned runs in 6.1 frames on May 2, was pulled after surrendering seven runs on nine hits as No. 4 Florida (40-14) fell to LSU 10-6 in the opening round of the SEC Tournament in Regions Park Stadium.

UF will play an elimination game against No. 15 Arkansas (40-17) today 30 minutes after the match-up between Auburn and South Carolina.

"(The Tigers) swung the bat real well," Johnson said. "They were aggressive. I just fell behind a little bit and didn't have my stuff."

Johnson's outing went south in the second when LSU designated hitter Matt Gaudet hit a lead-off homer. The next five LSU batters reached base, including an RBI single by No. 9 hitter Mason Katz.

Johnson struggled with his command, walking three in the inning, but UF coach Kevin O'Sullivan

SEC enforces pitch clock

HOOVER, Ala. – The Gators faced a brand new opponent Wednesday – the clock.

No. 4 Florida (40-14) saw its first-round opponent LSU (37-20) less than a month ago, but it had never been exposed to the new pitch clock that is being experimented with in this week's Southeastern Conference Tournament.

It has been implemented in an attempt to speed things up, and it did.

In last year's conference tourney, games lasted an average of 3 hours and 20 minutes. Two of the first three contests in this season's tournament finished in less than 2 hours and 40 minutes.

The Gators' game was the longest of the first three at 3 hours and 17 minutes due in part to the combined 30 hits the teams racked up.

The new clock was not expected to impact the Gators, who preach a quick and consistent rhythm on the mound.

"It didn't affect me at all," UF starting pitcher Brian Johnson said. "I work at a fast pace anyway."

However, the freshman hurler struggled as he allowed nine hits in just 3.2 innings while giving up seven runs.

The new rules that come along with

the clock include a 20-second timer for the pitcher. When the bases are empty, hurlers have 20 seconds to deliver each pitch. The batter is rewarded with an added ball to the count if the pitcher fails to throw before the clock expires.

UF's game went without an incident as each pitcher worked efficiently.

In order to help give the players a better idea of the allotted time, they have added a digitalized clock in right-center field that counts down the seconds.

A fourth umpire that is not on the field controls the new timer.

Another strategy the SEC is using to make things go by faster is shortening the gap in between frames.

There will be just 108 seconds from when the last out is made and the first pitch of each half inning is

thrown.

Despite all of the added regulations to control the pace of the game, coach Kevin O'Sullivan did not want to burden his players with adjustments.

"We kept it simple," O'Sullivan said. "If the catcher makes the last out, we make sure we have the back up (catcher) in there (to catch warm-up pitches)."

If these new policies go over smoothly this week, they could become part of conference play in the regular season too.

Ex-Gators safety passes

Jarvis Williams, a former defensive back for the Miami Dolphins and New York Giants, died Tuesday night in north Florida. He was 45.

A spokeswoman with the Putnam Community Medical Center said Williams passed away shortly before midnight in his hometown of Palatka, Fla.

The medical examiner confirmed the cause of death was an acute asthma attack.

His passing came as a shock to the Palatka community.

Williams had started volunteering as a football coach at Interlachen High School in Putnam County earlier this year.

Principal Phyllis Criswell said he appeared to be in good shape and perfectly healthy at practice on Tuesday afternoon.

"This has been very hard on our football players ... they have grown to care about Jarvis and were looking forward to their game this Friday," Criswell said. "Now they'll be playing in dedication to him."

The team is scheduled to play a scrimmage game on Friday.

Jerome Wilkerson had been friends with Williams since his senior year of high school. He said he hopes Williams is remembered as a great family man.

"He was always smiling, always laughing. He was a person you loved to be around," he said.

Williams got his start as a safety at the University of Florida and was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame in 2001.

He played with the Dolphins from 1988-1993, and later joined the New York Giants for his final season in 1994.


Former Gators and Dolphins teammate Louis Oliver remembered Williams' famous tackle of University of Miami standout Melvin Bratton in 1986 as "the hit that resonated around the country."

Oliver said he has never seen anything like it in football before or since.

Nat Moore, vice president of Alumni Relations for the Dolphins, called Williams' death a tragedy.

"Jarvis Williams ... was not only a personal friend but a tremendous football player for both the Dolphins and the Gators," Moore said in a statement Wednesday. "He dedicated his life to coaching and helping young people and it's a real tragedy for him to pass away at such an early age."

Williams' son currently plays football for Jacksonville University.

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NY gets Super Bowl

Steam coming from the quarterback's mouth. The Statue of Liberty in the distance. NFL championship at stake.

Live from new Meadowlands Stadium, it's Super Bowl 2014.

NFL owners voted Tuesday for a title game that could be like no other. While there have been sub-40s temperatures for an outdoor Super Bowl, and it's snowed outside a domed stadium on game day, never has the league chosen to hold its marquee event in a place where players and fans could be freezing at kickoff.

They decided it was worth the risk to bring the Super Bowl to the New York area, and to the new \$1.6 billion stadium that this season will become home to the New York Jets and Giants.

"We promise the greatest game in the greatest venue in the greatest city," Giants co-owner Steve Tisch said. "Now we've got to deliver."

The NFL has required an average temperature of 50 degrees or a dome for a team to even bid on hosting the Super Bowl, but the league bent the rule to let New York bid.

"Everyone knows it's risky," said Miami Dolphins owner Stephen Ross, one of two Florida teams whose bids were rejected.

The coldest kickoff temperature in Super Bowl history was 39 degrees, and that would be considered a warm February day in East Rutherford, N.J. Average February temperatures there are 24 to 40 degrees, with several inches of rain, according to the bid documents.

"I do believe that New York is a unique market and the membership recognized that," said NFL commis-

sioner Roger Goodell. "I think it will turn out to be a great event."

Being just outside the Big Apple means lots of glitz and spectacle. Buildup will include everything from a float in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day parade to parties at internationally renowned destinations.

The flip side is that security will become a bigger issue, perhaps among the most expensive pieces of the budget. An expected economic impact of \$550 million would help offset some of the cost.

Tuesday's vote had been widely considered a formality, but it didn't play out that way. Even after Miami was eliminated, it took two more rounds of voting for New York to get the nod over Tampa.

"New York knows how to put on an event," Ross said, putting aside his weather warnings. "It's not like you lost to some small town that doesn't know how to put on big events."

It's billed as a one-time exception, but players are split on the decision.

In the Pittsburgh Steelers' locker room, quarterback Byron Leftwich said the weather doesn't matter "because it's the Super Bowl ... and you're not going to let 15 degrees change anything." But linebacker James Farrior countered, "I play enough games in the cold."

It's been at least 57 degrees for kickoff of every Super Bowl since 1975, when it was 46.

Odds are, the NFL will wait and see how this foray into the great outdoors in winter goes before considering another such bid.

The 2014 game will be held Feb. 2nd, 9th or 16th, depending on how that season's schedule is set up.

kept Johnson in until the fourth inning. The southpaw was finally pulled after giving up a double and single to sophomore Tyler Hanover and first baseman Blake Dean, who both scored later in the inning.

Unlike Johnson, LSU ace Anthony Ranaudo redeemed a nightmare outing against Florida on April 30, when the Gators chased the right hander after two innings. Ranaudo, a projected top-10 pick in the MLB Draft before the season, recorded five strike outs while throwing a season-high 7.2 innings on Wednesday.

"You got to tip your cap to him," UF center fielder Matt den Dekker said. "He battled and gave them a great chance to win."

If the Gators can take anything positive from Wednesday's game, it is their effort in the eighth inning. Den Dekker led off the frame with his 12th long ball of the season. Freshman Austin Maddox then singled and right fielder Daniel Piggot drew a walk to force Ranaudo out of the contest.

Both base runners scored later in the frame, cutting LSU's lead to 9-6. But the Tigers added

an insurance run in the ninth and reliever Paul Bertuccini closed the door on the Gators in the ninth.

Seven Gators recorded a hit on Wednesday, led by Den Dekker, who drove in three runs with his homer and a fifth-inning double. And, despite his struggles on the mound, Johnson went 3 for 4 from the plate.

But UF was still outhit 19-11.

After clinching the regular-season title last weekend against South Carolina, Florida appeared to suffer from a hangover Wednesday. Maddox spoiled a potential rally in the fourth by over-running third base, and even the shore-handed Nolan Fontana committed his third error of the season.

"They were really flat," O'Sullivan said of his team. "I could tell before we stretched. I understand what we accomplished in the regular season, but it's a separate season. We can't just turn it on and turn it off. We talked about that. We can't just go through the motions this weekend then next weekend go ahead and turn it on full speed."

off of back-to-back WCWS appearances, but were still facing questions about if they could maintain that greatness in the post-Stacey Nelson era.

Walton feels those questions have been answered.

"I'm just happy about being able to set goals and achieve regional success," Walton said. "Moving on to Super Regionals is huge for stability in your program."

"I think I said in the beginning of the year, it's going to be one of the most important years of our program because of how much success we've had in the past and whether or not we'd be able to transition from one pitcher to the other, and I think Stephanie (Brombacher) answered that call."

While Florida can use this weekend to cement itself as one of the NCAA's premier softball programs, the SEC can use it to assert itself as the nation's top conference.

Last season, the SEC accounted for three of the final four teams in the WCWS, but were still unable to come away with the league's first national championship as Washington pulled through to give the Pacific 10 its 21st title.

US releases 23-man roster

The phones started ringing at 2 a.m., and players were told to come down to the third floor for a meeting. As Herculez Gomez pressed the elevator button on 17, his mind raced.

Were his dreams about to be fulfilled -- or crushed?

This is the way the U.S. World Cup team was finalized, in the dead of night in a Hartford hotel.

"It's been such a crazy and unbelievable journey," Gomez said.

And the big trip hasn't even begun.

For Gomez, it was good news. He and Edson Buddle went from long shots to the American roster Wednesday, joining veterans Landon Donovan, DaMarcus Beasley and Tim Howard on the 23-man U.S. team headed to South Africa.

While there was joy and relief

for the chosen, there was only heartache and anguish for the seven players called downstairs a few minutes earlier, the players leaving the group selected May 11 for the preliminary roster, only to be cut four days before departure.

At the start of the year, Gomez and Buddle weren't even afterthoughts. Neither was listed in the team's 2010 media guide.

A 28-year-old from Las Vegas, Gomez scored 10 goals for Puebla to tie for the Mexican scoring lead, becoming the first American to top a foreign league. The 29-year-old Buddle leads Major League Soccer with nine goals for the Los Angeles Galaxy.

They were chosen over Brian Ching, who only returned May 13 from a hamstring injury.

Beasley also had a remarkable turnaround and will be going to his third World Cup. He teamed with Donovan to spark the Americans to a quarterfinal appearance in 2002. Then he was part of the disappointing team eliminated in the first round four years ago.

He was exiled from the national team after poor play at the Confederations Cup last June, but returned for the March exhibition at the Netherlands.

Beasley made a strong showing at the training camp that began May 17.

"He certainly had to prove himself," Bradley said. "He needed to make a renewed commitment to the team, a renewed commitment to doing things as a player that make his team better. We've seen that."

Bradley selected three goalkeepers, seven defenders, nine midfielders and four forwards.

Forward Jozy Altidore at 20 is the youngest player. The average age is just under 27, down from 28.5 at the 2006 tournament.

Donovan, with a U.S. record 42 goals in 121 appearances, is the most experienced player and Buddle the least. Of the 43 players in qualifying, 19 made the roster.

Gators set for NCAA Preliminaries

While it was a great accomplishment, the Southeastern Conference Outdoor Championship was just an appetizer for the outdoor season.

This weekend the Gators track and field teams are prepared for the entrée and ready for the opportunity to taste the dessert.

Both the men and women's teams begin their NCAA championship ambitions today when they participate in the three-day NCAA Preliminary Rounds in Greensboro, N.C.

Hot off its first SEC Outdoor Championship since 1987, the men's team enters the meet as the nation's No. 1 ranked team. The women's team, which finished a close second to LSU at SEC's, also enters the meet ranked in the nation's top 10, sitting at number six.

Florida head coach Mike Holloway, recently named SEC Men's Head Coach of the Year, said he was proud of both teams at SEC's, and that both are ready to compete and qualify this coming weekend.

"We just got to do what we've been doing," he said.

Unlike the previous seven years, the 2010 campaign is the first season for the NCAA Preliminary Rounds. The NCAA moved from the four-region format to the two regionals, East and West.

North Carolina A&T University is hosting the East Re-

gional, while the University of Texas at Austin is hosting the West Regional.

There are no winners this weekend, only qualifiers.

The fields of each individual event consist of 48 athletes with the top 12 advancing to the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The top 12 teams also advance from the 24 teams competing in each relay.

The Florida men enter the preliminary rounds leading the East Region in six different events: Kemal Mesic in the shot put, Calvin Smith in the 400-meter dash and the top 4x100 meter relay teams. Christian Taylor, recently named SEC Men's Field Athlete of the Year, is the East Regional's top long jumper and top triple jumper.

The women's team leads the East Regional in three different events led by SEC Female Field Athlete of the Year Mar-iam Kevkhishvili in the shot put. Charlotte Browning in the 1,500-meter run and Shara Proctor in the long jump also lead the region in their respective events.

After the SEC's were marred with inclement weather and long delays, Holloway said he expects much of the same this weekend during the preliminary rounds.

"It always rains," he said. "I haven't checked it [weather], but I always expect it to rain."
