Tuition fees sent to Board

■ THE UNIVERSITY FEE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDED RAISING FEES BY \$5.79 PER CREDIT HOUR.

The University Fee Committee decided unanimously Friday to recommend the UF Board of Trustees raise overall undergraduate tuition costs by \$5.79 per credit hour, starting in August.

The decision comes almost a week after Gov. Charlie Crist signed legislation allowing Florida universities a one-time opportunity to raise student fees more than the usual 5 percent.

On Tuesday, the committee accepted three new fees totaling \$2.80, on top of the \$1.15, or 5 percent, fee hike approved in December.

The allocation of a potential \$1.84 fee was put off until Friday. This fourth new fee was initially proposed to be used to fund 40 percent of the graduate student health care program, GatorGradCare.

Student Body President Ashton Charles said it made her uneasy to have undergraduates pay for health coverage they would not receive.

"It's a bad precedent to set," she said. "[The money] could be tailored to services all the students could use."

Though the committee acknowledged GatorGradCare is important for attracting good graduate students to UF, members agreed it is not fair to burden undergraduates with fees they

50 protest for Gaza

Amid renewed controversy surrounding Israel's seizure of an international aid boat headed to Gaza, about 50 people demonstrated at the corner of Southwest 34th Street and Williston Road, calling for the U.S. government to take a stand against Israel's actions.

Protesters gathered at the northwest corner of the intersection and lined Southwest 34th Street with signs that read, "Building supply = contraband," "End the blockade

now," and "Free Gaza."

Organized by the Gainesville chapter of the International Socialist Organization, the demonstrators stood at the intersection from 4 p.m. to about 5 p.m. and then walked down Southwest 34th Street to the Gainesville office of Florida Representative Cliff Stearns, chanting

all the way.

Jeremiah Tattersall and Joe Cencer said they organized the protest because they felt the act by Israel

Pipe, road repairs not done

A large water pipe burst Saturday evening, flooding the intersection of Southwest 10th Street and Southwest Fifth Avenue for about two hours.

The pipe, which runs under Southwest 10th Street, burst around 7 p.m., causing water pressure for the surrounding area to drop severely, according to Tony Cunningham, senior environmental engineer with Gainesville Regional Utilities.

Officers from the Gainesville Police Department quickly blocked off the flooded street and intersection, which remains blocked off while the pipe is repaired, Cunningham said.

"It looked like the street was erupting with like, white water rapids," said Brian Greenfield, 22, who was on his way home nearby when he

saw the flooded street. "It was just spewing out with water and spreading everywhere."

GRU employees were able to turn off the feeding valve to the broken main and isolate it, which stopped the flooding, he said.

According to Cunningham, GRU worked quickly to restore water utilities to those affected. Most residents were back on track by Sunday morning. By Monday, everyone's utilities had been restored.

Cunningham said GRU continues to run water quality analysis tests and can assure residents that their water is safe to drink.

Although Cunningham could not say for sure when the intersection will reopen for traffic, he said GRU will be working on repairing the broken main into the next week.

"We don't know exactly because we're getting the parts to repair it," he said, "and determining the best solutions for repair."

The Alligator failed to report this clearly in Thursday's paper.



City adopts fire service fee

With costs rising for city services, churches and nonprofit organizations will soon have to pay a fire service fee.

The special assessment fee for fire services, which was adopted by the Gainesville City Commission on Thursday, was created to balance shortages in Gainesville's budget for next year.

The notifications about the fee should be received via mail by June 24. All property owners, residential homes and business offices are included in the assessment, and no properties are exempt.

The fee won't be the same for every building. The City Commission has proposed to establish the amounts based on factors such as the building's hazard class, which is dictated by what the building is made of, the rate of flame spread and occupancy.

As of now, the City Commission has not set exact rates.

Gene Prince, interim fire chief for Gainesville Fire Rescue, said 14 percent of the city's budget is for the fire department, and

the department's availability, demand and incident reports are used to determine the costs of operating and the level of service for the community. He said the fee is a stable funding method because the charges won't fluctuate like other taxes.

Kent Vann, executive director at the St. Francis House said this is another financial burden placed on nonprofit organizations. But he said he understands the fee may be needed as an effort to save other services.

"I don't think the City Commission realizes how insulting this is to volunteers," said Jasmine Nebhrajani, a UF political science senior. "Charging charities and nonprofit buildings just isn't right."

The final meeting for the City Commission fire service special assessment will occur July 15.

Zoo holds Oceans Day

The Santa Fe College Teaching Zoo flooded visitors with conservation tips to celebrate World Oceans Day over the weekend.

This year, in light of the recent oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico, the zoo provided information about the spill and about the Association of Zoos and Aquariums. The organization is working with the zoo to help animals affected by the spill by rehabilitating them and releasing them back into the wild.

About 200 attended both days of the event, which was intended to help educate people on how their daily activities affect the oceans, said Tarah Jacobs, the event coordinator and a conservation education specialist at Santa Fe.

The event, which is in its third year, featured coloring, an arts and

crafts table with seafood origami, and a children's sea turtle researcher game.

World Oceans Day, which is today, was recognized by the United Nations in June 2008.

Jacobs said there are simple things people can do to help with the ocean's ecosystem like shutting off the water while brushing your teeth or choosing your area's most sustainable seafood items at restaurants because most seafood is over-fished.

The zoo's conservation efforts included ocean facts posted around the zoo and information packets based on Seafood Watch, a seafood advisory list.

Kristen Reecer, Santa Fe zoology technology student and an event volunteer, said she hopes that what people learn at the event, they'll share with others, which will bring more awareness to the issue.

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

130-meal limit criticized

Praying won't get you a free meal if you're the 131st person in line at the St. Francis House.

The Gainesville ordinance, which caps the number of free meals at homeless shelters, was criticized again by residents at Thursday's City Commission meeting.

The city threatened on April 2, 2009, to shut down the St. Francis House, a homeless shelter and soup kitchen in downtown Gainesville, if it did not begin complying with the city code's section concerning soup kitchens, which limits the number of daily meals to 130. This made social workers and local church members question the reasoning behind the strict enforcement of the ordinance.

Miriam Elliott, who used to work at St. Francis, said she was saddened by the city forcing the shelter to lock its doors while it still has food to serve.

Assistant City Manager Fred Murry listed the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, formerly known as

the Food Stamp Program, the Salvation Army and Arbor House, a facility for homeless, pregnant women, as potential options for those who are turned away from food by the 130-meal limit.

Elliott, who now works at Arbor House, said the Arbor House is not open to the public and does not give out meals. The house's residents, who are single mothers and pregnant women, use food stamps.

She also said the Salvation Army begins service at 4:30 p.m. while the meals at St. Francis are served at noon, which would make one wait for more than four hours to be fed.

The issue of meal limits have been debated since **Local News** early 2009 when the city began enforcing the 1993 city code amendment, which limits the number of daily meals a shelter could provide, restricts certain areas from providing meals or shelter and caps the number of people who could stay the night at a shelter, according to the commission meeting's agenda.

The City Commission approved a petition on Feb. 18 to lift the meal limit on Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and one additional day to be determined by the shelter.

Obama defends Gulf spill response in interview with NBC

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama said Monday he's been talking closely to Gulf Coast fishermen and various experts on BP's catastrophic oil spill not for lofty academic reasons but "so I know whose ass to kick."

The salty words, part of Obama's recent efforts to telegraph to Americans his engagement with the crisis, came in an interview in Michigan with NBC's "Today" show.

He strongly defended his role in dealing with the crisis that began with the April 20 explosion on a BP-leased oil rig in the Gulf.

"I was down there a month ago before most of these talking heads were even paying attention to the Gulf," Obama told NBC's Matt Lauer. "I was meeting with fishermen in the rain talking about what a potential crisis this could be."

Some have criticized the president for not engaging passionately enough on the spill, even though he's been to the Gulf coast three times since the disaster, his most recent visit on Friday. Obama said he has talked to a variety of "experts" on the oil spill besides fishermen.

"I talk to these folks because they potentially have the best answers — so I know whose ass to kick," the

president said.

NBC aired a portion of the interview on Monday evening in advance of Tuesday's "Today" show.

Obama also launched a salvo at Tony Hayward, BP's CEO, over some of his comments, including saying at one point that "I want my life back" and that the Gulf was "a big ocean" and that "the environmental impact of this disaster is likely to be very, very modest."

"He wouldn't be working for me after any of those statements," Obama said, according to excerpts released by NBC.

Earlier, Obama sought to reassure the nation that the Gulf Coast

would "bounce back" from the worst oil spill in the nation's history, but not without time, effort and reimbursement from BP.

Surrounded by Cabinet members, Obama said that not only is he confident that the crisis will pass but also that the affected area "comes

back even stronger than ever."

The president and top federal officials were briefed on the government's battle against the spill by Coast Guard Adm. Thad Allen, who is overseeing the government's efforts in dealing with the tragedy.

Allen earlier Monday said a cap on the damaged oil well is now keeping up to 462,000 gallons of oil a day from leaking into the Gulf. That's up from about 441,000 gallons on Saturday and about 250,000 on Friday. BP in a statement put the amount being captured at 466,200 gallons. Allen said the government was using its own flow-rate calculations and not relying on those from BP.

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UF tunnel robbery was a false alarm

UF students and faculty members received emergency text messages and e-mails early May 31 warning of a crime that occurred in the pedestrian tunnel under 13th Street.

There was just one problem; the robbery likely did not happen, according to UPD Capt. Jeff Holcomb.

Brett House, a 19-year-old Gainesville resident, called the University Police Department at 8 a.m. on May 31, according to UPD Lt. Alton McDilda. House reported that he had been robbed.

Holcomb said House told police that at 3 a.m. someone hit him from behind and stole about \$45 worth of marijuana from his backpack.

Later during questioning, House admitted to making up the crime, blaming it on his narcotics use, Holcomb said.

"He didn't remember reporting the crime to us," he said.

UPD will file a complaint with the State Attorney's Office against House for filing a false police report, Holcomb said Thursday. The complaint can turn into a criminal charge. House did not answer repeated phone calls.

Crist receives abortion bill with ultrasound requirement

TALLAHASSEE — After a wait of more than five weeks, lawmakers finally sent Gov. Charlie Crist the most contentious bill of the 2010 legislative session on Monday.

Lawmakers passed a health care bill on April 30 containing some last-minute amendments that would require women seeking an abortion during the first trimester to undergo an ultrasound exam and pay for it. Estimates on the cost of an ultrasound varied from a few hundred dollars to about \$1,500.

The amendments tacked onto the otherwise non-controversial measure would require women to view the live ultrasound image or have it described by a doctor unless they could prove they were victims of rape, incest or domestic violence.

That language and the way the Republican-led Legislature pushed it through in the final hours of the session created heartburn for Crist, who has already used his veto pen several times this spring.

Crist, who has until June 22 to decide whether to veto the bill,

has previously said on several occasions that he was troubled by the anti-abortion language added in the final hours of the session without going through any committee hearings.

"Gov. Crist has concerns about House Bill 1143 and will fully consider it now that it has reached his desk," press secretary Sterling Ivey said Monday.

House Republicans said Monday the bill provides women an opportunity to make an informed choice. The delay by the House before sending the measure did result in more calls and letters being sent to the governor's office in support of the bill. Of more than 39,000 messages, letters or calls directed to Crist, roughly 60 percent were in support, his office reported Monday.

The bill also extends a state and federal policy prohibiting tax dollars from being used to pay for elective abortions.

Crist's vetoes and decision in April to leave the Republican Party to pursue his bid for the U.S. Senate without party affiliation has made him a virtual outcast in most GOP circles.

The state Constitution says the Legislature can forward legislation to the governor on a "practicable" timetable.

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

However, the university also said Koretzky was not allowed to stay on as an unpaid volunteer because FAU policy requires advisers of student groups to be university employees.

FAU has refused to comment on the issue or detail what the punishment would be if students met with Koretzky against the school’s wishes.

We are nothing short of disgusted over how FAU is handling this situation. It is effectively censoring its student newspaper and enforcing its rule through threats of disciplinary action. Sometimes we forget how lucky we are to work at an independent paper because things like this still go on at student papers across the nation.

We are glad to see Koretzky is still meeting with student writers against FAU’s wishes. But we would be happier if FAU would acknowledge its mistake, apologize and consider changing its policy for non-employees.

Anyone who volunteers to assist students in their area of study should be able to do so as long as he or she is qualified. Someone with about 20 years of journalism experience sounds qualified enough to us.

Fellow Gators, I know you all have heard so much about how important it is to fill out the 2010 Census, but this is the final stretch.

Participation in the census is crucial for college and university students around the state who have been traditionally underrepresented in the past. Standing up for the count is our best way to impact the amount of funding our school and community receives. We must ensure students here are counted in Gainesville in order to obtain the federal funds our college community is eligible to receive. Although you may still receive support from your parents or consider their house your permanent address, this is the community where you live and sleep most of the year, and where you should be

counted.

With this data collected only every 10 years, it is important a complete count of the student population is obtained in order to properly plan for future growth, including college tuition and grant and loan programs. In addition, the census can help our

school receive funding for important research done by faculty, students, librarians and community leaders. Census data also determine funding for critical community resources such as transportation, public safety, medical care and road repairs.

Students who live off campus received their forms last semester while those living in group quarters on campus were counted through May. Soon you may receive a knock on your

door from an enumerator if you did not return your form. If so, please take 10 minutes to fill out the form with the official census taker. These professionals will not ask to enter your home and will only ask you the 10 short questions.

Just a few minutes of your time will help strengthen our generation's voice. It's up to all of us to stand up and be counted.

The Alligator accepts this?! "We want to use this money for mental health later, but for now, let's go ahead and collect the money and throw it at SG. It'll be fun!"

If the administration wants a fee to support a mental health program that doesn't yet exist, then it should either delay the fee until the program exists or save the money that is collected from the fee now to support the mental health program later. Just giving the money to SG doesn't make sense.

Now let's talk about undergrads supporting graduate health care. Actually, despite being a former graduate assistant and GAU member, I agree with Ashton Charles and other under-

graduates that the undergrads shouldn't have to pay for grad students' health care. On the other hand, I think the 60-cent per credit hour fee that will keep grad students' overall fees down is a great idea — undergrads won't feel that too much, and it will lift a substantial weight from grad students' shoulders.

I also want to correct some misconceptions of the editorial board. You assert that potential graduate students choose UF because it will further their careers and not because of financial concerns during grad school. This is not true. The funding you get in grad school is a huge determinant your school decision. If a highly qualified graduate student is being courted by UF and another school that is offering a similar salary, the free health care here could convince that student to attend UF. Did you ask any grad students why they chose UF before writing?

Another misconception: the purpose of free health care is not to lure in more grad students, but rather to increase the quality of students recruited. The administration's argument is not that supporting health care this way will lead to more sections being offered. Rather, it will lead to the sections that are already offered being taught by higher quality teachers. I think that this is a serious assumption on the administration's part. Being a good researcher does not mean you're a good teacher. I just want the Alligator to understand the position it's arguing against.

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Law orders cyclists stick to bike lanes when possible

The Florida Legislature is kicking bicycles to the curb. A new bill signed by Gov. Charlie Crist on Friday will force cyclists to ride in bike lanes if one is available after Sept. 1.

A section of the 81-page bill will amend the current law, which states bikes must ride as close to the edge of the road as practical, to say that if a bike lane is present then cyclists must stay in the bike lane.

Bicycle advocacy groups, such as Florida Bicycle Association and Green Mobile Network, opposed the bill because it takes power away from cyclists.

The bill contains exceptions to the law. For example, if an animal runs in front of a cyclist, then the person can swerve out of the way.

The executive director of Florida Bicycle Association, Laura

Hallam, said she thinks the bill will hurt bike safety.

"What's going to happen is it's just going to make things so much more confusing over whether a bicyclist is in the right place," she said. "Whereas, it would be much better for bicyclists to make their own judgment on where the safest place on the roadways is."

Tui Popenoe, a computer science and business administration junior who works at the Student Government Bike Repair, said the bill makes a reasonable request.

"If the bike lane is there, then bikes should ride in it," he said. "If it's not there, then the law doesn't change anything."

The main problem with the new law, said Gainesville lawyer Cherie Fine, is too much is left up to interpretation. She said she hopes Gainesville will interpret the law to mean that cyclists should ride in bike lanes only if it's safe to do so.

One problem that can arise, she said, is if courts use the law as an excuse to give tickets to cyclists. She fears that "this could make cyclists second-class citizens."

There are different types of cyclists, according to Dekova Batey, the program coordinator for the City of Gainesville's Bicycle/Pedestrian Program. For more relaxed cyclists, using a sidewalk is more appropriate since they don't need the speed of the road. However, for people who commute by bicycle, they are more likely to need the speed of a bike lane.

Cyclists on the road should operate like motor vehicles, while cyclists on sidewalks should operate like pedestrians, he said.

Another portion of the bill, which Hallam said Mothers Against Drunk Driving supports, changes driving under the influence restrictions.

Previously, people receiving a fourth DUI conviction would permanently lose their licenses. Under the bill, they can regain their license by connecting their cars' ignitions to alcohol-testing devices.

The bill is a better alternative to making sure drunk drivers aren't driving without a license, Hallam said. This option makes sure the government is tracking drivers with a history of driving under the influence, she said.

would not directly benefit from.

The committee decided the additional \$1.84 fee should be adopted and split up to be used for all students' interests. It will recommend that \$1.20 go toward student activities and services, and the remaining 64 cents be spent on the university's health department.

Organizations and groups on campus who want funding can make their arguments to student government in the coming months.

Committee members said that raising fees by \$5.79 per credit hour is necessary for UF to remain a credible academic institution. Currently, UF's tuition rates are below average for the state. To ignore this one-time chance to raise student fees would put UF at a disadvantage to other schools in the state, committee members said.

T.J. Villamil, UF undergraduate student and committee chairman, said the money is badly needed all around campus.

"Every year when this fee committee meets they're ... nickel and diming, they're strained," he said. "It's a shame as the flagship university of this state to be so behind. It was a landmark [decision] because it was a one-time thing."

could not be ignored.

"We think the occupation and blockade of Gaza is just inhumane, an injustice to human decency," Cenker said.

Tattersall said the plan was to give Stearns hundreds of hand-signed letters that called for him to make an official announcement against the act.

"They're trying to starve the people out," Tattersall said. "We'd like to see him openly denounce the attack."

The protesters were met outside Stearns' office by his district aid Jene Plough, who told them Stearns was not available for comment.

Plough promised, however, to take the letters to Stearns, as well as listen to their demands and forward them to the congressman.

Plough said Stearns' official statement on the subject could be available via his press secretary in Washington, D.C., Paul Flusche.

Flusche was not available for comment by press time.

Muhammad Rushdi, a graduate student in computer science at UF, brought his daughters with him on Monday.

He came to protest because he thinks the situation represents is a double stan-

dard in foreign policy.

"Israel has broken international law in what they've done," he said. "We claim

to be neutral, but we're supporting those who support the blockade. This is a big problem."

South Florida gunman kills wife, three other women

HIALEAH — A gunman shot and killed his wife outside a South Florida restaurant where she worked, then targeted women inside and killed three others before committing suicide, police said Monday.

Police said 38-year-old Gerardo Regalado bypassed at least two men when he fired at the women inside. Three women were hospitalized in critical condition, Hialeah police Detective Eddie Rodriguez said.

"He went straight for the women," Rodriguez said.

Regalado is the half brother of former baseball star Orlando "El Duque" Hernandez.

The shooting began Sunday night in a parking lot outside the Yoyito Restaurant in Hialeah, where Regalado of Coral Gables was seen arguing with Liazan Molina, Rodriguez said. According to Florida marriage records, the couple married in 2007.

According to police, Regalado shot and killed Molina, 24, then entered the restaurant and fired on six women inside.

One employee called her brother after

the shooting, saying she had been shot and was bleeding.

Felix Fuentes said his sister, Ivet Coronado, told him to "please call 911." He said the 36-year-old woman was recovering Monday from surgery for gunshot wounds to her chest and one of her arms.

Regalado drove off after the shooting, police said. Officers found him dead of an apparent suicide a few blocks away, with the same weapon used in the restaurant shootings, Rodriguez said.

People inside the Coral Gables house where Regalado and Molina lived refused to answer a reporter's knocks at the door. A person who answered the phone identified himself only as a family friend and said the family didn't want to talk.

Hernandez's agent, Mike Maulini, told the Spanish-language newspaper El Nuevo Herald that the family does not know what caused Regalado to shoot seven women.

"This has taken everyone by surprise," Maulini said.

Regalado came to Miami from Cuba in 2006, he said.

"We do not know what might have happened. He was a good kid. Since he arrived he has tried not to depend on his brother and do his own work," Maulini.

In a statement, Hernandez's family of-

fered condolences to the families of the seven women. "It is with great pain that we reach out to everyone affected and offer our prayers in this time of sorrow," the statement said.

It was not immediately clear if all the women shot were restaurant employees or customers. The shooting began shortly after the restaurant had closed.

A series of 911 calls released by police record breathless Spanish-language callers urging dispatchers to send ambulances Sunday night.

"Hurry! Hurry!" said one terrified woman in Spanish to the dispatcher. "That man killed them."

State News A male caller in Spanish is heard on another recording at 10:11 p.m. breathing rapidly and telling the dispatcher,

"He entered the Yoyito Restaurant and began shooting like crazy."

He tells the dispatcher that the man and a woman had argued before the shooting started.

"They were arguing out in front of the restaurant ... he killed the girl," the man says.

A spokeswoman for Jackson Memorial Hospital declined to release any information about the three women being treated

there because all had requested privacy. No contact information for one survivor, Yasmine Dominguez, could be found. There was no answer at the Hialeah Gardens mobile home of the third, 55-year-old Mayra Delacarrada.

No working phone number could be found for Molina's relatives in the Miami area. At the Hialeah home of 56-year-old Zaida Castillo, a relative said her family did not want to speak with reporters.

Two other victims, 32-year-old Maysel Figueroa and 47-year-old Lavina Fonseca, lived next door to each other in Hialeah. People inside Fonseca's home refused to answer the door, and a neighbor said Figueroa had lived in her small cottage for only about six months.

Regular customers in the city, which has a large Cuban-American population, gathered in shock outside the restaurant on Monday.

"They are good people," said Valentin Perez, 52, who visits the restaurant for his Cuban coffee every morning.

Octavio Guzman, another customer, said the restaurant workers are always generous with those who can't afford a meal.

"You tell anyone here, 'I'm hungry and I don't have money,' and they give it to you," Guzman said.

UF advances to super regionals

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An unlikely bat rose to the occasion and hit the Gators into the next round of postseason play.

Sophomore Tyler Thompson, who leads the team with 49 strikeouts and has struggled to provide productive at-bats, has been stuck at the bottom of the order all year.

But on Sunday he showed why coach Kevin O'Sullivan has stuck with him through the tough times.

The left fielder became the first Gator in postseason history to drill three homers in a game. He racked up six RBIs along the way to power No. 4 Florida (45-15) past FAU 15-0 and into the NCAA Super Regional. UF outscored its opponents 32-5 in the Gainesville Regional.

The Gators will take on the winner of today's 1 p.m. Coral Gables Regional final between Miami and Texas A&M, which was delayed Monday night due to weather.

"I feel really good about this team at this point," O'Sullivan said. "I think we're clicking. We are playing really good defense and are pitching well, while getting production from up and down the lineup."

Thompson got it started in the second inning with an RBI double down the right-field line to drive in freshman Mike Zunino and give the Gators an early 1-0 advantage.

He then followed up back-to-back round trippers from Brian Johnson and Zunino in the third with his first of the night as he crushed a ball over the scoreboard in right field

Gators ousted from WCWS

OKLAHOMA CITY – After his team's 16-3 loss to UCLA on the first day of the Women's College World Series, UF coach Tim Walton said rebounding to win a national championship would be "next to impossible."

Evidently, he knew what he was talking about – but at least his team went down swinging.

Just a few hours after valiantly staving off elimination with a 5-0 victory over No. 9 Missouri (51-13), No. 4 Florida's (49-10) season officially came to a close Saturday with a 3-2 loss to No. 6 Georgia (50-12).

With the Bulldogs holding a 3-2 lead in the top of the sixth, the Gators put runners on second and third with just one out, only to follow with five consecutive swinging strikeouts to end the game and the season.

"The pitcher that came in was throwing

a really good game and we just didn't make the adjustments that we should've made," senior Corrie Brooks said. "I don't think we really communicated well with each other, like the first person striking out going to the next person."

These late-inning shortcomings overshadowed the heroic efforts of junior Stephanie Brombacher and freshman Britany Schutte, who fought their hardest to keep UF's season alive.

Brombacher had a stellar bounceback performance, allowing just three runs on the day despite throwing 13 innings and 182 pitches in the sweltering Oklahoma City heat.

"I thought Stephanie really showed a lot of heart today," Walton said. "She went out there and gutted it out through 13 innings

Stanton to make major league debut for Marlins

NEW YORK — The wait is over. Mike Stanton is joining the Florida Marlins.

The highly-touted slugger will make his major league debut to-night in Philadelphia, part of a roster shakeup designed to spark the slumping Marlins.

"He's a great talent and he's going to be a big addition to our lineup," outfielder Cody Ross said after Sunday's 7-6 loss at the New York Mets. "It's going to be fun to watch him play finally."

Stanton wowed the Marlins during spring training with his power but the 20-year-old outfielder was sent to Double-A Jacksonville for

seasoning. He responded by dominating the Southern League, hitting .311 with 21 homers and 52 RBIs in 52 games to earn the promotion to the majors.

"I think he's going to be fine," second baseman Dan Uggla said. "He's a very humble kid with a huge amount of talent and I think he's going to continue to work

hard. Hopefully, he's going to be able to help us out."

Stanton's anticipated debut comes at a key time for Florida (28-30), which has lost four of five to sink to fourth in the NL East. But the Marlins were quick to dial down expectations and were confident the 2007 second-round draft pick would be able to handle the

hype.

"The young man is mature and humble and I think he'll handle it just fine," said manager Fredi Gonzalez, who declined to get into where Stanton will play and how he fits into the lineup.

Washington Nationals rookie pitcher Stephen Strasburg will also make his big league debut today.

Nationals select Harper with first overall pick in draft

A year after taking similarly hyped right-hander Stephen Strasburg, the Nationals got him a potential batterymate, although Harper was announced as an outfielder at the draft site at MLB Network studios by commissioner Bud Selig.

He has shown solid defensive instincts behind the plate and called pitches much of the time. Still, some believe — including the Nationals, apparently — his bat could get to the majors even faster if he moves to the out-

field.

The 6-foot-3, 205-pound Harper surpassed former big league pitcher Alex Fernandez, who went fourth overall to the Chicago White Sox in 1990, as the highest-drafted JUCO player.

He hit .443 with 31 home runs and 98 RBIs in his first college season after skipping his final two years of high school and getting his GED.

Harper is expected to seek a record con-

tract through his adviser, Scott Boras, who last year negotiated a record-breaking four-year, \$15.1 million deal with the Nationals for Strasburg.

The Nationals have until Aug. 16 to sign Harper, who has said he has plenty of options, including going back to Southern Nevada for another year if negotiations go awry.

Harper was the subject of a Sports Illustrated cover story while still in high school, and has reportedly hit balls over 550 feet. A hitter has not garnered that much national attention since possibly FSU's J.D. Drew.



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Glazer family's debt leaves team's future up in air

LONDON – The American owners of Manchester United are \$1.6 billion in debt, leaving their control of the club in doubt, the BBC reported Monday.

The BBC said its investigation found the Glazer family's debts are \$570 million greater than previously known. Malcolm Glazer and his sons own the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as well.

All the extra debt comes after the Glazers borrowed extensively against their shopping mall business in the United States. The extent of the debt could fuel a further revolt by a group of United fans who oppose the Glazers'

ownership.

The Glazers took over United in 2005 in a leveraged buyout worth \$1.4 billion.

The BBC said it saw mortgage documents showing the Glazers have borrowed \$570 million against shopping malls owned by their company Allied Corporation. That's in addition to \$1 billion in debts tied to Manchester United and \$95 million to the Buccaneers.

The Buccaneers released a statement Monday assuring Tampa Bay fans that the Glazer family is "as financially well-positioned as ever before."

"Companies they own generate revenues in excess of \$800 million each year," Buccaneers director of communications Jonathan Grella said.

The Glazers have said they have assets totaling \$2.9 billion.

"I don't think anybody can be satisfied with

how Manchester United are being run," Dave Whelan, chairman of Premier League club Wigan, told the BBC program "Panorama."

"They have got somewhere in the order of a three-quarters of a billion pounds worth of debt. That has got to be eliminated and eliminated quickly."

The research for the BBC program was carried out by Andy Green, a London financial analyst who is part of a campaign by disgruntled United fans to oust the Glazers.

Thousands of United fans attended matches at Old Trafford last season adorned in green and gold colors instead of the club's usual red. The homage to United's original 19th century colors is a protest against the Glazers.

In March, United chief executive David Gill said the club's debts were easily covered by the income.

"In an ideal world people would like to not have a mortgage on their house, but that doesn't mean they don't enjoy the benefits of living in that house and can't afford that house," he said.

The Glazers have said they will not sell the club.

"Sophisticated real estate experts know that the family's refinancing of their commercial real estate before the global meltdown has proven to be the wise move," the Buccaneers statement said.

to extend the lead to 6-0.

He then smacked his second homer in the fifth and capped his night off with a three-run dinger to right-center field in the eighth. Thompson racked up more home runs against the Owls than he had managed to hit all season before Sunday's performance – which was just two.

"(After the third one) I was just thinking 'no way,'" Thompson said. "I was just trying to put the ball in play.

The Gators put on an impressive display of power as they banged a season-high six balls over the fence against FAU (37-24).

"There are a couple stretches of games where we are swinging the bats as well as anybody in the (Southeastern Conference), and there are some other games where we are struggling," said Preston Tucker, who hit a three-run homer in the eighth. "Fortunately we were swinging the bats well this week

and we just have to continue that."

Just one of those home runs was enough for Johnson, who started for UF and threw seven scoreless innings. It was an encouraging performance from the left-hander who came into Sunday's start with a 10.23 ERA in his last four outings.

But he didn't just excel on the mound – Johnson helped himself at the plate too.

He picked up three hits, including a solo home run of his own. Johnson's success in both aspects of the game led him to be named the regional's Most Outstanding Player.

The Gators' pitching staff was tough on hitters all weekend. It gave up only five runs in 27 innings while striking out 30 batters.

"I think if you plan on advancing to the College World Series and have a chance to play on the last day of the year – you have to hit, you have to pitch and you have to play defense," O'Sullivan said.

status in the college football world. Adding Miami and FSU would make the most sense. It would keep the conference within the southern region and both squads have rivals in the conference.

These expansions would destroy the Big 12 and the ACC, so the Big East could add some of the other teams left behind in the ruins of these two former college football powers.

All of this would give us four super conferences. The consolidation of college football is the starting point to a playoff system.

It will basically have the same format as the NFL at this point.

Each conference could have its own championship game – like many do now – and the winners of those will automatically earn a berth into the playoff. That will fill up four of the spots.

Then, much like the NFL, there could be two wild-card teams – or in this case, at-large bids. This will

be for teams such as Boise State and Utah, which will unfortunately not be part of the big four. It could also be useful for a scenario where two teams from one of the super conferences deserve a berth – like last season's Alabama and Florida co-nundrum.

With the design of the system already in place, the logistics are the only things left.

The top-two squads, by ranking, would earn a bye in the first round while the remaining four battle it out for a chance to advance.

Then it would just take the form of a classic semifinal round and championship game.

All of this is still very up in the air. Conference expansion is just an idea that hasn't come to fruition yet.

But the way things are going, it looks like it is very possible.

So instead of looking at it as the demise of the sport, let's put another adage to use and see this glass as half full.

and did a great job."

On offense, Schutte stepped up and carried the load for Florida.

The freshman went 4 for 6 with three home runs and four RBIs between the two games, extending the UF freshman records to 19 and 59, respectively.

"That wasn't a freshman running around the bases out there – just a really good player," Walton said. "She's a hard worker and has really developed into a ferocious hitter."

The Gators also got another big day from junior Kelsey Bruder, who contributed a solo homer in Saturday's opener and hit .565 with five home runs and 11 RBIs over the course of the NCAA Tournament.

The primary keys to UF's early win against Missouri were timely pitching and defense, as the Tigers left eight runners on base for the game.

With two on and one out in the first, Missouri's Ashley Fleming hit a fly ball to right, where Bruder was able to make the catch and throw a tagging runner out at third.

The game was still scoreless in the third when Missouri loaded the bases only to see Brombacher strike out Fleming to end the threat.

The Tigers' final opportunity came when trailing 2-0 in the fifth. They once again put runners on first and second before Nicole Hudson popped out to Brombacher and Fleming grounded out to third to complete the frame.

"The high fly ball that Stephanie caught was probably the biggest play of the game," Walton said. "That could've been a disaster because we don't work with our pitchers on catching fly balls at all ... but she caught it like she's been doing it her whole life."

Unfortunately for the Gators they could not carry that momentum into the nightcap, as Georgia's Alisa Goler gave her team a 2-0 lead just three batters into the bottom of the first with a home run to right.

Florida battled back as Schutte homered in the fourth and pinch-runner Lauren Heil scored on a wild pitch in the fifth. But Georgia answered in the bottom of the frame with an RBI single from Brianna Hesson which gave it the 3-2 lead that would become the final.

UF vies for more championships

"Finish the Mission" has been the Gators' anthem all season. A last opportunity awaits to do just that.

After capturing a men's NCAA Indoor Championship, men's South-

eastern Conference Outdoor Championship, women's SEC Cross Country Championship and SEC Indoor Championship, the Gators track and field teams look to complete what has been a remarkable season by adding two more team championships this

week at the NCAA Outdoor Championships in Eugene, Ore.

Florida enters the final meet, which runs from Wednesday through Saturday, hot off dominating the East Preliminary Round, sending 19 Gators to compete in 21 slots.

As the defending NCAA Indoor Champion, the No. 2 men's team looks to become just the fourth team in NCAA history to win both the indoor and outdoor national titles in the same season.

If either team does complete the final quest, then it would mark the first time in program history a men or women's team has claimed a NCAA Outdoor Title.

The men qualified for 13 spots including the 4x100-meter relay team, which will be looking to win its second consecutive NCAA Championship.

Jeff Demps qualified in multiple events and returns to the track where he became the co-owner of the U.S. Junior World Record (10.01) in the 100-meter dash.

The women's team qualified for eight spots including three in the shot put. All-American Mariam Kevkhishvili, who holds the nation's top shot put toss this season, heads to Eugene looking to cap off an undefeated season and defend last year's title.

Kevkhishvili will be looking for her second consecutive NCAA Outdoor title, after already claiming the SEC Indoor title, SEC Outdoor Championship and NCAA Indoor title.

The season-long mantra of "Finish the Mission" was established after the Gators track and field teams felt that after a successful 2009 campaign, ultimately, it could have been better.

According to UF coach Mike Holloway, who was recently named the South Region Men and Women's Head Coach of the Year, his teams were inspired by the theme that the Florida football team used en route to its 2008 National Championship.

The mantra has obviously been taken to heart as the Gators look to complete one of their most prosperous years in school history.

The University of Oregon is hosting the meet at its historic Hayward Field this year.
