



UF finishes second in all-sports rankings

Stanford won for 16th year in a row

Florida is the second-ranked athletic program in the nation, according to the final standings for the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup.

The standings, which will not become official until the conclusion of baseball's College World Series this week, use a points system based on an individual sports' final rankings to determine the school with the most success in all NCAA sports.

Regardless of the outcome of the College World Series, the Gators will remain ranked No. 2.

Florida had 10 teams finish with top-five rankings this year, according to Mary Howard,

associate athletic director for communications.

Florida has 21 varsity teams, while Stanford, which won the award for the 16th consecutive year, has 31.

The standings use each university's top 10 rankings from men's sports and the top 10 rankings from women's sports.

This year, the Gators won national championships in women's swimming and diving and men's indoor track and field, as well as second-place rankings in women's tennis and men's outdoor track and field.

"Every sport at the University of Florida is trying to finish as high as possible," said Howard. "So I don't think there is going to be any extra emphasis on any specific sports."

To beat Stanford, Florida would have need-

ed the equivalent of three more national championship wins.

Last year, the Gators took the third-place spot, as Florida had six teams ranked in the top five.

The Gators are the only team in the Southeastern Conference to finish in the top 10 for the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup. Tennessee is the next highest SEC school at No. 13.

The Gators won seven SEC championships in team sports this past year, earning Florida the SEC All-Sports trophy sponsored by the New York Times Regional Newspaper Group in May.

It was Florida's 20th time in 23 years that it won the trophy.

Although Howard said she doesn't see a direct correlation between the Gators' all-sports rankings and ticket sales, she said successful sports programs brings more fans.

Campus tobacco ban starts Thursday

Smoke 'em if you've got 'em Gators, because in a couple of days, tobacco on campus will be a thing of the past.

Starting Thursday, UF will enforce a new smoke-free campus policy, designed to encourage healthy lifestyle choices among students, staff and visitors.

UF is the first public university in the state to adopt such a policy, although there are at least 394 campuses nationwide that adhere to such strict standards, according to the American Non-smokers' Rights Foundation.

The policy prohibits the use of any tobacco products, even smokeless products like snuff or electronic cigarettes.

The ban applies to all UF-owned facilities, including those outside of Alachua County. Tobacco users will also be prohibited from using products in their cars on any campus parking lot

or road. It also applies to university-recognized locations on the UF campus, such as fraternity and sorority houses.

"There won't be a direct penalty for violating, but again, the goal is not to create a situation where we're going to penalize people . . . but to encourage people to be healthier."

The policy is part of the Healthy Gators 2010 Initiative, which is dedicated to promoting a healthy campus environment, according to UF spokesman Steve Orlando.

If caught using tobacco, violators will be reminded of the policy and asked to comply. Students who refuse will be dealt with by



Fla. wins \$11.5 million food stamp bonus

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's food stamp program has been named the nation's most ac-

curate in paying benefits for the second year in a row, earning an \$11.5 million bonus from the federal government.

The Florida Department of Children and Families on Monday also announced its program has been rated the most improved in a separate category — handing benefit denials and closures.

Two years ago, Florida was most improved in payment accuracy. Florida's award is the largest ever given to a state since the U.S. Department of Agriculture started the bonus program in 2003.

Florida's program is the nation's fourth largest, providing more than \$4 billion in benefits to more than 3.5 million people last year.

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Obama seeks international cooperation in space

WASHINGTON — Saying the U.S. is no longer “racing against an adversary,” President Barack Obama called Monday for greater international cooperation in exploring space.

Obama said in a statement that the U.S. seeks peaceful collaboration with other countries that will ward off conflict and make it easier to expand exploration. The United States must do more to address debris and other hazards in space, he said, and called for a “burgeoning commercial

space industry.”

Peter Marquez, the White House director of space policy, said the administration is returning to a policy that existed before George W. Bush was president that would entertain the possibility of a treaty to limit space-based weapons. He didn't say the Obama administration would pursue such a treaty, but he wouldn't slam the door against the idea as the previous space policy had.

The language is similar to that adopted by Presidents Ronald Reagan, George H.W. Bush and Bill Clinton, Marquez said.

Russia and China in the past have made vague proposals about limiting weapons in space and the U.S. has always opposed it.

No country has deployed space weapons, but there is an issue of attacking satellites from the ground, as China did its own satellite and the U.S. did to a dying satellite in 2008, said Laura Grego, a senior scientist on global security at the Union of Concerned Scientists.

The U.S. space program began in the late 1950s as a competition with

the Soviet Union, a longtime Cold War enemy.

In his statement, Obama said America's imperatives and obligations in space have changed in recent decades.

“No longer are we racing against an adversary,” he said. “In fact, one of our central goals is to promote peaceful cooperation and collaboration in space, which not only will ward off conflict, but will help to expand our capacity to operate in orbit and beyond.”

Most of the civilian side of the space policy was already announced

by Obama in February and April, including a dramatic turn for the human space exploration. Instead of aiming for a return to the moon, the Obama space policy is more geared to Mars with a stop first at an asteroid by 2025.

Even the exploration plan has more of a tinge of international cooperation.

Officials said they are talking with the Chinese government about including them in U.S. space efforts — such as the International Space Station — but there is nothing concrete yet.

Hillel adds panels for GRU solar program

UF Hillel is turning the sun's energy into cash.

With the recent installation of more than 200 solar roof panels, the Jewish center on University Avenue is the first non-profit organization to take advantage of Gainesville Regional Utilities' feed-in-tariff program.

The program allows landowners to build solar panels on their own property and lease the panels' energy output to GRU, which buys the power from the businesses or residents at a rate of 32 cents for each kilowatt hour generated.

"It's a win-win situation for everybody," said Keith Dvorchik, UF Hillel's executive director. "We've basically become a power source, and GRU buys the energy from us."

UF Hillel applied to join in March

2009, four days after GRU offered the program, he said.

Although UF Hillel is the first non-profit organization to get on board, 36 local organizations have already installed solar panels and are using the feed-in tariff.

Although popular in Europe, the feed-in-tariff system is relatively rare in the United States.

GRU is the only feed-in-tariff provider in Florida, Dvorchik said.

UF Hillel paid nothing for the purchase or installation of the panels, he said, as an anonymous donor bought the panels.

The implementation of the feed-in program may have helped GRU win a nationwide award this week.

The American Public Power Association gave GRU an E.F. Scattergood System Achievement Award, which goes to power companies that exhibit outstanding customer service.

Alonso, a self-described "Twilight" fanatic, is donating her blood in a drive held by LifeSouth Community Blood Centers before the release of "The Twilight Saga: Eclipse" at 12:01 a.m. Wednesday.

LifeSouth decided to have a drive for the third installment in the "Twilight" series, "Eclipse," after a successful drive for the series' second film, "New Moon."

Clay Gibbons, district community development coordinator for LifeSouth, said the success of its last vampire-themed drive was huge. He hopes to duplicate the success of that drive.

In exchange for a pint of blood, donors with tickets to "Eclipse" will receive a "Team Edward" or "Team Jacob" shirt, will get to skip the line to the movie and will have reserved VIP seating to see the movie.

Gibbons said people should donate early because reserved seating is limited.

The drive will be held today from 6 p.m. to midnight in the Regal Butler Plaza Cinemas 14 parking lot, 3101 SW 35th Blvd., where the movie will premiere. Donors will be able to choose to donate from either a

Jacob bus or an Edward bus.

Edward is the film's central vampire character and Jacob is the main werewolf character.

Alonso, a 22-year-old family, youth and community sciences major at UF, said she is "Team Edward all the way," and is looking forward to her free T-shirt.

Local News She is trying to recruit people to attend the blood drive. "It's for a good cause and you get something good out of it, as well," Alonso said.

Gibbons said it's important to support this drive because 20 to 25 percent of its donor base comes from students, and when they leave for summer break, the center loses donations.

The center especially needs O-negative donors, according to its website, lifesouth.org.

Gibbons said donating blood gives people the opportunity to save or affect the lives of others in the community.

He said the center needs about 100 donors per day. He believes 60 to 80 people will attend the drive.

Alonso said she donates because she wants to be able to help others.

"As long as I can donate," she said, "I will donate to save someone else."

To donate, you have to be 16 or older, weigh at least 110 pounds and have a photo ID. Sixteen-year-olds must bring written parental consent to donate.

Sex abuse lawsuit against Vatican moves forward

A lawsuit against the Vatican that had been dismissed as a publicity stunt moved forward when the U.S. Supreme Court refused to hear an appeal from the Holy See. Monday's development represents a significant advance for what many believed to be a long-shot claim that the Vatican bears legal responsibility for molester priests.

The high court's decision not to stop the lawsuit means the clergy sex abuse case will go to trial in an Oregon district court.

"I have known for 25 years that all roads lead to Rome," said Jeff Anderson, the Minnesota attorney who represents the plaintiff. "This is the beginning for us of a new journey, a uniquely difficult odyssey."

Anderson, who has represented hundreds of abuse victims and has tried for years to sue the Vatican, said he hoped to persuade a judge that he should be allowed to depose Vatican officials.

Jeffrey Lena, the American attorney for the Holy See, argued the Vatican is not responsible for individual priests in dioceses, saying the existence of the priest in the case "was unknown to the Holy See until after all the events in question."

The original lawsuit, *John V. Doe v. Holy See*, was filed in 2002 by a Seattle-area man who said the Rev. Andrew Ronan repeatedly molested him in the late 1960s.

Anderson argues in the case that priests are Vatican employees for the purpose of American law. If the trial judge agrees, that would constitute an exception to the Foreign Sovereign Immunity Act, under which the Vatican has been immune from the jurisdiction of U.S. courts.

A lower court judge previously ruled there could be enough of a connection between the Holy See and Ronan for him to be considered a Vatican employee under Oregon law.

That ruling was upheld by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Lena had asked the federal courts to throw out the lawsuit.

"The Holy See does not pay the salary of the priest, or benefits of the priest, or exercise day-to-day control over the priest, and any of the other factors indicating the presence of an employment relationship," Lena said.

According to the lawsuit, Ronan, who belonged to a religious order, began abusing boys in the mid-1950s as a priest in the Archdiocese of Armagh, Ireland. He was transferred to Chicago, where he allegedly admitted abus-

ing three boys at St. Philip's High School.

Ronan was later moved to a parish in Portland, Ore., where he was accused of abusing the person who filed the lawsuit now under appeal. He was removed from the priesthood in 1966, according to the Archdiocese of Portland, and died in 1992.

The acting U.S. solicitor general, the U.S. State Department and the U.S. Justice Department filed a brief with the Supreme Court arguing that the case does not meet the standard for an exception to immunity.

Douglas Laycock, a religious liberty specialist at University of Michigan Law School, said the brief will be influential as the case proceeds.

"The courts give substantial weight to the State Department's views on foreign sovereign immunity issues," Laycock said.

In 2005, the administration of President George W. Bush argued the pope should have immunity from a lawsuit accusing him of conspiracy to hide abuse because the pontiff is an acting head of a foreign state. Soon after, a federal judge dismissed the case.

However, Steve Rubino, a New Jersey attorney who has represented abuse victims since the 1980s, argued that the court could react differently now that the scope of clergy sex abuse is better known. The case against the Vatican is proceeding as European churches, Vatican officials and Pope Benedict XVI are engulfed by the latest crises over clergy sex abuse.

Rubino said that when he first took up abuse cases, diocesan attorneys often won by arguing that First Amendment religious freedom protections meant that civil courts could not interfere in church business. That approach rarely works any more.

"The world has been affected by a slow realization of the depth of the scandal," Rubino said. "Judges react the same way. People are tired of this."

A separate lawsuit filed in Louisville, Ky., and still in the courts, contends the Vatican is responsible for U.S. bishops who failed to stop priests from molesting children.

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

Smoking ban encroaches on rights

There is something very unsettling in the way modern society is beginning to parallel the fictional worlds presented by writers such as Orwell, Huxley and Rand. From the disturbing similarities between contemporary texting language and Orwell's Newspeak to the health care battles that still continue to rage in Congress, it is undeniable that, at some point in the last 50 years, the line between fact and fiction began to blur.

These novelists' prophetic visions continue to frighten and enthrall us for more than just the apocalyptic drama they paint within their pages – much of what was written is indeed coming true, possibly by our own unconscious need to indulge in self-fulfilling prophecies.

It is a well-known fact that we, as a society, are extremely susceptible to the lures of mob psychology. From the xenophobic tendencies we exhibit toward the influx of immigrants to the more recent green movement that seems to have swept through not only college campuses but through the very heart of Suburbia, we are unable, when together, to exhibit anything other than the traits of the timeless adage "Monkey see, monkey do."

From the time we are children until adulthood, we want to be part of the group, to be liked, to be popular. But the question, of course, behind the innate drive to seek this popularity is: Am I doing what is right, and if so, at what cost?

On July 1, the statewide properties of UF, including its home base right here in Gainesville, will be banning the use of any and all tobacco products on campus.

In the policy made available on the university's website, "tobacco use" means the personal use of any tobacco product, whether intended to be lit or not, which shall include smoking ... as well as the use of an electronic cigarette or any other device intended to simulate smoking and the use of smokeless tobacco, including snuff; chewing tobacco; smokeless pouches; any other form of loose-leaf, smokeless tobacco; and the use of unlit cigarettes, cigars, and pipe tobacco."

In lieu of quoting statistics, as is often done with the con-

troverisal issue of smoking and the effects of secondhand smoke, it is more important to focus on the ban's sociological effects.

Ever since the statewide smoking bans in enclosed workplaces were enacted seven years ago, those Floridians who choose to smoke have been ostracized and demonized by contemporary society. Floridians should invest in education

Public education is the cornerstone of our nation's economic might. When we make a true commitment to educating a future generation, we are not only producing a workforce that is better equipped to tackle the problems of today, but we are planting the seeds for the innovation of tomorrow. If we are going to prepare our children for the future, I believe Florida must change its course and make a proper investment in public education.

Our failure to make this investment triggers the scourges of every society: poverty, crime, discrimination. It's our responsibility as a community to combat these issues and make sure that every child has the chance to succeed. We cannot do this when we put more of an emphasis on testing than teaching.

Tallahassee's obsession with standardized testing has harmed our schools in more ways than can be counted. One glaring example has been in the recent failure by Pearson Education Inc. to properly grade and code the FCAT on time. Rather than finding ways to improve our schools by putting

Perry C. McGriff Speaking Out money into the classroom, our state is investing hundreds of millions of dollars in testing – and getting a bad return.

The State of Florida pays our teachers about \$6,000 less than the national average and ranks 36th in terms of per child spending. We spend \$20,108 per year to house an inmate in a Florida prison. Compare that to the \$6,400 we spend on per student funding. These numbers reflect a disturbing trend that lead to only one outcome: we care more about locking people up than giving them an education.

We need an education policy that is not based on the principles of fear -- but instead seeks to keep the most talented educators in our state and inspires our children to be the innovators of tomorrow.

When educators are instructed to teach only what is on a test, the question needs to be asked: What is left out? This question should be in the minds of Tallahassee lawmakers before they

pass harmful legislation like Senate Bill 6, which would have only worsened the problem.

There will always be a need for proper academic guidelines and benchmarks to ensure the quality of our education system. But testing is not teaching and when we use a rigid model to determine how much we pay our teachers or how much we fund particular schools, it has gone too far.

If we want to get serious about education reform, it starts with a partnership between parents, teachers and lawmakers - not a power grab by Tallahassee bureaucrats. As a product of the public school system, I know that the best ideas in education come from the classroom.

Turning Florida's economy around begins with realizing that every dollar we spend in the classroom is an investment in a job market based on creativity and ingenuity.

All it takes is the political will to make that happen.

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Private company takes over Game-Day bus shuttle

■ BUS RIDES WILL COST MORE.

Shuttles providing transportation to and from Florida football games will have a new look this year when private bus company Fabulous Coach Lines takes over for the federally

funded Gator Aider.

The new service will be called Navigator, said Ray Land, owner of the Branford-based company.

Unlike Gator Aider's city buses, which were the same buses used by Gainesville's Regional Transit System, Land said his luxury coaches will have restrooms, flat-screen televisions, storage space and leather seats.

Single-game passes will be \$10, up from the

previous \$8. A year-long, home-game pass will be \$60, up from \$40 last year. Students with valid IDs and children shorter than the fare box will ride free.

"Our coaches will be better than what people are used to for only a small increase in price,"

he said.

Land is also planning on providing service to away games, bowl games, Gator Growl and

the SEC Championship, if the Gators qualify.

RTS buses did not provide transport to away games, and RTS Gator Growl passes were \$6 each, according to Chip Skinner, RTS marketing and communications supervisor.

Home-game transportation will have five different hubs: the Oaks Mall, the Southwest Downtown Parking Garage, the Hilton UF Conference Center, the Village Center in Haile Plantation and Tioga Town Center.

the Dean of Students Office, while staff members will answer to their immediate supervisors.

Repeat violators will face harsher consequences, although Orlando said punishment isn't the emphasis.

"There won't be a direct penalty for violating," he said, "but again, the goal is not to create a situation where we're going to penalize people . . . but to encourage people to be healthier."

Tobacco users may find the policy too strict, but it's like older policies that prohibit people from smoking indoors, Orlando said.

"It's going to be a cultural change over time," he said. "It seems strange and outrageous to some people right now, but in a few years it will seem strange to have ever smoked on campus at

all."

D.J. Halford, 22, is an employee of Shands at UF and has been smoking cigarettes for years. He said changing his habits at work will be difficult and kind of annoying, but he accepts the university's oversight.

"It's like a restaurant," he said. "I think they're allowed to say what can and can't be done on their property. It'll definitely help me cut back, although I haven't quit yet and I don't really want to."

The first phase of UF's tobacco ban began Nov. 1 at UF's Health Science Center and all Shands at UF facilities. Ben Hill Griffin Stadium went smoke-free Sept. 5 by eliminating its smoking areas.

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BP stations' sales decline in wake of Gulf oil spill

Tension is mounting between BP and the neighborhood retailers that sell its gasoline.

As more Americans shun BP gasoline as a form of protest over the Gulf oil spill, station owners are insisting BP do more to help them convince motorists that such boycotts mostly hurt independently owned businesses, not the British oil giant.

To win back customers, they'd like the company's help in reducing the price at the pump.

BP owns just a fraction of the more than 11,000 stations across the U.S. that sell its fuel under the BP, Amoco and ARCO banners. Most are owned by local businessmen whose primary connection to the oil company is the logo and a contract to buy gasoline.

In recent weeks, some station owners from Georgia to Illinois say sales have declined as much as 10 percent to 40 percent.

Station owners and BP gas distributors told BP officials last week they need a break on the cost of the gas they buy, and they want help paying for more advertising aimed at motorists, according to John Kleine, executive director of the independent BP Amoco Marketers Association. The station owners, who earn more from sales of soda and snacks than on gasoline, also want more frequent meetings with BP officials.

"They have got to be more competitive on their fuel costs to the retailers so we can be competitive on the street ... and bring back customers that we've lost," says Bob Juckniess, who has seen sales drop 20 percent at some of his 10 BP-branded stations in the Chicago area.

Owners and distributors put

forth their demands at a meeting in Chicago with BP marketing officials. BP's reply could come as early as this week, says Kleine, whose group represents hundreds of distributors.

Station owners are locked into contracts that can last seven to 10 years in some cases. So, switching to a competing brand if BP refuses to help may not be an option.

BP spokesman Scott Dean declined to offer specifics about the discussions when contacted by The Associated Press.

"BP is in daily contact with its independent distributors and franchisees and helping them manage the impacts the oil spill is having on their businesses," he said.

Gasoline retailing trade groups say the boycott's impact isn't only evident in southern states such as Florida, Georgia and Tennessee, but also in places further from the

spill like southern Pennsylvania. Jim Smith, president and CEO of the Florida Petroleum Marketers & Convenience Store Association, said BP has given some station owners a one-cent-per-gallon discount, which "doesn't amount to much." Kleine told AP the discount appears limited to Florida. He declined to give the size of the discount that was requested at the Chicago meeting.

Websites and Facebook pages advocating a BP boycott popped up soon after oil started spewing into the Gulf in late April. Drivers only heeded the call when the spill's full impact became apparent.

Paola Soldevilla, manager of a BP station in Pembroke Pines, said it was only when images of oil-soaked birds appeared in newspapers that sales fell off. So sharply, in fact, that she won't be getting her usual one-week paid vacation.

Kevin Dalton can empathize. He owned a Citgo station when President Hugo Chavez made anti-American statements in 2006, leading to a boycott of the Venezuelan-owned gas company. Sales of gas and in-store items dropped more than 50 percent. Sales at his Shell station in Palm Beach Gardens have increased 15 percent since the spill started in late April, but he says it's hard to directly tie that to a BP station less than a mile away.

Last week, Vincent Connolly's GPS guided him to a BP station off Interstate 480 in Cleveland. But he had second thoughts after filling up for \$2.75 a gallon.

"You don't want to support anyone that's killing the environment," he said.

That connection to the destruction on the Gulf Coast concerns Juckniess, the Chicago station owner. He's been running his own

promos — free coffee and \$2 off a car wash — but he wants BP to step up support of both the stations and the BP brand.

"We're their branded marketers," he says. "It would be foolish for BP to not support its branded marketers when clearly we can document that some of the loss that we've experienced is due to the incidents in the Gulf."

The biggest hit comes not from lost gas sales but from lost convenience store business. Owners like Juckniess make just pennies on a gallon of gas. But they might make up to 55 cents on a \$1 cup of coffee. The margins on candy and chips are about 48 percent and 37 percent, respectively, Jeff Lenard of the National Association of Convenience Stores.

The boycott's impact on BP is limited. The company makes most of its money exploring and producing oil in places such as Angola, Egypt, the North Sea and the Gulf of Mexico.

"The corner store is the face of BP, but by no means how BP gets its money," Lenard said.

And even if drivers opt to fill up at an Exxon or 7-Eleven, they still may buy BP gasoline. Because of the way gas is refined and marketed, BP fuel gets supplied to stations other than those with BP brands.

The boycott's impact is felt less in rural areas, where people know the owners personally. And it helps to sell other necessities.

Dacia Radabaugh, who manages a BP station owned by her parents in Williamstown, W.Va., thinks the station is as popular as ever because it sells liquor and cigarettes to a regular crowd.

And of course some drivers are just more pragmatic.

"Gas is gas, buddy," said Danny Sullivan, making no apologies for filling up at a Little General BP station in Charleston, W.Va. "It don't matter where it comes from."

Young Gators gain experience from early CWS exit

The Gators' trip to the College World Series may have been short, but they didn't let it go to waste.

After two consecutive poor performances that led to a pair of losses against UCLA and FSU, Florida was eliminated before it could even enjoy Omaha, Neb.

But it won't be long until it is back in the CWS.

"I think we are all foolish if we don't pull something away from this and don't try to improve and make ourselves better for next year," coach Kevin O'Sullivan said. "I can tell you we are looking forward to breaking in the new (CWS stadium) next year."

The Gators are expected to lose just one position player next season, senior center fielder Matt den Dekker, from a lineup that won the Southeastern Conference regular season title. The New York Mets drafted den Dekker in the fifth round of the 2010 MLB Draft.



"I think we had a great experience (in Omaha)," rising junior Preston Tucker said. "It was new to everybody on the team, so I think if we get back here next year we will be a little more confident."

The corner outfield positions proved to be the two holes in the lineup this year. Daniel Pigott, Jonathan Pigott, Tyler Thompson and Kamm Washington combined to hit just 11 homers while picking up 69 RBIs in 456 at-bats this season.

In order to increase the team's production from those two spots, O'Sullivan may plug Tucker into right field next year, while Austin Maddox takes over at first base.

O'Sullivan gave Tucker seven starts in right field this season and it was evident the first baseman needed some work before becoming

an everyday outfielder. In the SEC Tournament on May 27 he misplayed two balls and committed one error in right field.

"(Tucker is) a good outfielder," O'Sullivan said after that contest. "We have a lot of confidence with him playing in right field."

UF won't be losing much on the pitching side either.

The weekend rotation of Alex Panteliodis, Hudson Randall and Brian Johnson will be back. However, the Gators will have to find a replacement for All-SEC closer Kevin Chapman, who was drafted in the fourth round by the Kansas City Royals.

But O'Sullivan is already preparing to fill those voids. After bringing in the No. 1 recruiting class in the nation last year, he is luring in another premier wave of talent.

According to Gators pitching recruit Johnny Barbato, hurlers Jonathon Crawford (42nd round of MLB Draft) and Daniel Gibson (26th round), and third baseman Zack Powers (28th round), are all enrolled in summer classes at UF and have decided to pass on the MLB to play college baseball.

Barbato, who was picked in the sixth round by the San Diego Padres, is also enrolled in classes, but has not made a decision yet.

"My decision is depending on how much money I am offered, and if I don't get what I want then I'm not going to sign (with the Padres)," he said.

The right-hander could end up being the prize recruit of this year's class if he stays in Gainesville because Barbato expects pitcher Karsten Whitson (ninth pick overall) to sign his MLB contract.

"In three years I think I can be a top talent in the country with O'Sullivan's help" Barbato said. "So to me it's either give me the money now or later, but as of now I am definitely leaning toward Florida."

Lack of depth at guard positions still an issue for UF

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Backcourt depth could prove to be a problem for the Gators again next season.

Last year, point guard Erving Walker and shooting guard Kenny Boynton were each forced to play a team-high 33 minutes per game because of the lack of options at those positions. They might have to do the same this season, too.

"We still have a little bit of depth issues back there," coach Billy Donovan said.

In the offseason Florida added

These two players will be the pri-

mary backups in the backcourt after Ray Shipman decided to transfer to UCF in order to play football. With Wilbekin's decision to join the Gators one year early, next season will likely be a developmental one for him. While the 6-foot-5-inch Prather, who didn't play much as a guard in high school, will probably only see time at shooting guard and small forward.

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This could force Walker and Boynton to carry the load once again.

Walker seemed to tire out as Southeastern Conference play went on last season. In the first eight SEC games, the 5-foot-8-inch point guard averaged 17.8 points and shot at a 46 percent clip.

Craddock, a freshman who won All-America honors in the triple jump this past season at Florida, jumped a personal-record leap of 16.56 meters to claim a USA junior championship and qualify for the World Junior Championships.

In all, six current UF athletes participated this weekend at the USA Track and Field Championships and USA Track and Field Junior Championships hosted by

as he put up just 11.4 points per game on 27 percent shooting in

the final 12 contests of the season.

“(Walker and Boynton) probably got caught this past year

playing way too many minutes,” Donovan said. “We probably would have liked to have pressed a little bit more and maybe have

done some more things defensively, but it was really difficult because we did rely on both of those guys to score.”

After playing at the shooting guard position as a freshman, Walker was forced to switch to the point guard spot last year after Nick Calathes decided to forgo his final two seasons at UF.

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UF athletic program successful despite postseason struggles

You hear that noise? It's the sound of the dead period for Gators sports. The period between the end of summer sports and the start of fall ones.

When Florida State ousted third-seeded Florida from the College World Series on June 21, it marked the end of the 2009-10 athletic year for the University of Florida.

The loss also signaled another unsatisfying finish to an otherwise great season for a Gators team this year.

I'm sure you've heard the old idiom: always a bridesmaid, never a bride.

I've always thought it was an interesting one. I've also found it to be an adequate way to describe, for the most part, UF athletics in the past year.

With the women's swimming and diving title and the men's track and field team's indoor championship aside, it's been a close, but no cigar year for UF athletics.

The school's 17 teams combined for 14 top-10 finishes nationally – and one team, men's golf, finished 11th – but only two were able to close out memorable seasons with the lifting of a national championship trophy.

Of those 14 top-10 finishes, the most notable was the football team, which came into

the season as the defending BCS champions and spent most of the year atop the polls. That is, until the team was demolished by Alabama in the Southeastern Conference Championship Game and denied a chance to defend its national title in Pasadena, Calif.

Instead, fans were left with a trip to the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans and many were left saying sugar never tasted so bittersweet because the Gators weren't able to "Finish the Mission."

Less than a month before the football team's title hopes were crushed, the then-fifth ranked women's cross country team had its aspirations dashed (no pun intended) and it finished seventh at the NCAA Championships on the campus of Indiana State.

The women's volleyball and soccer teams met similar fates when both suffered early-round exits in the NCAA Tournament.

The women's gymnastics team won the SEC title and hosted the NCAA Championships in April and had a great chance to take home the program's first NCAA title. Even former Georgia coach Suzanne Yoculan, who won 10 titles in Athens, Ga., said she would put her money on the Gators to win it all – that is, if she were a gambling woman. But

the team finished fifth at the Super Six after gaffes in the lineup of each event.

While the women's swimming and diving team took home a championship, the men's track team, which finished fourth at the indoor championships while the men took home the title – and both finished in the top three at the outdoor championships.

Then there was UF's softball team, which entered the Women's College World Series as the fourth overall seed but was shellacked by UCLA 16-3 in the first game and then eliminated by SEC rival Georgia in Oklahoma City, leaving the WCWS empty-handed for a third straight time.

And of course, most recently, there was the disappointing CWS exit from the No. 3 overall seeded baseball team in Omaha, Neb., when the team faltered after playing some of its best baseball of the season in regionals and super regionals.

But there's something to be said for UF's teams "always being bridesmaids" this year.

Some may view the early postseason exits as underachieving on behalf of the teams, but in reality, people should take a step back and look at the larger picture for UF athletics.

To have so many teams vying for national titles means athletic director Jeremy Foley has built one of the nation's best athletic programs in his 18 years at the helm, and it shows. Florida finished second to Stanford – which won for the 16th year in a row – in the 2009-10 Learfield Sports Directors' Cup, which is given annually to the best collegiate athletic program.

The finish was Florida's best since a tie for second in 1997-98, and the school's 17th top-seven finish in the award's 17-year history.

Maybe next year more of the school's teams will live up to their potential and we will all see more brides and fewer bridesmaids. One thing is for sure, though: students and fans alike shouldn't take these bridesmaids and the sustained success that Foley has brought to UF athletics during his tenure as AD for granted.

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Doctors: Henry had brain damage before accident

NEW YORK – Cincinnati Bengals receiver Chris Henry suffered from a chronic brain injury that may have influenced his mental state and behavior before he died last winter, West Virginia University researchers said Monday.

The doctors had done a microscopic tissue analysis of Henry's brain that showed he suffered from chronic traumatic encephalopathy.

Neurosurgeon Julian Bailes and California medical examiner Bennet Omalu, co-directors of the Brain Injury Research Institute at WVU, announced their findings alongside Henry's mother, Carolyn Henry Glaspy, who called it a "big shock" because she knew nothing about her 26-year-old son's underlying condition.

Henry died in December, a day after he came out of the back of a pickup truck his fiancée was driving near their home in Charlotte, N.C. It's unclear whether Henry jumped or fell. Toxicology tests found no alcohol in his system, and an autopsy concluded he died of numerous head injuries, including a fractured skull and brain hemorrhaging.

But Bailes, team doctor for the Mountaineers and a former Pittsburgh Steelers physician, said it's easy to distinguish those acute traumatic injuries from the underlying condition he and Omalu found when staining tiny slices of Henry's brain.

Bailes and fellow researchers be-

lieve chronic traumatic encephalopathy, or CTE, is caused by multiple head impacts, regardless of whether

those blows result in a concussion diagnosis. A number of studies, including one commissioned by the

NFL, have found that retired professional football players may have a higher rate than normal of Alzheim-

er's disease and other memory problems.

What's interesting, Bailes said, is that Henry was only 26, and neither NFL nor WVU records show he was diagnosed with a concussion during his playing career.

But it doesn't take a collision with another player for brain trauma to occur.

"The brain floats freely in your skull," Omalu said. "If you're moving very quickly and suddenly stop, the brain bounces."

And over time, with repetition, that causes big problems.

CTE carries specific neurobehavioral symptoms, Bailes said – typically, failure at personal and business relationships, use of drugs and alcohol, depression and suicide.

"Chris Henry did not have that entire spectrum and we don't know if there's a cause and effect here," Bailes said.

Glaspy gave Bailes permission to examine her son's brain in detail.

"I was a little scared," she said. "It was something new to me. I'm still trying to educate myself as to what it means. Some of it makes sense with some of the behavioral patterns in Chris – just like mood swings and the headaches."

"Hopefully I can share whatever they share with me with other parents and help the NFL deal with the matter of being hit in the head and concussions and to educate ourselves as mothers and fathers when we send our kids out there on the field."

Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa.

Craddock struggled at the start, scratching on his first two attempts, but his third jump became the third-best leap in school history.

"I sat down and really thought about it," Craddock said of his last jump. "I tried to visualize my

whole set: my run-through, my jump off the board, everything. I pretty much just had to think about it and go get it."

It meant even more to him to win a junior championship because he had been unable to compete in the junior championships during his last three years of high school due to injuries and a near-death experience.

"This is like the Olympics for

me," he said.

Competing in the USA Track and Field Championships, fellow UF jumper Christian Taylor also had a good weekend. The NCAA Outdoor and Indoor men's triple jump champion placed second in the

triple jump and 12th in the long jump.

All-American sprinter Calvin Smith placed sixth overall in the men's 400-meter dash final, recording a time of 45.27. Fellow senior sprinter R.J. Anderson also competed in the 400-meter dash, but he did not advance out of the qualifying heats.

Florida had two of its women's athletes also compete this past

weekend.

Freshman sprinter Lanie Whitaker ran in the junior women's 400-meter dash, but she placed 20th in the first round with a time of 55.79 and did not advance.

Ugonna Ndu, a freshman hurdler, also competed in the junior championships placing fourth overall in the 400-meter hurdles. Her time of 59.94 qualified her for the World Junior Championships.

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
