



Band Hall made possible by Steinbrenner

Yankees owner contributed to academics, athletics

George Steinbrenner was known in the sports world for his deep pockets.

The famed baseball owner, who died of a heart attack at age 80 on Tuesday, brought his New York Yankees to seven World Series titles and 11 World Series appearances.

While he was known nationwide for generous spending on his baseball team, Steinbrenner was also a generous donor to UF.

The Steinbrenner Band Hall, which houses rehearsal facilities for all UF bands and office space for staff members, was dedicated in November 2008.

"When [students] come in the doors, there's a sense of reverence—it's that nice," said Director of Bands David Waybright. "I don't think there's a better rehearsal facility in the country."

It all started in 2002 when Steinbrenner walked up to then-UF President Charles Young at a Gators football game and said, "I wanna do something nice for the band."

The facility has a 5,600-square-foot room for band practices, which is enough room for the 350-person Pride of the Sunshine marching band to do indoor rehearsals, Waybright said.

"The facility really kind of enhances the reputation of the university in all things music, and certainly in all things band,"

Waybright said.

Steinbrenner also did similar things for Ohio State University's band program because his wife, Joan, was an alumna.

"He was a huge band guy when he was in college. That was a passion of his," said Paul Robell, assistant to UF President Bernie Machen.

But Steinbrenner Band Hall was not the sports icon's only contribution to the university.

Steinbrenner also had a passion for horses.

He owned a horse farm in Ocala called the Kinsman Stud Farm.

His love of horses led him to donate to UF's College of Veterinary Medicine.

A large donation was given toward completion of an animal hospital in 1989.

He also donated \$400,000 toward a horse medical imaging machine for the college in 2005.

Of course, Steinbrenner also gave generously to UF's athletics programs.

According to Robell, Steinbrenner was a Gators fan.

The osprey-infested lights that illuminate McKethan Stadium, the university's

Plaques pay tribute to Gators' contributions

■ THE COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUES ARE PAID FOR BY THE UF FOUNDATION AND COST ABOUT \$3,000 EACH.

Twenty-nine names have been etched into UF's landscape – literally.

The names are found in front of 27 of the 44 named buildings at UF on bronze plaques set atop concrete pedestals. The displays, funded by the UF Foundation, honor men and women who significantly contributed to the university.

Some were presidents, some deans, at least two soldiers, about half a dozen agriculturalists and some were just rich enough to donate money to the university. Only one is still alive – 81-year-old former UF President Marshall Criser Jr., who still lives in Gainesville.

Two buildings, Griffin-Floyd Hall and Keene-Flint Hall, honor two people each with their plaques.

Raymer F. Maguire Jr. created the commemorative plaque endowment program in 1988. The original donation by Maguire, who graduated from UF's law school in 1948 and died in 2003, was invested, and the money earned from the investment is used each year to support the program.

Currently, constructing the black plaques and concrete pedestals costs about \$3,000 each, said UF Foundation spokesman Chris Brazda. He did not know how much the older plaques cost.

The program is ongoing, and 17 more buildings need plaques and pedestals, Brazda said.

The four most recently installed plaques were finished three weeks ago at the Marston Science Library, Norman Hall, Weimer Hall and Williamson Hall, according to Mike Barsaleau, facilities manager for the

SHCC to take insurance

Senators were all about the money during Tuesday night's meeting.

Kaitlyn Rogers, an intern with the Student Health Care Center, gave a presentation about the benefits of allowing students to use private health insurance at the SHCC, which will be accepted beginning in the fall.

She told the Senate that students have asked SHCC administrators to accept their private insurance for years.

Currently, the center only accepts UF insurance or cash.

"We're kind of piggy-backing off of how [other Florida universities have] done it," Rogers said.

Because the center will now accept private insurance, students will no longer have to persuade their personal – or parents' – insurance companies to reimburse them because the companies will be billed directly, Rogers said.

Students who wish to keep their affairs private will still have the opportunity to pay out-of-pocket. The univer-

sity insurance plan will still be available for students to purchase, she said. Rogers said she hopes this new policy will prevent students from having to go off campus for health care.

"We do think it's such a positive thing, and we really want them to use the resources here at UF that are provided for them," she said.

Senators also allocated more than \$1,400 to student organizations, including the Outreach Ambassadors Program, Quidditch at UF and Gator Freethought. The money was approved to pay for the organizations' equipment, supplies and advertising.

Lastly, senators voted unanimously to move the spring 2012 SG elections from Feb. 28 to 29 to Feb. 21 to 22, due to a conflict with Spring Break.



Federal passport fees increase to cover security costs

Federal passport fees went up Tuesday.

Previously, applicants older than 16 had to pay a \$100 fee, which has been raised to \$110. There's been an added processing fee of \$25. Renewals are also up from \$75 to \$110.

Passport fees go toward their own produc-

tion but also help cover costs for emergency services for overseas citizens, according to the U.S. Department of State's website.

Part of the fee hike is supposed to help cover new advancements in passport-protection technology. U.S. officials hope the passports' new security measures, such as integrated computer chips containing individuals' biometric data, will keep travelers safer while abroad.

"Investing in new technology to prevent passport fraud is one of our key priorities, and an ongoing initiative," the website stated.

National News The fee will help expand passport infrastructure and service. The last five years saw a general increase in passport demand, peaking at 18.4 million in 2007.

"To increase our presence in underserved areas, the Department has undertaken a sys-

tematic expansion of the passport network," the website stated.

Gregory Webster, an assistant professor of psychology at UF, said he travels internationally at least twice a year. He renewed his passport last in 2007 and was surprised to hear about the fee increases, but not too worried.

"I'm a professor," he said. "So an extra \$35 is pretty easy. If I were a student, I could see how that would make it harder to travel."

Senators want action against underage-drinking ordinance

Come November, UF's Student Government may challenge the drinking ordinance currently

affecting 101 Cantina and The Swamp Restaurant.

Seven senators representing both the Student Alliance party and the Unite Party met in the Reitz Union on Tuesday evening to discuss taking action against the ordinance.

Most of the discussion was done by Senate Minority Leader Jon Ossip, who stressed the need for action as opposed to simply passing a non-binding resolution.

The senators agreed to try to repeal the ordinance via ballot petition in the November city elec-

tions.

Ossip said he is confident they can obtain the necessary signatures to get the measure on the ballot.

"In terms of Student Government, we've collected thousands of petitions for the Student Gov-

ernment ballots," he said. "There were over 5,700 signatures collected toward online voting. If you can get 5,700 signatures for something that only affects SG, I think we can get far more signatures for something that affects the entire Student Body."

UF Foundation.

The foundation works on plaques for the oldest buildings first, according to Cindy Belknap, the foundation's director of stewardship and donor relations.

"The beauty of the endowment is the endowment lasts forever," she said. "One hundred years from now, we'll still have that endowment, so the Emerson Alumni Hall will be a historic building by then."

The foundation's biographical researcher, Cynthia DeMates, is tasked with finding family members and finding facts about the people receiving plaques.

After that, Phoebe North, who received her master's of fine arts in poetry from UF, writes the biographies for the plaques.

The biographies need to fit on the 23-inch-by-30-inch plaques, and before the text is set, North and DeMates fact-check and proofread the less-than-300-word biography.

Each biography is checked about four

times.

No plaques have needed to be corrected so far, Brazda said.

Some plaques are harder to write biographies for than others.

"One of the more recent ones we put up, we really could not find out anyone living to be able to ask them information, so we just had to depend on our researchers and archives," Belknap said.

The foundation usually gets family approval before writing the biography in stone.

On Campus "Families love to participate," she said

From start to finish, about a dozen hours are spent on each plaque's biography.

In the fall, the foundation will decide on the next set of plaques to work on, Barsaleau said.

After the foundation's decision, the plans will be submitted to the Preservation of Historic Buildings and Sites Committee, who will decide on the best locations for the pedestals and plaques.

Church seeks donations to open Christian night club

■ THE CLUB MAY JOIN THE DOWNTOWN AREA.

The Rev. William Russell thinks downtown Gainesville could use a little less alcohol and a little more Jesus.

Bothered by what he calls "total immorality" throughout the Gainesville bar scene, Russell has started collecting donations for a \$1.3 million, Christian-based night-

club in the downtown area.

"It has always been block-to-block alcoholic-serving bars," Russell said. "We want to give an alternative to UF students and everyone else who frequents the downtown area."

Club Glory, which Russell has tentatively named the facility, will be open to all who want to socialize and party alcohol-free. Teenagers, adults, college students, seniors and church groups are all welcome.

Russell said he hasn't chosen a spot for the club, but he is wants to renovate a club that has been closed

down for some time.

The club will have a dance room, indoor restaurants and rooms that serve multiple purposes. Aside from being a nightclub, the facility will also offer counseling, financial and addiction services, HIV testing and crisis intervention, according to Russell.

He also plans to offer services that help people with depression or those who are unemployed due to injury.

Russell said he has received over-

whelming support from not just his own congregation, but from churches and businesses around the state.

In just over one month, The Trinity Church of Gainesville has raised about \$100,000 for the project.

He said he plans to hold fundraisers and raise all the necessary funds within a year.

"It can't be anything but a win-win for the city of Gainesville," Russell said. "We might even take the burden off some other places."

There are also plans to open a food bank and clothing drop at the facility, according to Douglas Gun-

tor, a member of the United Church of Gainesville.

The Rev. Wilbert Brozoski, a minister from Jacksonville who is contributing 25 percent of his income to the club, sees it as an opportunity for everyone to stay out of trouble and become closer to God.

Alana Hardeman, who is a member of Campus Crusaders for Christ, supports the club.

"I think the whole idea is great," she said. "It's a safe place for people to go who don't necessarily want to drink and want to have a fun time without that."

UF eases Haiti ban for faculty, grad students

It has been more than five months since the administration banned UF-related travel to Haiti for students and faculty, but it looks like the university is starting to loosen up a bit. It's about time.

While the revised policy continues to ban official travel to Haiti — namely anything that uses university funds or resources — for undergraduates, faculty members are now permitted to travel to the island as long as they fill out travel forms. Graduate students may travel if they meet several requirements and apply for a waiver. Good news for Gators wanting to do research in Haiti.

Since the ban went into effect on Feb. 5, UF has made more than a couple bone-headed decisions and seemed unwilling to make exceptions for anyone — the administration told a pair of grad students they couldn't use footage from Haiti in their thesis before backing down after threats of legal action.

Catholics drink, so they won't be banging down the door to get in. That just leaves Protestants, many sects of which refuse to be in the same room together.



Man hopes to save lives with DUI story

Matthew Maher, a 26-year-old former professional soccer player and Temple University graduate, is now in prison for the next five and a half years for killing an innocent man while driving drunk on March 7, 2009.

Before he began his prison sentence,

Matthew spoke to more than 7,000 students at 36 schools. His presentation, titled "I'm That Guy," was developed by the New Jersey Traffic and Safety Alliance.

Prior to March 7, 2009, Matt was "that guy." He was active in his community, excelled in academics and sports and came from a great family. In fact, his father was even the police chief at one time and now serves as the undersheriff.

Now he's "that guy," a drunk driver who killed an innocent person. The responses to his presentation have been overwhelming. Matthew journals daily in prison and mails his entries home to be posted on his website, themattmaherstory.com, by his family.


The victim's family, supportive of our efforts to spread this story, began contributing their own blog entries to the site. Rarely

do offenders and their victims' families join together to offer a glimpse into their new realities.

We're sharing Matt's compelling "I'm That Guy" story to prevent future tragedies like the one that occurred on March 7, 2009. His blog offers startling insights into prison life, the design and implementation of parole-incentive programs and the general attitude and approach that most prisoners adopt while incarcerated.

Matt is determined to be "in jail with a purpose." He has dedicated his life to honoring the life of his victim, Hort Kap, by using his platform to reach others and spread awareness about the dangers of driving under the influence.

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GRU announces rate changes for water, gas, electric

■ THE AVERAGE RESIDENT WILL SEE A \$4.21 BILL INCREASE.

Starting Oct. 1, the cost of water, wastewater and gas for residents served by Gainesville Regional Utilities will rise after the Gainesville City Commission and Mayor Craig Lowe approved the GRU-proposed

rate increases at a meeting Tuesday. GRU's plan also included a decrease of the monthly electricity charges to citizens. With these rate changes, the average resident will see a \$4.21 increase on their monthly bill, said Diane Wilson, managing utility analyst at GRU.

An average resident consumes 813 kilowatt hours of electricity, 6,000 gallons of water, 5,000 gallons of wastewater and 25 therms of gas per month.

In the past two years, GRU has noticed

a continuous decrease of water usage by its customers. The cost increases are meant to compensate for the pressure on sales it has experienced.

In outlining the rise in the cost of water, GRU divided usage into three tiers. Rates for customers who use up to 9,000 gallons of water a month will rise about 24 percent.

Customers who use between 10,000 and 24,000 gallons will have a 3 percent rate in-

crease. The third tier, for any usage above 24,000 gallons, will not have any cost changes.

During the meeting, commissioners were concerned the majority of customers fall under the first tier category, which is to have the largest rate increase.

"My heart just goes out to the first tier because I know a good segment of our citizens who cannot, at this time, afford this increase right now," Gainesville city commissioner Scherwin Henry said.

baseball field, were donated by him in 1977.

He also was a member of the Bull Gator program, a club for the athletic department's top donors.

"We are deeply saddened to hear the news of George Steinbrenner's death," said John James, executive director of Gator Boosters, in a statement. "He was a wonderful friend to the University of Florida, supporting both athletics and academics."

Steinbrenner became interested in UF because the school was the major research university in the state and he enjoyed the athletics at the school, Robbell said.

Steinbrenner does have family ties to the university, though.

His son Hal, who now is the co-owner of the New York Yankees along with his brother Hank, received his MBA from UF in 1994.

Saint Somewhere: brewed with pride, bottled with passion

Bob Sylvester's workplace feels a little bit more like a garage project than a brewery. Despite its storage-unit looks, Tarpon Springs-based Saint Somewhere Brewery has developed a reputation throughout the 20 states to which it is distributed as a brewer of high-quality, Belgian-style beer.

For the most part, Saint Somewhere is a one-man operation. On bottling day, however, Sylvester puts out an email asking his devoted fan base - myself included - for a few hours of their time to help bottle his beer.

Fourteen of us answered the call for help last week to put the latest batch of Pays du Soleil, a lightly spiced saison, in bottles ready for distribution.

A few volunteers had experience working with Saint Somewhere, but most of us were rookie brewery employees, ages ranging from student to retiree.

Things started slow, but in no time we were flying. Bottles came out of the box, then were sanitized and rinsed using two separate pump cleaners. One veteran volunteer ran the four-spigot bottling system, filling and replacing bottles as soon as they were full, then passing them over to the corking station.

Using two well-worn bench corks, complete with oven-mitt pads on the handles to prevent blisters, we stuffed corks into the bottles, which then made their way to the caging area.

Cages were set over the corks (think champagne bottles) and then cinched down with an electric drill or by hand with

a hook bolt. Four turns of the cage wire and the bottles were ready to box and stack on a palette.

Without any mechanical slowdowns, it only takes one minute and 15 seconds for a bottle to go from box to box, and we averaged twelve bottles per minute. Not bad for a bunch of greenhorns.

Sylvester himself has only been homebrewing for a little over 10 years - the brewery is approaching its third birthday - but he quickly found a passion for brewing the beers of Belgium. "Belgians are a little more adventurous," Sylvester said. "I'm not a big fan of recipes."

Most Saint Somewhere beers are based on the saison, a style originating in the farmhouses of Wallonia, the French-speaking region of Belgium. Saisons feature wild, natural flavors and are brewed in high temperatures, which is good news for brewing in Florida.

Sylvester uses open fermentation, allowing wild yeasts in the air into the beer, enhancing flavor and making for a more unique product.

"You can see it right there," Sylvester said, pointing to the lid of his fermentation vat, held slightly ajar with a small block. "Keeping the tank open allows a little more wildness, a little more originality."

Our palette of empty bottles quickly dwindled down to the wood, and as sweat began to soak through our shirts, conversations quickly sprang up.

What you've been drinking, what you've been brewing, what breweries you've visited - common ground was not hard

to find. We were all there for the beer.

After getting paid (pizza and a six pack of freshly bottled beer to take home), everyone left with a smile on their faces.

It's the passion for good beer that links us all together - brewers, distributors and drinkers alike. Saint Somewhere is available at Dorn's Liquors, 352-378-0229.

Roller Rebels recruiting session promotes camaraderie

By day, Adrienne Filardo, 22, works as a grant assistant in the UF Department of Neurosurgery. On a typical day of work, she wears a cardigan, skirt and pantyhose – looking “as June Cleaver as possible,” she said. But three

nights a week, donning fishnet stockings, short shorts and a thick layer of purple eye shadow, she is Rage-rienne, the roller derby girl, acting as a blocker for her team, the Gainesville Roller Rebels.

Roller derby is an all-women’s sport in which two five-girl teams skate around an oval track.

Four members from each team, the blockers, guard against the opposing team’s spring skater, the jammer, to keep her from lapping them. Each team scores one point for each time the jammer laps the opposing team, according to the team’s website, www.gainesvillerollerrebels.com. A roller derby match is known as a bout.

Rage-rienne, the team’s sponsorship and media relations manager, was one of the Rebels at Skate Station Funworks, 1311 NW 76th Blvd., who—despite their appearance as a group of punk-rock Sonic waitresses, some with tattoos showing through their stockings and sleeveless black T-shirts were flashing encouraging smiles at a group of new recruits.

She said most of the team, ages 18 to 49, hold day jobs as homemakers, teachers and UF staff members.

The Rebels went around the room introducing themselves to the recruits by their derby names: Stocky Balboa, Sara Leethal, Dr. PopHer, Suzie Bonebreaker and Zelda Shagnasty (No. 69).

Guided by members of the team, the derby girls-to-be looked over their waiver forms, which included guides on what protective gear to buy, how to eat before a bout and the rules of the game.

One recruit, Marta Puyana, a 39-year-old local high school teacher, said she was surprised at how detailed the form was. She said she decided to check out the team when she found out the derby was an all-women’s sport that emphasized camaraderie. She would not name the high school where she teaches.

“It’s like a whole other family,” said Sarah Purcell, 29, a veterinary technician in exotic and wildlife medicine at UF, known on the track

for two years as Sara Leethal (she said she wears scrubs by day and hot pants by night).

“It’s a lot of powerful women,” she said.

Filardo said the friends she made through roller derby played a large part in her decision to join the team. “In derby with your teammates, there’s no such thing as TMI,” she said. “We play together, get hit together, win and lose together.”

After reading over the form, the recruits suited up and skated out to the rink for their first night of what the league calls “fresh meat training,” a three-month training period where new skaters learn the techniques and rules of the sport, then take an exam on their new skills before they can compete in their first bout.

After fresh meat training, the girls are allowed to choose their derby names and numbers.

Another recruit, Lauren Ashley, 22, said she has been to two or three recruitment nights. She has not turned in a waiver to start training. She said her feet, thighs and hips were aching after a just a few minutes on the rink.

For now, she said, skating in an hour-long bout is a far-off goal.

“I’m just trying to stay up,” she said. “All of us haven’t skated since we were like 10.”

Filardo said because of the demanding nature of the sport and the 20 hours of training a week, eight out of every 15 to 30 recruits stick with it.

“A lot of people just aren’t prepared for how much time it’s going to take and how much it’s going to hurt,” she said, after mentioning a grapefruit-sized bruise on her thigh from a recent practice.

Purcell said the hardest part for new skaters is their first fall on the track.

Kicking off in Colombia and now making it all the way to Gainesville, Zumba is sweeping the nation off its feet (literally) one dance class at a time.

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
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Garden dedication focuses on community improvement

Under the coordination of the Florida Organic Growers and Abundant Edible Landscapes,



"In this day and age it's so much easier to hear music than even four, five years ago," Aoki said. "The Internet brings you music immediately and you get that immediate feedback."

Aoki said getting up on the decks was a direct result of working with these artists.

He said he would throw label parties and lots of the band members and various DJs would be up there,

and he just felt like it was his turn.

"Since it's my party, I started DJ-ing," he said. "I was really promoting and just progressed and excelled." Aoki said his love and passion for the art of the craft developed alongside his talent.

"You do drugs long enough and you get addicted," he said. "It's the same with DJ-ing."

Aoki's first DJ-mix record, Pillowface and His Airplane Chronicles, hit shelves in January 2008, and he recorded a BBC Essential Mix that same year in August.

Stand-up comedian Chayce Fourwinds, also known as "Lady Chayce," went on, not only for his act, but also to show people that after years of being a performer he does not plan on slowing down.



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
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No. 7 UF: Brantley looks to fill void left by Tebow

■ UF LOST NINE TO DRAFT.

We continue our countdown of the top 10 teams headed into the 2010 season with the No. 7 team in the alligatorSports' preseason poll: the Florida Gators.

The Gators are coming off a season in which they went 13-1, ending with a 51-24 victory over Cincinnati in the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans.

Despite its second consecutive 13-win season, and second consecutive BCS bowl victory, many viewed last season as a relative disappointment because Florida failed to win the Southeastern Conference title and earn a trip to Pasadena, Calif., for the BCS title game.

This year's team, however, will have a very different look to it, both on the field and the sidelines.

Let's start with the loss of Tim Tebow, who was arguably the face of college football for the last three years.

In Tebow, the Gators lose a dual-threat quarterback who accumulated 9,285 yards through the air and nearly 3,000 on the ground in his four years at Florida. But beyond his statistics, the Gators also lose a vocal, emotional leader in the three-time Heisman finalist.

Replacing Tebow at quarterback is redshirt junior John Brantley, a more traditional dropback passer who has been learning the Florida offense for three years.

Losing Tebow is huge for Florida, but Brantley should be regard-

ed as a more than serviceable heir to the offense, so the quarterback position shouldn't be much of a concern.

Instead, on offense, the biggest question mark should be the unproven receiving corps. The Gators lost their top three receiving targets (in terms of number of receptions) from last season's team in tight end Aaron Hernandez (68 receptions for 850 yards and five touchdowns), wide receiver Riley Cooper (51/961/9) and David Nelson (25/291/2). Hernandez was drafted in the fourth round by the New England Patriots, Cooper in the fifth by the Philadelphia Eagles and Nelson went undrafted but signed with the Buffalo Bills.

The Gators will rely on redshirt junior Deonte Thompson – who was the fourth-leading receiver on last season's team – to step up into one of the voids left behind. Redshirt senior Carl Moore and redshirt freshman Andre Debose, who have battled back from back and hamstring injuries, respectively, as well as redshirt sophomore Omarius Hines, will also need to be looked upon to produce.

Florida is also moving running back Chris Rainey, who had 161 receiving yards and 575 rushing yards last season, to the "Percy position," meaning he will line up as a slot receiver and as a running back.

As for the offensive line, Florida returns four of five starters, with Maurkice Pouncey (18th overall pick) being the only one not coming back for 2010.

On the other side of the ball, the Gators also lost several key pieces

to the NFL Draft, most notably cornerback Joe Haden, who led the team with four interceptions and 10 passes broken up.

Aside from Haden, Florida lost safety Major Wright, linebackers Brandon Spikes and Ryan Stamper (undrafted), and defensive ends Carlos Dunlap and Jermaine Cun-

ningham.

While those are all key losses on defense, the Gators do return safeties Ahmad Black and Will Hill and cornerback Janoris Jenkins in the defensive backfield. They also get A.J. Jones back at linebacker, where he will be joined by the likes of Jelani Jenkins and Jonathan Bostic.

On the defensive front, Florida will have a rotation of Omar Hunter, Jaye Howard, Lawrence Marsh and Terron Sanders at the tackle position, and Justin Trattou and true freshman Ronald Powell likely on the ends.

Arguably the biggest loss on

Steinbrenner had ties to UF

Yankees fans will forever be thankful for what George Steinbrenner did for their team, but Gators fans also have reason to be grateful.

He is most remembered for being the outspoken owner of the Yankees for the last 38 years and his winning mentality, but "The Boss," as he was nicknamed, also had ties to the University of Florida.

Steinbrenner, who passed away from a heart attack in his Tampa home Tuesday at age 80, was a member of Gator Boosters, Inc.'s Bull Gator program.

The Bull Gator program, according to the Gator Boosters' website, requires annual contributions of at least \$14,500 for membership and has been around since 1979.

Steinbrenner had been a Bull Gator since 1980, despite never attending the University of Florida.

According to Doug Brown, the associate executive director of Gator Boosters, Steinbrenner's first connection to UF was former Florida football coach Ray Graves, who became the program's athletic director in 1979.

Graves approached Steinbrenner when the school needed help funding the baseball facility, McKethan Stadium.

"In addition to being a great business man, he was a great philanthropist as well," Brown said. "He was not only just a strong supporter of athletics (at UF), but the rest of the university."

To go with his contributions to the school's athletic program, Steinbrenner also donated to the band building on campus, which is named after him, and the university's veterinary college, among other things.

Along with being a Bull Gator, Steinbrenner also had seats to Florida football games on the Bull Gator Deck, which cost \$15,500 annually, though Brown said he would only make it to one or two games a season.

"He generally couldn't get to games, in all seriousness he had the Yankees playing in a lot of World Series ... he really couldn't get to Gators games until later in the season," Brown said.

Florida wasn't the only school that Steinbrenner supported. He also contributed to programs at Ohio State and North Carolina.

"It's a great loss for the university, athletics in particular, because he was such a strong supporter in a lot of different ways for our university," Brown said. "He'll be greatly missed, by a lot of folks, not just here ... but all over the sports world."

defense for the Gators will be that of defensive coordinator Charlie Strong, who took the head coaching job at Louisville before the Sugar Bowl. Strong helped turn Florida into a top-10 defense in four of the last five seasons.

With the exception of the quarterback position, Florida has depth at seemingly every spot, and it's supplemented by a plethora of young talent that Urban Meyer and his coaching staff (with new additions of defensive coordinator Teryl Austin, running backs coach Stan Drayton, linebackers/special teams coach D.J. Durkin and wide receivers coach Zach Azzanni) brought in with the No. 2 recruiting class in the nation, according to Rivals.com. Other outlets had the class ranked first.

Whether or not Meyer can coach Florida to a third straight BCS berth remains to be seen, but the young team certainly has the talent to do so.

It will just be a matter of whether or not that talent in practice produces in games.



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UF to honor Heisman winners with bronze statues

Three donors to fully fund the \$550,000 project

With a combined three National Championships, eight Southeastern Conference Championships and three Heisman Trophies, there is plenty to remember Steve Spurrier, Danny Wuerffel and Tim Tebow by. Just in case, the University of Florida wants their legacies set in stone.

The three Heisman winners are coming back to the Swamp, but they won't be wearing the traditional orange and blue — their new color is bronze.

Florida will pay homage to the quarterback legends with three larger-than-life statues outside Ben Hill Griffin Stadium.

On June 16th, the University Athletic Association Board unanimously approved the project to erect the sculptures.

According to Chip Howard, associate athletics director for operations and facilities, the project will cost roughly \$550,000.

"We have commitments from three donors to fully fund the project," Howard said. "No UAA or other university funds are being used."

The statues will be about 15 percent larger than life-sized and will be placed on the west side of the stadium where a planter now

sits, near the elevators, Howard said.

To prevent people from climbing the statues and possibly getting hurt, a barrier will surround the elevated statues.

"It won't be like the gator [statue] on the corner of Gale Lemerand [Drive] and Stadium [Road]," Howard said. "People will be able to stand in front of them and get pictures, they just won't be touching the statues."

The statues will depict the former quarterbacks in the year they

won the Heisman Trophy. While Spurrier and Wuerffel, the 1966 and 1996 Heisman recipients respectively, will be captured in a throwing motion, there is suspense surrounding how Tebow, the 2007 winner, will be portrayed.

Spurrier, who was the school's first Heisman winner, threw for 1,852 yards and 16 touchdowns in 1966 to win the award.

Wuerffel accumulated 3,319 yards through the air to rack up 36 touchdowns in his Heisman

season.

Tebow recorded 51 total touchdowns (29 passing, 22 rushing) and 3,970 total yards in 2007 to become the latest Gator win the trophy.

Howard did not disclose how Tebow's statue would look.

"There were a couple of poses looked at for each individual," he said. "We contacted each person and wanted to make it a collaborative effort to best represent them."

As for the eye black, Howard

said that will be answered at the unveiling.



Artist W. Stanley "Sandy" Proctor has been commissioned to build the statues.

Howard said Proctor also did a Doak Walker statue in Dallas and has a lot of experience sculpting life-like statues.

According to Howard, the installation of the statues will take place sometime after Jan. 1, and a ceremony will follow to unveil the statues to the public.

The university is trying to find a time for all three honorees to attend, despite their busy schedules.


Currently, the only life-like statue on Florida's campus is of Albert A. Murphree, the second president of the university.

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
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Vandy coach announces surprising decision to retire
