## Woman trespasses at President's House

A Gainesville woman just couldn't resist the divine order to take a dip in Bernie Machen's pool.

At 10:45 p.m. Monday, staff members at the UF President's House called police and reported a woman trespassing and swimming in the pool, according to Capt. Jeff Holcomb, public information officer for the University Police Department.

This is not the first time trespassers have attempted to swim in the President's House pool, Holcomb said.

The officers who found the woman, who was noticeably disoriented, thought she was drunk.

As it turns out, the woman was not drunk.

While officers talked with the woman, according to Holcomb, she told them that God told her to get in the pool.

After officers apprehended and spoke

with her, the woman invoked the Baker Act. Under the Baker Act, patients are taken to mental health facilities, where they are observed for a maximum of three days.

Officers took the woman to Shands, where she was presumably assessed, and then taken to

Shands Vista, one of two local Baker Act facilities.

Before leaving, officers gave her a trespass warning, which means she could be arrested if she returns to UF campus.

Because of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act restrictions, her name cannot be released.

UF president Bernie Machen moved out of the President's House and into a private residence in 2006.

The house, 2151 W University Ave., is now used to host events for UF organizations.

## Graffiti gets mixed reactions

Graffiti isn't a black-and-white issue.

Its legality, artistic merit and permanence are debated. But in Gainesville, it's still vandalism.

On July 21, it took Chris Arters, a Physical Plant Division employee, about 30 minutes to clean graffiti off the potato-shaped rock in Turlington Plaza, according to Wayne Wainwright, UF facilities department manager.

According to Wainwright, gra-

fitti shows up every week on campus during the summer. During the fall, it's every few days.

Sometimes, it takes a whole day to remove the graffiti.

The Southwest 34th Street wall, the 13th Street pedestrian tunnel and Turlington Plaza

and Turlington Plaza are three of Gainesville's biggest graffiti hot spots.

While technically illegal, no one has been arrested for vandalizing any of those three places in recent months.

About once or twice a year, stu-

dents are disciplined for graffiti, said Capt. Jeff Holcomb of the University Police Department.

The wall on 34th Street is owned by the Florida Department of Transportation, and it is illegal to create graffiti there, according to Gina Busscher, a department spokeswoman.

"We don't have enforcement powers," she said. "We rely on local police, and it has not, in the past, been a high priority for the police to enforce the vandalism."

The Department of Transporta-

You may have seen the banners hanging over University Avenue and 13th Street.

The Jehovah's Witnesses are knocking on Gainesville's door this weekend.

From Friday through Sunday, Jehovah's Witnesses will be walking through the doors of the O'Connell Center, where they will hold their second weekend-long convention of the summer.

Their last conference, held over Independence Day weekend, filled about 6,000 seats in the O'Connell Center on each of its three days, according to Tony Fowler, a convention spokesman.

Attendees will be coming from Florida, Georgia and Alabama, according to O'Connell Center assistant director David Lucier.

The conventions are for the purpose of Bible instruction, and there will be a number of speakers and interactive presentations with a focused message, Fowler said.

During the speeches, there will be skits, demonstrations and staged interviews with people relating their personal experiences, he said.

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## National Minority Donor Awareness Day

 Organ, tissue and eye donation is important to everyone but can sometimes be of even greater concern to the minority community. The first of August celebrates National Minority Donor Awareness Day and is an ideal time to consider giving the gift of life by making a commitment to be an organ, tissue and eye donor.

Because some diseases of the kidney, heart, lung, pancreas and liver are found more frequently in racial and ethnic minority populations than

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in the general population, minorities are much more likely than Caucasians to need life-saving transplants. More than 100,000 men, women and children in the United States are waiting for a life-saving organ, and half of those on the waiting list are minority patients.

While race is not a limiting determinant in donations, transplant success rates increase when organs are matched between members of the same ethnic and racial group. Lower donation rates among minorities can result in longer waiting periods for transplants for minority organ recipients.

One out of 20 Americans will need a tissue transplant in his or her lifetime. Donated tissues such as skin, bone and heart valves are used to treat burn victims, increase strength, restore mobility and improve the quality of life for approximately 1 million patients each year.

Tissue is a special gift that can be shared among all populations. A minority donor's tissue may benefit a patient of another race, and a minority patient may receive tissue from a donor of another race.

The commitment to donate tissue is part of the focus during National Minority Donor Awareness Day, observed August 1 each year to raise awareness of the importance of donation among minority populations.

# Athletes to compete in strength charity challenge

Normally, Florida athletes fight teammates for playing time, but on Friday, they'll compete for six worthy causes.

Members of the 2010 football squad will challenge each other in a series of strength competitions at the third annual Gator Charity Challenge at Ben Hill Griffin Stadium on Friday as part of their last workout of the summer.

The squad will be divided into six teams that will represent six Shands-affiliated organizations. This year, the event will feature the Ronald McDonald House Charities of North Central Florida, Shands Cancer Hospital, STOP! Children's Cancer, the American Cancer Society, American Heart Association and March of Dimes, said Kari Hodgkiss, a representative of the University Athletic Association.

There are 19 players on each team, said Scott Holsopple, assistant director of strength conditioning. Each team member

was chosen by Holsopple and Mickey Marotti, the Gators' strength and conditioning coordinator.

"We chose the teams based on their character and skill," Holsopple said.

The six squads will be led by Ahmad Black, Brandon Antwine, Lorenzo Edwards, A.J. Jones, Terron Sanders and Duke Lemmens in the night's contests, which consist of a sled push, obstacle course, farmer's hold and tug of war.

Pledge cards will be available at the West Concourse for fans to donate to the six causes, said Denver Parler, assistant director of communications of UAA. No cash or checks will be accepted.

About \$11,000 was raised last year, but increasing awareness is the ultimate goal, Hodgkiss said.

The challenge is free to the public and will begin with team introductions at 7 p.m.

# Pool hall employee robbed at gunpoint

A man was robbed at gunpoint while he was taking out the trash at his job early Monday morning, and the robber is still on the loose.

The employee, who works at Art of Billiards on 4251 SW 13th St., was behind the store washing kitchen mats and throwing out the garbage when he noticed someone approaching from Wiliston Road, said Alachua County Sheriff's Office spokesman Art Forney.

At first, the man made small talk with the employee, even asking if Art of Billiards was hiring, Forney said.

"He said he was feeling kind of uncomfortable because the man was holding his hands behind his back," Forney said.

As the conversation ended, the man

showed his hands and pointed a black handgun at the employee, forcing him toward the back of the building, Forney said.

He ordered the employee onto his knees and demanded he empty his pockets. The employee took out his wallet and whatever bills he had, Forney said.

The robber then took the bills out of the wallet, threw the wallet back at the employee and ran east toward the woods, Forney said.

**Local News** The employee was not otherwise injured, Forney said.

The suspect is described as a black man in his mid-20s, about 6'1" and of slim, but muscular build, he said.

## Engineers race robot chariots

More than 2,000 years ago, Romans raced wooden chariots around the track at Circus Maximus for sport.

Friday, at the Reitz Union Ballroom, the past will be resurrected, albeit on a smaller scale — and with robots.

Starting at 2 p.m., 120 engineering freshmen, grouped in 30 teams of four or five, will race shoe-box sized chariots made of LEGOs as they've been building and programming as part of AGN 1935, an introduction course given over summer.

While the performance of the robots will not be part of the final grade, there will be a prize for the winner, as well as small door prizes for each bracket winner and superlatives like best

design, said Dan Dickrell of the UF department of mechanical and aerospace engineering.

They will, however, be graded on a written summary about the building and programming process, and the things they learned.

"We want it to be fun, but we also want them to take it seriously," Dickrell said.

In the past, the class has always ended with a building assignment, but "nothing to this magnitude of coolness," he said.

According to Dickrell, it's in the rules that chariots must be topped with a LEGO man, and if he gets knocked off, just as in real chariot races, he's dead, and the team is disqualified.

J. T. Anderson, a chemical engineering major, has spent about 10 hours on his chariot.

"This has kind of showed us that engineers are faced with a problem, and you need to figure out the best way to solve it," he said. "It's a lot of work but a lot of fun at the same time."

# Pizza joint fills vacancy

Ever since Mellow Mushroom closed its doors in October, the restaurant space less than 500 feet east of the UF campus has been vacant.

Not anymore.

Nearly a year later, a new tenant will occupy the 3,400-square-foot building at 1209 W University Ave. when Anthony's Wood Fired Pizza opens in mid-August.

"We know who our customers are," said William Gray, a restaurant manager. "We are, 100 percent, a school-oriented restaurant."

Anthony's will serve food until 4 a.m., providing bar patrons a reasonably priced, late-night option to "settle you down," Gray said.

Besides pizza, Anthony's will also serve wings, fajitas, lasagna, burgers and an array of appetizers including a concoction called "Gator Bites."

The Gator Bites, with a spicy kick from fresh jalapeno peppers, will be the restaurant's claim to fame, he said.

"But four or five of them can be dangerous," he joked. "We might have to have people sign a waiver."

A full vegetarian menu is also in the works, he said.

The restaurant will use wood-burning ovens to cook nearly every item on the menu. It will also serve a variety of imported, local and microbrew beers, he said.

"We want as many [beers] as we can get our hands on," he said.

The restaurant will also feature a chalkboard menu with daily specials.

While specific prices have yet to be set, Gray said there will not be any \$12 burgers like he saw at another Gainesville establishment.

"What's up with that?" he asked. "Nothing is cheap these days, but it doesn't have to be overpriced either."

Before Anthony's signed the lease, the property attracted plenty of potential clients, said Jamie Kennedy, the commercial real estate agent who was assigned to the lot.

"We could have showed it five or six times a week," Kennedy said. "That's a pretty hot property."

## Tunnel, wall popular spots to tag

tion understands that police officers focus on issues that are more serious, she said.

Gainesville Police Department spokeswoman Cpl. Tscharna Senn said she doesn't think anyone has ever been arrested for vandalizing the wall.

The wall serves as a "community bulletin board," said Richard Heipp, interim director of the School of Art and Art History at UF.

Mickie MacKenzie, executive director of Keep Alachua County Beautiful, said the organization tries to paint over obscenities. Graffiti, she said, is usually an eyesore and a symbol of crime.

The pedestrian tunnel under 13th Street mostly serves as an artistic outlet for students, and it differs from more vulgar graffiti found elsewhere, Holcomb said.

"It's not even good tagging," he said.

But Holcomb said there's some good art on the 34th Street wall, including the memorial to the five UF students murdered in the fall of 1990.

Adam Tritt, a 45-year-old writer and therapist in Palm Bay, painted the memorial in September 1990.

"I knew the community was suffering, and I did something about it," Tritt said.

But he said it's "stark-raving crazy" that the memorial is still around 20 years later.

"It was going to be extremely temporary because that's the nature of the wall, which is why that center panel ruins the concept of the wall."

Alachua County Sheriff Sadie Darnell, then a Gainesville Police captain, maintained the wall until 2000. Now, UF's Interfraternity Council maintains the memorial, said Sean Smith, the council's president.

For graffiti artists, Gainesville's not the best place to tag, one artist said. The graffiti artist, who goes by "Brown," started learning graffiti at the wall on 34th Street about three years ago.


He said it's frustrating that what he paints on the wall gets painted over. Generally, he said, it costs him about \$15 for each piece he paints.

People have a misconception that graffiti crews are the same as gangs because of gang tags, but he said the gang tags aren't true graffiti because they mostly just mark territory.

But the Norman Tunnel offers first-time graffiti artists an opportunity to experiment.

Tuesday night, three high school seniors who are at UF for a summer science camp spray painted their first tags.

"It's something we wanted to leave behind," he said. "Now we're a part of history."

## Prince says Internet is no longer profitable

**S**ummer is coming to a close, and it's time for us to dole out an award for the most out-of-context quote of the semester: Prince's now-famous uttering of "the Internet is over."

Similar to when Al Gore said he invented the Internet, not a moment went by before people came out of the woodwork to jump on the music icon for what they perceived as ignorance. A quick read past the headlines, though, reveals his actual message — the Internet is over as a viable way to distribute and profit from music.

So let's prove Prince right by going against the grain and buying albums again. Maybe then our generation could afford to commission some more memorable music than Nickelback.

They held a guiding principle that innovation and creativity is to come from the ruling few and not from the masses, which were to be either forcefully equalized (as in Russia's case) or repetitively stifled (as in France's). Broaden the scope to most large societies throughout history and compare the successes of the ones with innovative citizenry to the ones with ensnared, government-dependent masses.

We are to be grateful that we live in a society that was founded upon the individual's ability to succeed, not the government's ability to provide. America's success is a tribute to its freedom.

In the past 100 years, Americans have seen an increasing trend; one that is shifting away from citizens providing for themselves, to instead making them increasingly dependent on government. We find ourselves willing to become less reliant on our own efforts and creativity to succeed. What happens when we fully allow the government to become the source of our livelihood and creativity?



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# Serendipity defines accomplished ghost writer's career

An economics degree from Cornell University. A law degree from UF. Experience as a marketing director.

These milestones had Eddie Mordujovich on a fast track to becoming one of New York's wealthy, young businessmen.

But they aren't the reasons why he spends his time with Emmy Award-

winning actor Joey Pantoliano. They played no part in the fact that, at 34, he'll have his third book under his belt this October. And they don't factor into the change in his posture or the smirk on his face when he talks about his job.

For that, he points to serendipity.

Flashback to 2000. Fresh out of college, he was working as marketing director for Kargo, a wireless Internet company he said was too ahead of its time—it was created before wireless was available.

Inevitably, the company crashed, and four years out of college he was laid off, collecting unemployment checks every month.

He managed to get a temp job in New York's New School doing administrative work until the job ended in October and he was once again on unemployment.

That went on until December 2001, when he got a call from his friend and son of his childhood piano teacher, Gleb Klioner, who was working as Pantoliano a.k.a. Joey Pants' agent, mentioning that Pants was looking for a new assistant.

A week later, he was on the set of "The Sopranos" in Queens, watching Pants as he went through his takes.

When Pants had a break, he walked over to Mordujovich, sat down and interviewed him for the job.

The interview was one question:

"How fast can you type?"

He started working as Pants' assistant for free.

He handled his schedule, went to the set with him, took his phone calls and acted as the assistant for the writer working on Pants' autobiography.

Then, on a Wednesday in March 2002, he got the call.

"Hello?"

"Hey, Eddie, it's Joey. The writer left the book, and she thinks you can write it. You think you can put something down?"

"Sure."

"Get me a chapter by Friday."

Click.

Short of a tennis article that appeared in the Cornell Daily Sun in 1997, he hadn't published any of his writing.

But what he compiled in the next 18 hours became the 10th chapter of Pants' autobiography, and his first chapter as a writer.

He was given six weeks to finish the rest of the book.

"I was chained like a monkey to the offices at Penguin Putnam," he said.

He didn't get a byline on the book's jacket. This was because he also collaborated with writer David Evanier, who came to help finish the autobiography.

He said ghostwriters usually don't have their names on the books they write.

He was, however, listed in the acknowledgments as "the great Eddie Mordujovich."

All he needed from there was encouragement.

The editor and publisher from Penguin Putnam called Pants to comment on the new chapter.

She said Mordujovich captured him in that chapter better than the previous writer had all along.

"I needed someone to tell me that I could do this f—king book," he said. "It felt good."

Since then, he has ghostwritten another book, "How to Buy, Sell and Profit on eBay," and was called in a second time by Pants to ghostwrite his contribution to Larry King's "Remember me when I'm Gone," a collection of celebrities' goodbye letters to the suspended talk show host.

But writing gigs weren't paying the bills.

Mordujovich packed up and went to work at a bank in Jackson Hole, Wyo., where he met his wife.

But serendipity had him by the throat again.

Unannounced and unexpected, his sister died in New York at age 32.

Worse, he remembers, their last conversation was an argument, ending with her saying that he had ruined her life.

He decided a priority change was in order.

Mordujovich moved again in 2006 to Florida for law school. His mother lives seven hours away in Miami.

While living in the sunshine state and going to UF's Levin College of Law, he tapped his connection to Pants and co-produced "Canvas," a movie about the plight of a father (Pants) and son, dealing with his wife's schizophrenia.


The movie was well received.

It won eight awards, and he was already working on a documentary about Pants before he had his law degree in 2009.

And serendipity struck a third time.

His documentary about Pants' depression prompted the start of a charity for those with brain disease called No Kidding Me Too!


Eddie Mordujovich relaxes in the place where literacy magic happens, his office.





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## Brewer hosts three-day youth basketball camp

■ PROCEEDS ARE GOING TO BREWER'S DIABETES FUND AT SHANDS.

Corey Brewer didn't have this opportunity as a kid.

Growing up in Portland, Tenn., Brewer never attended a basketball camp hosted by a professional athlete. Instead he spent many of his summers helping his father Ellis, a diabetic, in the tobacco fields of his small hometown near the Tennessee-Kentucky border.

Brewer wanted to give other kids a chance he never had, and it's a big reason why he decided to host a three-day basketball camp in Gainesville this week.

"It's always fun to see the kids' faces, because I know I would've been ecstatic to see a pro basketball player," Brewer said, flashing his signature smile that many UF fans know well.

After winning back-to-back national titles at Florida as part of the group affectionately known as the "Oh-Fours", Brewer wanted to give back to the Gainesville community and help raise awareness for a disease that hits close to home for him – diabetes.

The former NBA lottery pick of the Minnesota Timberwolves decided a basketball camp would be the best way to do that, and hosted Brewer's Back 2 Back Youth Basketball Camp at the Santa Fe College gym this week.

About 50 kids attended the three-day camp, where they participated in drills, five-on-five games, contests and had sessions where they were able to ask Brewer questions that ranged from NBA-related matters to what his favorite college team was growing up (the answer is Kentucky), to what he likes to do in his spare time – which is being home with his family.

Not only was Brewer able to give the kids an opportunity he didn't have during his child-

hood, but he was also able to team up with Shands Health Care. Proceeds from the camp are going to the Corey Brewer Fight Diabetes Fund at Shands.

"It means a lot to me," Brewer said. "I feel if I can help one person, it's better than helping none."

Both Brewer's mother, Glenda, and his father suffer from diabetes, so Brewer knows how crippling the disease can be. His dad lost both of his legs – one while Brewer was still in college and the other after Brewer made the jump to the NBA – and just recently lost his vision because of the disease.

Brewer said his diabetes fund was heavily influenced by his family and his personal experiences.



"I know how tough the disease is, so for me it was very important to do something for diabetes," he said.

Despite what his father has been through, his mother has managed her diabetes well, and still "acts like she's 25."

Brewer wants people to know that diabetes is a deadly disease, one that 23.6 million children and adults in America have. But he still wants to show that you can live a healthy life if you take care of the disease properly. That is why aside from raising money to help combat diabetes, Brewer used time at the camp to raise awareness for the campers and advise them to start getting checked for it at a young age.

"I started getting checked when I got to high school," Brewer said. "I tried to get checked at least every year ... because a lot of people in my family have it. It starts at a young age, I feel, and everybody should get checked."

## Gators offense should be better off with Brantley at the helm

This next statement defies all logic.

But here it is: Tim Tebow, arguably the greatest college football player ever, is gone, and Florida's offense will be better off because of it.

Now, I know we have all been taught that if A is greater than B, then AC must be greater than BC. While that may be consistently true in math, it isn't in sports.

Chances are that current Gators quarterback John Brantley will never possess the type of game-breaking ability or overall skill that Tebow displayed each Saturday.

However, Brantley is the right one to lead this season's offense.

Tebow needed former UF wide receiver Percy Harvin, who was named The Associated Press 2009 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year, in order to succeed and hide his deficiencies in the passing game.

He was asked to do more last

season in the absence of Harvin and the offense struggled at times because of it. Tebow's game became predictable with a quick-strike aerial attack that targeted a select group of receivers and a good amount of quarterback dive plays mixed

in.

This year, coach Urban Meyer is still looking for the guy to replace Harvin.

However, Brantley will succeed either way.

This quarterback will keep you guessing. A versatile decoy like Harvin isn't necessary.

He doesn't depend on one stud receiver to help him, he gets everybody involved.

Let's compare the numbers. In a Tebow-led offense, wide

receiver Riley Cooper and tight end Aaron Hernandez combined to accumulate 1,811 receiving yards (55% of the team's receiving yards), 119 catches (48 percent of the team's completed passes) and 14 receiving touchdowns (50 percent of the touchdowns through the air).

On the contrary, Brantley did not discriminate.

In the seven games he played last season, Brantley threw an average of 20.5 yards per completion. SEE CHIANG, PAGE 20

# No. 3 Ohio State: Buckeyes will rely on stingy defense

■ PRYOR LOOKS TO LIMIT TURNOVERS AND SACKS.

We head into the homestretch of the alligatorSports' preseason college football poll with the No. 3 team in our countdown: the Ohio State Buckeyes.

Last season, the Buckeyes finished 11-2 after winning their fifth consecutive Big 10 title and beating Oregon in the Rose Bowl on New

Year's Day.

The 11 wins marked the fifth time in as many years that Ohio State finished the season with at least 10 wins.

Part of what made last year's Buckeyes squad so successful was the team's vaunted defense, which finished as the fifth-best scoring defense in the nation, giving up just 12.5 points per contest and allowing opponents to accumulate just 262.3 total yards per game.

At the heart of Ohio State's stifling defense are two senior linebackers, Ross Homan and Brian Rolle. In 2009, Homan led the team

with 108 total tackles (57 solo) while Rolle was second with 95 (37 solo).

The Buckeyes also return senior defensive tackle Cameron Heyward, who led the team with 6.5 sacks last season and was second on the squad with 10 tackles for a loss.

In the defensive backfield it also returns cornerbacks Devon Torrence and Chimdi Chekwa (seven passes broken up), so the team should be in good shape there.

The defense should have no problem replicating the 2009 ver-

sion, which will make the offense's job much easier.

Ohio State isn't known for having a flashy offense, but the school does have a flashy quarterback in Terrelle Pryor. At 6 feet 6 inches tall and 233 pounds, Pryor certainly has the build and the physical tools to excel at quarterback, but will need to limit the mistakes, as he tossed 11 interceptions last season and was sacked 22 times while passing for 2,094 yards and 18 touchdowns.

As a dual-threat quarterback, Pryor also led the team in rushing, with 779 yards and seven scores.

Surrounding Pryor, the offense

returns plenty of weapons for Pryor to use at his disposal, including its two leading receivers from last year in DeVier Posey (828 yards, eight touchdowns) and Dane Sanzenbacher (570 yards and six touchdowns), as well running back Brandon Saine, who was second to Pryor in rushing (739 yards, four touchdowns).

Combine the talent Ohio State returns on the field with Jim Tressel in charge of things on the sideline, and the Buckeyes should be in great shape to win their sixth consecutive Big 10 championship and possibly book a trip to Glendale, Ariz., the site of the team's last BCS title.

# Smith granted sixth year of eligibility

Maranda Smith has been through a lot in her college career, which was thought to have ended in April.

But now the four-time All-American has one more chance to vie for a national title after the NCAA granted her a sixth year of eligibility Wednesday.

"I'm so grateful that the NCAA granted me another year of eligibility," Smith said. "I'm really looking forward to competing with my Gator teammates again and having another chance to compete in front of the O'Connell Center fans is truly a gift."

Smith began her college career at UCLA, where she made it through two meets before a stress fracture in her right shin caused her to miss the rest of her freshman season and have a metal rod inserted into her shin.

After transferring to Florida in 2008, Smith tore her right labrum, but competed through the pain before having surgery on the shoulder prior to last season, which was expected to be her senior year.

Last season, Smith was second on the team to then-freshman Ashanée Dickerson with nine event titles – five on the uneven bars and two each on vault and floor – en route to being named a first-team All-American on the bars.

Smith's return is a great advantage for UF, which now returns 10 gymnasts from last year's Southeastern Conference championship squad that placed first at the NCAA

North Central Regional in Salt Lake City and fifth at the NCAA Championships.

"We're very excited for Maranda that she has been granted a sixth year of eligibility,"

UF coach Rhonda Faehn said. "Maranda is a great leader and competitor. I'm sure the Gators fans will enjoy seeing her compete for another year."

erage of about seven passes in those contests. Out of those measly seven passes, an average of about three different receivers caught the ball.

In other words, Brantley spreads the ball around, which keeps defenses from focusing its coverage on certain receivers.

The redshirt junior completed 36 of his 48 passes in mop-up duty for Tebow last season and threw for seven touchdowns. That's one endzone celebration for about every seventh passing play.

This speaks volumes for his ability to complete long passes and grab chunks of yards at a time. He doesn't need a Harvin-type player to create the big plays for him with yards after the catch.

Tebow, on the other hand, needed about 15 passes for every touchdown he threw last year because of the short-pass offense that was implemented to cater to his strengths.

So, in the spring when Deonte Thompson was quoted as referring to Brantley as a "real quarterback," maybe, just maybe, he knew what he was talking about.

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
