UPD reinstates officers involved in Kofi shooting

Four of the five officers involved in the on-campus shooting of a UF graduate student were reinstated to their duties with the University Police Department on Thursday. Only Lt. Stacy Ettel, the commanding officer when 36-year-old Kofi Adu-Brempong was shot at his Corry Village apartment, has not been reinstated as of Monday.

The internal affairs investigation is still ongoing, so Florida law does not allow anyone involved to comment on the investigation. But UF spokeswoman Janine Sikes said the investigation should be over by the end of August, if not sooner.

According to a UF press release, the university has contracted Margolis Healy & Associates to "evaluate UF's internal affairs review protocols and ensure that the police department strictly followed them during the internal review process."

The university's decision whether to reinstate Ettel probably won't be made until the investigation has ended, she said. The investigation will make a final decision whether the officers followed university policies.

The other four officers—Bill Ledger, Keith Smith, William Sasser and James Mabry—were reinstated Thursday because evidence indicates they followed lawful orders, Sikes said. She added that the state attorney has decided not to charge them.

Those officers returned to their former positions, except for Sasser, who has now

joined the motorcycle unit. Since the incident, UPD has maintained a full staff by moving officers who were normally off-patrol to patrol duty, Holcomb said.

Meanwhile, the officers have been doing non-uniformed office duties, he said.

For example, Sasser has been assisting Holcomb with bike registrations, answering phone calls and other office duties, Holcomb said.

UPD spokesman Capt. Jeff Holcomb said he's not sure about the other officers, but Sasser told him he has already requested overtime, which is something the officers weren't allowed after the shooting, until now.

According to Sikes, UPD Chief Linda Stump and UF President Bernie Machen are working to create a police advisory committee. While the details of the committee have not been determined, Sikes said it will probably be composed of students and faculty. What the committee will do is uncertain.

Student Government senators unanimously passed a resolution calling for a UPD review board on June 15.

According to Student Body President Ashton Charles, SG has yet to see any progress regarding the review board. SG is waiting for the investigation's completion before they act further, she said. UPD and the university administration has been thorough in its investigation thus far, she said.

Machen was unavailable for comment and will be on vacation for the rest of the week, Sikes said. She also said

Sergeant returns to duty

■ **SGT. SATCHER CONTRACTED H1N1 10 MONTHS AGO.**

Sgt. Lisa Satcher rides again.

Ten months after she was hospitalized at North Florida Regional Medical Center with the H1N1 virus, Satcher will return to duty as an officer for the Gainesville Police Department on Tuesday morning.

"It's a great occasion for us that she's able to come back," said Tscharna Senn, public information officer for the department. "Her doctors told her that she probably would never even be off of oxygen, much less come back as a full-time cop."

While in the hospital's intensive care unit, Satcher was put in an induced coma and placed on a ventila-

tor for nearly three months. She nearly died several times, Senn said.

Her mother, Sheila O'Neill, was also hospitalized after contracting the same virus, but was unable to recover. She died just four doors down from her daughter in ICU.

After she left North Florida Regional Medical Center, Satcher spent time at Select Specialty Hospital on Archer Road and at home.

She returned to work for GPD in mid-April, but not as an officer, because she was not ready to return to the field. Instead, she worked in administration.

It is unknown how Satcher contracted the virus, though she said she may have gotten it while policing the

Florida-Tennessee football game or during a visit to a doctor's office.

After a roll call and a short briefing in the department's multi-purpose room Monday evening, GPD Capt. Bart Knowles introduced Satcher, who tearfully read a thank-you letter to family members and friends who came out to see her re-introduced into police action.

It was a day she and others thought they may never see.

"There were times I'd . . . say 'I don't think I'm going to make it,'" she said.

Satcher said she had mixed emotions putting on her uniform for the first time since September. It reminded her of a time her mother was alive.

But getting back into the squad car is a different story.

"It's going to be exciting," she said. "I can't wait, actually. I can't wait."

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Fraternity named year's most outstanding chapter

The men of Alpha Phi Alpha beat out more than 700 other chapters of the fraternity to be crowned the Outstanding College Chapter of the Year.

The judging criteria included many standards, such as how well the chapter imple-

mented the fraternity's national initiatives and the students' overall GPA, which was 3.14 for UF. The chapter won the award at the fraternity's national convention in Las Vegas, Nev., on July 25.

The award is a point of pride for the Greek community, said Abby Myette, an adviser to the National Pan-Hellenic Council, the organization that oversees nine fraternities, including Alpha Phi Alpha.

"I think that they are a group of men who are very committed to their organization," Myette said. "They work together as

a great team."

Alpha Phi Alpha's UF President Hamarado Sinclair said he enjoyed the recognition of the award, but doesn't want to lose sight of the true goal of positively influencing more people and touching more lives.

"Our plans for the future are not only to continue what we started with this recognition as Outstanding College Chapter of the Year," Sinclair said. "We want to continue to think of new ways to have bigger and better results."

The chapter completed all three of the fraternity's national programs this year. The chapter did Project Alpha, a program where members taught boys about STDs and pregnancy prevention; "Go-to-High-School, Go-to-College," a mentoring program that encouraged young men to prepare for their academic future; and "A Voteless People is a Hopeless People," where the chapter helped 17-year-olds and low-income people register to vote.

The UF chapter also had the highest GPA in the state.

Deferment program adds textbook rentals

UF students have a new option to consider when getting textbooks.

Students can now rent their textbooks through a new deferment program that allows financial aid to be used for books before the money is disbursed to the student.

This option is available at the UF Bookstore, located at the Welcome Center in the Reitz Union, the College of Veterinary Medicine Bookstore, the Health Sciences Center Bookstore and the Levin College of Law Bookstore.

Students will be allowed to highlight and write in these rented books without being penalized, said Lynne Vaughan, director of UF bookstores.

However, if the books are damaged, or returned late, students will be penalized, Vaughan said. If books aren't returned at all, students will pay 75 percent of what the book would cost new.

Students who want to use the pro-

gram must create a rental profile on www.rent-a-text.com, Vaughan said. When students go to the bookstore to rent, all of their information is already in the system.

But, not all books will be available for rent, said Jerry Meriwether, assistant director of business services division of UF. He said there are about 1,000 titles available to rent at the moment.

He also said advantages include cutting down on shipping fees for students. Offering this service on campus allows students to save time and money by not packaging and returning unwanted books, he said.

Books must be returned to the same location they came from and by the last day of finals that semester.

Eligible students can rent up to \$500 worth of books each semester, Vaughan said.

Along with financial aid, students can pay for rentals with a credit card, debit card, by check or with cash.

As leases end, moving day scatters students, stuff

On the day Santa Fe College art student Sarah Ludwig moved from the house she had rented for the past year, she wondered which she liked more, the stuffed swordfish or the electric organ.

In the end, the swordfish won.

This past weekend, Ludwig wedged, pummeled and crammed 20 years worth of stuff into boxes and bags ready to be moved when her lease ended. At the end of the day, she had piled her life into a mountain of brown boxes the size of two refrigerators side by side.

"I generally like to make sure that I can handle all of my stuff by myself," Ludwig said. "But it was still so much stuff. I couldn't understand it."

Ludwig is not the only person to be sweating and scrambling to move out. From late July through the month of August, the pressure of moving can be felt all over Gainesville, as many renters find themselves with expiring leases.

"I hate moving," said Phil Dalton, 21, whose father had to drive to the city of Archer to rent a U-Haul truck. "It's annoying. I had to bring boxes from work for about a week just so I could have

enough time to pack everything."

This past weekend, the rumble of moving trucks, the smell of overflowing dumpsters and the peeling of duct tape overtook a city in the midst of a transition. Armed with mops and brooms

and backed by friends and family from out of town, students and non-students alike felt the throttle of moving their stuff, discarding what was no longer valuable and acclimating themselves to their new neighborhood.

Some, like Santa Fe student Jordan Streetzel, 20, signed a lease for the first time.

"I've been spending a year and a half collecting cute stuff or anything that could go on a wall and plotting what I was going to

do with all my space," Streetzel said.

Streetzel, who has been living in Gainesville since last October by paying rent under the table and occasionally crashing on a friends' couch, said moving gives her hope for a new start.

Others — like UF students Lisa Ferrera, 22, who moved all her stuff in the rain, or Brian Greenfield, 22, who bemoaned losing valuable study time to clean out his refrigerator — don't have such a positive outlook.

Realtor Bob Mitchell, whose has managed properties around Gainesville for 21 years, said this weekend is always his most miserable.

Landlords, rental companies and property owners find this time of year to be one of the most exhausting, he said.

"We work long hours into the night cleaning up houses, painting walls, hauling garbage, whatever it takes," Mitchell said. "It's miserable, but that is the nature of the beast."

For Ludwig, the only beast she knows is stuffed and hanging on the wall of her new home.

"The stuffed swordfish was a good idea," Ludwig said. "I got it out of the trash and I'm so happy. Moving day is awesome."

Anti-Defamation League cites UF vandalism in report

■ A GRAY SWASTIKA WAS PAINTED ON A HOUSE BELONGING TO ALPHA EPSILON PI IN APRIL 2009.

A gray swastika spray-painted on a UF fraternity house last year made national news this week when the Anti-Defamation League released its 2009 Audit of Anti-Sem-

itic Incidents.

The league listed the UF incident alongside other acts of vandalism around the country, including rocks thrown through a synagogue's window, KKK graffiti discovered in a synagogue's parking lot after Passover and a burning cross placed inside a Jewish education center.

Members of the traditionally Jewish fraternity Alpha Epsilon Pi discovered the swastika on April 2, 2009 and reported the incident to University Police on April 5,

according to Alligator archives. At nearly 8,000 Jewish students, UF has one the highest Jewish enrollment rates in the nation, according to UF Hillel.

The report, released on July 27, found that the number of anti-Semitic incidents in 2009 remained at a "sustained and troubling" level for both the United States and Florida, even with the total number incidents decreasing from 1,352 to 1,211.

The audit separates acts of anti-Semitism into three categories: physical assaults, vandalism and harassment.

Florida had a total of 90 incidents in 2009, down from 122 last year. Harassment accounted for 63. There were 24 cases of vandalism and 3 physical assaults, according to the audit. In 2008, there were 71 cases of harassment and 46 cases of vandalism in Florida, according to 2008 audit. The League also found an increase in anti-Semitism online.

that Stump will be out of her office until Thursday.

According to Sikes, UPD is placing an emphasis on improving relationships between officers, students and faculty. Another program Stump hopes to emphasize, she said, is Student Community Oriented Policing Effort.

The program assigns UPD officers to specific sections of campus they regularly patrol. This, she said, allows the officers to become familiar with the students and faculty in that area and to know how to deal with situations better.

"We want to make sure people know there are efforts to bring students and officers together," she said.

Adu-Brempong has been living with local relatives since his release from Shands at UF in early May, according to his civil attorney Bill Hoppe.

Although he no longer requires constant medical attention, he still has a long way to go before reaching the end of his recovery, Hoppe said.

Adu-Brempong's injuries are extensive. The bullet that pierced his face blew out his upper palate and some of his teeth.

According to Hoppe, there are shattered remnants of teeth lodged in his mouth. He will undergo reconstructive surgery and receive a replacement palate and set of teeth in hopes of repairing some of his speech.

A second bullet remains stuck in his vertebrae, Hoppe said, as doctors said it would be more dangerous to try to remove it than to leave it.

Adu-Brempong was also shot in the right hand, which resulted in partial loss of motion, Hoppe said.

Despite Adu-Brempong's injuries, Hoppe said the grad student is recovering quite well.

"It's now five months today, and he's doing as well as could be expected," he said. "I'm very positive and he's very positive about his future."

Adu-Brempong continues to go to counseling as part of his court mandates, he said. If he continues to go for the next three years, his charges of aggravated assault and resisting arrest with violence will be dropped.

Hoppe said this should present no problems as long as he stays on current medications.

"His goal is to recover, and when he has recovered sufficiently, to complete his doctorate at the University of Florida," Hoppe said.

In June, the news that Adu-Brempong's charges were deferred came as good news to more than just him and his family.

Concerned students and community members had been calling for the charges to be dropped since the shooting occurred. For Adu-Brempong, a deferred sentence means that as long as he keeps going to counseling sessions, his charges will be dropped.

Dave Schneider, a third-year history and political science major, organized three rallies in spring demanding, among other things, the charges be dropped and a board of citizens and students review UPD protocol.

"Our position all along was that [dropping the charges] was the most important demand," he said. "That happening was very fulfilling for the campaign."

However, he said, there is still much to be upset about, mainly the reinstatement of the officers involved.

"It's still a massive injustice that the police were not publicly reprimanded or charged," he said.

Schneider said his group, Justice for Kofi Adu-Brempong, will now turn its attention to making sure the SG-recommended review board will have actual power to influence UPD policy.

The proposed advisory committee cannot investigate police conduct or determine discipline because the Police Officer Bill of Rights prohibits it, according to an official UF statement.

Events surrounding the Kofi Adu-Brempong shooting on March 2

■ Adu-Brempong had been exhibiting mentally disturbed behavior days before the incident, police said.

■ A neighbor heard screaming from Adu-Brempong's on-campus Corry Village apartment, according to police reports.

■ Adu-Brempong would not allow police officers into his apartment, police said.

■ Peter Waylen, Adu-Brempong's colleague in the Department of Geography, attempted to assist police in talking with Adu-Brempong.


■ Officers talked to him through an open window for about two-and-a-half hours before he fell silent, police reports said.

■ The officers forced their way into the apartment, they said, because they feared Adu-Brempong had harmed himself.

■ The reports said Adu-Brempong approached the officers with a metal table leg.

■ They fired two Tasers, which failed to connect, four rounds of bean-bag shots, which failed to subdue him, and two shots from an AR-15 rifle, which struck his face and hand.

■ Adu-Brempong was taken to Shands at UF, where he was admitted as a patient under an alias.

Until then, we're willing to pitch in on a miles-long extension cord to span from our houses to Clay Electric territory.

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

Arizona's law is reasonable

Simply being an American citizen comes with a grab bag of freedoms and benefits. Social Security, education, welfare and President Obama's soon-to-be-implemented comprehensive health care system are only some of the fruits of our nation's wealth - a wealth built on the social and ethnic diversity that defines America. While this diversity is our nation's greatest strength, we cannot allow unrestrained access to America's limited bounty. I am writing in regards to SB1070, the Arizona law causing so much uproar - the one that allows police officers to detain suspected illegal immigrants unless they are carrying immigration documents. I've heard the words "un-American," "fascist," "xenophobic" and "racist" all used to describe this legislation and its supporters, and I have never been more worried for the future of America.

In an age when many students' only news comes from tweets and hearsay, our opinions are quickly growing more uninformed and thus more asinine. Our refusal to seek objective journalism has left us with less and less exposure to the unbiased facts that allow us to form our own opinions. Instead, we passionately regurgitate the twisted opinions of partisan bloggers and talking heads. SB1070 was created in response to chronic failures by the federal government to secure our borders against the overwhelming influx of illegal immigrants. The residents of Arizona have a right to protect their own interests in light of our national government's inability to do so. In fact, the failure to control illegal immigration has fueled a dangerous and despicable human-trafficking trade that preys on the desperation of people who come here seeking a better life.

As an American citizen and tax payer, I pay a hefty portion of my income into Social Security, and I pay for my health insurance. In return, I expect to receive the associated benefits I have earned from hard work. Illegal immigrants sneak into the country undocumented and then drain American social systems - Social Security, health care, food stamps, education. They receive the same benefits as American citizens, only they pay nothing for it, adding a monetary strain that keeps many legal Americans from enjoying the same benefits. The industry surrounding illegal hu-

man trafficking is even more detrimental: Police raids on these operations have turned up illegal automatic weapons, forged documents, hard drugs and even prostitution rings. The illegal immigrants are often abused or even sold into what is essentially slavery, an outcome that benefits no one except the traffickers themselves.

While I agree the Arizona law does open the door to potential overuse by authorities, I do not concede that its terms are unreasonable. The average American's wallet contains a driver's license, multiple credit cards, a debit card, insurance certificates and numerous other documents. What's one more piece of paper? Upon questioning by an officer, an American citizen accused of being an illegal immigrant would simply present proof of citizenship and be on her way. No person will be deported because he "fits the profile." He will be deported because he cannot prove he is in America legally, an extraordinarily easy thing for a person to do if he is lawfully in the United States. In an age when American citizens are recruited as terrorists, and immigrants seeking their own American dream are enslaved by human traffickers, perhaps it is time for all U.S. citizens to carry documentation stating they are here legally and have undergone extensive background screening - a sort of "fast pass" for legal justice.

As a student paying for college with scholarships and a part-time job, I have no sympathy for any person of any nationality (including American) trying to steal from the social systems that enable me to go to school and receive medical care when I need it. To generalize those who share my opinion as being racist or xenophobic is startlingly offensive. Being un-American means not taking a stand and defending America when it is being abused. People with the dream of being Americans should have a legitimate, legal way to become tax-paying, productive citizens who enjoy all the fruits of our nation. Ignoring America's illegal immigration problem benefits neither those who wish to become Americans nor those who are already here and pay dearly to support our way of life.



Gators flex muscles for charities at annual event

With two-a-day practices and the start of another grueling season on the horizon, the Gators took some time to have fun and give back to the community.

About 1,000 fans filed into Ben Hill Griffin Stadium to watch UF football players compete in strength and agility drills in the third annual Gators Charity Challenge.

"It wasn't so much of a workout as it was an opportunity for them to get in front of the fans," said Scott Holsopple, the assistant director of strength and conditioning.

The competition helped raise money for six different local charity organizations: March of Dimes, STOP! Children's Cancer, Inc., American Cancer Society, Shands Cancer Hospital, American Heart Association and the Ronald McDonald House Charities.

The players were divided into six teams – each one represented a different organization. Duke Lemmens, Lorenzo Edwards, Brandon Antwine, Ahmad Black, Teron Sanders and A.J. Jones were named captains as each squad wore different colored shirts.

But in the end Edwards' team, which represented STOP! Children's Cancer, Inc., came out on top after competing in an obstacle course, farmer's hold, sled push and tug of war contest.

"This is the fun stuff, this isn't the hard stuff," Lemmens said. "This is what we worked out all summer for – to show off our muscles to everybody."

Jeff Demps, who ran the fastest 100-meter dash in the world earlier this year, did not run the top time in the obstacle course event. As he attempted to make a cut, his cleats gave way and he slipped before he could reach the end of the course.

Wide receiver Andre Debose and defensive tackle Sharif Floyd were among the players that didn't take part in the event because they had to make a trip home before practice started on Thursday.

"Tonight shows you the energy we have," Lemmens said. "We really came out for a cause. This isn't about us, it's about the charities and I think we did a good job representing them."

SEC has most talent at QB

The Southeastern Conference just got tougher and deeper.

Former Oregon quarterback Jeremiah Masoli, who was kicked off the team in June for legal troubles, will be taking his talents south this fall and joining Houston Nutt's Ole Miss team for the upcoming season.

Masoli will have to join the team as a walk-on, since the Rebels already have 85 players on scholarship, but the quarterback that led Oregon to a Pac-10 title – and the Rose Bowl berth that came with it – will be battling for the starting position with sophomore Nathan Stanley.

But let's be real, a quarterback of Masoli's stature and proven worth is sure to be under center for Ole Miss by the time the season kicks off in September.

If – rather, when Masoli wins the starting job, it means one thing for the SEC.

The conference that is widely argued as the best in the land now has an argument for the best quarterback conference in the

That's saying something, considering the two quarterbacks that were named to the All-SEC pre-season first and second teams before last season are now in the NFL – former Florida quarterback Tim Tebow and former Ole Miss play-caller Jevan Snead (who many considered a Heisman darkhorse prior to the season).

With Masoli walking on to play at Ole Miss, he instantly becomes the second-best quarterback in the conference this season behind Arkansas' Ryan Mallett. And that's without Masoli ever taking a snap for the Rebels.

Last year, while starting 12 games for Or-

No. 2 Boise State: Broncos return 21 of 22 starters

This might be the Broncos' year.

After finishing with an undefeated record in two of the past four seasons, Boise State still could not punch a ticket to the BCS national championship game because of its weak conference.

But that could be a non-issue this time around. With the Broncos returning every starter on offense and 11 out of the 12 on defense from last year, they are expected to rank high in the preseason polls.

Which is why Boise State comes in at No. 2 in the alligatorSports' college football

preseason poll.

The only starter not coming back is cornerback Kyle Wilson, who was drafted by the New York Jets in the first round.

Other than Wilson, every starter is returning from a team that finished its season with a perfect record and ended its year with a victory over then-undefeated TCU in the Fiesta Bowl.

Quarterback Kellen Moore, who threw for 3,536 yards and 39 touchdowns last year, returns with the same cast that put up 42.2 points per game last season.

That includes two all-conference receivers in Austin Pettis and Titus Young, who will be back to help Moore in the passing game, and the two-headed monster in the

backfield (Jeremy Avery and Doug Martin) which totaled 1,986 rushing yards last season.

The offensive line, which only allowed five sacks last year, will return all five of its starters and will be the catalyst to the success of Moore and the running game.

The defense does lose an All-Western Athletic Conference cornerback in Wilson, but junior Jerrell Gavins from Miami is expected to fill the void.

However, the front seven, which tallied 26 sacks in 2009, remains in tact.

Defensive ends Ryan Winterswyk and Shea McClellin combined for 12 sacks last season and will provide pressure off the ends to help force opponents to the middle of the field and into the grasp of defensive tackle Billy Winn, who was given second-team honors in the WAC.

You don't find many undefeated teams that return 21 of its 22 starters in the following year, but that's exactly what the Broncos will do.

With Boise State's expected high ranking in the preseason polls and the core of its team returning, this could be the exact formula the Broncos have been waiting for in order to earn a chance at the BCS National Championship.

egon, Masoli threw for 2,147 yards and 15 touchdowns while connecting on 58 percent of his passes. He also ran for 668 yards and 13 scores for the Ducks.

The only quarterback in the SEC that dwarfs Masoli's output is Mallett, who last season threw for 3,627 yards and 30 touchdowns, compared to just seven interceptions, while completing 56 percent of his passes.

But behind those two quarterbacks, the SEC still has plenty of talent.

What does it say about the depth in the conference that arguably the third-best quarterback in the SEC is the one that guided his team to a BCS title last year?

In fact, it's even hard to put Alabama's Greg McElroy at third on the SEC's list, though I give him the slight nod over UF's new quarterback John Brantley, only because everything we know about Brantley is based on limited game experience and the potential he has.

Brantley is probably more gifted than McElroy, and could end up higher on this list by the time the season is over, but based on what we've seen on the field, McElroy (2,508 yards and 17 touchdowns en route to an undefeated 2009 campaign) should be the third-best quarterback in the conference.

Now, add in South Carolina's Stephen Garcia, new Auburn quarterback Cam Newton and LSU's Jordan Jefferson.

Garcia showed improvement as a sophomore while throwing for 2,862 yards and 17 touchdowns, but needs to cut down on the mistakes (10 interceptions in 2009) and Newton was Tim Tebow-lite in his limited time at UF before being kicked off the team for stealing a laptop.

With those seven names from 12 teams, it's evident the SEC has the most depth at quarterback of any conference.

Scholar Athlete of the Year awards.

"As a player, I was fortunate enough to be part of a national championship team and I know the amount of dedication and hard work that it takes to get there," McFadden said.

McFadden's hiring came on the heels of the departure of assistant coach Jennifer Ulehla. With a spot to fill, UF jumped at the chance for an impactful hire.

"We looked at all the options available and Caitlyn's name kept popping up," O'Leary said. "Everyone said great things about her and I met with her at a tournament we were both at. She was very interested. UF was an easy sell."

Despite her youth, McFadden's transition from player to coach will come very easy to her, O'Leary said.

"It is a different dynamic," O'Leary said. "But it is all about respect. Our players have seen her play. They've seen her work ethic, commitment and determination. She'll command respect."

McFadden is no newbie to coaching, as she has worked camps across the country since 2007.

The Phoenix, Md., native worked as an instructor for Elevate Lacrosse

Camps and Maximum Exposure Lacrosse Camps. She also conducted youth camps with the National Team.

Coach O'Leary referred to McFadden as a "student of the game" and said she will be involved in all aspects of coaching.

Innovative offensive and defensive schemes are just some of the

things McFadden will bring to the UF lacrosse program. O'Leary also said recruiting will be impacted by the hire.

"Every kid knows who Caitlyn McFadden is," O'Leary said. "The name recognition will certainly help us because who wouldn't want to come and be coached by one of the best players in the country."
