



Local Muslims say violence won't solve Dove problem

■ ANTI-VIOLENCE GROUPS ARE COMING TOGETHER TO MAKE IT CLEAR THAT THREATS AGAINST THE CHURCH DO NOT REPRESENT ALL MUSLIMS.

Amid the controversy surrounding the Dove World Outreach Center's plan to burn the Quran on Sept. 11, Islamic groups have been advising Muslims to not let their frustration turn into violence.

Ziad Ghanimi, spokesman for the Gainesville Muslim Initiative, said the local Muslim community condemns any form of violence against the church's pastor, Terry Jones, or its members.

"It's counterproductive to be violent," he said. "We should try to engage in a discussion."

Ghanimi said an attack on the church would only bolster Jones' stance.

"Violence will not make him change his mind," he said. "It will just confirm his position — especially if those that are violent are Muslims."

The condemnation comes after The Gainesville Sun reported receiving a death threat directed toward Jones Tuesday evening.

According to the article, the Sun gave the letter to the Gainesville Police Department, who is investigating the matter.

In a statement released by The American Muslim Association of North America on Wednesday, the group condemns the Quran burning but denounces violent reaction to the event.

"We would like to remind that Islam calls for vigorous condemnation of such hateful acts, but always within the margins of law and order," the statement said.

The statement was signed by 15 imams — Islamic leaders — and Ahmed Al Mehdawi, president of the Islamic Center of Gainesville.

Sofian Zakkout, director of the American Muslim Association of North America, said Muslims should exhibit tolerance and control because violence only weakens America's sense of unity.

"Our enemies would be looking at us and laughing at us," he said. "We would be doing their job for them."

Bed-bug invasions on the rise

Students may have something to be itchy about.

Bed bug infestations are becoming more and more common on college campuses, crawling between the sheets with students and biting them while they sleep.

Their numbers have exploded in the past five years, said Wayne Walker, senior pest control technician for UF's Department of Housing and Residence Education. "Most of us in the industry believe it's because of increased international travel and truly a lack of awareness by most people that it is a problem," Walker said. "Most of the bed bug issues are brought in by people traveling in hotels and motels and ending

up back in their residence or them picking up used furniture."

A bed bug is a small, blood-sucking insect whose adult form is around a quarter-inch in length, Walker said. The bug is from the same family as stinkbugs, and if a lot of them are in one room, there is a noticeable smell.

Though the bugs are not known to transmit any diseases, their bite has been known to cause an uncomfortable itch and, in some cases, an allergic reaction.

Walker, as well as Roberto Pereira, another UF bed bug expert, said the problem has not affected UF's dormitories as much as it has affected other campuses.

In the past five years, there have been about four bed bug occurrences in the UF dormitories, Walker said.

However, graduate students have not been so lucky.

About four bed bug in-

- Look for black spots on linens.
- Pull sheets back; look around the box spring.
- Check around the bed.
- Beware if the room has a smell similar to that of a stinkbug.

How To Avoid Bed Bugs:

- Check your bags for bed bugs while traveling.
- Beware of bed bugs in used furniture.
- Call your local pest-control agency if you spot bed bugs.

Police say man leads hour-long chase in dump truck

SYRACUSE, N.Y. — Police said a 37-year-old man driving a dump truck led them on an hour-long chase over roads, rails and yards in the Syracuse area that ended with the suspect being shot.

The Onondaga County Sheriff said Stanley Lostumbo jumped into a dump truck Tuesday night after being accused of stealing from vending machines at a mall.

Police pursued the truck on a highway, through backyards and school grounds and

down railroad tracks at speeds up to 65 mph before stopping it at a barricade in East Syracuse.

Police said Lostumbo reversed the truck and hit a sheriff's vehicle and officers fired, apparently striking Lostumbo in the shoulder. He was briefly hospitalized for minor injuries.

Deputies were questioning Lostumbo. It was not clear if he had a lawyer.



UF info center opens at Santa Fe College

UF and Santa Fe College students seeking an online degree have a new UF resource available to them.

The grand opening of the UF @ Santa Fe Center, also known as the Gator Den, took place Wednesday morning.

Located in Building H of Santa Fe's Northwest campus at 3000 NW 83rd Street, the Gator Den is a partnership between UF and Santa Fe.

The goal of the facility is to provide easier access to online degree programs and help prepare transfer students for entrance into UF.

UF is currently offering online degree programs in business administration and sports manage-

ment through Santa Fe, but more will be added as the new program expands.

Steve Dorman, dean of the UF College of Health and Human Performance, said only a small percentage of adults in Florida have a bachelor's degree.

Because of these statistics, Dorman said, it is important to make education more available to residents across the state of Florida.

"This is two government agencies getting it right for the betterment of Floridians," Dorman said.

UF paid for the building's renovation, which cost about \$200,000, according to Santa Fe's website, sf-college.edu. UF and Santa Fe will split the cost of a full-time adviser/recruiter, who will give information about UF's distance-learning programs and transferring to UF.

festations are reported per year in graduate housing, Walker said. Off campus, the number of cases per year is even greater, though the bed bug problem is not as bad in Florida as it is in other states, Pereira said.

Students should immediately notify on-campus pest control if they discover bed bugs

in dormitories or graduate housing.

Bed bugs, particularly young ones, are difficult to see with the naked eye. Baby bed bugs are clear and about the size of a period on a printed paper, Pereira said.

When bed bugs feed, they defecate, he said. So, the best way to look for bed bugs is to look for black spots on linens.

Pereira, along with Walker and another professor, Phillip Koehler, came up with a simple

solution to the bed-bug problem — cook them. They put up walls around infested items, such as blankets, with Styrofoam panels, and then place a heater or fan inside to create, in effect, an oven.

They then monitor the temperature inside the "oven" until all the bed bugs are dead.


Though the design is simple and could be built at home, Pereira advised potential home

bed bug warriors to leave it to the experts.

Bed bugs are typically harmless aside from causing an uncomfortable itching sensation, although Walker said bed bugs could be harmful in other ways.

"When you share your bed with a bed bug, it's a traumatic experience of sharing your bed with something that feeds on you," he said. "So the trauma of it all and the mental anguish is an issue."



Fair touts benefits of alternative transportation

The battery helping to propel the bicycle did the rest.

This Sanyo Enloop bicycle was the newest display at the third annual Alternative Transportation Fair hosted by the UF Office of Sustainability.

Organizations such as Gators for a Sustainable Campus, Sustainable UF and the American Solar Energy Society set up tables at the fair to hand out brochures and help promote energy-efficient transportation alternatives.

The fair was held to help promote the One Less Car Challenge, which encourages students and faculty to use alternative transportation through Nov. 19.

Ashley Pennington, outreach coordinator for the Office of Sustainability, said she hoped the fair helped students and faculty become more aware of the many benefits of alternative transpor-

tation, such as riding the bus, biking or walking to school.

"By not taking a car to places, people don't have to pay for gas money and struggle to find parking spaces. They can also help the environment by helping to reduce pollution in the air," Pennington said.

The One Less Car Challenge is also directed toward making people more physically active.

UF Senior Veronica Urdaneta said riding her bike to school is a simple form of exercise for her.

"I'm not only helping out the environment, but I'm also doing good to my body by riding my bike around on campus," she said.

Students who visited the fair walked away with T-shirts, alligator-shaped erasers and other goodies from the different displays, in addition to being able to test drive the bikes.

The American Solar Energy Society showcased Photon, a solar-powered tricycle.

"There are so many options to get around campus besides driving a car, and Photon is proof that getting around can be interesting," said UF senior Sammy Shams.

Local used-car prices a bargain

■ NATIONAL USED CAR PRICES HAVE GONE UP.

Used-car prices are increasing nationally, but Gainesville consumers can still find good deals.

Research from Edmunds.com, an online resource that estimates car values, shows that the prices of used cars increased by about 10 percent nationally since last July.

But Ramon Young, a car salesman at Gatorland Pre-Owned Superstore, said he's seen no change in prices.

"People find used cars less expensive," he said. "They do research on new vehicles so we have to keep our prices down."

Today, the estimated national price for a three-year-old

vehicle is \$19,248, an increase of \$1,800 from last year's price. And in the last 12 months, used-car and -truck prices increased 17 percent and some sport utility vehicles are up 30 percent since last July, according to the United States Bureau of Labor Consumer Price Index Summary. The spike in prices may be a result of consumers' economic confidence.

"A lack of confidence in the economy is driving more people to used cars, putting upward pricing pressure on a limited supply of vehicles," said Joe Spina, a senior analyst for Edmunds.com, in a press release.

David Denslow, a UF economics professor thinks the increase in prices is also partly due to the Cash for Clunkers program, which paid people to trade in their old cars for new ones and thus increased the supply of used cars.

"Now that that's gone, people are holding onto their old cars so there's not much supply and it is holding up prices," Denslow said.

Area Internet may get Google boost

Gainesville Internet providers like Cox Communications, Gainesville DSL and Gator.Net advertise lightning-fast service; however, consumers are finding that their Internet access isn't always as fast as it is advertised to be.

A new report by the Federal Communications Commission shows that users are paying for speeds of 7-8 megabits per second on average, but are receiving only about half the speed they expect, usually around 4 Mbps.

"Cable modems can be problematic," said Jeff Shelton, a customer service support specialist at Gator.Net. "They can be affected by the weather and humidity. It's the same thing with DSL."

While advertisers are able to use the maximum speeds that their service may reach, service can slow down because of net congestion — a long delay between the server's transmission and the consumer's reception of information.

Around Gainesville

Though many users may not realize their Internet service is slower than advertised, some residents are trying to change the way Gainesville receives its Internet.

Dave Pokorney of UF Computing & Networking Services is campaigning for Google to build a fiber network in Gainesville, which would deliver data transfer rates of 1 gigabit per second.

"I'm very hopeful that it comes to Gainesville," Pokorney said. "This will make Cox and DSL look like dial-up does now."

Though many cities are competing to be the home of Google's gigabit fiber, Gainesville is a strong contender with help from groups like Gig 4 Gainesville.

If users want to check their Internet speed at home, they can test it at www.speedtest.net.

Campus, local groups weigh in on NYC mosque

Although hundreds of miles separate Gainesville from the site of the proposed mosque near Ground Zero, the issue resonates deeply for many Gainesville residents.

Local religious representatives are weighing in on the mosque, which has sparked much debate nationally as to whether an Islamic place of worship should be built near the site of the Sept. 11 attacks.

Ismail ibn Ali, the president of Islam on Campus, believes that having a mosque near Ground Zero is a good idea.

After hearing about the proposed mosque, Ali said that he never thought the location would cause such a contro-

versy.

"I see it as another building close by," he said.

Members of other religious faiths, such as Kristi Colson, the president of the Christian Student Association, believes Americans, no matter what their religious preferences, should be able to practice freely.

For Colson, the Sept. 11 attacks are not a reflection of the Muslim faith as a whole.

"The Sept. 11 acts were done out of religious zeal, but I trust that not all of them are like this," Colson said.

Others, such as Keith Dvorchik, the executive director of Hillel, had a hard time forming an opinion regarding the issue.

Initially, Dvorchik felt conflicting opinions when hearing about the anticipated mosque and Islamic center. He said the terrorist attacks still strike powerful emotions

with the public and placing a mosque near this site is very controversial.

He admitted to feeling a little skeptical at first about the prospect of having a mosque so close to Ground Zero given the political implications.

However, after doing some personal research, he said the public needs to remember that not all Muslims are terrorists.

"They have every right to [build] it there," he said.

One of the things that made him come around was that he believed the mosque would focus more on the community aspect and would have a positive impact.

Dvorchik believes that the ability to practice one's religion without fear of repercussion is something that, no matter what one's faith, should be respected.

"The beauty of America is that they have the right to do it there," Dvorchik said.

Southwest Rec debuts state-of-the-art hand scanners

Melissa Pender can be described as a gym regular. Five days a week, she, like many other UF students, travels to Southwest Recreation Center to take advantage of all the state-of-the-art equipment.

However, Pender has been plagued with a recurring problem that has hindered her workout plans—a lack of ID. Without her Gator 1 Card, Pender can't enter the gym.

"I must have lost mine at least three times since freshman year," said Pender, a journalism junior.

Now, as part of Southwest Rec's recent

multi-million dollar renovation, students such as Pender won't need to worry about missing a workout due to a lost student ID.

Instead of waiting in line to get their Gator 1 Cards swiped, students can enter Southwest Rec by punching in their UF ID numbers and placing their hand on the gym's newly installed HandKeys.

David Bowles, the director of the Department of Recreational Sports at UF, said the staff had to undergo training to learn the HandKey software.

In less than two weeks, more than 10,000 students have enrolled in the system to use the HandKeys, said Pamela

Hightower, coordinator of operations for UF's Department of Recreational Sports. Hightower said about 400 new students enroll a day.

With thousands of hands touching each machine a day some students have expressed concerns about the sanitation of the HandKeys.

"I never really thought about the cleanliness until I saw a really sweaty guy use the HandKey right before me," said Matt Heller, a freshman at UF.

Hightower said these students do not have to worry. The surfaces of the HandKeys are built with BioCote, an anti-microbial surface.

The HandKeys also undergo specialized weekly cleaning.

Although the technology is relatively new to UF, Southwest Rec officials remain optimistic the new feature will catch on.

"These HandKeys have the potential to be very useful in a lot of applications around campus," Bowles said.

Police kill hostage-taker at Discover Channel headquarters

A man who railed against the Discovery Channel's environmental programming for years burst into the company's headquarters with at least one explosive device strapped to his body Wednesday and took three people hostage at gunpoint before police shot him to death, officials said.

The hostages — two Discovery Communications employees and a security guard — were unhurt after the four-hour standoff. Montgomery County Police Chief Thomas Manger said tactical officers moved in after officers monitoring the gunman on building security cameras saw him pull out a handgun and point it at a hostage.

An explosive device on the gunman's body detonated when police shot him, Manger said. Police were trying to determine whether two boxes and two backpacks the gunman had also contained explosives.

A law enforcement official speaking on condition of anonymity because the investigation was ongoing said authorities had identified James J. Lee as the likely suspect. Police had not released the gunman's identity.

County Police and firefighters Wednesday night looked at a laptop screen that showed an image of a body lying face-up, surrounded by blood. Authorities also sent in a robot to disarm the explosive on the gunman's body. Police Capt. Paul

Starks said the suspect had shot a gun at least once. He also said police believe the suspect was acting alone but are investigating all possibilities.

NBC News reported that after its producers called Discovery's general number, a man identifying him-

self as James J. Lee got on the phone and said he had a gun and several bombs.

"I have several bombs strapped to my body ready to go off. I have a device that if I drop it, if I drop it, it will ... explode," the man told NBC.

He said he built the bombs in

about three weeks. "I did a lot of research. I had to experiment," he said.

Manger said the suspect held the hostages in the lobby area of the first floor. Authorities said they will methodically go through the building and identify any suspicious items.

Manger said police spent several hours negotiating with the armed man after he entered the suburban Washington building about 1 p.m. None of the 1,900 people who work in the building were hurt, and most made it out before the standoff ended.

Lee was convicted of disorderly conduct for a protest he organized outside Discovery's offices in February 2008. According to court records, he paid homeless people to carry signs and set off a scramble when he threw fistfuls of cash into the air, calling it "just trash."

Lee served two weeks in jail after his arrest during which doctors evaluated his competency to stand trial.

County State's Attorney John McCarthy said Lee was ordered to stay 500 feet away from Discovery headquarters as part of his probation, which ended two weeks ago. A magistrate ordered a doctor's evaluation, but the result was not immediately available Wednesday.

"The Discovery Channel produces many so-called 'Environmental Programs' supposedly there to save the planet," Lee said in an ad he took out in a Washington newspaper to promote the protest. "But the truth is things are getting WORSE! Their programs are causing more harm than good."

David Leavy, Discovery's executive vice president for corporate affairs, said all employees had been accounted for. "We're relieved that it ended without any harm to our employees," he said.



Christian philosophies shaped America

Allow me to begin by lobbing a grenade into the mine field. I believe our country's founding is inseparable from Judeo-Christian philosophies.

However, it is also an American's right to hold himself to the tenets, philosophies and practices of any religion, spirituality or non-religion he deems appropriate.

Recently, the "Restoring Honor" rally was hosted in Washington, D.C., with reports of more than 100,000 people from all demographics and backgrounds attending. The speakers reminded those listening to rely on God for relief from the burdens of life and associated hardships.

However, the fiery debate still rages between those who seek to eradicate all traces of Judeo-Christian philosophy from our government and those who seek to preserve those principles.

To separate the idea of civil rights from the Judeo-Christian principle of moral obligation and the idea of a higher power is to devalue our liberty as Americans. As Alexander Hamilton argued, to separate the two concepts is "the most manifest violation of justice." Espoused by Enlightenment philosophers such as John Locke and as stated in the Declaration of Independence, the rights to life and liberty are ordained from no less a power than God.

A 2007 Pew Forum on Religion and Public Life study found that about 75 percent of Americans are either religious or take no offense to public mentions of God on currency, monuments, etc. However, we still find our legal system entangled in cases to remove "under God" from the Pledge of Allegiance and to ban Bible study clubs from public high schools.

Yes, the classic separation-of-church-and-state argument has to come into play somewhere. Let's deconstruct this argument. The exact term "separation of church and state" is found nowhere within America's founding documents. Instead, Thomas Jefferson used the phrase to alleviate the concerns of a Baptist ministry that America would be prone to

adopt a specific Christian denomination. Jefferson makes the same point I would advocate by using that phrase. Essentially, he points out there is to be no specified or accepted practice of religion by the government.

This does not mean, however, our government cannot adhere to the Judeo-Christian philosophy in its operation. The wording of the First

Amendment supports such an idea, as well. The establishment and freedom of exercise clauses prevent specification on the part of the government.

At this point, I must caution us to the danger of separating God from government. If the secularist movement prevails and the idea of "inalienable natural rights as granted by God" is defeated, then what is to prevent the reinstatement of slavery or discrimination at the behest of a majority? When men are left to determine the rights of one another, those rights are in serious jeopardy.

In summation, this issue is of paramount importance to each of us, and at such a tumultuous point in American history we should all be standing up for the continued recognition of our inalienable natural rights, as endowed by God.

The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., in his famous "Letter from a Birmingham Jail," referred to "our constitutional and God-given rights." In that same letter, he also said those engaged in the civil rights movement were "standing up for what is best in the American dream and for the most sacred values in our Judeo-Christian heritage."

If we continue to diminish the role of religion in our political dialogue and exclude its manifestations from our public affairs, we will lose the essential foundation of our American rights and freedoms. Our natural rights are our foundation, our backbone, our promise and our future.

Single-entry visa policy for some int'l students unjust

As a UF student, you might take it for granted that you can visit your loved ones whenever you like. It takes but a single call to arrange a visit, a simple drive or, at most, a flight or two. Even if you are an international student, you can plan in advance to visit your family back home during summer or semester breaks.

But this is not true for all UF students. Being able to visit their families back home is far out of the imagination and reach for some international students. This is not because of financial difficulties, but instead because of their U.S. visa type.

Iranian students are subject to single-entry U.S. visas only. This means they are only allowed to enter the United States once. If they decide to leave, for any reason, they must re-apply for a U.S. visa, which means going through a long and cumbersome administrative process again that might take anywhere from a few weeks to a year.

Iranian students who dared to travel outside the U.S. during their studies here, have, many times, ended up losing a semester or two, or even their assistantship positions simply because of this unfair policy. Some even end up saying goodbye to their unfinished studies in the U.S. What makes the problem even worse is the U.S. has no embassy in Iran, an issue that forces students to travel to a third country in order to renew their visas.

This policy is a result of the bitter relationship between the U.S. and Iranian governments, which has roots in historical events, including the CIA-backed coup in 1953 that overthrew the democratically elected prime minister of Iran and the hostage-taking crisis at the U.S. embassy in Tehran in 1979 following the Islamic revolution in Iran.

Some American politicians say

this is a reciprocal policy in response to the same situation Americans face

if they travel to Iran.

However, this is not true. First, while it is true Iran does not offer a multiple-entry visa to U.S. citizens, it does however, allow them to leave and return to the country for a period of three months without obtaining a new visa. Also, all foreign nationals, including Americans, can renew their expired visas inside Iran, a privilege that Iranian students don't have in the U.S.

The single-entry visa policy for Iranian students contradicts even what President Obama pledged in his message to Iranians on March 20, saying "...even as we continue to have differences with the Iranian government, we will sustain our commitment to a more hopeful future for the Iranian people. For instance, by increasing opportunities for educational exchanges so that Iranian students can come to our colleges and universities."

To sum up, Iranians are very family and community-oriented people, and this harsh policy subjects Iranian students at UF and all other universities in the U.S. to unnecessary stress and frustration.

Imagine not being able to visit your family for four years. Is that really fair? Only hope keeps inspiring Iranian students to stay rather than return home. Hope for obtaining competence by studying at high-standard American universities, and hope for the day when tensions between the two governments ease and mutual interests of their citizens are valued.

John McCain doesn't represent the definition of 'maverick'

The blare of heavy artillery could be heard across Arizona last week as the state's Republican senatorial primary candidates battled for their political lives. When the final rounds were fired and the smoke had cleared, one man emerged victorious.

Vietnam War veteran, 2008 Republican presidential nominee and four-term United States Sen. John McCain claimed victory in last week's primary. He will now face off against Democratic nominee Rodney Glassman in hopes of serving his fifth, and quite possibly final, term as Arizona's senator.

Unfortunately, McCain's triumph in this primary election has proven that he is willing to do anything, perhaps even sell his soul to the devil, if it will forward his political career. It is clear that the man who once proudly declared himself a "maverick" is no longer worthy of the title.

Any Republican incumbent seeking re-election who is not Tea Party-certified faces the risk of losing his or her conservative credentials as well as a seat in the legislature. McCain and his opponent J.D. Hayworth both received Tea Party endorsements, but apparently McCain didn't believe being endorsed by a cabal of conspiratorial racists was enough to win a re-election.

In order to appease his political base, which has been corrupted by the Tea Party movement, McCain has disavowed many of the political positions that set him apart from his counterparts. His stances on climate change, cap and trade, immigration, campaign finance reform and "don't ask, don't tell" gained him the reputation as one of the most centrist members of the Republican Party, though he has flip-flopped on nearly all of these issues now that an election cycle has rolled around.

McCain's sudden change of heart on the issue of immigration and amnesty caused a kerfuffle. In fact, the Hayworth

campaign made amnesty the centerpiece of their anti-McCain crusade. But oddly enough, McCain now claims he never supported amnesty.

Apparently he wants his constituents to forget that he co-sponsored a comprehensive immigration reform bill with the very liberal Ted Kennedy that proposed, yes, an amnesty program for more than 12 million illegal immigrants. Now, McCain can be seen in overly-dramatic and poorly-produced campaign ads promising to build a "danged fence".

Furthermore, his support of the draconian SB 1070 has thrown many for a loop. How can a man who was at one point a proponent of amnesty come out in support of an immigration law that turns Arizona's police force into the Gestapo?

We all remember the 2008 presidential election when John McCain and the "Disasta from Alaska" drove onto the political stage in their "Straight Talk Express" being all "mavericky." A maverick is defined as "someone who exhibits great independence in thought and action."

A maverick does not pander to his base, nor does he seek to appease an unorganized political movement destined to be tossed into the trash heap of history.

John McCain is not a maverick. He is a sell-out, willing to sacrifice his principles in order to fulfill his political ambitions.

Last Friday, Mayor Craig Lowe came out, again, and in brilliant colors.

Gainesville’s first openly gay mayor has been immortalized by one of the city’s most enigmatic artists, Tom Miller, and the portrait was unveiled at local gay mecca University Club.

“He is somebody who will listen to anybody in this town no matter who you are or where you came from,” he said. The portrait is a mixed-media piece that depicts the mayor as a strong, proud figure, standing with his arms crossed and his head looking forward and up, as if to the future.

His body is a black and white picture pasted over large, horizontal stripes of the gay flag colors. His tie has been cut out so that the underlying colors shine through.

“This is my way of honoring him and letting him know that the artists in town like him, or at least I do,” Miller said.

With Morningbell, talent runs in the family

It all started on Christmas in 1994 with a pair of guitars, an Aerosmith record and a Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers tablature book.

Throw in years of absorbing The Beatles, The Flaming Lips and soul greats like Otis Redding and Curtis Mayfield, and the education of Morningbell’s brother duo Travis and Eric Atria was complete.

The Gainesville-based group, known for its psychedelic power-pop anthems and charm, is a family affair for the Atria brothers. With Travis covering vocals and guitar and Eric on bass, they share the stage with drummer Chris Hillman and keyboardist Stacie Atria (Eric’s wife).

The band is playing Common Grounds Friday to mark the digital release of “Sun Come Out,” a new EP featuring songs from the sessions from its 2009 outing, “Sincerely, Severely,” and for anyone who’s ever been a face in the crowd at a Morningbell show, it’s in the air: brotherly love.

And it’s taken time for the brothers to refine their roles in the band. Travis is the artistic force. As the

songwriter for the band, the younger Atria says his music has become more accessible, with lyrics that are less about outer space and more about life, love and sex.

“There’s more body. There’s more of a physicality to the music,” he said. “I wanted to make some-

thing that was undeniable.”

They agree their brotherly bond over music has only made chasing their artistic dreams easier.

“For us, it’s like the thing that keeps us going,” Eric said. “When we go on tour, we know how to live with each other.”

It could be surviving an on-stage hiccup or guiding a two-car caravan through New York City traffic. Either way, the Atria brothers take advantage of their family ties.

“We have a language between us,” Travis said.

The chemistry of the band as a whole is tangible on stage. Eric recounted a time when drummer Hillman missed a beat during a show. The band was able to adjust, in lock-step, to the rhythm with just a split-second glance at one another.

And it’s this chemistry that has guided the band through what Travis amusingly calls an “adolescent fantasy.” The band saw “Sincerely, Severely” attract national attention and bigger gigs. Since its release in December, Morningbell has played large-scale music festivals like South by Southwest and Bonnaroo, and they’ve had more critical acclaim than ever before.

“It feels like we’re just starting, in a way,” Travis said.

After nearly 10 years of paying dues, they found that their enthusiasm has crowds erupting at festivals just as they do in small clubs.





Defensive line given more freedom with Austin

Jaye Howard expects to get his hands on ball carriers more often this season, thanks to the leadership of first-year defensive coordinator Teryl Austin.

Howard said his role in the past, along with that of the rest of the defensive linemen, has been to merely occupy blockers so the Gators' linebackers could roam untouched.

"We had a freak back there in Brandon Spikes and we were just holding [offensive lineman] up for him, letting him do his thing," said Howard, who has recorded 37 tackles in two seasons.

But this year Austin wants his linemen to shed more blocks and get their own tackles.

"Anybody that's on the field for us, they have to be able to make plays," he said. "You have to do your job, and sometimes that requires holding the gap and then getting off to make a play."

Howard will have an even greater chance to get his name on stat sheets when he moves to defensive end, a spot he said he will occupy in some of Florida's packages this season. He expects the team to run multiple formations when Florida plays Alabama Oct. 2.

Although he said he likes the chance to mix his assignments, Howard would have been more excited about the move as a freshman. Entering school weighing just 230 pounds, Howard said he used to hang around the salad bar to keep weight off, hoping to avoid becoming an interior

lineman.

But, three years and about 80 pounds later, he now prefers playing inside and the contact that goes along with the position. He credits his weight gain to workouts with strength coach Mickey Marotti and "pancake diets" at the dining hall.

"You eat like a pig out there," Howard said. "I'm not used to eating that much."

Austin on recruiting: Austin has not coached college football since leaving Michigan for the NFL in 2002. He said staying on the phones and in the living rooms of high school prospects has been the most notable adjustment he's had to make.

He's noticed an increased amount of attention to recruiting websites and televised all-star games since joining the professional ranks.

"You never had to deal with that before," he said.

"You had guys, usually, coming in just trying to earn their way. With all the media stuff, sometimes they get like, 'Hey, you're ready to go.' But they really don't quite understand what it takes to be a college football player."

Jones moving around: The Gators have used all their linebackers at the strongside, weakside and middle positions throughout the preseason in an effort to make each player more versatile.

But A.J. Jones is the only member of the unit the coaches feel comfortable enough to play at all three positions in games this season, coach Urban Meyer said Wednesday. Last year, Ryan Stamper played a similar role.

"A.J. Jones is basically our Stamper,"

opposite Janoris Jenkins, and Austin said the decision will not be made until shortly before Florida's season opener noon Saturday against Miami (Ohio).

New defensive scheme leads to more Gators blocks

It was the best birthday present assistant coach Dave Boos could ever ask for.

With his team leading 14-12 in a decisive fifth set, juniors Kelly Murphy and Cassandra Anderson leaped in the air and sent the attack of Nebraska outside hitter Hannah Werth plummeting back to the floor, lifting the No. 6 Gators to a victory over the then-No. 2 Huskers and their first win against a top-two team since 2003.

"We joked beforehand that the team was going to win the match for my birthday," Boos said. "It was really nice to be able to have the team play so well that day."

Sunday's victory was significant for Boos due to more than just timing. His newly installed defense led to not just the win over Nebraska but also Saturday's victory against Iowa State.

Despite not boasting a player taller than 6-foot-2, the Gators out blocked a Nebraska team featuring 6-foot-5 Morgan Broekhuis, 6-foot-5 Lindsey Licht, 6-foot-4 Brooke Delano and 6-foot-3 Allison McNeal by a

count of 14 to 9.

In its three most recent matches against Nebraska, UF had never come within seven blocks of the Huskers.

"That was one of the key statistics and we've seen it year in and year out in volleyball," UF coach Mary Wise said. "Blocking is one of the really key skills needed to play at an elite level."

Boos joined the program in the

offseason to try to help the Gators excel in this crucial area, and the switch to his system appears to be paying immediate dividends.

Although a number of schools run a variation of the scheme Boos employs, very few, if any, do it exactly like he does.

"It's basically a way to have the front court and back court be very coordinated together as a defense," Boos said. "It allows us to take calculated blocking risks during a match, and this weekend I thought that the players did a fantastic job of executing what the gameplan was."

Although the players and coach-

es agree there is still plenty of room for improvement as the season progresses, Florida's 2-0 showing at the Runza/American Volleyball Coaches Association Showcase proves the system has the potential to be everything the team hoped it would.

"When the whole thing starts clicking together we should have six people responding as a unit, and that's the ultimate goal by the end of the season," Boos said.

Returning middle blockers Lauren Bledsoe and Anderson may have the most difficult time making the transition, as the pair is now

Redhawks to play Gators fresh off one-win season

Mike Haywood knows how difficult it is to play in Ben Hill Griffin Stadium.

Before he became the coach at Miami (Ohio), Haywood spent eight seasons as an assistant coach at Florida's conference rival LSU.

After visiting Gainesville four times as a coach, Haywood is well aware of the difficulties his team will face when it goes up against No. 4 Florida on Saturday at noon.

"We talked to our guys about going in and embracing the atmosphere," he said. "We are doing things in practice to give us

an advantage, like silent cadence and different things so we really don't need cadences on offense so we can get the ball snapped appropriately."

The Redhawks are coming off of a one-win season, but quarterback Zac Dysert has instilled hope. The sophomore signal-caller threw for 2,611 yards last year in 11 games, while also racking up a career-best 426 passing yards against Temple last season. His play has led others to compare Dysert to Miami (Ohio) great Ben Roethlisberger, but his coach isn't going that far.

"Due to his knowledge of the offense, [Zac] has become a leader on the field and off the field," Haywood said.

"He has the potential and as long as he

stays on track – I wouldn't compare him to [Roethlisberger] because he has a couple of Super Bowls – but he is progressing on that line where he can be a quality NFL football player."

However, Haywood wants to take pressure off Dysert by developing a rushing attack early in the season. The good news is the team's leading rusher, Thomas Merriweather, returns this year. The bad news is he only accumulated 291 yards in 2009.

"Offensively, we are coming together a lot better," Haywood said. "Dysert is leading us at quarterback, Merriweather

at running back and we are still trying to solidify our offensive line at this point."

On the defensive side of the ball, the Redhawks will try to improve after allowing 34.2 points per game last season.

They return middle linebacker Jerrell Wedge, who led the Mid-American Conference with 18.5 tackles for a loss last year.

Still, Florida running back Jeff Demps could be in line for a big day Saturday as Miami (Ohio) struggled to stop the run in 2009, allowing 186.9 rushing yards per game.

"Florida is a team with tremendous speed and we have to make sure we find a way to slow this football game down and limit their possessions," Haywood said.

Big East boasts expanded venues

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Louisville athletic director Tom Jurich heard the rumblings four years ago when he led the push to expand Cardinal Stadium.

Even though the program was in the midst of a record-breaking season in which it eventually won the Big East title and the Orange Bowl, Jurich knew some wondered if there really was a need to spend millions upgrading a stadium that was less than a decade old at the time.

"I took a lot of criticism, like 'what's this idiot doing?'" Jurich said.

Construction continued even as the program and the economy faltered. When Louisville and new coach Charlie Strong take the field against Kentucky on Saturday in the Governor's Cup, the Cardinals will do it in front of a sellout crowd of over 56,000.

The facelift includes 33 new luxury suites, over 1,700 club seats, an upper deck with 13,000 chairback seats and a south terrace that provides a view of the twin spires at nearby Churchill Downs.

"It's a big-time looking stadium right now," Jurich said. "This puts us in an elite group."

To keep up in the Big East these days, it's part of the game. Five years after the conference was left on life support after Virginia Tech, Miami and Boston College bolted for the Atlantic Coast Conference, the Big East is thriving both on the field and at the gate.

Rutgers finished a \$100 million renovation of its football complex last year.

"Since the reorganization, I think every school without exception has made a commitment to improving all facilities," said Rutgers coach Greg Schiano. "It's paramount for the continued growth of our league."

And interest is growing.

Average attendance in the Big East last year was higher than it was before Boston College split following the 2004 season. The current lineup averaged 44,804 fans a game in 2009, compared to 37,805 in 2004. Those numbers are skewed a bit by Temple, which averaged just over 16,000 fans during its final year in the conference.

Why the uptick in a conference prematurely pronounced dead a few times? Winning helps.

Schiano has revitalized Rutgers. West Virginia has won a pair of BCS bowls. South Florida has beaten the likes of Florida State to carve out a niche in the football-heavy Sunshine State.

Though Big East teams don't play in the sprawling palaces that can be found in places like the Southeastern Conference, that's not necessarily a bad thing.

expected to read the other team's attack and coordinate UF's response, both of which are responsibilities they didn't have to worry about last season.

But Florida's two starters have taken the new challenges in stride. And after such a successful opening tournament, they have no doubts that the move was a smart one.

"I think everyone is responding to it really well, and after seeing it this weekend it completely makes sense," Bledsoe said. "Nobody has any problems following along and jumping on board with it."

Anderson has been a consistent force at middle blocker over her first two years, leading the team in blocks both seasons.

Bledsoe, on the other hand, is relatively new to the middle blocker position after spending the majority of her time at outside hitter last season.

Her first match on the interior came on Nov. 20 against Tennessee, when Florida had just four matches

left in its regular season.

Bledsoe seized the opportunity, recording 45 kills, four solo blocks and 18 block assists in her final seven contests while earning a full-time spot at middle blocker in 2010.

After a full offseason of work at the position, Bledsoe expects her play to be even stronger than it was last year.

"It definitely helps to have one position and to have something to really focus on," she said. "To be able to work on just one thing versus everything will always help."

Hurricanes in talks about playing in Yankee Stadium

CORAL GABLES — Miami is looking to play at Yankee Stadium.

Hurricanes athletic director Kirby Hocutt engaged in talks with New York Yankees officials Tuesday and Wednesday about the possibility of Miami playing in the team's new ballpark during the 2013 season, and emerged believing an agreement could be struck.

"I feel confident to say the Miami Hurricanes are going to have a presence in New York City," Hocutt told The Associated Press.

No potential date, or opponent, has been revealed, although it's likely any game would take place in November because of the baseball playoff schedule. Hocutt said there are "a couple options" on the table, but stressed he wants to make sure any deal is the right fit.

"There's obviously a desire on our part to get up into this market," Hocutt said. "The Yankee organization, they've expressed their interest and desire to have the game in the stadium. So I'm confident that there's interest on both sides."

Miami already has 10 games — five home, five away — scheduled for 2013, eight of them being Atlantic Coast Conference matchups. The Hurricanes plan to host Florida on Sept. 7, 2013. Miami is scheduled to visit South Florida on Nov. 30 of that year in Tampa, the

Yankees' spring training home.

That leaves two non-conference dates for the Hurricanes still to fill, and if the Yankee Stadium plan comes together, their likely preference would be to make the sixth road game of the year a neutral-site contest in New York.

"I think it's great for college football and the University of Miami," coach Randy Shannon said. "You play teams outside of the conference a lot ... and it's an opportunity for us to be in the Northeast, which is a big University of Miami alumni base area."

Miami has already added one marquee non-conference, neutral-site game to its upcoming schedule. The **NCAA** Hurricanes will play Notre Dame at Chicago's Soldier Field in 2012.

There's a number of ties between the Hurricanes and Yankees — including Alex Rodriguez.

The Yankees' third baseman nearly enrolled at Miami before signing his first pro deal, has donated millions to his adopted university and is a member of the school's board of trustees. Rodriguez regularly works out at Miami during the offseason as well, but has not been part of these talks between the Hurricanes and the Yankees, Hocutt said.

Miami played in the old Yankee Stadium in 1962, losing to Nebraska in what was the final edition of the Gotham Bowl.
