# Gov. debate changes date

UF students might have the opportunity to hear from Florida gubernatorial candidates Alex Sink and Rick Scott much sooner than expected.

Rather than hosting the final debate before the Nov. 2 election, UF will host the first gubernatorial debate of this election season. The debate, organized by Florida Blue Key, has been re-scheduled from Oct. 26 to Oct. 4.

"Alex Sink feels very strongly that students are the future of our state and she is excited that the first debate will be held at the University of Florida," said Kyra Jennings, press secretary for the Alex Sink campaign.

Sink sent a letter to Scott on Monday proposing five debates in October, the first of which will be held at UF.

Debates will also take place in West Palm Beach, Doral, Davie and Orlando.

According to Jon Philipson, a member of Florida Blue Key and co-chairman of the event, the organization is still waiting for Scott to accept the date change.

## Officer, that's not me! Case of mistaken identity lands pastor in jail

SHREVEPORT, La. (AP) — A series of unfortunate coincidences led to a case of mistaken identity that put a Louisiana minister behind bars for nearly eight hours. Gregory Jones, pastor at Eden Worship Center, was pulled over for speeding and arrested as a man wanted for violating parole in Texas.

The minister not only had the same name as the wanted man, but the same birthdate — and a Texas driver's license.

So he wound up handcuffed and taken to a Shreveport jail.

Jones said deputies treated him well and assured him they were checking his claims. A photograph and fingerprint check eventually confirmed he wasn't the wanted man.

Caddo Lt. Don Gibbs said the department was sorry for Jones' inconvenience but committed to ensuring wanted criminals don't accidentally go free.

# Local group sues state over funding for education

A Gainesville political action group is suing the state to make education its paramount duty.

Citizens For Strong Schools is one of two political action groups suing the state to provide higher-quality education.

In 1998, a clause was voted into the state constitution that made

the state legislature's "paramount duty" to provide high-quality education.

In a motion to dismiss the lawsuit, the state argued that the legislature was responsible for deciding how best to adhere to the language in the Constitution. But on Thursday, a circuit judge in Tallahassee turned down the state's motion, allowing the case to move to trial.

"In the long run, we hope that

when we elect our officials, they understand that education is the lifeblood of any community," said Mark McGriff, the chairman of Citizens For Strong Schools.

The suit was arranged by the Southern Legal Counsel, which assembled a group

of plaintiffs that also includes the Orlando-based Fund Education Now, as well as concerned parents.

McGriff said it will probably take until 2011 for the case to see the courtroom, and then it could take one to five years to reach its conclusion.

He said ultimately, there is no specific goal, except to open up doors to discuss how to improve the education system.

"There is no ABCD list we're asking for," he said. "We just want our elected officials to sit and listen to us."

Jon Mills, a UF law professor and attorney representing the group, said there is precedent for the challenge, and similar cases have been heard in Ohio, Kentucky and Washington.

The state has until Sept. 9 to respond to the suit.

## Something fishy: Rotting shad cause stink in local lake

Lake Santa Fe, a popular fishing spot for Alachua County anglers, is full of dead shad.

Thousands of threadfin shad, a bait fish only 1 to 2 inches long, were reported dead and floating on the surface of the lake Saturday, according to Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Public Information Officer Karen Parker.

The suspected killer seems to be a combination of the summer heat and the cloudy,

rainy days of the past week.

A deadly chain of events begins when water temperature is higher than normal, sometimes reaching 90-degrees Fahrenheit. Water that reaches such high temperatures cannot hold as much oxygen as cooler water, creating higher competition among organisms living near the surface.

The recent cloudy skies also make it difficult for plants in lakes to photosynthesize, decreasing the oxygen content in the water.

And if the clouds cut off sunlight for a few days, primary oxygen producers such as algae will die and begin to decompose, which uses even more oxygen.

These conditions are the "classic setup" for a low dissolved oxygen kill, and threadfin

shad are among the first species to be affected, according to North Central Region Fisheries Administrator Allen Martin.

Jill McGuire, president of the Santa Fe Lake Dwellers Association Inc., an environmental watch organization, said Florida Lakewatch, part of UF's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, tested the lake's water and found nothing abnormal.

"We're feeling a lot better," she said. "We were pretty nervous Friday."

McGuire said there are millions of threadfin shad in Santa Fe Lake, and that because they are small and sensitive to heat changes, they are the first to die when the temperature changes quickly or when oxygen is low.

"Hopefully it hasn't damaged the total population," McGuire said. "I think that's doubtful, as many as they are."

Parker, from the FWC, said that quick die-offs of fish populations are normal and aren't a cause for concern. Parker said the biggest concern now is the rancid smell from the rotting fish.

"It's not a pretty sight," she said.

But anglers who enjoy Lake Santa Fe have seen kills like this before. Robin Chiappini, owner of Chiappini's Bait & Tackle in Melrose, isn't concerned about any lasting effect on the fishing.

"The fishing is still really good, and the shad should spring right back," Chiappini said.

# GED holders get free educational services at Santa Fe

Any GED-holding student in his or her first semester at Santa Fe College is now eligible for free tutoring, mentoring and seminars through the Pathways to Persistence program.

The three-tiered program focuses on mentoring, tutoring and seminars. Each student starts with ten hours of tutoring, and additional hours are added as necessary.

Dan Rodkin, director of Student

Life at SFC, said free tutoring is provided throughout the student's first semester. Additional tutoring programs are available for successive semesters.

Tutor Matching Services, a Gainesville start-up company that uses a Facebook application to match students with tutors, is arranging the tutoring and mentoring for SFC.

Rodkin said there are 23 registered mentors and more than 100 tutors in the system.

Dr. Angela Long, student life and activities coordinator, said 40 percent of the GED population at SFC drops out in the first semester.

these students since most drop out within the first two weeks.

SFC Student Body President Aus-

tin Brinza said he wants to see the program implemented throughout Florida and eventually throughout the country.

"It's not just about Santa Fe," he said. "If it works here, then it should work throughout the state."

The pilot project, Pathways to Persistence, is based on a proposal presented to U.S. Undersecretary of Education Dr. Martha Kanter and to the U.S. Department of Education policy analysts in late July.

Currently, the program functions

as the local model. The second phase is a state model, and the third is a national model.

The group plans to show the success rates of Pathways to Persistence at the end of the fall semester to receive further funding for the project. The pilot program is funded by SFC.

"This program has the potential to improve the status quo, and should it receive funding, could serve as a model program," Rodkin said.

# Historic city in south Pakistan saved from floodwaters

THATTA, Pakistan — Thousands of people streamed back to this historic southern city where new levees hastily built from clay and stone held back floodwaters that have inundated much of Pakistan.

But thousands who fled the waters that inundated neighboring towns complained Monday about the shortage of food and water as they camped in a vast Muslim graveyard on a hill near Thatta city.

Hordes of people ran after vehicles distributing food and water near the graveyard, a chaotic effort that left many flood survivors — especially the old and infirm — with nothing. Some drank rainwater pooled on the ground.

"I cannot run after food and survive the maddening rush at this age of mine," said 75-year-old Nasima Mai, who fled with her extended family, mostly women and children.

"They throw food from the truck like animals are given food," she said.

Authorities said they were trying to provide food and shelter to the hundreds of thousands of people camped out on the hill in Makli.

But as in other areas of the country, the scale of the disaster has overwhelmed both local capacity and the international partners trying to help.

"We are trying to set up a tent city in different parts of Makli so that the distribution (of aid) could be organized," said Hadi Baksh, a disaster management official in southern Sindh province.

The floods started about a month ago in the northwest after extremely heavy monsoon rains and have slowly surged south along the Indus River, devastating towns and farmland.

More than 1,600 people have died and 17 million more affected by the floods.

Authorities struggled to save Thatta on Sunday, building new levees with clay and stone across a major road to hold back floodwaters that inundated the nearby town of Sujawal. Many of Sujawal's 250,000 residents had already fled, but the water damaged houses, schools and other buildings in the town.

Most of Thatta's 350,000 residents had also fled in recent days but began to return to the city as the danger passed, said Baksh.

## Hurricane Earl batters Caribbean, threatens East Coast

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — Hurricane Earl battered tiny islands across the northeastern Caribbean with heavy rain and roof-ripping winds Monday, rapidly intensifying into a major Category 4 storm on a path projected to menace the United States.

Already dangerous with sustained winds of 135 mph (215 kph), Earl is expected to gain more strength before potentially brushing the U.S. East Coast this week and bringing deadly rip currents.

The U.S. National Hurricane Center in Miami warned coastal residents from North Carolina to Maine to watch the storm closely.

"Any small shift in the track could dramatically alter whether it makes landfall or whether it remains over the open ocean," said Wallace Hogsett, a meteorologist at the center. "I can't urge enough to just stay tuned."

In the Caribbean, Earl caused flooding in low-lying areas and damaged homes on islands including Antigua and Barbuda, Anguilla and St. Maarten. Several countries and territories reported power outages. Cruise ships were diverted and flights canceled across the region.

"We are getting a battering with wind and rain," said Martin Gussie, a police officer in Anguilla. Several utility poles were down and a couple of roofs had blown away, and it was still too dangerous to go out and assess the full extent of damage, he said.

The storm's center passed just north of the British Virgin Islands on Monday afternoon.

It was gradually moving away from the Caribbean and was forecast to approach the U.S. Mid-Atlantic region around Thursday, before curving back out to sea, potentially swiping New England or far-eastern Canada.

The Hurricane Center said it was too early to say what effect Earl would have in the U.S., but warned it could at least kick up danger-

ous rip currents. A surfer died in Florida and a Maryland swimmer has been missing since Saturday in waves spawned by former Hurricane Danielle, which weakened to a tropical storm Monday far out in the north Atlantic.

Craig Fugate, administrator of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, said Earl's approach ought to serve as a reminder for At-

lantic coastal states to update their evacuation plans.

"It wouldn't take much to have the storm come ashore somewhere on the coast," Fugate said. "The message is for everyone to pay attention."

Close on Earl's heels, Tropical Storm Fiona formed Monday afternoon in the open Atlantic. The storm, with maximum winds of 40 mph (64 kph), was projected to pass just north of the Leeward Islands by Wednesday and stay farther out in the Atlantic than Earl's northward path. Fiona wasn't expected to reach hurricane strength over the next several days.

The rapid development of Earl, which only became a hurricane Sunday, took some islanders and tourists by surprise. At El Conquistador Resort in Fajardo, Puerto Rico, people lined up at the reception desk, the lights occasionally flickering, to check out and head to the airport. There, more delays awaited.

John and Linda Helton of Boulder, Colorado, opted to ride out the storm. The couple, celebrating their 41st wedding anniversary, finished a cruise Sunday and planned to spend three days in Puerto Rico.

"There was a huge line of people checking out as we were coming in, and I thought it was just that summer vacation must be over," said John Helton, a real estate appraiser. "But we paid for the room, so we might as well stick it out."

"I don't think we could get a flight even if we wanted to leave," Linda Helton added.

There were no reports so far of major damage from Earl.


A boy takes cover from a wave in Fajardo, Puerto Rico on Monday caused by the approaching of the Hurricane Earl, which is on track to hit the United States.

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

## Ignoring intolerance solves nothing

The Dove World Outreach Center's hateful plan to burn Qurans on Sept. 11 prompts a lot of responses from people.

There are folks who decry this extremist group's plan but believe any response gives Dove the attention it seeks. Their solution is to just ignore this open act of aggression against Muslims.

There's another group who believes Gainesville should respond to Dove but ought to do so indirectly by holding separate events on different days promoting peace, tolerance and love.

I fall into a third camp.

It's because I believe Gainesville is a crucial battleground in the fight against hate and bigotry that I will march and protest against the Dove World Outreach Center on Sept. 11.

It's understandable why many people are reluctant to directly protest the burning of Qurans. Ideally, Dove wouldn't receive any media coverage, and it would be ignored on the sidelines as the fringe group it is.

That didn't happen.

The New York Times ran a full story on one of Dove's repugnant events

last Thursday. In July, CNN's Rick Sanchez interviewed Terry Jones, the pastor-turned-architect of this hateful act.

Various Turkish media outlets began preliminary coverage on the event last week, and I've been told Al-Jazeera — the largest international news network in the Arab world — will be present to cover Dove on Sept. 11.

The truth is that discrimination against Muslims and racism toward Arabs is widespread and pervasive in

the United States. Although very few Americans agree with Dove's methods, far too many people are complicit in the kind of fear, intolerance and hate that lie at the root of this horrible event.

It's precisely this spirit of exclusion and hostility that fuels support for conflict in the Middle East and Asia.

Ignoring racism and bigotry doesn't have a very good track record of success.

On Sept. 11, the world will fix its attention on Gainesville for a reason other than the Gator's football skills.

The reactionaries and extremists from the Dove World Outreach Center want our town to be defined by hostility toward Muslims, and whether it's five or 50 people burning Qurans, we're going to be judged internationally based on our responses to this hateful act.

Will people leave the USF game and go home, believing that by not standing against Islamophobia they were somehow depriving the extremists of the attention they seek?

Or will Gator fans of all races, genders and faiths come out in droves to show the world hate and marginalization aren't welcome in Gainesville?

I want to be judged based on the latter.

Students for a Democratic Society is organizing a peaceful but direct protest against the burning of Qurans, and it will meet Monday at 6:30 p.m. in Anderson, Room 32. Anyone interested in fighting hate is welcome to come and help plan this event.

# Florida primary results show media predictions mean little

A guy walks into a bar. He gets a drink, stands up and says, "All politicians are crooks." A man in the corner replies, "Hey, I resent that." First guy asks, "Why, are you a politician?" Man in the corner says, "No, I'm a crook."

Be that as it may, Floridians received both politicians and crooks a week ago today in its primary election, and thanks to media coverage, everyone and their mother knows it.

Touted as the "end of incumbency" and the time when angry voters would show Washington politicians just how angry they were, Tuesday's results showcased none of that. Well, maybe some of that, but it's hard to separate voter intent from the sheer amount of money spent in this year's gubernatorial election. This election was the most expensive in Florida history at about \$70 million spent, and about three-fourths of that coming from Rick Scott's personal bank account. The Senate race, too, has redefined the notion that "money doesn't grow on trees."

Jeff Greene threw in about \$30 million of his own money to beat sitting Congressman Kendrick Meek. Of course, both Scott and Greene's money trees were planted using questionable soil. Scott defrauded the government as the CEO of a mega-hospital and Greene bet against the housing market before it fell.

Stand-up guys, I'm sure.

This trend isn't limited to the Sunshine State, either. Nationwide elections are spending

just as much, and a few individuals are even trumping Florida in the race to buy, sorry, win the election. California gubernatorial candidate Meg Whitman made her money as CEO of E-bay and is now working up a hefty bid for governor. To date she has given \$100 million (yes, million) to her campaign. Another CEO, Carly Fiorina, has given

\$5.5 million to her Senate campaign, which seems like pebbles in this environment. I'm not sure if they've been paying attention to anything other than annihilating their opponent, but their state of California they so desperately want to represent is currently in a budget deficit. I'm no mathematics expert, but \$100 million can buy a lot of government programs. Perhaps it would send a better message to voters if the candidates just paid off the state's debt instead of wasting it on attack ads. If anything, it would at least demonstrate their dedication to reducing the deficit. Then again, attack ads are so much fun to watch.

Consequently — and this is a piece of news for all the self-funders out there — a recent study by the National Institute on Money in State Politics found only one in 10 of self-funders won between 2000 and 2009. I don't even want to think about the amount of money wasted there.

Back in Florida, the national media ran stories about how "shocking" it was that Scott beat McCollum. The "political outsider" message was a reality! Voters are actually rejecting career politicians! The pundits were right! And look at Jeff Greene! He lost.

That's right, \$30 million worth of calling Meek a scum of the earth "career politician" got him nowhere. It's an interesting dichotomy, and pundits are quick to analyze why Scott could buy, sorry again, win the election but Greene couldn't. Is it just Republicans that are full of incumbent hatred?

Maybe it takes \$50 million to fully saturate the TV market, and Greene's paltry \$30 million just didn't cut it. Or maybe Medicare fraud is somehow less ethically offensive to voters than betting against the housing market and riding around Cuba in a yacht.


Maybe it's a combination of all the above. I tend to disagree. At the end of the day, it comes down to Election 101. Meek had a stronghold base of African American voters as he faced a guy that behaved like a typical rich guy. Greene didn't interact with the voters nearly as much, and he used his money without a clear message. Meek had better name recognition, was a better established Democrat the voters knew (he took his current seat in Congress after his mother retired from it), and he started early. Greene's attack ads came on too late in the game to have any real effect.

The Republican race for governor was a completely different story. It was close all the way to the wire with both sides attacking each other for unethical behavior, both spending a lot of money (obviously Scott spent more), and both traveling throughout the state (McCollum more than Scott). It was 46 percent to 43 percent at the end of the day a week ago today. I call it a toss up. They both had equal negative attacks against them, McCollum had the more damaging "career politician" label and voters picked what they thought would be the lesser of two evils.

Interestingly enough, the third and lesser-known candidate, Mike McCallister, was able to get 10 percent of the vote with only \$8,000 spent, a result of voters hating both Scott and McCollum. In contrast, the Meek-Greene percentages were more decisive, at 58-31.

So, a note to the media: nothing is what it seems in elections. Voters decided based on a myriad of reasons, and as much as the pundits like to analyze the why, it comes down to an age-old notion: What happens in the voting booth stays in the voting booth — unless, of course, you have a giant money tree in your backyard and you can just buy the voting booth — I hear Rick Scott's is blooming this time of year.





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## Lemmens, Trattou face tall task of replacing DE pair

■ POWELL AND GREEN TO PROVIDE DEPTH AT DEFENSIVE END.

Many unproven players will take on prominent roles for the Gators this season, but perhaps no position will need to replace as much production as defensive end.

Seniors Justin Trattou and Duke Lemmens will be charged with taking over for Jermaine Cunningham and Carlos Dunlap, two second-round NFL Draft selections, when Florida opens up its season Saturday against Miami (Ohio).

Coach Urban Meyer said junior William Green and freshman Ronald Powell will be counted on to provide depth to the rotation, and starting defensive tackle Jaye Howard could see some time at end.

Trattou has logged seven sacks in his career, but Lemmens and Green have combined for just three sacks in their time at UF.

"There's one known commodity, but there's a little bit of a rotation we're going to run, especially on Saturday," Meyer said.

**Opening up the playbook:** Just as Saturday's game against Miami (Ohio) will give UF a chance to test its defensive end depth, it will also give the Gators an opportunity

to see what they have on offense.

No one expects Florida to dig deep into its playbook out of necessity, but that won't keep Meyer and offensive coordinator Steve Addazio from seeing how their new players perform in the offense.

Meyer said he plans to use every package against the Redhawks, including some single-wing plays with Trey Burton and under-center packages with John Brantley.

"You'll see the whole gamut this week," Meyer said. "We're doing everything we

can. Some people say, 'What do we save?' Save it? We've got a bunch of new players."

Wide receiver Deonte Thompson and running back Jeff Demps are the only returning offensive starters at skilled positions. Meyer added that receiver Andre Debose, who previously worked in the slot with Chris Rainey, will move to "X" receiver and serve as Thompson's backup.

**Open linebacker spots down to two:** Meyer announced Monday that senior A.J. Jones will start Saturday's game at strong side linebacker, where Jones played along Brandon Spikes and Ryan Stamper a season ago.

Meyer didn't, however, announce that senior Brandon Hicks will start at weak side linebacker. Instead, Hicks is expected to be in a rotation with sophomore Jon Bostic and redshirt freshman Jelani Jenkins at middle and weak side linebacker.

Bostic and Jenkins were thought to be competing for the middle linebacker spot, but the coaching staff has preached versatility to its linebacking corps, something Bostic was weary of initially.

"At first I was like why was I rotating, but then I saw the good thing that we did was start rotating," Bostic said. "Because if somebody goes down in this spot, somebody else can step in there without bringing somebody else in who may not be as talented in that position."

## Linemen excited for tweaks in Gators' offense

Florida's offensive schemes will remain a bit of a mystery until the season gets underway this weekend, but count left guard Carl Johnson among those who want to see a bruising running game.

"That's every hog's dream, to play in the mud," the 355-pounder said.

And with the amount of talent on the offensive line, letting Johnson & Co. get their hands dirty would be a smart move.

The Gators' expected line of Marcus Gilbert, Johnson, Mike Pouncey, James Wilson and Maurice Hurt (from left to right) is UF's most grizzled offensive unit with a combined 81 career starts.

Gilbert, Johnson and Pouncey started all 14 games in 2009, anchoring the nation's 10th-best rushing attack and sixth-best total offense, and Johnson has little doubt they can repeat the feat this season — even without playmakers Tim Tebow, Aaron Hernandez and Riley Cooper.

"It's a team effort and a joint effort, and we're just going to prove everybody wrong," Johnson said. "People are thinking we don't have [Tebow] and we don't have that will, but the offensive line is the strength of any team no matter who the quarterback is."

"And I feel like we have the best offensive line in the nation, hands down."

Quarterback John Brantley will pose a different challenge for the line as far as protection.

Without the inside running or scrambling skills Tebow leaned on, Brantley will spend more time in the pocket and less dodging defenders.

That's not necessarily a drawback, but it is a change of pace, and Brantley is making sure he's on the same page with his linemen.

"I was texting [Pouncey] last night, and we want to get together once a week and sit down with the entire offensive line and watch tape with them," Brantley said. "We're just trying to figure out a time where we can sit down once a week and just watch film of the opponent and spend some time together."

He may want to get especially close with Gilbert, who'll be manning his blindside in the season opener against Miami (Ohio) on Saturday.

A right tackle last season, Gilbert flipped sides because of injuries to sophomore Xavier Nixon (knee) and redshirt sophomore Matt Patchan (wrist), both of whom will miss at least the first game, UF coach Urban Meyer said.

Gilbert said he hasn't felt much of a difference since the switch, but Johnson, a former left tackle, pointed out that Gilbert's opposition will be tougher than on the right side.

"Those ends are ridiculous on the left side," Johnson said. "It's the [Southeastern

Conference], and it's as close as you can get to NFL football. [Gilbert is] a great athlete, and the whole left side is going to be veteran with me, Mike and Marcus."

But there's one big piece missing from the middle of the line.

Maurkice Pouncey, a first-team All-American in 2009, is now with the NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers, and Mike Pouncey will have to fill his shoes while adjusting to his first football season without his twin as a teammate.

"It is different, but [me and Maurkice Pouncey] have become accustomed to it knowing that someday we would have to part ways in life. All of the other offensive linemen are like my brothers, and we are here to do one thing: make it to [the SEC Championship]."

Mike will replace Maurkice at center, and he's already found a new partner for the pregame ritual he used to share with his brother.

Instead of having his twin strap on his shoulder pads for him, Mike Pouncey said he'd have Gilbert do it.

day?

"Not at all" is the easy answer. Fear of oversimplifying aside, sports equals entertainment. And this game won't be fun to watch. Don't be surprised if most of the fans in your section are gone by the third quarter.

But a disappointed reaction is shortsighted. Florida vs. Miami (Ohio) is not just about an easy win. The game, along with the seven other matchups pitting top-10 teams against overwhelmed opponents this week, is about sports theory.

On one end of the spectrum sits

the NFL, a wildly popular form of American socialism priding itself in parity. College football sits on the other end of the spectrum, a capitalist venture that would make Ayn Rand proud.

The NFL rewards the worst teams each year by giving them the earliest selections from a pool of talented new players. In turn, those players are punished by having to work for the worst teams. And those eight-figure salaries don't offset the punishment. Players would get the same contracts if the best teams had a chance to sign them, too.

The market for the most talented players enrolling in col-

lege, meanwhile, is regulated by football's version of the invisible hand. Players can choose where they want to play, and teams must create the best programs to sell those players.

The value of both structures is subjective, so it is pointless to debate which is better. And neither league will ever change its system. The NFL is pulling in about 16.6 million viewers for each regular season game, and forcing teenagers to enroll at certain colleges should be left to irresponsible parents.

But understanding the differences between the two systems and why each one works helps

explain uneven games like Florida vs. Miami (Ohio).

Socialism is not inherently bad in all business. Because the worst NFL teams get the first draft picks, fans know their teams (outside of Detroit) are potentially one year away from a playoff run.

Building a championship contender in college football is more challenging. But a capitalist system forces teams to overcome disadvantages in interesting ways. Boise State and Texas Tech have been fun to watch because their programs were built on undervalued players and untraditional offenses.

Still, rebuilding a team like

Miami (Ohio) seems daunting following a 1-11 season, and Redhawks fans would benefit from drafting the best high school talent. In the meantime, they get stuck facing the Gators.

The average point differential in Florida games last season was 28, twice as high as the point differential in games involving the New York Jets and Minnesota Vikings, pro teams that reached similar heights to those of Florida in 2009.

But don't worry if you're really excited about this Saturday. You probably just really miss football.

Or you're a communist.
