Medical school icon dies

He joined the staff in 1958

For more than 50 years, Dr. W. Jape Taylor watched the UF College of Medicine grow from a start-up school to one that is well established in the medical community.

Taylor, who joined the staff in 1958 as its first chief of cardiology, died in his sleep March 22 at age 86.

He left behind a legacy at UF as one of its finest professors. Throughout his teaching career, he was known as one of the toughest and best teachers in the college.

"He was a tough bedside physician because he demanded that you know what you were doing when you presented a case," said Mark Barrow, a retired physician who was a member of the class of 1960, the first class of students to graduate from UF's medical program.

The biggest lesson Barrow said he learned from Taylor was to completely concentrate on a patient when he was talking to him or her and to never let his mind wander during the conversation.

Barrow recalled seeing his former teacher at a class reunion last fall and how emotional the experi-

ence was.

"We were all extremely close and held him in the very highest regard," Barrow said. "A lot of the people hadn't been back for 50 years, and they hugged him and kissed him."

Taylor was born in 1924 in Booneville, Miss. He attended Yale University as an undergraduate student at 16 before earning a medical degree from Harvard Medical School in 1947.

He didn't originally plan to become a doctor, said Dr. Michael Good, dean of the College of Medicine, in an email to faculty and staff announcing Taylor's death.

Crowd limited for Daniel Tosh

If you're going to see comedian Daniel Tosh in the O'Connell Center on Wednesday, bring your Gator 1 ID.

Although the show was originally to be open to 8,000 people, Student Government Productions and Accent announced last week that only 4,900 UF students and members of the faculty will be permitted to attend.

Tosh, who is used to performing for crowds of about 2,000, said he is uncomfortable performing in front of that many people, said Student Government Productions Chairman Kyle Calhoun.

He said because Tosh wanted the atmosphere to be smaller, Calhoun decided to limit the show to UF students only. This is the first time the organization has had to place a limit on a crowd.

"This sucks," Calhoun said. The free tickets will be distributed on a first-come-first-served basis beginning at 7 p.m. The show will begin at 8 p.m.

Calhoun said Tosh is one of the most-demanded and successful college acts. He has performed at more than 700 campuses across the nation.

The comic is most famous for making fun of popular YouTube videos on his Comedy Central show, "Tosh.0." He has also made appearances on "The Late Show with David Letterman," "Jimmy Kimmel Live!" and "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno." Tosh will get \$66,000 for his performance.

UF to defend title at fishing championship

Jake Gipson and Matt Wercinski won a national championship last year by a 9-ounce margin.

This year, they hope to take home another title.

Gipson, a recent UF graduate, and Wercinski, a senior general business major, will be defending the championship title in the second National Guard FLW College Fishing National Championship

on Thursday through Saturday.

The competition is hosted by Murray State University in Kentucky and the winners will receive \$100,000 in cash and prizes.

Last year, the UF team brought home \$25,000 in scholarship money for the university, \$50,000 to the bass club, of which both men are members, and a boat as victory prizes.

"It was pretty awesome to win," Gipson said. "And it was

LOCAL Five Guys opens second location

Students and residents have a new place to get their burger fix as Five Guys Burgers and Fries opened a second restaurant in Gainesville on Tuesday.

The restaurant, located at 4222 NW 16th Blvd., brought in about 500 people and made about \$4,000 in sales on its first day. The restaurant did not offer specials, discounts or gimmicks on its opening day.

"We have a good product," said restaurant manager Brandon Foster. "People get what they pay for. They get a great burger."

In 25 years, the burger chain has expanded to more than 750 locations in 40 states and in four Canadian provinces.

Foster said the chain has plans to grow even more.

"We are not going to stop with this store," he said. According to the restaurant's website, 200 restaurants are planned to open this year.

Foster said customers have been stopping by the restaurant days before the grand opening constantly asking when it would open.

"Customers are ecstatic," he said. "I don't think they could be any happier."

Project ponders whether college is waste of time

UF student Kyle Eschenroeder is working on a project that explores one question: Is college a waste of time?

Eschenroeder's soon-to-be website and documentary explore the college decision and other alternatives.

"We're stuck on this path from kindergarten to 12th grade, and there's not an easy way out until you graduate high school," he said. "That's when you can make a huge decision to stay inside the system or blaze your own path."

SelfMadeU will go live May 1 and consists of a free e-book with case studies that follow individuals in their 20s to success without receiving a degree or attending college at all.

The joint project is geared toward three groups of people: students graduating high school and wanting to travel, people who want to work as freelancers or start their own businesses, or those ready to work.

The documentary starts filming Friday. It will be a yearlong project compiling what is considered to be the most interesting aspects of the website to viewers.

Kevin Schlenker, a subject in a case study for the project, started an online retailer of car audio equipment at 19. Last year, he did \$280,000 worth of revenue and expects to do about \$500,000 this year, according to Eschenroeder.

"It's much more important to understand the market you are working with," Schlenker said. "In my situation, I deal with car audio products. Knowing the industry is something critical that can't be learned out of a business degree."

WUFT to offer Spanish news

For those with an HD radio, WUFT-FM will now be coming through the airways in two languages.

The radio station has announced a new addition to its HD lineup, WUFT AHORA, a 24-hour Spanish programming channel.

The channel, which has been in the works for about four months, will be found in the 89.1 HD-3 slot.

Randy Wright, UF's executive director of media properties, said he expects the station will go on-air Monday, but said the launch date is subject to change.

"We see this as an opportunity to provide a real difference for students who will be entering the job market," he said. "And if they have the ability to truly call themselves a bilingual journalist and to have experience actually doing newscasts

in Spanish and in English, then we're giving our students a real advantage when it comes time to get the job."

At first, the new station's content will be taken from NPR's national Spanish-language programming, but the station will gradually ramp up its local broadcasts as time goes on, he said.


Local content will be generated by bilingual UF students working in the broadcasting field, though the format currently centers on news and talk radio, Wright said.

Because the station is on an HD frequency, those with regular radios will be unable to access to the programming.

Wright said the station is unique in that it is the first foreign-language station offered by a prominent journalism college.

Richard Branson plans deep-ocean submarine dives

NEWPORT BEACH, Calif. — Billionaire adventurer Richard Branson on Tuesday unveiled a new single-person submarine that he said will be used to set new world records by exploring the five deepest parts of the world's oceans.

Branson said that over the next two years, the solo craft will go to the bottom of the Mariana Trench in the Pacific Ocean, the Atlantic's Puerto Rico Trench and South Sandwich Trench, the Diamantina Trench in the Indian Ocean and the Molloy Deep in the Arctic Ocean.

Branson's fellow explorer, Chris Welsh, plans to make the first descent later this year to the Mariana Trench, which at 36,000 feet is deeper than Mount Everest is high. Branson then plans to explore the 28,000-foot-deep Puerto Rico Trench.

While the pilots for the other three trips have not been chosen, Branson said they hope to set as

many as 30 Guinness World Records with the dives.

"The last great challenge for humans is to explore the depths of our planet's oceans," the Virgin Atlantic founder said at the Newport Harbor Yacht Club.

A news release said there was only one frontier left for Branson's Virgin brand, which has reached "the seven continents of the earth, up into the jet stream and soon, even into space."

"If someone says something is impossible, we like to prove it's possible," Branson said. "I love learning and I'm just very fortunate to participate in these kinds of adventures."

Branson unveiled the submarine, a nearly 18-foot long, white-and-blue airplane-like craft with stubby wings and a cockpit.

The carbon fiber and titanium craft will be capable of cruising for about 6.2 miles and can stay down unaided for 24 hours. The sub and its accompanying catamaran cost an estimated \$17 million.

Branson said his so-called Virgin Oceanic expedition will have a scientific and educational purpose. He hopes the voyages will help to educate the public about mankind's impacts on the world's oceans and marine life.

He is partnering with Scripps Institution of Oceanography in San Diego, Monterey Bay Aquarium Research Institute and Moss Landing Marine Labs in Northern California as well as other research institutions. Scientists hope to study the tectonic plates and eventually use lander vehicles to bring back water, microbes and possibly small creatures from the ocean depths.

"We have 800 pounds of moon rocks and not one drop from the bottom of the ocean," said Alex Tai, Virgin Group director of special projects.

The dives will be dangerous and the pilots will likely be down in the dark and cold ocean depths for hours with little communication with the outside world. Rescues will be impossible, Welsh said. Still, he was clearly more excited than wary of the prospect, saying there is a magic to exploring new places.

"It's like going to the moon and having the lunar rover to explore around," Welsh said.

The dives also will be recorded and uploaded to Google Earth, said John Hanke, the Internet search engine's vice president of product management.

"Our mission for Google Earth is to create an interactive virtual globe and enable users to visit places that they've never explored, including the world's oceans," he said.

The submarine originally was commissioned by Branson's close friend and fellow adventurer Steve Fossett, who died in 2007 while flying a plane over the Sierra Nevada. Fossett had intended to complete

the first solo dive to the Mariana Trench, Branson said.

Branson also said he plans to create a larger submarine that can hold more people and offer trips to tourists for a sizable fee.

Last year he unveiled a three-person submarine called the Necker Nymph, which is available for \$2,500 a day for guests of his private resort in the Caribbean. The submarine, created by San Francisco-based Hawkes Ocean Technologies, is capable of going almost 100 feet deep. In a subsequent interview with Popular Mechanics, Hawkes officials said they were also working with Branson on submersibles capable of high-speed deep sea travel.

Branson has also been working on a space tourism venture with the construction of a \$209 million spaceport in New Mexico. The British businessman has said he expects to launch the first sub-orbital flights from Spaceport America between mid-summer 2011 and spring 2012.

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

Vouching For It

Budget proposal won't solve Medicare problems

Threatening the sacred cow carries dire consequences for politicians.

The budget Rep. Paul Ryan proposed for the GOP focuses on cutting back both Medicare and Medicaid. Everyone understood it wasn't going to be popular, and chances are that it won't pass. However, it gives us an opportunity to remember how much money these programs siphon away from all the other items the government addresses.

While we applaud Ryan for boldly trying to attack the deficit problem at its roots, we also have to call him out. Ryan painted switching to a voucher system for Medicare as saving money over the long run, and although we are excited at the prospect of freeing up federal money without losing the level of care our seniors receive, we realized it was too good to be true. If switching to private companies kept all factors the same other than the lowered price, wouldn't everyone have been on board with the idea by now?

The fact is the combination of corruption and higher rates — as demonstrated through the Medicare Advantage plan — will cost us even more in the long run. Rep. Ryan, we'll give you points for trying to go against the grain to cut spending, but you need to recheck your numbers, especially when you're proposing deeper tax cuts. Unfortunately, there's no simple solution that doesn't involve directly harming the American people.

But, hey, what do we care? By the time we retire, that whole Medicare thing is likely to be a relic of the past.

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Man stabs friend for denting car

Kyle Gamble might have been in trouble for the damage to his mom's car, but he only made it worse by breaking a knife off in his roommate's back.

Gamble, 18, was arguing with his roommate, Lou Calhoun, in their house on Southeast 12th Terrace at about 3 a.m. Tuesday morning, according to a Gainesville Police report.

Gamble accused Calhoun of taking his mom's car around town and driving through dips in the road at high speeds, causing damage to the vehicle.

Gamble became so angry during the ensuing argument that he grabbed a small knife and drove it into Calhoun's back, breaking the handle off the blade.

Gamble removed the knife before police and paramedics arrived, but when they did, they found a half-inch cut in the middle of Calhoun's back.

Though the injuries weren't life threatening, Calhoun was taken to Shands at UF.

Gamble told police he had been friends with Calhoun for two years and admitted that he had been upset with his friend for wrecking his mom's car.

He also admitted to the stabbing and was arrested on a felony charge of aggravated battery with bond set at \$20,000. He has since been released from the Alachua County Jail.

really exciting to win the first ever one."

Gipson said that last year, they were in 11th place after the first day of competition.

He didn't think they had a chance.

"It was probably some of the hardest fishing we've ever had," he said.

So he and Wercinski decided to just have fun on the second day and ended up in second place.

On the final day, Texas State University, the leading team from the day before, had caught 29 pounds and 1 ounce of fish.

The UF team had 29 pounds and 10 ounces of fish.

In the tournament, teams from schools across the country fish for three days, from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., using artificial bait to catch the five heaviest fish. After the first two days, the totals are added and the top five teams go to the final, third day of competition. The winning team will have best total weight from all three days.

Chad Gay, the public relations manager for Forrest L. Wood Outdoors, which started the tournament last year, said UF has won a majority of the \$1 million FLW has given to winners.

"The University of Florida has just dominated," he said.

Since 2009, when the FLW added a college section to the national- and pro-level fishing competitions, the number of college teams has grown from about 90 to almost 500.

Out of those 500 teams, 25 will be competing in the championship this year. Two teams will be from from UF.


Gipson and Wercinski form one team, and Dennis Croyle and Travis

He was interested in pursuing zoology or biology as a career until the U.S. Navy recruited him during World War II to become a physician.

As a doctor, he practiced medicine, taught aspiring physicians and conducted medical research.

While at UF, he also established a chapter of Physicians for Social Responsibility, a nonprofit organization that advocates the prevention of nuclear warfare and the reduction of the environmental effects of toxic degradation and global warming.

Although Taylor retired from teaching in 1996, he remained involved with university affairs and remained close with his friends on the faculty.

Parker Small, Jr., professor emeritus of pathology and pediatrics at UF, played tennis on Sundays and bridge on Mondays with Taylor for years. They became friends after Small joined the UF staff in 1966.

Taylor had a competitive spirit, whether he was playing tennis, bridge or another game, Small said.

In addition to being a good teacher, Taylor was also "the doctor's doctor," he said. He was the personal doctor of several of his colleagues, which showed his clinical skill and the respect his fellow physicians had for him.

His family is planning a memorial service that will be held later in the spring, Good said.

Taylor is survived by four sons and three grandchildren.

Taylor's wife, Audrey, died three years ago after 60 years of marriage, Barrow said.

"He was ready to go," he said. "I dearly miss him and always will, but we all have to go. That's the way it is."

His funeral will be held Thursday in St. Augustine.

Students to perform German opera at Phillips Center

A narrator stepped onto the stage in an olive tunic holding an empty three-ringed binder.

"Once upon a time," he said.

But this wasn't a fairytale.

A 20-foot-long golden snake tried to eat a prince, a birdcatcher with a net and a birdcage strapped to his back had his mouth sealed with a golden lock and everyone sang in German and spoke in English.

Student actors rehearsed an opera by Mozart, "The Magic Flute," Tuesday night. It will

be performed Thursday and Saturday at 7:30 p.m. at the Phillips Center for the Performing Arts.

About 150 UF students worked on the production, a classic German opera about failure and forgiveness.

The cast members are students in Opera Theater Workshop, which the show's director, Anthony Offerle, teaches to give students real-world experience with theater.

Cody Laun, the UF music graduate student who will play the prince, said he's learned more on stage than he ever has in a classroom.

He said being on stage teaches you how to work as a team while under pressure, and the rush of excitement is indescribable.

"There's nothing like being on stage in front of 2,000 people," he said.

The orchestra members, the chorus and the stagehands are also students, Offerle said.

Mary Steffel, a 29-year-old marketing post-doctorate fellow, said singing in the show's chorus is a way for her to disconnect from the stress of her research, which focuses on consumer behavior.

"It's easy to be totally consumed with one's work," she said. "For four hours in my life, my primary concern is being actively engaged in telling a story."

Around Gainesville

Offerle said the performance cost between \$20,000 and \$30,000, which includes renting the set, hemming the costumes and staff payroll. The cost will be paid for by ticket sales, which are \$15 for students and \$25 to \$40 for everyone else.

Since the show was set up to help students

learn to perform, Offerle had some help with the funds. He said the Sarasota Opera House rented out its sets for Offerle to use, the Operafestival di Roma let him borrow the costumes for free and employees from the Phillips Center helped with behind-the-scenes work.

If this show was done in a non-academic setting, he said, it would have cost no less than \$175,000 to rent the set for its full market price, rent the costumes and pay a full staff.

He said he's grateful for the contributions because he's seen how much his students enjoy performing.

While some of them will continue performing, he said, others put in the time for the love of the arts.

"We have people who are going to go on to all sort of walks of life," he said, "but they'll be music lovers forever."

Envoys dangle financial offer to key Gadhafi aides

LONDON — It's an offer that diplomats hope Moammar Gadhafi's family and top aides can't refuse: If they publicly withdraw support for the Libyan dictator's regime, the restrictions on their assets and travel plans could be made to vanish.

The U.S. Treasury and Britain's Foreign Office have spelled out the details of the proposal, and discussions are now under way at the European Union ahead of a meeting of foreign ministers next week. Talks on the proposed deal will also take place among U.N. Security Council members if any of those named under U.N. sanctions flee from Libya and renounce Gadhafi.

Gadhafi's seven sons, a wife, his daughter, two cousins and other allies who have served him for much of his rule are all being given a chance to escape international blacklists and reclaim billions of dollars of seized funds.

But some critics recoil at the thought, wondering whether the incentives will set a bad precedent for giving billions back to possible plunderers or even if the measures will work to oust Gadhafi.

The offer came as Gadhafi's forces unleashed a withering bombardment on the rebels outside a key oil town Tuesday and a U.S. envoy met with the rebels in the eastern city of Benghazi in a possible step toward diplomatic recognition.

The EU will decide next week whether to lift a travel ban and asset freeze imposed on Moussa Koussa, the former Libyan foreign minister who escaped from Tripoli last week, flew into Britain and is now providing information to intelligence officers and government officials in the U.K.

"There are talks going on this week ahead of meetings in Europe next week," a Foreign Office spokeswoman said, on customary condition of anonymity in line with

policy.

The U.S. Treasury on Monday removed sanctions it had imposed against Koussa, saying lifting the measures "should encourage others within the Libyan government to make similar decisions to abandon the Gadhafi regime."

It's likely that EU diplomats will also discuss how to handle other potential defectors attracted by the terms of the international community's deal.

British Foreign Secretary William Hague told lawmakers that anyone among the 25 people listed on an EU sanctions list and the 16 named in measures approved by the U.N. could escape the restrictions if they recant their backing for Gadhafi, and if allies agree their actions should be rewarded.

"In the case of anyone currently sanctioned by the EU and U.N. who breaks definitively with the regime, we will discuss with our partners

the merits of removing the restrictions that apply to them," Hague said.

The U.S. Treasury has 13 senior Libyan officials on a blacklist, including Gadhafi, his wife and sons, and plans to announce sanctions against other Libyan officials in the coming days.

Oliver Miles, a former British ambassador to Libya, said the offer to lift sanctions could help pile pressure on Gadhafi.

"It will encourage people to defect and therefore reduce the political support which Gadhafi enjoys," Miles said. "That's the only way in which a solution is going to be reached."

Others aren't convinced.

"It's a carrot-and-stick tactic that frankly hasn't worked very well in the past, but we're reaching a critical point that we have to try various approaches," said a European intelligence official, who spoke to

The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the discussions.

Miles said the most damaging move would be if any Gadhafi relatives took up the deal.

"If a close family member were to come out openly and defect, that would also be valuable," he added.

Details of the assets each individual Libyan has had seized have not been disclosed by the U.N. or the EU, and officials are still checking the details of bank accounts, stocks and properties that regime insiders own.

Yet Britain's treasury said, so far, it calculates those named under the sanctions hold assets worth about \$20 billion inside the U.K. The Netherlands said it has frozen \$4.5 billion in Libyan assets, and Sweden estimates that Libyan assets there are worth around \$1.6 billion.

One relative of a victim of the

1988 Lockerbie airline bombing — act of terror that British officials are questioning Koussa about — said he was troubled to see longtime regime insiders being offered financial incentives to abandon Gadhafi.

In 2003, Libya acknowledged responsibility for bombing Pan Am Flight 103 over the Scottish town of Lockerbie, an act that killed 270 people, mostly Americans.

"It's kind of distasteful what they have to do," said Bob Monetti, of Cherry Hill, N.J., whose 20-year-old son Richard was killed in the Lockerbie blast. "[But] they're doing whatever they can to isolate Gadhafi to the point where he's alone — and that's a good idea."

Despite the international offer, Hague has insisted that no members of Gadhafi's regime will be granted immunity from prosecution for past crimes — even if they help topple Gadhafi.

But others suggest Koussa might win leniency.

Luis Moreno-Ocampo, the prosecutor of the International Criminal Court, wants to interview Koussa for his investigation into possible atrocities in Libya, and has named Gadhafi and Koussa as possible suspects responsible for crimes against humanity.

Yet Moreno-Ocampo offered an olive branch Tuesday to Koussa, hinting that he may not be prosecuted.

"If you cannot stop the crimes, defecting is a way to avoid criminal responsibility," Moreno-Ocampo said. "So we would like to understand why he defected, what happened and we're trying to interview him."

Scottish authorities will interview Koussa in the next few days over the 1988 Lockerbie bombing. And in France, families of those killed when a French plane was blown up in 1989 over Niger — killing all 170 people aboard — have demanded that Koussa also answer questions about that attack.



Anthony DeSclafani wasn't used to this. Not this season, at least.

Florida's normally reliable right-hander was one out away from improving to 4 for 4 in save opportunities before allowing a two-run double to UCF shortstop Darnell Sweeney, and the Knights downed the No. 4 Gators 4-3 in McKethan Stadium on Tuesday night.

Clinging to a 3-2 lead in the top of the ninth, DeSclafani (4-1, 1.99 ERA) was called from the bullpen after lefty reliever Nick Maronde allowed a lead-off walk to UCF's Beau Taylor.

DeSclafani quickly struck out the first batter he faced before Ryan Breen's fly ball dropped in center field, putting runners on first and second with only one out for the

Knights (20-9).

Florida's junior pitcher rebounded with another strikeout, putting the Gators (24-6) one out away from a fourth straight home win.

Then, DeSclafani ran into Sweeney.

The UCF shortstop crushed a double over center fielder Tyler Thompson's head, and with it, he dashed Florida's hopes of a midweek win.

"I'm not going to sit here and talk about Disco," Florida coach Kevin O'Sullivan said. "That guy has been nails for us all year long. He's made pitches all year long, and that happens. This is the game of baseball."

"If we get into the same situation Friday night, he's getting the ball."

DeSclafani's blown save came just an inning after junior Jeff Moyer appeared to come through with a game-deciding knock of his own.

With the game deadlocked at 2-2 and pinch runner Paul

"I think more than anything what we want to do is go out and have a very functional scrimmage. We want to go out and execute on both sides of the ball," Muschamp said Tuesday. "What I want to

do is play physical, play with toughness, get in two-back, run the ball, stop the run defensively, and do those things in the scrimmage.

"It's not going to be real flashy."

Sounds like fun, right?

Sure, as Muschamp said, it's important to see how some of his younger players respond in front of a crowd in a big stadium, to evaluate how they perform at a faster tempo and to find out how physical they're willing to play.

WR Dunkley suspended

Redshirt freshman wide receiver Chris Dunkley has been suspended for academic reasons, Florida coach Will Muschamp said Tuesday.

Muschamp added that Dunkley has been suspended for "parts" of spring rather than the whole spring season.

"He just academically needs to handle some things," Muschamp said. "So that's where we are right now."

Dunkley came to UF as a four-star prospect and the No. 9-rated wide receiver in the country, according to Rivals.com.

He caught 34 passes for 721 yards and four touchdowns in his senior season at Pahokee High but was hampered by a nagging hamstring injury that led to his eventual redshirt last season.

POSITION CHANGES: As Florida undergoes sweeping transitions on both sides of the ball, some of the Gators are making changes of their own.

Gerald Christian spent his freshman year working at tight end before switching to linebacker this spring.

But now, the 6-foot-3, 232-pound sophomore is consistently taking snaps on both sides of the ball.

"(Christian has) done some nice things for us at tight end, and we're going to continue to rep him in there at linebacker," Muschamp said.

Muschamp praised Christian for his effort and performance on both units, adding the decision on Christian's permanent position will be made after the spring season concludes.

"He's battling in there," Muschamp

Fontana leaves game with head injury, status unclear

UCF's Darnell Sweeney hurt the Gators in more ways than one Tuesday night.

In the seventh inning of the Knights' 4-3 victory, Sweeney, the eventual hero with his go-ahead two-run double in the ninth, hit a fly ball into shallow left field. Florida shortstop Nolan Fontana backpedaled from his position, chasing the seeing-eye single into a crowd of Gators outfielders.

After the ball dropped, Fontana's body drilled the ground, and his head hit the grass. The Gators' leadoff hitter rolled in pain for several minutes while receiving medical treatment.

Fontana was able to walk off without assistance, and coach Kevin O'Sullivan said Fontana was fine leaving the field.

But when asked about his condition, O'Sullivan said, "I haven't even talked to [team trainer John Barrett] yet."

O'Sullivan also said he didn't see the play, but he "thought" Fontana's head hit the ground.

The shortstop, who was 0 for 4 before incurring the injury, was removed from the game. Sophomore Cody Dent was inserted into the

lineup, grounding out in his only plate appearance.

"He's a competitor, and no one wants to see him off the field," junior Jeff Moyer said. "It's tough when your big shortstop goes down like that."

Fontana, a sophomore and freshman All-American a year ago, has led off every game this season. He is tied for first on the team with 23 RBIs and leads UF in on-base percentage, triples and walks.

No timetable was given for his

possible return, and the Gators have limited options if their shortstop should miss any significant time.

OLD WOES CONTINUE: After busting out of their hitting slump during last weekend's sweep of Tennessee,

the Gators reverted back to their former struggles Tuesday night.

Florida's issues of stranding runners struck again, as its Nos. 1 through 3 hitters went a combined 1 for 13, including an 0-for-5 night from Daniel Pigott (.357).

"We left 10 guys stranded again," O'Sullivan said. "It's a frustrating loss."

UF's coach said it's tough to have big innings with the new bats, which makes it essential to execute fundamentals.

"Those are the things that are kind of hurting us right now," he said.

ETC: Austin Maddox continued his recent surge with two more RBIs Tuesday night. In the past four games, the sophomore has knocked in six runs on six hits after going 11 games without an RBI.

"I was scuffling a little bit early, but I just went to work and just tried to relax up there and have some fun," he said. "That's what I've been doing these last few games and it's been working out."

Tyler Thompson made several nice plays in center field, starting just his seventh game of the season. With two men on in the fifth, the junior made a running catch to end the threat. With the game tied in the eighth, he robbed UCF's Chris Taladay of extra bases with a jumping grab at the wall. ... Moyer's single in the eighth was his fifth pinch hit this season.

Moyer came through with his fifth pinch hit of the season by lining a single up the middle and scoring Wilson from second, putting Florida ahead 3-2.

"O'Sullivan called my name again, and I was just looking for that clutch hit," Moyer said. "I've been trying to stay positive with not swinging the bat good lately, but

coach trusted in me to get the job done."

But Moyer's effort was for naught, as the Gators' normally stout bullpen gave up the two runs, and the lead, in the ninth.

"If you score three runs, it's going to be a dogfight to the end," O'Sullivan said. "[UCF] seemed to get a big hit when they needed it."

Prior to Moyer's pinch-hit RBI, the Knights kept the Gators' batters off-balance for seven innings with an array of pitchers.

UCF emptied its bullpen, as seven pitchers combined to hold UF to seven hits on the night and just one run after the first inning.

Aside from starter Chase Bradford, UCF's pitchers were nearly lights-out. Bradford struggled with his control and gave up a two-RBI single to Austin Maddox, who pitched 2.2 scoreless innings of relief.

But that was all the Gators would be able to put together before Moyer's late-inning knock.

"I'm not going to make any excuses for our hitters," Maddox said. "We've got to do a better job at the plate."

Florida's offensive line has also been mixed up this spring, as sophomore and former tackle Ian Silberman has made the permanent shift to guard and redshirt freshman Chaz Green is playing at both tackle spots.

Sophomore Jonotthan Harrison has also seen his role change, as the former guard has been working at center throughout the spring.

INJURY UPDATE: Muschamp added another name to Florida's growing list of spring injuries Tuesday.

Freshman cornerback De'Ante Saunders strained a hamstring in a recent practice, putting a damper on what Muschamp called "a really nice spring."

Saunders joins a litany of running backs and offensive linemen who have missed practice time due to injury.

Currently, redshirt senior Chris Rainey is the only running back involved in spring practice, and Muschamp said last week that UF had only seven functional offensive linemen.

The lack of linemen could lead to a few changes in the Orange and Blue Debut, Muschamp joked Tuesday.

"I may line up at left tackle," Muschamp said. "I wouldn't want to be the blindside there, but we'll be fine. The kids will work through it and we'll manage it."

That's what spring practice is all about, especially with the new staff and a group of unproven players moving into leadership roles.

It's a time where nobody actually knows anything, where everyone's guess is as good as the next person's — where any player can be as great as you want them to be.

BRINGING HOME THE HARDWARE

Here's a quick rundown of several Gators who captured weekly and yearly awards in their respective sports this week.

HUDSON RANDALL / BASEBALL

After throwing a complete-game shutout against Tennessee on Friday, Randall was named the Southeastern Conference Pitcher of the Week for the second time in the past three weeks. The sophomore pitcher is sporting a perfect 5-0 record and a miniscule 0.54 ERA this season while holding opposing hitters to a .189 batting average.

ASHANÉE DICKERSON / GYMNASTICS

Dickerson shared National Association of Collegiate Gymnastics Coaches' Southeast Region Gymnast of the Year honors with Georgia senior Cassidy McComb. The sophomore All-American, who will lead the Gators into the NCAA Championships on April 15-17, is the only Florida gymnast to ever receive the honor, and she has done so two years in a row.

KITTY CULLEN / LACROSSE

Cullen was named the National Offensive Player of the Week by WomensLacrosse.com after recording a school-record seven goals in Florida's win over Penn State on Saturday. Cullen, the nation's leader in goals with 56, also took home her second consecutive American Lacrosse Conference Offensive Player of the Week honor.

ALEX CERCONO / TENNIS

Cercone was selected as the SEC Women's Tennis Freshman of the Week after a 4-0 performance that included her fifth consecutive singles victory in UF's wins over Vanderbilt and Kentucky. Cercone has now received the honor three times this season. In addition to running her singles record to 7-1, the freshman improved to 6-0 in doubles.

JEFF DEMPS / TRACK AND FIELD

Demps was named the SEC Men's Runner of the Week on Tuesday after running the nation's fastest time in the 100-meter dash in front of his home crowd at the Florida Relays last weekend. Demps ran a 10.07 (+2.2), the top wind-aided mark in the world this season. The junior sprinter also anchored the Gators' third-place men's 4x100-meter relay team.

CORY MCGEE / TRACK AND FIELD

Two first-place finishes helped McGee earn SEC Women's Freshman of the Week honors Tuesday. She took home the women's 800-meter run with a time of 2:07.45, the ninth-best time in the nation, and helped the Gators' sprint medley relay team win its event at last weekend's Florida Relays.

JEREMY POSTIN / TRACK AND FIELD

Postin earned the SEC Men's Field Athlete of the Week award after posting a UF-record 65.09m/213-6 mark in the hammer throw at last weekend's Florida relays. Postin broke his own record with the performance and currently ranks ninth in the nation and third in the SEC in the event.



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
