



Taco Bell to close its doors

Tacos on campus will soon be much harder to come by.

Today at 8 p.m., Taco Bell will close its location at the Reitz Union, a UF official confirmed.

Mike Mironack, the Union's director of operations, said the decision was made between the Taco Bell franchise and Gator Dining Services, though he couldn't give specific details as to why.

The manager of Taco Bell was also not allowed to say why the restaurant was closing; she could only say it would not be around for Summer B.

Student Life Calls and emails to Gator Dining were not immediately returned.

The loss of the campus' Taco Bell means students will not be able to get a meal on campus for less than \$1.

Whether it was a Cheese Roll-Up for 89 cents or a Beefy 5-Layer Burrito for 99 cents, Taco Bell has always been a cheap alternative for students on a budget.

The cheapest meal available in the Reitz Union will now be a slice of cheese pizza from Papa John's for \$2.50.

The Reitz Union has no current plans for a new business to move into the Taco Bell space, Mironack said.

"We are not 100 percent sure how we are going to use the space at this point," Mironack said.

Graduate student Andrew Stewart said he eats at Taco Bell

UF parking services rolling with budget punches

Despite ongoing budget concerns across UF, the amount of parking citations issued on campus has decreased.

Scott Fox, director of Transportation and Parking Services, describes the department as more like a business than a department of the university, because it creates its own revenue and does not receive revenue from the state, university or student tuition.

Its revenue depends on decal sales, visitor parking, fines, special events, meter parking and other sources.

This past year the net decrease

of the department's revenue was estimated at \$454,452. The office has cut some of its expenses by deferring some "non-essential" projects, such as bus shelter construction.

They have also decreased staff, eliminating four employees by not filling open positions.

Fox stated they had not fired any personnel.

"You don't want to fire people, even in a tough budget climate," he said.

Fox said the expenses for the office have also increased. "Imagine the electric bill we pay to light 13 garages 24/7," he said.

Also, the office is expected to spend \$60,000 to add more ener-

gy-efficient lighting.

Fox also said the office would be spending more than \$1 million to maintain the structural integrity of said 13 garages, protecting the \$50 million dollar asset.

The office will increase decal prices by 6 percent in the coming year, an increase that would allow the office to have a budget cushion of about \$45,877, just 0.39 percent of the department's budget.

The 2009 revenue from fines was about \$1.7 million. The office expected the revenue to increase to \$1.95 million, but instead it fell to \$1.4 million.

"We are writing fewer tickets than ever before," Fox said.

He said a couple of years ago the office would write about 100,000 tickets. This past year it wrote about 79,000 tickets, of which 5,000 were dismissed after being appealed.

More than 18,000 tickets were appealed in the last year, a figure that does not include many students who didn't bother with the appeals process.

He explained that when an appeal is made, the Student Traffic

Court, a group of unpaid student volunteers, reviews it.

He also spoke about the second level of the appeal process, where one can appeal his or her ticket to a council of faculty members to try to protest their denied appeal.

"Sometimes we make a mistake," Fox said.


For many violations, the office takes photos to have evidence to the reason of the citation.

The office also takes photos when cars are towed. Fox said the photos help provide accuracy during the appeals process.

More than 6 percent of parking citations are dismissed.

"I think you get a pretty fair judgment," Fox said.

Porn actress claims Weiner asked her to lie about conversations

NEW YORK — A former porn actress who exchanged emails and messages over Twitter with Rep. Anthony Weiner said Wednesday that he asked her to lie about their interactions, while a growing chorus of lawmakers pressed for his resignation as the scandal enveloping the congressman enters its third week.

Weiner has told friends he wanted to speak with his pregnant wife, Huma Abedin, before deciding whether to resign. She

returned to Washington early Wednesday from a trip to Africa with her boss, Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton.

Nightclub dancer Ginger Lee is the latest in a series of women who said they received sexually charged messages from the seven-term congressman. The scandal began when Weiner posted a picture of his underwear-clad crotch on Twitter, then lied about it and said his account was hacked.

Oregon officer named Byrd rescues young hawk

PORTLAND, Ore. — It's the kind of story that creates its own headline — Byrd Rescues Hawk.

Oregon's KGW-TV reports that Portland Police Bureau officer Cage Byrd — his real name — spotted a young red-tailed hawk standing outside a downtown hair salon on Tuesday.

The raptor chick appeared to be injured, so Byrd grabbed some towels and a box from a nearby hotel and took the hawk to a veterinary hospital.

The bird was later taken to the Audubon Society, which says the hawk probably fell from a nest near the KGW Audubon Raptor Cam. The remote camera records the activity of a raptor family and is shown on a website that has become popular.

One of the three chicks sustained a leg injury last week.

Eminem takes the big stage as rap rules Bonnaroo

MANCHESTER, Tenn. — After a little more than an hour of a hard-as-nails set that had the bikini-clad rumps shaking at Bonnaroo, Eminem thanked the crowd and left the stage.

Nearly 80,000 fans chanted "Shady! Shady! Shady!" in a thunderous roar for five minutes until hip hop's angry king returned to the stage for a triumphant encore of "Lose Yourself," capping the day rap took over

Bonnaroo.

Saturday kicked off with Big Boi and Lil Wayne laying down early morning sets — inexplicably overlapping — shortly after Arcade Fire's Friday night finale, and the takeover continued with Wiz Khalifa on the big stage during a hot afternoon set before Eminem destroyed his Bonnaroo debut.

The event is known more for its granola-flavored ethos than its urban cool, but Jay-Z turned in one of the most memorable sets in the festival's 10-year history in 2010, and expectations were high for Saturday's takeover — the most concentrated collection of star MCs at Bonnaroo.

The day was full of odd juxtapositions. Khalifa dropped his hit "Black & Yellow" while just a few hundred yards away Mumford & Sons tore through a set of fiery folk rock as fans watched over a nearby fence and from atop ATMs.

Later in the evening, a reunited Buffalo Springfield set up Eminem's show with a fiery rendition of Neil Young's "Keep on Rockin' in the Free World."

Eminem was in top form, fast and angry as he stalked the stage in long camouflage shorts and a black T-shirt. He thanked his fans for standing by him before launching into "Not Afraid."

Bonnaroo's crowd may be a hippie enclave, but you wouldn't have known it Saturday night as most fans rapped right along with Eminem, brightened the sky with lighters to the Slim Shady and Royce Da 5'9" s "Lighters" and played along to a naughty call-and-response before "Love the Way You Lie."




Campus program to debut in Summer B

The Office of the Provost is introducing a new program, called Creative B, which is an effort to refresh UF campus life from June 27 to Aug 5.

Proposed in 2010, the program is a collaboration of the Colleges of Fine Arts, Performing Arts, Journalism and Communications, and Engineering.

Other campus agencies, like Student Affairs and the Smathers Libraries, are joining in an effort to boost campus creativity. Live performances and unique academic opportunities will also be part of the program.

"We are hoping that momentum carries through to the fall and spring," said Andy Howard, manager of marketing

and alumni affairs at the College of Fine Arts.

At its core, Creative B is a promotional effort as opposed to a curriculum track.

■ THE TEMPERATURE HIT 102°

Reaching 102 degrees Fahrenheit, temperatures in Gainesville broke a record that has stood since 1977.

Peter Wolf, a spokesman for the National Weather Service in Jacksonville, said Gainesville reached a high of 99 degrees Tuesday. By Wednesday at 4 p.m., it hit the record high.

Typically, July and August are the most common months for record-breaking numbers, Wolf said.

"Records are about a 100, 102," he said, "so it can get this hot, but [it's] a bit unusual this

early."

The temperatures will cool down slightly over the weekend, he said.

The highest recorded temperature for Gainesville was 103 degrees in August 1915.

With such hot temperatures, exercising and spending time outdoors could lead to dehydration if people don't take precautions. Shannon Kirkpatrick, health promotion specialist at GatorWell Health Services, said people should drink about eight cups of water a day to maintain healthy and hydrated during the summer heat.

Some signs of mild dehydration are thirst, fatigue and loss of appetite. Drinking water could aid these symptoms, Kirkpatrick said, but for a person who has been exercising outdoors, sport energy drinks like Gatorade work best.

For those with late-night munchies, cookie service offers cure

Jennifer Aldrich and Jon MacAllister say the Internet helped them start a promising relationship. It also helped them start a promising business.

Midnight Cookies is a delivery service that delivers "freshly baked, made-to-order cookies, straight from the oven to your doorstep," the website says.

The small business is located inside of California Chicken Grill at 2022 SW 34th St., but Midnight Cookies is an entirely separate business with different staff and drivers.

Its niche delivery market mainly targets college students. It also gets a lot of walk-in business from California Chicken Grill customers who notice the desk in the back corner.

"We get a lot of the late-night, drunk crowd who just want desserts and don't want to drive yet," Aldrich said.

The two owners work 40 to 80 hours a week, stay open seven days a week and have a nocturnal working schedule. For the small shop's summer schedule, business opens every day at 7 p.m. and closes at 1:30 a.m. Monday through Thursday. On Friday and Saturday, the business closes at 2 a.m. and 1 a.m. on Sundays.

Cookies are \$1.29 each and a minimum of six must be ordered for delivery. After tax is added, the minimum price for delivery is

\$8 and there is a \$1 charge for orders under \$12.

The business has earned itself some loyal fans.

"The amazing thing about this business is that every time they deliver, the cookies are still warm," Cynthia Rodriguez said. "It's as if I had taken them out of the oven my-

self. But who am I kidding? I can't bake that good."

Rodriguez, an undergraduate biology major at UF, "likes" almost every status update and comment on the Midnight Cookies fan page on Facebook. She describes herself as daring and said she loves to try all the new crazy cookies they have.

Midnight Cookies is proud of their "crazy" creations. Their newest creation is the maple-bacon cookie, Aldrich said. The idea was inspired by the Denny's bacon sundae, she said.

This cookie business had unusual beginnings.

The two met on the website OKCupid, where Aldrich took interest in MacAllister's roles in high school musicals.

MacAllister was a full-time student at UF before being academically dismissed and transferring to Santa Fe College. He worked 40 to 60 hours a week at California Chicken Grill. During this time, Aldrich made the move to Gainesville to be with him.

The move was difficult for her at the time because she didn't know anyone, so she turned to baking.

MacAllister, the creative one of the two, would put new ingredients in his wife's recipes. Some crushed-up Oreo cookies later, the famous cookies-and-cream cookie was born.

Midnight Cookies finally took off Aug. 9 and is close to celebrating its one-year anniversary.

After 22 years in public service, Long says its time to hang it up

State representative to run for his county seat

County Commissioner Rodney Long, who announced his retirement in an email Monday morning, said he will continue to serve the Gainesville and Alachua County community from his private sector.

"It's time to leave while I'm at the top of my game," said Long, as he chronicled his 22-year public service career at his official retirement speech Wednesday morning to a crowd of almost 80.

He reminisced about his career milestones including founding the Martin Luther King Jr.

Commission of Florida, serving as president of the Florida Association of Counties and spearheading the Plan East Gainesville project.

He also joked about his pitfalls, remembering his first bout of negative publicity shortly after his 1988 election.

"You wanted to be a trail blazer," Long recalled, "so, blaze the trail."

Smiles, nods and laughs in the audience followed each of Long's statements. Tears even flowed for some, including Dyonne McGraw, a professional and personal friend of Long's.

"The timing is perfect," she said of Long's decision to retire. McGraw said Long played a

large role in her life as a mentor, guiding her professional career, and that he's left an even bigger impact on the community.

Long said his community involvement won't stop. He has plans to continue projects in his areas of concern, such as developing and improving east Gainesville, reducing poverty and homelessness and providing education for at-risk youth.

It was 1988 when Long's career as a public

service officer took off with his election as the first single-member district commissioner. He was re-elected in 1991, and after much controversy, was elected the first district mayor-commissioner later that year.

In 2000, Long won his first county seat on the Alachua County Commission, making him the first African-American to serve on both the Gainesville City Commission and the Alachua County Board of Commissioners.

Long also announced in his retirement email that state Rep. Charles S. "Chuck" Chestnut IV, D-Gainesville, will seek Long's District 5 seat on the County Commission.

"I believe that he could actually be an individual who could hit the ground running," Long said. "It's time to pass the torch."

University makes changes to social media policy

Human Resources released the document

Faculty, staff and students at UF are being reminded by the university to monitor their social media activity at work, school and home.

The university's Office of Human Resources released a document Monday outlining federal, state and university regulations

relevant to social media use.

Social media includes Facebook, Twitter, blogs, YouTube, Flickr, text messages and other, less popular platforms, according to the document, which has been more than one year in the making.

If the use of social media outside of work represents an individual as a member of the university community, the guidelines

apply.

If social media are used to share opinions and activities unassociated with the university, such conditions must be clearly indicated.

Janine Sikes, director of UF public affairs, said the initial concern was the accidental release of patient information or student and applicant records via social

media, which would violate both legal and ethical standards.

She said the human resources department pooled together existing regulations into one document, which specifically addresses social media use.

"Essentially, it's a reminder of best practices," Sikes said. "This is what we expect."

If any guidelines are violated, no further repercussions will be carried out other than those that already exist under federal, state

or university regulation.

Norman Lewis, a professor for the College of Journalism and Communications, is a social media user. He has a Twitter account, a blog and a personal website. Though he says he always views himself as a representative of his employer, a protection of the boundaries between personal and public life is important.

"Social media is a means to an end, not an end in itself," Lewis said.

Whether it's more budget cuts coming from Tallahassee in January 2012, the administration's block tuition plans, or the 15 percent tuition hike, we can defeat any and all attacks on public education by standing together.

UF trustees, Alligator made the wrong call on tuition hike

Our tuition is about to increase — again. Our university is facing a budget crisis — again. And the Board of Trustees has approved yet another policy that will make UF less accessible to working students.

At the June 10 Trustees meeting, every member of the board voted to increase student tuition by 15 percent in the coming year.

Facing an economic crisis with no end in sight and a slew of attacks on education coming from all sides, students are beginning to learn two lessons. First, the fight for public education in Florida is a multi-front battle. Second, we can't count on anyone but ourselves to fight this battle for us.

In the past legislative session, the right-wing state legislature and our extremist Gov. Rick Scott decided to balance the state budget on the backs of students and faculty. Just a month later, the Trustees and Student Body President Ben Meyers agreed to throw on a bit more weight by voting to increase student tuition by 15 percent.

Tuesday's issue of the Alligator featured an article covering the 15 percent tuition increase,

an opinion piece written by President Meyers explaining his vote in favor of increased tuition and an editorial defending tuition hikes. It wasn't the presentation of the arguments that bothered me, especially since I've been on the receiving end of one-sided news coverage before. Instead, I was disturbed that neither of the two largest representatives of the Student Body — the student newspaper and the Student Body President — were willing to stand up to this new wave of attacks on public education.

Students need to come to terms with the fact that our list of allies has grown tremendously short in the last few months. Most of our representatives in Tallahassee are more than willing to put us on the chopping block first. Our sole representative on the board, the Student Body President, buckled under the pressure of President Bernie Machen and Provost Joe Glover and voted in favor of this recent 15 percent tuition hike. And even our student newspaper opted against standing with the Student Body against tuition increases and instead threw its support behind the board's

Building muscle requires consistency and healthy diet

Summer is upon us and beach bodies are longing to soak up some sun.

Men who want to bulk up and show their summer physique need to focus on proper weight training and nutrition.

"The key is training hard with consistency and eating right," said UF junior Michael Petresky, a personal trainer and fitness intern at Southwest Recreation Center.

"When you exert a certain stimulus on the muscle through resistance, you're breaking down the muscle," Petresky said. "The building up of muscle happens after you workout, for instance, when you're sleeping."

This is when the protein in your body repairs the stressed muscle fibers.

"Protein is essential for muscle repair," Petresky said.

Chicken, turkey, 90 percent lean beef, lean pork, top sirloin, cottage cheese, Greek yogurt, milk, eggs, soy, tofu, sweet potato, tilapia and salmon are all full of protein and are recommended as a nutritional staple.

"I get asked so many times as to what supplements to use," Petresky said.

He believes there is more to gaining muscle than just using supplements. However, there is one supplement he finds agreeable, called creatine.

Although creatine is frowned upon for athletes, many average gym members do use it to power through their workout sessions.

"It's the only research-based supplement proven to enhance performance," Petresky said. "It enhances ATP [Adenosine triphosphate] use, and it pulls water into the muscle. That's where people get the fuller look from."

This means that you are able to lift heavier weights and work out for a longer period of time.

According to Petresky, it is a naturally occurring substance found in our bodies and in red meat.

"Creatine helps you get stronger and is not a stimulant," said GNC sales associate Darrel Brooks. "It helps with muscle recovery and an effective amount will cost about \$60 to \$80."

As with misconceptions among supplements, there are also fallacies toward weight

training.

"There's a misconception that you need to work out like body builders to get big," Petresky said.

According to Petresky, most body builders use isolation exercises that won't help the average Joe in bulking up.

Petresky said the average person should focus on core compound lifts such as deadlifts, squats, pull movements, rowing movements, overhead press and, of course, the infamous bench press.

"People who want to bulk up should make those the focus on a bi-weekly basis," Petresky said.

Depending on the individual, Petresky recommends doing a warm up set, with lighter weights and three hard work sets with eight to 12 repetitions, working up to 12. Once you hit 12 reps increase the weight, start with eight reps and work up to 12 again.

"If you're unfamiliar with exercise form, educate yourself when you start," said Petresky. "Don't pile up on heavy weights."

Spend two to four weeks using light weights doing 15-20 reps so it teaches your body how

to do the movements; when you start serious training, it will be simple muscle memory.

Bulking up and gaining muscle takes dedication, patience and time. Petresky said the common error he sees is guys who don't eat enough.

"Take the time to see how much you're eating," Petresky said. "Increase your calorie intake until you find the right level for you."

Tech Effect: Microsoft research team uncovers portable X-ray

Good news, guys! The dream has finally been achieved: A Microsoft research team has successfully created a working prototype of a portable X-ray gun.

Just imagine how easy getting test answers through a drawer will be, what a breeze mild voyeurism will turn into, how simple it will be to check out what the girls on campus are working with underneath their ... Just kidding.

The device is actually a handheld hybrid of an Optoma PK102 pico projector, a Microsoft LifeCam digital webcam, a FireFly MV USB near-infrared camera, and a Logitech R400 laser pointer which researchers have discovered creates a safe and portable X-ray machine that can be used to show physical therapy patients what's really going on inside their bodies.

The device, which researchers call the AnatOnMe project, was tested on 18 individuals chosen to participate in a test study group on the effectiveness of image projection on three types of surfaces during simulated therapy consultations. Out of the three types of surfaces, the AnatOnMe project kept the patients' attention the longest through the sheer novelty of seeing their insides on their outsides.

Microsoft Research's Amy Karlson explains, "People are notoriously bad

at sticking to their physical therapy regimens." Injuries, as a result, take longer to heal, and it has been reported

that between 30 and 50 percent of patients with chronic conditions fail to comply with their recommended

therapies, an average that AnatOnMe hopes to curb with its new device.

"There seems to be something

quite compelling and unique about viewing medical imagery on one's own body," Karlson said.


The device can also take photos during a consultation, which can be printed out and reviewed as an additional aid and incentive for the patient.

Developed on the Redmond campus in Washington and led by researchers Tao Ni, Amy Karlson and Daniel Wigdor, the AnatOnMe project was presented recently in Vancouver at ACM CHI 2011, the Association for Computing Machinery's Conference on Human Factors in Computing Systems.

"This is an interesting new space because, despite the prevalence of technology in many settings, technology has been relatively absent from face-to-face communication and education opportunities between doctors and patients," Karlson said.

So, unfortunately for all the guys out there, research into a handheld X-ray gun has stalled beneath the moral implications of what havoc such a device would wreak upon the female population of the world.

But the good news is that at least when you bust your knee playing ultimate Frisbee, the AnatOnMe project will be able to show you exactly how long it will be until you're back out on the field.

The Inferno Pizza

If you were to choose a slice-of-life moment and equate it to a slice of Pazzo Bistro's Inferno Pizza, it would be the spiciest moment of your entire existence.

Only 53 people have survived the Inferno Pizza at Pazzo Bistro, 3841 SW Archer Rd., but 355 have fallen to the spice of this parching pie.

The challenge started just over a year ago, and Marc Perotti, owner of Pazzo Bistro, said it only came into being because of the small market of students who would be willing to try it.

This pizza has "ghost pepper everywhere," Perotti said. A homemade hot sauce of jalapenos, habaneros and ghost peppers replaces traditional tomato sauce. Sitting atop the hot sauce lays eight habaneros, four jalapenos and three ghost peppers. Cover-

ing the combination of peppers is another homemade sauce of cayenne pepper, vinegar and more ghost peppers, thus bringing the heat level to extremes unknown.

Florida takes business-like attitude back to Omaha UF plays Texas at 7 p.m. Saturday in Game 1 on ESPN

In the opening baseball media session in February — still stinging from a bitterly short trip nearly eight months before — the top-ranked Gators spoke about their motivation to get back to the College World Series.

Florida players lamented how they were nervous, overwhelmed, excited but ultimately blind to the environment they walked into. Yet every player and coach was quick to respond that if the opportunity presented itself to get back to Omaha, Neb., things would be different.

“As a coach, you can give a player a lot. You can coach a lot of different ways and give them lots of things to improve on,” UF coach Kevin O’Sullivan said in February. “But one thing a coach can not give a player is experience.”

A year ago, the Gators trekked to the CWS wide-eyed and content.

Fresh off a Super Regional sweep of perennial powerhouse Miami, Florida strolled into Omaha with a sense of accom-

plishment, a feeling that the hard part was already past them.

But after UCLA and Florida State drubbed UF twice en route

to an early exit, a long plane ride home wasn’t quite so enjoyable.

“I hate to say it, but everybody was just happy we got there,” se-

nior second baseman Josh Adams said.

“This year, it’s different because everybody knows we expected to be there. Don’t get me wrong — we’re thrilled we’re going — but there’s that little thing in the back of our minds that we knew where we were going to be at this point. We just have to stay focused on the task at hand.”

Motivated Young hoping to fuel guard-heavy Gators

Listening to sophomore Patric Young talk about Florida’s season-ending loss in March at the NCAA Tournament, it’s clear he hasn’t put the game behind him.

Despite contributing solid minutes as a freshman and being eyed as a potential selection in the NBA draft, Young said losing 74-71 to Butler in overtime at the Elite Eight motivated him to come back and improve.

“We felt we shouldn’t have lost that game,” he said recently while being interviewed regarding his invitation to the U-19 USA Basketball camp.

“I’m going to avenge myself from last season, (from) that last game that we lost,” he said. “We’re going to come back and

we’re going to work together as a team. I want to be the guy that can push my teammates and help us get to that point to make it to a national championship this year.”

But the team that was three wins away from a title is no more. Southeastern Conference Player of the Year Chandler Parsons, Vernon Macklin and Alex Tyus are gone, and the path for Young is wide open.

If the 6-foot-9 sophomore is to make good on his goals, it will be with a completely different lineup and larger personal role — something Young said he is comfortable with.

“There’s a role to be filled in the big man

Bruder closes career with another prestigious award

Kelsey Bruder always told freshmen teammates their UF careers only got easier after year one.

"I might have weighed more than my batting average freshman year," said the senior left fielder, in reference to her .133 mark.

Having completed a senior season in which she batted .387 with 19 homers and 71 RBIs, Bruder's time at Florida received a final crown Tuesday.

The current member of National Pro Fastpitch's USSSA Pride was honored with the 2011 Honda Sports Award for Softball.

The award is given to the nation's top collegiate softball player as decided by the National Fastpitch Coaches Association.

"To be recognized as the best player in college softball seems absolutely surreal," Bruder said in an official statement.

"Receiving this award would not have been possible without every single one of my teammates."

The left fielder is UF's first winner, and only the second Gators softball player — along with Stacey

Nelson in 2009 — to be nominated for the award.

Bruder now becomes one of 12 candidates for the Honda-Broderick Cup, the trophy given each season to the Collegiate Woman Athlete of

the Year.

Other finalists include Connecticut basketball player and 2010 winner Maya Moore and Notre Dame soccer star Melissa Henderson.

The Broderick Cup will be

awarded at a New York ceremony on June 27.

"This is certainly one of the most prestigious awards that a student-athlete can receive in college athletics," UF coach Tim Walton said in a statement.

"This is the exclamation point to a great collegiate career for Kelsey and her senior classmates who leave behind a legacy of greatness."

A two-time All-American and 2011 Academic All-American, Bruder was at her best during Southeastern Conference play in 2011.

She led the SEC in runs, doubles, slugging percentage, hits, RBIs and home runs during league play.

The 79 runs she scored this season were a school record.

After a freshman season in which she got sparse playing time as a pitcher and designated player, Bruder bounced back her sophomore year to tie the school record for slugging percentage while batting .369 and starting all 68 games.

She beat out fellow nominees Ashley Hansen (Stanford), Jolene Henderson (California) and Chelsea Thomas (Missouri) to win college softball's premier individual award.

Former Gator and U.S. Olympic swimmer Tracy Caulkins is the only UF athlete to win the Broderick Cup, taking the award in 1982 and 1984.

Neither Bruder, who was hospitalized Tuesday night with dehydration and a stomach illness, nor Walton could be reached for comment.

position," he said. "I have been working on my game to develop my offensive game, so when that time comes for me to step into that role, I'll be ready and prepared."

With the statuses of forwards Erik Murphy and Cody Larson still up in the air, Young and little-used Will Yeguete may be the only two returning players in Florida's frontcourt. Incoming freshman three-star recruit Walter Pitchford is raw and will need time to develop before contributing major minutes.

Florida will depend heavily on its guards in 2011-12, a position of serious strength. The team's top two scorers, guards Kenny Boynton (14.2 ppg) and Erving Walker (14.6), are slated to return, as are Casey Prather and Scottie Wilbekin.

Redshirt junior Mike Rosario, who Wilbekin said might be the team's best shooter, will also see significant minutes after sitting out last season due to NCAA transfer rules. Plus, the Gators inked one of the nation's top prospects in McDonald's All-American Brad Beal.

"There's going to be a lot of

great guards here next year," said Wilbekin, who will join Young at the USA Basketball camp.

Wilbekin, who turned 18 days after the loss to Butler, said he has been working on his shooting and ball handling in the offseason, and added that he thought too much was made of his age last season.

"I knew what I could do inside, but I just felt like I had to go out there and prove it to everybody else," Wilbekin said.

Now, the sophomore will be fighting for playing time in an extremely crowded backcourt likely to utilize a lot of three-guard, and potentially even some four-guard, lineups.

"With this team, we have so many guards we're possibly going to have one of the top backcourts in the league or in the country," Young said.

How coach Billy Donovan decides to use that talent remains to be seen, but one thing is certain, and Young knows it as well as anybody else.

"It's going to be completely different from the team last year," he said. "I'll tell you that."

Florida focused, could face SEC foe Vanderbilt in Game 2 on Tuesday

SCOUTING THE COMPETITION



North Carolina — As the nation's No. 3 overall seed, the Tar Heels ran through five games in Chapel Hill to make it to their fifth CWS in six years. While UNC is anything but flashy on offense as freshman Colin Moran leads the team with just nine homers, its bats have been consistent in the NCAA Tournament plating 39 runs.



Vanderbilt — The Commodores made it to the CWS for the first time in school history, and did so without a single loss in their two regional rounds. Since falling 5-0 in the SEC title game to Florida, Vanderbilt has given up just seven runs in its last five games. Vandy is led by two first-round MLB draftees in Sonny Gray and Grayson Garvin.



Florida — After narrowly escaping a scrappy Mississippi State team in its Super Regional, Florida will need to continue its playoff power surge — 13 homers in six games — if it wants to avenge last season's two-and-out performance in Omaha. Led by catcher Mike Zunino's 18 long balls, Florida's potent lineup will be tested early on by Texas' equally effective pitching staff which owns a 2.27 ERA on the season — the second lowest in the nation.



Texas — As a six-time national champion, the Longhorns are a perennial staple in the CWS, but this year, lack some of the offensive pop they are known for. Texas leads the nation in sacrifice bunts and has yet to score in double digits in the postseason. The Longhorns .272 team batting average is the lowest in the field of eight.



California — The Golden Bears are this year's Cinderella story after the program was almost cut before the season began due to budget issues. As a No. 3 seed in its Regional, Cal is the only team not previously seeded No. 1 in the CWS field. The Golden Bears are led by sophomore lefty Justin Jones, who paced Cal with nine wins including three complete games.



Virginia — The top-ranked Cavaliers will look to drop the feel-good Golden Bears in Game 3 on the left arm of Danny Hultzen — selected second overall by the Seattle Mariners in the MLB draft. Although its pitching staff is statistically the nation's best, Virginia's bats were responsible for propelling it into the CWS with a two-run, bottom of the ninth rally against UC Irvine.



South Carolina — As the defending national champions, the Gamecocks are looking to become just the sixth team to put together a repeat title run. Though South Carolina rolled through Connecticut in two games to make it to Omaha, the champs are still holding their breath on whether injured center fielder and reigning CWS Most Outstanding Player Jackie Bradley Jr. will be able to play.



Texas A&M — With a pair of aces in their hand, the Aggies will look to out-throw teams early on. Texas A&M received dominant performances from Ross Stripling and Michael Wacha in Games 1 and 3 of their Super Regional to down Florida State. But in Game 2, the rest of the bullpen proved to be streaky at best with the Seminoles putting up 23 runs.

history — the Gators know to anticipate large crowds, crazed autograph seekers and cameras everywhere. They understand the overall atmosphere of the classic event.

When the media met with players and coaches on Tuesday, there was an obvious message: Focus on winning, not on the environment and surrounding hoopla.

O'Sullivan led the business-like approach, organizing a team meeting Monday to clear up "all the extra stuff."

"The hotel, the tickets, when we're leaving, getting prepared to get packed — just the detailed stuff that kind of crept up on us last year," O'Sullivan said.

"I think what happened last year was due to the way we prepared ourselves the whole week. I wouldn't say we were satisfied with the season, but it was almost like it was the end of the road, that they were just happy to get there.

This year, I'm hoping that they understand that we still have one more step to take, and it's going to be very difficult. For me personally, it felt like everything was kind of rushed when we got out there last year, and the next thing you know, it's the fifth inning and we were down. I've just tried to do the best job I can, starting Monday night, preparing ourselves for Saturday night."

After addressing initial distractions, O'Sullivan decided to have the team travel a day earlier to get in a full practice at the

new TD Ameritrade Park.

In 2010, the last year of historic Rosenblatt Stadium, Florida had just a 45-minute session eight hours before playing UCLA.

"Maybe we fulfilled our season with just the trip out there," Game 1 starter

Hudson Randall said about last year. "This year we're looking to get more out of it, go up there and take care of business. It's not a vacation this year."

Florida faces off against Texas in the primetime 7 p.m. slot Saturday on ESPN.
