



New company splinters from TutoringZone

StudyEdge will offer free reviews during Summer B

A new study center could create competition for TutoringZone.

Nine tutors from TutoringZone in Gainesville have left the company to form a new academic study service called StudyEdge.

The decision to split was announced at the beginning of the break between Summers A and B, said Margaret Kelsey, director of communications for TutoringZone.

While the permanent location is under construction, StudyEdge will be offering live review sessions for Summer B at UF Hillel, located at 2020 W University Ave.

The tutors held their first review session Tuesday.

The new location is anticipated to open Sept. 1 at the former Goerings Book Store location, 1717 NW First Ave., behind Ti-

juana Flats and Jimmy John's.

StudyEdge will offer free review sessions on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 4:30 to 7 p.m. at Hillel during Summer B.

StudyEdge tutors are trying to be more accessible to students, said Graham Rees, co-founder of StudyEdge. He said they want students to be well-acquainted with the tutors so they will feel comfortable asking questions.

StudyEdge tutors started a new company because they were tired of TutoringZone repeatedly ignoring student concerns, Rees said. They wanted to offer quality reviews with proficient tutors.

TutoringZone would "plug holes" with unqualified tutors to make money, he said.

TutoringZone is being affected by the loss of its seasoned tutors. When its physics 1 with calculus tutor left, the company

was left without anyone else to teach the summer review sessions. Preregistered students have to get their money refunded and take their business elsewhere.

"For students, we would have loved to have been training someone for physics," Kelsey said. "We refuse to throw anyone who we haven't trained into the mix."

Jess Bodzo, 19, a sophomore computer science engineering major, said he didn't

know this course was no longer being offered until he went to TutoringZone this week.

He was told he will get his money back but was not given an explanation. After contacting his physics tutor on Facebook, he learned about StudyEdge.

Kelsey wants to squash rumors that the new company is a switchover. There are two different companies now, she said.

Francesca Dickhaus, a 19-year-old sophomore biology major, was a regular at TutoringZone her freshman year.

She took reviews for organic chemistry 1 at TutoringZone the first half of this summer. Now, she said, her tutor works at StudyEdge.

Like many of her classmates, she has a tough decision to make — deciding which review service is better for her.

As a student, the most important thing is who is teaching the material, she said.

"I don't care about being loyal to one company," Dickhaus said.

UF obtains \$5.5 million in grants

■ THE MONEY WILL FINANCE EDUCATION RESEARCH

UF education researchers have received two federal grants totaling \$5.5 million for studies focused on reducing behavioral problems that disrupt the learning environment.

One \$4 million grant will fund a study on behavioral intervention techniques in preschool-aged children, headed by Maureen Conroy of UF and Kevin Sutherland of Virginia Commonwealth University.

Another \$1.5 million grant will support the research of UF special education faculty members Stephen Smith and Ann Daunic into developing curricula to help control behavioral issues in grades six through eight.

Conroy and Sutherland's research will examine their BEST in CLASS intervention program's ef-

fect on preschoolers in the classroom.

The program teaches teachers behavioral intervention strategies, such as using rules and routines, providing specific praise and encouragement and keeping children engaged, Conroy said.

Next year, she will be collaboratively working with Alachua County Head Start.


"We want to prevent those behaviors so that when they go to school, they can be successful," she said.

UF Research

Conroy noted that preliminary research has shown that BEST in CLASS techniques are both successful at increasing engagement in children while decreasing disruption and aggression.

Smith's research, on the other hand, will lead to the development of an entire curriculum for middle school students in specific programs with emotional and behavioral disorders.

Baker's son, Fritz Baker, says his father found the ticket in a book bought at an Orlando garage sale in 1995.

He says his father decided to pay the fine as a lark, even though it wasn't issued to him.

Baker sent the \$1 payment in the ticket's original envelope.

That got it delivered to a police department auditorium that was

The wedding appeared doomed when tests showed Derek McBride had three broken ribs and a punctured, collapsed lung.

But family and Saint Vincent nurses stepped up, decorating the chapel with medical glove balloons and bows made of gauze. Guests were told the beach wedding was scrapped.

Cassy McBride, whose maiden name was Messenger, wore her gown. Derek had one too — a hospital one, under his tuxedo.

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


The volunteers at the Jungle Friends Primate Sanctuary don't come to monkey around.

The 12-acre sanctuary, located north of Gainesville at 13915 N. State Road 121, has been open since 1999 and is home to 120 monkeys, including white-faced capuchins, brown-faced capuchins, spider monkeys, squirrel monkeys, marmosets and tamarin monkeys.

"We are looking for dedicated, committed volunteers," said Mimi Sanada, the apprentice caregiver since July.

There are several open positions for volunteers, ranging from office work to caring for the monkeys, according to Ashlei Martin, a former apprentice and employee at the Jacksonville Zoo.

A couple months before Sanada ar-

rived at Jungle Friends, the sanctuary rescued a group of monkeys from another sanctuary, which was basically a roadside zoo.

Three infant monkeys that were rejected from their mothers were able to be saved.

"I had the opportunity to nurse them back to health and socialize them with other monkeys," Sanada said. "That is definitely one of the most fulfilling experiences I been able to be a part of."

Most of the monkeys at Jungle Friends were obtained from owners who were illegally keeping monkeys, from medical research facilities or from the entertainment industry, according to jungle-

friends.org.

Jungle Friends provides a natural environment for the monkeys, giving them the same surroundings as if they were living in the wild.

The sanctuary was originally started in Las Vegas, but the climate was too dry for the "New World" monkeys, or monkeys originating from the Americas, said Kari Bagnall, the founder of Jungle Friends.

The Gainesville weather, along with the presence of UF's veterinary school, was the perfect new home for the sanctuary.

"Just being able to wake up every day and being able to give these monkeys a second chance to live in a natural environment is completely worth the effort," Martin said.

By 3:45 p.m. LifeSouth had practically reached its goal of 150 donors with 76 women and 50 men. By 5:30 p.m., it had surpassed its goal at 160 donors with 93 women and 67 men.

Clay Gibbons, the District Community Development Coordinator for LifeSouth, said events like this are extremely important for recruiting first-time and returning donors, especially with the Fourth of

"We have to collect blood every single day," Gibbons said, "and close to the holidays, people aren't thinking about donating."

Santa Fe students get tuition hike

Unlike the Florida afternoon sky, Santa Fe College students will not be making it rain any time soon.

Tuition at Santa Fe will increase by 10 percent this year as part of the budget President Jackson Sasser recently presented.

Sasser said the increase would amount to a little more than \$200 per year for a student taking 30 credit hours.

Santa Fe sophomore Kyle McKay said he won't complain about the tuition increase, but he acknowledged that he does not pay his own tuition.

Sasser thinks Santa Fe students will still pay less than most state college and university students because most institutions are increasing tuition as much as possible. Sasser could have raised the tuition by up to 13 percent, according to state legislation signed by Gov. Rick Scott June 1.

The tuition raise comes as the school continues to take budget cuts that have hit since 2007.

McKay said he understands the school is in a tough place.

"We're going to have to start suffering the consequences, basically, of the economy we're in right now," he said.

The economy is partly what prompted Sasser to increase employees' salaries. He wanted to respect the needs of current employees and be able to recruit in the future.

Sasser said Santa Fe has already missed out on top candidates because of salaries.

"And that's tragic," he said.

The 2011-2012 budget featured a different kind of financial change for the school's employees.

All employees will get a raise and an additional 2.5 percent cost of living increase. The cost of living increase will be applied to the post-raise salary.

Sasser emphasized that the tuition increase is not directly related to raises.

David Price, president of the Santa Fe College Senate and professor of history and political science, estimated that his raise will be around \$3,000. Price will have to put about \$1,500 towards the Florida Retirement System.

Employees who have been at the school longer will receive larger raises.

Still Shining: She may have her faults, but America still kicks ass

This Monday, millions of Americans will gather in backyards, ballparks, churches and parade routes all across the country to celebrate the 235th birthday of the United States. For many of us, the Fourth acts as just another excuse to jet-stream unholy amounts of ethanol into our systems as we butcher another Lee Greenwood song and blow shit up. And why shouldn't we? But for some, the holiday serves as a bittersweet reminder of a country "that once was." Earlier this week, the U.S. Supreme Court, in a 7-2 vote, ruled that states cannot ban the sale or rental of violent video games to children, deeming such a ban as a violation of the First Amendment.

In his majority opinion, Justice Antonin Scalia wrote that just like books and movies, video games fall into a category of entertainment that deserves free-speech protection.

We feel this is a good message to send to people who are up in arms about these kinds of games. Parents should know what kinds of

video games their kids play. If they feel the violence inappropriately influences their kids, they should talk to their kids about just that.

Now, we aren't against the protection of children from harmful influences. We understand that these games could feed into a culture of violence that is perpetuated by similar movies, and even by the very real wars and violence that are but a click away on the Internet. 

Why capital punishment needs to die

If Americans smelled the burning flesh of someone being burnt at the stake or saw a squirming decapitated head after it was guillotined, would they still be in favor of the death penalty? I find the death penalty to be too great of a power for the government to wield, and for that reason, I am staunchly against it.

Recall that our Declaration of Independence states that all men are endowed by God with certain rights: life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. The Declaration of Independence is in stark contrast with the convoluted thinking that those rights are derived from the authority of a government. The Declaration argues that life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness are inherent in all men. Moreover, it uses the specific word "unalienable," meaning those rights cannot be forfeited, even if you wanted to forfeit them.

The death penalty clearly goes against the logic of the Declaration of Independence. We have ceded our "unalienable" right to life to the government that can — and will — kill you for heinous crimes. Since we've ceded life, it implies that we'll also allow the government to take our liberty and pursuit of happiness, even though the founders said those rights come from God.

Additionally, there is a huge cost difference between the death penalty and life in prison. According to a George Mason University study, the average cost of capital punishment in Indiana is about \$120,000 more than life in prison. In North Carolina, that difference jumps to more than \$160,000! The contributors to this phenomenon are mostly huge upfront trial costs: grand juries, sequestration, additional security, requiring experienced lawyers (in some states), hiring the best experts and the list goes on. These upfront costs are even more expen-

sive than a long-term stay at Alcatraz. Moreover, the average capital punishment trial lasts longer than a year, after a year of preparation. The whopping costs and time delays are an attempt to be meticulous and not wrongly convict someone to death.

Recent advances in technology, especially DNA evidence, have exonerated hundreds of people from death row. Think of how you would feel if you were wrongfully convicted and sentenced to death. It has happened before. Justice is flawed because it is administered by humans. Death cannot be taken back. Is satiating the lust for revenge truly worth the risk of murdering an innocent life?

Many death penalty advocates claim capital punishment serves as a deterrent for violent crimes. This is a generalization based on false logic. A murderer isn't afraid of death, and the death penalty isn't going to stop him. In fact, the FBI's annual "Crime in the United States" report in 2008 suggested the exact opposite. The report found states with the death penalty on the books had higher homicide rates than states without the death penalty. If it were me, I'd choose to commit a crime where I'd get death instead of being locked in a cage indefinitely.

Most of the world no longer applies the death penalty. We stand with fewer countries by the year on this issue. Should we be content in the company of China, Iran and Cuba? To those who still subscribes to Hammurabi's Code, Gandhi said, "An eye for an eye makes the whole world blind."

Unite Party uses "system" to rule

In summer of 2008, I walked into my first Senate meeting. Fresh out of high school, I thought I had found a good place to get involved. What I found instead was a disaster.

I entered a room where I saw a huge majority repeatedly ignore logic and common sense. In the years since, Student Government has wasted thousands of dollars of our money, and at every opportunity, the majority party sided with the administration — not with the average student.

The problem with SG is not the massive difference between majority and minority size, and it's not that the two parties can't "work together." The problem is not an abstraction, it's an actual physical thing — "The System."

With a name like that, you probably think I've gone off the conspiracy theory deep end. But I didn't invent that moniker; they did. The System is a method of control, using patronage, biased rules and pure threats to get a few resume lines and SG salaries at the expense of every other UF student.

The patronage system run by the Unite Party is something that would make Rod Blagojevich jealous. Grouping student organizations into so-called "blocks," the system uses both carrot and stick to ensure members are brought in line for the purpose of getting votes for Unite. Organizations are told to guarantee the "cooperation" of their members, because refusing to participate in the effort has social consequences, in addition to the denial of positions in SG.

The Unite Party accomplishes this through the use of "voter boards," which allow organizations to keep track of which members voted and reward/punish them accordingly. This is why there is a unique rule in SG allowing only the Unite-appointed Supervisor of Elections to hand out stickers saying the magic words: "I Voted."

All of this was revealed in depth on last year's so-called "Unite Tapes," which, of course, the Alligator lacked the spine to adequately report on. Some choice words from the recording of Unite leaders: "...you guys had that incentive of getting your girls a bottle, not too many [groups] do that, that's awesome." Or, "I know you told your baby pledge class that they couldn't eat until they went and voted. That's amazing, that's what you need to do. So I applaud you all for doing that."

The Unite Party knows that just a few hundred people voting against them could wipe out their super-majority. That's why every year they pay lip service to increasing voter turnout, but every year they vote against the legislation that would actually do it. Instead, they've rammed

through election "laws" designed with one thing in mind: limit the number of voters to the 18 percent who do now, while making it increasingly difficult for the opposition to campaign.

They do this because they are afraid of losing their power, which is exactly why they comply with every request the administration has for them. After all, without a real minority party, the administration is the only group left that can stop them. Whether it's the University Police incident last year, the new Reitz Union fee proposal, or most recently, a massive tuition increase not covered by Bright Futures, the Unite Party sided with the administration and not with students. The system isn't only spending students' money; they are claiming to speak for students while working against us again and again.

All in all, this System-Administration love fest has worked out great for the Unite Party. When emails were leaked in 2008 revealing that senate seats were given away by organizational affiliation, the Student Body President was given a "stern talking to" by administrators. When more emails surfaced revealing that applicants to the supposedly nonpartisan Elections Commission were told to hide their Unite Party affiliation, the administration told me they were "working on it." Finally, when a member of The System leaked an unedited tape of one of their own meetings, which described in-depth and in their own words the patronage and corruption that currently has a choke hold on student government at UF, administrators told me they had spoken with the people on the tapes and that "there was nothing else to be done." One of the people on the tapes is now Student Body Treasurer.

Changing their name every few years to prevent you from catching on — they need to win it all — because they've already promised it all away.

Let me be absolutely clear: I reject the Progress Party's idea that we can work with these people. Their policies are not the problem; their corruption is. And until there is an opposition party that will truly fight to end The System and give Student Government back to the students, these people will control millions of dollars of student money and will continue to speak on behalf of people they don't represent.

But it's easy to be apathetic. It's easy to not vote. And yes, it's easy for you, Alligator, to refuse to report on these facts and claim you're afraid of lawsuits. It may be easy, but it isn't right.

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

Zombie Vinyls finds a new art medium in old records

The company spray paints famed artists on vinyl

Everything old is new again, or so the saying goes. If one were to anticipate a sweeping statement that applies to the 20-somethings of today, it would be safe to assume our generation has taken a cue from our hippie forefathers with expressions like "going green" hitting a defining, socially acceptable cool.

Well-stocked secondhand stores prove Americans' addiction to consumption, a reflection of cultural interest in the next best thing. But embedded in this discarded materialism is a source of artistic inspiration, of reinvention, of newness.

Zombie Vinyls, a fresh visual-art business based in Gainesville, creatively implements a take on the theory of reduce, re-use, recycle as a foundation for its handcrafted, re-purposed vinyl records.

Officially establishing its business roots in the spring of 2011, Zombie Vinyls is the brainchild of longtime friends and UF graduates Tony Feria and Matt Teper.

The idea for their business model is relatively simple and seemingly obvious, yet naturally channels a concept of reformulation that no longer necessitates a grain of salt: turn stacks of used, scratched, unwanted and outwardly obsolete vinyl records into an art medium.

As the name suggests and as their website claims, Zombie Vinyls "brings dead music back to life." The company trades in a studio for a stencil, adorns coats of spray paint and ditches the phonograph as a testament to what once fell silent, now given new breath of life.

Understanding that an immediate association of music is inherent in the medium, Zombie Vinyls orchestrates imagery of various musical acts on the surfaces of their records. From Jimi Hendrix to Jay-Z, The Clash to Tiesto, each record stands as an homage to those who have aurally entertained, inspired and embodied the conventions of various points in history.

Swirls of tangled hue gradations set the stage for the headlining portraits, a foundation of spray paint affixed to the pits and grooves that formerly sourced hissing transitions between songs.

Taking a cue from street art, the subjects of each record are

depicted via flat layers of solid color planes, intelligently stenciled to trick the mind into believing shadows articulate the faces of the voices we love. Unlike a standard painting base such as canvas, which typically provides a neutral playing field, the LP as a picture plane allows the imagery to resonate beyond its face value.

Tony Feria is the founding artistic mind behind Zombie Vinyls, which he began about a year ago. He claims inspirations for his work stem equally from his love of diverse musical tastes and visual arts. Feria's first piece, a profoundly arcane yet strong delineation of John Lennon that resides on a wall in his apartment, retains sentimental value as it marks the start of the Zombie Vinyls endeavor.

"(After the John Lennon record) I just kept going with this type of artwork, and it naturally progressed into something more," Feria said. "I began discovering different ways to incorporate various designs into the work and put more and more time into the creative development of the images. I could spend six hours on one piece, mess it up, go back and ask myself, 'OK, how do I fix this?' The work is always progressing."

Initially, the decision to turn Zombie Vinyls into an LLC business enterprise was not Feria's intent. Yet much like the development of his artistic technique, the decision to take this collection into the market evolved organically.

With the help of his supportive friend Matt Teper, the two decided to take Feria's portfolio to the next level.

the tech effect

Company traps antimatter

For those of you familiar with the works of author Dan Brown, the name CERN should pop off the page instantly.

The company, whose acronym stands for the European Organization for Nuclear Research and which was made famous through its literary depiction in Brown's novel "Angels & Demons," uses its laboratory on the Franco-Swiss border to conduct research of fundamental physics and the mechanics of the physical universe.

The ALPHA experiment, one of the company's more ambitious endeavors, may be the closest to actually achieving this goal.

Earlier this month, researchers involved with the ALPHA experiment succeeded in trapping antimatter for more than 16 minutes using an antiproton decelerator.

"We can keep the antihydrogen atoms trapped for 1,000 seconds," explained ALPHA spokesperson Jeffrey Hangst in a press release. "This is long enough to begin to study them, even with the small number that we can catch so far."

Antimatter, as science fiction geeks and Tom Hanks fans will recall, is a highly unstable energy that exists in direct opposition to matter (i.e., ev-

erything), and therefore is extremely destructive if brought into contact with matter.

Ever see what happens when you get a horizontal line of connecting tiles in Tetris? The same principle applies here.

Using magnetic fields to trap and suspend the antimatter, the researchers were able to begin studying the "anti-atoms" within it, which may provide clues as to why antimatter is so rare.

It also may illuminate the truth behind the long-held CPT theory, which concerns the fundamental symmetry of the universe according to change, parity and time.

According to the theory as stated in a press release, "a particle moving forward through time in our universe should be indistinguishable from an antiparticle moving backwards through time in a mirror universe."

"Any hint of CPT symmetry breaking would require a serious rethink of our understanding of nature," Hangst said.

So while CERN might not yet be able to create the magnificent doomsday device envisioned by one of the most commercialized authors of recent memory, the company has still managed to contain the material just long enough to begin collecting the puzzle pieces for one more crack at the mysteries of the universe.

“I've been following Tony's work for the last year, always thought that it was great, but didn't think he had an interest in it as anything more than a hobby,” Teper said. “Tony consistently kept creating some really, really great work that made me think I could help him turn this into something more if he wanted to pursue it at a higher level.”

Teper, who handles most of the managerial aspects of Zombie Vinyls, invested his graduation gift money in Feria and his artwork with the ambition of expanding this project into a larger market.

In a short period of time, Zombie Vinyls has already received substantial recognition.

This summer Feria, Teper and their devoted intern Jon Senterfitt

will be participating as vendors in national summer music festivals such as Electric Forest in Rothbury, Mich., and the Identity Festival, which tours more than 20 North American cities.

Senterfitt has even taken his dedication to the company a step further, getting a full-color tattoo of the Zombie Vinyls logo stretched across his entire forearm after only five days on the job.

Zombie Vinyls also retires each stencil after a short-run number of pressings, preventing the records from becoming exhaustive and generic.

Even during a quick visit to the downtown studio, the air saturated with the stench of spray-paint fumes, one can immediately sense a tone of optimism.



Season ends in disappointment

OMAHA, Neb. — Josh Adams' lips quivered as he spoke. With tears streaming down his face, Florida's second baseman was helpless at the podium, unable to process where it all went wrong.

After rolling through the first three games at the College World Series, the Gators, the preseason and postseason favorite to win their first national championship in school history, were swept by South Carolina in the best-of-three finals, losing 5-2 in Game 2 on Tuesday night after an excruciating 2-1 loss in 11 innings Monday.

While the reigning national champions successfully defended their title, Florida left Omaha with an even deeper hollow feeling than a season ago.

"It's nice to make steps. But to be honest with you, the idea is to win this thing," coach Kevin O'Sullivan said. "There's a lot of disappointed players in that locker room right now. ... We wanted to finish this thing off."

After a two-and-out in 2010, the Gators said they knew what to expect, knew what heartbreak felt like.

Now they really do.

"It hurts a lot more this year. Making it to the finals and making it that much closer and having it ripped away from you is heartbreaking," sophomore ace

UF runner booted after sexual assault charge

The promising career of a Florida track and field athlete came to a disturbing close when he was arrested Tuesday on a charge of sexual assault, stemming from an incident just hours after competing at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

Dumisane Hlaselo, 22, of 7 SW 23rd St., told police he entered his roommate's bedroom in the early morning hours of June 12 with the intention of having sex with the semi-conscious victim, according to a Gainesville Police

Department report.

Hlaselo originally denied having sexual contact with the woman when interviewed on the day of the incident, but later confessed to having sex with her without her permission when questioned again by police on Tuesday, the report states.

"We are aware of the arrest of Dumisane Hlaselo," the UF athletic association said in a statement. "We find these charges deeply disturbing. He is no longer a member of the University of Florida track and

SEC, SLIVE PROPOSE NEW RECRUITING RULES

The Southeastern Conference is proposing a number of changes to NCAA football recruiting bylaws. CBSSports.com obtained a letter from SEC commissioner Mike Slive to NCAA Associate Director of Academic and Membership affairs Leeland Zeller sent June 15. Here are some highlights of Slive's proposed changes.

Coaches are currently not permitted to text message recruits at all even though they are permitted to contact them through Facebook and other social media outlets. The SEC would like this rule abolished and replaced with limitations on texting.

Staff members and coaches should be permitted to accept follower requests on Twitter and friend requests on Facebook without having to be monitored by compliance offices. Slive called the current rule a "significant compliance challenge."

College campuses should not be permitted to host 7-on-7 high school football tournaments or other "non-scholastic" events.

Phone calls between coaches and recruits need to be deregulated. Any coach or team staff member should be permitted to receive phone calls from recruits, recruits' parents or recruits' coaches.

An earlier date should be determined for when coaches and recruits can first contact one another off campus.

Slive also wrote the SEC supports earlier official visits, which include allowing summer visits. However, he did not propose a specific date and did admit concerns that allowing summer official visits could be an issue with schools also hosting summer camps.

While there are currently four recruiting periods (Contact, Evaluation, Quiet and Dead), the SEC would like to change it to three (Off-campus, On-campus and Dead). The change would allow coaches to freely communicate with recruits who visit during the spring. It would likely boost the importance of spring football in recruiting and raise the number of early oral commitments.

Coaches should be banned from involvement in local sports clubs.

field team."

According to the report, the victim woke to find Hlaselo on top of her. When Hlaselo ignored her pleas to stop, she pushed him to the floor.

Hlaselo, a South-African native, finally fled the room naked when he said the victim began "freaking out" and is now booked in the Alachua County jail under \$100,000 bail for a second-degree felony charge of sexual assault.

The incident occurred less than a day after UF's third-place finish at the NCAA Outdoors on June 11.

During the meet, Hlaselo ran to a fifth-place finish in the 1,500-meter run, scoring four points for the Gators.

Out of his high school in Jo-

hannesburg, South Africa, Hlaselo was heavily recruited by UF cross country coach Todd Morgan, who tried to get him in the program as a freshman but was held up two years by the academic side of the NCAA transfer process.

As his country's junior record holder in the 1,500m, the efforts to get Hlaselo seemed validated early on, after he broke the UF record in the mile with the first sub-four-minute time in school history and won a 2011 SEC Indoor Championships in the 3,000-meter run.

But while he seemingly dominated on the field for the Gators,

the 5-foot-7, 125 pound runner had difficulties initially adjusting to life in a new country.

During his first six days in the states, Hlaselo had trouble eating American-style foods and ultimately passed out on campus from exhaustion.

After the incident, Morgan said in December he and his staff kept a closer watch on Hlaselo, who also struggled with homesickness after leaving his mother in South Africa.

His teammates, who refer to him as "Dumi," tried to fill that void by helping him get in touch with her on the phone and taking Hlaselo back home with them on holiday breaks.

Hlaselo was, for a time, treated like an adoptive brother according to Morgan and fit in well with everyone around the program.

Hudson Randall said.

Florida played with an all-or-nothing mentality for five months, but the Gators seemingly ran out of gas at the most inopportune time.

For just the fourth time all season — and first since May 5 and 6 at Arkansas — the Gators lost back-to-back games.

“It was definitely an improvement, making it to the finals and all. We understood what it took to get this far, but in the end we didn’t have quite enough,” Randall said. “We didn’t play well enough as a team. We’ve had a great year and a great season, but we fell short in the end.”

Although Florida had a dominant regular season and NCAA Tournament, winning a school-record 53 games wasn’t enough.

While UF had Southeastern Conference rival Vanderbilt’s number all season — the Gators won five of six, including eliminating the Commodores in the CWS — Florida labored against South Carolina, losing four of five.

Leading 1-0 in the eighth inning of Monday’s Game 1, Florida coughed up the late lead and squandered multiple precious scoring opportunities. The Gators were left wondering what if after the Gamecocks again worked their Houdini magic late, escaping a bases loaded jam and throwing out the winning run at the plate.

All season, the Gators were a team that relied on pitching, defense and timely hitting. But in the CWS Finals, the clutch hitting and web gems were largely absent.

In the brief series, UF went 2 for 16 with runners in scoring position with just three RBIs.

Florida also committed seven errors during the tournament — four in the CWS Finals.

“All you can really do is say what if. But it doesn’t matter anymore,” Adams said. “Just got to

get back at it. Got to get back at it next year.”

For seniors like Adams, there will be no new season. No chance at reprisal. But many Florida players could have that chance, as the Gators will return arguably the most talented team in the country.

“I’m not really looking forward to next year yet, but we do have a good group of core guys coming back,” Randall said.

“We’ll be all right,” O’Sullivan said. “We’ve got the whole rotation coming back. [Austin] Maddox closing full time. [Nolan] Fontana, Zunino. We’ll be back.”

UF FOLDS IN FINALS



After sweeping through the competition en route to the championship series, the Gators were a different team in the College World Series Finals.

- In two tries, the Gators are now 0-4 in the CWS Finals, also getting swept by Texas in 2005.
