



# Law experts weigh in on Anthony case

■ SENTENCING IS TODAY.

One six-week-long trial, media frenzy and not-guilty verdict later, a few UF legal experts have weighed in with opinions on the Casey Anthony verdict.

Michael Seigel, a UF law professor, said he thinks the biggest problem for the prosecution was not being able to establish what happened to Caylee Anthony between the time she went missing in June 2008 and the discovery of her body in December 2008 beyond a reasonable doubt.

"Jose Baez repeated the words 'reasonable doubt' so much that they seemed to live in this case," he said, "and the prosecution was unable to re-

spond because they only had a theory." Seigel feels comparisons being made between the Anthony trial and that of O.J. Simpson are far-fetched.

"In the O.J. case, the evidence really was overwhelming," he said. "It came down to racial issues and other side issues. Here there was none of that."

Seigel said the media circus surrounding the trial could be attributed to the attention Caylee's story received when she was first reported missing.

George Dekle, a UF legal skills pro-

# UF grad dies while tubing

A recent UF graduate died Saturday while tubing with his friends at Ginnie Springs on the Santa Fe River.

L. Jahi James, 22, of Lauderhill, Fla., fell into the water when the inner tube he was floating on was flipped over, said Gilchrist County Sheriff's Office investigator Tracy Taylor.

When James didn't resurface, his friends dove into the river to search for him. It took them almost 10 minutes to find him. They attempted CPR.

Gilchrist County Emergency Management rescuers arrived about 20 minutes later and could not revive James. They pronounced him dead at 3:24 p.m.

James graduated from UF in 2010 with a bachelor's degree in biochemistry. After shadowing a pediatrician at the University

of Miami Hospital for a year, he was accepted to the F. Edward Hebert School of Medicine in Maryland. The U.S. Army was going to pay for it.

He would have officially taken up his commission as a second lieutenant on July 25.

Ryan Jones, 22, was on the tubing trip with James. He and James had been friends since their sophomore year of high school, and the tubing trip was part of an informal reunion with a group of scattered friends.

They arrived at the Ginnie Springs Outdoors launch site around 2 p.m.

Jones was the one who started shouting when he realized James hadn't resurfaced. He said James flipped about 200 feet from the springs exit, 45 minutes into their trip.

"It's just a shock that someone that nice

# GOTCHA Ride looking to give barflies a new way home

For at least one year, UF students' nighttime transportation options are expanding.

UF is entering a one-year contract with GOTCHA Ride, an electric-car taxi service that has operated in Gainesville since fall 2010.

The university will give the company \$75,000 out of already-existing funds paid through the transportation access fee, money that also funds students' free RTS rides.

"It's helping them help students receive the benefits of their service," said Scott Fox, the director of UF's Transportation and Parking Services.

Starting in the last two weeks of Summer B, students will be able to access an expanded form of the current GOTCHA, which stands for Green Operated Tran-

sit Carrying Humanity Around, service on Thursday through Saturday 8 p.m. to 3 a.m.

The "Rides," as GOTCHA likes to refer to its electric-powered vehicles, will take students from campus to the downtown district and densely student-populated areas.

The money will help GOTCHA increase its current fleet from three cars to five, add a new charging station and hire new drivers.

GOTCHA does not charge for its rides, though it is customary to tip the driver. The arrangement will be the same under the new program.

The request for the service came from student government, Fox said.

Both UF and GOTCHA Ride are still working on the details of the arrangement, and the university will soon be developing a plan to market the program to students.

### Exxon said failed Mont. pipeline was deeply buried

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) — Exxon Mobil Co. had reassured federal regulators and officials from a Montana town since December that an oil pipeline beneath the Yellowstone River was safe, buried deep enough to avoid any accidental ruptures. Then, on Friday night, the pipe failed, spilling an estimated 42,000 gallons into the flooded river.

The cause of the accident remains under investigation, but the prevailing theory among officials and the company is that the raging Yellowstone eroded the riverbed and exposed the line to damaging rocks or debris.

**Lightning strikes twice for NJ's Lucy the Elephant**

MARGATE, N.J. — Who says lightning never strikes twice in the same place?

Certainly not Lucy the Elephant.

The national historic landmark on the Jersey shore was damaged over the weekend by a lightning strike that knocked out electrical, computer, alarm and air conditioning systems.

Richard Helfant, executive director of the group that operates Lucy, says Sunday's lightning strike could cost anywhere from \$10,000 to \$100,000 to fix.

Lucy was also hit by lightning in 2006.

That hit caused \$162,000 worth of damage to her riding carriage, called a howdah.

After that incident, lightning rods were installed.

They may have helped limit the damage from Sunday's strike.

The popular 65-foot tall wood and metal tourist attraction just south of Atlantic City remains open and will mark its 130th birthday in two weeks.

**Southern California lizard smuggler gets 15 months**

LOS ANGELES — A California man who strapped 15 live lizards to his chest and tried to walk through customs at Los Angeles International Airport has been sentenced to 15 months in prison.

Michael Plank of Lomita was also fined \$2,000 and will be on supervised release for three years after completing his sentence.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service says Plank was returning from Australia in 2009 when customs agents found two geckos, two monitor lizards and 11 smaller lizards fastened to his body.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Dennis Mitchell says the animals are at the San Diego Zoo but he wouldn't comment on what would happen to them.

Plank pleaded guilty last year to smuggling wildlife into the U.S.

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He was represented by attorney Larry Bakman, who asked for a lighter sentence.

**Authorities say they are investigating the matter.****Farmers workers to get \$1.5 million back wages**

DALLAS — Farmers Insurance has agreed to pay just over \$1.5 million in back overtime wages to workers at 11 customer service call centers in Texas and five other states after a U.S. Labor Department investigation.

The federal probe found what a Labor Department statement Wednesday called "significant and systemic violations" of federal overtime and record-keeping provisions of federal wage-hour statutes.

The agreement will pay back overtime to almost 3,500 workers.

Those workers were spread over Farmers centers in Austin, Texas; Olathe, Kan.; Oklahoma City; Lake Mary, Fla.; Grand Rapids, Mich.; Overland Park, Kan.; and Hillsboro, Ore.

A message to Los Angeles-based Farmers seeking comment was not returned Wednesday.

**Okefenokee fire continues to burn**

FOLKSTON, Ga. — Fire information officials at the Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge say the Honey Prairie Fire continues to burn, and a new blaze has been identified.

Officials said Tuesday the Honey Prairie Fire has burned about 290,000 acres, including 2,250 acres in the past two days.

They say a new fire, called the Cravens Fire, has been spotted northwest of the main body of the fire and within its containment lines.

Fire information officer Rich Phelps says the main fire is 70 percent contained, although there are probably lines all the way around the fire.

**Gimenez installed as new Miami-Dade mayor**

MIAMI — Miami-Dade County officially has a new

mayor.

Carlos Gimenez was sworn in during a ceremony Wednesday afternoon in downtown Miami.

Gimenez beat out former Hialeah Mayor Julio Robaina in a runoff election last week.

They were the top two vote-getters in a crowded field of 11 candidates vying to replace former Mayor Carlos Alvarez, who was ousted in a March recall.

Former 2 Live Crew rapper Luther "Luke" Campbell was among the other candidates in the May 24 special election.

He finished fourth, behind former state Rep. Marcelo Llorente.

With more than 2.5 million people, Miami-Dade County is the most populous area ever to recall a local official.

After finishing out the current mayoral term, Gimenez will have to run for re-election in 2012.

**Beached pygmy sperm whale on central Fla. coast**

FORT PIERCE, Fla. — A necropsy is underway to determine why a pygmy sperm whale beached itself on central Florida's Atlantic coast.

Beachgoers tried to keep the 10-foot-long male whale alive Tuesday, but the sea mammal died shortly after a rescue attempt.

The whale had beached itself near the Wabasso Beach Park in Indian River County.

Steve McCulloch of the Harbor Branch Oceanographic Institute in Fort Pierce says pygmy sperm whales often suffer from a heart condition.

The necropsy began late Tuesday was expected to continue Wednesday.

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

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# Audit report released

A document released by UF's Office of Audit and Compliance Review has revealed the School of Architecture's director billed the school for the services of a design center he also directs, signaling a possible conflict of interest.

Martin Gold signed 10 invoices as executive director of the Florida Community Design Center which were submitted to the School of Architecture, of which he is also the director. The invoices were submitted between 2005 and 2010, according to a May 20 investigation report by Chief Audit Executive Brian Mikell.

The bills, ranging in amount from \$60 to \$15,000, totaled \$47,210, according to the report.

Seven of the invoices were submitted

to the School of Architecture for payment, and eight of them did not contain a specific description of the service provided, listing only "consult" or work dates.

The last invoice, received in May 2010, was for \$3,000 in consulting services and was charged against a grant for a member of the architecture faculty.

However, auditors reported that the faculty member did not authorize any consulting by the FLCDC for his project.

Auditors concluded that although the invoices signed by Gold may have been legitimate, they do create the appearance of a conflict of interest.

Calls made to Gold's office were not returned by press time.

# O'Dome to undergo \$900,000 facelift

The Stephen C. O'Connell Center is getting a facelift at an estimated cost of \$900,000.

Lynda Reinhart, director of the center, said the recent renovation addresses safety issues. New handrails, first-level bleachers and wider aisles will better accommodate the audience.

To maintain the old bleachers, which were 30 years old, the university was spending a tremendous amount of money, Reinhart said.

"Even though it was a pretty hefty outlay of money," she said, "it will save the university some money in the long run with less maintenance expense."

The new bleachers have a clean look, she said, that will closely match the Gator blue color and brighten the arena.

The main area previously held around 12,000 seats; with the wider aisles, about 200 seats had to be removed, she said. Fewer seats shouldn't affect ticket pricing in future events.

The project was funded by the O'Connell Center's reserves and started May 14. It had been discussed for about three years, said Jeremy Cynkar, director

of operations. Cynkar said the bleachers will be more aesthetically pleasing.

By the end of this week, the arena should be ready for fall activities. UF Football and Volleyball Fan Day, scheduled for Aug. 20, will be the first event

where people will use the bleachers, but people will get a glance at the new arena with earlier events, such as another Jehovah's Witness Conference and summer commencement during the first week of August.

and genuine — something so horrible could happen to him," Jones said.

Jones said he and other members of the tubing group raced to meet the ambulance carrying James to Shands Hospital, but when they arrived, hospital employees said James had not been checked in. They later found out he had already been declared dead.

When Taylor arrived at the scene, he spoke to two of James' friends, whom he declined to name. They said James had drunk a quarter of a bottle of vodka when members of the group started flipping each other's rafts, and James was dumped into the water.

James' family back home and some of his friends disagree.

Jones said James didn't want to drink in front of his 18-year-old brother, Caleb, who was on the trip. Caleb is a sophomore at UF, and James didn't want to set a bad example for his brother.

"I've never seen brothers as close as they were," said Raymond

Brandte, 23, a friend of James'.

Jones maintains James only had a one-liter Zephyrhills water bottle with Arnold Palmer iced tea and lemonade, to which James added a little vodka. Jones said he saw James only have that one drink throughout the 45-minute trip. He said James was asleep when two of the friends flipped his tube.

fessor, said the case made such a media splash because it had something that many cases don't: a truly innocent victim. He said the uproar due to the verdict was remarkable, especially because he feels a guilty suspect going free is not an uncommon occurrence.

"The way that our criminal justice system is set up is so that if it makes a mistake, the mistake will be to turn somebody guilty loose rather than to put someone innocent away," he said. "That's what it is supposed to do. You shouldn't be shocked when it does that."

Jennifer Zedalis, a trial practice professor and director of UF's trial practice program, said the state's decision to seek the death penalty could have affected the jury's decision in this case. Even though the jury wouldn't be sentencing the defendant, knowing its decision could result in a death penalty puts added stress on its search for a proper verdict, she said.

Zedalis compared the Casey Anthony trial to another high-profile case: the Scott Peterson trial of 2002. Peterson's trial was another example of a case where the prosecution didn't know exactly what happened, but he was convicted and sentenced to death. People were outraged that Peterson could call his mistress at his dead wife's funeral, just as they were outraged that Anthony could be partying at a club in Orlando just days after her child went missing, she said.

She also said the bizarre way the Anthony family interacts was an especially interesting aspect of this case.

"It stretches the bounds of human experience to see a family like this," she said.

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

## Punk legends Hot Water Music announce new record

The local punk rock scene is a rich one that has been well documented in the past.

The Gainesville area has churned out numerous notable bands, such as Less Than Jake and Against Me! — bands that have transcended their success to current times even when record sales are at an all-time low.

But perhaps no homegrown band is more important to Gainesville’s hallowed punk scene than Hot Water Music. The now-legendary punk rockers formed in 1993, releasing seven critically acclaimed full-length albums and several EPs before breaking up on good terms in 2005.

Now, Gainesville punk fans are eagerly anticipating the return of one of the founding fathers of the local scene, as Hot Water Music recently announced plans to record a new full-length record — their first since 2004.

The band, which consists of vocalist/guitarist Chuck Ragan, guitarist Chris Wollard, bassist Jason Black and drummer George Rebelo, originally came out of its hiatus in 2008. The group made a triumphant return with a secret show at Gainesville’s own Common Grounds that year, and since then the band has played scattered shows and festivals.

But before releasing its new full-length record in the spring of 2012, Hot Water Music will self-release a two-song EP to

support an upcoming European tour in August.

“Hopefully everyone likes it,” Black said. “We’re really happy with the songs. We haven’t written in a long time so these were the first two that came out after exchanging ideas.”

Black said the songs came together so quickly because Ragan and Wollard already had ideas brewing from their respective side projects. Ragan has had an extensive solo career since Hot Water Music disbanded while Wollard has worked with a variety of artists.

All four members of Hot Water Music have taken on other musical endeavors since the group broke up six years ago — something that, Black said, made coming back for a full record and tour difficult to plan.

“It took a long time to figure out and schedule it, but we’ve planned it so there’s enough time to do it properly,” Black said. “We scheduled it to be out in the spring, so by the time it comes out, [we’ll all be free.] We wouldn’t have announced

all this if we weren’t planning on supporting the record and giving it a big push.”

With Hot Water Music coming back to pull out all the stops on a new album, many wondered which record label the group would choose to release it. Having released music with Gainesville-based No Idea Records and indie giant Epitaph Records in the past, those two labels seemed to have the inside track on putting out the new album.

But staying true to their form of surprising fans, the group chose Oregon-based Rise Records to release the album. The label, which has made a name for itself by putting out numerous metalcore releases over the past few years, is seemingly in the process of changing its identity.

Craig Ericson, founder and owner of Rise, said adding Hot Water Music to the label’s roster is “a dream come true.”

“Hot Water Music is my favorite band, period,” Ericson said in an email interview. “I’ve been following them since 1997. Once I knew HWM was shopping for a label, I went full-steam ahead.”

Ericson ended up making perhaps the biggest scoop of his label’s history, as countless Hot Water Music fans and the scene at large were shocked at the band’s choice.

“At this point, I expect [that reaction] for everything we announce,” Black said. “When we signed to Epitaph, people

# Junior Battles mix old and new with debut "Idle Ages"

In recent years, there has been surging popular interest in the ability to live in the ever-fleeting "now," a practice that aims to relieve stress generated by worry of what was and potentially will be.

The older we get, the more this method becomes relevant — a state of mind that disavows expectations and allows us to find satisfaction in the reality of the moment. As teenagers, we begin to understand that, no, life is indeed not fair, and we develop strategies in our minds for how we can embark upon change while embracing angst.

For some, this momentum maintains its strength for years; for others, the angst sours as the weight of "have-to-dos" crushes the "wants" of hope-

ful, albeit naive, agendas.

Time is short. Growing up sucks.

Junior Battles, a four-piece band from Ontario, Canada, has put together a collection of songs that investigate the ins and outs of growing up, fighting nostalgia and coming to terms with the infuriating reality that sometimes life doesn't unfold in the ways that one had imagined.

Appropriately titled "Idle Ages," Junior Battles' debut full-length for Gainesville-based Paper + Plastick Records is blatantly honest without soliciting sympathy with its admittance of successes and bummers that occur throughout the development of adulthood.

What results is a musical gift of high-energy, guitar-centered, pop-punk hooks sealed in a duration of less than 40 minutes, like a clever tongue-in-cheek card salutation affixed via

duct tape to poorly creased wrapping paper.

The opening track, "Seventeen," establishes the tone for the record. Instantly blasting listeners full-force with a wall of impatient vocals, the song introduces "Idle Ages" with a lyrical declaration that quickly hooks one's interest: "Here's a list of reasons we're making this morning to never feel angry or get disappointed. Our body's growing old while our hearts languish in the gutter, and we're arm in arm."

But where does Junior Battles intend to take us?

As the record unfolds, the band delves into an inquisition that likens a poetic confession, a psychoanalyst's rant that attempts to uncover where, when and how one goes wrong by default in maturation. Why do lame things happen to good people who, as the band declares, "are all just doing

the best [they] can?"

Twelve songs reveal tales of debauchery, love gone awry, frustration amalgamating into indifference, giving up but not necessarily giving in, etc. The lyrics frequently strike a chord, making this album relevant for different points in one's life, without ever becoming too nostalgic.

From a strictly musical standpoint, it's difficult to pinpoint the "sound" of Junior Battles. It would be easy to call this a pop-punk record, but the classification seems wholly unfair to the band.

For one thing, the category of "pop-punk" is as muddled and generic as the term "indie rock" — what does it characterize?

The fact that Junior Battles is all over the place doesn't help classification purposes. The instrumentation is uptempo, structured around power

chords, full of memorable hooks and vocal melodies.

But it's undeniable that Junior Battles is doing something different from its predecessors, although the exact location of the variation is hard to pinpoint. Maybe it's in the noodly guitars reminiscent of the Midwestern emo we thought had been blown away already. Maybe it's in the delivery of the dual vocals, which inspire comparisons to bands from Blink-182 to The Get Up Kids.

Junior Battles' songs veer from steady flow, the transitions often choppy and sharp like a newbie learning to drive stick. This observation should not be confused as a criticism, however.

Instead, it's safe to assume Junior Battles is expanding upon a genre it's been following since adolescence, proving that growing up does not necessarily mean giving in.

# Former executive says Apple to enter TV market

Greg Godin thinks the idea for Apple's new product is a dud.

Godin, a DirecTV representative, along with several other experts, has mixed opinions on Apple's upcoming venture into the TV market.

According to an article on DailyTech, Apple has plans to enter the television business. An anonymous former executive said the multinational corporation might unveil an Apple-branded TV later this year.

The release of such a product has been rumored for a while, but this is the first time a


present or former executive has confirmed the launch, DailyTech said.

Richard Lutz, a UF marketing professor, admires Apple's marketing skills and believes the company would not go into the sector without doing its research. Success will come with how the company markets the product.

"To be honest, I thought the iPad was a total loser when they introduced it, but I was wrong," Lutz said.

The suggested plans for the new product are to bundle Apple TV, released in May of 2007, and iTunes together in a physical TV set.



One marketing strategy that a television does not have is portability. Now more than ever, people don't want to be tied to their devices.

Investing in a non-portable product might seem contrary to Apple's normal plan, with most of their products offering maximum portability. But according to International Business Times, the move would make sense because it would allow Apple to compete with Netflix.

For a company that relies on a few highly sought-after products, an Apple television could provide another marquee product with which to fascinate the masses.

According to Lutz, even portable devices are replaced at such a fast pace that the idea of an Apple television taking off seems uncertain.

"Technology is moving so rapidly," Lutz said, "that it makes the whole device obsolete before its time."

Best Buy employee Kevin Swarm does not indulge in Apple products himself, but believes an Apple TV would see some success.

"[People will] just flock to it because they're all sheep when it comes to Apple."

# Foldable steering wheels could appear in 2016

As cellphones, computers and our lines of communication grow ever smaller and more consolidated, Michigan's TRW Automotive is working on extending those same principles to a place you may not have considered: your car.

With the rise in popularity of ultra fuel-efficient cars and electric cars, TRW is working on revolutionizing the automotive industry by developing a steering wheel that folds up and retracts into the dashboard when the vehicle is parked.

"This technology could offer tangible, practical benefits in addition to the styling freedom it provides," TRW development manager Manuel Poyant said in a press release.

"The key benefit is to make it much easier for elderly drivers or other drivers with reduced mobility to get in and out of the vehicle. Due to the significant growth of small city cars, this technology could open up the

possibility for even smaller cabin designs." The proposed design TRW is currently working with features two bisected handles that lock into place when the vehicle is being driven, but that fold inward into the dashboard once the engine is turned off.

When the driver once again starts the engine, the wheel is designed to automatically deploy into the driving position.

The primary market that TRW is gearing this development toward is the over-65 population, which numbered close to 36 million in 2009 and is projected to top 72 million by the year 2030.

But Poyant and the team at TRW

don't want to wait that long to put it out on the market.

The company believes the retractable steering wheel could begin showing up in cars as early as 2016, and that it may even be part of an elderly focused equipment package that would make driving easier for people with limited mobility.

The steering wheel provides another benefit with its more secure style.

A potential car thief might be discouraged by the lack of a steering wheel in plain sight.

And although the only images the masses have seen thus far of TRW's designs are computer renderings of the theorized prototype, automotive manufacturers have already begun showing interest in the folding steering wheel, giving credence to TRW's goal of putting them in vehicles within the next five years.

freaked out. When we toured with Sick Of It All, people freaked out. At this point we expect that reaction from almost any decision we make."

Black said the opportunity and mystery of something new also played a part in deciding what label to release a new record on.

"As a band, since we started this, we've always been interested in working with as many different people as possible," he said. "If we release the record on Epitaph or No Idea, we pretty much have an exact idea of what would happen. We really have no idea what will happen with Rise."

A host of questions still surround the situation, but one thing Ericson and the band agree on is what seems like a calmness approaching the release. When asked if he felt any additional pressure releasing a record from a band as respected as Hot Water Music, Ericson didn't flinch.

"I'm sure there will be expectations, but at the end of the day, I'll be able to sleep at night knowing we worked our hardest promoting the band and the release," Ericson said. "What it sells is not the most important aspect — far

from it, in fact."

Black stressed the band's confidence in Rise and said they trusted the label because "[Ericson] really wanted to do the record more than anyone else." He added that by now, fans should expect the unexpected and have faith in the band's choices.

As much as the release is being anticipated by die-hard fans who have waited years for this announcement, a lot of time remains between now and spring of next year. In that time, Hot Water Music will tour Europe in August, headline The Fest 10 in October and finally head into the studio in winter.

The most exciting aspect of the band's announcement to release a new record might be the excitement of the band itself.

"I think having so long away from writing makes it fresh and exciting for us," Black said. "It's not like, the touring cycle is over, let's go write. Everyone really wants to do it."

"The more we talk about it, the more shows we play and the more songs we write, the more it seems like everyone is all fired up about it."







After a mediocre finish and a barrage of off-the-field issues, Florida coach Will Muschamp will try to balance promises of proper conduct with the expectations of winning immediately in his first year.

## No. 4: Muschamp - Will Florida Way win?

It's been seven months since Will Muschamp first stood at a lectern and promised his players would abide by a specific code of conduct.

## Gators pull offer from top LB, cite space issues

While observers might consider linebacker a position of current weakness, Florida still repealed a scholarship offer to one of the nation's standout high schoolers last month.

Four-star recruit Deaysean Rippy is a star at Sto-Rox High in McKees Rocks, Pa.

Rippy recorded 77 tackles and seven sacks as a junior, and he holds scholarship offers from top of the line programs like Alabama, Ohio State and Southern California.

But Florida is noticeably absent from that list — no longer an option for Rippy after a tumultuous trip to Gainesville.

The Gators originally offered Rippy while Urban Meyer was still at the helm.

The outside linebacker was close with former defensive coordinator Teryl Austin and said he spoke with Meyer "a lot,"

forming a solid relationship.

But on June 18, while on a family-funded unofficial weekend trip to Gainesville, the Gators repealed Rippy's offer.


The withdraw came a mere three days after fellow outside linebacker Lorenzo Phillips orally committed to UF.

"They really burned the bridge with me, just by the way that they handled everything down there," he said.

"Instead of calling my mentor or calling me or sending me a Facebook message. Instead of letting me waste \$400 on airfare and being miserable in my dorm for two days."

Rippy was told that with two outside linebacker oral commits — Phillips and Jeremi Powell — the Gators had reached their quota at the position but would continue to recruit him.

He plans to sit down with his mentor — Pittsburgh Steelers employee Ty Ryan — and his family before going forward.

But adversity isn't new for Rippy. In middle school, a downfall in family finances forced a move into a rough neighborhood.

He fell into bad ways, selling drugs and stealing cars. He spent 12 days at Pittsburgh's Shuman Juvenile Detention Center when he was just 13 years old.

"It's like you're being commanded to do whatever they tell you," Rippy said of Shuman. "Every time you came back into the room you had to squat and cough to make sure you didn't have anything. After that, it was like, 'I could be out playing football.'"

Football and nearly two weeks of hell at Shuman helped turn a once-troubled kid into a motivated athlete.

"If you were to look at me now, you wouldn't think that I was the same person I was five, six years ago," he said.

As a freshman, Rippy started at middle linebacker for Sto-Rox and immediately drew

attention.

When a visiting college coach asked about No. 11, he was informed that he was inquiring about a 14-year-old.

Before he was a sophomore, Rippy had verbal offers from Maryland, Pittsburgh and Syracuse.

He would also become student body vice president and a positive community figure.

After hearing a young local boy named Nick was a big fan of his play, Rippy surprised him by showing up at his house for family dinner.

"I could never really imagine that I was going to be this big-time national recruit," the 6-foot-2, 198-pounder said.

"Coming from how I grew up and the place that we live, I guess I look at so many football players and their history ... and it's always the real football players who had a rough lifestyle who grow up and become big.

I tell kids, no matter where you're from, you can really do anything. I'm kind of big on that."

South Florida, Auburn, North Alabama and Texas Tech have all gotten stronger after taking on Chris Dunkley, Mike Blakely, Janoris Jenkins and Javares McRoy, while Florida's ranks have thinned at key positions.

Although Muschamp's hard line against these players has been popular, it's tough to predict if it will translate into early wins Florida fans demand.

Expectations for this season will undoubtedly be high despite last year's 8-5 record, and most will look to Meyer's inaugural 9-3 season as a fair starting point.

But even with the aid of a coaching staff featuring six Super Bowl rings, Muschamp's initial slate of Southeastern Conference games looks daunting with a brutal four-game stretch against Alabama, LSU, Auburn and Georgia.

Having Jenkins, arguably college football's top cornerback, would've been invaluable against teams like Auburn, Alabama and Florida State which are unproven at quarterback after the departures of Heisman Trophy winner Cam Newton, Greg McElroy and Christian Ponder.

The Florida Way, however, demanded Jenkins' departure after his third arrest in 23 months and deprived the Gators of a rare chance to play their strength against another team's weakness.

But if anything can be learned from recent coaching transitions in the SEC, it's not to rush to judgment following a coach's first campaign.

In 2007, Nick Saban, Muschamp's mentor at LSU and

with the Miami Dolphins, endured a 6-6 regular season with the Crimson Tide. Two years later, Auburn's Gene Chizik fared only slightly better at 7-5.

But in their sophomore years, all three coaches turned the corner.

Alabama finished the 2008 regular season undefeated and one win from an appearance in the national title game, while Chizik led the Tigers to the 2010 BCS National Championship.

Even Muschamp's predecessor made the jump from second-tier SEC contender in 2005, to national champion just a year later.

With just 58 days before Muschamp's first kickoff in The Swamp as head coach, the Florida Way has instituted a launching point for the future.

The only thing left to do is win.

## No. 7 - Boise State

### 2011 Outlook

Led by Heisman Trophy candidate quarterback Kellen Moore and often-sought after coach Chris Peterson, the Broncos will look to continue their roll as BCS busters. Although Boise State must deal with an ongoing NCAA investigation, the Broncos return a high-powered offense and unheralded defensive front seven.
