

# SG officials to review election complaints, concerns

Fall Student Senate elections ended Wednesday, but some questions about the validity of the results still linger.

District E tallied 535 student voters Tuesday and Wednesday, up more than 700 percent from the fall 2010 count of 65 voters.

Students Party member Jonathan Ossip said party members are trying to get elections map experts to look at the numbers and confirm that the District E results are an anomaly.

District E, the commuter students' district, includes all ZIP codes except those specified in Districts A, B, C and D, which include the areas around UF. If the registrar's office had a student's permanent home address and not his or her Gainesville address, that student would have been placed in District E.

Ossip said students receiving the correct ballot is vital to fair elections.

He said when he voted in the fall 2010 paper-ballot elections, his address wasn't listed under the correct district, but it was caught before he made it to the polls. He filled out an affidavit with his address, which was confirmed within minutes.

He said a similar process should have been used this semester to avoid discrepancies.

## Greeks raise \$10K for tornado relief

UF will show that compassion trumps rivalry at the University of Alabama football game Saturday when the UF Greek community presents a \$10,000 check for tornado relief in Tuscaloosa, Ala.

After Tuscaloosa was devastated by a series of tornadoes in April, UF's four Greek councils decided to start a fundraising effort titled "Florida Greeks for 'Bama Relief."

"When we get a call that Alabama needs help, we immediately don't think about the football rivalry," said IFC President Rajiv Asnani, 23. "We think, 'These guys are our peers; let's reach out and help.'"

Each individual sorority and fraternity

chapter has been hosting outreach events to raise funds and spread awareness including a "Pie the Student Body Vice President" and a FIFA video game tournament.

Meredith Lynch, Tuscaloosa Incident Command public relations coordinator, stressed the city's gratefulness and that it will help the long-term recovery effort.

The money will be used for rebuilding infrastructure and purchasing weather radios for low-income households.

Asnani said each chapter was responsible for contributing \$200 to the donation.

"We may be intense rivals on the football field, but in the end we're both two very successful Southeastern Conference universities that have a great reputation for doing great things around the world," Asnani said.



# Big game calls for upped security

After six years, the Tide is coming back into The Swamp.

Gainesville is about to become flooded with fans of the University of Alabama's Crimson Tide, and in their wake comes the increased security concerns of a major SEC rivalry game.

"We look at all games with true significance as a premium game," said Maj. Brad Barber, public information officer with the University Police Department. "LSU, Alabama, FSU and Tennessee are all approached operationally the same."

More officers will be on hand Saturday, which is usual for games of this magnitude, he said.

"There is a difference between when we play Florida State and Furman," Barber said.

On Sept. 30, 2006, the last time the Tide came to Gainesville, 70 people were ejected or arrested from the stadium, he said.

A sold-out stadium will watch the UF vs. Alabama game Saturday at 8 p.m., said Mark Gajda, assistant athletics director of ticket operations with the University Athletic Association.

The Swamp's seating capacity is 88,000, and 90,000 people are expected to attend the game.

"Tailgating will be at a premium," he said. If cars are obstructing the flow of traffic or parked in a non-designated area then the car will be towed by Superior Towing LLC, Barber said.

"Along with expected increase in traffic, people need to arrive early and park in designated areas," he said. "That's the safest way to go."

The city of Gainesville and Alachua County will, as usual, be very involved in policing the game this weekend.

"We are not treating this football game differently than any other football game," said Cpl. Angelina Valuri, public information officer with the Gainesville Police Department.

Some officers will report to their traffic posts earlier and stay later than normal this weekend, and officers will be looking through neighborhoods for parking violations.

GPD contracts with University Towing, Valuri said.

If you are parked on private property, it is up to the owner of the property to call and have a car towed, she said.

# Mobile museum educates about slavery in Florida

The traveling Florida Modern-Day Slavery Museum is back to show that slavery is still present today.

The museum will be making five stops in Alachua County from Saturday to Wednesday.

The mobile museum, brought to the city by the Interfaith Alliance for Immigrant Justice, displays the presence of slavery in Florida from before the Civil War to the present.

The museum itself is a mock-up of the cargo trucks used in a slavery operation from 2008.

"People were forced to live in it without any sanitation or water and you can see the shackles and chains that these workers were chained up with," said Richard MacMaster Interfaith Alliance for Immigrant Jus-

tice assistant organizer.

The museum's tour through Gainesville will begin Saturday at

# Alumni couple adds \$63,000 to original donation of \$1.9 million

► THE MONEY WILL EVENTUALLY FUND RESEARCH PROJECTS IN THE COLLEGE OF EDUCATION.

As the almost \$2 million they had set aside began depreciating, Bill and Robbie Hedges were not worried about losing money but concerned about how to give more.

In 2005, Bill Hedges, 87, a former professor at the College of Education, and his wife, Robbie, 85, set up a fund of about \$1.93 million that eventually will benefit research projects at the college.

However, after the money was set aside, its value quickly began to decline because of the stock market slump a few years later. After losing about \$100,000, the Hedges decided an additional contribution was in order.

"The reason we added to it is that two or three years after we gave it to the university, the stock market dropped," Bill Hedges said. "So we thought, 'Well shucks, we have a little extra money. Why don't we add to it?'"

The couple added \$63,000 to their original contribution, which was funded by the sale of family-owned real estate.

The Hedges, both former teachers, set up the trust to fund research that will benefit children who fall behind in school and drop out before graduating. Bill Hedges said these students, whom he calls "invisible children," are becoming more common in

the American education system, and nothing is being done to help them.

He said that after a year as a Fulbright lecturer at Chungnam National University in Daejeon, Korea, he realized how many American students were falling behind. He said about 94 percent of children in Korea graduate from high school, while in Florida

the figure is only about 67 percent. The national average is not much better.

"A third of our children never finish high school," Bill Hedges said. "A few years ago, the United States led the world. It's sad. Florida is a tragic case in terms of education."

The William D. and Robbie F. Hedges

Research Fund was created as a charitable remainder unitrust, which means the funds benefit the Hedges and their family while they are alive, but after their lifetime, the remaining assets will go to research projects at the College of Education.

Because the funds are not directly available to the college at this time, no specific research programs are planned, but the Hedges said one area that is specifically important is researching preventative indicators that would allow teachers and parents to assess which students may be at risk.

"The early learning, that predates school even, is so important," Robbie Hedges said.

Elizabeth Bondy, professor and director of the School of Teaching and Learning in the College of Education, had Bill Hedges as a professor during her time as a doctoral student at UF. She said the donation is right on track with the goals of the college.

"It is such an important need in the state of Florida and across the nation," Bondy said.

Bondy said much of the research done at the College of Education is funded by outside grants, and the Hedges' contribution will be extremely valuable.

The \$63,000 addition to the trust will increase the amount of interest collected and increase the amount of funding for future research — research the Hedges say is crucial to our nation.

"Ignorance and freedom don't go hand in hand," Bill Hedges said. "And with this high incidence of ignorance, you're jeopardizing your freedom. We are very, very concerned about it."

## Cyberbullying should be treated as a crime

It has been nearly a year since Tyler Clementi, former Rutgers student, committed suicide after his roommate streamed an intimate video of Clementi and another man. I remember when I first read about the tragedy in the news. I didn't understand — how did this happen? What caused Clementi so much pain that he had to end his life?

The reason that Clementi's suicide elicited so much national attention not only stems from the fact that it delineated a culture of intolerance but also because it gave rise to a new problem in our society: the danger of cyberbullying.

Since the evolution of the Internet in the 1990s, one of the most apparent outcomes has been the simple accessibility to cyber contact in lieu of human contact.

However, with the invention of any form of technology, there are always some issues that are unforeseen and unthinkable. As Clementi's suicide so clearly demonstrates, the Internet is a smooth and easy passage into the dark world of cyberbullying.

Ultimately, cyberbullying is not about intolerance toward homosexuals. In essence, we are free to feel what we want about others. Whether you choose to accept the way someone expresses himself or not, there are always better ways to define your beliefs than to attack and judge.

Fortunately, New Jersey has made commendable efforts to challenge bullies in the future. By enacting the "Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights," the state has taken a national lead in deterring bullying within public schools. While the Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights has grand intentions and is extremely purposeful with its agenda, it fails to specifically address cyber crimes, which are often more harmful than your average hate crime. In fact, according to the Anti-Defamation League, "although 44 states have bullying statutes, fewer than half offer guidance about whether schools may intervene in bullying involving 'electronic communication.'"

New Jersey's initiative in making this daring legislative reform is nonetheless admirable. But we can't stop here. Treating cyberbullying as a rare and unique crime is a flawed approach, and we must understand that it happens regularly.

Recently, a 15-year-old freshman high school student, Phoebe Prince, committed suicide because of prolonged cyberbullying from a group of girls who harassed her for dating an older football player. Beleaguered by hateful text messages and taunting in the form of Facebook posts, Prince could only endure so much. Students would scream at her from one side of the library, calling her derogatory names. One girl went so far as to throw a drink at her from a car while driving away laughing. While some bullies are too young to understand the repercussions of their actions, Phoebe's harassers were 17- and 18-year-old students. They have no excuse. What's worse is that Prince was a recent Irish immigrant.

Why couldn't Prince's death have been prevented? Why aren't Prince's bullies being severely punished for their unforgiving actions? Why didn't the school feel compelled to intervene? The simple answer is that there is no imposed law.

Are we going to wait for another young person to end his or her life just because of a lack of enforcement?

It is time we realize that cyberbullying is becoming a fatal crime. Laws must be created, publicized and enforced.

Would this be a violation of our first-amendment rights? Maybe in a small, convoluted way. But our forefathers did not write the Constitution to invite heinous actions into our society.

## Companies “greenwash” consumers

A recent phenomenon in the marketplace has become a big deal in the past couple of years. The trend I am referring to is the flood of “green” products on store shelves.

You have seen these products: eco-friendly laundry detergents, all-natural shampoos, sustainable paper products. Many big-time manufacturers have delved into this world with at least one or two “green” products.

Initially, this seems like a great development. Are people finally beginning to realize their negative impacts on the environment and taking steps to reduce them?

Unfortunately, what I believe is happening is something that has been termed “greenwashing.” Greenwashing is the act of wrongfully advertising something as being better for the environment when in fact it is not. Sometimes, the resources wasted on green campaigning negate any benefits the product may have had for the environment.

Many of these greenwashing companies are large corporations with worldwide distributions, meaning they more than likely sacrificed their “green” ways somewhere along their path to prosperity. Truthfully, these companies would suffer dearly if their operations actually went “green.” They would have to reformulate many of their products, which would cost millions of dollars.

What is actually happening is very similar to something you see on TV shows. Often, one token character of some racial minority is present in order to appease minority groups and to draw in viewers from these groups.

The same goes for the greenwashing companies. They are trying to appeal to the environmentally conscious consumers by creating “green” products. They are doing so to increase revenues, not to save the environment.

For example, Clorox has created a line of green products under the Green Works label that they claim

are natural, complete with cute illustrations of leaves on the packaging. The truth is that there is little basis for this claim. The ingredients for these products are not even listed on the bottles, so who’s to say what is really in these products? It is evident that Clorox created this line of token “green” products as a ploy to capture part of the eco-friendly market.

The birth of greenwashing has made it increasingly difficult for people trying to decrease their harmful environmental impacts to do so. They now must sift through a sea of deceitful and outright false advertising in order to actually find products and companies that are indeed “green.”

What may be needed is stricter governmental regulations on how products can be labeled. The U.S. Department of Agriculture’s standards for organic-certified products are an example of a good start to governing label terminology.

Fortunately, there is some hope for consumers who want to make a difference. Some third-party organizations have taken the lead in determining which products truly have minimal impacts on the environment.

These groups evaluate products in multiple aspects, from the impact of extracting resources for the products to the packaging materials they use, only recommending those that meet their strict standards of excellence. Two of these groups are EcoLogo ([www.ecologo.org](http://www.ecologo.org)) and Green Seal ([www.greenseal.org](http://www.greenseal.org)).

Before I get off my soapbox, I would just like to say that you can prevent yourself from being conned by greenwashing products with the valuable resources I mentioned. Do not waste your chance to make an environmental difference by supporting those who are just trying to line their pockets.

### Villamil left out some details

I don’t know which budget Unite Party member T.J. Villamil was talking about in his letter this week, but it isn’t one that was passed by the Student Senate.

His letter was so full of misinformation that I have to assume it was an attempt to discredit the Students Party on an election day.

Villamil is the Student Body treasurer, so he knows Student Government is responsible for allocating the full amount of the Activity & Service Fees it receives from the university —\$12.87 per credit hour, equaling roughly \$16.7 million for 2011-2012. He knows this because he was chairman of the Student Senate committee that oversaw the development of this budget last year and because these numbers are printed in the “Finance for Students” packet available in the SG Finance office.

It’s true that SG typically allocates the majority of its funds to RecSports and the Reitz Union. But SG makes that decision. Florida law gives SG the authority to decide how the money is spent, so only SG can allocate the A&S Fee paid by students.

Saying that SG’s budget is only \$4.8 million is like saying the federal government doesn’t have full control over all of the tax revenue it receives.

As for his next claim: that SG doesn’t use student funds to reim-


burse SG officials for their phone-related costs? It reimburses them not only for their phone plans but also for their phones. They’re even allowed to put this money toward apps for their phones. You know, so they have the option to download, say, Angry Birds for official SG business purposes.

As a former student senator who served on the Budget and Appropriations Committee, I am very familiar with the policies surrounding student organizations that fail to spend all of their allocated funds for the year. The unspent funds are placed in SG’s reserves account, which is off-limits to student organizations. And when you don’t spend it, your budget is more likely to be reduced next time around.

Being the Student Body treasurer and a former budget chairman, Villamil knows all of this. So when he decides to represent himself and his office by writing a letter correcting alleged “factual errors” about the budget, he should at least show some self-dignity by making sure his response is factual. Especially on election day.

The Students Party has been nothing but honest about the numbers from the start. It’s just unfortunate how many students may have been misled by Wednesday’s hit piece.

# Gun law has state officials scrambling

Officials across Florida are scrambling to repeal gun control ordinances, including bans on firearms in parks, buildings and other public places, before a new state law takes effect.

It adds penalties to an existing statute that requires governments at the local level to follow state gun laws, which are generally less restrictive. The pre-emption law has often been ignored — until now.

The legislation is one of 29 laws that become effective Saturday.

"We can restrict having clubs, flame throwers and hand grenades, but when it comes to firearms, we can't restrict them," said Kraig Conn, legislative counsel for the Florida League of Cities.

The law imposes penalties for violating the 1987 pre-emption statute that covers ammunition and firearms.

"It merely says you have to follow the law and if you don't follow the law there are consequences," said the law's sponsor, Rep. Matt Gaetz, R-Fort Walton Beach.

The National Rifle Association pushed for the legislation, saying cities and counties were ignoring the pre-emption law because it had no penalties.

City and county officials could be fined up to \$5,000 if they failed to repeal a pre-empted gun ordinance or try to enforce it. They also won't be able to use taxpayer funds to defend themselves or pay the fines. Violators also could be fired or removed from office by the governor.

# Participants required to wear undies of some kind

Participants arrive at the run dressed in clothes they wish to donate. Before the dash begins, the clothing is removed and collected in trash bags, and the participants prepare to run across campus dressed in their underwear.

Beau Bergeron, a UF alum, started The Great Underwear Dash in 2005. Since then, it has grown into a school tradition and is even featured in the "F Book" as an experience that students should have before graduation.

The university approved the run under one condition: People must wear some form of underwear.

"You're not allowed to be naked because that's indecent exposure," said Josh Kelley, a 20-year-old mathematics junior who ran in the event last spring.

The race is less than one mile long. It begins on Turlington Plaza, circles around Library West, goes down University Avenue and turns back toward Turlington Plaza. Participants must remain on campus, or they can be arrested for indecent exposure.

Kelley plans to donate the clothing to Operation Cover-Up Gainesville, a Student Alumni Association-sponsored service project. UF is competing against FSU to see which school can collect more clothing by Novem-

ber's football game. The clothes will be donated to United Way, The Salvation Army and other charities.

Although Kelley said it's tough to track how many people participate in the dash each

year, about 2,430 people said they participated in the spring on "The Great Underwear Dash 12" Facebook page.

"If we get half of that, that's awesome," Kelley said. "Even 20 percent of that will be great."

# SG Election Commission to meet this morning

Officials failed to test the system properly, he said.

Supervisor of Elections Toni Megna said she tested the system with senators after the Sept. 20 Student Senate meeting, which was a week before elections began.

Elections rules state that the supervisor of elections must test the voting system in front of specific officials two days before the elections.

Megna declined to comment on the elections rules.

If students were placed in District E, their voting screens Tuesday morning would have indicated that. The page also listed each ZIP code not included in District E. Students who noticed zoning errors could select to complete affidavits with their correct addresses.

After about 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, students who were zoned for District E were immediately directed to an affidavit to verify correct address registration.

Megna said students could have gone on to the SG website to check their district.

"Any students that go there are the ones that are interested in being educated vot-

ers," she said.

Megna said fliers directing students to the website were distributed during slating.

She said she didn't know why the number of District E voters spiked this year.

"Maybe just more people live outside UF," Megna said. "I don't know."

At 11 a.m. today in room 284 of the Reitz Union, the Elections Commission will hear the complaints made regarding the elections, including those filed by the Students Party.

Complaints were filed before midnight Wednesday, and Megna said she knew of four complaints officially filed.

# Census: More same-sex couples living together than in 2000

The number of same-sex households in the United States is on the rise, and Gainesville is no exception, according to 2010 census data released Tuesday.

About 650,000 same-sex couples reported living together. Of those, 131,729 same-sex couples reported that they were married.

The total number of same-sex couples who reported living together is nearly double what

it was in 2000, according to the Associated Press.

The growth in results shows that society is becoming more accepting, said Terry Fleming, co-president of the Pride Community Center of North Central Florida.

"It's important to recognize that LGBT folks live in every corner of every county in the country," Fleming said. "And that's reflected in the census data." Because Massachusetts first legalized gay marriage in 2004, the 2010 census was the first time same-sex couples could mark themselves married and be counted as so.

Florida's number of same-sex households has grown 60 percent since 2000, according to

a Sun-Sentinel article. Gainesville recorded 367 same-sex partner households in 2010, up from 226 in 2000, according to the South Florida Sun-Sentinel's U.S. Census database.

Because the general population is still not completely accepting of LGBT communities, people often misreport their situations, Fleming said.

"Many people are afraid to identify — even on an anonymous form — as gay or lesbian," Fleming said.

Gainesville Community Alliance founder Joseph Antonelli said people will not respond hon-

estly until they know they're protected.

Although the census data shows about 131,000 same-sex married couples, the number of legally recognized gay partnerships is much lower, Gary Gates, a UCLA demographer and Census Bureau consultant, told the Associated Press.

Couples reported themselves married because they feel that way, Antonelli said.

"If you've been with somebody for 15, 25 or 50 years, would you not consider yourself married?" he said.

Fleming, who has been with his partner for 14 years, marked "married" on his form.


"If I tell you that I'm married, you know what that means," Fleming said.

# Campus buildings get new addresses in case of emergencies

Emergency responders and visiting parents should have an easier time getting around campus because UF's buildings have new addresses.

The addresses have been changed to traditional street addresses. For example, Turlington Hall's address has been changed from the name of the building to 330 Newell Drive.

The old building names wouldn't appear on GPS devices, which made it hard for emergency vehicles and new parents to find their way around campus, said Frank Phillips, an associate director of UF's Facilities, Planning and Construction.

One of the reasons the addresses were changed was to make sure fire trucks, ambulances and other emergency vehicles could find the campus buildings on their GPS devices quickly.

"Our paramount concern is we do not in any way, shape or form want to have an issue with emergency response," he said.

The process of changing the addresses has been going on for about three years, Phillips said. It took about a year to get the addresses finalized.

Keith Godwin, E911 coordinator and communications section chief at Alachua County Fire Rescue, said the lack of traditional addresses made emergency responders' jobs more difficult.

"When you have a physical address, it's logical," he said. "It makes sense."

Signs with the new addresses will be added to campus buildings, but the names of halls and buildings won't change. Some campus buildings, including Dickinson Hall and the Counseling & Wellness Center, already have their address signs installed.

# Internet becomes as important as air to some college students

## Young people increasingly dependent

The Internet is essential for life — at least for Generation Y.

New data indicate that one in three college students and young professionals 30 years old and younger consider the Internet to be as important as air, food, water and shelter.

The data, which were collected in 14 countries, come from the 2011 Cisco Connected World Technology Report released Sept. 21.

This is the second year the report has been released. Last year, the report studied employee behavior and information technology policy, according to the Cisco website. This year's report focused on the importance and

role of the Internet in young people's lives. About 3,000 people were surveyed this year.

Jeanna Mastrodicasa, assistant vice president for UF Student Affairs, didn't have email or the Internet when she started college in 1988. Today, college students rely on the Internet as a tool to do everything from research and homework to socializing and shopping, Mastrodicasa said.

"When we had a student organization meeting we would call people on the telephone and say, 'See you Tuesday night,'" she said. "The Internet has become the tool to be able to do things that people did previously using other mechanisms."

When forced to make a choice between having a car or the Internet, about two out of

three people surveyed chose the Internet.

Telecommunication junior Kamaron Scholl, 21, didn't have an Internet connection the first two months after he moved to Gainesville, but he said having one does make life easier.

"You can go online and buy a ticket for something, or you could spend half an hour driving to and from somewhere to physically get a ticket," Scholl said. "I think it's just [a] convenience that we're starting to get used to."

Two of five college students surveyed said the Internet is more important to them than dating, going out with friends or listening to

music.

Food science and human nutrition sophomore Ruhiyyih Bannister, 19, agreed that the Internet is important but said it's not more important than human interaction.

"The Internet isn't real life," Bannister said. "You can't substitute dating and friends with the Internet."

In the survey, 91 percent of college students said they have a Facebook account. Of those, 81 percent check their Facebook page at least once a day. Seven of 10 employees in the report became friends on Facebook with their managers and/or their coworkers.

Bannister said she doesn't see a problem with being friends on Facebook with coworkers if only appropriate content is posted. "Facebook is just a good way to connect with anybody," Bannister said.





## Gators facing first real rushing test against Tide

▶ ALABAMA AVERAGES MORE THAN 230 YARDS PER GAME.

Florida's players don't like talking about last season. They don't want to discuss the 31-6 drubbing at the hands of Alabama — and for good reason.

The Tide ran all over the Gators' defense in Tuscaloosa, Ala., a year ago, compiling 170 yards and two scores on the ground.

"We're not even really looking at last year," linebacker Jon Bostic said. "It's a whole new year."

A new year and a new defense, too.

Florida's rush defense ranks fifth in the nation, allowing just 56.5 yards per contest, and the team has yet to surrender a rushing touchdown.

No. 12 Florida (4-0, 2-0 Southeastern Conference) hopes that continues Saturday at 8 p.m. when No. 3 Alabama (4-0, 1-0 SEC) comes to The Swamp.

"Every game we come across is going to be defined by how we play up front," defensive lineman Sharrif Floyd said. "They're going to run on us, a lot of teams want to run on us, so we've got to defend the run before we can defend the pass."

However, stopping an Alabama rushing attack that ranks 19th in the nation with 230 yards per game and 13 touchdowns could prove to be difficult for a

## To beat Alabama, Florida must pound it

Charlie Weis and Florida's offense will face a unique challenge when Alabama enters The Swamp on Saturday.

The Crimson Tide defense is without significant flaws, ranking No. 3 nationally against both the run and the pass.

"I always look for weak links in personnel, people that you can attack," Weis said.

"This is an unusual group because they really don't have one. ... It's unique when you come against a defense that is solid at every position. That doesn't happen that often."

But it will this weekend, and Weis is

expected to have a plan.

So what should the Gators do?

At first glance, running 5-foot-9, 174-pound Chris Rainey and 5-foot-7, 191-pound Jeff

Demps into the teeth of a massive Alabama defense seems futile.

Many feel that the best counter is to spread the Crimson Tide out and ask John Brantley to establish a vertical passing game.

But history has shown that this strategy won't get it done.

Over the past four years, Alabama has lost just four Southeastern Conference contests, and the opponent's game plan in each was simple: establish the run.

Alabama's defense faced 165 rush attempts and 82 pass attempts — a ratio better than 2-to-1 — in those four losses.

That formula won't be easy to replicate. Regardless, UF has to make the effort.

The reason Alabama wins so many games is because it stops the run so effectively. Those facts aren't unrelated. To say,



# Starting Saturday, Muschamp not likely to rewrite history

Calm down, everyone. From the ever-irrational everyday fan, to college football "experts" like ESPN's Mark May, people are hopping aboard the Gators bandwagon.

Hoping to catch a glimpse of the next unforgettable Will Muschamp moment, or hoping to ride Florida's coattails to another national championship celebration, people are predicting just that — that the Gators are back in the discussion with the best teams in the country, that they will be in position to compete for a BCS bowl by year's end.

But if there's anything history can teach us, it's patience.

Especially when it comes to winning football games in the Southeastern Conference.

Before last year's meteoric fall from grace, Urban Meyer could do no wrong as the leader of Gator Nation. He was a coaching icon. But even Urban lost to Alabama in his first year stomping the sidelines at The Swamp.

And it wasn't even close. The 15th-ranked Tide destroyed the fifth-ranked Gators, 31-3. That was the last time a Florida team failed to score a touchdown in a game — until last year's Alabama matchup. That season ended at the Outback Bowl.

Ron Zook beat two top-five teams during his first year. But in his first real SEC test, in the month of October 2002, Zook and the Gators dropped consecutive games. First, on the road to unranked Ole Miss, then, a laughter at home against LSU. That season ended at the Outback Bowl.

Even The Ole Ball Coach experienced his fair share of conference frustration.

Florida beat a mediocre Alabama team in the second game of Steve Spurrier's first season, but then, in October, the Gators got embarrassed in front of the entire nation when Tennessee whipped them 45-3 on ESPN.

Spurrier piloted his team to a 9-2 mark

that season, but because of lingering NCAA probation issues, the Gators didn't play in a bowl game or have a chance to go to Atlanta and play for the SEC title.

Had it been eligible, Florida would have likely played in the Gator Bowl instead of Ole Miss.

This trend, however, isn't limited to coaches residing in Gainesville.

Nick Saban, Muschamp's mentor and counterpart this week, had a losing record in 2006, his first year at Alabama. The Tide played Oklahoma State in the Independence Bowl that season, losing 34-31, and Saban managed just a one-win improvement in 2007.

Les Miles had arguably the best season of a first-year coach in the SEC, winning three games against ranked conference opponents, but the Tigers lost in overtime to a Tennessee team that finished 5-6 that season.

Florida fans should use this template to temper their expectations this season.

Don't listen to Mark May. Don't listen to The Worldwide Leader.

Even if Muschamp pulls off the improbable, beating Alabama on Saturday, beating the man who taught him most of what he knows, he still has the remainder of the SEC slate in front of him. And that includes a trip to Death Valley next Saturday.

Plus, the rest of October isn't much easier.

If history is any indication, the chance of the Gators playing in a BCS bowl in January isn't very good. The same goes for winning Saturday's game against Alabama.

Don't make those Fiesta Bowl reservations just yet.

# Florida working on offensive spacing

## Hosts Vandy tonight at 7

The Florida offense has had no trouble finding its groove as of late.

Problem is, the Gators aren't showing up to the party on time.

To open Southeastern Conference play, the Gators were able to create scoring chances after half-time.

But finding the back of the net proved difficult in the first half of their 1-0 win against Georgia on Friday and their 4-2 loss to Tennessee on Sunday, when they struggled finding the proper spacing on offense.

No. 12 Florida (8-3, 1-1 SEC) hopes to buck that trend when it hosts Vanderbilt (6-4, 0-2 SEC) tonight at 7.

After the loss to Georgia, coach Becky Burleigh said Florida was unable to generate many good scoring chances in the first half because the Bulldogs were using a very conservative style of defense in which many players stayed closer to the back line.

"We can always get better offensively," Burleigh said. "We need to do a good job of using all the space on the field against teams that are going to put a lot of people behind that ball."

"That means the width all the way to the sidelines. That means the space that is behind them when they hold a high line."

In the first 45 minutes, the Gators were only able to register one shot on goal between games against the Bulldogs and Vols.

Burleigh said the Gators have to create holes in defenses if they are to improve their offensive consistency.

"We've got to do a better job of stretching them out, making those gaps wide between players, particularly on our field, which is smaller than most," she said.

"We need every inch of space we can get."

At 70 yards by 110 yards, the field at Pressly Stadium is slightly smaller than the average soccer field.

Junior center back Kat Williamson said this can play to a defense's

strength when trying to limit gaps for the offense.

"Our outside backs really like to attack, so having more room for them to go into is great," Williamson said.

"But with a small field, an advantage defensively is that we can be really close together."

One of Florida's outside backs, sophomore Maggie Rodgers said the key to preventing an offense from stretching the Gators out too much is knowing where everyone else is.

"The biggest thing is communication," Rodgers said.

"[Outside backs] have to constantly be in communication with the center back to know exactly where we need to be and limit any gaps."

Junior forward Erika Tymrak said Florida should be just as effective on any field, but is excited to be home tonight after a four-game road trip.

Florida has not lost to Vanderbilt at home since 1997.

"It's a great atmosphere," Tymrak said.

"The crowd is awesome. The fans are awesome, so we love playing at home."

# Gators have only faced one of nation's top-100 running backs

Florida defense that, while highly touted, has been largely untested against the run.

Through their first four games, the Gators have faced just one back ranked among the top-100 in the nation: Tennessee's Tauren Poole, who averages 72.33 yards per game. But in a 33-23 loss to the Gators on Sept. 17, the Vols abandoned the run early on.

That won't be the case for Alabama, which features two running backs who average more than 200 yards per game combined.

Junior Trent Richardson, a 5-foot-11, 224-pound downhill runner, already has 441 yards and eight scores on the ground this season.

"He's got great balance, he's got great vision," Florida coach Will Muschamp said. "He's a one-cut guy. When he sees the hole he gets it north and south. ... He's always moving the chains in a positive direction for their team, so he's an outstanding player."

The key to minimizing Richardson's impact, Muschamp said, is to attack as a team and gang tackle him so he doesn't break a big play. As such, Florida's focus in practice this week was on improving tackling and wrapping up ball-carriers.

"He's a strong runner," Bostic said. "If you try to grab his legs, he's going to take off."

While Richardson has been stellar, the Gators are approaching him like any other running back they have prepared for this season — even if he isn't like all the others.

"We treat him as a normal running back," Bostic said. "He puts on his pants just like we do. He's a little bit bigger, but we've got to come up and just tackle him."

Even when Richardson is out of the game, Alabama is out of the game, Alabama has sophomore Eddie Lacy, who is averaging more than 90 yards and a touchdown per game.

That presents a new challenge for the Gators, who have to be prepared for the run regardless of the running back lined up in the backfield. Still, it's a challenge defensive coordinator Dan Quinn said his team is ready to take on.

"Every week is a test," defensive tackle Dominique Easley said. "We try to prep, we try to be the best we can be in the run D. ... We're not even close to being where we should be yet."

"The Gators can't run it against Alabama, so they shouldn't even try," is to accept defeat.

The ground game doesn't even need to rack up big yardage to be effective.

The Crimson Tide held opponents to 3.4 yards per carry or fewer in three of those losses, but teams were still able to convert first downs and control the game.

Weis and center Jonotthan Harrison each said UF has developed a smash-mouth identity.

While "the two rug rats" at running back, as Weis calls them, don't scream smash mouth, UF's play calling does. The Gators have a 1.8-to-1 run-to-pass ratio, and Demps and Rainey have sprinted UF to the No. 10 rush offense in the nation. Florida can't abandon what it does best in the season's biggest game.

Marcell Dareus and Terrence Cody are long gone.

Josh Chapman is a solid nose tackle, but other than that, Alabama's defensive line is without NFL talent.

Dont'a Hightower is a damn good linebacker, but if he has a weakness, it's speed, and Demps and Rainey will con-

stantly race him to the edge.

And what's Florida's alternative to running it 30 or 40 times?

Letting John Brantley air it out?

Even in a run-heavy attack, he'd be called upon to manage the offense, complete a high percentage and hit one or two deep balls.

That's challenge enough for a passer who has averaged just 188 yards per game.

Especially against an Alabama defense that boasts perhaps the top cornerback in the nation in Dre Kirkpatrick and might have the NCAA's two best safeties in Mark Barron and Robert Lester.

A better option is to ditch the hurry-up, pound the rock and keep 'Bama backs Trent Richardson and Eddie Lacy on the sidelines, where they can't rack up yards and wear down UF's defense.

Harrison predicts a physical, line-of-scrimmage game, and Weis knows what to expect.

"You have to go toe-to-toe," Weis said. "You've got to be ready for a slugfest."

The Gators wouldn't be the favorite in a slugfest, but at least they'd have a puncher's chance.

# Gators look to get Anderson more involved against Auburn

Senior middle blocker Cassandra Anderson does not get enough touches.

According to coach Mary Wise, under-utilizing a four-year starter that led the Southeastern Conference in blocking last season is a trend that cannot continue when No. 13 Florida (9-3, 2-1 SEC) takes on Auburn (8-6, 2-2 SEC) on the road tonight at 8.

"We have to do a better job of getting her the ball," Wise said. "She's going to have a tough time scoring points for us if we don't get her the ball."

Anderson, a second-team All-SEC selection in 2010, recorded 140 total blocks and averaged 1.27 per set, but her numbers have been down this year.

She currently has a .293 hitting percentage and 0.8 blocks per set — both career-low marks.

However, a meeting with Wise following the Gators' SEC opener may have put Anderson back on the right track.

"It was just about refocusing and trying to have my best year my senior year," Anderson said.

In the two matches since, she has hit .379 with 11 kills and 4.5 blocks.

Wise specifically praised Anderson's performance against Kentucky last Friday, calling it one of her best outings of the year.

While her statistics may not be up to par with previous seasons, Anderson has still made her mark in the box score in 2011.

Seven Gators have recorded at least 10 blocks this season, and of that group, Anderson is the only one yet to record a blocking error.

Additionally, she ranks second on the team in total blocks and blocks per set, trailing only junior Betsy Smith.

"She works really hard at blocking," said Smith, also a middle blocker. "Blocking is her favorite thing to do. She's really good at it and that's something that all of us middles can look for-

ward to."

While Anderson has a history of good numbers, that success has not come easy.

She is 6-foot-1, which is considered undersized for a Division-I middle blocker.

Comparably, No. 9 Penn State, the four-time defending national champion, has three middle blockers on its roster standing at least 6-foot-4.

"It's very seldom that we're bigger than anyone else in the middle," Wise said. "So we have to rely on [Anderson's] foot speed and her IQ. She has to be ahead of the play, and she has that ability."

Florida also relies on Anderson for her experience, which will come into play in tonight's match against Auburn.

She cracked the starting lineup as a freshman in 2008 and has not looked back, seeing significant playing time on two SEC Champion squads.

"She just brings that level of calm stability where she's like 'I've been here before. We've been here as a team before,'" Smith said. "She just knows what she needs to do in those situations and it's something to pull us all along."

## WHAT TO WATCH FOR

The Gators lead the SEC with a .292 hitting percentage. Auburn ranks 10th in the SEC with a .219 opponent hitting percentage.

Auburn was the only SEC team to push Florida to five sets in 2010, losing 3-2 (25-23, 18-25, 21-25, 25-23, 15-11) in their upset bid of then-No. 1 UF.

The Gators and Tigers will play the first volleyball match in Auburn Arena, which opened last October.

Florida has won 33 straight matches against Auburn.
