



# Satchel's supporters reach owner's fundraising goal

In the days following the Feb. 28 fire that will keep Satchel's Pizza closed for three months, owner Satchel Raye was thinking of how to help the 50 Satchel's employees who were left out of work.

They'd collect unemployment, he said, but it wouldn't be enough.

"We have a lot of people with kids and mortgages," Raye said.

Satchel's Pizza usually pays out \$27,000 every two weeks. That doesn't include tips.

To help with the bills, he created the Satchel's Pizza Employee Relief Fund on IndieGoGo, an online fundraising website.

Raye initially wanted to give the fundraising page three weeks to raise \$20,000 instead of two weeks. If the fundraising goal wasn't met, Satchel's would have to pay IndieGoGo a percentage of the dona-

tions.

The page raised \$1,000 within the first hour. About 24 hours after the page went up, the Satchel's Pizza Employee Relief Fund had met its goal of \$20,000.

"I could just refresh my page and the money was just going in there," Raye said. "It was just mindboggling."

As of press time, 641 people had given a total of \$35,416 to the fundraiser.

Lisa Duke, who teaches advertising at UF, first heard about the fire at Satchel's Pizza on Facebook.

"I was really sad because I love that place," she said. "I take my son there."

Just after that, one of Duke's students posted about the Satchel's IndieGoGo page.

Duke knew she had to help. She gave \$200.

Duke said the creativity of the restaurant is what touched her so deeply and made her want to help.

"You could just tell that someone

## Legislature approves bill that would allow UF to up tuition

After passing a statewide budget that hit universities' wallets hard, Florida legislators passed bills that will allow UF to increase tuition more than 15 percent and self-insure state employees.

While bridging a \$2 billion gap between the House of Representatives' and the Senate's proposed budgets, lawmakers slashed \$300 million from the State University System.

The legislature finally settled on a budget of \$70 billion, and UF's will be about \$36.5 million lighter.

The cut was shallower than last year's, which took \$54 million from the university's budget.

Although there's no plan in place yet for how to distribute the budget

cuts, administrators are breathing a sigh of relief.

"We are fortunate that it is not as high as it could have been," UF spokesman Steve Orlando told the Alligator on Friday.

On Thursday, legislators passed SB1752, which would allow state universities that meet certain criteria to raise tuition by more than the current cap of 15 percent per year.

UF and Florida State University are the only schools that meet the requirements this year.

The bill was sent to Gov. Rick Scott,

## .. THIS WEEK *in* GAINESVILLE ..

**March 12, 1976** – UF football players are rewarded up to \$200 in personal gifts every time the Gators play a bowl game. The Athletic Association spends more than \$20,000 a year on gifts for athletes. All varsity athletes receive different gifts and rewards such as rings, letter sweaters and leather jackets, for their participation, according to head football coach Doug Dickey.

**March 12, 1981** – The UF Food Service Advisory Committee approved new 1981-82 meal plans that will cost between 13 and 20 percent more than the previous years. New meal allotments for the week include 10, 14 and 19. Under the new plans, students are allowed \$2.85 for one meal and \$3.65 for the next every day, compared to the current allowance of \$2.25 and \$2.75 for meals during the day.

**March 16, 1982** – Two students have charges dropped against them after a police report was filed stating they were engaged in a homosexual act. According to a police report, University Police Officer Randy Norris went to the third-floor Peabody Hall bathroom after a secretary told police about two students remaining in the bathroom for an “unusual amount of time.”

**March 14, 1993** – The UF women’s basketball team made history for reaching the NCAA tournament for the first time in school history.

**March 16, 1993** – Part-time owner of the Florida Marlins baseball team and Miami Dolphins football team H. Wayne Huizenga pledged \$200,000 to UF’s College of Medicine. Huizenga’s gift would establish an endowed professorship in sports medicine worth a total of \$300,000.

All of the money raised at the door will go to the employee relief fund, according to Double Down social media manager Mat Poe.

The day after the fire, Raye thought Satchel’s Pizza would be closed for about a month. Now he thinks it will be at least three.

The fire damaged the ceiling and walls and the building needs a new electric system. The restaurant needs another exit to meet safety codes. Raye

is also taking the opportunity to make the kitchen a little bigger.

“The whole thing kind of quickly escalates and snowballs into a bigger project,” he said.

In the meantime, he said, he’s trying to stay positive.

The well-wishes of fans on Facebook and by email, the calls and texts and the “get well soon” cards from local businesses have been so uplifting, he said.

“It’s quite startling how many real big fans are out there that are wanting to wish us well and are looking forward to us opening back.”

## Bill waiting for approval from Gov. Scott

whose previous promise to not raise tuition makes it difficult to predict whether he will sign the bill.

During last year’s legislative session, UF President Bernie Machen proposed a 30 percent tuition increase to cover budget cuts.

The Board of Governors has the power to approve or deny proposals for tuition increases.

Machen has long campaigned for the ability to charge higher tuition,

citing that UF has different needs than other state universities.

Student organizations such as the Florida Alliance for Student Action have lobbied against the provision throughout the legislative session and have demanded Scott keep his promise to not raise tuition by vetoing the bill.

Lawmakers also passed an amendment that would give UF the green light to insure state employees under GatorCare, a new model of health insurance.

The model, according to its web-

site at [healthplan.ufl.edu](http://healthplan.ufl.edu), will include more choices of health care providers, keep health care costs competitive and improve access.

It already covers all Shands employees in Gainesville and Jacksonville, graduate assistants and post-doctoral associates.

The bill would allow UF to insure faculty and staff, including IFAS faculty and staff all over the state and UF physicians in Gainesville and Jacksonville.

## Campus Cab keeps UF moving

Despite the constant pedestrian traffic and limited road access on a typical day of classes, University of Florida faculty and staff can still easily travel across the campus with Campus Cab.

In 2008, UF leaders decided to reduce the number of departmental vehicles on campus, as many were seldom used and they often occupied precious parking spaces.

Campus Cab started the same year to supplement the loss of those vehicles. It allowed faculty and staff to get to their meetings on time without using personal

or department vehicles.

The cabs, which are operated by Transportation and Parking Services, reduce the number of vehicles in use on campus, said

Ron Fuller, assistant director of Transportation and Parking Services.

The program is funded by charging each department to use reserved parking spaces for department vehicles. Each space costs \$3,000 per year.

Three mini-vans can carry seven passengers each, Fuller said. Cabs are available from 7:45 a.m. to 4:15 p.m. Monday through Friday.

“They stay busy all day long,” he added.

Ridership has increased over the years, said Fuller, and the program has grown from one cab to three. In January, Campus Cab provided 632 individual rides and served 802 riders.

Because Campus Cab is funded by departments, it is reserved for faculty and staff. The on-campus, RTS routes provide a similar service for students.

# The many faces of protest

Gainesville artist Melanie Peter walked toward an art exhibit as protesters set up their exhibit outside.

Inside, Peter walked past bottles of wine and trays of delicately sliced meats. Outside, resident Maria Parsons lined up bottles of water and a basket of eggs — all contaminated, she said.

The artist went past two security guards and into the gallery. An etching of a skull and crossbones, a jungle-like oil painting and other pieces lined the walls. The signs lining the sidewalk outside also showed skulls and crossbones, but for a different reason.

Peter said the art project inside and the protesters outside represent voices crying for change.

"We all have our different, varied skills," she said. "I personally can't do that — going to meetings and thinking on my feet and arguing. But I can paint."

The art show, "Region 4: Trans-

formation through Imagination," was created to showcase city artists' feelings about the history and cleanup of a chemically toxic site in northeast Gainesville called the Cabot-Koppers Superfund site. During the show's March 2 opening, about 300 people packed into the Thomas Center to see the exhibit and discuss the site. The show will be on display until April 28.

About 30 years ago, the Cabot-Koppers site was deemed environmentally hazardous by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Kids weren't allowed to play near the area anymore. People were worried that a nearby creek was dangerous, and it was. Cancer concerns still loom.

Since then, residents and local governments have protested — some with letters, some with chants. For the artists, the works in the art project were a form of protest. But for the protesters, the art show didn't help the situation.

For those living near the Cabot-Koppers Superfund site, listening to

roughly 30 years of cleanup negotiations hasn't been easy.

Some are frustrated. Some are furious. And others say they are happy to see something being done, even if it isn't all they hoped for.

The exhibit prompted a few residents to put their dissenting emotions on display. The group, which fluctuated between three and five through the afternoon, came armed with arguments against the art project's intentions and inspirations.

The art show ranged from taped-up paperwork and video testimonies to a branching tree of bones, twigs and mementos.

Peter's work, an oil painting of a dense, jungle-like creek, hung near the entrance.

Her work has more luscious trees and palm fronds than its inspiration, Springstead Creek, has. She said the creek isn't the same now that it's dangerous to drink the water or sink your feet into the cool soil.

"This is my imagination of how it was and could be again," she said.

While gallery-goers meandered

around the pieces quietly, some protesters called out to bystanders as they left the building.

Susan Fairforest, a Gainesville resident, held a sign chastising the EPA, the organization responsible for cleaning up the Superfund site.

She said she decided to protest to get people to pay attention to the big picture of the cleanup plan. The EPA plan mentions removing topsoil from contaminated yards, but there are no stipulations for relocation.

"We're hoping that people will see the other half of what's going on, not just the feel-good part," she said.

The city, with neighborhood-organized Superfund Art Project, used a \$24,000 grant from a state cultural affairs division to host the show. The city gave an equal amount to the project by paying for the building to be open during the exhibit and for staff time.

Some protesters didn't approve of funding an art show when there is an unfulfilled need in the city.

Parsons said she believes available money should first be used to

relocate residents from neighborhoods near the site. Some are sick. Others have died. She and other supporters blame the contaminants, such as cancer-causing dioxin, from the Superfund site.

Others disagree with the purpose behind the art show — to show a hopeful scenario in the midst of a bad situation — because they believe the project requirements bordered on censorship.

According to a call to artists, the project was meant to showcase "closure and a positive outcome, not accusation and condemnation."

Mallory O'Connor, show curator, said there wasn't any censorship of artists' works.

But Peter said the art show made a point that artists and activists alike agree upon.

"It's a powerful statement of what we won't put up with as people," she said. "These are alarms in some form or another that we have to clean up or die."

# Students join KONY 2012 movement

Four letters, four numbers and about 90 million total views. KONY 2012.

On March 5, nonprofit organization Invisible Children Inc. posted a short film on YouTube about Joseph Kony, leader of African rebel group the Lord's Resistance Army.

According to the video, Kony has abducted tens of thousands of children for soldiers and sex slaves.

The video launched a campaign to rally celebrities and politicians to work for Kony's arrest, and UF students are joining in.

A KONY 2012 Gainesville Facebook group has about

370 members. About 1,200 people clicked "attending" for Gainesville Paint the City, a national night of hanging posters on April 20.

Associate professor of history Paul Ortiz, who teaches an African diaspora course, said students should be smart about taking action.

Though Ortiz said the campaign's efforts to educate are good, he suggests researching the organization before donating or forming opinions. Invisible Children Inc. has been accused of manipulating facts and misusing donations.

"Don't let your activity be guided by one documentary," he said.

### Issues of Incentive *Insurance problem root of birth control debate*

Few would have thought that in 2012 one of the biggest topics of debate would be birth control.

While aspects of this debate are important, some of the rhetoric from both sides has just gone too far and way off topic.

Rush Limbaugh's distasteful remarks about the student who testified in front of Congress completely missed the point of the debate, claiming that she was asking the government to pay for her birth control.

This was not the case. The student said insurance providers at her school, the Catholic university Georgetown, should have to cover birth control due to its other medical benefits.

The main contention for those on the other side, namely from Catholic institutions, is that institutions and organizations should not have to provide coverage for something that goes against their beliefs.

For those hysterics on the far right, the government is not going to start providing free birth control to everyone. For those hysterics on the far left, conservatives are not trying to make birth control illegal.

But while the rhetoric has been heated at times, a crucial discussion has been absent from this debate.

We buy car, life and renter's insurance on an individual basis, so why are we reliant upon our employers to provide health insurance?

When most Americans change employers multiple times throughout their lifetime, why is our health coverage tied to where we work?

That seems impractical.

According to Dr. David Gratzer, author of "The Cure," the reason stems from a mid-20th century change in the tax code.

In the early 1940s, President Franklin D. Roosevelt enacted wage and price controls, making it hard for employers to lower or increase the wages for their employees. As a result, employers had to find other ways to attract workers to their business.

On October 26, 1943, according to Gratzer, "the IRS confirmed that employees were not required to pay tax on health insurance premiums paid on their behalf by their employers. Health benefits would remain tax-free, an idea codified in the new [IRS] Code of 1954."

Prior to this time, employers rarely provided health benefits to employees, but by 1987, "70 percent of employers offered health benefits."

As a result, we have a system of third-party payers, in which ordinary people do not really experience the true cost of their health care.

This incentive limits a person's need to shop around, limits competition in the health care marketplace and increases health costs.

More importantly, this entire debate about Catholic institutions covering birth control would be moot without this tax incentive.

Individuals would be in charge of shopping for health insurance plans that cover the things they believe are important, and companies would not have to go against their consciences.

do a good job. I feel like I threw well."

Junior right-hander Austin Maddox handled the ninth in six pitches — all strikes — and sat FGCU third baseman Zack Tillery down looking on three pitches to end the game.

Sophomore Jonathon Crawford got his third start of the season for the Gators and worked 5.2 innings in 73 pitches. He allowed five hits and two runs, the second an Andrew Valencia RBI double in the sixth that negated the 2-1 lead Turgeon's home run had nabbed and effectively chased Crawford from the game.

"It was great to get Crawford back out there," O'Sullivan said. "Each time he goes out there, he seems like he's getting better and better."

For Florida, the win meant a weekend sweep of FGCU and the extension of a winning streak that now stands at 13 games, one away from tying the school record. At 15-1, this is the best 16-game start for the Gators in school history, beating out the 1952 team that started 14-1-1.

Junior catcher Mike Zunino carried the Gators offense on Friday night, notching two home runs in a 4-2 victory. Saturday night's game was all about top-of-the order offense as junior shortstop Nolan Fontana, Zunino and Gushue combined for five RBI in an 8-3 victory.

"It was a great, great weekend for us," O'Sullivan said. "But it was a well-played weekend for both teams and hopefully this will make us a better club."

As players sat in the locker room, regrouping from the most physical game of the year, the truth started to dawn on them: They can survive without Will Yeguete.

Even in a losing effort, that was proven Saturday.

"Right now, we were so close to winning that game that we've got a bad feeling from losing," Young said after a few minutes. "I guess looking back at it, we'll say there's a lot of positives."

UF hit 50 percent of its threes after failing to crack 30 percent from beyond the arc in its first two losses to UK.

The Gators ran an efficient offense and got career games from Beal and Murphy.

Leading scorer Kenny Boynton had only two points on 1-of-9 shooting, but Florida managed to stand toe-to-toe with the nation's best team for 39 minutes.

If they'd been sent to the foul line more than just twice, the Gators could have been looking at a Sunday matchup against Vanderbilt with a Southeastern Conference Tournament championship and NCAA Tournament three seed on the line.

"If we go as hard as we did [Saturday], I think we can do it without Will," Boynton said. "We lost,

and we're never happy with a loss, but with the effort we put out [Saturday] we've got to be happy with the way we played as a team."

"That's the number one team in the country, right there," Erving Walker said. "They've been all year, and we were right there basically in a road game with them."

When Yeguete went down with a broken foot, the Gators had to adjust. New rotations and different roles needed time to develop, but now UF is ready.

Florida has put itself in a position where its fate will be determined by whether it knocks down shots. They've got the rest figured out.

Relying on 3-point shooting is a dangerous — and I'd argue nearly impossible — formula for winning a title, but at least it gives the Gators a chance. UF won't be let down by leadership, team chemistry, role confusion or maturity.

The way it handled those things on Saturday proved that.

"To be honest, I think we're perfectly fine," Beal said. "We all are still confident in what we're capable of doing. We just displayed that we can just compete just about with anybody in the nation, so we're going to come in with a lot of confidence going into the Tournament."

## Florida receives No. 7 seed, faces No. 10 Virginia on Friday

Before the Gators knew their seeding or what far reaches of the country the NCAA Tournament selection committee would send them this week, they sat in the visitors locker room at New Orleans Arena on Saturday confident of their completed resume.

Florida's schedule this season was littered with games against championship-caliber teams, including three meetings with No. 1 overall seed Kentucky, as well as road tests against No. 1 seed Syracuse and No. 2 seed Ohio State.

"There's no other teams we could have played to get ready for the NCAA Tournament," Kenny Boynton said. "We definitely have seen a lot, been through every situation. So I think we should go in with the mindset of anything is possible."

The common thread in each of those marquee matchups, however, was a UF loss.

On Sunday, the selection committee pegged No. 7-seed Florida (23-10) to play 10th-seeded Virginia (25-9) in Omaha, Neb., on Friday.

Before being placed in the West Region of The Big Dance, both the Gators and Cavaliers ended their respective seasons by losing six of their last 10 games. Florida has dropped four of its last five.

"You have only got one shot at

this," Boynton said. "It's just like [the Southeastern Conference] tournament, but this one is end of season. You've got to give your all every game."

Though the Gators missed an upset bid against the top-seeded Wild-

cats over the weekend, they came away from their 74-71 loss with a renewed confidence.

Florida fell in its previous two meetings with Kentucky by an average of 17.5 points.

"We're making moves in the right

direction for sure," Patric Young said. "Everyone around here loves each other. We're like a brotherhood. We've been going into practice with a good mindset, getting better each day, been committed to doing the right things, and hopefully we have the same mindset next week but the results will be different."

Last season, the Gators were considered over-seeded as a No. 2 and went on an Elite Eight run which culminated in an overtime loss to eventual NCAA runner-up Butler.

ESPN analyst Doug Gottlieb said in a phone interview that UF had to avoid being placed in the eight-to-nine-seed range, which would mean a potential matchup with a No. 1 seed in its second game.

Instead, as a No. 7 seed, the Gators will see the winner of No. 2 Missouri and No. 15 Norfolk State if they get past the Cavaliers.

"Once you get past the top-three teams, and this is a group of teams that I thought Florida was in ... I mean, are they that much better than Duke?" Gottlieb said. "They're far more athletic than Duke. They shoot it better than Duke and they should guard better than Duke. Their results just haven't been as good as Duke's."

## Gushue's blast propels Gators

Jason Forjet's 100th pitch proved to be too much for Florida Gulf Coast to overcome.

With a 1-2 count, the senior right-hander gave Taylor Gushue a slider low in the zone, but Florida's freshman phenom got under it enough to deposit a souvenir over the right-field wall. The seventh-inning homer gave No. 1 UF a 3-2 lead that would hold as the final score.

"I just wanted to put it in play," Gushue said. "It ended up going out, so I was happy about that."

The blast was one of just four hits on the day for the Gators, who couldn't muster a hit against Forjet through 4.1 innings before Gushue opened things up with a double. His first hit of the day was immediately followed by a 2-2 long ball from freshman second baseman Casey Turgeon.

Before the back-to-back freshmen hits, Forjet had worked UF over with a steady changeup-slider-fastball mix that kept hitters off balance. Gushue said the Gators weren't pressing and he knew the big hits would eventually come, but early on UF coach Kev-

in O'Sullivan said he was very impressed by the Eagles' mound presence.

"I can't remember the last time we got no-hit through four innings and it didn't look promising early on," he said. "[Forjet] was commanding his pitches, he was executing, he looked very comfortable."

After giving up Gushue's homer in the seventh, Forjet was pulled and relievers R.J. Brown and Danny Patrick finished the game with 1.2 hitless innings. However, none of that mattered as the Gators were working bullpen magic of their own.

Sophomore lefty Daniel Gibson needed just 30 pitches to work 2.1 hitless innings, striking out a career-high four batters and picking up his first win since Feb. 25 of last season. Three of Gibson's strikeouts came looking, a trend on the day for the Eagles, who struck out looking six times.

"I threw yesterday and I knew that I was still hot today," Gibson said. "When I got the call, I kind of knew that I had to come in and
