Two Ways About It

Beal, Young facing difficult decision at season's end

After the Gators' lone win in the Southeastern Conference Tournament, Patric Young sat next to his locker in the home dressing room of New Orleans Arena and fielded the same question four times — answering each inquiry with a positive response.

When asked if he was going to return next year for his junior season following Florida's nine-point win against Alabama on March 9, or whether he will go pro at 20 years old, Young declared, "Yeah, I'm back next year."

Though Young has been known to be exceedingly candid with the media during his short career — he also referred to Kentucky's players as out of shape heading into their semifinal matchup the next day — the sophomore center's startling announcement still came as a surprise in the middle of the Gators' efforts to claim the program's fourth SEC Tournament title.

Both he and All-SEC freshman Brad Beal have long been considered potentially high selections in the NBA Draft, even before the season began.

Curious if he had any insight on Beal's upcoming decision, a reporter asked Young whether he had spoken with his teammate about his plans.

"I'll be back. I don't know about Brad, but I hope he is," Young replied.

With the April 10 deadline for early entries and underclassmen to declare for the draft fast approaching, news that one of Florida's key building blocks for the team's future should have been a major revelation.

But the very next day, Young sounded like a different person as he answered follow-up questions

about his earlier comments.

On Saturday, he sat in a familiar position in front of reporters, but in a different locker room and, this time, following a disappointing loss to Kentucky in the conference semifinals.

He was guarded and short in response. Young spoke softly and low enough that none of his answers inspired much confidence about the previous verdict he came to regarding his future at Florida.

"I mean, Coach Donovan ... It's my decision," Young said. "I mean, I really haven't thought about it because the season's not over yet."

Young is right. The season still needs to be played out and so do the factors that will weigh on his

As a No. 7 seed in the NCAA Tournament cornered in the bottom of the West region, Florida is entering a winnable game today in Omaha, Neb., against No. 10 seed Virginia.

While a deep run in The Big Dance for the Gators would likely have to go through current national powers like No. 2-seed Missouri and top-seeded Michigan State, some analysts like UF's chances despite the team backing into the tournament with four losses in its final five games.

One of those confident in the Gators' prospects in the region is college basketball analyst Doug Gottlieb, a former Oklahoma State point guard who has been working at ESPN since 2003.

Gottlieb has publicly picked Florida to reach the Final Four, and he said an extended run could completely change the way NBA teams are looking at Beal and Young.

"The first thing they can do in order to help their stock is to win," Gottlieb said. "If you go across the board and look at how many guys have gone to the Final Fours and been drafted, it's really remarkable. Whether they can play or not is a different story."

This season, Beal has tried to state his case on the floor by playing the most minutes of anyone on the roster.

Coming out of St. Louis, Mo., as the No. 4 overall player in the country, according to Rivals.com, Beal has led Florida in points and rebounds down its final stretch of 16 games.

Though the 6-foot-3 guard is averaging 14.6 points per game and is rebounding 6.5 per contest, the large load he has carried as a freshman has also backfired at times, as Beal has struggled intermittently

and Beal's draft status.


Though Young again addressed his comments Thursday in Omaha, Neb., saying this time he has indeed decided to return for his junior season, recent NCAA Tournament history has proven that sustained success through the month of March could change all of that.

During Florida's weekly press conference the Monday after Selection Sunday, Beal spoke for the first time on his own intentions.

Describing his situation as almost a win-win scenario, Beal said he had "no clue" what his final decision will be at the conclusion of the season.

"Either way it goes, if I leave, I still played a great year of college," Beal said.

"I enjoyed it. If I stay, it's only going to make me get better. Either way it goes, I'm gaining something

with turnovers and streaky 3-point shooting.

Currently, DraftExpress.com ranks him as the 10th pick in the draft and the first guard overall in an especially thin class for backcourt players.

"I know he's a good student and I know he's smart enough to realize he's probably a year away from breaking through," Gottlieb said. "He's just inconsistent."

"But they're going to take him. You know he's going in the top 10; everybody knows he can play. But is he ready? Or does he want to spend some of his first years in the D-League?"

Gottlieb called Beal a player with limitless potential, a description he echoed for the 6-foot-9, 250-pound Young.

Much like Beal's current situation, Young gave thought to leaving after one season but stayed largely for academics. On March 6, he was named the SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

Last season, NBA rookies taken in the opening round of the draft made anywhere from \$4.3 million in their first season as the No. 1 pick, to just less than \$1 million as the 30th overall choice.

Young was projected in most mock drafts as a player who could have been selected in the late lottery picks or in the middle of the first round.

After averaging 10.3 points and just 6.4 rebounds per game this year in his first full season as a starter, though, Young's stock has somewhat slipped.

He's currently projected as the 21st overall pick by DraftExpress.com.

"Obviously, if he's not the most impressive physical specimen in college basketball, there's very few guys who could compare," Gottlieb said. "For Patric Young, the M.O. is, 'Does he love the game or is he just blessed by God with this incredible body and skill so that he can just show up and do it?'"

Each season, Billy Donovan har-

bors the same silent wish of every other Division I coach who is working with elite-level talent: He wants to see all of his players stay for the following season.

But in his 16 years at Florida, Donovan has had 10 players depart early to pursue professional basketball.

"Selfishly, you never want to see anybody leave. I wish these guys would stay here for four years, but that's not the real world anymore," Donovan said. "And I think at times, these guys are presented with opportunities or decisions they've got to make before their time is done here eligibility-wise. I try to support them in that."

While Donovan's main job is to make sure players like Young and Beal are concentrating on the team and not their draft positioning, he said sometimes the task can become more complicated when outside influences get involved.

"I always worry about the agent situation and people trying to get to those guys a little bit," Donovan said. "It's my responsibility to stay on top of the fact that they could be being pestered or someone's trying to get close to them. It's not even that there's anything wrong or illegal going on. It's just more of keeping them focused on what they need to focus on."

With Young hampered by tendinitis in his knee and a right ankle sprain for much of the second half of the season, Donovan has repeatedly called out the big man for inconsistency during practices and poor mental preparation for games.

"I'm not saying this is Patric, but I've been around enough players, there are some players that like what the game brings to them: notoriety, attention, to certain guys in the NBA, the money," Donovan said. "Then there are guys that really want to be great in the game."

NBA scouts have also noticed Young's long lapses of energy and focus on the court, according to Gottlieb.

"If he can't practice or play in 32 games, how the hell are you going to play when we play 82 games?" Gottlieb said.

Though Donovan hasn't had to deal with many one-and-done types in the past, even the departures of upperclassmen like Joakim Noah, Al Horford and Corey Brewer, after they experienced success in the tournament, can put a strain on the program.

"We went through a hard time in recruiting when Noah and Horford and Brewer and those guys came back," Donovan said.

"You try and tell [recruits], 'Hey listen, they're going to go,' and all of a sudden one guy says, 'Well geez, Joakim Noah would've been the No. 1 pick after his sophomore year and he came back. Why wouldn't he come back again for his senior year?'"

Donovan said that after winning two national championships with the core group of Noah, Horford and Brewer in 2006 and 2007, he spent more time re-recruiting them than he actually did coaching the three current NBA players.

However, there has been no hint from Donovan that either Young or Beal has let thoughts of a potential professional career affect his current play.

"Those guys are really level-headed right now," Donovan said. "They don't talk about it."

With the draft deadline just more than three weeks away, discussing their intentions to make the jump to the NBA will have to become a priority for both players.

Donovan is losing only one senior this season — point guard Erving Walker — and is bringing in three guards for his 2012 class without any forwards or centers lined up to possibly replace Young or Beal's impact on the boards.

As the Gators prepare for their opening-round game today — in what could be the beginning of an extended stay in the tournament or one that just lasts the weekend — Donovan said both players have a clear understanding of how their performance going forward can shape their future.

"I think that they all realize that if our team does well, they do well."

Fume leak marks third incident in Sisler since October

A student's experiment caused fumes from hazardous chemicals to leak into the air in Sisler Hall on Thursday night.

The student, who did not want to identify himself, was conducting an experiment alone on the third floor of the building when fumes started to rise from a 6-inch flask, said Gainesville Fire Rescue Lt. Gary Law.

Although GFR called the incident a chemical spill, only fumes leaked from the beaker. Sisler Hall was kept open while GFR inspected the lab where the incident happened.

The student told firefighters he was not hurt, but GFR insisted he go to the hospital as a precautionary measure for fear of inhalation hazards, said GFR Lt. Steve Mueller.

The student was working with a 100 mL mixture of carbon tetrachloride, hexane, triphenylphosphine and water.

The experiment was conducted on a countertop under a hood, which prevented the fumes from being released into surrounding air.

Law said if it had not been for the hood, the situation could have been a lot worse.

This was at least the third inci-

dent involving hazardous chemical reactions in Sisler Hall throughout the past year. The first occurred Oct. 11 when a student's vial exploded as

he transferred it to a scale. The second was on Jan. 11 when a student's chemical mixture exploded under a protective hood.

GFR would not comment as to why chemical-related accidents keep happening in Sisler Hall.

"But it's something that should

be asked," Mueller said.

Machen addresses tuition hikes, faculty self-insurance

UF President Bernie Machen laid out a plan for tuition increases and addressed members' concerns about GatorCare during Thursday's Faculty Senate meeting.

During the last days of the legislative session, bills allowing UF to self-insure employees and charge market-rate tuition were approved and sent to Gov. Rick Scott.

"We're hoping against hope that that becomes a long-term reality for us," Machen said of the market-rate tuition bill. "This budget situation is the bleakest in the eight years that I've been here."

Increasing tuition to the market rate could bring in \$25 million to \$30 million in additional revenue, which would take care of about half the budget cuts UF will face this year, Machen said.

Although the legislature reduced UF's budget by about \$36.5 million, the total "real" cut is closer to \$55 million or \$58 million because of hidden items like an \$8.5 million reduction to retirement contributions.



UF bookstore gets new iPad today sans student discount

The third-generation iPad tablet debuts at the UF bookstore today, but students won't get a discount on the product.

Today is the gadget's official release for Apple suppliers around the world. It is priced starting at \$499.

Jon Pitts, a trade manager at the UF bookstore, said the bookstore did not offer a preorder option for the iPad, and Apple did not give an exact number of iPads that would be shipped to the store.

iPads have been popular at the bookstore in the past, Pitts said, and he expects the new one to sell out quickly.

The new iPad features more vivid graphics, faster performance, a five-megapixel camera and the ability to connect to 4G

networks.

It is offered in black or white and features the same 10-hour battery life as its predecessor, the iPad 2.

Pitts said the new iPad is essentially a "beefed-up iPad 2."

"The screen resolution is incredible," he said. "It's higher than most people's high-definition TVs."

According to Macworld Magazine's website, iPads preordered through the Apple store are sold out, and high demand has led to shipping delays of two to three weeks for new orders.

Corresponding with the third generation iPad's release, the iPad 2 prices dropped on March

7, according to Apple's website. A 16-gigabyte iPad 2 now starts at \$399.

Pitts said the price drop is likely to lead many students to choose the iPad 2 rather than the newer model.

Twenty-year-old accounting junior Kelly Collar said she doesn't think the iPad will be a necessary purchase for her because she already has an iPhone. She said the upgraded iPad doesn't seem worth the extra cost.

"If I was going to buy one, I would buy an older one because I feel like it would be a much better value," Collar said.

Sonya Sarkar, a 21-year-old economics junior, said the brand alone makes the cost worth it to her.

"I would buy it because I just love Apple," she said. "And I'd buy the newer one because it would have more features."

Militia group wants to arrest Fla. watch leader suspect

The watch leader shot a 17-year-old in February

ORLANDO — Members of a self-described black militia group will attempt a citizen's arrest on a white neighborhood watch leader who admitted to fatally shooting an unarmed African-American teen in an Orlando suburb, but has not been charged, a leader of the group said Thursday.

Members of The New Black Liberation Militia plan to take 28-year-old George Zimmerman to federal authorities next week since local police haven't acted, said Najee Muhammad, a leader of the militia group.

"We'll find him," Muhammad said. "We've got his mug shot and everything."

Sanford police investigated but have declined for now to arrest Zimmerman, who

says he acted in self-defense last month when he shot 17-year-old Trayvon Martin. Police say they have no evidence to disprove his assertion. They have since turned the case over to the State Attorney's Office, and a spokeswoman said it could be weeks before a decision is made on whether to file charges or present the case to a grand jury.

An attorney for the teen's family said they are discouraging actions such as what the militia proposed.

"They want justice at the hands of authorities and nobody else," said attorney Benjamin Crump. "Everybody has a right to peacefully assemble but we certainly want to leave any kind of arrests ... to the authorities."

A spokesman for Sanford police didn't return an email seeking comment on the militia group's plans. Zimmerman has a discon-

nected number and couldn't be reached for comment.

Moments before the shooting, Zimmerman had called police to report a suspicious person in the neighborhood. After a confrontation, he shot and killed Martin, who was walking back from a convenience store to a house in the Sanford neighborhood where the teen's father's fiancée lived.

Out of a population of 54,000, about 57 percent of Sanford residents are white and 31 percent are black, according to the 2010 U.S. Census. The median income is about \$43,000.

Martin's family has criticized police for not arresting Zimmerman. They filed a lawsuit asking that the 911 tapes be released, but police said the tapes are part of the investigation and will only be released once the

State Attorney's Office is done evaluating the case.

A spokeswoman for the Southern Poverty Law Center, a civil rights group that monitors hate groups, said her organization didn't have any information on The New Black Liberation Militia.

Photos on the site show men dressed in fatigues and berets.

There is no mention of citizen's arrests in Florida's criminal statutes but state courts have cited common law in establishing when such an arrest can be made. The crime has to be a felony. It has to be witnessed by the citizen making the arrest or the citizen must have probable cause that the person being arrested is guilty of a felony.

Orlando criminal defense attorney Patrick Cairns said members of the militia face a high legal hurdle in taking such action since they didn't witness a crime. They could be charged with false imprisonment if they detain Zimmerman.

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Biblical temple to be built on North Lawn

A life-size temple made of PVC pipes and cloth will take up most of the real estate on the Reitz Union North Lawn next week.

Messiah's Mansion, a Christian organization from Harrah, Okla., began constructing a scale version of a biblical temple on the North Lawn late Wednesday night. When completed, the 75-by-100-foot model will stand 15 feet tall.

"It's a copy of God's house in heaven," said Carolyn Leineweber, director of Messiah's Mansion. The blueprint for the temple comes from the Book of Exodus in the Bible, she said.

Leineweber, 50, has been running Messiah's Mansion with her husband full-time

since 2003. They received an invitation from UF Seventh-Day Adventist group Baby Isaac and were given two days to complete the project.

About 30 to 40 volunteers from Baby Isaac, Messiah's Mansion and Gainesville Seventh-Day Adventist Church are helping build the temple.

They will give 15-minute tours of the tabernacle from Saturday through March 24. Tours will be open from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. Saturdays and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday through Friday.

Each project costs about \$15,000 dollars and is funded entirely by donations, she said.

Thomson Paris, vice president of Baby Isaac, said the group has been trying to get Messiah's Mansion to come to UF for more than a year.

"The religious museum will allow students to experience what life was like during biblical times," he said.

As St. Patrick's Day revelers begin their celebrations in Midtown, Jason McKibben will be going bald for children with cancer.

'Imagine' message often misunderstood

Following the 9/11 attacks in 2001, the country was, naturally, reeling emotionally. People were shocked — almost 3,000 people dead, families torn apart, iconic American architecture and symbolism utterly destroyed, our proud military headquarters damaged. An attack of this magnitude hadn't been seen before. For the first time in decades, Americans didn't feel safe.

In that same month, according to a New York Times article, Clear Channel Communications, a company that owns the most AM and FM radio stations in America, internally circulated a list of de facto banned songs. When the list's circulation broke to the media, Clear Channel claimed it hadn't banned the songs outright, and that the songs had been "graylisted," or put on a voluntary blacklist for individual stations to decide.

The songs "graylisted" were deemed "lyrically questionable." Artists whose songs were rumored to appear on the list included Tom Petty, Red Hot Chili Peppers, Bruce Springsteen, Frank Sinatra, The Beatles, Louis Armstrong and Billy Joel. One popular song among them was "Imagine" by John Lennon. The song's message was so powerful that Neil Young performed it on "America: A Tribute to Heroes," a huge TV fundraiser that aired 10 days after the attacks.

There are debates about this song all the time. Some claim it is socialist in nature and therefore un-American. Clear Channel seemed to have agreed when it "graylisted" the song — a completely wrong move.

There is little doubt "Imagine" promotes world peace. It declares that without countries and religion, there would be "nothing to kill or die for," and without possessions, there would be "no need for greed or hunger." Lennon states that a world without these things would be a world with "all the people living life in peace."

Detractors like Clear Channel would say the hippie song disguises a sinister idea: that beneath the overt people-sitting-Indian-style-in-a-circle-holding-hands-and-chanting-"kumbaya" message lies some sort of socialist propaganda.

They'd say Lennon was calling for people to give up on

religion, the moral compass of life, and become atheist, anarchically relinquish affiliation to their country and let go of the material possessions they worked hard for so everyone could eat and live in a more equal station of life. The people who think this just don't get it.

In truth, underlying the world peace message, Lennon subtly and profoundly pointed out a significant flaw in humanity: that we are "taught" (for lack of a better term) to discriminate against people based on manmade conceptions, and that fact ultimately divides people. Lennon pointed out religion, country and possessions specifically. Man made religion, not God. Man made countries. Man makes material possessions, and material possessions are a function of money, another device made by man. It's precisely through these "boxes," which we manufactured ourselves, that society has conditioned us to judge people. We've been taught to hate.

Consider religious wars like the Crusades and the soon-to-be conflict between Israel and Iran. Consider America's "Islamophobia." Countries that go to war to improve their positions — virtually every single war. Consider prejudices made about entire peoples because of their government.

Are the people who live in China genuinely bad people or does their government simply pose a threat to our government? Consider how jealous people can be when their classmates, neighbors or coworkers get new cars, and consider how that jealousy breeds resentment.

Resist the society-made boxes and the pull to place people in them. We are all humans sharing one earth with similar capacities and struggles. Imagine that with compassion and understanding, we can solve problems and change the world. If more people understood John Lennon's "Imagine," the world would indeed "live as one."

Students should start financial planning right out of college

As we get closer to graduation, more of us are looking to make the kind of money we've never seen in our lives at new jobs. Friends all around me are getting the dreaded boot from their parents.

No more phone coverage, car insurance or food money. Most people have no clue how to manage money, and they waste a lot of their first-year salaries because of it.

UF grads entering the real world should establish a plan now to save for big goals such as retirement and a home and not buy anything major in the first year unless it's necessary — steer clear of salespeople of all stripes.

I've mentioned this before, but if you're 22 or 23 the biggest gift you can give yourself is to sign up for your company's 401(k) plan.

Finances might bore you, but commit to contributing at least until the company won't match anymore and choose the lowest cost stock index fund if you have one.

At about 9 percent annual return, large U.S. company stock has returned more than it did in the past 25 years or so. Investing \$10,000 at 22 is like investing \$67,275 at age 42.

Also, any mortgages you get through the Federal Housing Administration require a 5 percent down payment.

It might take a while to get together \$10,000 for a \$200,000 house unless you put away a small amount of money per month for about 48 months for that purpose.

If you want a private loan so you won't have to pay extra for private mortgage insurance, you need 20 percent down.

So start saving for the future as soon as you start a new job.

When athletes, doctors, lawyers and the like pass the arduous processes required to get the big bucks, many tend to immediately buy the big stuff like houses, boats, luxury cars and more.

If you're making \$50,000 a year, you probably can't afford a high-quality house in many areas if you operate on the don't-buy-a-house-more-than-three-times-your-income rule.

If buying a house right out of school is a bad decision, then I think buying a brand new car for more than \$25,000 has to be worse. Nothing loses its value faster than a new car. In fact, that new-car smell probably costs at least 100 times as much as any extravagant fragrance you've purchased.

If you must have a car, look for something 1 to 4 years old so someone else can take the \$10,000 to \$20,000 price drop.

Did you go to Career Fair and see that Northwestern Mutual was hiring, or read that the Modern Woodmen have many jobs for qualified UF grads? The reason is the companies are hiring insurance salespeople, which costs next to nothing.

The companies put a lot of pressure on new employees to leverage the companies' social circle to sell insurance products such as whole life, universal life and more.

I would almost guarantee you will get at least one acquaintance from college who'll ask you to buy some financial product he or she is selling.

The insurance companies give their salespeople a huge commission for each "elephant they kill," so let the buyer beware. Once you start a family, it will make sense to have a term life insurance, but whole life insurance is usually sold as an investment, and it's not a very good one.

In general, you want to protect against massive losses that could bankrupt you. Whenever you buy an insurance policy, ask for a high deductible because losing \$100 shouldn't make you lose sleep, but losing \$100,000 should and that's what you need protection for.

For investing, if any financial adviser/broker/wealth manager approaches you to do something, please ask him or her if he or she is fiduciary, the legal obligation to act in your best interest. This one word will scare away most financial salespeople.

Save and invest for the future. Don't spend on the big-ticket items, and beware of anyone who wants to sell you financial products — you will go far.

I know it's tough to give up all those perks our parents have been giving us for the past 22 years of our lives.

You might start by asking Siri if that new iPhone is really necessary.

with a standards board.

"I just heard about this situation a few hours ago," Gordian said. "I've been in meetings all evening and haven't had time to get to the bottom of what happened."

Mobley worked with two other people, according to Gainesville Police, whose investigation is still in progress.

"Other arrests are more than likely forthcoming," said GPD spokeswoman Cpl. Angelina Valuri.

At about 6 p.m. Wednesday, Mobley and the two other people planned to steal six boxes of "Black Roll Out Plastic Sheeting" from the Home Depot at 5150 NW 13th St, police said.

The three men loaded the sheets on a cart near the garden center exit, and Mobley distracted a cashier as the other two people rolled the cart to the parking lot.

Security officers watched this on a surveillance video, according to police. Earlier Wednesday, employees from the Home Depot on Northwest 75th Street warned the employees of

the Northwest 13th Street location about the three suspicious people.

Workers at the 75th Street store followed three people around the store before they left without buying anything.

In the parking lot at the 13th Street store, Mobley and the other two people loaded the sheets into the back of a car, but security officer Gaylord Wagaman confronted them.

They took the sheets out of the car and lingered for a few minutes, according to police. But the three suspects then got back in the car and drove off, hopping a curb and almost hitting several vehicles before speeding off on Northwest 13th Street.

Wagaman was on the phone with 911 when they left. From the surveillance video, GPD determined the car belonged to another fraternity member, whose name was not released.

Officers contacted Mobley on Thursday morning, and he turned himself in at the GPD Criminal Investigations Building.

Man charged with stalking women

Gregory M. Milner pushed a key into the front door of the apartment around 6:30 p.m. Wednesday and tried to open it. The key didn't fit. From inside, the women heard a soft clang.

"Open the door," Milner said, according to Gainesville Police. "I know you're in there."

One of the women called 911. Milner, who lives a floor below, had more keys. Somehow, he got one that worked, but the deadbolt was locked.

Minutes later, GPD officer Christopher King arrived, and Milner was arrested on four counts

of stalking. Milner, 29, is being held at the Alachua County Jail in lieu of a \$400,000 bond.

Stephanie Coronado, a psychology senior, lives at The Estates with three other girls. They didn't use to lock the deadbolt. They covered the handle in tape to remind them.

"We basically had a rule: Don't use it," said Stephanie Coronado, a psychology senior. "We were afraid one of us would get stuck outside. Then, we met Greg."

Before Milner showed up at their doorstep Wednesday, Coronado and Gianessa Nieto, an exploratory freshman, were preparing to go to The Estates gym. When they first heard scratch-

However, even if the governor approves market-rate tuition, it probably wouldn't be imposed in the fall, Machen said.

Going straight to the market rate would mean an increase of about 40 percent. Machen said to be fair, he'd rather wait until Fall 2013 to allow families considering UF to plan for the cost.

Another side of the plan would introduce flat-rate tuition, meaning students would pay the same amount for tuition throughout their degree programs so families can plan for similar expenses over four years. Tuition would increase with incoming freshman classes.

During the meeting, Machen opened the floor to faculty members with questions about GatorCare.

Some were concerned about whether off-campus and retired faculty would be covered

under the plan. Machen said they would.

"Wherever you are, we got you covered," he said.

Machen encouraged faculty to keep voicing their concerns and suggestions. He said the only way UF can create a self-insurance plan to fit everyone is if they continue to share.

Bernard Mair, associate provost for undergraduate affairs, and Dave Kratzer, associate vice president for student affairs, gave an update on the anti-hazing task force.

Mair and Kratzer said people will soon be able to look up organizations' conduct history online to see if a hazing complaint has been made against it.

"We want to be very transparent and very clear with our students," Kratzer said.

ing in the keyhole, they assumed a roommate was coming home.

"It was only a matter of seconds," Coronado said. "We were about to leave. That's scary as hell."

Coronado first met Milner in mid-January. While she was in the apartment complex's computer lab, Milner struck up a conversation with her. He talked for about an hour about a thesis he was writing about massage therapy, she said.

Soon after, Milner met Nieto and the other two roommates: Jillian Koenig, a business freshman, and Alisha Badger, a Santa Fe student.

While the women were exercising together in their apartment in January, Milner knocked on the door and asked if they were in a band. He lingered at the door, Coronado said, but he eventually left.

From then on, Milner appeared almost everywhere.

"Any time we're at the pool, any time we're at the gym, he shows up immediately," Nieto said. "We don't know where he comes from."

He knocked on the door again in early February and told them their parents were downstairs, waiting to greet them. One of the women called

The Estates front office, and management asked Milner to never contact the victims again, according to police.

That didn't work, Nieto said. Milner kept showing up when they walked outside, and his actions culminated Wednesday. The women were frightened thinking about how Milner found a key.

They are also angry at The Estates management. Milner was on probation for a stalking charge in January 2008, according to the Florida Department of Corrections. An employee told the women the complex does not do background checks on its residents, Badger said.

Nieto said an Estates manager offered to let the women move to another apartment within the complex.

That's not good enough, they said. They want out — out of The Estates and out of their leases.

A woman at The Estates call center said Thursday night it was too late for the Alligator to get a comment concerning the women's situation. Koenig was especially worried. In January, she signed a lease for next year.



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Gators facing tough defensive challenge in opening game

► UVA ALLOWING TEAMS TO SHOOT JUST 29.5 PERCENT FROM 3-POINT RANGE.

After suffering through five losses this season against some of the nation's most highly regarded defenses, the Gators thought they were prepared for anything an NCAA Tournament team could possibly throw at them.

In mid-November, they faced Ohio State featuring Big Ten steals leader Aaron Craft, who helped the Buckeyes pilfer Florida for 16 turnovers. Two weeks later, UF watched as Syracuse's vaunted 2-3 zone defense forced 20 against the Gators.

In conference play, the challenge only grew in difficulty when facing Kentucky and Anthony Davis' 7-foot-4 wingspan.

Each of those teams finished the regular season as a top-25 defensive unit, but none of them has been as stingy ahead of the NCAA Tournament as Virginia's pack-line defense.

When the No. 7 seed Gators (23-10) tip off against the No. 10

seed Cavaliers (22-9) today in Omaha, Neb., at 2:10 p.m., they will be shooting on, statistically, the best defensive squad they have faced this year.

"There's no question that is a real strength of their team — how well they defend, how they help each other, the pressure they apply on the ball," Donovan said. "If you look at their team throughout the course of the year, they are certainly a very sound defensive team."

Virginia's scoring defense, which allows just 53.7 points per game, is ranked second in the country. This season, the Cavaliers have held 11 opponents to less than 50 points, the most by an Atlantic Coast Conference team dating back to the beginning of the shot-clock era.

However, Virginia isn't dominating teams defensively with its talent alone. The Cavaliers' pack-line defense — which was created at Wisconsin 20 years ago by UVA coach Tony Bennett's father, Dick — attempts to compensate for a lack of athleticism by clogging the paint and placing its own players around an imaginary, 16-foot arc

Driskel, Brissett speak for first time, talk last season

When Jeff Driskel enrolled at Florida last January, the nation's top-rated high school quarterback was lost during spring practice; he admittedly had no idea what he was doing.

One forgettable freshman season and a new offensive coordinator later, Driskel said he feels much more comfortable as he battles fellow sophomore Jacoby Brissett for the Gators' starting job.

"Any time you get any experience, you're going to be a lot more comfortable," Driskel said. "I came in not knowing too much... kinda just throwing the ball around. But [Wednesday's] practice I felt a lot more comfortable."

Both Driskel and Brissett spoke to the media Thursday for the first time since arriving on campus last year, and while both were tight-lipped about who took the first snap of spring practice, wide receiver Quinton Dunbar wasn't as secretive, saying Driskel got the first rep.

Although the sophomore signal-callers are splitting time within the offense, and coach Will Muschamp said he has no timetable for naming a starter, Wednesday's practice marked a step forward for Driskel,

Florida not overlooking Vandy despite poor season start

Vanderbilt will stumble into Gainesville this weekend looking like a shell of the Southeastern Conference baseball powerhouse people tend to think of when the Commodores are discussed.

When the No. 1 Gators (16-1) take the field at McKethan Stadium tonight at 7, they will see a team with a losing record (7-10) that is near the bottom of the SEC in nearly every statistic.

Offensively, the Commodores are batting just .273 as a team and have struck out 114 times. Defensively, no SEC team has allowed more runs (101) or committed more errors (30).

"Baseball is a funny game," UF catcher Mike Zunino said. "You could be going bad and then the next thing you know it clicks and they could go on a run. It's something that we cannot take for granted."

While the Commodores may not march in with the best resume in hand, they will arrive to play the Gators with a little sense of normalcy and consistency. That's because starting on Friday night will be left-handed pitcher Kevin Ziomek, the one constant on a Vanderbilt team that has been all over the place to start 2012.

Ziomek has given up eight earned runs in 23.1 innings of work, with his only loss this season coming in an 8-3 defeat on opening night to Stanford, the nation's No. 2 team.

But it will not only be Ziomek's skill set and low- to mid-90s fastball that could give the Gators trouble. While it would be considered nitpicking to claim full-blown weaknesses in the UF batting lineup right now, it is fair to say that lefties have a bit of an advantage against the nation's most powerful team.

Of Florida's top-four leaders in batting average, only Zunino bats right-handed.

Gators readying for NCAA Tournament, guard-heavy Buckeyes

Similar nature of teams helping Florida prepare

The Gators' return to March Madness was shrouded in uncertainty throughout an up-and-down season.

After falling to Kentucky 71-67 in the quarterfinals of the Southeastern Conference Tournament on March 2, Florida had to wait 10 days to learn its postseason fate.

Not until Monday did UF learn it would face Ohio State in the first round of the NCAA Tournament on Sunday at 12:15 p.m., returning to The Big Dance for the first time since 2009.

After more than a week of tweaking their game and hoping for the chance to play for a na-

tional championship, the Gators finally had something tangible ahead of them in the Buckeyes.

Not only could UF move forward without worrying about bubbles or RPI rankings, but preparing for OSU was also familiar.

Like the Gators, the Buckeyes employ three-guard lineups, running a guard-oriented offense that gets the majority of its points from the backcourt.

"They kind of do the same thing we do as far as using on-ball screens," senior guard Deana Allen added. "Just practicing against that, with us using it as our strength, we already know how to guard and what we want to take away."

However, that is where the

similarities end for Florida and Ohio State.

The two squads' differences can be traced back to Monday, when each earned a berth to the NCAA Tournament.

While the Gators were happy just to get into The Big Dance, the Buckeyes expected more than a No. 8 seed from the selection committee after going 25-6 and finishing in second place in the Big Ten Conference.

"(Ohio State is) a team that's a little disappointed with their seed," coach Amanda Butler said. "Therefore, probably a little extra

measure of hunger and fight in them."

UF already faces a tall task in OSU, the 11th ranked opponent the Gators will face this season. They are 2-8 in those games.

Additionally, the Buckeyes are the highest-scoring team (75.1 points per game) the Gators will play this season and boast the second-best 3-point shooting clip (35.9 percent).

Guards Tayler Hill and Samantha Prahalis provide the majority of Ohio State's offense, averaging 20.3 and 20.1 points per game, respectively.

"It's a huge challenge for the guards," redshirt senior guard Jordan Jones said. "It's two of the best guards we've played all year on one team, so it's definitely

been a huge focus in practice." Florida and Ohio State have similar styles, something that has encouraged the Gators in their preparation for the Buckeyes.

"There's a comfort level there," Butler said. "Even if it's just with the terminology of understanding what to expect because it's the same sort of things you're harping on and trying to perfect."

Should the Gators defeat the Buckeyes, they would likely be facing a game against the nation's best player Brittney Griner and Baylor, the tournament's No. 1 overall seed.

Florida has not advanced past the second round since 1997-98, when the Gators advanced to the Sweet 16 and assistant coach Muriel Page was the star forward.

around the basket.

Virginia's defenders won't cross that line until the UF player they're guarding receives a pass. If Brad Beal or Kenny Boynton attempt to drive the lane, the Cavaliers hanging back will try to collapse on him.

"It will be a little bit different for us, so to speak," Donovan said. "We have played teams that don't necessarily do exactly the

same thing, but they are teams that have similar philosophies, similar mindsets in terms of how they play defensively."

While UVA's brand of defending welcomes teams like the guard-heavy Gators to settle for jump shots, the Cavaliers have done a good enough job closing out to limit their opponents to 29.5 percent shooting behind the 3-point line.

In their first NCAA Tournament game since 2007, though, the low-scoring Cava-

liers will be short-handed following a Feb. 17 season-ending left foot injury to freshman sixth man Malcolm Brogdon.

Less than a month earlier, they also lost senior center Assane Sene to a right ankle injury, from which he has yet to return.

Stuck with a seven-man rotation, Virginia has scaled back the pace of its already-snail's-pace of-

fense to a near crawl. The Cavaliers went through the season scoring just 63.1 points per game — good for 10th in the ACC.

"Sometimes it can be difficult when a team is really disciplined with the ball and doesn't turn it over," UF senior Erving Walker said. "We want to hopefully probably press and keep pushing the pace and get the game going our way."

Of Florida's 27 home runs this season, 15 have come from left-handed batters, eight have come from righties and four have come courtesy of freshman Taylor Gushue, one of two switch-hitters on the team.

"We have a lot of lefties and we just have to battle and compete every at-bat," Zunino said. "I think we're doing a great job of that this year."

Although Florida's team batting average is .312, its team average against left-handed pitching is a notch lower

at .298 — not a sign of serious troubles by any means but a slight note when dealing with a team that has won 14 straight games by an average of 5.4 runs and is hitting .323 in March.

"We've got a few hard-throwing lefties on our squad, too, so I think seeing those guys in the fall and spring is definitely going to (help)," he said. "Nothing is going to surprise us."

Etc.: For the third straight weekend, sophomore right-hander Jonathon Crawford will be Florida's Sunday starter as the Gators continue to hold sophomore Karsten Whitson out of action for what UF coach Kevin O'Sullivan has called "precautionary reasons."

Driskel: 'I was a little nervous' in first action against Alabama

who struggled mightily during his freshman campaign but will get a clean slate under new offensive coordinator Brent Pease.

Despite battling through spring practice last year, Driskel entered the 2011 season No. 2 on the Gators' depth chart behind redshirt senior John Brantley. He made his collegiate debut against Florida Atlantic, completing 4 of 6 passes for 42 yards and an interception in second-half garbage time.

But nearly a month later, when Brantley sprained his ankle at the end of the first half against Alabama, Driskel was called upon and looked just as lost as he said he was in the spring.

"I want to say that I was calm, but I'd be lying," Driskel said. "I was a little nervous. It was a big stage; I should have been more prepared."

Driskel vows he will be more prepared this year, adding he is more mature and finally comfortable with the offense, which is remaining largely the same under Pease apart from tweaked terminology and more shifts and pre-snap motions. First, Driskel must beat out Brissett, who took over the backup

job following the Alabama game and looked far more poised running Florida's offense than Driskel did in his limited action.

"To be honest I wasn't (nervous)," Brissett said. "I mean, throughout practice I kind of like put myself in situations in my head like if it was a real game, and when I went out there I don't think I felt anything."

Brissett finished out the season as the backup, even earning time as the Gators' goal-line quarterback when Brantley's ankle was still recovering. Neither quarterback put up impressive numbers as freshmen, but regardless of results, Muschamp said the experience both gained last season will pay dividends moving forward, and he sees the intangibles both need to be great quarterbacks.

"I've said it before: Unfortunately they played for us [last] year; fortunately they played for us [last] year," Muschamp said. "It's two-fold. It's not an indictment on either young man. I think they're really good players, but playing as a freshman at that position is different. It's different than any other position."
