Erin Andrews gets laughs, date invitation at Phillips Center

After fighting her way up the sports media ladder, Erin Andrews briefly climbed back down Wednesday to return to where her career started.

Accent Speakers' Bureau and the Women's Student Association paid Andrews, a UF alumna and ESPN sideline reporter, \$15,000 to speak at the Phillips Center for the Performing Arts.

Andrews' bubbly personality raised many laughs from her audience of about 500.

She was forced to decline an invitation to a fraternity member's formal and poked fun of a front-row fan sporting an Indiana jersey.

"Why are you wearing that?" Andrews joked.

But her famous looks and Gator roots are not the only traits that attracted the crowds.

Telecommunication freshman Megan Gannon, 19, who waited in front of the Phillips Center for three hours to see Andrews, said she idolizes the reporter and wants to work alongside her one day.

"I like how opinionated she is,"

Gannon said. "She speaks very well as a woman in a male-dominated profession."

Andrews graduated from UF in 2000 with a degree in telecommunications. During her time in Gainesville, she was a member of the Dazzlers, the official dance team for UF athletics.

Andrews said she knows she is one of the prominent females in her field and it only makes her work harder to prove herself to her peers.

"I'm a huge sports fan," Andrews said, "and I've met the male sports fans that don't know as much as I do. Every day, I try so hard to prove to people I belong."

While Andrews has fought hard to earn her credibility, several male viewers said they don't doubt her abilities.

"It shouldn't matter whether you're a man or woman," said Alex Everett, a 21-year-old chemical engineering senior. "She's a good reporter, no matter what."

Shands children's hospital gets \$23,000 in donations

Shands Hospital for Children at UF received \$23,000 in donations Wednesday, courtesy of a 7-year-old, his family and an online video of them dancing.

Gainesville's Pence family won the money and placed second in the Primrose Schools Family Dance-off competition benefiting Children's Miracle Network Hospitals.

Tyler Pence, 7, has been a patient at Shands since he was 3 months old. He has been treated for a cleft lip and a notch in his gum.

The family earned a \$20,000 donation to Shands at UF and a \$3,000 cash prize at a Wednesday ceremony from the Prim-

rose Children's Foundation. The family decided to give its cash to the hospital.

This year, 117 families across the nation submitted 30-second videos of themselves dancing. First place went to the Peetz family of Kannapolis, N.C., and third place went to the Froehlich family of Xenia, Ohio.

Nathan Pence, Tyler's father, said his family is happy about winning second place and donating the prize money to Shands at UF.

"We actually looked at the videos of the other families, and we were secretly pulling for the Peetz family," he said. "If we didn't win it, we wanted them to win it."

Speed limit on I-75 may be reduced to increase safety

City and county officials are pushing to lower the speed limit on a stretch of Interstate 75, and Florida Department of Transportation officials will conduct a study to see if the move would be possible and realistic.

In the wake of the Jan. 29 crashes that killed 11 people, Mayor Craig Lowe and 11 city and county commissioners asked the state transportation department to provide them with the criteria necessary to reduce the 70 mph speed limit to 55 mph.

While officials are saying the change would make I-75 safer, some students said the move is an overreaction.

"This would be adding more problems instead of helping," said Christina Barker, a 26-year-old first-year political campaigning graduate student.

She drives two hours from Pasco County to Gainesville three days a week and said drivers already slow down before the Gainesville exit. To lower the speed limit where the officials want, between County Road 234 and State Road 222, would make traffic even worse.

"I would hate that, actually," Barker said.

The speed limit has never been changed in the area, said Gina Busscher, a transportation department spokeswoman.

The department will do a two- to four-

Police search for missing man

Police are looking for a Gainesville man who was reported missing Tuesday night.

Roy Dillard, 69, was reported missing by his daughter, Samaria Dillard, when he didn't return home Tuesday.

Dillard left his house, 321 NW 21st Lane, at about 10:30 p.m. Tuesday to get a money order from Walmart, pay bills and go to his church in Fairbanks, said Gainesville Police spokeswoman Cpl. Angelina Valuri.

It is uncharacteristic for Dillard not to return home, Valuri said. Dillard is a Type-2 diabetic, and at times he can become disoriented.

His daughters have looked for him at places he frequents: Big Lots, Publix, the Waldo Flea Market and Piccadilly.

Dillard was last seen in a maroon Hyundai Sonata with Veterans Affairs tag No. DV5890A.

Non-profit says city power agreement violates state law

A group of Gainesville residents are suing Gainesville Regional Utilities to get a city power agreement thrown out.

Gainesville Citizens CARE Inc., a non-profit organization created to protest the agreement, said the city violated state public-meeting laws when signing an agreement to get power from a wood-burning power plant, according to a complaint filed Wednesday.

The Gainesville City Commission signed a roughly \$3 billion contract in 2009 to buy 30 years of power from the new plant, which will be owned by American Renewables.

"This contract is void because of the way it was done," said Jo Beaty, a board member of Gainesville Citizens CARE Inc. "The public process has been violated throughout the whole approval of this."

City Commissioner Thomas Hawkins

said the accusation is incorrect and each step was done through public meetings.

The complaint states the negotiations were not open to the public and the meeting notes were not available for residents to see.

It also states final changes to the contract, including changing the agreement from 20 years to 30 years, were made in private.

This isn't the first time residents have been concerned about the agreement.

The County Commission is considering using another utility provider for its buildings because the wood-burning plant would increase its utility bills. Residents are also concerned about utility bill increases — a sentiment echoed by some City Commission candidates in the spring races.

Hawkins said any new power plant would increase rates. He said the wood-burning plant was the cheapest long-term option available to the city.

"Prices increase over time," he said. "It's something that we have to deal with, and the way we deal with it is we work every day to keep our rates low."

Florida senator discusses state election law at meeting

Florida Sen. Bill Nelson met with his constituents Wednesday afternoon for a town hall meeting as part of his re-election campaign.

Nelson spoke to a crowd of about 30 at the Florida Innovation Hub, berating state election law and urging bipartisanship in all levels of the government.

Gainesville was one of at least 10 town hall stops the senator will make around Florida.

"Sen. Nelson and the city of Gainesville are certainly no strangers," Mayor Craig Lowe said. "He checks in frequently to let us know what is going on in Washington and how that impacts us. We have a lot to thank him for."

Nelson went on to rail against changes the Florida Legislature, which is mainly comprised of Republicans, made to the state election law. These measures include

cutting early voting hours in at least half and disallowing voting on the Sunday before an election.

He said research shows that Sunday is the time when most African Americans and Hispanics vote.

"It's hard for me to believe this is happening in 2012 in America," Nelson said. "I thought we went through this in the right of access to the ballot during the civil rights battle."

He expressed the need for bipartisanship.

Frank Ogborn, audience member and mayor of Archer, agreed.

"I'm a Republican. He's a Democrat," Ogborn said. "But, I'm here anyway because we've got to work together."

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Union Street Farmers Market celebrated Sweet 16 Wednesday

The gentle clanging of cymbals and drums drifted through the farmers market tents, like the people sniffing scents wafting from nearby herbs and soaps.

Wednesday marked the 16th anniversary of the Union Street Farmers Market at Bo Diddley Community Plaza.

Charlie Lybrand, 62, director of the farmers market, said the vendors at the market know more about their products than some grocery store employees.

"There's a whole feeling of community between the vendors and the customers," he said. "It's an experience."

Lybrand, who is also a beekeeper and sells infused honey, started the first Union Street Farmers Market in 1996 at the Sun Center plaza. Eight vendors and about 12 loyal families attended the market's inauguration.

He said the market's growth was slow until about four and half years ago, when it outgrew the Sun Center plaza and moved to the Bo Diddley Community Plaza. Once the market relocated to a more visible location, it took off.

Now, about 55 vendors sell everything from orchids to cheese to jewelry.

Lybrand said he wanted to start a Gainesville market after a county market became too restrictive, only allowing produce and vegetables to be sold. He wanted to open a market to bakers, farmers, artists and musicians.

"There's a huge amount of talent in this community," he said. "Sometimes, that's taken for granted."

Ashley Helfrich, a 22-year-old UF early childhood education graduate student, was a first-time market-goer. She said she was surprised to find bread, ethnic foods and shaved ice.

"Now that I've been here and see

what they have, I'll probably come back next week to do some grocery shopping," Helfrich said.

Jose Landrua, 23, hopes Helfrich will buy some vegetables from his farm, LaLa Land. He moved from Fort Lauderdale with his brother, Javier, 21, to start an organic farm in Alachua a few months ago.

Landrua said the farmers market gives him another place to sell his produce and support his brother and himself.

"This is where my passion is," he said.

BugFest promotes entomology, recruits new students

UF's Entomology Club gave people something to buzz about Wednesday night with its second annual BugFest Open House.

About 500 students and Gainesville-area residents gathered at Charles Steinmetz Hall on the south side of campus.

The event aimed to promote entomology — the study of insects — and to recruit students to the major.

"It's a showcasing of the entomology department to get people to understand what entomology is and how it actually plays a great role in their lives," said Alyssa Porter, the event's coordinator and a 22-year-old entomology senior.

Visitors were able to tour the department's research facilities, talk to entomology advisers and professors, participate in Hollywood-themed games and competitions, and witness a live butterfly release.

Games included cricket-spitting competitions, a cockroach race to the Oscars and Hollywood Walk of Fame maggot art.

Live arthropods drew in visitors who held Madagascar hissing cockroaches and millipedes that can grow up to 2 feet long.

Emperor scorpions and Chilean rosehair tarantulas were on display, but visitors were not allowed to handle them.

Chris Thomas, a 20-year-old graphic

design junior, said the cockroach races were his favorite part.

"You have your cockroach on the table, and you just guide them in the right direction," he said. "I ended cutting the other cockroach off and came in for the win."

The maggot art display maintained a crowd of about 20 people throughout the night.

Attendees were able to dip live fruit-eating maggots into paint, then watch them crawl around on star-shaped paper.

The first 400 visitors to the free event received tickets to the Florida Museum of Natural History's Butterfly Rainforest as well as a food voucher for pizza.

Academic information was available to students and highlighted the degree tracks within the entomology major, such as ecotourism, basic science, pre-professional and urban pest management.

Thomas said one of his friends was able to get advice from a graduate student about what entomology class she should take next semester.

Porter said the pre-professional degree track is a good option for students who want to go to medical, dental or veterinary school.

"It meets application requirements and can help make your application stand out from the hundreds of biology majors applying," she said.



Police Powers Supreme Court rules in favor of searches

In 1907, Charles Evans Hughes, New York governor and eventual chief justice of the U.S. Supreme Court, said, "The judiciary is the safeguard of liberty ... under the Constitution."

Alexander Hamilton, secretary of the treasury and an author of The Federalist Papers, wrote in Federalist 78 that the judicial branch "is equally requisite to guard the Constitution and the rights of individuals from the effects ... of occasional ill humors in the society."

Though the Supreme Court of the United States is supposed to act as this safeguard of individual rights against majority rule and expansions in executive power, it does not always side with the individual.

On Monday, according to NPR, the Supreme Court ruled 5-4 "that guards may routinely strip search even minor traffic offenders when they are arrested and detained."

When Albert Florence was pulled over by a state trooper in 2005, his records showed that he had a 7-year-old outstanding arrest warrant for failing to pay a fine.

Although Florence had a receipt in his car indicating that the fine had been paid, the state trooper arrested Florence and took him to jail. The story by NPR says that Florence "was held in jail for seven days and strip-searched twice."

Florence eventually sued, arguing that he was subjected to unreasonable searches as described in the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution.

Unfortunately for Florence, the majority disagreed. Justice Anthony Kennedy, who wrote the majority opinion for the court, argued that "the courts must defer to the judgment of correctional officials in order to prevent new inmates from putting lives at risk with weapons or contraband that they may carry in on their bodies."

In his dissent, Justice Stephen Breyer countered that correctional officials need to have a reasonable justification for conducting a strip search on minor offenders. He also noted that those charged with minor offenses probably did not plan on being arrested and, therefore, would not have tried to hide contraband in their body cavities.

One of Kennedy's main arguments was completely asinine and illogical. He argued that the fact that Timothy McVeigh was pulled over and charged for a minor offense and turned out to be the Oklahoma City bomber shows how minor offenders could be dangerous criminals.

The chances of something like that happening on a regular basis are slim to none.

Finally, the majority was made up of conservative justices — the same justices who argued that the mandate in "Obamacare" requiring everyone to purchase health insurance gives the government too much power. Can you see the contradiction?

The government's police powers have grown tremendously since 9/11, and Fourth Amendment protections continue to shrink.

The Supreme Court, or this supposed "safeguard of liberty," has failed to live up to its role.



Obama's statements coercive, inappropriate

Last week, the Supreme Court heard arguments on the constitutionality of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, more colloquially known as Obamacare. Now President Obama is using his office to inappropriately sway the court's eventual ruling.

A large part of the controversy surrounds a provision called the individual mandate, which would force every American to purchase some form of health insurance.

Some of the comments made by Obama on Monday are unnecessary and worrying, especially coming from a former constitutional law professor.

Specifically, Obama said, "I'm confident that the Supreme Court will not take what would be an unprecedented, extraordinary step of overturning a law that was passed by a strong majority of a democratically elected Congress."

He continued, "And I'd just remind conservative commentators that for years what we've heard is the biggest problem on the bench was judicial activism or a lack of judicial restraint — that an unelected group of people would somehow overturn a duly constituted and passed law."

By referencing a possible overturning of this law as "an unprecedented, extraordinary step," Obama is attacking the Supreme Court. By calling the nine most powerful judges in the world "an unelected group of people" who should exercise "judicial restraint," he is negligently using his office in an attempt to sway what is supposed to be an unbiased decision.

Obama's preemptive strike took the form of his usual political calculations — attacks disguised as commentary — easily defended later as a mere analysis but clearly a form of masked coercion.

It was a passive-aggressive attempt to inject his liberal viewpoint in what should otherwise be an objective decision based on the Constitution of the United States.

Mr. President, the fact that the Supreme Court is an "unelected group of people" is exactly what our Founding Fathers intended. As Obama certainly must understand, it is the very spirit of our republic to vest the ultimate power to

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interpret the constitution in this "unelected" group — a group which he helped appoint.

This power is not given to Congress, and just because a "strong majority of a democratically elected Congress" voted for the bill does not mean that it cannot be unconstitutional at the same time.

The strength of the majority has nothing to do with the constitutionality of the law. It is inappropriate for the president to suggest otherwise.

Ever since Marbury v. Madison gave the Supreme Court the power of judicial review, the courts have struck down laws.

The president is worried. You can tell he is worried because he is saying he is "confident" that the Supreme Court will uphold the law.

In the backward world of politics, elected officials say one thing when they mean another. Obama would not have released such a strong-armed statement if he didn't think it would reach the ears of the Supreme Court and affect its decision.

Don't get me wrong, I fully believe that the individual mandate is well within the constitutional power of Congress. I fully believe that Obamacare is constitutional. I fully believe that if the Supreme Court overturns this law, it would be deeply rooted in politics and not in the court's historic objectivity.

But I do not fully believe that politics should be used to help sway the court's decision.

I do not believe it is appropriate for the president to inject such brash and inappropriate language to condemn an action by the court. And, perhaps most worrying, I do not believe that the president believes in what he is actually saying.

Web series promises murder and comedy

Where we're going, we don't need cable.

Coming soon to a computer screen near you is "Euston Prep," a new Web series out of Los Angeles.

Kacy Bartleigh, the 23-year-old director of the project, graduated from the New York Film Academy last year and has never worked on a project like this before.

"So far, the workload has been very much a labor of love," she said. "Everyone gets along so well and is incredibly talented."

Executive producer and co-creator/writer Andrew Connor has had the idea for a series like this for a few years, ever since "Veronica Mars" began to dwindle from the airwaves.

"Annie (Liu) and I are both huge fans of 'Sherlock Holmes,' and modeling the characters after Doyle's archetypes, but putting them in a different location, seemed interesting to us," he said. "We figured, as members of the entertainment-loving public, it would be interesting to others as well."

"I hope people will realize why we're doing this — to tell a good story," Connor said.

Annie Liu, executive producer and co-creator of "Euston Prep," works around schedules and problems in order to keep the project moving forward.

She said Connor is "more in charge of the story and writing it because his work schedule is more intense," and with Bartleigh's help, she has been "mostly in charge of actual production."

"We've finished a pilot script, and we're in the process of finishing up outlining the rest of the six-episode season because we have

an overarching series-long story in mind," Liu said.

"Our photographer, Jason Boulanger who did the promotional photo shoot with us, did it all as a personal favor," Liu said. "I think that says a lot about the passion and interest for this project: People are willing to donate their time and services to helping us making 'Euston Prep' a reality."

The crew will need more than favors from friends to make this project available to the public. In order to make the 45-minute pilot a reality, the team created an "Indiegogo" donation page. Their goal might seem large — \$25,000 — but all donations will cover basic expenses needed to produce a pilot episode.

None of the money raised will go toward payment of the cast or crew, so it's a good thing they love their work. Liu said she knows it's "a lot to ask for people to work for free, but in the end, we're all doing this because we wanted to create opportunities for ourselves to tell a really good story."

"It has been such a collaborative process so far with everyone being so open and accepting of ideas, which is very rare," said Chelsea Taylor, the actress who plays Charlie Reid on "Euston Prep."

Noah Hunt, 21-year-old actor and musician, plays Declan Rhodes. He met Taylor in an acting class a while ago, and she got him involved with the Web series.

"I want people to connect with it," Hunt said. "This story is original and intriguing, so if they do [connect with it], we will obtain the opportunity to bring this piece of art to a much wider audience."

Due to the creators' love of "Sherlock Holmes" and "Veronica Mars," viewers should expect plenty of surprises from the Web series.

"'Euston Prep' will bring you a lot of mystery, intrigue, and suspense, but there will also be a healthy dose of comedy if I have anything to do with it," said Matt Devine, who plays Noah Bailey.

Some of Devine's previous projects ("The Wedding Dance" and "Break of Day") have also used donation-raising websites such as Indiegogo or Kickstarter to help pay for costs.

"I am no stranger to Web-based productions," Devine said. "There is a lot of talent in Los Angeles, and the Internet is making it possible for more of that talent to be seen."

"The Indiegogo project is amazing because it allows us to spread the word on different medias to a wide

array of people," said Kat Bradley, a 24-year-old writer of the show.

She got started on the project when Connor asked for her input during the beginning stages, and she was eventually asked to be a member of the team.

"I hope people realize that we're a group of people dedicated to making a good show, and they'll be able to expect an exciting episode week after week. I am confident we can deliver."

One of UF's youngest professors has released a new book. Ben Wise, a historian of modern America who focuses on Southern history, gender and sexuality and cultural history, recently published "William Alexander Percy: The Curious Life of a Missis-

sippi Planter and Sexual Freethinker."

In this biography, Wise paints the complex picture of a man who is mostly known as a white supremacist, but also provides a unique perspective through his world travels and life as a queer male and sexual liberationist.

Published a few weeks ago through University of North Carolina Press with a

cover designed by his wife, the book has been met with positive reviews from critics and historians.

Although this biography is Wise's first published book, he has already made a name for himself in the field.

In 2009, he was awarded the C. Vann Woodward prize for the best dissertation in the field of Southern history, and he has had several articles pub-

lished since 2008.

At UF, he's known as one of the "cool" professors of the young generation who does interesting modern readings of history and culture. Two years ago, he was named a teacher of the year in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

This semester, he is teaching undergraduate-level courses Race and Power in American Society, 1865 to 1920 and American Culture from 1880 to 1940, along with independent study, master's and doctorate courses.

Civil Twilight's albums can be purchased on iTunes, and "Holy Weather" is now streaming on the band's website, civiltwilightband.com.



Screenplay writer David H. Steinberg, of the iconic teen movies "Slackers" and the "American Pie" series, shows that 10 years after the movies' releases, when it comes to playing out teen lingo, sex drives and self-deprecations, he still understands teenagers — all of which we see in his new book "Last Stop This Town."

With the upcoming "American Pie Reunion" flick, those who grew up watching Jim and the guys grow from horny teens to college guys, and now parents, may think, "Damn, the years sure flew." But now it's time for them to move over for the new teens in town.

"Last Stop This Town" brings in a new set of teens who are just as lovable. Think of the growing-up storylines we've come to love

from "American Pie" and the raunchy humor we've picked up from hits such as "Superbad" and "The Hangover." Mix that into this coming-of-age story about four friends who are in limbo between high school graduation and college — an area no film or book has ventured into quite like this.

They do what most 18-year-old high school seniors would do in this situation: live life to the fullest — or at least try to.

Dylan, Noah, Warren and Pike are characters who make up the perfect teen entourage. Dylan is the frustrated leader of the pack, who gets a lot of the soon-to-be-classic lines. Despite his confidence, he is very unsure of where to take his life and how to make his dad proud. Noah, the Ivy-League-bound boy, has the perfect life, the perfect balance of book smarts and street

smarts and the perfect girlfriend — until they break up.

Warren is the way-too-talkative guy who respects women so much that instead of talking them into bed, he bores them to death with his chatter of "let's exchange emails" and "are you on Facebook?" catchphrases. He's the guy who, as Dylan perfectly describes, girls will like when they're older because right now they don't want respect, they want someone "to tip the scales of their precarious self-esteem by making them feel special."

And of course, what would a perfect teen epic be without the stoner? Pike is a smart, mouthy, laidback guy, who at one point in the story is described by a potential

hookup as "funny, good-looking (in a young Sean Penn kind of way)." It's impossible to not reference Jeff Spicoli, of 1982's "Fast Times at Ridgemont High" fame — after all, he is the epitome of teen stoner.

This foursome of troubles and trifles creates an interesting dynamic that spends its days in the suburbs of Hartford, Conn., doing the usual activities: hooking up and bribing homeless men to buy booze for parties (one of the homeless men ends up drinking his stash and throwing his fecal matter at them).

So, to end their high school years on a high, they decide to go to an underground rave in New York. The journey to the rave drives the story forward, and along the way, they live, learn and come to terms with their futures.

Steinberg keeps readers on their toes with his witty, film-worthy lines and unexpected turns of events. When you think things are

becoming cliché and expected, he throws unexpected elements into the teen mix.

With pop-culture references spanning the '80s, '90s, '00s and today, the appeal is wide. Anyone who has been a teen in the last 30 years will enjoy the romp and raunchiness that effortlessly and realistically flows throughout the novel.

This will surely become a timeless teen story, and possibly a movie, that will greatly define the zeitgeist of teen culture for this new decade.

In fewer than 200 pages, Steinberg covers a lot of ground and takes us through the ups and downs that come with being a teen, all while allowing the four young men to grow for the better as their journey comes to end — or the beginning, as many would say.

Among the people in Gators T-shirts, jerseys and frat tanks in the Swamp on football Saturdays, a few girls stand out from the crowd looking perfect in their gameday dresses — thanks to Jacquelyn Brooks.

Brooks, a Gainesville fashion designer, will be showing her creations as part of a Gainesville Fashion Week runway show on Saturday, April 14, at Villa East, located at 301 N. Main St. Her show will feature ready-to-wear pieces as well as formal wear.

Brooks got her start in design by sewing clothes for herself in her early teens. She then pursued fashion in college, attending Florida State University to major in apparel design and technology.

After graduating from FSU, Brooks moved home to Gainesville to open her business, Jacquelyn Brooks Designs, on University Avenue in Midtown, where she does both custom designs and tailoring and sews everything herself.

"My family was here when I got out of school," she said. "Honestly, I didn't think that I would be staying in Gainesville, but it kind of just ended up that way."

With a location within walking distance from Ben Hill Griffin Stadium, Brooks designs a line of gameday dresses that come in diverse cuts while still staying true to orange and blue for Gator girls.

"I have some styles that are geared toward college students, and I have some that are geared toward professionals. It just really depends on the design because you know what one group likes, another group would like something else," she said. "I kind of just design what I like and go from there. I don't like to wear T-shirts to a game, and you kind of want to stand out in a crowd of 80,000, so a lot of girls really like to wear the dresses."

Brooks doesn't just design with the style of dress that her clients might like in mind. She also takes into consideration the weather in the Swamp.

"I've designed a line so far that's good to wear in hot weather," she said. "Most of it's knit, so it's movable with the body. It stretches so you don't feel constricted, and it's breathable so you're not dying in a 100-degree stadium, but it's still cute."

She hopes to take her gameday line nationally, creating different designs based on regions due to climate differences in different states, including long sleeves and maxi-dresses for northern schools, and maybe even branching out into separates.

"I think that's the direction I'm going to go, and I can kind of launch that and take that to manufacturing doing gameday

colors for every different school and have that as a base business while I expand on the stuff I really love to do, which is the couture line," she said.

She describes her design style as "feminine, classy but slightly trendy as well," and prefers doing custom designs for her clients. Last year, she designed a custom blue taffeta wedding dress that the customer, and Brooks, loved.

"It was gorgeous, and basically she just gave me an inspiration — a picture to start from — and just let me run with it. She just loved everything I did, so that was great because she allowed me to be creative and (I) wasn't stuck with a certain design," Brooks said. "I really prefer if customers don't come to me like, 'Hey, can you copy this dress?,' because for me that's not designing; that's just reproducing something somebody's already made."

Brooks is not just a designer, but also a philanthropist who founded the Runways and Rescues fashion show last year benefiting Haile's Angels Pet Rescue. This year's event will take place on May 18 at the Haile Plantation Golf and Country Club.

To Brooks, the defining moment in her career has not been just one event, but a culmination of all the little things along the way.

"Last year, I got calls from 'Fashion Star' and 'Project Runway,' so those were two really amazing things that happened," she said.

"And then, you know, the charity fashion show, and it was my first year at Gainesville Fashion Week, so I think all those little things kind of just keep the motivation going."





Now healthy, Whitson primed for first full start since February

It took 37 days, but Karsten Whitson finally appears to be done watching.

The sophomore right-handed pitcher took the mound Tuesday night in Jacksonville for a one-inning rehab start, ending more than one month of inactivity.

Now he is back to being an option for No. 1 Florida (24-5, 6-3 Southeastern Conference) as it welcomes No. 12 LSU (23-6, 6-3 SEC) into McKethan Stadium for a three-game series beginning tonight at 7:30. Whitson's name is being tossed around as a possible starter for Friday's game.

"That's what me and (coach Kevin O'Sullivan) have kind of talked about," Whitson said. "I'm definitely looking forward to getting back out there."

Despite missing the majority of fall practice with a groin injury, Whitson entered the spring with giant expectations. As a freshman, he struck out 92 batters in 97.1 innings, registering a 2.40 ERA and an 8-1 record. He was expected to slide up

a spot in the rotation and serve as Florida's Saturday starter.

His right arm wasn't quite ready for the promotion.

After "four or five" weeks of resting his groin injury, Whitson said his arm wasn't in the shape. He got his first victory in a five-inning outing against Cal State Fullerton on Feb. 18 but didn't look quite himself. His next start on Feb. 26 lasted 13 pitches, and Whitson was shelved for more than a month.

"It's hard when you take off the four or five weeks you're supposed to take and you can't just come back and assume you're going to be 100 percent," he said. "It's definitely a process and it's been tough."

On Wednesday, O'Sullivan said Whitson had strained muscle in his forearm. For weeks, it had been described as simple fatigue. The injury was one that took nothing more than time to heal. Whitson praised how protective O'Sullivan was of him, a quality the fifth-year Florida coach has become famous for.

"It just shows why guys make the decision to come to Florida," Whitson said. "It's definitely comfortable knowing the coach has your best interests in heart rather than just trying to get you back out there and win a couple games."

O'Sullivan said if it was up to Whitson, he would have been back

Horton, Fagan power No. 6 UF past No. 21 FSU in Tallahassee

The Gators traveled to Tallahassee on Wednesday, but Sami Fagan and Kelsey Horton went a little farther.

Fagan and Horton both homered in Florida's second trip through the order, powering the Gators to a six-run third inning.

"It was big," Horton said. "It always makes it easier for your pitcher to pitch when you're up by five or six runs."

Boosted by its early offensive outburst, No. 6 Florida defeated No. 21 Florida State 9-1, improving its nonconference record to 20-2.

Already up 1-0 in the top of the third inning, the Gators (32-4) got a leadoff single from Kasey Fagan followed by a bunt single from Michelle Moultrie.

Then, Sami Fagan sent Seminoles starting pitcher Monica Perry's offering over the center-field wall for her first career home run.

"Normally, we'd probably be in a bunt situation there," coach Tim Walton said. "But Sami

got a nice hit against Georgia the other night with two outs, a two-RBI double, so it just felt good. I felt like she could deliver with that."

After a Lauren Haeger strikeout and a Cheyenne Coyle double, Horton smacked her team-leading 10th homer of the season to make it a 6-0 contest.

Aided by her long ball, Horton knocked in three runs against FSU (33-7), resulting in her 10th multi-RBI game of the season, a mark that leads UF.

Horton's 3-for-4 performance at the plate marked her 10th multi-hit game in 2012.

"She hit a bomb [Wednesday], just got a hold of it," Walton said. "(Horton) really did a good job. She went left-center, she went up the middle, she went opposite field, so she was really just spraying the ball around well."

Florida ultimately won by the run rule thanks to Horton's efforts with the bat and on the base paths in the fifth and sixth innings.

After hitting a one-out single in the top of the fifth inning, Horton took two bases on a Jess

Leonard enters plea, must serve six months probation

Sophomore tight end A.C. Leonard pled no contest Wednesday afternoon to a misdemeanor charge of simple domestic battery.

According to the Orlando Sentinel, Leonard appeared in front of Judge Denise R. Ferrero early Wednesday afternoon in the Alachua County Courthouse and entered his plea of no contest to the charge stemming from a Feb. 15 arrest.

Leonard must pay \$628 in fines and court fees, complete six months of probation, continue counseling for anger management and open his medical records to the state attorney's office. According to the report, Ferrero also ordered Leonard to not come in contact with the victim, his longtime girlfriend

Nia V. Ruiz.

Leonard was arrested Feb. 15 for allegedly pushing Ruiz to the ground, pulling her hair and dragging her by her feet out of their apartment at the Polos

complex on Williston Road during an altercation. Ruiz called police after Leonard, 20, locked her out of their apartment, where the two had been living together since January.

Following the arrest, Florida coach Will Muschamp suspended Leonard indefinitely from team activities. Leonard was reinstated to practice and participate in team meetings on March 26, but his status for Saturday's spring game is unclear.

"As I stated last week, A.C. has a number of things he has to work through before his status for the fall is addressed," Muschamp said in a statement released Wednesday afternoon.

As a freshman, Leonard appeared in nine games, hauling in eight catches for 99 yards.

Saunders needs improvement: After appearing in 12 games and starting nine as a freshman in Flor-

ida's secondary, De'Ante "Pop" Saunders wasn't atop the depth chart at safety opposite Matt Elam when spring practice began.

Instead, Muschamp said Monday, Saunders has been sharing time with Valdez Showers, Cody Riggs and Jabari Gorman, behind Elam and Josh Evans.

Florida's second-year coach added that Saunders, who recorded 26 tackles, two interceptions and a forced fumble last year, needs to work on his overall consistency

heading into next season. Muschamp pointed specifically to the sophomore's tackling ability as an area that needs improvement, adding that Saunders missed a couple of tackles in the secondary during the team's scrimmage Saturday.

"(He has) got to get stronger," Muschamp said. "(He has) got to get a better job finishing on some tackles. Again, you miss a tackle back there, it's a big one."

on the mound 10 days ago, but the Gators have bigger plans in mind than a late-March road trip.

Horton scored the Gators' eighth run when Hamilton mishandled a Katie Medina grounder with two outs.

In the sixth inning, Florida scored with two outs again thanks to a double off Horton's bat, putting Florida up 9-1.

In addition to a solid night with the bats, UF was boosted by the efforts of starting pitcher Hannah Rogers (18-2).

Rogers tossed six innings for her fifteenth complete game, walking two and yielding one unearned run on four hits.

"She hits her spots really well every single game," Fa-

gan said. "We go against her in scrimmages and she's tough to hit against then, so I have a lot of confidence in her. She did really good tonight."

The nine runs UF pushed across on the road are its highest total since a 9-1 win against South Carolina on March 16.

The nine-spot also marks Florida's highest tally away from home since an 11-0 win against Illinois State during the season's opening weekend.

"Coming off a tough last four games, I think our offense just felt a lot of confidence [Wednesday]," Horton said. "We just need to take that confidence and momentum into Ole Miss this weekend and keep on hitting."
