# Bar can't sell alcohol in parking lot

Cinco de Mayo party-goers will not be able to buy alcohol in the parking lot of 101 Cantina like they have in past years.

Management at 101 Cantina requested a permit earlier this month to "extend boundaries" in order to sell alcohol underneath a tent in a neighboring parking lot during its annual Cinco de Mayo celebration on May 5.

The city denied the permit request.

When the city attorney's office looked over the request, it found that the permit was against city law.

However, it had been granted to the business in the past for events, including for a St. Patrick's Day celebration about a month ago.

City spokesman Bob Woods said the reason the permit was approved in the past was because city staff misinterpreted a city rule that determined

whether businesses were allowed to sell alcohol outside the business with city permission.

The rule actually only allows this on weekends when there are UF home football games.

"There was a misunderstanding in the past with the ordinance," Woods said. "Now that we've clarified that, we've got to exercise due diligence in complying with the ordinance."

Management at 101 Cantina declined to comment.

Under the city ordinance, a permit can be given to a business that wants to sell alcohol outdoors during the "period of

# 'Parks and Rec' actor delivers standup, songs

About 500 people watched "Parks and Recreation" actor Nick Offerman deliver standup and songs, but hundreds more couldn't fit in the room.

Crowds were turned away from his Wednesday night performance. Offerman plays Ron Swanson on the NBC show.

The line snaked past the Rion Ballroom and through hallways on the Reitz Union's second floor. Attendees were turned away starting 30 minutes before the event.

Those who made it in witnessed Offerman bound around the room in an unbuttoned American flag shirt before the show.

He joked about the smoke in Gainesville, homosexuality and evangelical politics.

"With this homosexuality issue, I think we're losing sight of what really matters — there are vegetarians everywhere," he said.

The free event was hosted by Reitz Union Board Entertainment, Accent Speaker's Bureau and Inter-Residence Hall Association. Offerman was paid \$35,000 for the 90-minute performance.

Christie Harrod and Jessica Perkins waited in line for three hours, wearing paper bag mustaches.

Harrod, a 22-year-old wildlife ecology and conservation senior, said Swanson has been her favorite character since the first episode.

Mechanical engineering junior Scott Jagolinzer said he enjoyed Offerman's show.

"His whole philosophy on religion and politics was interesting," he said.

# UF reacts to Zimmerman's murder charge

## He turned himself in to police

George Zimmerman was charged Wednesday with second-degree murder 45 days after Sanford police said he shot and killed 17-year-old Trayvon Martin.

Zimmerman, 28, turned himself into authorities. Special prosecutor Angela Corey later announced Zimmerman is being held without bond.

Trayvon's death made national headlines after Sanford police didn't immediately charge Zimmerman. Some believed Trayvon was targeted for his race, while others said the media was blowing the case out of proportion.

The controversy began the night of Feb. 26, when police said Trayvon walked to his father's girlfriend's house from a store unarmed. Zimmerman called authorities and said he was following a suspicious person. The two fought, and Zimmerman shot Trayvon.

Zimmerman told police he acted in self defense.

UF law professor Michelle Jacobs said if he's convicted of second-degree murder, Zimmerman could face up to 30 years in jail.

"I'm a little surprised at the charges," she said.

Jacobs said she originally thought Zimmerman would be charged with manslaughter. Both charges acknowledge the defendant never intended to kill.

She said the two charges differ in the degree of recklessness committed.

For example, she said, if someone threw a heavy object off an overpass at 3 a.m. that killed a driver, the person who threw the object would likely be charged with manslaughter. However, if that same person threw a heavy object at oncoming traffic during rush hour, he could be charged with murder.

She said the difference is there's a greater chance someone will get hurt in the second scenario, which makes the incident more reckless.

Jacobs said Zimmerman will be in court

the day before the football game and the day of the football game."

Because there is no game on May 5, the permit should be denied, said Lee Libby, an assistant city attorney, in an

email to Commissioner Jeanna Mastrodicasa explaining the recommendation for the city to deny the bar's permit.

Libby could not be reached directly for comment.

Various city departments, including public safety and planning, must review a permit to sell alcohol outdoors

during special events before it is approved.

Somewhere along the way, Woods said, staff within those departments misunderstood the rules.

The bar will still be able to have an event, he said, it just cannot sell alcohol in the parking lot.

within 24 hours for his initial hearing, where the charges will be explained.

If the case makes it to a jury trial, Jacobs said the state prosecutor will have to prove Zimmerman didn't have the right to follow Trayvon and the actions that led to Trayvon's death were "very" reckless.

Some students said they are disappointed with the overall situation.

Michael Keller, 20, said the media's attention to the case has become borderline ridiculous.

"Black rights groups turned

this into a racist thing," the civil engineering sophomore said, "when it wasn't like that to begin with."

Others celebrated the fact that Zimmerman is in custody.

Vincent Adejumo, a UF Ph.D. candidate and member of the Black Graduate Student Organization, said he hopes the prosecutor was able to gather enough evidence for a conviction.

"It's unfortunate that it took this long," the 25-year-old said. "But I'm glad he's been charged so the justice system can run its course."

# Reporter places 196 out of 200 on list of top jobs

Journalists might not have good hiring prospects, but they could have worse jobs — four, to be exact.

Newspaper reporter was ranked 196 out of 200 on CareerCast.com's 2012 jobs ranking. Last year, it was No. 188.

The only worse jobs were oil rig worker, enlisted military soldier, dairy farmer and — No. 200 — lumberjack.

The rankings were based on work environment, stress, income, physical demands and hiring outlook.

UF journalism professor Norman Lewis said criticism against newspaper reporters isn't new. It can be applied to any field, he said, especially other "helping professions," such as teaching and social work.

Lewis, who worked in newspapers for more than 25 years, changed his

major to journalism from computer science during college, even though the latter would have paid more.

He said reporters help people govern themselves, sift through falsehoods and lead better lives.

But Lawrence Chan, 19, a journalism and English freshman, said he could understand the ranking and doesn't plan to go into newspapers. He hates the deadlines and hectic hours but thinks the degree is versatile.

Journalism freshman Marisa Ross, 19, said she's heard criticism in the past but thinks reporters don't get enough respect.

"Journalism is a necessary field," she said. "Reporters will always be needed."

The top five jobs, according to the website, were software engineer, actuary, human resources manager, dental hygienist and financial planner.

# Bystander catches purse snatcher

A chase involving 2-foot-long incense sticks, a purse and a running tackle ended Wednesday with one man in jail and another with a sore face.

Carl M. Babb, 50, was arrested after police said he snatched a woman's purse from the Lunchbox restaurant downtown at about 8:50 p.m.

Felipe Echeverri, 33, said he saw Babb take the purse and ran after him.

"He looked like a guy you see in prison movies," Echeverri said. "I would have never messed with him if I had actually thought about it."

A few seconds into the chase, Babb turned around and punched Echeverri between the eyes, leaving a visible mark.

Echeverri said he felt groggy but continued to chase Babb when Babb threw a handful of lit 2-foot-long sticks of incense backward at him. About 100 feet farther, Babb threw the woman's purse.

Echeverri tackled Babb and pinned him to the ground. He said he tried to reach for his cellphone when a crowd that had gathered began to yell, "He's reaching for his pocket!"

Sensing that the crowd thought he had bad intentions, Echeverri tried to explain that Babb stole a woman's purse, punched him in the face and needed to be held until police arrived.

While most of the crowd bought the story, Echeverri said about three others got in between him and Babb, allowing Babb to run away.

Police caught up with him at the corner of Northeast First Street and Northeast Fourth Avenue.

Babb was arrested for robbery by sudden snatching and battery.

Although his head hurt, Echeverri said he considered himself lucky.

"He could have just as easily done something much worse," he said.

### Drug Dilemma Scott vetoes bill offering treatment

A report by the Florida Department of Corrections showed that 26.1 percent of all prisoners admitted for the fiscal year 2010-2011 were incarcerated for non-violent drug offenses, the most common type of offense for the year. As of June 30, 2011, non-violent drug offenders made up 18.4 percent of the total inmate population, still the most of any crime.

In terms of those incarcerated for mere possession of drugs (in other words, those not convicted of trafficking, manufacturing, selling or purchasing drugs), this group made up 26.8 percent of all non-violent drug offenders for the same fiscal year.

Because drug laws are largely enforced at the federal level, the statistics for drug offenders under federal jurisdiction are even more grim. A report by the U.S. Justice Department found that 51.1 percent of federal inmates were incarcerated for drug offenses.

A bill that passed the Florida House of Representatives by 112-4 and the Florida Senate by 40-0 would have helped drug-addicted inmates receive treatment after serving half of their sentence. According to the Miami Herald, the program would have only helped non-violent drug offenders, as long as they met certain conditions such as good behavior.

Unfortunately for these inmates, guilty of nothing but being addicted to drugs, Gov. Rick Scott vetoed the bill on Friday.

The bill was sponsored by Sen. Ellyn Bogdanoff, a Fort Lauderdale Republican, who argued the bill "would save taxpayers' money by reducing the chance that inmates would re-offend by getting them the help they need," according to the Herald.

In his veto message, Scott wrote that "victims of crime" would not be able to receive justice if "a criminal is permitted to be released early from a sentence imposed by the courts."

But who are the victims when the inmates affected by this bill are non-violent offenders?

Did Scott even read the bill?

Is he so concerned about looking "soft on crime" that he would veto any bill that gave a sense of dignity to inmates in the Florida corrections system?

If anything, keeping those addicted to drugs locked up for a full sentence without allowing them to seek help will not prevent them from being repeat offenders.

Their imprisonment will likely foster their addiction, increase their resentfulness of the justice system, extend their time surrounded by truly violent criminals, and ruin their chances of ever becoming a productive member of society once they are released.

If anything, our corrections system should be about rehabilitation and retribution. While the prospects of rehabilitation for extremely violent criminals are quite dim, helping non-violent offenders can only yield positive results.




smooth singers.

# Sustainability efforts expanded at O'Connell Center

Would you want to see beer bottles, empty nacho containers, soda cups, plastic merchandise bags, forgotten posters, broken-off wristbands, fallen ticket stubs on your property?

Because these are just a few of the items left in heaps on the ground of the Bank Atlantic Center in Sunrise, Fla., after a sold-out performance by the Red Hot Chili Peppers on April 2.

This is a familiar scene at the end of any given night at major venues such as the Bank Atlantic and Stephen C. O'Connell centers.

Trash piles up throughout the hours, and at the end of the night trash is all that remains. But what is done with that trash

is what counts.

In the past year, the O'Connell Center has taken steps toward running a more eco-friendly venue through paper and plastic recycling incentives.

The O'Connell Center, which seats 12,000 people in the main arena, serves UF and the Gainesville community regularly.

Going green is a large task to which the O'Connell Center staff has responded to whether it is through sporting events such as the ever-popular Gator basketball games, concerts, such as Drake's recent performance there, or arguably the most important event hosted there: commencement ceremonies.



"We have a team right now that is called the Green Team," said Diana Caglianone, O'Connell Center senior event coordinator.

"They go to meetings and they congregate with other members of campus and determine what would be a good way to make green policies."

In an effort to encourage event attendees to improve their recycling efforts, 44 recycling bins have been put inside the 296,000-square-foot building, Caglianone said.

A main initiative started by the O'Connell Center Green Team, which consist of four or five students who are advised by staff, is to reduce paper waste.

## Ariana Grande to drop debut album

At 18, Ariana Grande already knows her future.

"I'm going to be an 80-year-old lady looking through a book of my Tweets," she said.

Grande, who's known as the burgundy-haired Cat Valentine on the TV show "Victorious," documents her life every day. Whether it's a video of her doing impeccable Shakira impressions or a picture of her behind the scenes, the update goes on Twitter. It's a natural part of her day.

"I don't ever want to forget anything."

Once filming for the Nickelodeon show wraps up in July, Grande will focus on releasing her long-awaited debut album with Universal Republic Records.

"I've put my everything into it," she said. "I don't keep a journal anymore; it's all my music."

Though finishing the record has been a slow process, Grande said she couldn't be prouder of the progress.

She describes the tracklist as her life over the past eight months with a melody. It's honest, romantic, relatable and young with some throwbacks.

Grande is incorporating Motown and '50s-'60s pop on the album, a complement to her soulful vocals.

"Put Your Hearts Up," her warm, uplifting first single, entered the pop charts at No. 25 last winter.

"Put Your Hearts Up' is about love and kindness, especially because my fans are at an age when acceptance is scary and rare, and kids are harsh toward one another," Grande said. "It's a sweet, simple message, but it means a lot to me."

She emulates that positivity in her role on "Victorious." Grande plays Cat, an adorable, always-smiling, sometimes-ditzy student at Hollywood Arts High School.

The show, which is now in its third season, recently took home a Nickelodeon Kids' Choice Award for Favorite TV Show.

"We died," Grande said. Her mouth remained wide open -- hand glued to her chest -- as the cast walked up to accept the award.

"I really, really couldn't be happier," Grande said. "It's not possible."

Her performing status began rising at 15, when she starred as Charlotte in the Broadway musical "13" (along with her "Victorious" costar Elizabeth Gillies). Grande won a National Youth Theatre Association Award the following year.

When she had to move from her hometown of Boca Raton to New York, Grande didn't fret. In fact, it was a comfortable transition.

Grande and her best friend of eight years were cast in the musical.

Now, Grande soaks in as much of home as possible when visiting South Florida. She'll always find time for the Town Center at Boca and eating at Stir Crazy every night.

"It's my favorite restaurant in the whole entire world," she said. "I don't understand why they don't have one in LA."

People can also find Grande running around the town center screaming with friends, eating chocolate-covered bananas and "making fools" of themselves.

Grande was never the shy type.

She created a YouTube page, Freaky Forever, at age 12. On it are music videos by her and friends in Boca Raton. Some videos include dancing around her room. The videos now have over a million views thanks to Grande's recent fame.

"That's why I love being Internet-obsessed: memories."

As her presence skyrockets this year, one thing remains constant in Grande's life: her passion for performing.

She plans on releasing two more singles and music videos before her album release.

As custom, Grande guarantees steady amounts of updates and footage from the studio.

"I was really happy on Broadway, I'm happy on TV and I'm happy making music," she said. "I just want to be creating and entertaining as long as I live."

## Florida Players presented life lessons during New Works

Like a good work of theater should do, last weekend's New Works Festival forced audiences to examine themselves through a critical lens and made them laugh the whole way through.

The fifth annual festival, presented by Florida Players at the Phillips Center for the Performing Arts, featured three short plays by UF students Andrew Bailes, Amelia Harris and Josh Sallerson.

In keeping with Florida Players' style, the works presented at the festival were more relatable to students than the mainstage productions of the School of Theatre were.

This is probably due in part to the fact that the works that were written, directed and produced by students, but another reason for the increased accessibility of these works is that the playwrights didn't seem to try to impress anyone.

The festival opened with Bailes' "Front Porch Play," the story of a friendship between a graduate student and a recovering drug addict, presented through a lens of racial inequality.

When a playwright tries to make a comment about an issue as heavy and nuanced as racism, he or she can unconsciously (or consciously) bash his audience over the head with it.

Bailes didn't whitewash or oversimplify his protagonists Abe, the privileged white graduate student played by Logan Wolfe, and Moses, a black man trying to stay off the streets, played by Joel Oramas.

Wolfe and Oramas' easy chemistry adds even more believability to the work.

Abe and Moses both possess elements of good and evil, evidenced throughout the hour long work.

During a conversation about religion between the two, Abe, defending his atheist beliefs, says everyone has a right to an opinion. To this, Moses replies that everyone has a right to be an ignorant motherf\*\*\*er, amid raucous laughter from the audience.

The play gets serious quickly, ending after Abe is stabbed by Moses' drug-abusing ex-girlfriend. The open ending on a note of violence is jarring, but it solidifies Bailes' message

that racial inequality still pervades what some consider a post-racial society.

"12.21.12," written by Amelia Harris and directed by Colin Hudson, is much lighter fare.

Harris' 45-minute work consists of a handful of interrelated storylines, played out in scenes as short as 30 seconds, depicting the last day of the Mayan calendar.

Although the work seemed at first to venture into the absurd, the intersectionality of the plot eventually reveals how connected all humans are, even as strangers.

A pot-smoking college student who kidnaps and accidentally drowns a girl she's assigned as a role model to, a pill-happy Christian missionary who commits suicide when he realizes he's gay and a young psychiatrist struggling with his father's mental and financial issues all intersect through their relationship with Lane, played by Rhiannon Tasker.

Lane is a reflection of us all, insecure with her appearance and desperate for attention from her friends and loved ones.

Confused by messages from her aforementioned missionary boyfriend, Lane gets plastic surgery, only to find out too late the psychiatrist friend she secretly loves will only be with her if she stays as she is.

New Works closed on an uproarious crescendo of wild with Josh Sallerson's "The Bender Method."

Without being heavy-handed, Sallerson managed to completely defy traditional gender classification with Princess Queely and her three descendents, all sporting massive female and male genitalia.

In about 30 minutes, Princess Queely, a genderless alien played by Logan Wolfe, takes a clean-cut youth named Sam, played by Fernando Masterson, on a sexual journey through the universe.

While Princess Queely helps Sam accept his feminine side, the plot of "The Bender Method" incorporates neon costuming, a few dozen yards of bubble wrap and an eclectic performance of "Total Eclipse of the Heart" to underscore its theme of breaking gender stereotypes.

Juxtaposed with all of that colorful brouhaha is Sam's chaste, straight-laced sister Mary, played by Gabriela Barrios.

And Sallerson's message about being the person you were born to be and embracing sexuality makes it all the way through the bubble wrap.







## Gators' newcomers contributing, helping established stars

It's a mantra that UF coach Kevin O'Sullivan has repeated all season.

"The bottom line is we go as they go."

Through weeks of good wins and a recent stretch of bad losses, O'Sullivan made it clear the Gators will only reach their potential if stars like Mike Zunino, Preston Tucker and Brian Johnson do the same. It was the reason why Johnson started on a Tuesday night in Tallahassee after opening a weekend series against LSU five days before.

"If we hadn't been in the situation we were in, having lost five of seven, maybe things would have been different, but I thought we needed a win," O'Sullivan said after the game.

Against No. 1 FSU, the guiding figures were there. Zunino had two hits, including a two-run homer in the fifth. Tucker had a hit, while Nolan Fontana and Johnson each notched solo homers. Johnson's start lasted just three innings, accounting for all three FSU runs.

But climbing out of a rut took more than the Gators rolling out their list of 2012 Major League Baseball Draft prospects.

Johnson's rough start could have spiraled into a Seminoles run-scoring derby had it not been for Ryan Harris, a previously sparingly used right-handed freshman who retired nine batters in a row and picked up the win.

Three of Harris' previous seven appearances had come against Florida Atlantic, Florida A&M and North Florida.

Zunino's home run wouldn't have meant as much had freshman second baseman Casey Turgeon not singled before him. One inning later, Turgeon singled in Fontana for the go-ahead run.

## UF forward Pitchford to transfer for family reasons

After just one season playing for the Gators, Walter Pitchford announced Wednesday that he is transferring from Florida's basketball team.

The 6-foot-10, 221-pound forward saw just 22 minutes of playing time off the bench during his freshman season at UF, scoring six points and grabbing four rebounds in 13 games.

Coach Billy Donovan cited Pitchford's wish to be closer to his family in Michigan as his main reason for leaving the program, according to a university release.

"It's definitely the best thing for him and his family, just with some of his extenuating circumstances. Right now, he just needs to be near his family," Donovan said. "They need him

home and they want him home."

Pitchford came to UF as a three-star center out of East Lansing (Mich.) Summit Christian Academy. His departure leaves Florida one scholarship below the NCAA limit, creating an opportunity for another recruit to commit to the Gators before the late signing period is over on May 16.

## Cullen, Dohony against rules changes despite head injuries

Emily Dohony and Kitty Cullen have good reason to be scared.

But they aren't.

Both players have suffered head injuries in the past three weeks, but neither has reservations about being back on the field without taking additional safety measures.

Cullen, a junior attacker, sustained a concussion in the Gators' 10-8 win at Ohio State on March 24. She hit the ground in the first half and was struck from behind in the head or neck area in the second half, but the team could not determine which play caused the concussion. She returned to the lineup against Johns Hopkins on Saturday after missing two games.

Cullen said additional action does not need to be taken to improve safety because doing so could make women's lacrosse as physical as men's lacrosse.

"I think it's a pretty safe game," Cullen said. "It always could be safer if we wore

helmets, but then people might get more aggressive."

Dohony, a junior defender, had to leave Saturday's game against Johns Hopkins after she was hit by an attacker's stick, opening up a cut on her forehead that bled profusely.

Women's lacrosse players currently have the option to wear a soft rugby-style helmet, but no Gator has opted for the extra protection.

Both Dohony and Cullen cited comfort, and Cullen also said she thinks it could restrict her peripheral vision.

Cullen became the second Gator to suffer a concussion in as many seasons, as junior midfielder Brittany Dashiell lost consciousness after falling chin-first onto

# Senior Slilam focusing on aggressive tennis in stretch run

Nassim Slilam has a new haircut. He gave up his long hair and took on a much more polished look. Now, he is working on polishing his game.

The lone senior on No. 10 Florida, Slilam has had a spring full of ups and downs. His 8-7 record in singles is indicative of a player who hasn't quite found his best stroke. But Slilam, who is entering the final phase of his Florida career, said he is finally beginning to

play his best tennis.

"I just needed some confidence and to find my game," he said. "On the baseline, I'm feeling really good right now. I have to hit some good shots and come to the net more often. Don't go for the big serve, just get it in and play heavy with my forehand. I have to not back up on the baseline with my backhand."

Earlier in the season, coach Andy Jackson made a remark one doesn't hear often about a player — Slilam was trying too hard. Jackson said that his senior was running around the court an excessive amount. While Slilam is one of the more physically fit members of the Gators, Jackson was encouraging him to create offense to reduce the amount he was running.

Although his record may not indicate much of a change, Slilam noted that he was running

less and getting in a more aggressive mindset. The key, he said, has been shifting his playing style from a defensive style where extending points is the goal to an offensive style where

he looks to end points quickly.

"I'm just trying right now to hit the ball," he said. "All the matches I've lost, I was defensive and the other guys were playing more aggressive than me. I lost a lot of matches like that. I was too far away from the baseline, I don't see the ball, I play short and I have to run more and get tired. I'm good physically, but I lost a

lot of three-set matches. "

By losing in three sets to Mississippi's Marcel Thiemann on Sunday, Slilam dropped to 1-3 in three-set matches. That is particularly troubling because of Slilam's fitness. His game is designed to wear down opponents. Instead, opponents are able to beat him with aggressive play.

Recently, though, Slilam has been showing signs of improvement. He has become much more confident in his ground strokes, and has been displaying very good cross-court shots in recent matches. What he hasn't done to date is put everything together. Jackson believes that Slilam is much better than his record, and once the senior begins to play aggressively and still wear down opponents, he could make his final few weeks as a Gator memorable.

# UF shut out, records two hits in loss to UCF

The Gators probably wish they could have used some of their 14 runs from Sunday in Wednesday's game.

Or, at the very least, borrow a couple hits.

Instead, No. 3 Florida (35-5) was left with a zero in the runs column for the second time this year and a mere two hits against unranked UCF (30-10) on Wednesday night.

"We just have to work on staying and looking for our pitches and I think that's the key," pitching coach Jennifer Rocha said.

"You have got to come out strong, especially in an in-state rivalry like UCF. They're always going to bring their 'A' game against us."

The Gators' offense reached a season low in Orlando against the Knights.

Not only was UF shut out for the first time since playing Tennessee on March 9, but it was the first time in more than a year Florida was

held without a run and held to two or fewer hits.

In that game against Nebraska on March 12, 2011, Michelle Moultrie and Megan Bush each had one hit. Moultrie collected the only two hits for her team this go-around.

"We didn't play awful," Moultrie said. "But we just didn't get the job done. You have to give their pitcher credit but we need to make better adjustments at the plate. There are

When Bailey Castro led the charge against Ole Miss this past weekend with three home runs and eight RBI, it seemed as if the Gators' lineup was truly starting to click and come together in time for the postseason.

Instead, Florida took a nose dive, striking out 11 times against UCF's Mackenzie Audus (16-5) while losing to its second game this year to an in-state rival, with the first com-

ing to USF on March 28.

Unfortunately for sophomore Hannah Rogers, who dropped her third game of the year, this has happened before.

In Rogers' first loss, a 1-0 defeat against Tennessee, she gave up an unearned run in the bottom of the seventh to end the game because her team failed to provide any sort of run support.

In Wednesday's game, she allowed a two-run double before even notching the first out of the first inning.

Rogers was then lights out for the remainder of the game, allowing only one more hit while striking out seven.

However, the first inning was all the Knights needed to earn their first win over the Gators in nearly four years.

"I just try to keep faith in my team, hoping they are going to get some runs across the plate for me," Rogers said.

"But [Wednesday] wasn't our night. I'm upset. But we have to come back ready to play."

the artificial turf at Penn State's Bigler Field in 2011.

Junior defender Sam Farrell was also held out of Florida's game against Detroit University earlier this season for precautionary reasons after being hit by a ball on the top of her head in warm-ups.

Despite the pattern of head injuries to her players, coach Amanda O'Leary is also content with the safety measures in women's lacrosse such as the new rule implemented prior to the season that puts a team down a man for two minutes for receiving a yellow card.

"The repercussions of yellow cards are so significant, playing a man down, that I think it has helped control a lot of the excess fouling," O'Leary said. "You can't

really prevent every injury from happening."

She has no plans to require her team to wear helmets, but the athletic department would cover the cost if those plans change.

"We tell our players that whatever protective gear that is allowed within the rules we will provide for them," O'Leary said. "The rules of the game are meant to keep our game safe and overall I think our game is very safe ... I don't feel like I would need to step in and require our team to wear helmets."

Dohony said she thought the play was incidental, and said it's not something she's worried will happen again.

"I feel safe," Dohony said.

"I've been playing for over 10 years and nothing has happened yet. So I'm just lucky this is the first time, and I'm ready to play again."
