# Trustees approve increasing fee for Reitz Union renovations

UF's Board of Trustees has approved a \$2 per credit hour increase to the Capital Improvement Trust Fund fee that will help fund renovations to the Reitz Union.

In March, the board approved the \$50 million expansion of the student union, to be financed through bonds, and a \$25 million renovation, \$20 million of which would be funded by the Capital Improvement Trust Fund.

Although the fund was initially expected to yield \$20 million, the Board of Governors recently let UF know the available amount in the fund was only \$4.9 million.

To make up the difference, trustees voted Monday to adjust the CITF fee by \$2, increasing the fee from \$4.76 to \$6.76 per credit hour. This is the first time the fee has been adjusted in 30 years.

Student Body President Tj Villamil said the 5,000 signatures of support for the proposed expansion from students, as well as the support of about 60 student organizations that use the Reitz Union, show the project is a high priority.

"This is something that students really did want, and it's got

# Medical condition likely caused UF sophomore's death

A UF student died Monday morning of unknown causes.

Stephen C. Speck's roommate tried to wake him in their dorm room at Rawlings Hall and performed CPR when he saw Speck, 19, in distress.

University Police and emergency medical services were no-

tified at 8:46 a.m. They arrived three minutes later.

EMS also performed CPR on Speck before they took him to Shands at UF. He died at 9:26 a.m.

"We are treating this incident, as any unattended death, as a death investigation," UPD spokesman Brad Barber said. "But at this point we do not have any indication that this was anything other than a medical-related incident."

His friends view his death as a tragedy. They showed their

love on his Facebook wall Monday.

An Oviedo resident, Speck was chosen to play clarinet in the 2006-2007 Seminole All-County Band.

He continued to play in high school.

Speck became an Eagle Scout on June 14, 2009 with Troop No. 613, according to a newsletter from the Central Florida Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

# Applications for Summer A pass-fail option due Wednesday

► THE DROP DEADLINE IS JUNE 15.

Wednesday, and the deadline for Summer C classes is June 1.

No grade point values are earned for courses graded under the S-U option, and they are not included in students' grade point average.

Students wishing to withdraw from their Summer A courses with a 25 percent refund

must do so by Wednesday, and the deadline for Summer C classes is June 1. Students who want to drop a Summer A course without receiving a failing grade on their transcript must do so before 5 p.m. on June 15.

After that, students who drop a course will fail the class.

Authorization from the dean or designee of a student's college is required to drop a course, but graduate students need authorization from their graduate department.

Fee payments for both Summer A and Summer C classes are due to Financial Services by 3:30 p.m. on May 25.

## Mafia-style end for Australia's flawed Obama mugs

CANBERRA, Australia (AP) — Australian officials wanted to get rid of some commemorative mugs that misspelled President Barack Obama's name. And boy, did they ever.

A Parliament House official told senators on Monday that 198 mugs were smashed and buried under wet concrete at a loading dock behind the building. Sen. John Faulkner called it a "mafia-style execution" for the mugs, which had an extra "r" printed in Obama's first name.

The government made 200 of the mugs to commemorate the president's planned visit to Australia in 2010, which was later canceled. No mugs were created when the American president finally made it to Australia last year.

Only two of the mugs were ever sold from the Parliament House gift shop, including one to the journalist who reported that Obama's name had been misspelled.

"Due to the sensitivity associated with the mistake that was made with the president's name, the last thing we wanted was for the fragments to be found on a garbage tip somewhere," said Bronwyn Graham, the Parliament House official.

"I am not saying it was a bad idea. It is creative; I will give you that," Faulkner told Graham and her superior, David Kenny, who had authorized the disposal.

"You have not buried any other mistakes in concrete, have you Mr. Kenny, per chance?" Faulkner asked. Kenny said he had not.

## Tons of pot found floating off Southern Calif.

DANA POINT, Calif. (AP) — Authorities say three and a half tons of marijuana have been found floating in the ocean off Southern California.

A boater spotted 160 bales of pot around noon Sunday about 15 miles off the coast of Dana Point. Orange County authorities and the Coast Guard sent boats to gather up the pot and turn it over to the U.S. Border Patrol.

They say it's unclear who dumped the pot, which together

weighs about 7,000 pounds and has an estimated street value of \$3 million.

Authorities say there was no boat in sight and they didn't get any distress calls from a vessel.

FRANKENMUTH TOWNSHIP, Mich. (AP) — A woman running for the Michigan Legislature was bitten by a dog while going door to door. The dog's distressed owner has made amends: Ann Doyle can put a campaign sign on his property.

Doyle says she didn't see the dog until it was too late Wednesday. She was campaigning in Saginaw County's Frankenmuth Township when the dog bit her three times. The Saginaw News says the owner heard the commotion and called off the animal.

Doyle says she was bleeding and blacked out but is doing much better. She won't identify the dog's owner but says he agreed to take a campaign sign. Doyle calls it a "sympathy vote."

## Texas boy suspended over NBA shave scores tickets

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A 12-year-old Texas boy who was suspended from school after shaving his head to resemble the face of Spurs forward Matt Bonner scored tickets to a playoff game and props from his favorite NBA player.

Patrick Gonzalez was suspended for a day from Woodlake Hills Middle School because the school district deemed his \$75 haircut a distraction. He returned to class Thursday after reluctantly shaving his head.

Gonzalez says Bonner is his favorite player, noting they're both redheads.

Bonner, whose mother is a teacher, says the school could

have just moved Gonzalez to the back of the room. Bonner encouraged Gonzalez to "keep supporting us redheads in the NBA."

Gonzalez's story prompted the Spurs to give him and his family tickets to Thursday's playoff game — against the Clippers.

## Man wears briefs on head during Idaho burglary

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — Police in southwest Idaho say a man chose briefs over boxers to wear on his head as he held up a coffee shop and stole a safe.

Coffee shop owner Jason Wilson tells the Idaho Statesman he believes the man was likely not prepared when he entered Big Star Coffee in Fruitland with an accomplice on Tuesday morning.

Wilson asked, "Who robs something with underwear on their head?"

Investigators say the two burglars made off with about \$500 in cash that was inside the safe. Their actions were captured on surveillance cameras inside and outside the shop.

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# Administrative budget proposal reasonable, officials say

UF administrators say budget cuts are inevitable, including the \$13.4 million that might come from their own budget.

The budget cuts proposed for the administration would reduce state funding put toward areas such as Student Health Care Cen-

ter services, the UF International Center, research and university libraries. Some of these cuts would result in reduced positions and services.

The cuts, which were proposed Friday, came after the Florida Legislature required UF to reduce its budget for the upcoming fiscal year by about \$38 million.

The fiscal year begins July 1, and UF President Bernie Machen will present a final budget proposal to members of UF's Board

of Trustees during its meeting scheduled for June 7 and June 8.

Members of Faculty Senate will discuss the overall budget Tuesday.

Scott Nygren, chairman of Faculty Senate, encourages any-

one with suggestions or questions about the proposed budgets to bring them forward in time for the meeting next week.

The Faculty Senate's discussion website allows users to comment on issues such as the budget.

Nygren said the administrative budget seemed appropriate, and it lined up with other cuts UF will have to make.

Current proposals protect tenure-track and tenured faculty from layoffs, but other faculty

and staff positions might be eliminated.

"That's not a good idea, but it's still something that may be necessary," Nygren said.

Provost Joe Glover said meeting the legislature's requirement is not an option, and all the proposed budgets are acceptable.

"People may come up with even better ideas," he said, "but the ones that have been proposed are reasonable."

## Student Senate will vote on campaign activity bill tonight

The Student Senate will vote on a bill today that could limit when students can campaign for Student Government.

Proposed revisions would add "campaign activity" as intentional action supporting or opposing a candidate or party.

Campaign activity would be allowed to start four weeks before the election and end when the polls close. However, the activity could not refer to a specific election.

This would be a change from the UF Supreme Court's spring ruling that campaign-like activity could occur any time.

The revisions would also redefine "campaigning" to encompass election-specific materials such as encouraging students to vote on a certain issue.

Campaigning would begin one week before the first day of elections and end when the polls close.

But the revisions say a website with general information about the party and party members would not be campaigning. The revisions also propose adding Internet posts as campaign material.

The Judiciary Committee approved the proposal to go before the Senate.

Committee member Sen. Cory Yeffert was in favor of the revisions.

"What I see from this piece of code revision is pretty much fair on all grounds," he said.

However, another member of the committee, Sen. Umair Asghar, said limiting campaign activity to a few weeks out of the year violates state law.

"I think there should be a lot more time put into this other than the one week," he said.

There is no difference in price for students' tickets.


Dunham is known for his four Comedy Central television specials and is working on a fifth.

## Trustees name Dave Kratzer new vice president for student affairs

A nationwide search for the new vice president of student affairs ended where it began.

Dave Kratzer, who has served as the interim vice president for student affairs since April 1, 2011, was officially named to the position Friday.

"I am deeply honored to be given this opportunity," Kratzer said. "I think it's important — and our staff will remember every day — that student affairs begins with students."

Kratzer took over the interim position after Patricia Telles-Irvin left UF last year to become the vice president for student affairs at Northwestern University.

In 1986, Kratzer joined UF as the director of the Reitz Union, according to his website. He

served as the associate vice president for student affairs from 2005 to 2011.

Kratzer has advocated for campus projects that improve student welfare, including the expansion and renovation of the Reitz Union and the implementation of the "U Matter, We Care" campaign, which seeks to help students and faculty members in distress.

to be done right," Villamil said.

He noted that raising the CITF fee is in keeping with the board's promise to not create new fees to fund renovations to the Reitz Union.

Graduate assistants and graduate students with associate appointments will not have to pay the fee.

Money from the CITF fee is collected from state universities and released by the Board of Governors every three to five years, depending on the needs of the universities.

Kratzer said he was surprised the

trust fund fell so short this cycle.

"All along when I proposed this, I didn't think we'd have to do this," he said.

UF needs the full \$20 million to be able to complete the renovations all at once. Although projects on campus are usually completed in multiple phases, he said, it would be more efficient to finish the project in one phase because the building is used year-round for a variety of purposes, unlike most classroom buildings.

Otherwise, he said, "You're actually paying for that twice."

.. THIS WEEK *in* GAINESVILLE ..

**May 21, 1969:** A man was severely gored by a 1,000-pound Brahma bull at the Gainesville Livestock Market after smashing down the wooden partition of a cattle truck. The victim, 46-year-old Matthew B. Sanchez, was rushed to Alachua General Hospital where he underwent surgery for wounds to his stomach and hip. "It was a wild bull," said L.H. Thompson of the Gainesville Livestock Market. "This was probably the first time he had ever been penned up - and he didn't like it one bit."

**May 24, 1983:** Henry Badcock, owner of Badcock's Furniture in downtown Gainesville, falsely reported a robbery and hostage situation at his store. After police cleared the store and found no one inside, Badcock was taken in for questioning and admitted to Alachua General Hospital for psychiatric evaluation.

**May 20, 1988:** The inventor of the Nautilus exercise system, Arthur A. Jones, announced a donation of \$8.47 million to UF, the largest donation ever made to a Florida public university. Jones said the money would go to UF's Center for Exercise Science and the Health Science Center over a 10-year period.

**May 25, 1989:** Florida Blue Key, a prestigious student honor society at UF, was placed on six months of probation for misconduct at a party held the previous month at the Florida Museum of Natural History. Student Services Dean Jim Scott gave the punishment after an investigation by the conduct committee found the group guilty of damaging campus property and sponsoring an event involving alcohol.

**May 22, 1990:** The NCAA sendt an inquiry letter asking UF to defend itself against 10 alleged violations, ranging from accusations of sports agents paying players to coaches acting unethically. UF officials expected the letter, according to UF President John Lombardi. Lombardi said the letter focuses on several perceived problems that UF has already been trying to resolve.

## Diagnostic manual re-classifies alcohol abuse

### New version has only one diagnosis

Nearly 40 percent of college students at four-year U.S. institutions could be deemed alcoholics next year, according to the label in the newest edition of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders.

The current edition of the manual labels alcohol issues as either alcohol abuse, classified as a short-term problem, or alcohol dependence, a chronic problem popularly recognized as alcoholism.

But the proposed changes in the newest edition of the manual, which will be published in May 2013 following final revisions, would only include one diagnosis: substance use disorder. Patients would be measured as mild, moderate or severe cases, depending on the number of harmful criteria they meet based on their history of actions involving alcohol, not the quantity or frequency of their drinking.

Assistant professor Daniel Logan of the UF Department of Psychiatry said diagnosing college students under the new system would be difficult because of the short amount of time most students have been drinking. The lack of opportuni-

ties students have to evaluate the consequences of their drinking makes it harder to justify diagnosing them as being alcohol-dependent.

"Once you're an alcoholic, you don't go to not being an alcoholic anymore," he said. "We don't want to give people labels or stigmatize them with something that's

transient."

Kevin Dotson, a 23-year-old Santa Fe College student who says his father is a functioning alcoholic, agreed.

For as long as Dotson can remember, his father drinks every night after work. Sometimes he only drinks one cocktail, Dotson said, but sometimes he mixes al-

cohol with sleeping pills.

"I wouldn't want any college kid to relate to what my dad does," he said. "They're just doing it for fun and being social."

Logan said the classifications could encourage denial and functional alcoholism.

"People think, 'I'm not that bad, I'm not as bad as they are. I can't have a problem,'" he said. "It will have a bad outcome for our patients."

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

## Shut Down SG election codes limit free speech

At the end of the spring semester, we wrote a series of editorials addressing UF Student Government election codes and their negative implications for student free speech.

First, we discussed the issue with code 762.0, which requires that candidates and parties attach "Registered Political Advertisement" to all campaign materials. Due to a vague definition of campaign material, this code could be enforced against almost anything someone says in favor of or against a particular candidate or party.

Next, we questioned code 761.1, which appeared to constrain "any intentional action in support of, or in opposition to, a candidate or political party for an elective student body office" to a four-week period.

Both of these codes provide ample opportunity for the party in power to limit student free speech, especially for those students who have aspirations to run for office.

At the end of last semester, the UF Supreme Court recommended that SG amend the rules to clarify the meaning of "campaigning" and determine when these activities could occur.

We were hopeful that the Student Senate would revise the rules to remove these vague and draconian limitations on free speech. Instead, this evening the Student Senate will be voting on whether to add even stricter rules to candidates, political parties and, perhaps, even the general student body.

First, the proposed code revisions now clearly stipulate that campaign activities can only occur on the first day of the active election cycle, or four weeks before election day. Election-specific material, such as things that say "vote for," cannot occur until one week prior to the first day of elections.

They also added "Internet posts" to its definition of campaign material, which now extends the ability of the Elections Commission to give violations to online communications that do not have "Reg. Pol. Ad."

Because the codes surrounding this requirement are so vague, an election-related post by a student who is not running for office that does not bear "Reg. Pol. Ad." could potentially lead to an election code violation for the candidate or party that was mentioned by the student.

These code revisions clearly violate student free speech and deserve serious scrutiny from the entire student body.

While this might not seem like a big deal to some, if you do support someone running for office in SG in the future, simply saying something in support of him or her at the wrong time or without adding "Reg. Pol. Ad." could cost the election.

The Senate should, without question, vote against these election code revisions. We strongly encourage you to contact your senator to tell him or her to vote against these revisions.

We also encourage you to attend this meeting. It will be held at 7 p.m. tonight in Reitz Union 282.

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

# Bloomberg's reaction to living wage bill shows disconnect

New York City used to be the city of hopes and dreams. Today, we see a different narrative emerging. Last week, New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg showed his true colors as being part of the 1 percent. Bloomberg, the 20th richest man in the world, is loudly denouncing the so-called living wage bill that has just passed New York Council.

The bill would require publicly subsidized companies to raise the minimum wage for workers to \$10 with benefits or \$11.50 without them. While many employees would gladly welcome this bill, the New York mayor seems to see his beloved town turning a bright shade of Communist red.

Bloomberg elaborated his "let them eat cake" stance on the living wage bill on a local radio show when he said, "The last time we really had a big managed economy was the USSR, and that didn't work out so well."

This hyperbolic quote is an example of how conservatives react when faced with most social services — they automatically see "red" and cry Stalin.

Fortunately, he's alone in his modern anti-communism crusade (unless you count the "brave" five out of 44 council members who voted against the bill). Bloomberg's stance shows how disconnected he is from the people of New York. He would

Bloomberg willingly hands out taxpayer money to this company, which offers a service only the wealthy can afford, while refusing to support a bill that would improve the lives of many New York workers.

In a city like New York, a \$10 per hour wage is coveted by the working class. If you were to drive past Yankee Stadium on game days, you would see a line of cashiers forming outside the perimeter.

Yankee Stadium hires more cashiers than necessary and has them wait for hours on a first come, first served system to get to work that day. The unlucky ones have just wasted unpaid time standing in the heat. The hope of receiving a higher wage in a city with such a high cost of living was reason enough to wait.

rather favor businesses than regular working-class people.

For instance, the company FreshDirect (a grocery delivery service based out of New York) has reported receiving \$129 million directly from taxpayers' pockets, yet the company is currently paying its workers less than \$9 an hour.

However, Bloomberg's reaction to this bill is symptomatic of larger societal issues. # Emancipation Day should be reminder to keep fighting slavery

On May 20, 1865, U.S. General Edward M. McCook gave the first reading of the Emancipation Proclamation in the state of Florida. During the Civil War, more than 1,000 African-American Floridians joined nearly a quarter of a million African-Americans across the nation to serve in the Union Army and Navy. Many more worked as scouts, spies and laborers in a struggle to end the long nightmare of slavery. Henceforth, African-American Floridians observed May 20 as a sacred day of remembrance of the Peculiar Institution's many victims, and in hope that the nation would nevermore place property rights above human rights.

African-Americans understood that slavery continued to exist in our hemisphere. In the decades after May 20, African-American churches and conventions organized to protest slavery in Latin America, particularly in Brazil and Cuba. One mass meeting, chaired by the great abolitionist the Rev. Henry Highland Garnet at Mother Bethel A.M.E. Church in Philadelphia, led to the formation of the American Foreign Anti-Slavery Society in 1840.

Garnet pledged his organization's support to the anti-colonial struggle being waged

in Cuba and stated, "If the veteran abolitionists of the United States had not mustered themselves out of service, I believe that there would not now have been a single slave in the island of Cuba. We sympathize with the patriots of Cuba, not simply because they are republicans, but because their triumph will be the destruction of slavery in that land. All of Europe now frowns upon Spain because of her attitude toward human bondage. We must take our place on the broad platform of human rights, and plead for the brotherhood of the entire human race."

Tragically, the Rev. Garnet's call for the recognition of universal human rights fell upon deaf ears in his own country. As one-party rule swept the South, forced labor re-emerged. Convicts, primarily African-American men, were traded as commodities to farmers and corporations to work in the coal mines of Birmingham, Ala., the cotton fields of Georgia and the turpentine camps of Florida. Municipalities viewed the conviction of African-Americans as a source of revenue. J.C. Powell, a white prison captain, dubbed Florida "The American gulag" and PBS's recent documentary "Slavery by Another Name" reveals that millions of African-American men were held in chattel

bondage long after the end of the Civil War.

Courageous voices spoke against

the insidious new slavery. Foremost among these was Florida's Stetson Kennedy. In 1952, Kennedy risked life and limb to gather testimony about slavery in the South, presenting this evidence before the United Nations Commission on Forced Labor in Geneva.

Modern-day slavery continues to exist in Florida. Barry Estabrook notes in his recently published book "Tomatoland" that, "In the last fifteen years, Florida law enforcement officials have freed more than one thousand men and women who have been held and forced to work against their will in the fields of Florida, and that represents only the tip of the iceberg. Most instances of slavery go unreported."

There is a solution to these egregious violations of human rights in our state. A Florida-based organization, the Coalition of Immokalee Workers, recently earned the Anti-Slavery Award from Anti-Slavery International in London for its efforts to expose and to end slavery in Florida agriculture. Major corporations, including Taco Bell, Mc-

Donald's and Trader Joe's, have joined the CIW's Campaign for Fair Food, which has led to the first enforceable code of conduct joining consumers, growers and purchasers of Florida produce together to ensure that agricultural workers are treated fairly and paid regularly for their labor.

Unfortunately, a major purchaser of Florida tomatoes, Publix Super Markets, continues to ignore the pleas of religious leaders and Florida consumers to join the growing list of firms that have pledged to abolish exploitation and slavery in our fields. By claiming that it bears no responsibility for the conditions of the men and women who pick the crops that help generate enormous profits, Publix ignores the wishes of its customers who have been petitioning the company for more than two years.

On this newest Emancipation Day, we should pledge to take up Garnet's call to fight for universal human rights and for the brotherhood of the entire human race regardless of occupation, racial background or nationality. It is up to us to honor the spirit of May 20 in Florida.





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## UF advances to Final Four in program's third season

The Gators only needed three goals to reach the Final Four. They scored 15.

No. 1 seed Florida (19-2) made history by coming out of the NCAA women's quarterfinals with a 15-2 blowout win against Penn State (12-7) to earn their first-ever Final Four appearance.

In just a matter of three seasons, the Gators have accomplished a lot by taking past mistakes and learning from them.

"This was a monumental win for us," coach Amanda O'Leary said. "We have been preparing for this since we lost to Duke in the same round last year. These young ladies have put in so much hard work. They have the heart, they have the passion and I thought it really showed today."

In addition to earning its first Final Four appearance in the NCAA Tournament, the Gators became the youngest team to earn two tournament wins and advance to the national semifinals as well as becoming the second program in the 30-year history of women's lacrosse to advance to the Final Four in only its third season.

"I think the little things are the most important things in the game," junior midfielder Brittany Dashiell said. "Like ground balls, draw controls, I think those are key in every game because whoever has possession is the team that's going to score the goals."


These key factors certainly gave the Gators the advantage Saturday.

## Gators to play in third straight national title match

For the third straight year, the Gators are one win away from a national title.

No. 2 Florida (26-1) advanced to the NCAA Tournament final after defeating No. 3 Duke (29-3) in the closest match the Gators have played this post-season.

The match remained close to the final point, with Alexandra Cercone putting UF on top with a 4-3 victory.

"I don't know how we won that match," said coach Roland Thornqvist.

The match began with a close contest for the doubles point. The Gators and the Blue Devils split the first two

matches, but Florida's No. 1 duo of Lauren Embree and Joanna Mather won the point with a 9-8 victory.

The match moved to singles, and Duke quickly regained momentum, despite losing the doubles point.

The Blue Devils won the first set on five of the six courts, with Embree providing the only first-set victory for the Gators.

Although softball should have been the only thing on the Gators' minds this past weekend, it wasn't.

Instead, Florida also dealt with the dismissal of three student-athletes, which was announced just before the start of Friday's matchup with Florida Gulf Coast.

Sami Fagan, Kasey Fagan and Cheyenne Coyle did not suit up to face the Eagles in the Gators' first NCAA Regional game of the weekend, and FGCU took advantage of UF's shorthanded roster for its first ever NCAA Tournament victory.

Although coach Tim Walton said there was no doubt the decision to move on without the players was a distraction to the squad, he said the team's struggles were not caused

by the dismissals.

"I don't think it's about three people," he said. "I think it's about where we were at as a team and how we did offensively and what we can do to get that clutch hit. That's been the M.O. of our team all year long, finding a way to get the clutch hit. To be honest with you, that stuff right there was happening all season."

FGCU's David Deiros believed otherwise.

"I think they missed having Sami Fagan in the lineup to disrupt some things," Deiros said. "I think offensively it may have made a difference."

Sami Fagan, the team's only slap hitter, led the team in batting average (.378) and

# Jensen leads UF women's golf to second straight NCAA final

## She carded a 217 (+1) at the NCAA East Regional

For the second consecutive year, the women's golf team will make an appearance at the NCAA Championships today. For Evan Jensen, this will also be her last.

The senior, who has shot an average of 74.43 for the 2011-12 season, will lead the team as they search for their third NCAA title in program history.

Their first two wins came in back-to-back years in 1985 and 1986.

"It's definitely something I've thought about being my last college tournament," Jensen said. "It's difficult to leave here, I don't

really want to. I've loved every moment here, so going into this last tournament is going to be great."

Despite the bittersweet atmosphere, Jensen is coming off one of her best performances this year, which led the Gators to place tied for fourth at the NCAA East Regional. Jensen shot a three day total of 217 (+1) carding nine birdies against eight bogeys to secure a tie for seventh.

"I played really well, and I did leave a few shots out there, but that's always a good feeling knowing that I was so close to winning a tournament in a really good field," Jensen said.

"It's a good feeling knowing

that I have the ability (to win), and I've already competed with these players."

The field for the NCAA Championships will consist of 18 teams ranked in the top 25, including Florida at No. 12. But coach Jan Dowling still believes her team will come out on top.

"Our ultimate goal would be to win, we would love to do that and I think we're capable of it," Dowling said. "I know the team is hungry to get back in the mix. That's all you can ask for

when you're playing in a college golf tournament or any golf tournament is to get yourself into the mix and get yourself in contention."

The Gators have stayed in the mix for a majority of the season with six top-five finishes, including the last four tournaments. Dowling credits Florida's depth as its key to having a solid performance, saying that the No. 5 player could shoot low just as easily as its No. 1.

Proof of that came in the final round of the NCAA Regional when freshman Camilla Hedberg's score was not counted towards the team total. Hedberg leads the Gators in average with

a 73.46 and is on pace to set the school record for lowest average among freshmen.

Jensen has proven to be a valuable player for the Gators throughout her time at Florida. In addition to possibly finishing in the top 15 for lowest scoring average, she has placed in the top 10 in two of the last three tournaments, and hopes to do the same one final time at her last collegiate meet in Franklin, Tenn.

"Evan is just our solid rock," Dowling said. "She's face a lot of adversity throughout her four years here at Florida.

"What she's done at Florida just proves what a competitor is and how reliable she is as a person and a teammate."

hits (71) entering the weekend. After usually batting in the leadoff spot, Sami Fagan had to be replaced by Michelle Moultrie at the top of the lineup but Moultrie struggled, going 0-for-3 with a strikeout.

"(Friday) was a hard day for all of us," Lauren Haeger said after Saturday's two victories.

Florida's challenges would only get more difficult against South Florida in Sunday's NCAA Regional Championship game.

The Gators were shut out for just the fifth time all year and desperately could have used a deeper bench in the drawn-out pitching duel with the Bulls.

With the game ending in a 1-0 loss, Florida needed some kind of offensive output, which it could have gotten from the team's third leading home run hitter (10) and RBI provider (34) in Coyle.

But even with the Gators' earliest exit since 2006, Walton stuck by his decision and even had support from USF's Ken Erikson who endured a similar situation in 2008 when he had to suspend 13 players for breaking curfew right before the start of the regular season.

"It's very tough. People are involved," Eriksen said. "We try to do the right thing. We're teachers at heart, coaches secondarily. You have to make the decisions long term that are going to benefit your team and also your university. You do what's right."

And although doing

"I just try to do the best job I can possibly do and gather everything I can do as a leader. The game — what you do and how you compete — is a life's lesson for everybody."

though, it is something that Gilroy has taken upon herself to consistently dominate.

She led the team with six draw controls and propelled Florida to a 15-4 team advantage on draws.

"When the ball is up in the air, we're pretty confident (Shannon)'s going to come up with it," O'Leary said.

"When it's on the wings we have Kayla (Stolins) and Brittany (Dashiell).

6-4, 6-1, giving Florida a 2-0 lead.

Mather scored the next point for the Gators, coming back from a first-set loss to win the next two sets 6-2, 6-0.

Though Florida held a 3-0 lead, the match was far from decided, as Duke led on the other courts, and the Gators still needed to win one of them to clinch the match.

Both Sofie Oyen and Cercone each forced a third set after dropping the first, but their third sets would play out quite differently.

Oyen won the first game of her third set, but quickly fell behind and would not be able to recover, losing 2-6. Cercone came back from a 2-0 deficit in her match, and would not relinquish her lead, winning 6-3 and clinching a championship berth for UF.

"Today [Cercone] got outplayed and found a way to win the second," Thornqvist said. "She was just a surgeon at the end. She put the ball where she wanted it to be at the end."

Florida will put its 21-match winning streak on the line against UCLA with the national championship at stake today at 1 against UCLA.

The Bruins come into the championship match ranked No. 1 in the country, and they lived up to their billing.

They racked up decisive victories throughout the early rounds of the tournament, only surrendering one point before their semifinal match. In the Final Four, UCLA defeated

## Magic fire coach Van Gundy, GM Smith

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP)—For months the Orlando Magic have been trudging through the aftermath of a preseason trade request by Dwight Howard that sapped the life out of the franchise as internal team issues quickly affected the product on the floor.

Now after easily one of the most tumultuous seasons in their history, they made the first in what promises to be a huge offseason shake-up.

The Magic fired coach Stan Van Gundy on Monday and agreed to part ways with general manager Otis Smith, severing ties with two of the architects of one of the most successful runs in franchise history.

Smith and Van Gundy's relationship with Howard was the centerpiece of drama the team faced all season and following their second straight first-round playoff exit, CEO Alex Martins said the shift was warranted.

"It's time for a new leadership and a new approach," Martins said at a news conference to discuss the moves. "We simply came to the decision that we were not on the right track."

Martins wouldn't go into many specifics about what he is looking for in replacements, saying only that he and ownership want to fill the general manager post by June's NBA draft.

He said he would sit down with

ownership on Tuesday to begin ironing out the details of both searches.

Phone and text messages left with Van Gundy and Smith by The Associated Press were not immediately returned.

Orlando went 37-29 in the regular season but was eliminated in five games by Indiana after a rash of late-season injuries that included back surgery for Howard. Orlando went 5-12 without him.

Martins said those consecutive first-round playoff exits were "simply not good enough."

In early April, Van Gundy claimed top-ranking team officials had told him that Howard had asked management to fire Van Gundy as a condition of the center signing a long-term contract beyond 2013.

Howard denied it.

Martins addressed that dispute directly, saying "At no time during that time did Dwight ask me to have Stan fired."

With a relationship with Smith dating back to the Magic's inaugural season when Smith was a player and a five-year relationship with Van Gundy, Martins also called Monday "the most difficult day of my career."

Both Smith and Van Gundy are under contract through next season and both of their contracts will be honored. The current assistant coaching staff has also been offered the opportunity to stay on for now.

Van Gundy coached the Magic for five seasons. He finished with a 259-135 record, going 31-28 in the playoffs.

Smith departed after six years. He was the architect of Magic teams that made it to the playoffs in each of those seasons, winning the Eastern Conference championship in 2009.


But he also made several questionable moves, including trades for Vince Carter and Gilbert Arenas that failed to work out long-term.

The day after the Magic's season ended with the loss to the Pacers, Smith said that he would need a few days to even decide whether he wanted to return to that position following the tough year, setting it as a "50-50" chance.

Van Gundy said at the time he wanted to return and was hoping that the ultimate decision would be about performance solely.

"When you're talking a professional relationship, what matters — at least to me — is the results," Van Gundy said.

"I don't care if it's a business relationship where two people at work are driving a business to make money, or if it's a sports relationship, where the object is to win games."

# Florida fails to claim share of SEC regular season title

Steven "Paco" Rodriguez and Austin Maddox have been nearly unhittable out of the Gators' bullpen this season. The duo has combined for a 1.82 ERA, a .193 batting average against and 15 saves in 103.1 innings pitched.

However, with a share of the Southeastern Conference regular season title on the line, Rodriguez and Maddox did not get the job done. The junior relievers surrendered a two-run lead in the seventh inning of Auburn's 5-4 win against Florida on Saturday.

"The guys who've done it all year long, it was just one of those days where they didn't have their best day," coach Kevin O'Sullivan said. "We were in a position to win a championship because of those guys."

Rodriguez bookended his outing with two strikeouts, but what happened in between proved costly. Tigers third baseman Zach Alvard led off the seventh with a single on

a full count. Shortstop Mitchell Self followed with a base hit and second baseman Tanner Cimo knocked an 0-2 pitch to left to load the bases.

Then right fielder Creede Simpson hit into a fielder's choice, allowing Alvard to score and cutting the Florida lead to one.

Rodriguez fanned the next batter, center fielder Ryan Tella, before O'Sullivan pulled him for Maddox. Designated hitter Justin Bryant worked the count full against Maddox before punching out a two-run single to give the Tigers a 5-4 lead.

"We had our best guys on the mound in our latter half of the game and it worked out the way we wanted it to," O'Sullivan said. "Obviously, it's disappointing, but the game's over and there's not much we can do about it now except learn from it and hopefully make some better two-strike pitches down the road."

Despite the loss Saturday, Florida still won the series due to its improved hitting. The Gators scored 20 runs on 34 hits against the Tigers. Preston Tucker led the offensive resurgence, finishing the weekend 8

for 14 with two home runs and five RBI. Tucker made the final out Saturday when he was thrown out at home.

"We swung the bat really good ... that was probably the most important thing coming into the weekend," O'Sullivan said.

The defeat dropped Florida to a No. 3 seed in the SEC Tournament, which begins today with a match-up against Auburn at 5:30 p.m. in Hoover, Ala. Under new rules set to accommodate Texas A&M and Missouri next season, UF missed out on a first-round bye for the SEC's top two squads.

With Jonathon Crawford on the mound, the Gators' bats will look to stay hot against the Tigers' pitching.

"In the big picture, our bats are going now," O'Sullivan said. "We're seeing the ball a lot better, so hopefully, moving forward, this will catapult us into being a really good offensive team come the postseason."
