

UF trustees pass budget with lower tuition hike

► TUITION WILL INCREASE 9 PERCENT NEXT YEAR.

After a year of campaigning to raise UF tuition to the market rate, President Bernie Machen decided to lower the tuition increase request for the upcoming year from 15 percent to 9 percent.

The state set a 15 percent increase cap, which UF has requested and received for

the past several years.

During this year's legislative session, Machen and FSU President Eric Barron lobbied Gov. Rick Scott to approve a bill that would have allowed both universities to raise tuition to the market rate.

Scott vetoed the bill in April.

Machen said in his address to UF's Board of Trustees on Friday that he understands these are difficult times.

He said he is ready to pause on the notion of using tuition increases to help balance the \$38.2 million in budget cuts dealt

UF selects new journalism and communications dean

Diane McFarlin spent most of her adult life on the road between Sarasota and Gainesville, but for now she's here to stay.

McFarlin, publisher of the Sarasota Herald-Tribune and a 1976 alumna of UF's College of Journalism and Communications, was selected as the new dean of the college.

"I just could not be prouder to be named dean of a school that is already so distinguished," she said.

As of Jan. 1, McFarlin will succeed John Wright, who served as interim dean since July 2006 and was named permanent dean in December 2007.

As dean, McFarlin said she hopes to help manage partnerships with stakeholders in the college and explore multimedia opportunities, including the 21st Century Newsroom in Weimer Hall.

"We extend a hearty welcome to Diane," advertising chairman John Sutherland wrote in an email. "She has the experience, expertise and leadership ability to help us continue our pursuit of excellence."

Unlike other candidates for the dean's position, McFarlin doesn't hold a master's degree or a Ph.D.

With a little help, UF will light up Gainesville's skies once again this Independence Day.

Suspect in Auburn fatal shooting has court record

AUBURN, Ala. — The man suspected in a weekend party shooting that killed three people and wounded three others was previously arrested on charges involving guns and twice sued for child support, according to court records.

Authorities were searching Monday for Desmonte Leonard, 22, of Montgomery, accused of opening fire Saturday night at an apartment complex near Auburn University after getting into a fight with some of the victims over a woman.

He faces three counts of capital murder.

Two of those slain were former players for the school's powerhouse football program.

Court records show Montgomery police arrested Leonard in 2008 on a charge of carrying a pistol without a license, after stopping a suspected stolen ve-

hicle and finding him inside.

Leonard was charged in 2009 with assault after allegedly shooting a man in the groin, but prosecutors dropped the case after the victim told authorities Leonard wasn't the shooter.

A Montgomery woman filed a paternity suit against Leonard on Friday that identified him as the father of a girl who turned 1 last month.

Another woman sued him in 2009 seeking unpaid child support for a girl who is now 4. A court ordered monthly payments of \$305 by Leonard, who records show was working at a Walmart store at the time.

Auburn police said the weekend shootings didn't appear to have anything to do with some of the victims being former or current players on the football team, which won the national championship in 2010.

Of the three wounded victims, John Robertson remained in critical condition after being shot in the head. Xavier Moss was released from the hospital. The third wounded victim was Eric Mack, a current football player who is expected to recover.

Slain were Edward Christian, who had to quit the team because of a lingering back injury, and Ladarious Phillips, who had previously quit playing football. The other person killed was 20-year-old Demario Pitts.

SFC offering community geocache class

A new community class featuring the rapidly growing hobby of "adult treasure hunting" will begin this summer at Santa Fe College.

This outdoor treasure hunting game, known as geocaching, has become a worldwide trend.

The hobby involves using a GPS device to find hidden containers called geocaches, which contain logbooks, at specific locations.

Class instructor Chris Wagoner said there are millions of geocaches hidden throughout the world, including 1,500 in Gainesville, some of which are at UF and at SFC.

"I was astounded by the sheer number of them," Wagoner said.

Wagoner, who has geocached all over the country and discovered more than 300 caches, said the containers range

in hiding style and vary in their level of camouflage.

"They could be the size of a pill to a full-size ammo can," he said.

Wagoner said geocaching is easy to do with a GPS, cell-phone or Google Earth. People can register at geocaching.com or opencaching.com.

The class at SFC, Geocaching for Fun and Fitness, will begin July 14 and is open to people of all ages.

The class costs \$24 per person and spots will be filled on a first-come, first-served basis.

University Police Department Capt. Jeff Holcomb began to geocache while camping with his family in 2009.

Holcomb said the more you geocache, the more aware you are to look for certain things.

Wagoner said some geocaches are even hidden in trees, disguised as bird nests.

"The secret is in camouflaging," Wagoner said. "It's fun trying to figure out where the hiding spot is."

Gators take first place in Hearst Awards

Jon Silman failed the first assignment he turned in to his future mentor.

Kelley Benham thought the Fall 2010 magazine and feature writing article was "A" material, but then she found a misspelled name.

One fact error means an "F" for UF journalism students.

Silman, a Santa Fe College transfer who previously battled addiction, redid the article and won Benham over.

Almost two years later, the Tampa Bay Times enterprise editor found herself awake at 2 a.m. Friday to hear that

Silman, 29, won the National Writing Championship of the Hearst Journalism Awards Program in San Francisco.

He wasn't the only Gator who did. Telecommunication senior Steven Gallo, 20, placed first in radio broadcast news. Eight students in each of the five categories competed for the college Pulitzer and the \$5,000 prizes.

Silman said his reward is getting to report as his job. He interned for a year and worked at the Alligator. Now he is a cops reporter at the Gainesville Sun.

"I love it so much, I don't mind waking up at 7:30," he said.

A profile about a widow who learned her late husband was gay land-

ed him a finalist position in April.

Gallo got his spot with a feature about an opera-singing chef in Italy and a news story about the execution of convicted murderer Manuel Valle.

Gallo, who has worked with WUFT's radio and television stations, was able to interview the son of the police officer Valle was convicted of killing. That story also won him national awards with the Society of Professional Journalists and the Radio Television Digital News Association.

Shortly before Gallo arrived in San Francisco Monday, he learned he'd be reporting on technology and privacy. He narrowed the topic to focus on how San Francisco police used cameras to scan nearby license plates.

He had less than two days to report and about one to compile and edit.

"It's kind of like being pushed out of a plane with a parachute in a city — and for me an entire state and a coastline — that I've never been to before and being told to do a story in a day," he said.

But knowing that he could do it was empowering, he said. It gives him hope for his internship with an NBC affiliate television station and his future career.

Donna Green-Townsend, features unit executive producer at WUFT-FM, said Gallo has the ability to get people to talk and a tireless work ethic.

She's seen Gallo work in every WUFT position he could.

This experience is what Green-Townsend thinks makes the difference for students.

"This is not just a little news lab," she said. "This is the real deal."

.. THIS WEEK in GAINESVILLE ..

June 11, 1997 — After reviewing state law for two days, UF announces it is revoking a student spouse ID card issued to a gay spouse. Christine Conover, the UF student who requested the card presented all the materials required for a spouse card — a student ID, copies of their social security cards and a marriage certificate — and they were approved by the desk clerks. UF President John Lombardi said UF had no choice in the matter and cited state legislation.

June 10, 1982 — A high school senior at P.K. Yonge Laboratory School is challenging the ban on his underground student newspaper as a violation of his constitutional rights. The student, Paul Donnelly, has been suspended twice for distributing the paper, This School Is Ours, and missed the last two days of his senior year. Donnelly has contacted the American Civil Liberties Union about the ban, and they are looking into the constitutionality of the matter.

June 16, 1987 — University officials and student leaders announce the concealed weapons law they have been fighting will soon go into effect on the UF campus. The law allows licensed State University System students, faculty and staff to carry concealed stun guns on campus. Administrators have found there is nothing they can do to regulate the electric guns, and they will have to change the university's policy to comply with the new law.

June 12, 1984 — Attorneys for UF fraternity Pi Lambda Phi and UF reach an agreement in the alleged gang rape of a 17-year-old freshman by several Pi Lam members. The signed settlement imposes restrictions on the fraternity for two years, ends its little sister rush program and requires fraternity officials to hire a permanent live-in house parent.

June 13, 2002 — The UF Police Department initiates the first K-9 unit in the Florida university system along with a high-tech Ford Expedition that will serve as a mobile command center. The new K-9 team consists of Officer Scott Summers and a 3-year-old German shepherd, Kim, who is trained exclusively for explosive device detection and not as an attack dog.

UF Institute on Aging gets \$5.2 million grant

The UF Institute on Aging received a \$5.2 million grant from the National Institutes of Health's National Institute on Aging to continue research on physical disability in older adults.

Dr. Marco Pahor, director of the UF Institute on Aging, said UF is among 14 other U.S. institutions receiving the award.

The grant, which will be disbursed over five years, took effect April 1, Pahor said.

The money will be used for research resources, recruiting junior scholars and researchers and conducting studies on older adults, he said.

The grant is a renewal of another five-year award that established the UF Pepper Older Americans Independence Center in 2007.

Pahor said the grant's renewal is

a positive testament to the work the center has completed since then.

According to the center's website, 18.1 percent of Floridians are at least 60 years old, which is the largest proportion in any U.S. state.

UF's Institute on Aging focuses on how to maintain these older adults' independence and avoid disability, Pahor said.

One of the center's current projects is researching the effects of physical activity on disability in older adults.

He said 16,000 participants around the country were recently selected and he expects results to be released in 2013.

The center is also working on studies involving the effects of antioxidants in red wine on older adults and testosterone in older men.

FAMU president under fire from board after controversies

Florida A&M University's Board of Trustees members questioned the leadership abilities of the university's president Thursday.

Eight of the 12 trustees voted that they had no confidence in President James H. Ammons during a routine board meeting.

FAMU has been under scrutiny for hazing following the death of drum major Robert Champion in November.

Since then, 11 members of the band have been charged with felonies for allegedly beating Champion to death.

However, Ammons is determined to continue as president and repair the university's image.

"I hear the message that the board has sent to me through its vote and I take it very seriously," he wrote in an emailed statement.

"I pledge to the board, faculty, students, staff and alumni that I will fix the problems at FAMU."

Other problems facing the university have been an investigation of fraud in the band's finances, issues with accreditation and graduation rates, and findings that showed more than 100 members of the band were not students enrolled in the university, according to the Tampa Bay Times.

James H. Ammons

Ammons is the tenth president of the university.

When he was appointed in 2007, FAMU was facing fiscal problems and was on probation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

During Ammon's first year as president, the university had its first clean audit in three years and was removed from probation, according to the university's website.

When she was nominated, her first question was whether UF would consider someone without advanced degrees.

"My whole career has been in the profession," she said.

However, she said, half of the top 10 journalism schools in the U.S. have deans whose backgrounds are in their profession, not academia.

She said this trend is indicative of current challenges in the field — the face of journalism is changing, and colleges want leaders who have experience dealing with those particular problems.

McFarlin also thinks UF was looking for a dean with leadership experience.

As former executive editor of the Gainesville Sun, president of the American Society of Newspaper Editors and managing editor and publisher of the Sarasota Herald-Tribune, she said, "I know what comes with a position like that, both the respect and the great reward."

Mike Foley, a professor in the journalism department, thinks it was a bold decision.

"She's not your traditional academic," he said. "She's the consummate professional."

After graduating from UF in 1976, McFarlin started her career as a reporter for the Sarasota Herald-Tribune, where she was named managing editor by the time she was 31.

She left to become executive editor of the Gainesville Sun in 1987 but returned to the Herald-Tribune three years later as executive editor. McFarlin has been the publisher of the Herald-Tribune since 1999.

Foley, who has known McFarlin for more than 25 years, said the selection comes at the right time for her and the college, which is ready to help pass her experience to students.

"We continue to try to make sure that we are preparing students for the brave new world of journalism, and she's on the front lines," Foley said.

Under McFarlin's direction, the Sarasota Herald-Tribune launched a 24-hour cable news channel in 1995, one of the first of its kind.

Although McFarlin's primary background is in print media, telecommunications chairman David Ostroff said he's glad she has some experience with television.

"It's going to be a learning curve for all of us," he said.

Ostroff said all of the candidates were told the college is in dire need of more faculty. He's looking forward to expanding in that respect, as well as working with the dean to enhance the graduate multimedia program and the TV production facilities.

"We're delighted to have somebody that already has a

great feeling for the college," he said.

McFarlin will stay with the Herald-Tribune for another three weeks. Then she plans to travel, making visits to other journalism programs and attending conferences to prepare herself for her new job with the Gator Nation.

She's looking forward to getting to know the faculty and students and welcomes the challenge of leading one of the top journalism schools in the country.

"I am happiest when I'm on the learning curve," she said.

to UF by the legislature this year.

With the change, Machen said he will have to find another \$5 million from additional resources, which he did not name.

The trustees approved the university's proposed budget and tuition increase during their meeting.

Student Body President Tj Villamil said he was pleased that Machen listened to the student voice. At a meeting Thursday, he voted against a 15 percent increase, citing concerns for students who didn't qualify for enough need-based financial aid and couldn't afford a 15 percent tuition hike.

He said Friday that he thought the 9 percent increase was a perfect compromise.

"We have to meet in the middle," Villamil said.

A student carrying 30 credit hours would have had to pay an additional \$608.70 with the 15 percent increase. But at the meeting on Friday, Machen said the 9 percent increase would cost about \$365.

He said UF can still be a leader in higher education and understand the tough times people are facing.

"I think it will be good for us to do this," he said.

Machen, who took office in 2004, also announced that he plans to step down and will help the board search for his replacement. His contract ends Dec. 31, 2013.

In December, the board extended his contract by one year without a salary raise.

A search committee, consisting of trustees, stakeholders, students and alumni, will be formed around July to find the next president.

Breaking the Bank *Students need to know details of budget*

It would be an understatement to say that last week's Board of Trustees meetings were eventful.

Of course, as many of you have heard by now, UF President Bernie Machen will retire at the end of 2013. While this may come as a surprise to some, his retirement from UF was expected due to the approaching expiration of his contract.

It was also decided that UF would no longer be participating in the National Merit Scholarship program due to the lack of control UF has over who qualifies for the scholarship.

However, of greater controversy was Machen's announcement that the annual 15 percent tuition increase will be slashed to 9 percent this year.

Given Machen's recent push to allow tuition increases greater than 15 percent at UF last semester, this sudden reversal was quite unexpected.

While this change might appease many student groups concerned about tuition hikes, it raises even more questions about the financial future of UF.

A lowering of the expected tuition increase from 15 percent to 9 percent creates a budget shortfall of about \$5 million.

UF administrators assured the trustees that these additional funds would come from "outside sources."

However, what exactly are these "outside sources?"

Do they plan to cut into the budget reserves? Do they plan to raise \$5 million from private sources?

First, we believe it is important for the students to know why there was a sudden switch in policy goals in regards to tuition increases. While the change might be pleasing, it does not solve our budget woes.

Next, we want the administration to be clear about where they plan to make up the \$5 million shortfall rather than using vague terms like "outside sources."

If tuition revenue does not meet the costs of the university, this leaves university services, faculty, staff and various other programs on the chopping block, especially if the \$5 million cannot be found.

The Student Body does not need to be appeased by promises of lower tuition increases.

The Student Body deserves to know that its administration has a plan to not only keep the university going, but growing.

We have consistently argued over the past few months that when it comes to university funding and tuition increases, the real fight is in Tallahassee.

At the same time, we should expect a transparent administration.

We understand that everyone is in a budget crunch right now, but we hope that UF doesn't bite off more than it can chew with failed promises.



Media is becoming too politicized, polarized

Like many of us, I thought I had heard every last word about the Trayvon Martin killing. The events that led to the shooting, the reaction of the community and the personal lives of both Martin and his shooter, George Zimmerman, have been examined exhaustively by the national and local media and subjected to the full spectrum of political and personal opinions.

I'm ready for a trial and, hopefully, some closure for the Martin family. For the most part, I'm done reading about the whole thing until something new happens.

Or so I thought.

I was unprepared when I saw a photograph of the paper shooting target produced by the Hiller Armament Company of Virginia — so unprepared that I momentarily lost control of my “inside voice” and spoiled a perfectly cordial lunch with a string of outraged profanity.

The target is a black silhouette on a white background, depicting a person wearing a hooded sweatshirt holding an iced tea with Skittles protruding from a front pocket. Obviously, this is meant to be Trayvon Martin on a shooting target meant for a gun range.

It would be an understatement to say that I find this revolting. Even more revolting, as I show people the image of the target, I'm met with laughter as often as disgust. I try not to recoil too much when someone sees the picture and laughs. I just have to ask, “How is this funny?”

I come to the conclusion that the shrugging answer to the previous question is the result of desensitization. Chefs don't feel heat, smokers don't smell each other and apparently constant bombardment by the national news media causes sociopathic behavior by making human beings into talking points. Martin stops being a dead teenager and becomes a symbol to both sides of the predictable partisan divide.

The media's response to the police reaction of not arresting Zimmerman began a political back-and-forth that removed humanity from the equation, and turned both the victim and the shooter into two-dimensional caricatures. Martin was neither a thug nor an angel. Martin was 17 years old. Think back to when you were 17 — it tends to be a rough year.

Zimmerman is neither a murderer nor a victim. He's a guy who instigated a fight, started losing and pulled a gun. There are many names for a person who does this, but not murderer, not victim. Martin is not a symbol, but a kid whose death reminds me not to be confrontational with strangers because I might get shot.

For another example, in Janu-

shot 19 peo-

ple, wounding 13, including Arizona Rep. Gabrielle Giffords, and killed six using a “high-capacity magazine” in his 9mm pistol. He fired 30 rounds before stopping to reload, when he was subdued and disarmed by members of the crowd at a public speaking event for Giffords. The event, an undeniable tragedy, inevitably became a debate about whether the Second Amendment included the right to bear arms that hold 33 bullets and fit in your jacket pocket.

By May, I was reading a story about a gun enthusiast named Nick Leghorn, who was doing an experiment to try to determine what went wrong, not in terms of Loughner's mental health but his inability to reload the 32-round magazine before someone stopped him. The implication is that Loughner should have been able to shoot more people, and the purpose of Leghorn's experiment is to prevent the next Loughner from having the same problem.

Six dead people, including a 9-year-old girl and 13 wounded — including Giffords — and this is the reaction from some people? Why couldn't he reload fast enough?

I don't blame these people who make Martin targets and run reload experiments for being ideologically stunted. Most of them probably haven't been exposed to much reality for the last decade or two, as most of them probably watch the same news channel every morning and night.

By dividing the media into rigid categories of “conservative” and “liberal,” we have changed the function and meaning of “the news” by forcing it to align with what is, in reality, strictly opinion. The closest thing now to traditional notions of the press are fact-checking websites like PolitiFact and rogue online publications like WikiLeaks, whose sole purpose is to provide actual truths.

Major news networks today have no interest whatsoever in reporting facts unless those facts fit nicely with their chosen political narrative. I find it outrageous that the 10 p.m. news has been replaced by Bill O'Reilly and Rachel Maddow.

While I'm more likely to agree with Maddow's opinions based on my political positions, I don't confuse them with facts. For facts, I have to go to PolitiFact after “The Daily Show” and see what actually happened.

When we substitute opinion for information, we lose the middle ground of informed opinion.

James Griffin was watching TV with his dog Lily early Monday afternoon when he heard what he thought was a tree branch fall on his apartment.

The 50-year-old walked out of his door at the Cottages on Market Street expecting to find roof damage and a rogue oak branch. Instead, he saw his neighbor's kitchen window engulfed in flames.

Emergency rescue workers responded to the fire at 725 SE Fifth Ave., unit No. 725, at 12:49 p.m. Griffin shared the cottage with two other tenants.

Outside, the damaged apartment's resident, recent UF graduate Mimi Seldner, and her boy-

friend, Lee Johnson, embraced each other as they cried. Their dogs, Lola and Bratwurst, were trapped inside when the fire started.

Gainesville Fire Rescue is investigating the cause of the fire, investigator Kelly DeRasmo said.

The fire was contained to the kitchen of the apartment it started in.

Lieutenant paramedic Sean Campbell, one of the first on the scene, said the fire was extinguished quickly enough to prevent it from ruining the cottage.

Joni McBride, Seldner's 67-year-old neighbor, rested nearby in a lawn chair. Its plum-colored finish matched the cottage's unblemished exterior.

"I thought the dogs weren't inside," she said. "Those poor babies."

DIY art class offered Summer B

UF has partnered with the Samuel P. Harn Museum of Art to introduce a new course that gives students the opportunity to create and display their environmental artwork on campus.

The one-credit course, "DIY Campus Eco-Art," is open to students of all majors and will begin Summer B.

The course will teach students about Florida's ecosystems and teach how to combine art and science.

Eric Segal, the education curator of academic programs at the museum and co-instructor of the course, said the projects will stay in the lab throughout the summer and into the fall.

"It is a chance to take your learning outdoors and to do something with real-world impact that is by learning about Florida's natural environment," Segal said.

Students in the course will work on an art project that will enhance the natural environment around it.

Once the artwork is completed it will be installed in the Natural Area Teaching Laboratory, a 60-acre tract located near the entomology and nematology building.

The course is also a part of Creative B, a summer program that aims to raise cultural activity

at UF, and will provide students with a small budget to purchase the materials needed to complete their projects.

Assistant extension scientist and co-instructor of the course Jennifer Gillett-Kaufman said the class will meet at the 60-acre environmental teaching lab for most of the semester.

"What we're really trying to do is get people to look at our ecosystems that we have here in Florida and find ways of putting sustainable art out," Gillett-Kaufman said.

The course is divided into two sections and both will be team-taught by Segal and Gillett-Kaufman. The two sections are ENY 4905 and HUM 2930.

Gillett-Kaufman said she wants every student on campus to come out to the Natural Area Teaching Lab to use and enjoy.

"Come and take it because you never know when a course like this is going to be offered again," she said.

Gainesville Regional Utilities to provide fast Internet services

UF faculty, students will have remote access to campus networks

Slow Internet could be a thing of the past for Gainesville residents living or working in the Innovation District east of campus.

GRUCom, a Gainesville Regional Utilities telecommunications division, and UF agreed Monday to bring gigabit broadband connections to the district.

The new gigabit network will provide connection speeds of one gigabit per second, which is about 100 times faster than standard DSL or cable services, according to a press release.

The Internet option will be available at the end of June and will extend to other parts of the district as the area develops, according to the release.

GRU General Manager Bob Hunzinger said in a statement GRU will support entrepreneurial and technological developments in the district with the new broadband connections.


The Internet service will be available to residents for an introductory price of \$99 per month, which includes 50 megabits per second of service. Rates are determined on an individual basis, according to GRUCom's website.

UF students, faculty and staff in the district will have remote access to on-campus networks.

The initiative is part of the University Community Next Generation Innovation Project, or Gig.U, which will bring high-speed networks to U.S. universities.

"This is something that was involved in all the major leading research universities in the country," said UF spokesman Steve Orlando. "We felt it was something we needed to be a part of as well."

Tobias, freshmen prove clutch in Gators' return to College World Series

► FLORIDA SWEEPS N.C. STATE IN NCAA GAINESVILLE SUPER REGIONAL.

The Gators' roster boasts nine new MLB prospects, but Florida relied on more than its highly-regarded upperclassmen to advance to a third straight College World Series.

"Our guys battled," coach Kevin O'Sullivan said. "Each guy did just enough. It was a great team effort."

Two Gators who have significantly contributed to the team effort this postseason are freshmen Josh Tobias and Casey Turgeon. Tobias has mostly earned praise from O'Sullivan for his defense and deservedly so. He has played error-free baseball this postseason, including a run-saving effort in the fourth inning Sunday.

With runners on first and second, Wolfpack second baseman Matt Bergquist hit a sharp grounder down the third-base line. Tobias made a diving play to stop the ball and tagged the bag with his glove for the third out.

Despite a noteworthy defensive effort, Tobias overshadowed his glove work with his bat.

In the top of the ninth, Tobias led off the inning with a double to center field. N.C. State center fielder Jake Fincher caught the ball while diving, but could not complete the catch.

"I thought Fincher had a really good beat on that ball in center," O'Sullivan said. "The first couple of steps, I thought he was going to catch it. We were just fortunate that when the glove hit the ground, the ball popped out."

Nolan Fontana bunted Tobias over to third, and after an intentional walk to Preston Tucker, Tobias scored the go-ahead run on a Mike Zunino sacrifice fly to center field. The Wolfpack tied the score up 7-7 in the bottom of the ninth to send the game into extra innings.

Daniel Pigott put the Gators up 8-7 with a lead-off solo homer to right field in the 10th, but Florida's freshmen tallied the eventual winning run.

Casey Turgeon followed Pigott's at-bat with a single — his third hit in a 3-for-5 day — and Justin Shafer, who finished the game 2 for 3 with two RBI, bunted Turgeon into scoring position. Junior Vickash Ramjit lined out to shortstop, bringing Tobias to the plate with two outs.

Down in the count 0-2, Tobias hit a ball into the right-field grass for a single. As Turgeon

UF juniors need title to seal legacy

There was nothing junior about what the third-year Gators accomplished Sunday.

With Florida's Super Regional sweep of North Carolina State, the UF junior class will play in its third College World Series in three seasons. It's a remarkable feat coach Kevin O'Sullivan tried to put into perspective.

"Obviously, Omaha is a thing we talk about," O'Sullivan said. "But I can't say enough — it's extremely difficult to get to this point. It is extremely difficult."

Reaching the College World Series has proven tough enough for the title-less Gators, and this season was no exception. Perhaps the most challenging step for Florida was its 9-8 victory Sunday. In what was likely the last home appearance for UF's six drafted juniors, there were four lead changes, and N.C. State rallied to tie Florida three times.

The Gators did not escape with a win until they plated two runs in the top of the 10th and only surrendered one to the Wolfpack in the bottom half of the inning.

"That kind of game, and how it worked out, that's what I came back for," senior Preston Tucker said. "If I could pick a game I wanted to go out with here at home, I think that's the one."

While Tucker and the seniors fell short of reaching the College World Series in 2009, all the juniors know is Omaha. However, Mike Zunino and his fellow juniors, like every other player that has donned a Florida baseball uniform,

have never won a national title.

Advancing to the pinnacle of college baseball three consecutive times is a monster feat. The Gators had only been to Omaha five times in the 50-year history of the College World Series before 2010.

But if you end the season empty-handed, it was all in vain — just ask

the Buffalo Bills.

Florida's current squad is the best team in the 98-year history of the program. Their record may not reflect that, but the Gators have nine MLB Draft picks on their roster. They have two years of College World Series experience — including the sting of last year's loss to South Carolina — and they are the nation's No. 1 team for a reason.

UF has dealt with high expectations since January, and the glare has only intensified in the heat of the June sun. The Gators' championship window is closing, and this is their last chance to punctuate a historic run with a satisfying end.

"For us to get back to this point," O'Sullivan said, "it was something we set out to do, but it was not easy. Getting to the final eight is never easy."

Florida has one final crack at glory in Omaha, and the road is not getting any easier.

Florida wins first NCAA Outdoor title

Sprinter Jeff Demps has the fastest all-conditions time for the NCAA in the 100 meter, senior Gray Horn has won the decathlon title in every South-eastern Conference Championship he's competed in and Florida men's 4x100 meter relay team set the second-fastest collegiate time earlier in the season. However, none of them competed at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

Despite missing out on three possible first-place finishes, Florida still edged LSU by two team points to win its first NCAA outdoor title.

"I can't tell you how proud I am of this group of

Rain delays plague Gators' NCAA Super Regional sweep

With a potential third-straight Omaha appearance on the line, the top-ranked Gators received a bit of help from the dark clouds hovering above McKethan Stadium.

Florida, facing North Carolina State's freshman southpaw in Carlos Rodon, needed a good offensive effort against the Golden Spikes Award finalist Sunday afternoon.

The rain ended Rodon's day early in a 9-8 Florida victory against the Wolfpack.

Rodon entered the game versus Florida's Jonathon Crawford tied for third in the nation in strikeouts. Rodon and Crawford had not allowed any hits heading into the bottom of the third, but a two-hour, 23-minute rain delay put the game on hold for the second day in a row.

While Crawford tossed only 17 pitches before play stopped, Rodon had 40 and the delay prevented any chance for his return.

N.C. State coach Elliot Avent favored postponing the game until Monday to prevent a repeat of Saturday's two rain delays that approached three hours.

"I won't speak for either club, but I will say that each manager, each coach, will probably have feelings based on what affects his team in his mind one way or another," NCAA game representative Bob Warn said.

Avent pulled Rodon, but Gators coach Kevin O'Sullivan kept Crawford in the

game due to his low pitch count. O'Sullivan, known for protecting his pitchers, had no qualms about giving Crawford the ball.

"I knew that question would come up and I knew there would be a lot of people questioning the move," O'Sullivan said. "All I know is we've only had one pitcher throw over 100 pitches all year long and we take care of our arms. You get to this time of year and when you protect kids' arms, you have the opportunity to do that."

Although Crawford allowed three earned runs in 3.2 innings, he delayed Florida's need to burn a reliever in a game that forced O'Sullivan to use seven pitchers. N.C. State used five pitchers in the high-scoring contest.

Right-hander Anthony Tzamtzis replaced Rodon in the fourth and the Florida offense erupted for four runs including a Preston Tucker right-field homer, which tied the game at one. Tzamtzis survived five batters and registered one out.

"We were definitely going to battle. We knew that we were going to get there best and that was the thing," Tucker said. "Whether it was him or somebody else, we knew it was going to be tough."

Once the starting pitchers exited the game, an offensive outburst ensued with four lead changes.

"I'm drained," Tucker said. "Mentally and physically that was one of the most exhausting games I've played in."

rounded third, Tobias rounded first. Tobias drew the attention of the N.C. State defense and got caught in a rundown to ensure Turgeon scored successfully.

"[Tobias' postseason success] speaks volumes to how far he's come as a player this year," O'Sullivan said.

"If he had not had that set back with his

(broken) hamate bone, you probably would have seen this a little bit earlier than the latter part of the season."

While Tobias proved clutch Sunday, Turgeon and Shafer have followed up their Southeastern Conference All-Tournament Team selections with good postseason play.

Turgeon earned Most Outstanding Player honors in the NCAA Gainesville Regional and has hit .474 with six runs in five NCAA Tournament games.

Shafer is batting .313 with five RBI and a .421 on-base percentage during the postseason.

"It's unbelievable to come in here as a freshman and play," Turgeon said. "I've learned a lot. I just want to thank the older guys for teaching me pretty much everything here."

When No. 1 Florida kicks off the College World Series against No. 8 South Carolina on Saturday, the returning Gators will have revenge on their minds and a target on their

backs.

O'Sullivan is confident the freshmen can keep up in an unfamiliar environment.

"It's one thing to be the underdog and not have expectations, but it's another thing when there are expectations," O'Sullivan said. "The relief of just getting [the MLB Draft] over with and getting to Omaha, I'm looking forward to just watching this team play."

MVP finalists James, Durant face off in Game 1 tonight

MIAMI — Several weeks before this season even started, LeBron James and Kevin Durant were competing against each other.

Hell Week, they called it, a four-day series of grueling workouts.

Starting Tuesday, they'll meet again. They'll call that the NBA finals.

Neither was playing at the level they are now when James invited Durant to work out with him during the NBA lockout in his hometown of Akron, Ohio.

Now as James tries to win his first ring, fittingly, it's Durant in his way.

"It's only right. It's only right," James said. "We look forward to the challenge. It's going to be a big test for us."

James played at a rarely seen level in the Eastern Conference finals against the Boston Celtics.

According to STATS LLC, James became the first player since Shaquille O'Neal in the 2000 finals to have six 30-point games in a play-off series. In the one contest where James didn't score 30, he finished with 29 in Game 4, fouling out in overtime.

His series averages against the Celtics: 33.6 points and 11 rebounds per game on 53 percent shooting. He had five games with at least 30 points and 10 rebounds in the entire regular season — then did it five times in the series against Boston alone.

"He was absolutely brilliant this series, and we all know it," Heat coach Erik Spoelstra said.

"He's playing at an historic level

during the playoffs, driving us with his will. We do not take his talent or his will or his competitiveness for granted. And we need every single bit of it. He is pushing himself beyond his limits, and he's pushing the rest of the team as well."

Said Heat guard Dwyane Wade: "He's amazing."

There were many moments for the Heat to celebrate on Saturday night, when they punched their ticket back to the NBA finals by ousting Boston 101-88 in Game 7.

Heat owner Micky Arison couldn't have gotten his hands off the East trophy fast enough, since that isn't the one he wants anyway. James felt the same way. The Heat star left the floor in a cap and T-shirt, one arm raised in joy.

Behind him, the celebration continued. By then, he was already thinking about what's next.

"I really thought he in particular played a very smart, aggressive game," Celtics coach Doc Rivers said.

"He kind of let the game come to him, and then down the stretch he took the game over. That's what great players do."

They don't do it alone, though.

Criticized last season for deferring too often in crucial situations, James went into the offseason driven by the pain of failing in the NBA finals. And even during the lockout, he did anything he could to improve — two-a-day workouts, studying with Hakeem Olajuwon, yoga, boxing, beach sprints, even asking Durant to come to Akron for a few days for some training.

In those sessions, they pushed each other to the limit.

"Me and KD, man, just tryin' to get better," James said in a video of one workout posted online.

And look at them now, two superstars set to fight for one ring.

"I envisioned it every day we worked out," James said. "I understood what his passion was. I understood what his drive was."

They both understood the other perfectly.

James and the Heat lost to Dallas in last season's finals. Durant and the Thunder lost to Dallas in last season's Western Conference finals. This probably couldn't have been scripted any better. Maybe the two best players in the world, scarred by similar disappointment, trying to make the other better.

And when the final series of the season begins Tuesday night in Oklahoma City, they'll each have a close-up view of how far the other has come.

"It's going to be a battle," Durant said.

The Heat and Thunder split two games during the regular season, both winning at home. Durant scored the most points in the NBA this season at 1,850, James was second with 1,683.

James won the MVP award, Durant finished second in that balloting. And in these finals, one will finish first again, the other will finish second again.

"It's not about Kevin and LeBron," Thunder coach Scott Brooks said.

"It's not about any other thing other than playing good basketball against a very good team. ... Individually, they're the best players in the league."

Heat-Thunder: Will LeBron win his first championship ring?

Corey: For those of you looking for a competitive NBA finals, don't get your hopes up. The real finals ended when the Thunder took four straight games to upset the Spurs. Now begins the encore: like when you sit through a Dexys Midnight Runners concert. When they hit the stage at the end to play one last song, there is only one possible outcome. After witnessing Scotty Brooks out-coach the great Gregg Popovich, Erik Spoelstra might as well step down and escape with what little confidence (and resume) he has left. Opening as a 4.5-point favorite, the Thunder will take Game 1 from a worn-down Heat squad in the Sooner State. Sure, the Heat might find a way to fight back, maybe connect with a few slaps here and there. The Pacquiao-Bradley judges might even claim the Heat were the better team. But with an 8-0 record at home this postseason, the Thunder will ultimately end this series in six games.

Joe: Oh, Corey. Did you even watch the Eastern Conference Finals? It may have been a rough, ugly, seven-game crap fest, but it produced a real champion: the Heat. Granted, Miami looked far from great. They were inconsistent and, at times, overmatched by the Celtics. But then, much to the dismay of throngs of haters, the dominant version of the Heat made an unwelcome return to the spotlight only rivaled by the release of the utterly useless third installment of the *Men in Black* franchise. Down 3-2 and sitting on the brink of elimination, LeBron James roared back to life

and dominated. King James scored 76 points and grabbed 27 rebounds in the final two games of the series to send Boston packing. In the words of Dwight Schrute from NBC's

The Office, "The hand that reaches from the grave to grip your throat is the strong hand you want on the wheel." With LeBron sitting pretty in the driver's seat, Miami is cruising towards a championship.

Corey: You could have Jimmie Johnson in the driver's seat for all I care; in the end you still have a Pontiac Fiero. Sure it looks flashy, but put it in a race and you're no better than Danica Patrick. Just look at the Thunder's supporting cast: Serge Ibaka, Kendrick Perkins and Thabo Sefolosha. With two prolific shot blockers down low, and a defensive specialist roaming the perimeter, LeBron will have a better chance of getting in and out of Cleveland alive than attacking the rim. Say what you will about the Thunder's defense, but what they did to the Spurs after Game 2 was nothing short of impressive. And with an offense averaging 102.3 points per game with a 51.2 adjusted field goal percentage, defense might as well be optional.

Joe: Looks flashy? C'mon, Corey. LeBron James was named the NBA MVP this season. He's the best automobile on the market. And

as much as Chicky-Chicky-Bron-Bron tried to prove he's a one-man show in the last two games of the Eastern Conference Finals, he's only one part of "The Big Three." Even though

he dresses like a Ken doll, Dwyane Wade is a top-five player in the league, and Chris Bosh — the only known dinosaur still roaming the earth — is a perennial All Star. These three guys are not a joke. D-Wade is known for his ability to create — and convert — tough shots. The Thunder may boast a powerful paint trio, but it's nothing Wade hasn't seen before. In fact, Wade averaged 20.5 points per game against Oklahoma City in two meetings this season. As far as Bosh is concerned, he can form an adequate duo with Udonis Haslem down low. The Heat may not overpower the Thunder in the post, but they'll keep it close.

Corey: Udonis Haslem would make a better duo with Art Garfunkel (sorry, Florida fans). That 6-foot-8 liability will give either Perkins or Ibaka the chance to sit in the lane and cut off the Heat's bread-and-butter: driving the lane. This season, the Thunder led the league with 8.17 blocks per game, almost two blocks more than the second-place Wizards. And you're forgetting that one dreaded quarter — the one that comes after "The First Three." The Heat are notorious for struggling in the fourth, and the Thunder seem to have

found their stroke this postseason, putting up 29.3 points in their last four games with an 83.5 free throw percentage. Meanwhile, Miami has not fared as well at the charity stripe this postseason with a 72.3 percent clip. It goes without saying that adjusting to the trio of scoring champ Kevin Durant, sixth-man-of-the-year James Harden and All-Star Russell Westbrook is like predicting who will be gone from the Heat next year: Bosh or Spoelstra.

Joe: Funny you should mention blocks considering the Heat lead the NBA with the fewest opponent blocks per game in the playoffs (3.5). If anything, Miami will drive the lane with fervor against Oklahoma City. When it comes down to it, LeBron is better man-to-man than anybody in the NBA. Also, as I mentioned before, that Wade guy is pretty good at getting to the basket and making things happen. The Heat will get to the free-throw line early and often against the Thunder. Granted, Miami averaged roughly three fewer free-throw attempts against Oklahoma City than against other foes this season. However, the Heat's 93 percent rate from the charity stripe against the Thunder, which was 15.5 percent higher than their regular season clip, should compensate for the slightly lower free throw count. In this high-powered battle between two abstract, natural elements, James and Wade will play like freaks of nature. The Thunder can't take the Heat, so they better stay out of the kitchen.

young men," coach Mike Holloway said. "We had a lot of adversity, not just this week, but throughout the year. You think about things, the people that weren't here, the people that didn't want to give you a chance, but our guys never

bought into it. I'm extremely proud of them."

The adversity for Florida's outdoor season started at the NCAA Indoor Championships. Horn entered the second day of heptathlon competition in first place and was two events away from securing a win, when the senior got injured during pole-vault warm ups.

Horn sat out a majority of the outdoor season due to the injury. After he was suspended for the SEC Outdoor Championships, Horn did not have a decathlon score to qualify him for the NCAA East Preliminary Round and therefore wasn't able to qualify for the championships.

Demps came next. After the five-time NCAA Champion finished second in the first round at the NCAA East Preliminary Round, all he had to do was finish in the top 12 during the finals to advance to the championships. However, Demps was forced to pull out of the competition because of a tweaked hamstring.

After winning the title in the men's 4x100 twice in the last three years, the hopes were high for the Gators to take home another one. Unfortunately for Florida, the relay team dropped the baton during a hand off at the NCAA East Preliminary Round, causing them to miss out on qualifying for nationals.

"We lost our best sprinter, we lost our best decathlete and our 4x100 didn't qualify," Holloway said. "A lot of people would have given up hope, but our group of guys didn't. I sat them down after regionals and I said, 'We are still the best team in the country, as long as you believe it,' and our guys believed it."

Despite losing out on those three events, the Gators still came out on top. Florida scored in seven events in com-

parison to LSU scoring nine times. However, they still outscored the runner-up Tigers to earn them their second NCAA title this year.

Out of those seven events, Florida took first place in three — Tony McQuay (400 meters), Omar Craddock (triple jump) and Dedric Dukes, Hugh Graham, Jr., Leonardo Seymore and McQuay (4x400 meter relay).

McQuay's performance in the 400 meters set a new personal record for him with a time of 44.58. His win also gave the Gators their first title in the event in school history.

In addition to the 400 meters title, Florida also won its first 4x400 meter relay title. The four now hold the world leading time with a mark of 3:00.02.

Craddock earned his win with an all-conditions best of 16.92 meters, giving the Gators its sixth straight NCAA title in the triple jump.

The Gators also had two top-three finishes. Junior Jeremy Postin was runner-up in the hammer throw, and junior Dwight Barbiasz finished third in the high jump. Combined, the two earned 14 points for Florida.

As the Gators look forward to earning their third straight NCAA title next year, the men's team will lose Demps and Horn.

"I actually figured out on the plane that we had no seniors (competing on the men's side)," Holloway said. "Obviously, if we stay healthy, there is a bright future for the University of Florida, on both the men's and the women's sides."
