



Fanfares and Fireworks event brought thousands to Flavet Field

Khila Frett said she came to Flavet Field Tuesday to see "Gators" fireworks.

The 5-year-old twirled a small American flag as she sat on a blanket with her mom, Thalia, 29.

Thousands packed picnics, Frisbees, footballs and blankets for a sunny afternoon on Flavet Field, where the UF College of Journalism and Communications hosted the Fanfares and Fireworks event. It has been a Gainesville tradition for about 15 years, said Randy Wright, executive director of the college's division of multimedia properties.

Also contributing to the event's \$30,000 price tag were Gainesville Regional Utilities, the City of Gainesville, Florida Credit Union and Plum Creek, Wright said.

The event was canceled several times in recent years due to lack of funding, which made the large turnout even more worthwhile, Wright said.

"It far exceeded our expectations," Wright said. "Mission accomplished."

Event-goers listened to live music from the band shell stage, ate funnel cakes and donated blood.

By 8 p.m., Flavet Field was covered in red, white and blue T-shirts, blankets and decorations.

Amber Monk, 16, sported a red bandana tied around her head and an America-themed T-shirt she found at Goodwill.

Gainesville City Commission will select new attorney

COMMISSIONERS VOTED TO DELAY THE FINAL DECISION UNTIL MONDAY.

The Gainesville City Commission will select a new city attorney Monday night after interviewing six potential candidates.

Commissioners interviewed candidates for the position on June 26 but voted to delay the final decision until Monday.

The commission sought input on the candidates from the city's charter officers, which include Gainesville City Manager Russ Blackburn, Gainesville Regional Utilities General Manager Bob Hunzinger, Clerk of Courts Kurt Lannon and Equal Opportunity Director Cecil Howard.

The new city attorney will replace Marion Radson, who is retiring after about 30 years

of working with the city.

The city attorney's office is responsible for handling legal issues presented to the city in state and federal courts.

The finalists for the city attorney position include Jeffrey Sheffel, city attorney for Hollywood, Fla.; Vivien Monaco, assistant county attorney for Orange County; Daniel Nee, litigation attorney for Gainesville; Nicolle Shalley, a senior assistant attorney for Gainesville and a Community Redevelopment Agency attorney; Brian FitzGerald, senior assistant county attorney for Hillsborough County; and Cherry Shaw, assistant general counsel for Jacksonville.

A seventh finalist, David Schwartz, assistant county attorney for Alachua County, withdrew from consideration.

The Monday meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall.

Gainesville man arrested in connection with armed robbery

He took \$10 after holding three people at gunpoint

A Gainesville man was arrested early Wednesday for allegedly robbing three people with a handgun and having a car key to a stolen vehicle, according to Gainesville Police.

Jo'Von Uriel Lake, 21, was charged with two counts of armed robbery, both first-degree felonies; grand theft auto, a third-

degree felony; and resisting arrest without violence, a first-degree misdemeanor.

Police gave this account:

At about midnight Wednesday, Lake, of Southwest 17th Lane, allegedly approached Michael Moss, 37, Shelea Caesar, 29, and Mocu Leej Macrae, 35, in a parking lot at the 2000 block of Northeast Ninth Street, according to a GPD report.

Lake allegedly pulled out a .357-caliber handgun and threatened the victims.

"You know what time it is, give it up,"

Lake is quoted in the report as saying to the victims.

One of the men gave Lake \$10 while the other victims said they did not have money or valuables on them.

Moss said in an interview Wednesday there was a second person with Lake hiding in the bushes.

Police found Lake near one of the victim's vehicles.

After he was discovered, Lake fled from police.

Police shouted at Lake multiple times to stop, but he allegedly refused and continued running.

Twitter helps find dog that took train to Dublin

DUBLIN — When Patch hopped aboard the train to Dublin, it took the power of Twitter to reunite the dog with his owner.

Irish Rail sent a "Lost dog!" tweet with a photo after the Jack Russell terrier arrived with Wednesday morning commuters on a train from Kilcock, County Kildare, an hour's ride away.

After more than 500 retweets in just 32 minutes, the photo found Patch's owner, Deirdre Anglin, who tweeted the state railway: "That's my dog!"

The episode underscored the ubiquitous use of mobile-friendly social media sites in Ireland, a tech-savvy corner of Europe where cell phones were the norm long before they were in the United States.

Soon after Patch went missing Tuesday night in Kilcock, 20 miles (30 kilometers) west of

Dublin, Anglin said she did "the usual social network thing," posting pictures of the dog on her Facebook account and appealing for followers to spot him.

It wasn't until after Patch waltzed on to the 6:49 a.m. commuter train in Kilcock that the alarm was sounded.

Rail workers on board dubbed the dog Checker, joking he might be trained to inspect tickets, as commuters took turns petting the friendly dog. They turned him over to Pearse Street station staff on the train's final stop in the heart of the capital, when it became clear the dog had no owner on board.

Irish Rail spokesman Barry Kenny described Twitter as offering the ideal platform for launching a nationwide appeal for the lost dog. And he said some staff at Pearse Station wished it hadn't worked so well.

"It was good she showed up so quickly, because the staff in the office were getting quite attached to him," Kenny said.

Anglin said she was particularly pleased that Irish Rail posted Patch's photo on Twitter and noted that the rapid retweets by other users to their own followers ensured that, soon, the alert reached her.

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
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


Fireworks explode over Ben Hill Griffin Stadium Tuesday night. The Fanfares and Fireworks event costs about \$30,000.

Man arrested for allegedly beating pregnant girlfriend

A Gainesville man was arrested for allegedly beating his pregnant girlfriend Wednesday morning.

Jacob Criger was arrested at 4:15 a.m. on felony charges of domestic battery on a pregnant woman and obstructing justice.

The fight started after an argument between Criger, 32, and his

girlfriend, Shameka Washington.

According to an Alachua County Sheriff's Office arrest record, Criger said Washington started to argue with him because she was angry another woman gave him a beer.

Washington said Criger held her down and hit her in the face multiple times during the argument.

She fought back.

Washington said she bit and scratched Criger to get him off of

her, according to the report.

Police found two bite marks on Criger's shoulder, a bite wound to his stomach, scratches on his back and a scratch inside his mouth.

Criger said he hit Washington because she started to bite him.

Washington tried to call the police, but she said he smashed the phone against her head and took it away from her.

Criger denied that he took the

phone, according to the report, and said Washington threw the phone on the ground and he picked it up.

Police dispatch heard what sounded like the phone being taken from the female caller and being hung up, according to the report.

Criger followed her as she walked away until police arrived.

When police found her, Washington's face was red and swollen in multiple places.

Criger and Washington have been in a relationship for about a year. They lived together in the past, but now live separately, according to the report.

Criger told police that Washington recently told him she was pregnant with his child, which she confirmed.

His bond is set at \$20,000.

Birds found dead on east coast sent to Gainesville for examination, display

On the east coast of Florida, more than 250 birds have washed onto shores they've never seen. Now they're in Gainesville, but they'll never see that either.

Greater shearwater birds have been found dead on the east coast of Florida in places such as Fort Lauderdale and St. Augustine. This summer, they are being sent to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission to be analyzed in Gainesville.

Dan Wolf, an avian veterinarian with the commission, examined the greater shearwater birds' carcasses.

Most of the dead birds are immature or less than a year old, Wolf said, but the species is not in danger of extinction.

"It's unsettling," he said. "Nobody likes to see dead birds. But as far as being highly unusual, I don't think so."

Greater shearwater birds are brown and gray and spotted and about the size of a typical sea gull.

Forming a figure-eight-shaped migration pattern from Canada to the British Isles to South America to the west coast of Africa, the birds glide over the Atlantic Ocean waves without a sound, said Andy Kratter, ornithology collections manager at the Florida Museum of Natural History.

Kratter said the young birds are simply running out of gas this year.

Hytta Mederer, a licensed rehabilitator at the Florida Wildlife Hospital in Melbourne, said the clinic would receive greater shearwater birds that couldn't

stand or open their eyes. She described them as "drooping."

"A normal, healthy bird is going to try to run away from you, bite or fly away," she said. "But these birds couldn't do that."

Mederer said the clinic rarely sees this species of birds, but received 102 in June alone.

Kratter said it's hard to pinpoint what the precise cause of the deaths is because so little is known about the birds' feeding habits. They only come onto shore to nest in the Tristan de Cunha islands in the south Atlantic Ocean between South America and Africa.

"This is not like a one-time thing," he said. "Climate change or something like that can't be blamed for this. This has to do with their food habits."

Kratter also said more birds than usual may be washing ashore due to strong eastern winds in the area, which are pushing more greater shearwater carcasses ashore.

Regardless of the cause of the birds' death, some of the bodies will end up at the Florida Museum of Natural History.

Kratter said 2005 was the last year the museum received a large number of greater shearwater birds for its collection, when it received about 100 from bird rehabilitation clinics across Florida. In 2010, the museum received 14, and it received five last year.

Wolf said the average number of birds found dead is about 50 to 60, but he has seen more than 1,000 some years at the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

This year, there have been more than 250 reported dead, he said.

Kratter estimated this year the museum would get about 50.

Officers later caught Lake after a foot chase.

Police searched Lake and found a car key in his front pocket to a 2004 Jeep Cherokee that was reported stolen on Tuesday,

according to the report.

Two of the victims individually identified Lake as the man who robbed them.

Lake did not make any statements to police after being arrested.

According to the Alachua County Clerk of Courts, Lake

has been previously arrested and charged with grand theft and burglary of an occupied dwelling.

Lake is currently in Alachua County Jail with a bond of \$400,000.

Andy Griffith, creator of television city Mayberry, dies at 86

RALEIGH, N.C. — Andy Griffith's gift to the show that bore his name wasn't just the homespun wisdom of the plain-spoken sheriff he played. It was the place he created: a small town where all foibles are forgiven and friendships are forever, full of characters who felt like family.

Mayberry, a fictional North Carolina village said to be modeled on Griffith's own hometown of Mount Airy, was so beloved that it practically became a synonym for any community that was too innocent and trusting for real life. After all, Griffith's Mayberry was a place where the sheriff didn't carry a gun, the local drunk locked himself in jail and even the villains who passed through were changed by their stay.

On "The Andy Griffith Show," he created an endearing portrait of a place where few people grew up but many wished they did.

Griffith, who died Tuesday at 86 at his North Carolina home, played a sage widower named Andy Taylor who offered gentle guidance to son Opie, played by little Ron Howard, who grew up to become an Oscar-winning director. Griffith inhabited the sheriff's "aw, shucks" persona so completely that viewers easily believed the character and the man were one.

"What made 'The Andy Griffith Show' work was Andy Griffith himself — the fact that he was of this dirt and had such deep respect for the people and places of his childhood," said Craig Fincannon, who

runs a casting agency in Wilmington and met Griffith in 1974.

A character on the show "might be broadly eccentric, but the character had an ethical and moral base that allowed us to laugh with them and not at them," he said. "And Andy Griffith's the reason for that."

Don Knotts, who died in 2006, was the goofy Deputy Barney Fife, while Jim Nabors joined the show

as Gomer Pyle, the cornpone gas pumper. George Lindsey, who died in May, was the beanie-wearing Gooper. The sheriff's loving Aunt Bee was played by the late Frances Bavier.

The show initially aired from 1960 to 1968 and never really left television, living on for decades in reruns. Almost 20 years later, a reunion movie titled "Return to May-

berry" was the top-rated TV movie of the 1985-86 season.

The series became one of only three in TV history to bow out at the top of the ratings (The others were "I Love Lucy" and "Seinfeld."). Griffith said he decided to end it "because I thought it was slipping, and I didn't want it to go down further."

In a 2007 interview with The

Associated Press, Griffith said he wasn't as wise as the sheriff or as nice. He described himself as having the qualities of one of his last roles, that of the cranky diner owner in "Waitress," and also of his most manipulative character, from the 1957 movie "A Face in the Crowd."


"But I guess you could say I created Andy Taylor," he said. "Andy Taylor's the best part of my mind. The best part of me."

Griffith also dabbled in Democratic politics, appearing in 2008 in an Obama campaign video directed by Howard and featuring the former child star chatting with Griffith and other former TV colleagues. Two years later, he made a commercial praising the president's health care legislation.

Griffith was born June 1, 1926, and as a child sang and played slide trombone in the band at Grace Moravian Church. He studied at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and for a time contemplated a career in the ministry. But he eventually got a job teaching high school music in Goldsboro.

He and his first wife, Barbara Edwards, had two children: Sam, who died in 1996, and Dixie. His second wife was Solica Cassuto. Both marriages ended in divorce. He married third wife Cindi Knight Griffith in 1983.

Griffith also suffered from Guillain-Barre syndrome, a rare neurological disorder that can cause sudden paralysis. He suffered a heart attack and underwent quadruple bypass surgery in 2000.



'Moderation' is not the key to independence

This Independence Day, as in years past, families and friends will gather together to barbecue, swim, play and enjoy fireworks. The Fourth of July is the ultimate rite of summer for most Americans, and rightly so. Yet in the flurry of activities that we all rush into, it can be easy to forget what the holiday truly commemorates.

Most people, if asked, would say July 4 is the birth date of our Republic. Technically they are correct, but for the founders who signed the Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1776 was merely the birth date of an idea.

The idea of a free and independent nation separate from the yoke of England existed only on paper that day. For them, the very act of signing such a document was treason, punishable by death, forfeiture of all their property and the imprisonment of their families. That these men knew the great risks they were taking is undeniable.

On April 19, 1775, less than 15 months beforehand, after being met with armed resistance at Lexington and Concord by colonial militia, the British proceeded to retaliate by searching nearby homes for militia members and slaughtering everyone inside, including civilian women and children. These scenes of carnage were later described in all 37 colonial newspapers of the day. It is therefore inconceivable that each signer took his actions lightly.

These men suffered greatly for their actions. To say they were well outside of their comfort zones in essentially declaring a civil war against their fellow Englishmen would be a gross understatement. However, these men willingly pledged their very lives, fortunes and their sacred honor to the founding of our nation.

Fast forward to the present day and we see a very different caliber of statesmen at the helm of our nation. One would likely be hard pressed to find many politicians who have ever so much as lifted a finger to serve our nation beyond their own personal or political interests.

I see a few men and women of principle who love their

nation and try to act in its best interest.

However, I find the majority of our national leadership seems composed of self-serving, power-hungry individuals with no stomach for sacrifice, humility or duty.

Obama does not deserve blame for state of today's economy

I recently read the column "President Obama displays incompetence," by Alligator columnist Joshua Fonzi. With all due respect to the author, this column is highly typical of the "things are bad and no matter who made them bad, blame Obama" argument.

The fact is that Republicans have been obstructing everything President Obama has tried to do, and this is more the "John Boehner Economy" than the "Obama Economy."

President Obama, for instance, has a job bill that would create four million jobs, but Republicans have blocked nearly every part of it.

Fonzi mentioned how Obama was using taxpayer money to travel to more campaign events than Bush did. Perhaps the author was unaware that Obama has already reimbursed more campaign travel expenses than Bush did in all eight years as president — that's not something you'd hear on Fox News.

While we're on the topic of jobs and Obama's performance, does the author remember the promise that the stimulus bill would prevent unemployment from going above 8 percent? Well, as it turns out, we were already at 9 percent unemployment when the Congressional Budget Office made

that prediction.

Every month, the Bureau of Labor Statistics comes out with an initial estimate of unemployment, then half-way through the month, it comes out with a revised estimate. We were between the initial and revised estimates when the Congressional Budget Office made that statement.

I guess we don't hear that too often because it's not great politics to say, "Oh, we were wrong because we didn't even know how high unemployment was in the first place," but those are the facts.

Fonzi also mentioned that Romney may not be wonderful, but that he knows how to use a calculator and balance a budget. When Romney ran Bain Capital, the company would buy out failing and struggling companies and "make them profitable" by firing a quarter of the workers and lowering pay and benefits, while also using outsourced labor.

Recently, Romney tried to defend his record by saying there's a difference between "outsourcing" (which he defines as firing American workers and moving their jobs overseas) and "offshoring" (which he defines as creating new jobs overseas instead of creating them here).

Every time Obama talks about giving tax breaks to companies for not outsourcing, Romney says he "doesn't want to pick winners and losers," so I think it's clear that Romney's record of outsourcing at Bain Capital reflects how he would govern as president.

In sum, if Obama were our king, Fonzi would be 100 percent correct. But Obama is not a king; he's a president who has limited power and must deal with representatives whose No. 1 priority is to make him a one-term president rather than work together to create jobs for American workers.

Finally, for full disclosure, I will admit that I too am a lifelong Republican. However, I am horrified by the extreme hardcore fiscal conservatism that has become popular with the Tea Party.

I never thought I'd hear people like Michelle Bachmann or Dick Morris say that it would be OK for the U.S. to not raise the debt ceiling and be in technical default. According to this new extreme fiscal conservatism, as long as we pay for the interest on the national debt, fund the military and keep social security solvent, everything else can remain unfunded.

I never dreamed my party would come out with the proposed Ryan Budget that block-grants Medicaid back to the states with such large cuts, it practically ends the program. It also virtually turns Medicare into a voucher program, making the average senior citizen pay \$6,000 more per year. (Yes, I know the Ryan Budget has a \$6,125 voucher for poor senior citizens, but only for extremely poor senior citizens.)

I agree with Jeb Bush — I can't even reorganize my own party anymore!

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

Bill Bryson, 46, is the founder and general manager of Grow Radio, a nonprofit he started three years ago. Bryson said the idea was partly inspired by radio programs he enjoys such as "The Moth," "This American Life" and "Radiolab."

"There are a lot of great storytelling based kinds of programming, and that's where the strength of radio comes from," Bryson said.

For Bryson, the main goal of many of his endeavors, and especially The Conch, is the idea of inclusion.

"I want to help find people common ground that they didn't know was there," he said.

Down the road Bryson said he hopes to bring in members of the community for workshops. He is excited to see people's storytelling techniques improve over time.

Although Bryson is, by his own admission, not a great storyteller. He feels there are many great stories and storytellers alike in Gainesville who come from all walks of life. He said they are reaching out to and expecting participation from many parts of the community, not just from the university.

True to the occasion, the theme of the event's launch will be, "There's a First Time for Everything."



Massage therapist sells homemade soap to Gainesville residents

A local soap-making business, Thrive Handcrafts, recently teamed up with a local coffee business, Sweetwater Organic Coffee Roasters, to create a soap that will leave java junkies feeling squeaky clean.

Susan Niemann, a stay-at-home mom and licensed massage therapist, began making soaps because she wanted to know the exact ingredients she was putting on her daughter's and her own body.

In two years, her hobby quickly expanded into a successful business that distributes soap to locally owned stores in Gainesville.

The Niemanns drink Sweetwater Coffee at home. When she realized soap could be made out of coffee, she began experimenting and brought her perfected product to Sweetwater. The company was eager to collaborate with her.

Thrive Handcrafts' soaps sealed with the Sweetwater logo are sold at Ward's Supermarket and will soon arrive in other local stores.

Niemann's other soaps, body scrubs, deodorant and balms can also be found at Ward's, Citizens Co-op, Florida School of Massage, The Green House Nursery, Garden Gate Nursery and Earth Pets, and she is continually partnering with more local businesses.

Niemann said she bought handmade soap at a craft festival years ago and loved the idea of buying it from the hands that made it.

She didn't want to use Johnson & Johnson on her baby because it had petroleum products. She wasn't comfortable putting mineral oils or unpronounceable ingredients on her daughter.

From an environmental perspective, she also wanted to feel comfortable with what she was putting down the drain.

"If there is any small way that I can make a statement," Niemann said, "even if it's with a bar of soap, I'm going to make it."

Her soaps contain natural products and are made from scratch. There are no dyes or animal fats, and if animal products such as honey or goat's milk are used, it is in the title so nothing is hidden.

Palm oil is a popular ingredient in soaps but Niemann refuses to use it in hers since the oil palm is grown in the rainforest and she does not condone crops destruction.

She uses herbs from her own garden to scent the soaps such as lemongrass, mint and rosemary.

"I wanted it to smell like the real thing," she said, "not like a chemically recreated scent."

A Thrive Handcrafts soap may cost double that of a bar of Ivory soap, but it is guaranteed to contain natural ingredients as well as support the local economy.

She said if someone buys a bar of her soap at Ward's then she makes money, Ward's makes money and then she ends up spending the money she made at Ward's so it stays in town.

Niemann thinks people are realizing that when you buy locally you can help feed a family on your block.

Niemann is starting to collaborate with local breweries to create a beer soap.

"I laugh at myself sometimes when I act like a bar of soap can change the world," she said. "But in reality I really feel like it can do its part to help."

Wild Onion Press advocates for acceptance of physical differences through book publishing

It has printed 10 books since 2009

It's the first day of elementary school. Some children are scared of letting go of Mom's hand, some are excited to make new friends. Others are anxious about getting their peers to accept their physical differences, which is why novelist Shelley Fraser Mickle started Wild Onion Press.

The Gainesville-based company publishes books starring children with physical differences.

"It is a hard thing to do to try to get the general public to embrace physical differences," Mickle, 68, said. "No one wants to go there."

Mickle had polio as a child and was paralyzed from the waist down, causing her to wear leg braces. While writing about her experiences growing up in her memoir, "The Polio Hole," she realized there was a gap in the publishing world. There were few books featuring children with differences, and through this revelation, Wild Onion Press was born.

"I was pretty outraged when I thought about how few books feature children with physical differences in heroic roles," she said. "They're usually objects of pity. They're objects in which someone comes forward to save them and we need to reverse it."

The company has published 10 books since it was founded in April 2009, the most recent called "The First Day Speech," by Isabelle Hadala. Hadala was born with ectodermal dysplasia, a condition that halts the development of fingers, teeth and toes. On her first day of first grade, Hadala gave a speech to her classmates, encouraging them to "take a good look at her and get over it," as Mickle said.

"So that bravery and that spunk really touched me," Mickle said. "I've held onto that whole idea for a long time."

Mickle could be a character in one of her company's books, turning her polio struggle into a memoir, writing acclaimed novels and now starting Wild Onion Press, an endeavor she's found to be the most rewarding accomplishment.

"I've had a movie made, a

New York Times notable book and all these wonderful things, but none of that has measured up to how this makes me feel," Mickle said. "What I'm doing in this last chapter of my career is giving me more satisfaction than I've ever had."


The publishing company's bestseller, "The Gift of Grace," by Grace Mary McClelland, is about a girl with a congenital hand difference. Another book, "Jason and Elihu," by Mickle, was added to the Just Read, Florida! Summer Reading List.

The books are currently sold in Alachua and Marion county Publix stores. Also Follett, an educational distributor, included the company in its business, a step closer to Mickle's goal to get the books into every school and national public library.

"What we want to do is get into schools where we will make lasting change of the culture, of perceptions of physical differences," Mickle said.

Mickle got to see the change begin in a kindergarten class when she read "The Gift of Grace" to it. There was a 5-year-old girl missing her right hand listening intently to a story about a heroine named Grace just like her.

"You could just see her flower," Mickle said. "By sharing their story they become more than their physical presence. They become the spirit for change."

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Wayward Council closes its doors

The smell of sweat and body odor lingers in the small two-room record store. Boxes are in piles strewn about the floor, and a dusty P.A. system rests in the corner, waiting to be used.

Nonprofit record store and music venue Wayward Council is closing its doors after 14 years.

There will be a farewell show Thursday featuring more than five bands. The event is \$5 and will begin at 9 p.m.

"It kind of ends when it ends," said Gabrielle Keane, a 23-year-old Wayward Council volunteer.

Wayward Council is completely volunteer based — Keane has been involved for about eight months, and there are roughly 15 other volunteers. There is no set schedule. All workers have keys and put their names down on available time slots.

Matt Sweeting, the remaining co-founder, reminisced as he loaded

boxes.

"The first day, I remember there was a line to get in. We had so many people that wanted to shop that we had to give people numbers," he said. "I was sitting there with a core of people, they were all freaking out, and I said 'I told you'."

Wayward's goal is to have everything cleared out by Thursday for the show and be officially out of the space by Monday when keys will be turned in.

The merchandise, which includes books, stickers, magazines, records, patches, tapes, CDs and T-shirts, are being sold and donated throughout the week. The items were a broad range of local art and music, objects from touring bands and older music dating anywhere from the 1960s to the 1990s.

"A lot of things are on the free table, the rest will eventually be donated," said Keane. "Other things


are going to be stored in case there is another project similar to this started, that way there will already be a stock."

Wayward also collected items for Books to Prisoners, an organization that gives donated books to incarcerated residents. Keane said the representative for the organization could not be reached. The accumulation of books will be stored for a month, and if no one claims them the books will be donated to the Friends of the Library.

Keane foresees the show being packed with people coming from out of town and those wanting to be a part of the last show.

"It's going to be cool visually and acoustically to be empty, its never been empty in here before," she said.

Zunino beginning pro career in Single A

SEATTLE — At this point, Mike Zunino just wants to get through the whirlwind of being honored for his college career so his pro career can begin.


It's coming very soon for the Seattle Mariners' latest top prospect.

"It's very surreal," Zunino said. "I've been dreaming about this since I was a little kid and I'm just extremely thrilled to have this opportunity. ... I'm just looking forward to playing and making an impact." The Mariners introduced Zunino on Tuesday, a day after the No. 3 overall pick in June's amateur draft signed his contract with Seattle. And within the next two weeks, Zunino is likely to be making his pro debut playing for Single-A Everett in the Northwest League.

That's a significant change from previous years when it was rare for top prospects to sign in enough time to get shipped off for some schooling in the minors before the end of the season. Changes in the collective bargaining agreement moved up the signing deadline and made locking up draft picks simpler for clubs. The result for Seattle is that Zunino could get about six weeks of minor-league experience that will only help in the process of trying to get him one step closer to the majors.

"You look at the amount of guys we've already signed, the number we had signed in the first week, I do think the new CBA had an awful lot to do with that," general manager Jack Zduriencik said. "In terms of this particular player, Mike he wanted to get out and play. He was like, 'Hey, I'm ready to go. You took me (No.) 3 in the country, I'm ready to start my career.'"

Zunino's trip to Seattle this time was brief and included taking in a

couple of games at what he hopes is his home park someday and signing his contract. He'll be off this weekend to the Golden Spikes Award ceremonies, where Zunino is a finalist for the award given to the top college player. After that comes a trip to the All-Star Game in Kansas City,

Mo.

And that travel is after Zunino has already made a pair of trips to the Midwest to accept the Dick Howser Trophy and Johnny Bench Award for his stellar college career at Florida.

Florida linebacker commit Hearnis eager to return from ACL tear Ejected from FSU camp for doing Gator chomp

Football didn't always come easy for James Hearnis.

The Lincoln (Tallahassee, Fla.) linebacker couldn't find playing time as a young player who preferred the hardwood to the football field.

Hearnis rode the bench as one of the youngest players on his team due to his weight.

It all changed once he suited for the Lincoln Trojans.

"When I got to Lincoln and played, that's when I started to realize I had a chance," he said.

Hearnis transformed into an Army All-American nominee and a state champion.

Although the 6-foot-3, 260-pound behemoth tore his left ACL eight months ago, he participated in summer 7-on-7 tournaments with Lincoln and can't wait for his senior season.

"I can't even explain it," Hearnis said. "I'm just so ready to get back out there. I feel like it's been too long."

While Hearnis expects his Lincoln team, loaded with prospects such as four-star wide receivers Reggie Davis and Taj Williams, to finish undefeated, the rising senior has even higher expectations for the Florida 2013 recruiting class.

"You could be that class and come in

and make an impact," Hearnis said.

"To bring this program back to national status would be something that would stick with you for a lifetime. You could be responsible for bringing in the next national championship."

It's not all about football for the outspoken future Gator who took into account more than just the opportunity to play in the Southeastern Conference.

"I like the fact that [UF] is not just known for athletics, but it is known academically too," Hearnis said. "Once you graduate and actually have to get a job in the real world

While Randall wrapped up the season by leading the Gators in wins, catcher Zunino ended his junior season leading the team with a .322 batting average. Zunino also led the team in doubles (28), homeruns (19), RBI (67) and slugging percentage (.669). In 2011, Zunino also led the Gators in batting average (.371) and led the SEC in total bases (178), hits (98), runs (75), doubles (23) and homers (19). During 2011, Randall turned in an 11-3 record and ranked fifth in the SEC with a 2.17 ERA with 73 strikeouts and 13 walks.

So, due to my constantly buffering MLB.TV feed and Chipper's physical predicaments, I have enjoyed my favorite ballplayer in small doses this summer.

A walk-off home run in a 15-13 Braves win against the Phillies on May 2. Chipper's 5-for-5 line against the Cubs on Tuesday.

However, barring a major injury, base hits and home runs will come off Chipper's bat several more times before the season is over. But when National League manager Tony La Russa added Chipper to the All-Star team Tuesday afternoon, I got a little choked up.

This is it for Larry Wayne Jones, Jr. Chipper will suit up for his final All-Star Game in the only MLB city he has never visited as a player — Kansas City, Mo. — July 10.

I'm sure I will get this emotional again when the Braves play the Mets in New York for the final time (Laaaaaarry!) and when I go to Chipper's home finale at Turner Field on Sept. 30.

In the end, I will be happy.

Countless careers conclude in injury, the minor leagues or on waiver wires, and it's simply unfortunate. Unlike Billy Heywood, I get to see my baseball hero leave the game with his head held high.

The Braves are in the playoff hunt, and Chipper is a major contributor to the effort. Atlanta is 27-19 when the 40-year-old third baseman laces up his cleats and plays.

Chipper is getting the Hall-of-Fame victory lap — including several touching tributes in opposing team's ballparks — he deserves in his final season. Sure, I could tell Mr. Jones that I wouldn't trade his baseball card for one million Wade Boggs cards, but that just wouldn't be fair.

Another World Series title excluded, there's already enough icing on the cake.

Zunino hasn't played since June 18 when the Gators were eliminated from the College World Series and the break — despite all the travel — has been welcome. Zunino played 66 games his junior season for the Gators and hit .322 with 19 homers and 67 RBIs. The homers and RBIs are equal to his sophomore season when Zunino was the Southeastern Conference player of the year.

It'll be about a month between his final game with the Gators and his likely debut in the Mariners farm system. "It's exciting to know there is room for advancement but that is up to these guys here and to myself. I need to go out and play well and prove to them that I'm capable of playing at the highest level," Zunino said.

Zduriencik is not putting a timeline on how quickly Zunino will be moved through the Mariners farm system. Seattle has a history of struggling to find catchers in the draft, either giving up on them too soon (Jason Varitek) or having them bust (former first-round pick Jeff Clement).

Zunino was just the third catcher ever taken in the first round by the Mariners.

"That is the most challenging position on the field. ... The thing we really liked about this particular player is he has all those other types of skills it takes," Zduriencik said. "He's a good receiver, he's smart, he's intelligent, he called his own game in college. His college coaches had great confidence in him so from our standpoint we think he's going to be a little more advanced."

being a UF graduate doesn't look too bad on your resume."

He committed to the Gators in February, but his potential journey to Gainesville took a comical turn last month when he grabbed national headlines while at a football camp at hometown Florida State.

Hearns announced via his Twitter (@JamesHearns21) on June 16: "I just got ejected for throwing up the gator chomp at Fsu camp."

The Gator chomp and tweet created a media firestorm, which surprised Hearns, but taught him a lesson.

"When I initially tweeted that, I never meant for any of that to happen," he said.

This Florida commit is ready to put the recruiting process behind him and prepare for Gainesville.

"You can just focus on yourself as a person and as a team, which really helps a lot to get stuff together your senior year before you're off in the real world by yourself."


Hearns plans on visiting the Gators' Friday Night Lights camp July 27.
