**FAMU president out after scandals**

Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University President James Ammons resigned Wednesday following a hazing death and several other issues.

FAMU drum major Robert Champion, 26, died in November after being beaten by his bandmates in a hazing ritual.

It was later discovered that more than 100 members of the band weren't FAMU students. Other problems the university has lately faced are an investigation of fraud in the band's finances and issues with accreditation and graduation rates, according to Alligator archives.

Parents, students and administrators have been calling for Ammons' resignation for months. In June, he received a

vote of no confidence from FAMU's Board of Trustees.

Ammons will officially leave his position Oct. 11.

"I am determined to move all of the major challenges toward resolution and move our university toward success," he wrote in a letter to FAMU's Board of Trustees. "When the next president experiences her or his transition in, she or he will very likely find additional challenges, albeit not nearly to the extent of that which I faced at the outset, or those I am now facing."

Board of Governors chairman Dean Colson said in a statement that the Board of Governors has committed to assist FAMU's Board of Trustees in resolving those issues.

**UF journalism and music library collections moving**  
*Budget cuts forced the libraries to close*

Budget cuts will force Library West to absorb the collections of two other libraries that are closing.

Collections from the Allen H. Neuharth Journalism and Communications Library, which is already closed, will be housed in the six-story facility by fall.

The Music Library will close in January. There is no projected completion date for moving its collection into Library West.

LeiLani Freund, a reference librarian at Library West, said the library administration is already preparing for the shift. Library staffers are currently allocating space on each floor for the collections.

The collections will be assimilated into normal library circulation based on the call numbers, Freund said. However, cir-

ulation records and online catalog information will need to be changed.

She said the project is extensive, so Library West may be hiring temporary employees or work study students if the budget allows.

The journalism library was closed for renovations at the end of Spring semester.

"We expected the library to open again after the renovations, but due to the budget cuts it was closed down permanently," Freund said.

The project should not affect student mobility or concentration during library hours, she said.

**CRC's retired director, mentor Wayne Wallace dies at 66**

For more than 20 years, Wayne Wallace helped build the UF Career Resource Center from the ground up to become one of the best university career service centers in the nation.

After he became the center's director in 1990, Wallace helped job-seeking students connect with companies and helped move the center from its original office in the Reitz Union basement to a first-floor suite. He retired in January 2011.

In early June, Wallace underwent what was supposed to be a routine surgery for diverticulitis, a digestive disease found in the large intestine. Doctors instead found pancreatic cancer.

On Tuesday morning, Wallace died from complications with the cancer at Shands Cancer Hospital at UF. He was 66 years old.

Friends and coworkers described Wallace as a "natural leader" and a mentor.

"He loved his employment, he loved his purpose at the university, and he loved his employees," said Grant Thrall,

a retired UF business geography professor and a close friend to Wallace. "Most importantly, he loved what he was doing for students."

The Alligator was not able to reach Wallace's wife.

Born in Chicago, Wallace grew up in Hammond, Ind., with his three siblings and parents, who were both deaf, Thrall said.

In 1972, Wallace first began working in career services when he became an assistant director of career planning and placement at Miami University in Ohio.

He later started working as the director of Indiana Uni-

MENLO PARK, Calif. — A California yoga instructor has been fired for her disapproving stink-eye glare at a Facebook employee using a cellphone in class.

Alice Van Ness, who was hired to teach hour-long yoga sessions at Facebook's Menlo Park campus, says she tells students before class to turn off their cellphones.

But a female employee pulled

The San Jose Mercury News says Van Ness didn't say anything, but she gave the student what she calls a look of disapproval.

The student later complained and Van Ness was fired by Plus One Health Management.

The termination letter says Van Ness "made a spectacle" of the student.

## Raccoons chase, attack Washington state woman

LAKEWOOD, Wash. — A Washington state woman says she was attacked and bitten by raccoons after her dog chased several of the animals up a tree.

Michaela Lee had just finished jogging in Lakewood's Fort Steilacoom Park on Monday when her dog got loose. When she went to grab the dog's leash, several other raccoons started to scratch her legs, chased her for about 75 feet, knocked her down and bit her.

Neighbor Michael Parks tells The News Tribune he heard Lee screaming and saw her on the ground. He called 911. Two other neighbors also went to help. Lee says her American dingo dog began barking and helped drive the raccoons off.

The 28-year-old Lee was treated for about 16 puncture wounds and had numerous scratches.

## Wash. man pleads not guilty in dead cat claim

TACOMA, Wash. — A Washington state man charged with insurance fraud after authorities say he used photos from the Internet to file a \$20,000 insurance claim for a dead cat that didn't exist has pleaded not guilty.

KOMO News reports that during a court hearing Wednesday, a trial for 29-year-old Yevgeniy Samsonov of Tacoma was scheduled to begin in September.

Samsonov was involved in a minor traffic accident in 2009, and the other driver's insurer paid some \$3,500 to cover chiropractic treatment. More than two years later, Samsonov claimed that his cat Tom had

been killed in the crash, and he sought \$20,000 in compensation.

Authorities say Samsonov submitted photos of a cat, but an insurance representative found that the pictures had come from the Internet.

If convicted, Samsonov could get a year behind bars.

## Man accidentally eats steel bristle during BBQ

TACOMA, Wash. — A Tacoma man needed emergency surgery after accidentally eating a steel bristle from a grill brush he used during a barbecue.

KING 5 reports that Adam Wojtanowicz went to the hospital Sunday complaining of abdominal pain that wouldn't go away despite his taking medication. Doctors found a metal bristle on a CT scan and performed surgery to get it out.

Wojtanowicz says he recently hosted a cookout, and he thinks a steel bristle from his grill brush fell onto his steak. He says he apparently swallowed the metal without realizing it.

The Centers for Disease Control says it knows of at least six people who have recently suffered similar, potentially fatal, injuries. It doesn't blame a particular brand or type of brush.

Wojtanowicz is expected to recover.

## 'Boared' piggy goes to bank in Austria

VIENNA — Piggy bank has a new meaning in a town east of Vienna after a surveillance camera caught a wild pig on a night foray to a local branch of one of Austria's financial institutions.

The Austria Press Agency reports that the inquisitive porker managed to push open a locked sliding glass door of a bank in Hainburg an der Donau to make its way inside. After looking around, it left the same way it came without causing significant damage, with the door locking behind it.

APA, in its report Wednesday, said bank officials became suspicious last month after a member of the early morning cleaning staff noticed large smear marks on the door. A review of surveillance footage identified the unusual visitor.

# Gainesville man looking for volunteers for local project

► HE HOPES TO END CHILD HUNGER IN GAINESVILLE.

Somewhere in Gainesville, there is a child too hungry to pay attention to the teacher standing in the front of the classroom.

His tummy is rumbling and his throat is dry. His eyes are fixed, but he isn't listening. He can't seem to erase the big potato chip on the canvas of his imagination.

His mother works 40 hours a week and he doesn't see his dad too often. Mommy doesn't always have time to pack a lunch. They don't always have food.

He sees the other kids with their lunchboxes and considers the unimaginable: steal or starve.

Gainesville humanitarian Dennis "DiscoDen" Franklin said he believes there are more than 300 children just like the one he described, in Gainesville and the surrounding region, fighting for survival.

These children continually motivate him to keep managing the Neighborhood Project, a one-man community restoration project built to make a difference in the lives of local families and individuals.

Franklin is looking for undergraduate and graduate student volunteers, graphic designers, student organizations and anyone with compassion who can help him operate and build on the programs within the Neighborhood Project.

Volunteers are invited to stop by the project's headquarters at The Bazaar, 1620 SE Hawthorne Road. It's open from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday through Friday.

With volunteer help, Franklin said he could spend more time communicating with major sponsors in order to finance programs for the Neighborhood Project.

Current sponsors include Best Buy Co. Inc., Walgreen Co., PepsiCo Inc., Coca-Cola Co., Big Lots and Big Brothers Big Sisters of Mid-Florida, of which Franklin is a board member.

"These people need help," he

said. "White, black, old or young, they all need help."

Franklin's objective is to raise people's attitudes from pessimism to hope.

He said people constantly focus on what they don't have or that they are living from paycheck to paycheck. They complain about how unemployment is about to run out, among other things.

Franklin said he is looking for a change in mentality. He hopes to provide all the resources necessary to do so.

"There is too much gimmie-gimmie in society," he said. "You can't depend on the government forever. At some point, you're going to have to get up and make things happen on your own. That is what I want to get to people."

Included in the Neighborhood Project is HOUSING4FAMILIES, a program for helping very low-income families, the elderly, veterans and the disabled to afford decent, safe and sanitary housing in the private market, said Bruce Wilson, customer relations specialist at The

Bazaar.

The project offers a job training and employment program that trains individuals for employment and places them in livable-wage jobs, he said.

Also featured are financial literacy workshops, talent searches, health and fitness training, an after-school program, a mentoring program and a neighborhood food bank.

"We are all slaves to habits. Peoples' minds need to be reprogrammed," he said. "If we are slaves to habits, why not teach people to be slaves to good habits?"

The food bank operates out of The Bazaar. The bank strives to ensure that individuals' and families' basic needs are met with fresh meats, fish, fruits and vegetables, Wilson said.

Franklin said he has seen a variety of demographics visit the food bank. He said the group that frequents the bank the most has been "the poor middle-class resident."

These people reside mostly in low socioeconomic neighborhoods, have housing and jobs, but are still

barely making enough to support themselves and their families, he said.

The food bank has served more than 2,600 residents in the last two months, Franklin said. Some have been recent college graduates having a hard time getting a job.

"I want to show people how to be successful. It's a step-by-step procedure," Franklin said. "The more you help others, the more you help yourself."

# Music professor sells jewelry

Kristen Stoner isn't in your face asking if you're registered to vote or handing out fliers. People just come to her.

On the Reitz Union Colonnade, Stoner's orange and blue jewelry creations catch the eyes of sneakered parents dangling canvas Preview totes, a man in a tie eating a Burger King Whopper and students in sunglasses sipping on Starbucks.

Stoner, 39, said she makes about \$500 a day selling homemade jewelry at the Reitz. Summer is prime time because of all the parents on campus.

This time, her profits go to the UF flute ensemble she advises as a professor in the School of Music. But on gamedays at the United Downtown festival

and other events, she keeps the money.

She's not bored sitting at a table from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. She can always play Words with Friends on her iPhone. It's the wind that gets on her nerves.

The wind blows over a wooden across the walkway and flaps Stoner's black velvet tablecloth. The earrings make a light clinking sound.

Her beads and trinkets, tiny metal gators and anchors and music notes, plastic dice and peace signs, feathers, glass beads and colored stones, are imported from Asia and South America, Stoner said.

Stoner's display of 600 pieces has taken time to collect. Some of them she made last night, and some she crafted two or three years ago.

"You made all of these?" customers ask.

"I know, I know," Stoner said, her blue eyes rolling behind her red-framed glasses. "Crazy."

# Norman Hall will get touch-screen classroom

UF's College of Education will launch a new cutting-edge classroom in hopes of bringing education into the 21st century.

Room 2309 in Norman Hall will be made over with state-of-the-art educational technology by summer 2013.

The college received a \$141,000 grant from UF's Office of Academic Technology supported by student technology fees.

Touch-screen SMART interactive whiteboards will complement the standard dry-erase boards.

Seven mobile media pods outfitted with iPads or laptop computers will facilitate classroom group work.

The classroom's media pods will connect to a large screen, allowing students to share their individual screens on 40-inch monitors at each end of the classroom.

"The importance is not the technology, but how you use technology to model 21st century skills of collaboration, problem

solving, creativity, research and critical thinking," said Suzanne Colvin, associate director of teacher education in the School of Teaching and Learning.

Incorporating student input into the educational process will empower students and increase their willingness to learn, she said.

Lauren Vivar, a 21-year-old elementary education senior, said the use of technology is essential in today's world.

"Students are much more likely to participate when technology is involved," she said. "The classroom will also give learners another way to gather new information."

Vivar said she believes teachers need to know how to use technology, and the new classroom will help equip future teachers with the right skills for when they go into the school system.

Colvin said she hopes the re-invented classroom will serve as a prototype for other departments at UF.

"The ultimate goal for the classroom would be to function as a model for how to improve instruction and increase active learning on the part of students all over campus," she said.

# UF study finds alcohol to be gateway to more substance use

A UF study has found evidence that alcohol is the primary gateway drug that can result in use of more dangerous substances.

Alcohol can be the first step toward substance use, said Adam Barry, an assistant professor and researcher in the College of Health and Human Performance.

"By preventing alcohol initiation, we can prevent initiation into other substances," he said.

The UF study was based on data from a separate 2008 Monitoring the Future

study. Information collected from 14,577 U.S. high school seniors was used to determine if they had used any of 11 regulated and illicit drugs.

Barry said UF researchers made the correlation between alcohol and other drug use by using a Guttman scale with survey respondents. For each of the 11 drugs the students had used, they were given one point on the 11-point scale.

The researchers were then able to predict what drugs each student had used based only on their score and how common use of each drug was.

"A student that scored three points would have probably used alcohol, ciga-

rettes and marijuana," Barry said. "We found that we were able to predict responses with about 92 percent accuracy."

According to the Monitoring the Future study, more than 70 percent of the 12th-grade students surveyed reported consuming alcohol.

According to GatorWell Health Promotion Services' Core Alcohol and Drug Survey from Fall 2011, 80.2 percent of the UF

students surveyed consumed alcohol in the past year.

"There is usually an initial experimentation with more socially acceptable drugs," Barry said. "You're not going to go to a bar and see someone shooting up heroin."

The study also found that students who drink can be 16 times more likely to use regulated and illicit substances.

Barry said the study's findings could be used by parents and grade schools to prevent illicit substance use. He supports a zero-tolerance policy toward alcohol.

"The longer you can fend off alcohol use, the longer you can fend off the use of other substances," he said.

versity Bloomington's career resource center in 1977.

In 1990, former UF president John Lombardi offered Wallace a director position for career ser-

vices at UF, which he accepted after some persuasion by Lombardi, Thrall said.

During his time as director, Wallace led the center to its ranking of No. 1 and No. 4 on The Princeton Review's annual "Best

Career Services" list for 2010 and 2011, respectively.

Heather White, who worked with Wallace for seven years before replacing him as the new center director in 2011, described Wallace as a man with a playful sense of humor, intelligence and a drive to inspire his staff to become leaders.

"He wanted the career center to be the best, and in order for the career service to be the best, we needed to be the best," she said.

White added that under Wallace's direction, she and 14 other former staff members have gone on to become directors of career resource centers at universities across the United States, including the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Purdue University and Carnegie Mellon University.

Shortly before retiring, Wallace was inducted into the National Association of Colleges and Employers' Academy of Fellows, which has selected fewer than 30 members nationally since 1994.

Apart from his staff, White said Wallace cared about helping students find jobs and better their futures.

Thrall said Wallace's involvement with Career Showcase, a job fair held at the Stephen C.

O'Connell Center, has helped expose thousands of students to internship and job opportunities each spring and fall.

Wallace has also worked with the Gainesville Area Chamber of Commerce to connect students with opportunities to work in the city.

"He was very supportive of connecting the university to the local community and especially for internships," White said.

Outside the office, Wallace was known to be an automobile and motorcycle enthusiast.

Growing up near factories outside of Chicago, Wallace's interest flourished. When he was 16 years old, Wallace purchased his first motorcycle, a 1962 Harley-Davidson XLCH Sportster, Thrall said.

Thrall and Wallace often participated in weekend motorcycle rides with UF faculty and administrators.

On the road, Wallace drove his electric blue 2007 Harley-Davidson Street Glide while wearing a black helmet with checkered stripes racing down the center, which distinguished him from the pack, Thrall said.

Wallace also owned an orange 2007 Chevrolet C6 Corvette, re-

flecting his joint passion for automobiles and UF.

Wallace was an avid traveler who often went on extensive trips with his wife, Victoria.

White said Wallace's experience with traveling led him to organize an exchange program with career resource center staff members at UF and the University of Leeds in England.

"For us to be able to travel and see how career centers run in other countries and to also helping students to be global-minded was something that [Wallace] definitely supported because he traveled so much," she said.

As part of Wallace's request, there will not be a funeral.

His remains will be taken to his home in Indiana, leaving behind a legacy that made UF's center a leader in the field of career services.

"I don't know if he realized how much of an impact he left in the field and on people's lives," White said.

"I think that's something that a lot of people strive to do in their careers and their lives," she said. "He was able to do that."

## Obama still to blame for state of economy

After reading the response column by UF alumnus William Deich maintaining that President Obama was not responsible for the state of the economy, I wanted to make a few things clear.

First, I didn't accuse Obama of causing every problem he faces — I accused him of making things worse through his utter incompetence at his job. There is a distinct difference.

Next, Deich asserts that the economy is actually the fault of Speaker of the House John Boehner, who ascended to the Speakership after the 2010 midterm elections.

To address this claim, consider the fact that Obama's stimulus plan was projected by his own White House Council of Economic Advisers to have brought the unemployment rate below 6 percent by now. This same body also projected that by simply doing nothing and allowing markets to absorb their losses, the unemployment number would likewise have fallen below 6 percent.

Instead, unemployment continued to skyrocket. Despite entering office with a bulletproof Democratic supermajority, Democratic possession of both houses of Congress and colossal personal popularity ratings, the economy still managed to nosedive beyond expectations under Obama's stewardship.

Boehner actually became the speaker of the house in a historic sweep as a direct result of the American people's displeasure at the failure of Obama's policies. The fact that the president was lampooned for sheepishly joking that his stimulus jobs "weren't so shovel-ready after all" speaks volumes in this regard.

The notion that the president can institute better employment through "jobs bills" is a political sleight of hand fooling only the naïve. His bill, the American Jobs Act, requires supporters to be willfully blind to the economic realities of small business ownership.

For instance, the provisions in sections 101 and 102, which provide temporary tax breaks and temporary tax credits to employers in exchange for permanently hiring new workers, are laughable. No employer can afford to invest permanently

on the basis of temporary incentives. Employment will take place only when the gains from doing so exceed the costs of the taxes and regulations of the deal. Still, Obama seems clueless as to how this actually makes the situation more tenuous for employers and actually discourages more hiring.

And what about the Simpson-Bowles Commission on Fiscal Responsibility and Reform, the bipartisan panel instituted by the president himself to find economic solutions and whose recommendations were all rejected by the president out of hand? Why form the commission at all? Under Obama, our national debt has increased by \$5 trillion. To put this into perspective, supposing Christ was born in 3 B.C., and that year you began spending \$1 million daily, you still wouldn't reach \$1 trillion until the year 2736. How is this responsible?

Finally, there is the matter of campaign and fundraising travel expenses. Deich asserts that Obama has reimbursed more for campaign travel than Bush did. This is highly misleading. Although the Obama campaign has reimbursed the taxpayers to the tune of \$1.5 million for some campaign-related travel, the White House has made an end run around Government Accountability Office complaints by stating that if one leg of a trip is official business, then making campaign stops in three additional states along the way is perfectly acceptable, as recorded in USA Today on April 26.

For a president who likes to wag his finger in the faces of CEOs, he is certainly eager to mobilize apologists to protect him from responsibility for his own pathetic executive performance. I, for one, am getting pretty tired of hearing how "the buck stops ... uh, over there." Aren't you?

# HIV home testing kits to become available

HIV tests with quicker results will soon become available for adults to take home.

The Food and Drug Administration approved OraQuick Rapid HIV test kit, a self-administered HIV test. The test will be available to people 17 and older by October.

The over-the-counter kit collects an oral fluid sample by swabbing the upper and lower gums, according to an FDA press release. Users can expect results within 20 to 40 minutes.

Gay Koehler-Sides, a senior human services program manager from the Alachua County Health Department, said she thinks the take-home test is important because it gives people who are afraid to go to their doctor or clinic the option to take the test in the privacy of their own homes.

"Even though we still offer anonymous testing in the state, there are still people who are afraid," Koehler-Sides said.

As simple and easy as it sounds, the new test comes with its share of problems.

Studies on OraQuick found it has a 92 percent test sensitivity of detecting when HIV is present and positive, but has one false negative result out of every 12 tests and one false positive result in every 5,000 tests, according to the press release.

"It's not as sensitive as other testing technology that we have available so we may have some people out there who think they're not infected when they truly are," Koehler-Sides said.

She also stressed the importance of understanding the "window period" when taking any HIV test.

Koehler-Sides said the antibodies formed by the virus take up to three months to develop and a person who is recently tested after having intercourse will not know if they are infected until the time period is over.

Samantha Evans, a sexual health educator with UF GatorWell Health Promotion Services, said she thinks it's important people are educated on the three month "window period" and know that support services are available to people who might be distraught after learning their results at home.

## The Jones Eastside is expanding, opening new location downtown

After two years of growing pains, repairs and making accommodations, the locally owned restaurant The Jones Eastside is expanding with a new location in the downtown area.

A bit south and slightly west of the original, the new restaurant will call 203 SW Second Ave. home, where the building's past two tenants Fyre Grill and Agave Blue only remained a short time. It is slated to open in mid-August.

Maya Garner, co-owner and general manager, said the main reason for the expansion is lack of space and proper infrastructure at the Northeast 23rd Avenue location, which seats about 30 to 34 people.

Co-owner and husband Tree Garner said the new location will seat four to five times more than that, and although the hours may slightly change, the original location will remain open.

The idea of expanding has been in their minds for a couple of years — ever since they were forced to rent extra space on Main Street in order to handle the volume of food going through the kitchen.

In addition to more space and shorter waits, patrons can expect more live music, a full bar and an emphasis

on early weekend brunches.

"It will become more of a multi-purpose place where you can bring your computer to do work and get coffee, eat lunch or dinner, and then come back later for drinks," Maya Garner said.

The Eastside story is simple. Six years ago, the Garners set out to build a place that reflected their philosophy on life and food — somewhere they would want their new daughter to eat. What resulted was a restaurant with the goal of providing affordable, local, organic food rather than meeting profit margins and increasing revenue.

"I'm not sure we even know how restaurants are supposed to be done," Tree Garner said of he and Maya Garner. "There is no one formula fits all, but what we are doing seems to be working."

Tree Garner said many of their clients are shared with other locally owned businesses and restaurants, none of which he has ever seen as competition. In fact, he wouldn't mind if there was one giant place all Gainesville's local businesses could share.

Despite the addition, Maya Garner said this expansion is not about change. "People love The Jones for what it is, and we're not trying to reinvent ourselves."

All over the country, small organic companies worry about this. Their nightmare is coming true.

But Pryor thinks it's a blessing.

"People that didn't do organic before are looking more toward eating better for their family."

organic without government approval.

The process starts out with soil that is certified free of any pesticides and fertilizers. Organic meat and dairy products are also produced in the same way. Animals are raised naturally and never fed antibiotics or other quick-producing hormones.

It is very expensive and takes years to acquire the USDA seal.

"I think it's easier to deceive the customer," said Kathy Markey, the assistant manager at Sunflower Health Foods. "If you don't have [the seal], then it's questionable."

On the other hand, Pryor said she believes name brands that promote organic food will expand the whole movement.

"A lot of people like name recognition," she said.

If popularity can cause more organic farming to occur, then prices will be able to come down. Eating healthy can be quite pricey.

Big name companies could help cheapen and produce more organic products for Americans if done in the proper way.

However, most food products are made of genetically modified organisms. This could compromise the integrity of the organic product if name-brand companies introduce this into the organic world.

From organic restaurants, stores and even ice cream shops, the organic movement has made its mark in Gainesville.

"Gainesville does a nice job trying to keep it more plentiful for everybody," Markey said. "I think that's something all around the United States. People are trying to go back to the roots and get that good, organic food."





# Gainesville man uses website to raise funds for producing movie

## Filming will occur in various locations in Fla.

Picture this, you start a fundraiser. In 15 days you raise \$4,500, but you set your goal at \$9,600. If you don't raise the full \$9,600, you get nothing, zero, goose egg.

This is how the website Kickstarter works. It refers to itself as a "crowd funding website for creative projects." The projects must meet certain guidelines before launch. The creator chooses a deadline and sets a minimum goal for funds to raise, but the catch is that Kickstarter runs on an all-or-nothing basis.

Backers can donate money at any time, free of charges until the end date, provided the goal is met.

This has had R.H. "Chip" Norman on the edge of his seat for the past 17 days.

Norman, an UF alumnus, is writing, directing and producing a short film depicting a true story about his great grandfather — a miner in the U.S. phosphate industry during the 1940s who became upset when a young white man in his crew was replaced by a black man.

"When your aunt tells you as a child that your great grandfather was an illiterate, third grade educated-racist and very mean spirited man who victimized someone, that sticks with you," Norman said.

The film, "Mulberry," is set to be about 10 to 15 minutes long and is being filmed in Gainesville and various locations in Polk County. The actual events happened in Mulberry.

Norman is keeping the punchline a se-

cret, but it will touch on racism in the south and show the point of view of a poor black miner who is taunted by his co-workers.

Norman has hopes to turn this into a feature film. Once completed he is entering it in festivals around the country.

The principal cast will have five to six people, including local musician Wester Joseph, who will be making his on-screen debut in Billy Bob Thornton's film, "Jayne Mansfield's Car" this fall.

Other actors involved are Ron Clinton Smith, Larry Weeks, Letecia Clark and Jason Hedges, lead singer of local band Heavy Petty, a Tom Petty cover group.

"We're telling a deep south epic in 15 minutes," said Norman.

Joseph is passionate about this film due to his rearing in the South. He will be playing Clarence Barnes the protagonist in 'Mulberry.'

"People were worried that I would be offended that in this story the 'n word' might be used. I am not worried about that.

That is life; life has taught me that can happen at any moment."

Following a successful Kickstarter campaign, the crew hopes to start filming the first week of August. Kickstarter can hold funds for 19 days, hence the short time frame for the film's fundraiser.

"\$9,600 is our budget down to a dollar," Norman said. "We need people to support us. Any amount of money will help, and if you don't have money, simply help spread


the word."

Donations merit prizes from the film's crew. The pledges range from \$1 to \$4,000 and prizes include a copy of the film, personalized "thank you" video messages, a list of the best films of all time, signed

movie posters and scripts, a walk on role in the film and fossils from the phosphate mine.

"Mulberry" was selected as a staff pick by Kickstarter and is on the front page of the website. The project ends Monday at 1:39 p.m.

## South Florida Express squad producing top football talent

Brett Goetz didn't mean to create a football juggernaut. He just wanted to help the kids in his community.

The creator of the elite 7-on-7 team, the South Florida Express, started the squad in 2007 after bringing back a youth tackle football program in South Beach.

Goetz never played football, but the UF graduate and financial advisor volunteered with a Miami Beach organization. The opportunity to service the community was enough.

"My wife and other people around me said, 'Why are you doing this? It's such a pain. You don't have a kid involved.' The truth is, it became more about helping these

kids," Goetz said. "Keeping kids off the street, teaching them life skills and basic things from shaking hands the correct way to a lot of different things like communicating with people whether it's your coaches, your teachers, your parents."

Five years later, after starting with 40 players at its first tryout attracted 200-plus players and 40 media members at the last audition Feb. 4.

Goetz attributes the attention surrounding the team to the tackle football league where he built relationships with local sports writers, which culminated in Scout.com asking him to start the Express.

"I didn't realize it, but I did know I had the media contacts to

reach out. Year by year it has grown on its own."

Even former NFL stars like Sam Madison, Samari Rolle and Patrick Surtain help coach the players in tournaments and practices.

"We actually have guys now that can bring stuff to the table in so many ways," Goetz said. "Even [the current players'] parents tell me that the stuff they have picked up are so absolutely invaluable to

their football careers."

Express defensive back and Florida offer Jamal Carter added, "It feels great to have them, because they've been where I want to go to," Carter said. "That helps me out

a lot. Anything they tell me I listen to them."

Football is only one aspect for the Express. The team travels together and builds lasting relationships on the road — sometimes at each other's expense. Carter and his teammates tweet pictures of sleeping teammates during bus rides up the state.

These players are going through the same recruiting process, which Goetz sees as a bonding tool.

"What makes it unique is it's not just the tournaments and the playing," he said. "It's more about the camaraderie that we build with the program and our kids."

Express alumni like West Virginia quarterback Geno Smith, former Ohio State running back Jaamal Berry and former USC linebacker Frankie Telfort continue their relationships five years after playing with the team.

Other teams have sprouted up in recent years to compete with the Express. Team Tampa with Florida targets Vernon Hargreaves III and Leon McQuay III defeated the Express Elite team 24-18 at the IMG Madden Football 7-on-7 National Championship earlier this month.

Goetz brought two teams to the IMG national championship, which featured wide receiver Jordan Cunningham who holds a Florida offer.

Current Gators wide receiver Quinton Dunbar and defensive back Jabari Gorman suited up for the Express in years past.

It's been five years since Goetz created the South Florida Express. His daughter is now 6-years-old.

Although he has one child of his own, Goetz has impacted the lives of South Florida kids for years.



Cro. However, the Bulldogs return starting quarterback Aaron Murray — the best quarterback in the SEC — and lost only two starters on defense. When the 2012 SEC Championship Game pops up on the schedule, Georgia will be saying, "Ock, ohem, oktei, weis, Atlanta." Yes, that was another *John Carter* reference.

## Lewis, Allen headline free agent signees, Howard talks quiet

The Miami Heat got two more shooters. The Orlando Magic, at least for now, are keeping their center.

A flurry of deals were completed Wednesday and another one was put on hold on the first day contracts could be signed in the NBA.

Ray Allen and Rashard Lewis inked their deals with the NBA champions, who will rely on their perimeter accuracy to create more space on the floor for LeBron James and Dwyane Wade.

The Knicks completed a sign-and-trade to bring Marcus Camby to New York. But there's no deal for the best big man of them all in the NBA.

The Magic can't find an agreement they like for All-Star center Dwight Howard, who has asked for a trade to Brooklyn. The Magic have tried to accommodate, only to find nothing from the Nets that fit their desires.

"We've had discussions with Brooklyn, we've had discussions with a host of different teams about a host of different issues. And the answer is, yes we're still talking to them," Magic general manager Rob Hennigan said. "We're still looking to do whatever it is that puts us in the best position from a sustainability standpoint, (and) from a strategic standpoint.

"...Currently as they stand I think the parameters that we've talked about are a little bit in a stationary position. And currently as it's constructed I'm not sure there's really anything to discuss."

Free agency opened July 1 and

teams were able to begin signing players at 12:01 a.m. EDT Wednesday. Deron Williams got a quick start, signing his five-year, \$98 million extension with the Nets while in Las Vegas for the U.S. Olympic team's training camp right after the window opened.

Even though he hasn't been able to get Howard, Nets general manager Billy King kept Williams, traded

for All-Star guard Joe Johnson, kept starting forward Gerald Wallace and will likely do the same with center Brook Lopez.

"Billy's done a good job of making some big moves and it makes us relevant again," Williams said. "Just the move to Brooklyn itself, being in New York, makes things better."

Things are looking up for another longtime lowly team, the Los Ange-

les Clippers. Blake Griffin wanted to be a part of it, signing a five-year extension that could play him about \$95 million.

"It's exciting and that was the goal from day one, to start building something and not just fall into the history of the program," Griffin said, "and I think we've done a good job of turning the ship in the right direction."

Allen decided to leave one good

situation for another, taking less money from the Heat. With he and Lewis, Miami will have options all over the floor.

"You've got to double-team LeBron. You have to double-team Dwyane Wade. You've got to double-team Chris Bosh. And then you think they're going to leave Ray Allen open?" Lewis said. "They've got to leave somebody open. So I have to go shoot a million jumpers tonight and be ready to knock them down."

Another good 3-point shooter, Ryan Anderson, has a new home. After leading the league in 3-pointers made last season and winning the NBA's Most Improved Player award, he was dealt by the Magic to New Orleans for Mexican Gustavo Ayon.

The Hornets have three days to decide if they want Eric Gordon to play with Anderson. He signed an offer sheet in Phoenix for four years and \$58 million, but New Orleans has three days to match the deal for the restricted free agent.

Amid all the dealing, there was no chance Tim Duncan was going anywhere. Terms were not disclosed, though Yahoo Sports cited anonymous sources in reporting the 36-year-old forward got a three-year, \$36 million deal from the Spurs.

"Duncan has established himself as one of the best players in NBA history," coach Gregg Popovich said. "He is an unselfish superstar who loves to compete and has only one goal when he steps on the court — to do whatever it takes to help his team win. We are all thrilled that he'll spend his entire career as a San Antonio Spur."

game, good enough for third in the country. Defensive end Jadeveon Clowney will make his way into a starting role and prove why he was the No. 1 overall recruit two years ago. Off the bench last season, he was responsible for 12 tackles behind the line, including eight sacks, including one against Georgia that forced a fumble returned for a touchdown, which ultimately was the winning touchdown. I hear Murray has been afraid of clowns ever since.

**Joe:** Everybody is afraid of clowns, but Clowney won't scare Murray. The Bulldogs signal-caller is a bona fide Heisman Trophy candidate this season, and that is the truth. During his sophomore season, Murray led the SEC with 35 touchdown passes and ranked second with 3,149 yards through the air. With another year of experience under his belt, Georgia will be just fine offensively. Granted, UGA lost three of its five starting offensive linemen from 2011, but with a calm, collected Murray at the helm, they should be fine. However, as much talent as Murray boasts in the Bulldogs backfield, Georgia's defense will be the reason for its second straight trip to the SEC Championship Game. As I said before, the unit that ranked fifth in the nation — not too far behind third-place South Carolina — in total defense (277.2 yards per game) last season only loses two starters compared to the Game-

cocks' five. Defensive end DeAngelo Tyson is the only Bulldog not returning from Georgia's starting front seven, which ranked third in the SEC behind Alabama and LSU with just 101.2 yards allowed on the ground per game last season. Linebacker Jarvis Jones, the SEC's reigning sack leader (13.5), anchors the group. As far as the secondary is concerned, look no further than free safety Bacarri Rambo. The senior, who led the SEC with eight interceptions and ranked second with 16 passes defended, dominated opposing wide receivers in 2011 and looks to do so again in 2012. With a talented, experienced defense and a polished quarterback, UGA is primed for another trip to Atlanta in December. And don't even get me started on the schedule. Georgia's SEC West foes this season are Ole Miss (yawn) and Auburn (tradition) — both very winnable games. The true tests will be road games against Missouri and South Carolina. As far as Columbia, S.C., the Bulldogs have won four out of the last five games they have played against the Gamecocks at Williams-Brice Stadium. If UGA wants a true road test, they should travel to Barsoom and face off against the Tharks and Dotar Sojat John Carter. Georgia has the easiest path to the Georgia Dome this season, and they are the best-equipped team to get there.

On April 8, Castro tied the school record of seven RBI in a 14-3 win against Ole Miss. Six RBI came in the third inning. The freshman hit two home runs, including her first career grand slam, in the third inning. She followed up the third by drawing a one-out walk with the bases loaded in the fourth frame for her seventh and final RBI of the day. Castro's final numbers tallied at 2 for 2 with two home runs, two walks and a total of seven RBI.

### Shannon Gilroy, Lacrosse

On May 5, Gilroy led Florida to its first American Lacrosse Conference Tournament title. The freshman scored seven goals in the 14-7 win over top-ranked Northwestern, who had won seven of the last eight NCAA women's lacrosse championships. In addition to scoring half of Florida's goals, Gilroy tied a team-high mark of three draw controls. She also had a game-high tally of nine shots.

### Chris Rainey, Football

The running back led the Gators in all-purpose yards (233), rushing yard (108) and receiving yards (104) in the 33-23 win against Tennessee on Sep. 17. Rainey also had a touchdown as well as a blocked punt. His 83-yard touchdown reception is the longest in school history for a running back. In total, the senior accounted for 61 percent of the Gators' total offensive yards, including 81 percent of the rushing yards.

### Jonathon Crawford, Baseball

In his postseason debut, Crawford threw the Gators' first no-hitter in the NCAA Tournament since John Burke in 1991 against Furman. The sophomore had five strikeouts in the 4-0 win over Bethune-Cookman. The only thing that stopped Crawford from recording a perfect game was a walk in the third inning against designated hitter Jake Welch. During the next at bat, Welch was thrown out by Gators catcher Mike Zunino. Crawford was the seventh pitcher in NCAA Tournament history to throw a no-no.

### Kytra Hunter, Gymnastics

In the NCAA Tournament, the freshman became the first Gator to win the NCAA All-Around title. She used a score of 39.725 to edge out Georgia's Kat Ding by .075. In addition to grabbing the first NCAA All-Around title for Florida, Hunter also became the first Gator to win multiple NCAA titles in a single year by winning the vault title with a score of 9.8750. Hunter is the fifth gymnast to win multiple NCAA events as a freshman.
