 beginnings, endings**

Adam Samei's eyes darted across a flood of unfamiliar faces. He walked along the sidewalk near the University Auditorium, searching the buildings to find a landmark he recognized.

He stopped.

"Where am I?" the 18-year-old asked under his breath, twisting his neck around.

Samei walked another block and stopped again.

"This is the wrong way," he said, sounding unsure.

Samei decided to follow a group of people walking toward Turlington Plaza and found himself at the Hub, his intended destination.

More than 6,000 freshmen began their first Fall semester at the university Wednesday.

They joined the masses of returning undergraduates and graduates to fill out UF's student population of about 50,000.

Samei, who plans to double-major in political science and international studies, moved into his Yulee Residence Hall triple Sunday.

On the first day of school, Samei gave himself plenty of time before class, in case he got lost — which he did.

He accidentally walked into an Italian class in Matherly Hall instead of his scheduled First Year Florida course. Samei asked the professor to let him sign onto ISIS on the university-owned computer to find the right room.

"It was a computer error," Samei said. "I had the wrong room number."

When he arrived at his classes, he made sure to land a seat in the front row so he could see the instructor.

"You have to make sure you make a great first impres-

**Students and residents invited to discuss presidential search**

UF students and Gainesville community members can learn about and discuss the university's presidential search at several public meetings Friday.

The university will host an open forum

from 1:30 p.m. to 3 p.m. in the Presidents Room of Emerson Alumni Hall to discuss what type of qualities the next UF president should have. Attendees can give their input regarding UF's character and accomplishments and its future president.

Also that day, two focus groups composed of previously selected faculty members and

students will meet at 9 a.m. and 11 a.m. respectively in the Presidents Room. Anyone interested may sit in on the sessions to listen, according to a university press release.

For those who can't attend, the conferences will be live-streamed online, which can be accessed via [www.presidentialsearch.ufl.edu](http://www.presidentialsearch.ufl.edu). Earlier this month, the search com-

mittee accepted comments regarding the questions via email.

An administrative subcommittee will meet Monday to consider reports from Friday's meetings and finalize the desired criteria for applicants, said UF spokeswoman Janine Sikes. The subcommittee will also ex-

**UF racks up rankings in annual Princeton Review roundup**  
*Gators placed in nine of 62 categories*

No. 5 in "Lots of Beer." No. 6 in "Party Schools." No. 17 in "Lots of

Hard Liquor."

UF was repeatedly recognized in this year's Princeton Review rankings. The university placed in nine of the 62 categories featured in the

book "The Best 377 Colleges, 2013 Edition."

The Princeton Review also ranked UF as No. 8 in "Best College Newspaper" and No. 19 for "Stu-

dents Study the Least."

The rankings derive from 122,000 student surveys, which averages to about 324 students per campus.

But UF takes its rankings with a grain of salt.

"We tend to focus on more objective measures," UF spokesman

Steve Orlando said, adding that the rankings do not represent the university's hardworking and well-prepared students.

However, UF has a reputation, as evidenced by its No. 1 party school ranking in 2008. This year's rankings

## Attorney: Shutting down Zimmerman Facebook page

ORLANDO, Fla. — The attorney for the shooter of Florida teenager Trayvon Martin says he is shutting down a Facebook page that had been used as a social media outlet

for supporters of his client because of what he says are "diminishing returns."

Attorney Mark O'Mara announced the decision Wednesday on a separate website set up to distribute information on George Zimmerman's defense for Martin's February shooting. That site, [GZlegalcase.com](http://GZlegalcase.com), remains active.

Zimmerman is charged with second-degree murder in the shooting and has pleaded not guilty.

O'Mara said the Facebook page had served several purposes over the past three months, including giving Zimmerman and the defense team an official social media presence. But it also allowed for discussions of evidence and Zimmerman's guilt or innocence that O'Mara said was not helpful.

Students in line wound through the aisles of the UF Bookstore on Wednesday, their arms heavy with textbooks as they took advantage of discounted prices.

For some, the reward was worth the wait — all new and used textbooks were discounted by 7 percent.

Book prices can differ among stores, which means many students shop around, hunting for deals and visiting several places before making a purchase.

# Police arrest car roof-rider

► HE ALLEGEDLY THREATENED HIS GIRLFRIEND WITH A KNIFE.

Gainesville Police arrested a man early Wednesday morning after he chased his girlfriend out of her second-story window and held onto her car roof as she drove away.

At about 1:30 a.m., Towshanda Hill's boyfriend, Allen Lenard Nelson, arrived at her house, 2542 SW 31st Place, wanting to borrow her car.

According to a GPD arrest report, Hill, 28, and Nelson, 32, started arguing about their relationship.

The couple fought for about an hour, mainly about "ignorant" stuff, Hill said Wednesday afternoon.

Hill went to the bathroom upstairs. When she came out, she said, she saw Nelson holding a knife behind his back at the bottom of the stairs.

According to the report, Nelson pretended he was going to throw the knife, and Hill fled to her room. As Nelson kicked down the door, she jumped from her window and ran to her car.

She locked her car doors as Nelson followed her outside. He climbed onto the car roof and started yelling at her.

Hill said she backed out of the parking lot and drove east on Southwest 31st Place as Nelson clung to the roof, screaming for help.

As she turned onto Southwest 23rd Terrace, Nelson fell off the car roof. Hill called police from a friend's house.

A witness said she and her husband heard screaming and called police after seeing a man, presumably Nelson, hanging onto a car roof as it sped down the road.

The woman, who did not want her name published, said she and her husband saw the man again as he ran down the street across from their house.

Police later arrived at Hill's house and thought Nelson barricaded himself inside, said GPD spokeswoman Cpl. Angelina Valuri.

Officers from the GPD Criminal Investigation Division, SWAT team and Negotiation Response Team responded to the call.

Police questioned Hill to find Nelson, who lives at 803 SE 12th Ave., where he was later arrested.

Nelson was charged with aggravated assault with a weapon and booked into Alachua County Jail at 10:01 a.m.

As of Wednesday night, Nelson remained in jail. A bond had not been set.

"I'm looking forward to football season," he said. "But I couldn't get tickets because I'm only taking seven credits."


When it was time for class, Solomon found a seat in the back of his lecture in the Florida Gym. There, he used the distance from the professor to his advantage.

amine information gained from conversations with alumni, boosters and business leaders.

"Ultimately, they're just trying to make sure they've addressed the desired qualifications in everybody's issues," Sikes said. "All the constituents."

The Qualifications and Criteria Subcommittee met Wednesday to talk about the language in the document. The subcommittee discussed including, as desired traits in an applicant, experience in an administrative leadership position at a major university and fluency in a second language.

Members of the subcommittee did not want the criteria to dissuade qualified applicants from pursuing the job. The subcommittee changed the introduction to the criteria to include that

"the university will consider candidates both within and outside academia."

After the subcommittee finalizes its criteria Monday, the document will be submitted to the overall search committee and UF Board of Trustees Committee on Governance for approval at a joint Tuesday meeting.

As for Friday, the three main topics will be:

- What are the unique qualities and notable strengths of UF?
- What are UF's opportunities and impacts in academics, research and service for the future?

• Based on these inquiries, what qualities and experience are needed for UF's next leader?

share a similar theme.

"We're aware there are issues that need to be addressed, and we are addressing those," Orlando said.

UF came in with several sports-related rankings, including No. 2 in "Jock Schools," No. 3 in "Students Pack the Stadiums" and No. 16 in "Everyone Plays Intramural Sports."

Marty Dempsey, a coordinator for competitive sports at RecSports, said the organization takes pride in its ranking.

However, Dempsey said the ranking isn't necessarily a good representation of UF's intramural numbers. Between 12,000 and 15,000 students play intramural sports at UF each school year, a small sample size, he said.

Robert Franek, author of the book, said it is not uncommon for larger campuses like UF to generate thousands of survey responses.

The book and rankings reflect data collected throughout the past three years. Generally, the survey results remain consistent, Franek said. But there are fluctuations on the list.

For example, UF's career resource services were ranked No. 6 this year. Last year, they pulled in the top spot, and in 2011 they were ranked No. 4, according to Alligator archives.

Although the university may not agree with these rankings, Franek maintained they are accurate.

"They are based on that expert opinion," he said. "And that expert opinion being current college students."

## Legitimate Rape? Todd Akin fails at science

Can you remember the last time you heard about Missouri? It's just one of those lonely, forgotten fly-over states — until last week.

Rep. Todd Akin stuck his Midwestern foot in his Midwestern mouth when he tried to express his opinion about a St. Louis television station.

He seemed to think that women rarely get pregnant via rape.

"If it's a legitimate rape, the female body has ways to try to shut that whole thing down," Akin said.

Oh!

Phew, what a relief.

Y'know, maybe that's why most conservatives are against birth control and contraception: They must think that it's almost unnecessary. We women are apparently in much more control of our bodies than science originally taught us.

We can just wish ourselves sterile at will, right?

Wrong.

Akin's comments on women's health issues are troubling.

Other anti-abortion enthusiasts maintain that women "secrete" something during the act of rape to prevent pregnancy.

Akin has since apologized for his controversial comments and was probably also taught a quick biology lesson before appearing on popular conservative radio and TV shows.

Somehow, through all of this, Huckabee became a beacon of journalism and the go-to place for interviews with the "no-nude-left-behind/two-wrongs-don't-make-a-right" representative.

"Rape is never legitimate," Akin said to Huckabee. "I used the wrong words in the wrong way."

He also said he would win this race "by the grace of God."

Listen, pal. Let's not bring God into this, because one of us won't be happy with what God has to say on the matter.

Akin might still stand a chance in his Senate race despite his gaffe-a-thon on Sunday, and that should be alarming.

Are Missouri voters OK with his stance on anti-abortion versus pro-abortion rights issues? It's possible. Missouri is a notorious swing state.

But we'd hope voters would find a problem with voting to elect someone who is so tragically misinformed about basic biology. The things he said were reprehensible and insulting to the American public and to all women.

Our congressional representatives should have a grasp on reality, not on a science that is loosely based on nothing.

Kudos to Huckabee for snagging the scoop on this brushfire of a political gaffe. All that Chick-fil-A must be brain food.

## IBC director's negative review shows carelessness

For many students, the Institute of Black Culture was just a landmark on the UF map.

However, after John Johnson was hired as the IBC director, things changed dramatically for black students. IBC became appreciated for its historical value and relevance as a home for the black community.

Under Johnson's directorship, the IBC coordinated a number of exceptional and engaging programs. He organized meetings and retreats for student leaders on campus to help them better serve their unique audiences.

He spent many hours in the office planning events like the Black Student Leadership Conference, which did a phenomenal job of promoting professionalism, etiquette and networking skills. His commitment to IBC promoted much more traffic and opportunity to uplift in the community.

Johnson did not just do his job — he made himself physically, mentally and emotionally available to students. Conversations with him inspired in students new perspectives, love for their identities and histories, and pride in being a scholar. Under his leadership, the IBC became a sanctuary for intellectual growth and minority unification.

Despite his many triumphs and recommendation letters lauding his wonderful performance sent to his superiors, Johnson received a negative performance evaluation after his first six months on the job. Feeling underappreciated, Johnson sought employment elsewhere and resigned from his position as IBC director.

No effort was made by the UF administration to support Johnson while he was here or when he made himself available for negotiation after receiving a job offer from another institution.

News of his leaving caused much frustration and anger in the hearts of many students, but it also raised some questions: What is the process for evaluating staff

and faculty at UF? Did the administration consult students — those affected most by Johnson's leadership? Does the administration understand the influence his position had on the community?

It seems that his evaluation and subsequent departure were treated like business as usual, and student voices were ignored. But under no circumstances will this be swept under the rug.

To avoid any confusion, Johnson explained that he was leaving UF after 11 months of work "because his work conditions were not affirming."

He loved his job and the people he served enough to occasionally clock 50 or even 60 hours in a week to make a difference.

I cannot understand why this talented professional was negatively assessed or why nobody made an effort to keep such a valued community resource.

This happened because UF's Division of Student Affairs, and Multicultural and Diversity Affairs in particular, operate with impunity and have no one to answer to when making decisions about how best to support underserved communities.

So starting today, I think we must hold Multicultural and Diversity Affairs and the Division of Student Affairs accountable.

We must demand that these questions be answered and changes be made to prevent a similar loss from happening again.

We will not acquiesce. We will be loud about our position on the matter until there is change.

# Chomp and chew: Cool off with refreshing lemonade recipe

On a sweltering summer day in Gainesville, a tall glass of this blueberry-lavender lemonade is simultaneously tart, sweet and instantly refreshing.

Normally, lemonade is made with only three humble ingredients: sugar, water and freshly squeezed lemon juice (don't even think about using Country Time). In this version, the water is infused with fresh lavender sprigs, and blueberry puree is added for a fruity kick.

Although it's the end of August, there's still time to enjoy a summer cocktail. So try adding a shot of gin or vodka to your glass. There's nothing like an ice-cold glass of lemonade on a hot day!

### Blueberry-Lavender Lemonade

(makes 1 pitcher)

#### Ingredients:

- 2 cups sugar
- 7 ½ cups water, divided
- 1 cup lemon juice, freshly squeezed (about 5 to 6 lemons)
- 1 pint blueberries
- 15 sprigs fresh lavender (1 small plant) and a few extra for garnish

#### Directions:

**1.** In a saucepan, boil 2 cups of sugar and 2 cups of water. Stir until the sugar dissolves.

**2.** Remove the mixture from the heat, add fresh lavender sprigs, and cover it. Let it seep for 30 minutes, then remove the sprigs from the saucepan and discard them.

**3.** In a bowl, crush the blueberries until they become a puree. You can also puree them in a blender or a food processor.

**4.** You can do this next step two ways: (1) Place the blueberry puree in a fine-mesh sieve positioned over a pitcher. Pour lavender-infused water through the sieve on top of the blueberry puree and into the pitcher. (2) Place the lavender-infused water and blueberry puree in a French press. Press down to create a very clear blueberry-lavender mixture.

**5.** Pour the lemon juice into a pitcher, followed by 5 1/2 cups of water. Tip: taste the lemonade between adding cups of water — some like it tart! You can also add more sugar or lemon juice at this step.

**6.** Stir well, and garnish with a sprig of lavender, floating blueberries, or a lemon slice on the edge of the glass. Enjoy!

Excitement streaming from both ends of the spectrum — the fans and the band — there is seemingly nothing that can bring this show down.

"I think people are really appreciative because not a lot of bands go to play colleges," Freeman said. "It's fun to be in the college town atmosphere because none of us ever went to college. So we get to play around, go a little wild and have fun with the locals."



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## Hines, Burton giving Florida versatility Pease excited by options

When Brent Pease kicks his offense into high gear, confusing opposing defenses with various formations, motions and shifts, Trey Burton and Omarius Hines are expected to present some of the biggest problems.

The question defenses will have to answer isn't simply, "Where will they line up?" It's, "What are they?"

"That's where you have some issues from a defensive standpoint: How do you count this guy?" coach Will Muschamp said of Burton and Hines. "Is he a back? Is he a receiver? Is he a fullback? Is he a tight end? He's going to line up in all the places, so it's very difficult for a defense to look at."

The possibilities are exciting for Pease, who admits that in six years at Boise State, "we didn't have players like that."

Deciphering Pease's offense was always going to be a chore for defenses because of how difficult it can be to identify how various shifts change the formation.

Knowing that the Gators have players in Burton and Hines who can be effective at multiple spots only adds to the challenge.

"They do create mismatches," Pease said. "We will get them the ball, now they have to make plays."

That was much easier said than done last season. Burton caught 19 passes for 149 yards and a touchdown and carried the ball 37 times for 155 yards and three scores. Hines notched seven catches for 106 yards and had one carry for 12 yards, failing to find the end zone all year.

Still, the optimism surrounding the 6-foot-3, 228-pound Burton and 6-foot-2, 217-pound Hines is understandable.

Along with 6-foot-3, 243-pound tight end Jordan Reed, Burton and Hines fit into the category of players who are simultaneously too quick for linebackers to contain and too big for corners and safeties to cover.

"You've got a guy whose got speed and ability to run vertical and snap routes, you're matched up on linebackers," Pease said. "Some-

body like Jordan, who's got really wide receiver ability but in a body like his, he's a nightmare for defensive coordinators."

The Gators are hoping Hines can join that cast of nightmares not just because of his versatility, but because of his big-play ability.

Hines averaged 14.8 yards per touch in his limited action last year, including a long of 39, and ripped off a 61-yard touchdown run in Friday's scrimmage.

"When the ball is in his hands, he can go the distance," Pease said. "He can create the huge, explosive plays. He can go 75-80 yards, because he's

got the other gear. He's got the ability to catch. He's got the ability to run. He's got strength.

"He's an incredible talent, so you just have to use him the right way."

So far, it appears the Gators think every way is the right way to use Hines.

While his 61-yard touchdown came as a running back, Hines said he's also lined up at wide receiver, tight end and fullback.

Although learning to play every position is a difficult adjustment, Hines has been putting in extra time with coaches to make sure he's up to speed at every position.

"At first, it was a little overwhelming," Hines said. "It's been a long journey, man. From playing

## Forget Atlanta: UF must move on from dismal 2011 season

The Gators have Georgia on their mind.

After an offseason in which the players worked in the trenches of practice without making headlines off the field, Florida has truly begun the Will Muschamp era.

And now the Southeastern Conference Championship game in Atlanta supposedly awaits.

"Guys have bought into what we are trying to do," Muschamp said. "Obviously, their way didn't work. They understand where we are heading with this program."

The message this training camp has been SEC title game or bust, but reaching the Georgia Dome will be tough.

No. 23 Florida plays four teams ranked in the top 10 in the preseason poll.

Of the last seven SEC title games, only one finalist has had fewer than 10 victories. Florida doesn't have to be great. Try being good first.

Muschamp's first year didn't go as planned.

He arrived at Florida with a depleted roster and the sour stench left behind by Urban Meyer.

Muschamp kicked Janoris Jenkins, his best cornerback, off the team in April due to a second marijuana-related arrest in the span of three months.

Four other Gators were arrested during the 2011 offseason.

On the field, players had to adjust to new coaches and new schemes. Those Gators were doomed from the start.

UF couldn't catch a break once football started. John Brantley, the senior quarterback, and backups Jeff Driskel and Jacoby Brissett were sacked nearly twice as often as they threw touchdowns, and the defense couldn't stay off the field.

It took until the bowl game against Ohio State before the players bought into the new coaching staff.

"I'm not surprised," defensive tackle Sharrif Floyd said. "I'm not saying I expected it this way. Some people learn in different ways and some people group together in different ways, and it took us a year."

So let's give these Gators a blank slate. The words from players and coaches during the preseason suggest these Gators have changed.

UF is 15-11 the past two seasons, which ranked eighth in the SEC. They're tired of mediocrity.

Florida took the right steps this offseason.

Muschamp had only two arrests and players ran their own practices.

Strength coach Jeff Dillman instituted a new training program, which players and coaches have raved about.

The mindset of this team has improved.

"Football means a lot more to some of the guys," redshirt senior Sam Robey said. "A lot of entitlements are gone now."

That was one of our big problems last year."

Last season was not what this Muschamp-led program is about.

"You get to the point where he's put his stamp on the program," offensive coordinator Brent Pease said. "You've got a feel of the kids and you've built up your standards and how to interact. They know what's

right. They know what's wrong. They know what is going to fly in the system and what's not going to fly in the system. At times, you fix things (that) aren't working."

These Gators are on the mend and will show a better product on the field.

While reaching Atlanta may be the "goal," just getting rid of 2011 would be an accomplishment by itself.

receiver to going to tight end, and now, doing pretty much doing everything. I love it. I'm enjoying it."

Hines agreed with a reporter's assertion that he could be "Trey Burton 2.0," saying he was "stronger and faster" than his versatile counterpart.

Pease has been careful not to overload Hines men-

tally, and if UF's jack of all trades can pick up the offense as well as Pease says he has, it could be a long year for opposing defenses.

"He's done a good job," Pease said. "He is a very smart kid on the field. He's good. He understands things, and he wants more. He's always, 'Hey, can I do this play? Can I do that play?' He's a threat. He's a weapon."

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

## Reed back in practice after MCL sprain

► TIGHT END SUFFERED A KNEE INJURY ON AUG. 11.

Two days after coach Will Muschamp announced Colin Thompson would miss about eight weeks due to surgery on his right foot, the Gators have good news at tight end: Jordan Reed is healthy.

"He's fine," offensive coordinator Brent Pease said. "He's practicing."

Reed sprained his MCL during Florida's scrimmage on Aug. 11. Muschamp initially predicted Reed would miss three to four days, but the junior ended up missing more than a week.

"Jordan Reed went through the walk-through this morning and looked good," Muschamp said Monday. "Hopefully, (we will) get him back maybe in non-contact today."

Despite missing two games last season, Reed was the Gators' second-leading receiver with 28 catches for 307 yards and two touchdowns. He is expected to be active for Florida's opener against Bowling Green on Sept. 1.

Based on Pease's confusion when asked how Reed's health had progressed Wednesday, the New London, Conn., native's well-being shouldn't have even been in question.

"You guys might be telling me something I don't know," Pease said. "Who? Who's that? MCL? Who's that?"

**Trouble's A-Foot:** When Muschamp addressed the media on Aug. 15 regarding Jeff Driskel's scapula contusion, there was a minor footnote. At the time, it went unnoticed.

"Mike McNeely, a walk-on who's going to be a big part of our special teams, fractured his foot and he'll be out six weeks," Muschamp said last week.

McNeely, a 5-foot-8 walk-on, had surgery on his foot on Monday. However, the sophomore wide receiver's name popped up again on Wednesday when offensive coordinator Brent Pease was assessing Florida's wide receivers.

"It really hurt when Mike McNeely (was injured) because he was having a good camp," Pease said. "That kid was going to help us."

McNeely dressed for every game last season except for Florida's loss to Alabama on Oct. 1. He appeared in seven contests during the 2011 campaign, including the final five.

While McNeely's performance in fall camp remains a mystery to

those outside the team, Pease's disappointment in losing a walk-on to injury does not bode well for the Gators wide receivers group. Andre Debose led returning wide-outs with 16 catches last season.

As the season opener nears, Pease is confident the receivers will be ready to take a step forward in 2012.

"I think the guys are understanding their role," Pease said.

"Like I've told them, 'If you want more, you better show consistency and create it.' I think guys are kind of grasping onto that. I'm going to tell you this: We're not just sticking anybody out there that looks pretty and can run. They better go out there and perform."

**No Scrimmage:** Florida canceled its Tuesday scrimmage due to rain. With preparation for Bowling Green set to begin this weekend, it will not be rescheduled.

"It gets too close to the game time and you risk injuries and stuff like that," Pease said.

With the scrimmage out of the picture, Pease stressed the need for additional practice time.

"We've still got to get more reps," he said. "Especially the reps that we lost out on [Tuesday] that we'll probably get on practice situations here on Thursday and Friday before we really start putting the game plan in."


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


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
