Ahik shook her head no. The Computing Help Desk at the Hub was swamped Thursday with students who were having trouble connecting to UF's new wireless network.

The network was updated July 16 to help students

Logan Harrison elected Student Senate President

The Student Senate voted Thursday for Unite Party Sen. Logan Harrison to take over as Senate president.

Unite Party Sen. Cory Yeffet was elected into Harrison's previous position, Senate president pro tempore.

Earlier this week, Harrison called an emergency Senate meeting after the

resignation of former president Aundre Price.

On Thursday, candidates were allowed to speak to the Senate for five minutes and answer five minutes of questions. In accordance with Senate procedures, there was no debate.

Harrison ran against Students Party Sen. Carly Wilson. He won 41 to 12.

Harrison said he ran for president to carry out the duties associated with being the Senate president pro tempore. Whenever the Senate president cannot

Frat brothers assist in arrest

Members of a UF fraternity assisted University Police officers in the arrest of an Ocala man who allegedly broke into the fraternity house mother's bedroom early Thursday morning.

Police charged Solomon Jamel Taylor III, 23, of Ocala, with unarmed burglary of a dwelling, a felony and trespassing, a misdemeanor.

At 2:13 a.m. Thursday, Patricia Arnold, 50, was sleeping when Taylor entered her bedroom through an unlocked balcony door at the Kappa Alpha Order fraternity house at 5 Fraternity Row, according to the UPD arrest report.

Arnold's bedroom is attached to the house, and Taylor climbed on a fenced deck,

which was 5 feet from the ground, to get onto the balcony, according to the report.

When Taylor entered the room, Arnold's maltipoo, Milo, started barking and woke Arnold up.

Arnold said she saw Taylor standing several feet away from her bed.

"I froze for a second," she said. "It didn't seem real, so I screamed."

According to the report, Taylor fled from the room.

Arnold said she grabbed a robe and went upstairs to tell fraternity brothers what had happened.

Several fraternity brothers went outside and patrolled around the house, Arnold

Ala. man pleads guilty to producing child porn

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — An Alabama man who was accused of posing online as pop star Justin Bieber while urging young girls to send him explicit photos of themselves pleaded guilty Thursday to producing child pornography, authorities announced.

Christopher Patrick Gunn, 31, of Montgomery, promised young girls free tickets and backstage passes to a Bieber concert if they would agree to send him inappropriate photos or webcam transmission of themselves, authorities said.

A statement released Thursday by U.S. Attorney George L. Beck in Montgomery said Gunn used chat rooms and other social media outlets to threaten hundreds of girls ages 9 to 16 throughout the United States and abroad over a period of more than two years as part of a far-ranging "online sextortion scheme" that included posing as Bieber and other ruses.

"These child predators irreparably damage the children they victimize," Beck said in the news release. "The scope of this defendant's exploitation of children is staggering; he not only preyed upon children in our community, but in communities across the United States."

Beck's statement said Gunn's plea included two counts of making child pornography, 15 counts of interstate extortion and seven counts of internet stalking.

Gunn also was accused of working another scam in which he posed as the new kid in town on social media sites such as Facebook, and once he gained the girls' trust through fake social media profiles he would solicit embarrassing information about them, according to Beck's statement. Gunn would ask for explicit photographs and threaten to make available the embarrassing information if the girls refused, it said.

Authorities allege that Gunn's actions took place from 2009 until 2012. On March 20, 2012, FBI agents executed a federal search warrant on Gunn's house. They said they seized a cellphone and a laptop computer containing images and videos of child pornography.

Beck's statement said Gunn had obtained explicit photos of young girls in numerous states, including Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation said it is continuing to work to identify any additional victims in other states including Florida, North Carolina, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Michigan and California.

Based on his guilty plea, Gunn faces no less than 25 years and as much as 35 years in federal prison, Beck's statement said. It added that he could be ordered to spend the rest of his life on supervised release.



fulfill his or her duties, the pro tempore must step up.

"This to me is a fulfillment of those duties," Harrison said.

After the meeting, Harrison said he hadn't decided if he would keep Price's temporary committees on anti-hate and sustainability. Temporary committees normally dissolve when the Senate president's term is up.

Harrison said he is excited for the new term.

"I think it will be an easier transition," he said.

The Senate also elected Yeffet to take over Harrison's position as the Senate president pro tempore. Yeffet beat Students Party Sen. Morgan Vollrath 40 to 11. The newly elected Harrison abstained from voting.

While presenting to the Senate, Vollrath said voting a minority senator to the second-highest position in the Senate would demonstrate the body's bipartisanship.

However, senators raised questions about Vollrath's inexperience within the Senate. He was voted in during the spring elections and is a member of the Rules and Ethics Committee.

Yeffet spoke about his time on the Replacement and Agenda Committee. He said he was the second-longest-standing member on the committee. Harrison was the other.

Yeffet's new position means he will lead that committee. He is allowed to keep his spot on the Judiciary Committee, but he's not sure if he will.

"I feel great," Yeffet said after

the meeting. "I'm looking forward to the next six weeks."

Harrison and Yeffet will serve in their new positions for six weeks until Student Government elections

on Oct. 2 and Oct. 3.

After the meeting, Wilson said she fears the rest of the term will be a "lame duck" period in which nothing gets accomplished.

"I don't think it's the best for the students," she said.

said. They found Taylor hiding behind a tree and chased after him.

The men caught Taylor near the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity house and held him until UPD officers arrived.

Police arrested Taylor after Arnold identified him as the man who broke into her bedroom, according to the report.

At the time of the break-in, Taylor had an active trespass warning, preventing him from being on UF campus following an incident several years ago.

In 2009, UPD arrested Taylor on misdemeanor battery and stalking charges after he was accused of trying to touch a Santa Fe College student in his groin area while they were driving on Hull Road, according to court records.

According to the report, Taylor has no affiliation with UF or the fraternity.

UPD spokesman Maj. Brad Barber praised the collaboration between officers and fraternity members in Taylor's arrest.

"One of the things this incident illustrates is working together as a campus community, we were able to successfully make an apprehension and arrest," he said.

Police booked Taylor in Alachua County Jail at 4:46 a.m. Thursday with a \$20,000 bond, which he met late that evening.

efficiently access the Internet while on campus, according to Alligator archives. The new system included combined resources and required students to update an anti-virus software.

As part of the change, UFW, the former on-campus wireless system, and DHW, the Internet service for dorms, combined this fall into one service.

Nick Robbie, a tech support staff for the Computing Help Desk, said students have been coming in since 8 a.m. Wednesday, and the lines have been long ever since.

Ahik said she's had problems connecting to the Internet for a month. Now she spent her second day of classes waiting in line at the Hub.

Maguire, a 20-year-old UF sophomore, said he spoke to Mac owners who also have the same problem.

He said he tried to reconfigure his wireless connection twice already, but whenever he tried to access Google, he'd have the same problem many students were facing: being redirected to the wireless network website and being told to connect to the UF wireless system again.

"A lot of people don't know they need anti-virus," Robbie said.

The line has been filled with Mac and PC owners alike, but most of them have been Mac owners. For Mac owners, the auto configuration setting depends on the type of operating system, such as Leopard or Mountain Lion, he said.

Some students like Ahik decided to use the computers in the Hub to get online before figuring out what was wrong with their laptops. For those students in line, the wait can feel frustrating.

"I don't want to stand in this long line," Ahik said, the line snaking behind her. "I could be eating lunch right now."

Campus tour encourages voter awareness, involvement

Whether it's by attending election awareness campaigns or by registering to vote, UF students can become engaged in the upcoming presidential election.

The Politic365 College Convention Bus Tour, an 11-college and university tour in conjunction with the Republican and Democratic national conventions, will hold a rally from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Monday in the Reitz Union Rion Ballroom. Students will voice their opinions on topics such as jobs, health care and immigration, according to a UF news release.

Students will also have access to a Politic365 speaker panel and representatives from politically engaged organizations like the College Republicans and College Democrats.

On Aug. 31, "Bring it to the Table," a community engagement campaign, will be on Turlington Plaza from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. The program, sponsored by the Bob Graham Center for Public Service, will allow students to share their political beliefs in an effort to encourage tolerance and discussion, according to a UF news release.

The tour is attending the Republican National Convention and will stop in Gainesville on its way to the Democratic National Convention in North Carolina, said Shelby Taylor, digital and communications director at the Graham Center.

If students have not yet registered to vote, they can do so through TurboVote, Taylor said.

Students can also change their registration county to Alachua County or request an absentee ballot from their county of permanent residence.

Andrew Arons, a 19-year-old telecommunication sophomore, requested an absentee ballot from his hometown of Boca Raton using the TurboVote link on the Integrated Student Information System.

About 1,500 students have either completed an absentee ballot request or registered since the program launched this summer, Taylor said.

"With students back on campus," she said, "we'll really start to see a huge increase in those numbers."

Students can register using TurboVote by visiting ufl.turbovote.org.

Columnist calls millennial generation to action

While on break, students tend to block out the world in favor of more malaise and relaxing realities. Fortunately for nearly all Americans, the fear of an artillery strike on a hospital, mechanized assaults on suburban neighborhoods and the loss of an entire generation in a family is a distant and abstract notion.

However, this does not and should not abdicate the American public's conscience from the atrocities taking place in Syria. The millennial generation — those who range in age from 16 to 25 — is by far the most electronically connected in terms of global communication. Now is the time for us to put this vehicle into action.

Last semester, I wrote a column imploring students to take action so we can keep Syria off of a macabre list that includes the likes of Rwanda, Sarajevo, Srebrenica and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. With a death toll in excess of 20,000 and evidence suggesting the brutal regime of Bashar al-Assad has committed atrocities amounting to war crimes, the window for the possibility of avoiding mass atrocity crimes has now passed. What remains is the opportunity for swift cessation and resolution. But the current geopolitical climate would suggest that this secondary follow-up objective may fall out of reach as well.

Here is where we must take a stand.

The case for intervention in Syria would be first and foremost humanitarian. In contrast with how the U.S. handled Iraq during Operation Iraqi Freedom, justification for an intervention could be mounted solely on humanitarian grounds, without needing a weapons-of-mass-destruction goose chase.

Thanks to the proliferation of online tools such as blogs, YouTube and Twitter, firsthand looks at the violence and depravity in Syria are easily accessible.

Those who claim a non-interventionist policy can no longer stand by the sidelines. The U.S. and other allies have already intervened. Now there is only a ques-

tion of to what extent we will continue to intervene. Non-lethal aid, medical supplies and diplomatic measures are all forms of

external intervention into the Syrian crisis.

And to the fiscal conservatives, even if our president seems to you to be a radical socialist, and no matter how bad our own fiscal crisis may seem, we never will face anything like indiscriminate air strikes on civilian targets. To those who say the risk of your grandchild having to pay an extra 5 percent in taxes in 50 years to pay off a national debt means we must not help people half a world away who are truly suffering, remember this: At the very least you can still talk that way about your progenies' future. Hundreds of families in Syria do not have that ability because of the loss of an entire generation.

I've said it before: If we remain comatose and act complacent, we will become morally culpable. We still have time to right the course of history. This reinvigorated call for action is not a call for war or invasion, but rather to help the Syrians suffering at the hands of their own brutal government.

You should be outraged and angry at such senseless slaughter and the subsequent lack of committed action. By understanding the daily hell Syrian children are experiencing, you will see how strong the justification is for continued intervention. Your calls should become stronger and more passionate the more you learn of their suffering.

And if our peaceful intervention tactics fail, and the need for direct military intervention becomes a potential reality, the mere fact that steps were taken to understand the issue before the onset of war will make for a more honest and intelligent discussion.

Tropical Storm Isaac could threaten students traveling to South Florida

Tropical Storm Isaac could impact UF students this weekend but probably won't affect school next week.

As of 11 p.m. Thursday night, Isaac was strengthening near Puerto Rico as it moved west-northwestward, according to the National Hurricane Center. Isaac's projected path leads it across Hispaniola and Cuba before swinging into the Gulf of Mexico early next week.

David Keellings, a UF geology doctoral student who teaches the Extreme Weather course, said Isaac probably won't threaten Gainesville.

"I don't expect it'll be a very severe hurricane, if it's a hurricane at all," Keellings said.

He said the storm's track is moving westward, directing it more toward Tampa and the Republican National Convention but farther away from UF.

Still, UF administration is keeping an eye on Isaac, said university


spokesman Steve Orlando.

A UF alert went out Thursday afternoon encouraging students, faculty and staff traveling this weekend to do so carefully.

The last time campus closed for severe weather was in 2008 for Tropical Storm Fay, Orlando said, but UF won't hesitate to cancel classes to keep students safe.

"If we have hurricane-force winds in Gainesville, there wouldn't be any question about it," he said.

UF med student, veteran left brain-damaged after accident

A few days before the biggest UF medical school test of the year, Ray Brown sped 550 miles to Tennessee to clear his mind.

That was typical Ray, his 32-year-old brother Tom Brown said. He was never quite sure where Ray would go next — Haiti to look after people, Iraq to tend to Army vehicles, UF to train to be a doctor — but Tom always knew Ray would come home again safely.

Ray, 31, was headed back to Florida on June 21, but something went wrong.

His car crashed, the metal twisting, the glass breaking. He was rushed by helicopter to a hospital in Chattanooga, Tenn.

There, family watched him open his eyes. They saw the blank stare — the expression of the brain-damaged.

There was a far-off look in his eyes, like he was trying to wake up from a dream.

While he fights and slowly recovers, his family is facing its own nightmares: dwindling savings, little to no financial help and no insurance.

But they're far from giving up.

Ray spoke for the first time Wednesday. He stood up for the first time a few weeks after the accident. He can squeeze a ball and hold his mother's hand.

His once Superman-like muscles have atrophied, making him look like a mortal again. His curly brown hair and beard are growing in, his facial hair trimmed as others see fit.

He's getting better, but the progress is slow going.

After being released from Erlanger Medical Center Monday, Ray was taken to St. Augustine to stay with his mom. She always

had a little room set up for Ray, just in case he decided to visit.

But this time, instead of watching her boys wrestle in the kitchen, she's watching as various therapists help her youngest boy take baby step after baby step toward recovery.

As Ray's silver car cruised down a Tennessee highway, glinting in the late afternoon sun, the Brown family's nightmare began.

He was driving back from Nashville, Tenn., on Interstate 24. It was about 4 p.m., and he wasn't far into his trek.

His car drifted out of his lane, and he jerked the wheel to fix it. He overcorrected, slamming the right side of the car into a passing semi truck.

Nearby witnesses — one who was a doctor and off-duty officer — ran to help him. While the man tended to Ray, a woman found his phone and called Tom and his mother.

"All we knew was he was being med-flighted to the hospital," Tom said. "You can only imagine the scenarios you run through in your head when you have a loved one go through that."

They drove all day and through the night to be by his side.

Until this week, Ray's family didn't know if they'd be able to get him into a rehabilitation program. He couldn't stay in the hospital, because he was well enough to be discharged, but his family said he needs intense therapy, both mentally and physically, if he's going to improve.

He'll get medical care provided by Veterans Affairs at his mom's

house until a rehab program agrees to take him. For a while, programs wouldn't take him, because he couldn't respond to commands.

With his recent progress of talking sporadically, his family is looking into getting him into Tampa's James A. Haley Veterans' Hospital. If everything goes as planned, Ray could be set to go to the VA in two weeks.

A big hurdle is the money.

Ray doesn't have insurance, and he's all but drained his Medicaid.

At home, little things like Ray's Ensure shakes add up at about \$2 a pop. But long-term care is a whole other matter.

For now, VA-contracted therapists visit Ray regularly, but his family isn't sure how long they can expect that to last.

"We're still in the dark in terms of what he'll need and what he'll get," Tom said.



Before his accident, Ray was on his way to UF to take Step 1, a comprehensive science skills test. It is universally known within the UF medical school as the most important and stressful exam to happen all year, said UF medical student Amy Driebe, 24.

If you don't pass, you don't advance to the third year of medical school. And how well you do could determine which field you can specialize in.

But friends say Ray wasn't stressing about the exam. The last time 26-year-old UF medical student Benjamin Srivastava saw Ray, he was in Library West, calm amid the chaos of cramming students.

"I feel now, studying for this test, I'm reaching my maximum

potential," he told Srivastava.

Driebe said she ran into Ray earlier in the year at Target. While she and most of her medical school friends were bundles of stress, Ray looked relaxed and collected.

"He was just so calm, and like, 'This is going to be fine. I have complete faith in you,'" she said.

For those who knew Ray's penchant for meditation and calm manner, his answer came as no surprise. Nothing could faze Ray.

She said many of her classmates are in shock after learning about his accident and brain damage.

"Ray was one of the best people I've ever met," she said, pausing. "He just had so much in his life. He was just going in such an amazing direction. It just couldn't have happened to a nicer person."

Ray's demeanor wasn't given to him. It was earned.

After high school, he realized he needed to make a change in his life, so he followed in his brother's footsteps and joined the Army, becoming a diesel mechanic and serving in Iraq, his brother said.

Ray kept the details to himself — only mentioning fragments of stories of how the ground shook during mortar raids — but somewhere in the smoke and sand, he had his awakening.

Tom said Ray came home mature, focused and ready to plan for

the future.

He focused on his health by exercising more, meditating and keeping a close watch on what he ate, sometimes testing out peculiar diets. His friends would post new concoctions on his Facebook wall, like sugarless cakes.

Soon, he graduated from the University of South Florida and was headed to UF's medical school with dreams of pursuing Doctors Without Borders.

His friends said he was motivated, yet kept his sense of humor. He had an unparalleled ability to dedicate himself to his work while keeping a calm presence.

Since the accident, Ray's class has banded together to get the word out about Ray's condition to see if there's anything that can be done to get him medical help or donations.

"He's an amazing person," Srivastava said.

They thought he'd be a great doctor one day.

When medical students start their studies, they expect to be healing strangers. They don't expect for one of their own to show up in their emergency room or to be on their charts. They belong in lab coats, not paper gowns.

"I think there's this idea that when you go into medical school that you aren't going to get sick," Driebe said. "We have a hard time talking about it."

Romney promises energy independence by 2020

HOBBS, N.M. — Republican presidential contender Mitt Romney promised on Thursday to aggressively expand off-shore oil drilling along Virginia, North Carolina and the Gulf of Mexico, changing the subject from social issues like abortion and Medicare that have dominated the debate in the days before the critical Republican National Convention.

Speaking to voters in the heart of New Mexico's oil and gas industry, Romney declared that his energy plans — which include drilling for oil in a federal Alaskan wildlife reserve — would create 3 million jobs and more than \$1 trillion in new revenue. And he predicted complete "North American energy independence by 2020, a never-realized goal claimed by presidential candidates for decades."

"That means we produce all the energy we use in North America," Romney said, emphasizing an expansion of oil and gas over wind and solar production. "This is not some pie-in-the-sky kind of thing. This is a real achievable objective."

President Barack Obama did not face voters on Thursday. Instead, he deployed a popular former president, Bill Clinton, to help convince a divided electorate that he simply needs more time to fix the nation's struggling economy. Clinton is expected to speak at the Democratic National Conven-

tion next month and play a prominent role in the final months before Election Day.

The cornerstone of Romney's plan is opening up more areas for offshore oil drilling, including mid-Atlantic swing states like North Carolina and Virginia, where it is currently banned. He also wants to give states the power to establish all forms of energy production on federal lands, a significant shift in current policy that could face strong opposition in Congress.

Romney specifically cited drilling in Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge as part of a broad plan to generate millions of additional barrels of oil each day.

A Romney campaign official later downplayed the comment. The plan would revive a longtime Republican goal to allow drilling for oil in the wildlife refuge. Congress has blocked drilling there for more than a quarter-century.

Romney also plans to approve the Keystone XL pipeline that has worried environmentalists and would run from Canada to U.S. refineries in Texas. And he is calling for the end of a production tax credit for wind power that is set to expire at the end of the year.



Fowler getting rave reviews in practice

Dante Fowler Jr. has only been with the Gators since July 2, but he has a chance to be a key pass rusher and a regular contributor at the Buck linebacker position.

"He certainly looks like he belongs," defensive coordinator Dan Quinn said. "He's physically strong, and when he's out there practicing, you certainly say, 'This guy is ready to help and be a part of our defense, for sure.'"

Given Florida's struggles rushing the passer and Ronald Powell's ACL tear, a significant contribution from Fowler would be a major boon.

A five-star prospect and the No. 28 recruit in the nation last year, Fowler seemed like a lock to head to Florida State before flipping his commitment to UF on National Signing Day.

Since joining the team on the practice field, Fowler has impressed, avoiding the freshman wall that can slow down many newcomers and establishing himself as one of the

team's best options at the Buck, likely behind only

Lerentee McCray.

Although Quinn said last week that Fowler was 'swimming' like many of the other freshmen, Fowler's motor has never slowed down.

"He's somebody who really pushed through and took each day and said, 'Alright, I'm going to work on this thing today and let's go out and do it,'" Quinn said. "I give him a lot of credit that he came through and was ready to go."

Of the 13 freshmen joining UF's defense, Jon Halapio said Fowler has been the most impressive.

"The one standout [is] Dante Fowler," said Halapio, who has known Fowler since the freshman was in eighth grade. "He was determined to play this year. He's having a great camp."

Quinn said he was impressed by Fowler's power and lower-body strength. Halapio was wowed by Fowler's play on the practice field.

"Honestly, I didn't think he was going to perform how he's performing now," Halapio said. "It's really good to see that he's been working hard, even in the summer."

cobs looks like a new man, according to Quinn.

Not only has Jacobs brought his weight down to 284 pounds, but he's added quickness and pass-rush ability at defensive tackle.

"His conditioning level is a lot better than when he first got here, and I think his pass rush has improved," Quinn said. "He's lighter. When he first came in, he was heavier and his conditioning wasn't as good."

Jacobs was signed out of East Mississippi Community College in the spring by a Gators team desperate to improve its pass rush and depth on the interior line.

After a slow start, Jacobs appears to be emerging as an option.

"You can see his quickness really come out," Quinn said. "I think he adds another inside rusher for us, so that's a role that I'm anxious to see him develop through the course of the first couple of games."

Omar Hunter has marveled at Jacobs' power.

"He's got that old-man strength," Hunter said. "Not like the weight room, but the old-man strength. It's weird, very weird. You might could bench more than him, but on the football field he's just strong. It's crazy strength."

UF offensive line needs less talking, more blocking

The Florida offensive linemen trust each other. They like playing alongside one another, and they are close friends who like hanging out together.

But that doesn't mean they will play well together. Prior to last season, the offensive line spoke glowingly of the unity and cohesiveness that had developed throughout fall practice.

"We're with each other 24/7, talking to each other 24/7," junior Kyle Koehne said last fall of himself and roommates and fellow interior linemen Jonotthan Harrison and Jon Halapio. "We've got some good chemistry between the three of us."

"The chemistry is a lot better," Halapio added at the time. "We communicate a lot better on the field, so it's good that we're good friends off the field."

But the chemistry did not translate to the field as the line finished in the bottom half of the Southeastern Conference in sacks allowed in conference play. The group also struggled to both run and pass block throughout the season, and the team was ranked eighth in both rushing and passing offense in SEC games.

In the absence of departed running backs Jeff Demps and Chris Rainey, both of whom could use their speed to get to the edge, the Gators will need an improved offensive front that can create holes for current starting running back Mike Gillislee, who is more of a north-south runner.

Regardless of whether the line can actually accomplish that, the linemen and coaches are saying all the right things again.

"We have a lot of, I guess, a lot of games where we actually have to work with each other, and we are tightly bonded," Harrison said. "We were working on our O-line unity throughout the whole summer."

"I think just having a year under our belt, especially playing together, going through the struggles last year, just pulling in together and just being closer with these guys, and definitely just playing with each other for a year, you just build that trust factor," Halapio said.

We have no reason to believe them. Fans and media will have seen the unit, which is full of once highly touted recruits who underperformed last season, take the field only once before the season opener: in Saturday's open practice that included few contact drills.

First-year offensive coordinator Brent Pease installed a new offense in the offseason that required the line to learn fresh blocking schemes.

And while it might be hard to quantify the effect an offensive line coach has on his unit, the fact that they have had to make the transition from Frank Verducci to Tim Davis is yet

another adjustment the lineman have had to work through.

Taking into account the offensive line's 2011 campaign, which is probably the best way to evaluate it given the lack of live action open to the media, expecting significant improvement from the unit as a whole is impossible.

A reason for optimism would be that the line consists of almost the same group of players from

last year, minus Dan Wenger and David Young, but continuity does not necessarily lead to productivity.

"They're with each other so much in individual period through practice." Pease said. "I mean they have 35-40 minutes where they're all together."

The rest of the offense just needs to hope that their time spent together produces more than good memories.

Travis switching from crowded offense to defense for Gators

She played forward for two years

Taylor Travis spent her first two seasons at Florida trying to find a way to score.

Now, in her junior year, her job is to stop other teams from doing so.

Before the women's soccer team kicked off this season, Travis made the switch from forward to defender.

As a forward, Travis was named the 2010 Southeastern Conference Freshman of the Year and was chosen as a member of the All-SEC Second Team.

She started 17 matches, scored three goals and led the SEC with seven assists in conference play. Travis accrued 17 points overall in 2010.

However, in 2011, Travis had her minutes cut in half, and she only started four games. Her assist total fell from 11 to two.

With a crowded group of forwards including redshirt senior McKenzie Barney, 2011 All-American Erika Tymrak, Canada U-20 team member Adriana Leon and Florida's only goalscorer this season, freshman Claire Falknor, Travis made the move to the backfield.

Travis said she was ready to play as a back because she had prepared before the Gators' season began.

"I played outside back a little in club and a little for the Region team," Travis said. "I played that position before. It was a little easier transition than most people expected it to be."

Travis started the season opener against Miami as an outside back and logged 62 minutes, more than she had in any game during the 2011 season.

Against the Hurricanes, Travis pushed forward on the outside when the Gators held possession.

"We get forward so much, it's almost like being an outside midfielder," she said.

As an outside back, Travis can use the passing skills she demonstrated during her productive freshman season to set up scoring opportunities for midfielders and forwards.

However, with defenders playing forward on offense, the defense is more vulnerable if the Gators turn the ball over.

"A lot of us get caught going forward, and we're not always going to keep the ball every time we go forward," Travis said.

Travis will likely see playing time when the Gators travel to Chapel Hill, N.C., this weekend to play No. 14 North Carolina and No. 2 Duke. Travis is from Raleigh, only about 30 miles from Chapel Hill.

"That's my hometown ... I've got a lot of friends and family coming out," Travis said. "It'll be nice to have a little Gator section."

When Travis' friends and family arrive at the field, they may not be used to where she's positioned, but Travis doesn't mind.

"I can still be creative and go forward at the same time, and I'm also able to defend," she said. "I love defending, and I love 1 v. 1's, so it's kind of the best of both worlds."

Wise ready for new year after offseason filled with change

This offseason has been a time of major change for coach Mary Wise.

Over the last eight months, Wise has seen a completely different team walk through the doors, altered UF's playing scheme for the first time in four years and toyed with the NCAA's new substitution rules.

Wise pushed the restart button over the summer and began from ground zero because of the changes the Gators face, saying it was fair to call this her hardest adjustment period in recent years.

After falling to Illinois in the Elite Eight to end the 2011 season, Florida lost five players to graduation, including two All-Americans. Wise picked up six true freshmen and Taylor Brauneis, a junior transfer setter, to help fill the void left by Kelly Murphy and Kristy Jaeckel.

"You get new players, and with the freshmen, in terms of teaching them the system and all, that took some time," Wise said.

"That was a big thing, with just how many new faces we have," Brauneis said. "And I think [Wise] adjusted very well. I feel like she put a lot of faith in us. And I think

we played really well as a team and I think we really just have to push ourselves to be the best we can every day in practice, in games and everything."

Brauneis, who spent her first two years at Louisville, was one of the major influences in the change from a 6-2 system to a 5-1. Rather than have two setters on the court at the same time, Brauneis will carry all of the setting responsibilities.

"It's going to take a while to gel and mesh and really get a feel for each other," senior Tangerine Wiggs said. "But we're doing a great job at practice. I think we'll do fine running a 5-1."

Although the transition will be seamless for Brauneis, who has played in a 5-1 offense virtually all her life, the new rotation has made Wise's workload a little heavier.

"We look at it as, 'It's a process,' and that the players embrace the fact that we're just trying to get better," Wise said. "All we're trying to do is figure how to score points and win."

Florida's coach of 21 years is looking forward to the new 15 substitution limit that the NCAA put in place this season. The expansion from 12 to 15 substitutions will allow the Gators to interchange more fresh legs into critical games.

"She's excited about [the changes]," senior Betsy Smith said. "It's a lot of new things but it is, at the end of the day, still the game she loves and the game she knows so well. She just knows how to inspire us and just really go out there and compete. That's her big thing: competing. And she does a great job leading us."

Gators stressing communication, organization before weekend matches

UF FACES UNC TONIGHT AT 7 IN CHAPEL HILL.

An unranked Miami team outpaced then-No. 21 Florida last Friday, but coach Becky Burleigh doesn't believe UF's season-opening 4-1 loss was the result of a lack of effort.

She's already pegged two areas in which the Gators (0-1) need to improve: communication and organization.

"It's hard to convert when your team is not organized," Burleigh said. "Some of that has to go to the coaching staff and some of that has to go to the players' abilities to make changes

during a game. We have to be able to adjust on the fly when things don't go exactly as we planned."

In preparation for a grueling stretch against No. 14 North Carolina (0-1) tonight at 7 and No. 2 Duke (2-0) on Sunday at the Carolina Nike Classic in Chapel Hill, N.C., Burleigh emphasized chemistry and trusting UF's system of play to her team throughout the week.

"Both of the practices this week, it's been concentrating on set pieces and staying with your man and bodying up and all the little things," senior midfielder Holly King said. "As a team, we've definitely gotten better. We just learned from it."

The Gators' lack of defensive coherence on set pieces sparked the Hurricanes. Confusion from sophomore goalkeeper Taylor Burke and

the back line during corner kicks led to Miami headers in the 12th and 32nd minutes.

A miscommunication on a clearance attempt resulted in UM's second goal, a 3-yard tap in by Kate Howarth in the 17th minute.

Florida also had trouble communicating offensively, tallying only one shot on goal in the first half as it fell into a 3-0 hole.

"We have to stay patient. For us, our offense stems from our defense," King said. "If we go hard at everything and our offense is helping us as a team, that's just how it's going to start our attack."

The Gators are looking to get back on track against the short-handed Tar Heels, who have starting forwards Kealia Ohai and Crystal

Dunn competing for the U.S. national team at the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup. UNC fell to Portland in a 1-0 upset last Friday.

"[UNC is] pretty high octane," Burleigh said. "They're going to go 100 miles an hour, and we're going to have to deal with that pressure."

Injury Report: According to Burleigh, junior outside back Maggie Rodgers will sit out this weekend as she continues to nurse an ankle injury. Last season, Rodgers started in 16 matches and logged 1,554 minutes, eighth most on the team.

Burleigh also said Tuesday that sophomore midfielder Annie Speese, who sprained her right ankle last Friday night in a collision, would see the field tonight.

Gators set to begin 2012 campaign with new offensive system

When the Gators open their season against Florida International tonight at 7:30 p.m. in the O'Connell Center, they'll have the opportunity to do something they haven't done since 2007 — run a 5-1 offense.

"It's something the fans will be excited about because it's something we haven't run here at Florida in a long time," junior Chloe Mann said. "They'll get to see the setter be really offensive, which I know is really exciting."

Florida has had much success with its new offense in the past. Last time it ran a 5-1 was with three-time All-American Angie McGinnis, who led the team to a 29-3 record and a Southeastern Conference title with 1,485 assists in 2007.

However, after running a 6-2 offense for the last four years, there is going to be a lot of change for the outside hitters and the libero, according to senior Tangerine Wiggs.

"Taylor (Unroe), or whoever plays libero, has to work on defending a 5-1 behind the setter," Wiggs said. "It's a little different than defending behind a right side

in the middle because we run a different defense behind a setter in the middle. It's going to be harder for Taylor, but she's a great passer, and I have no doubt that she'll do just fine."

Although Wiggs said they haven't run a 6-2 at practice yet, she said there is a possibility the Gators will use that style of offense.

"Expect anything from us," Wiggs said. "During preseason, I have no doubt that the coaches will try different lineups to make sure everyone gets playing time. Anything's possible at this point, but we have been practicing a 5-1."

Given the changes the Gators face, their main concern for this weekend's Campus USA Credit

Union Invite isn't the competition, but working on their own problems.

"We're a lot more focused on ourselves and making sure we're doing all the things on our side of the net to execute and score points," Wiggs said. "We're less concerned about opponents. It's more when we get into the SEC that we get really concerned about our opponents."

Another change for the Gators will be the absence of sophomore Naomi Santos-Lamb. The outside hitter, who was responsible for 14.5 points in 20 sets last year, tore her ACL during the Fan Day scrimmage on Saturday.

"I felt that we really lost a week and a half because we had to start over (from) square one when Naomi got injured," coach Mary Wise said. "Right now we're just trying to figure it out."

Even though the Gators have five other outside hitters to choose from, all of them are freshmen, and Wise only had six days to make a decision.

"When the lights come on and the first whistle blows, I know we'll compete," Wise said.
