# UPD advises caution for suspicious packages

## UF hasn't received direct threats

In light of the Boston Marathon bombings, University Police is requesting members of the UF community look out for suspicious packages or mail.

UF has not received any direct threats, but in an email to UF deans, directors and

department chairs Thursday, UPD Chief Linda Stump requested "assistance to remain vigilant and increase awareness of any suspicious activity/package and/or envelope that may arrive in your department."

UF students, faculty and staff should be aware of packages or letters with lumps, bulges, stains, protruding objects or a non-existent return address. They should also

look out for packages with handwritten addresses or address labels with fake companies, wrapped in string, that look like they were not weighed by the United States Postal Service or small packages with excessive postage, Stump wrote in the email.

"This was a proactive outreach to those who would encounter the thousands of pieces of mail that enter campus," said UPD

spokesman Maj. Brad Barber.

Later, the email was forwarded to campus residents and parents.

Stump encouraged anyone who sees a suspicious package to isolate it and to dial 911 or call UPD at 352-392-1111.

"The safety of everyone in the area of the package is our primary concern," she wrote. "If you think the package is suspicious, it is."

## Local Venezuelans upset after election

From posting on social media to rallying on West University Avenue, UF students in Gainesville are actively showing their support for a recount in the Venezuelan presidential election that took place Sunday.

Miguel Machado, a 21-year-old UF journalism junior, traveled to New Orleans over the weekend to vote at the nearest Venezuelan embassy, but his vote was not recognized.

Ballots recorded outside Venezuela were not counted, according to published reports.

An announcement made Sunday night by Tibisay Lu-

cena, the president of Venezuela's National Electoral Council, declared Nicolas Maduro, a successor picked by the late President Hugo Chavez, the victor with 50.66 percent of the vote.

Henrique Capriles, the opposing candidate, received 49.07 percent.

"The country is split in half," Machado said.

Following Sunday's election, Capriles asked for a recount of the votes.

Andrea Carroz, a 19-year-old UF journalism sophomore, said she was disappointed by the election results and the way the votes were handled.

She said the moment Lucena announced the election

books available in more than 50 categories, the event is a book lover's dream.

"I always like to see a rush of people come in at 9 o'clock in the morning with eager antipa-

tion," she said. "They all have a book they're looking for. It's a wonderful opportunity for anyone who likes books."

But patrons will find more than just books at the sale, she said.

Puzzles, computer software and framed oil paintings will also be available for purchase.

The sale's Collector's Corner, which in previous years housed first-edition works from authors such as Robert Frost and William

Faulkner, will also be open.

Though most books run between 25 cents and \$4, all items drop to half-price Tuesday and down again to 10 cents Wednesday.

Joan Bearden, former president of the organization, said the book sales have raised \$2 million for literary projects in Alachua County.

"Our sole purpose is to raise money for the library and for other literacy projects," she said.

# SG campaigning for bond package OK

Two weeks and \$33 million stand between an expanded Reitz Union and a building renovated for quiet studying.

UF student senators are phoning Tallahassee to urge state senators to include UF's student fees, which will finance the projects, in a bond package.

The package is already supported by the Florida House of Representatives, but if the Senate doesn't approve the bonds, funds for the Reitz Union expansion and Newell Hall renovations could be cut.

Student Body President Tj Villamil said state senators are wary of approving the bonds out of fear it would add to the state debt. But UF has never defaulted on its loans, he said.

UF secured the \$75 million Reitz Union expansion in 2012, with \$50 million from bonded student fees and \$5 million from UF reserves. An expected \$20 million would come from the Capital Improvement Trust Fund if the bonds are approved. The Newell Hall renovations would get \$13 million.

The fund was created in 1988 to improve nonacademic student life buildings on campus. It is bonded every four years, which means when students pay tuition, their money is transferred into bonds to be approved by the state Legislature. Then, the money compounds over time to return a greater investment.

The fee costs each student \$6.76 per credit hour, according to the University Bursar's website.

"We want students to call up senators and tell them how important these buildings are to them and how important it is to future Gators," Villamil said.

Sen. Morgan Vollrath is gathering a group of about five senators and Students Party members to take to the phone bank next week.

"It's a bipartisan issue," he said. "Students will benefit greatly from it."

# Florida Museum celebrates Earth Day

From blacktop to full color, the area in front of the Florida Museum of Natural History will transform into an aromatic wonderland for butterflies and guests.

Just past the makeshift meadow of about 140 species of flowers, the museum will hold its first-ever mini BioBlitz.

A BioBlitz is a type of field research where scientists and other volunteers do intensive identification of all living organisms in a

specific area for 24 to 48 hours. The museum's will last five hours. This is where museum collections begin.

The theme of the museum's second-annual Earth Day celebration, held Saturday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., is From Field to Collection. The second-largest plant sale of the year is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. today,

Saturday and Sunday. The goal of this event is to "increase habitat for pollinators" said Jeff Hansen, coordinator of operations and visitor services for the museum.

The Earth Day celebration is free but access to the Titanoboa exhibit and the Butterfly Rainforest is not.

Last year, about 1,600 people came out to the celebration, but the museum is prepared for 2,000, said Catherine Carey, the museum's public programs coordinator.

UF students are holding a 5K Saturday in honor of two fallen Gators.

The sixth annual Fallen Heroes 5K will start at 9 a.m. on the Commuter Lot. Registration is \$25 for UF students, and they can register at [www.active.com/running/gainesville-fl/6th-annual-fallen-heroes-5k-2013](http://www.active.com/running/gainesville-fl/6th-annual-fallen-heroes-5k-2013). People can also register the day of the event.

All money will go to the Gainesville Fisher House Foundation, which offers shelter and support for military families during a medical crisis, and the UDT-SEAL Foundation, which financially assists SEALs and their

family members. As of press time, 165 people had registered, said Seth Lindstrom, the 5K's director.

The 21-year-old UF mechanical engineering junior said the 5K is in honor of Navy SEAL James Suh and Naval Special Warfare Officer Thomas Fouke, both UF alumni.

"They're kind of near and dear to our hearts," Lindstrom said.

Suh, who graduated from UF in 1999, lost his life during a tour in Afghanistan in 2005. Fouke, who graduated in 2006, died in 2012 during training in Virginia because of heart complications.

Fouke's friend and former UF classmate Joey Benevento said he won't be able to attend the 5K Saturday but thinks it's a great way to honor the fallen men.

"He was a great guy," Benevento said. "I kind of looked up to him."

## Study: Beer's taste intoxicates drinkers

A new study suggests the taste of beer, instead of the alcohol content, may be what causes people to drink more, according to Indiana University School of Medicine researchers.

UF student Ellen Farley, a 23-year-old public relations senior, doesn't even take a sip of beer. Instead, she drinks wine.

"I really just don't like beer; not even a sip is enjoyable," she said. "Wine, on the other hand, is something I enjoy, and I tend to drink more of it."

The study found dopamine, a

hormone connected to rewarding activities, is released from the brain after drinking a small amount of alcohol, and the taste alone is enough to release the hormone.

The results suggest alcoholism could be a form of Pavlovian conditioning, which pairs a stimulus

with a specific response.

"While this study reflects on a Pavlovian style of learning, a more thorough investigation of alcoholism may suggest that it is acquired by operant conditioning, a form of learning that occurs through consequences rather than prior stimuli," said Chelsea Fleck, a 21-year-old UF post-baccalaureate research assistant in behavior analysis.

However, she said the study was flawed.

"Without testing the effects of nonalcoholic beer," Fleck said, "it is nearly impossible to conclude that the taste of beer causes continued drinking, which is a shortfall of the research procedures."

## Anthony Rapp talks 'Rent' at Reitz

Anthony Rapp sat on the floor of the Reitz Union Grand Ballroom with his legs crossed in front of about 25 UF students Thursday. Best known for originating the role of Mark Cohen in the Broadway musical "Rent," Rapp spoke in an open forum for students interested in theater three hours before his scheduled public speech.

Rapp, who was paid \$15,000 to come to UF, gave advice to actors trying to break into the business.

"Good luck trying not to be nervous," he said. "Whatever you have going on for you ... Nerves are energy."

Wesley Huffman, a 19-year-old exploratory fresh-

man, was among the students in the private session.

"I thought it was really cool to hear from a seasoned Broadway veteran up close in person," he said.

During the event hosted by Reitz Union Board Entertainment and Accent Speaker's Bureau, Rapp spoke to nearly 300 students about the road to "Rent" and the death of the musical's creator, Jonathan Larson, who only witnessed rehearsal versions of the show.

"I feel a tremendous honor and responsibility to bear witness to what we all went through together and honor Jonathan's legacy," Rapp said. He said working on "Rent" was an exciting musical endeavor, but he had no idea how big a sensation it would become.

"It's utterly transformed my life," Rapp said. "Thank you for being interested and celebrating the work he [Larson] and everyone did to bring this into the world."

## Jewish organizations trying for 1,800 to break Shabbat record

Multiple UF Jewish organizations are hosting the first-ever Shabbat 1800, and they're looking to break a record.

The goal is to have more than 1,800 students and residents come out at 5:30 p.m. to Flavet Field for a free dinner to celebrate the Jewish day of rest.

Spencer Greenfeder, the event's coordinator and a 22-year-old UF mechanical engineering senior, said the original idea started at Binghamton University in 1994 with Shabbat 1000.

"We were essentially inspired by them, but at UF, we have more Jewish students than any other public university in the country at over

8,500," Greenfeder said. "We know we can get as many people to participate."

With a goal of 1,800 people, this is the second-largest Shabbat dinner goal behind New York University, which holds a citywide Shabbat 2000. Greenfeder said Shabbat 1800 at UF will be the largest Shabbat dinner to ever hit any college campus.

Ali Lakofsky, the event's co-coordinator and a 21-year-old UF political science junior, said although the event is targeted at Jewish students, anyone is welcome to attend.

Chabad at UF, Hillel and the Jewish Student Union will pay for the event and the dinner with the help of private donors.

"We were able to fundraise \$7,000 alone from individual contributions in the community and from friends and family," Lakofsky said.

The options are Lola Cola; Steve Z Cal, a zero-calorie, stevia-sweetened soda; Ruby Root Beer; Ginnie Ginger Ale; Lennie Lemon Lime; and lemonade. The rotating flavor is Satch Sour, a probiotic, kombucha-brewed tea beverage.

Satchel Raye, owner of Satchel's, said the idea of making his own soda had been bubbling in his head since 2005, but he wanted to make sure the restaurant was

secure before he moved on to other projects.

"I don't think Coke and Pepsi are the best experience," he said. "I think it's what people are used to, but I don't think that it's necessarily the best. I think soda can be so much better."

He said he wants his drinks to help people change their relationship with soda.

The new beverages are meant to be enjoyed in moderation, Raye added.

"In a way, it becomes more

of an experience and less of a habit once you realize that it can be better for you and taste better," he said.

David Rodriguez, a 22-year-old UF mechanical engineering senior, said he would be interested in trying Satchel's original drinks.

"Everyone seems to have Coke or Pepsi products. It would be interesting to try something new," he said. "It seems like they're made right, unlike the corn syrup-sweetened drinks."

Raye said for now, his sodas still need more tweaking. He's recruited his family and friends to help in the taste-testing process.

"Our sodas are going to get better over the next few months," he said. "I feel like what we have now is not what we're going to have in three months."

decision was irreversible, Venezuelans suspected the election had been tampered with.

Carroz has been using Twitter and other social media sites to express her concerns about the situation.

"I've been ranting like crazy," she said.

Carroz has seen pictures online of ballot receipts being burned by government officials who support Maduro's victory.

In a statement released Monday, Sen. Marco Rubio said, "I am troubled by press accounts of fraud and electoral misconduct including uncounted votes."

He urged the Venezuelan government to conduct a "full and

transparent audit of the results.

"The Venezuelan people should know that the democracies of the Western Hemisphere are watching the electoral review process closely and will seek to hold accountable any individual determined to have disrupted the peaceful conduct of free and fair elections," he said.

Maria Carolina Di Bonaventura, president of the UF Venezuelan

Student Association, said about 60 students gathered Monday on the corner of Southwest 13th Street and West University Avenue to rally in support of a recount.

The organization raised money to pay for trips to New Orleans after Hugo Chavez's death March 5 and the announcement of an election for a new president so local Venezuelans could vote at the Venezuelan

embassy, Di Bonaventura said.

The club provided seven bus tickets to students without asking about political affiliation.

Di Bonaventura said she's seen a trend with people in the U.S. asking for a recount.

"If you've moved to the United States," she said, "you're most likely not in accordance with the government over there."

# Florida sends message about texting

► THE FIRST OFFENSE IS A \$30 FINE.

Texting while driving may be illegal in Florida as soon as May 3 if a bill passed unanimously Tuesday in the Florida Senate also passes in the state's House of Representatives.

Police could charge a driver with texting while driving only as a "secondary offense," meaning the driver would have to be already doing something wrong such as swerving or changing speeds. The first offense would be met with a \$30 fine, and if the offense is repeated within five years, the fine would be doubled and three points would be added to the

offender's license.

Texting while driving has recently become a more frequent deadly habit for Americans, said Patrick Sheehy, a representative for UNITE, a health and wellness organization, who was running a distracted driving simulation booth on UF's campus Thursday.

In 2009, there were about 450,000 injuries due to distracted driving, which is 20 percent of all accidents on the road, Sheehy said.

For every letter typed, the driver's eyes are off the road for about three to four seconds, and those

letters can add up, Sheehy said.

"If you're driving blind, you're not driving," he said. "You're just throwing a moving time bomb down the road."

The bill has built-in exceptions for those using a GPS or reading safety-related information. Texting at red lights would still be allowed.

Eric Strack, a 22-year-old UF advertising senior, tried a simulator Thursday, but he said he remained confident in his abilities to text while driving.

However, hearing about the impending legislation quickly changed his mind.

"I know it's hard to stop cold turkey because sometimes, you just have to send a message out," he said, "but definitely, I'll start limiting to just red lights and eventually cut it out completely."

# Florida bill would require unanimous vote for death penalty

Bills that would require a unanimous vote to sentence someone to death haven't budged in the state House of Representatives and Senate.

Current law stipulates that juries only need a majority vote to sentence a person to death. Florida is the only state with that minimum of a requirement, which has Florida Sen. Darren Soto (D-Kissimmee) concerned. Soto co-introduced SB 148 in December. It was referred to committees but never made it to a vote in any of them.

"Just keep in mind, the folks who are getting a death penalty are getting life in prison," he said. "Whether they should be executed or not is another question."

Soto said Florida has seen many people exonerated by DNA evidence, which suggests there needs to be more safeguards in the system.

Kathryn Zambrana, a UF criminology professor, sees more safeguards as a positive thing, which the proposed legislation provides for in more than one way.

Zambrana explained the jury must first unanimously agree the defendant is guilty. In order to sentence the defendant to death with the current law, a jury determines if the aggravating circumstances, such as if a murder was premeditated, outweigh the mitigating circumstances, like if a defendant had a history of child abuse or mental illness.

With the proposed legislation, a jury would have to unanimously prove each aggravating circumstance beyond a reasonable doubt and all agree to issue the death penalty.

"The process is longer, but I think it's better," Zambrana said. "It'll reduce the likelihood of wrongful conviction and will ensure that jurors are sure in their conviction."

However, the legislation is controversial. State Attorney Bill Cervone said he doesn't see a need for a change in the current law.

"What it does is allow the possibility for one aberrational juror to hold the rest of the jury hostage to their own personal belief," he said.

Cervone said a long list of safeguards already exist in Florida. A judge can override a jury's decision, or a defendant can appeal the decision in higher courts, he said.

In Tallahassee, HB 961 sponsor Rep. Mark Pafford (D-West Palm Beach) said he's disappointed the bill hasn't moved.

Pafford said committees stop meeting in the seventh week of the legislative session. It's currently week six.

"You get one opportunity to make a decision as to whether or not you're going to take a life," he said. "My goal in this bill is to make that decision unanimous for a jury, to provide more potential that somebody isn't put to death beyond a reasonable doubt by the jury."

## I agree with scientists: Mars or bust

Last week, Stephen Hawking gave humanity a startling prediction.

"We won't survive another 1,000 years without escaping our fragile planet," the physicist said.

Hawking emphasized the critical need for our species to continue space exploration and expansion into the universe.

Such sentiments have also been articulated to some degree by others. Scientists like Neil deGrasse Tyson, who recently spoke at UF, also emphasize the importance of continuing human expansion into the universe.

To these scientists, the next destination is clear: Mars.

Tyson has spoken on numerous occasions of the cultural impact an expedition to Mars would have. He imagines a future in which the younger generation will be excited by a Mars mission, inspiring them to create a better future for humanity. To Tyson, an expedition to Mars would be an investment.

So, how far is the United States from a manned mission to the Red Planet? Unfortunately for Americans, the U.S. isn't leading the charge. NASA doesn't have any plans to bring humans to the surface of Mars, but it is planning to set people in orbit of the planet in the 2030s.

Russia, on the other hand, is assuming the role of the ambitious leader of a manned Mars mission. In 2011, a group of volunteers from China, Europe and South America participated in the Mars-500 experiment, where they were confined to a mock spaceship for 520 days, simulating a round-trip to Mars.

Although this might not seem like much, such a gesture of international fellowship — something the United States has historically enjoyed offering — could signal the start of a new leader in the space race.

I would remind the reader that since the retirement of the space shuttle, NASA has no primary vehicle for sending people into space. To get to the International Space Station, our own astronauts take a lift on the Russian Soyuz spacecraft.

Russia isn't the only threat to American dominance of the race to Mars. A group of Dutch entrepreneurs plans to send a group of humans to the Red Planet one-way. The project, called Mars One, would be funded in part through a reality

TV show chronicling the adventures of the travelers.

Mars One is searching for volunteers from the public for the trip and has already collected 45,000 emails from interested parties. I expect this number will skyrocket as time progresses and the plans of Mars One come into fruition.

## Senior outfielder looking to continue hot streak at plate

Kelsey Horton has been a versatile player since she arrived at Florida in 2010. She is now playing the role of one of the Gators' hottest hitters.

Since Florida started its series against Mississippi State on April 5, Horton is 8 for 19 at the plate with three home runs and 10 RBI, three of which came in the Gators' 8-0 win against the Seminoles on Wednesday in Tallahassee.

Horton will look to carry that momentum into No. 3 Florida's (42-5, 14-4 Southeastern Conference) three-game series against Longwood (33-11, 13-5 Big South Conference) this

weekend. The series is the Gators' only three-game set against a non-conference opponent this season.

"This (was) our last midweek game ever," Horton said. "We're closing out the end of the season and trying to finish strong."

### UF Softball

Horton is on her way to closing out the season strong. She is hitting .317 in conference play and has a batting average of .421 in her past eight games.

Horton has moved around the field during the past two seasons. Although primarily an outfielder, Horton spent much of last season behind the plate. After junior catcher Britany Schutte suffered a jaw injury and retired, Horton took

over catching duties from the career .342 hitter.

Although she had experience at catcher, Horton spent most of her playing time prior to 2012 in the outfield or as the designated player.

"Everyone's kind of gone through the same thing, just doing whatever you can to help your team," Horton said.

As the Gators' No. 1 catcher in 2012, Horton had the best season of her career, batting .329 with a career-high 13 home runs in 59 games.

This season, Horton's numbers have tapered off. Her average is down 33 points at .296 and her slugging percentage is

## Does Florida baseball's recent run spell postseason success?


After Florida's 5-3 win at Florida Gulf Coast on Tuesday, the Gators are winners of six in a row as they travel to Columbia, Mo., this weekend to take on Missouri — the 13th-ranked team in the Southeastern Conference. Josh Jurnovoy and Adam Pincus debate whether Florida's recent run of success is sustainable or merely a hot streak.

**Josh:** Florida (20-18, 8-7 SEC) has every right to be happy about the past two weeks. After a 2-0 loss to Mississippi State on April 6, the Gators were four games under .500 with their next five games coming against ranked opponents and a game after that stretch against an FGCU team that swept them in Gainesville earlier in the season. Even though Florida won all of those games, that doesn't mean it is primed for a deep postseason run. The Gators have gotten a lot of help from the opposition during the streak — they've scored nine unearned runs. They can't count on getting that much assistance from better teams later in the season. To counteract that, Florida will have to show more consistency both pitching and hitting than it has to this point.

**Adam:** What better teams are you talking about? Only one of Florida's five remaining SEC series — at No. 3 LSU on May 2-4 — comes against a ranked team. Excluding the Tigers and their 35-3 record, the other four teams have a winning percentage of .465 and are 17-43 in SEC play. That's weaker than you in the gym, and that's giving those teams — Missouri, Tennessee, Auburn and Georgia — more credit than they deserve. It hasn't been pretty for Florida this season. Most of UF's early-season mistakes were head-scratchers. Flying out in the infield on a 2-0 count with runners in scoring position. Hitting a batter to lead off an inning after grabbing a lead. It all happened, but it takes time for a young team to turn it around. While the Gators almost dug themselves in a hole they couldn't get out of, it appears they've finally turned it around.

**Josh:** There's no question the rest of the regular season sets up well for Florida, and it'll probably look dominant and raise expectations to unreasonable heights for the postseason. But the fact remains the Gators probably won't win a regional if their pitching doesn't improve and they get consistent quality starts — which entails throwing at least six innings

while giving up no more than three runs. During their winning streak, the Gators have one such a start. For the season, they've had three — all courtesy of Jonathon Crawford — and a combined four other outings from Danny Young, Bobby Poyner and Jay Carmichael that were more than five innings with just

one run allowed. With games bunched closer together in the SEC and NCAA Tournaments, the bullpen won't survive if the starters don't start giving it more of a rest.

**Adam:** In a regional format, I'll take Florida's pitching any day. Granted it's not the workhorse staff the Gators leaned on last season,

but a combination of Crawford, Carmichael and maybe even Johnny Magliozzi could get the job done. Relievers Daniel Gibson and Ryan Harris have pitched the Gators into a regional from the bullpen. This Gators team isn't the same squad playing its way out of the postseason. This is a dangerous team with burgeoning talent at the plate and on the mound.

# Senior returning for SEC tournament

Florida could see the return of senior Billy Federhofer when it begins postseason play.

Federhofer (right ankle) will be a game-time decision for No. 3 seed UF in its matchup against sixth-seeded South Carolina today at 10 a.m. in the Southeastern Conference Tournament at the Palmer/Salloum Tennis Center in Oxford, Miss.

The senior has missed Florida's past five matches after injuring his ankle during practice.

"Billy's been a big, vital part of our success this year," first-year coach Bryan Shelton said. "We'd like to get him back out there on the court. ... Some things are just out of your control."

Federhofer is 10-3 in singles play this season — the best winning percentage on the team.

The Miami native competed in

the No. 5 and the No. 6 positions in singles for the majority of the season.

He climbed to the No. 3 spot for two matches before suffering his injury.

In Federhofer's absence, the Gators have picked up the slack.

No. 14 Florida (14-9, 7-5 Southeastern Conference) is coming off its most successful weekend of the season, beating No. 8 Kentucky (4-3) and No. 13 Vanderbilt (4-1). Since beginning the season 9-8, the Gators have won four of their past five matches — three against teams ranked in the top 15.

The Gators have maintained success in doubles play without the duo of Federhofer and red-shirt freshman Gordon Watson. During the past three matches, UF has won seven of its nine doubles matches.

Florida is 12-1 this year when it clinches the doubles point.

"We feel like we have enough

depth on this team, we have enough talent out there, we do enough things the right way where it's going to be difficult for teams to win four or five matches against us in singles," Shelton said.

"So getting the doubles point certainly gives us some confidence."

The Gators last won an SEC title in 2011. As a No. 10 seed, Florida fell to Ole Miss 4-1 in the quarterfinals of the SEC Tournament last season.

Florida fell 4-3 at South Carolina (17-9, 7-5 SEC) on March 8. The winner of today's match will advance to the semifinals on Saturday at 11 a.m.

"We're certainly happy about the last couple of weekends and how we've done," Shelton said. "But we know we're just one slip-up away from being knocked out the tournament in the first round, so we've got to be ready."

# A New Chapter: Freshman overcomes injury at Olympic trials

Inside the HP Pavilion center in San Jose, Calif., Bridget Sloan was vying for a spot on the U.S. Gymnastics team at the Olympic trials on June 28, 2012.

Four years had passed since the 2008 Beijing Olympics.

Sloan was considered a veteran after competing on the silver medal-winning team in Beijing. She now faced younger U.S. gymnasts such as Jordyn Wieber and Gabby Douglas.

A 20-year-old Bridget was the fourth-oldest of 15 gymnasts competing at the 2012 Olympic trials preliminaries that day.

"I remember waking up that morning feeling good," Sloan said. "I was like 'All right, today's the day. It's trials.'"

Sloan traveled to San Jose with her coach, Marvin Sharp, while her mother and father, Mary and Jeff Sloan, planned to arrive the evening before the first night of trials.

Sharp, who has coached Bridget since she was four, knew her medical history before going to California. Bridget had suffered numerous injuries to her knees, ankles and arms since joining the U.S. national team in 2003.

"By the time we got to the summer of 2012, she'd been training and competing for 10 years at that level," Sharp said.

Sharp knew Bridget, the most decorated gymnast at trials, faced enormous pressure. She was the 2009 World Championships all-around champion, a six-time Visa Championship competitor and a Pan American Games gold medalist.

"She accomplished a lot — I mean a lot more than 99 percent of the gymnasts out there," Sharp said.

On the night before trials, while practicing her routine on uneven bars, Bridget released too soon on one of her favorite skills, the 'Church' and realized she was off her mark when her toes came off the bar.

"I felt a little off when I was up there on the equipment," she said.

Bridget fell flat onto the practice mats. Her elbow ricocheted off of the sting mat just below her. Without any hesitation, she propped up, powdered her hands with chalk and prepared for another rotation.

She skipped her release and performed her jump exclusively to try to avoid the pain that pierced through her arm. But she couldn't shake it.

Meanwhile, Bridget's parents

were en route to the HP Pavilion Center. A family friend reached out to Mary via text, worried by Bridget's injury. Unaware of the situation, her mother, Mary, couldn't make sense of it all.

But any cause for concern was quickly dismissed. Mary's friend followed up with a text that Bridget had moved on to balance beam.

After consulting with USA Gymnastics medical coordinator Dr. Larry Nassar, Bridget returned to the balance beam and attempted a back handspring. Her arm, weak from her fall, collapsed. Clutching her elbow, Bridget turned to Sharp with a look of concern.

"I looked at Marvin and told him something wasn't right," Bridget said.

Sloan convened with Dr. Nas-

sar, who diagnosed Bridget with a bruised nerve in her elbow.

When Jeff and Mary finally made it to the arena, Bridget called, urging them to meet her in the medical room just below the stadium.

Bridget and Sharp felt it was in her best interest to forgo the remainder of the trials to avoid further injury to her elbow.

"That wasn't how we wanted to end our season, but we weren't going to go out there and cause her anymore damage, and we didn't want to go out and have 16 falls and have that be her last memory," Sharp said.

Bridget's announcement came one month before the London Olympics began, ending a career that took her from Pittsboro, Ind., to Beijing.

"(When I was) going through the MRI and X-Ray, and I realized that I was done... I started really appreciating gymnastics and what it offered me and what I've been able to give back," Bridget said.

In the weeks following her injury, Bridget took time to allow her elbow to heal. She worked closely with trainer Darrell Barnes in Indianapolis.

Following rehab, she traveled to several gymnastics camps including Camp Woodward in Woodward, Pa., — a camp she has coached at since 2009 — and Flip Fest located in Crossville, Tenn.

"She kept herself very busy," Mary said. "She kept herself focused on other things."

At the camps she served as a floater for the training staffs, walking from apparatus to apparatus, correcting back handsprings and bar swings.

She began to sound like her coach of 16 years.

"People kept telling me I taught the way Marvin [Sharp] did," Bridget said.

By the end of July, Bridget re-

focused her attention to selecting a college. She deferred endorsement money throughout her Elite career for a chance to compete collegiately.

Her list had three schools: Utah, Georgia and Florida. With her decision she would become the first World Championships all-around titlist ever to compete collegiately.

Utes coach Greg Marsden shared the same opinion of Bridget as other coaches: she was the most talented freshman going into college gymnastics.

"Everyone knew she was a blue-chipper," said Marsden. "She brings a great deal to a program with not only her abilities, but her personality, and everybody knew that and that's why we recruited her so hard."

When Bridget called Rhonda Faehn to tell her she would become a Gator, there was no answer. On her second try, she got a hold of her new coach, who described Sloan's commitment as a "present."

After falling 0.075 points short of winning the national championship at last year's Super Six, the Gators nabbed Bridget, who made Florida a national title favorite in 2013.

Sloan did not know what to expect at Florida. Her soon-to-be practices differed from the ones she was familiar with at the Elite level.

Her teammates were skeptical, too.

Junior Lauren Rose was unsure of Sloan's personality. Performing alongside her was a former Olympian with enough competition hardware to fill Florida's trophy room.

"I didn't know if she would acknowledge me," Rose said jokingly. "And then again, I didn't know that we would become such good friends because she's so good."

Admittedly, Sloan felt nervous throughout the team's preseason regiments until Florida's opening meet against Ball State on Jan. 4. Sloan competed on three events and took an outright win on vault — her signature event.

Since the postseason began, Sloan has performed her best yet.


Sloan holds the NCAA's best regional qualifying score of 9.955 on uneven bars, and has won the event outright six times this season. On balance beam, she has a regional qualifying score of 9.92, second only to Oklahoma's Taylor Spears' score of 9.945.

Bridget continued to impress at the Southeastern Conference Championships on March 23 in Little Rock, Ark. She earned a share of the SEC all-around title with a score of 39.75 — following in the footsteps of teammate Kytra Hunter, who earned the title as a freshman in 2012.

Her journey to Gainesville may have been littered with injuries, but Sloan is as confident in her abilities as ever.

Now, Bridget has a chance to get the Gators back to the Super Six today at 3 p.m. at the NCAA Championships Semifinal in Los Angeles.

"I'm so glad that I kept my NCAA eligibility and came to Florida," Sloan said. "And to be part of such a great team is such an honor."

# Senior sprinter finishing strong

Ebony Eutsey's high school track and field resume was sparkling.

"Every year was a process," Eutsey said. "In 10th grade, I won state in both the 200 and the 400. In 11th grade, I won Nike Outdoor Nationals and made the world team to go compete in Italy."

But she got off track near the finish line, suffering an injury away from the field.

"My senior year wasn't the best, though," Eutsey said. "I got hurt in P.E. trying to run a 40 against a couple of guys."

After suffering the injury, Eutsey struggled to recover.

"From there, it was a downfall," Eutsey said. "I had gained weight. It was really hard for me."

Despite her injury, UF coach Mike Holloway offered Eutsey a track scholarship.

But the decision was not an easy one. Eutsey spent many tear-filled nights contemplating which school to attend.

"It was intense," Eutsey said. "I didn't know where I was going. I ended up battling between Florida and Texas. It was just so stressful. I would cry to my mom. She'd say, 'Ebony, I'm not telling you where to go. It's your decision.'"

Despite growing up in Miami, Eutsey never dreamed of competing at UF.

"I never had the ritual or history to become a Gator," she said. "I never knew what college I wanted to go to. I finally said to myself that I was just going to Florida. I didn't need to leave the state to be successful."

Since arriving in Gainesville, Eutsey has shown significant progress.

In her freshman and sophomore seasons, she was impatient and failed to stay at the weight she wanted to maintain.

"My freshman year, I was hard on myself," Eutsey said. "I wasn't patient at all. Coach Holloway would always talk to me about patience. I also put on a lot of weight. Part of it was muscle, part of it was fat. I just was too heavy. Sophomore year, I worked on losing weight. I lost some but I still wasn't where I wanted to be."

Eutsey has cut weight since her freshman year and worked on her speed by competing in the 200m sprints. She plans to compete in the 200 at the Tom Jones Memorial Classic this weekend in Gainesville.

"I'm running a 200," she said. "I opened up with 23.5 and I'm expecting to run a 23.3 or a 23.4. Something faster. It doesn't have to be off the charts. Just something to show that I've been improving."

Holloway added: "She didn't like to sprint when she got here. It's hard to be a great quarter-miler if you don't want to sprint and get faster. She's totally bought into the program now. She understands what the thought process is to become a great quarter-miler. She's on the right path right now. We're pleased with her development."

Eutsey's "buying-in" has launched her to new heights this season, breaking a UF record in the women's 4x400m relay — her favorite event.

"Of course, nothing can ever take the place of the 400," Eutsey said. "That's my baby. That will always be my favorite event."

Bache continued her hot streak against Florida State on Wednesday, pitching five shutout innings and only allowing two hits.

# UF begins SEC Championship tourney as No. 2 seed

The Gators are about to face one of their toughest tests this year.

After earning three top-three team finishes in the regular season, Florida, ranked No. 11 by *golfweek.com*, opens the Southeastern Conference Championship in St. Simons Island, Ga., on Friday.

"This sounds kind of strange

to say, but we're healthy," coach Buddy Alexander said. "We got our boy, T.J. (Vogel), back from the Masters. We didn't play with T.J. two weeks ago at the (Gary Koch Invitational) so no excuses, ready to go. Time to put it together, and I honestly believe we're going to play well down the stretch."

The SEC Championship is coming at an opportune time for the Gators, who are healthy for the

first time this season.

Vogel struggled to play his best after undergoing sports hernia surgery in winter. Senior captain Tyler

McCumber had the flu earlier in the year, freshman A.J. Crouch had mono, and sophomore Eric Banks

underwent open-heart surgery during the summer.

But the group has rounded into form entering the playoffs.

Vogel's play will be critical to Florida's title hopes. The Gators last won the conference championship in 2010-11.

"Well, you know, we expanded the SEC this year so Missouri and Texas A&M will be there, but other than that everybody else has that

same familiarity (with the course)," Alexander said.

"If you've got a veteran team and they've played there for a long time, obviously, then that can help you a little bit."

Florida is the No. 2 seed in the tournament.

Alexander hopes the Gators will receive an early tee time and avoid the wind that comes at Seaside Golf Club.

## Slight defensive decline hinders Gators' conference title chances

Florida has come up short on defense during American Lacrosse Conference play, a trend that could prove troubling in the final weekend of the season.

If the Gators finish in a three-way conference tie, the title winner is determined by which team has allowed the fewest goals during the conference season.

Florida (15-1, 3-1 ALC) enters the weekend tied for second with Penn State. Each sits a game behind conference-leader Northwestern (13-1, 4-0 ALC).

Northwestern currently owns the tiebreaker, having allowed only 27 goals during conference play compared with Florida's 42 goals allowed and Penn State's 48.

The Gators face the Wildcats at noon on Saturday in Disney Stadium. Penn State faces Johns Hopkins on Saturday. If the Nittany Lions lose and Gators win, Florida earns the ALC title outright.

"It'll all work out in the end," coach Amanda O'Leary said. "There's all these

different outcomes and all these different scenarios, but until every team has played its final game, we won't know what the standings will be."

Against their first 12 non-conference opponents, the Gators defense was seemingly impenetrable. Florida allowed an average of 5.67 goals per game while facing perennial national championship contenders Syracuse, North Carolina, Loyola and Dartmouth.

But that defensive success has not translated to conference

play. Florida has allowed 10.5 goals per game in four conference matchups.

"I think we need to play a better defensive game," O'Leary said. "We are a little unsettled at times, and I think we have to go back to playing a solid defense."

After allowing double-digit goals only once through 12 games, Florida has given up at least 10 goals against No. 6 Penn State and unranked Vanderbilt.
