



Beer seem more expensive? Thank the hipsters

Hipsters are well known for their vintage appearance and progressive thinking, but their latest trend — causing beer prices to increase — might not be so well received.

A study conducted by Restaurant Sciences found that a rise in price of Pabst Blue Ribbon is causing a rise in price of inexpensive beers like Budweiser and Miller Lite.

"PBR is a good beer for the price," said Perry Fowlkes, a 23-year-old UF computer engineering senior. "If I had the choice between that and other beers, it has a better flavor."

The image people associate with PBR has added to its appeal.

"A lot of times when I drink it, I get labeled as a hipster," Fowlkes said.

Sarah Hamersma, a business assistant professor, said inexpensive brands of beer could be raising their prices in hope of improving their status.

"It's possible that if there's

really this big fall in demand for these other big sub-premium beers that they can't produce it in bulk anymore, so they're raising the price to make up for that," she said.

Kamaron Scholl, a 22-year-old UF telecommunication senior, said he hasn't noticed a change in the price of beer and likes to vary the types of beers he buys. He said he doesn't usually buy cheap beer because "cheap beer tastes like cheap beer."

He also said if a bar doesn't have a wide selection, he'll order PBR or Yuengling.

Alan Hodges, an extension scientist in the UF Food and Resource Economics Department, doubts the price increase is an attempt to make sub-premium beers seem more prestigious. He said the beer market is very competitive and driven by the cost of the primary beer ingredients like barley, wheat and hops, which have seen a recent price increase.

"Those have a well-established market niche with millions of loyal consumers," he said. "I don't think they need to make up a more upscale brand out of it. There are so many other upscale brands of beer."

FAFSA no longer required for Bright Futures scholarship

Students receiving Bright Futures scholarships have it a little easier this upcoming year.

Those who receive this merit-based scholarship will no longer be required to fill out a Free Application for Federal Student Aid form, or FAFSA, in order to obtain it.

A bill signed April 20 by Gov. Rick Scott has changed the previous law from May 2011 that required students to fill out a FAFSA form. The law takes effect July 1 and will apply beginning the 2013-2014 school year.

"Several thousands of students will be affected by this," said Rick Wilder, director of the UF Office for Student Financial Affairs.

Wilder said this change allows stu-

dents who are only interested in the Bright Futures scholarship to avoid an extra step if they do not need other financial aid.

"A number of students...will not have to fill out an unnecessary administrative requirement to receive something based on academic rather than need," Wilder said.

David Pritchard, a 21-year-old UF environmental science senior, said it's less time consuming not to have to fill out a FAFSA form in order to receive something that has already been promised.

Brittany Novak agrees.

It will be great not having to worry about filling out a FAFSA by the deadline, the 19-year-old UF food science and human nutrition sophomore said.

"It's one less thing to worry about," she said, "especially because my dad has been on my back about filling it out."

Click It or Ticket campaign effective at raising seat belt use

In preparation for Memorial Day weekend, the Click It or Ticket campaign that started Monday at UF will crack down on motorists who fail to use their seat belts.

This statewide campaign will run until June 2 and aims to prevent death and minimize injury, according to University Police.

The Click It or Ticket campaigns are set around times when fatalities increase, Officer William Sasser said, for instance, on Thanksgiving Day, Spring Break and Memorial Day.

In Florida, drivers and passengers in the front seat must wear a seat belt, Officer Gregory Castronover said. State law doesn't require backseat passengers to buckle up.

"Everyone on or around campus can get a \$104 seat belt citation," Castronover said. "Nobody wants to receive a

citation if they don't have to."

During the last campaign in March, 82 seat belt citations were issued on campus, according to an email from Officer David Watson. Seat belt usage at UF increased by 4 percent, he wrote.

Safety belt compliance usually increases every time police hold a Click It or Ticket campaign, Sasser said.

"It starts out in the low 90s then ends up in the mid to high 90s," he said. "We're pretty good about wearing seat belts around here."

Visibility and enforcement for the Click It or Ticket campaign is credited with helping raise national seat belt use.

Compliance in 2011 was at 84 percent, and by 2012, it reached 86 percent, according to a survey by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Seat belt usage in Southern states increased from 80 percent in 2011 to 85

Restaurant learns online reviews can make or break

PHOENIX — It was the customer service disaster heard around the Internet.

An Arizona restaurateur, fed up after years of negative online reviews and an embarrassing appearance on a reality television show, posted a social media rant laced with salty language and angry, uppercase letters that quickly went viral last week to the delight of people who love a good Internet meltdown.

"I AM NOT STUPID ALL OF YOU ARE," read the posting on the Facebook wall of Amy's Baking Co. in suburban Phoenix. "YOU JUST DO NOT KNOW GOOD FOOD."

It was, to put it kindly, not a best business practice. Add to that an appearance earlier this month on the Fox reality television show "Kitchen Nightmares" — where celebrity chef Gordon Ramsay gave up on trying to save the restaurant after he was insulted — and you have a recipe for disaster.

"That's probably the worst thing that can happen," said Sujan Patel, founder and CEO of Single Grain, a digital marketing agency in San Francisco.

In the evolving world of online marketing, where the power of word-of-mouth has been wildly amplified by the whims and first impressions of anonymous reviewers posting on dozens of social media websites, online comments, both good and bad, and the reactions they trigger from managers can make all the difference between higher revenues and empty storefronts.

Hotels, restaurants and other businesses that depend on good customer service reviews have all grappled in recent years with how to respond to online feedback on sites such as Twitter, Foursquare, Yelp, Facebook and Instagram, where comments can often be more vitriolic than in-person reviews because of the anonymous shield many social media websites provide.

No matter how ugly the reviews get, businesses need to be willing to admit mistakes and offer discounts to lure unhappy customers back, digital marketing experts said.

"In the past, people just sent bad soup back. Well, now they are getting on social media and telling all their friends and friends of friends how bad the soup was and why they should find other places to get soup in the future, so it takes

the customer experience to another level," said Tom Garrity of the Garrity Group, a public relations firm in New Mexico.

"The challenge becomes — how do you respond when someone doesn't think your food or product is as great as you think it is?"

In Amy and Samy Bouzaglo's case, the bad reviews were compounded by their horrible reality TV experience. The couple said during a recent episode of "Kitchen Nightmares" that they needed professional guidance after years of battling terrible online reviews. They opened the pizzeria in an upscale Scottsdale neighborhood about six years ago.

"Kitchen Nightmares" follows Ramsay as he helps rebuild struggling restaurants. After one bite, he quickly deemed Amy's Baking Co. a disaster and chided the Bouzaglos for growing increasingly irate over his constructive feedback. Among his many critiques: The store-bought ravioli smelled "weird," a salmon burger was overcooked and a fig pizza was too sweet and arrived on raw dough.

"You need thick skin in this business," Ramsay said before walking out. It was the first time he wasn't able to reform a business, according to the show.

Amy's Baking Co. temporarily closed last week after the episode aired. A Bouzaglo spokesman said the couple was not available for an interview Monday. The restaurant's answering machine was full. Emails and Facebook messages were not returned.

A wall post published last week claimed the restaurant's Facebook, Yelp and Twitter accounts had been hacked, but hundreds of commenters expressed doubt. Social media sites show someone posting as a member of the Bouzaglo family had been insulting customers over negative reviews since at least 2010.

The story bounced across the Internet, generating thousands of comments on Facebook, Yelp and Twitter, and prompting nearly 36,000 people to sign a petition on Change.org that asks the Department of Labor to look into the Bouzaglo's practice of pocketing their servers' tips.

While many corporations hire communications experts to respond to every tweet, Facebook message and online review, the wave of digital feedback can be especially challenging for small businesses with small staffs, digital consultants said.

For one thing, there is so much online content to wade through. Roughly 60 percent of all adults get information about local businesses from search engines and entertainment web-

sites, according to a 2011 study by the Pew Internet & American Life Project.

"Customer service is a spectator sport now," said Jay Baer, president of Convince & Convert, a social media marketing consultancy in Indiana. "It's not about making that customer happy on Yelp. That's the big misunderstanding of Yelp. It's about the hundreds of thousands of people who are looking on to see how you handle it. It's those ripples that make social media so important."

In their "Kitchen Nightmares" episode, Amy and Samy Bouzaglo are seen yelling and cursing at customers inquiring about undercooked food or long delays. They blame online bullies.

"We stand up to them," Amy Bouzaglo tells the camera at one point. "They come and they try to attack us and say horrible things that are not true."

That's exactly how businesses shouldn't respond, the digital experts said.

"If your policy is to berate the customer online, that doesn't create good public relations," Garrity said.

Baer said he tells clients to create a response matrix representing different potential complaints that staff can refer to whenever bad feedback arises. Creating the comment chart before the bad publicity hits helps ensure businesses aren't responding to angry or disappointed customers with their own anger or disappointment, Baer said.

A 2011 Harvard study found Yelp's 40 million reviews disproportionately affect small businesses. The research found a one-star increase in Yelp's five-star rating system resulted in a revenue jump of up to 9 percent for some restaurants, while chains with sizable advertising budgets were unaffected.

"You have to respond 100 percent of the time, whether you like it or not," Baer said. "Businesses need to assign someone to stay on top of it."

In Arizona, Amy and Samy Bouzaglo had planned a grand reopening ceremony and news conference for Tuesday, but the news conference was canceled late Monday after legal threats from Fox.

Fewer than a dozen people were waiting when the restaurant reopened Tuesday. Four guards blocked the door and turned reporters away. Inside, a smiling Samy Bouzaglo.



Okla. tornado damage nearing \$2 billion

MOORE, Okla. — The tornado that struck an Oklahoma City suburb this week may have created \$2 billion or more in damage as it tore through as many as 13,000 homes, multiple schools and a hospital, officials said Wednesday as they gave the first detailed account of the devastation.

At the same time, authorities released the identities of some of the 24 people, including 10 children, who perished. While anguish about the deaths was palpable as residents began picking up their shattered neighborhoods, many remained stunned that the twister didn't take a higher human toll during its 17 miles and 40 minutes on the ground.

The physical destruction was staggering.

"The tornado that we're talking about is the 1 or 2 percent tornado," Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management Director Albert Ashwood said of the twister, which measured a top-of-the-scale EF5 with winds of at least 200 mph. "This is the anomaly that flattens everything to the ground."

As response teams transitioned into cleanup and recovery, Oklahoma City Mayor Mick Cornett, who sent police

and fire crews from his city to assist the effort, said an early assessment estimated damage costs at between \$1.5 billion and \$2 billion.

The Oklahoma Insurance Department, meanwhile, said visual assessments of the extensive damage zone suggest the cost could be greater than the \$2 billion from the 2011 tornado that struck Joplin, Mo., and killed nearly seven times as many people.

Though there was less than 10 minutes warning that a tornado was on the ground Monday and headed for Moore, many in the area are accustomed to severe storms. The community of 56,000 people has been hit by four tornados since 1998, and residents were already on alert after weekend storms and days of warnings. Because the tornado hit in the afternoon, many others were away from the neighborhoods and out of harm's way at work.

Harold Brooks, research meteorologist at the National Severe Storms Laboratory in Norman, Okla., said long-range forecasting models also have dramatically improved and are able to provide insight even a week before a storm strikes.

percent in 2012.

The Florida Department of Transportation, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and law enforcement agencies across the state take part in the campaign, according to a UPD media release.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, one in five Americans fails to continuously wear a seat belt when driving or riding in a motor vehicle.

In 2011, about 21,000 occupants died in car crashes nationally because they didn't use their seat belts, according to an announcement by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. This represents 66 percent of all motor vehicle crash deaths.

The announcement also said seat belts saved about 11,949 lives in 2011 and if everyone would have buckled up, an estimated 3,400 additional lives could've been saved.

Statistics prove that seat belts prevent more injuries than not wearing them, said Sgt. Tracy Hisler-Pace, public affairs officer for Florida Highway Patrol.

"It's not always going to save you from injuries," she said, "but it will minimize the severity."

New library branch to expand in Gainesville's east side

With construction underway for the newest Alachua County library branch, organizers plan to bring expanded resources for residents to Gainesville's east side.

The facility will be located at 2841 E. University Ave., near the Eastside Recreation Center and in front of the Fred Cone Park track, which was completed in March.

The library currently operates out of a modular unit that is about 1,000 square feet. Before, a bookmobile serviced the area.

"The biggest difference will be the space and what you can put in that space," said Nickie Kortus, marketing and public relations manager for the Alachua County Library District.

Organizers have analyzed trends for the community to determine the types of resources that best meet residents' needs, Kortus said.

The new building will include a dedicated eGovernment com-

puter where library users can fill out forms and applications, a children's area that will offer parenting resources and a teen game station.

"The difference at this particular branch is that it is a library located at a city park and recreation center," Kortus said. "So we collaborate with the city of Gainesville to improve recreational and educational opportunities in that community."

The branch also teamed with Partnership for Strong Families, which provides child welfare, social and community services to the area. The group will have space to operate out of the new library.

"All of these pieces come together to navigate resources that you need to be successful in today's world," Kortus said. "If you don't have access (to technology), that is where the library can be that cohesive piece that brings it all together."

Construction of the building projected to be 10,000 square feet is expected to end in December, Kortus said.

A Gainesville woman was arrested Tuesday after she allegedly hit her estranged husband, took his cellphone and backed her vehicle into his truck in the parking lot of West Coast Seafood.

According to a Gainesville Police Department arrest report, Lashun Fayson, 42, met Ray Fayson at the grocery store's parking lot, 510 NE Waldo Road, so she could return his Nissan Titan truck.

The Faysons — who are in the process of getting divorced — had switched vehi-

cles so Lashun Fayson could use the truck to move, said Katrina Alston, Ray Fayson's girlfriend who saw the incident.

During the exchange, Lashun Fayson became irate at her husband because she was jealous, Alston said.

"Just the fact that he's with me — that's it. That's the only thing she could be upset about," Alston said.

Lashun Fayson handed him gas money but then snatched it back, Alston said.

She slapped him in the face, according to the report, and shoved his chest where his pacemaker was located.

Lashun Fayson had already given a set of truck keys back to her husband, Alston

said, but she refused to return the spare keys.

According to the report, she unlocked the truck and took her husband's cellphone, valued at \$200, from the cab of the truck and refused to give it back.

She also "tried to set his clothes on fire in the back of the truck," Alston

said.

Then, Lashun Fayson climbed into her Grand Marquis and backed it toward Ray Fayson, Alston said.

Instead, she hit his truck, and caused possible damage to the wheel, according to the report.

"If he wouldn't have moved, she would have ran him right over," Alston said. "I'm standing there, looking like, 'Are you serious?'"

Lashun Fayson then drove out of the parking lot, Alston said.

About two hours later, police found Lashun Fayson the 400 block of Northwest Eighth Avenue and arrested her, according to the report.

She was booked into the Alachua County Jail on charges of criminal mischief and domestic battery.

As of press time, she had been released.





Political ideologies are not the answer

According to an opinion column written by T. Emmett Ryan, it is time feminists embrace "laissez-faire capitalism," or, as it is known to others, "rampant capitalism," in which all financial transactions are completely free from state intervention. Did you hear that, ladies? We ought to stop nagging legislators to promote gender equality in the workplace. Instead, we should just shrug our shoulders and accept the fact that women are a commodity of lesser value.

In the utopia envisioned by Ryan, an employer can hire anyone he or she wants for any reason and at any wage. In our economy, men just happen to be at a higher value than women, so it only makes sense for them to earn more in wages. If a woman wants to be competitive in this market, her best option would be to accept a lower wage. Doesn't that sound empowering?

Ryan's logic for this is completely sound according to the fundamental laws that govern markets. In order for a state to enforce an equal-pay act, the state would have to assume the cost of labor in a given market and redistribute wealth from the firms to the laborers, thus reducing economic efficiency. In the case of a market in which women are a lower-valued commodity, artificially making their value equal to that of men would likewise reduce economic efficiency as well. Furthermore, if a woman's value is artificially higher than it ought to be, a sexist employer will simply not hire her. Following this argument, the only way a woman can compete in such a market would be to accept a low-

er wage and the lower standard of living that comes along with that wage.

From a purely economic viewpoint in which efficiency is favored above anything else, this makes complete sense. However, Ryan is failing to understand that if we lived in a laissez-faire economy—for example if he were to work at a burger joint—he would probably earn less than a dollar by the hour since the minimum wage greatly reduces economic efficiency, which places the wage way above economic equilibrium.

He is also failing to understand that sexism, as well as all forms of discrimination, operates systematically. This means sexism is not simply one or a few individuals committing acts of discrimination. It means sexism is a learned behavior reinforced daily by education, all forms of media and in some cases, laws. Women are not earning 76 cents to each dollar earned by a man because her employer is sexist—it is instead because we live in a society that places men at a higher value than women.

In fact, Ryan said it himself. According to his article, a woman's competitive wage is lower, implying that a man's labor is worth more. The only way to truly empower women is not to embrace a political ideology, whether right-winged or left-winged. Instead, we need to stop thinking about human beings as units of economic value. We need to start thinking of women and men not as opposites which are intrinsically different from each other, but as human beings who are valuable because all humans are valuable.

Sutton said masturbating has not been an issue in his dorm showers, and he didn't think it was a problem in other dorms on campus.


"I think it's hysterical," said the 20-year-old UF environmental engineering junior. "I don't think housing made it, but it's really funny."

National board suggests tightening DUI requirements

IT RECOMMENDS STATES LOWER BAC LEVEL FROM 0.08 TO 0.05.

A national recommendation to tighten standards that constitute drunken driving may not affect Florida, local officials say.

The National Transportation Safety Board recently recommended that states lower the legal limit of blood alcohol content that indicates drunken driving — currently 0.08 na-

tionwide — to 0.05.

More than 100 countries on six continents have BAC level limits set at 0.05 or lower, according to a board press release.

"The research clearly shows that drivers with a [BAC] above 0.05 are impaired and at a significantly greater risk of being involved in a crash where someone is killed or injured," said NTSB chairwoman Deborah Hersman, according to the press release.

However, Gainesville Police Department spokesman Officer Ben Tobias said changing the limit would not necessarily affect DUI



enforcement in Florida.

Tobias said Florida's DUI law involves two conditions to be considered drunk at the wheel: The driver must either score a BAC level of 0.08 on a breath test or display signs of impairment.

Normally, he said, officers simply administer a field sobriety test.

"For us, honestly, a BAC is an icing on the cake," Tobias said. "The actual number

isn't as important as if the field sobriety is showing that they are impaired."

State Rep. Keith Perry said talk of changing the limit surfaced during session in Tallahassee, but nothing is definite.

However, he said managing the DUI limit could present an effective way to encourage safe driving.

"We certainly need to look at every possibility of using that without being overly restrictive," he said.

New stats portal available

Figuring out statistical data just became a lot easier, thanks to Statista.

The George A. Smathers Libraries recently became a subscriber to www.statista.com, a portal that allows students and faculty to access data from some 60,000 different topics.

"This is an index that has thousands of data displayed in a user-friendly form, allowing you to utilize it in different ways," said UF business librarian Peter McKay.

Any graphical data found on the website can be downloaded as a JPEG to PowerPoint or Excel. It can also be printed and

viewed in different formats, like bar and line graphs.

"It is a very powerful tool," McKay said. "I think allowing students access to this program will help them understand statistics and the numbers behind it all," said Alexandra Webel, a 20-year-old UF mathematics and statistics junior.

"A lot of students find statistics intimidating and difficult to understand, but when they are presented with a topic they are interested in, they begin to understand what the numbers and results signify," Webel said.

The website can be accessed whether on or off campus. Students entering the website on campus have instant access. If accessing it while at home, students can enter Statista through the Smathers Libraries website using their GatorLink login information.





In circumstances like these, readers are invited to take a critical look at the construction of shows marketed as observations of reality.

"What is the Good Life" still required for incoming freshmen

Freshmen will need to make sure their schedules include "What is the Good Life" in upcoming semesters.

The interdisciplinary humanities class will be required for the second year in a row. Andrew Wolpert, humanities common course director,

said the first year went well.

"It's been a huge success developing this core curriculum," Wolpert said.

He said about 6,800 freshmen are expected to enroll in "What is the Good Life" in the next academic year.

The 2012 Summer B term marked the first time UF mandated the course for incoming freshmen. The class poses philosophical questions to students and zooms in on the arts, religion and sustainability.

Wolpert said that the student response was mixed, and most negative comments stemmed from the fact that the class is required.

John Maze, UF architecture professor and an instructor of "What is the Good Life," said the course pushes students out of their comfort zones.

"We try to expose you to as many viewpoints as possible," he said.

Jillian Briceno, a 19-year-old UF biology sophomore, said the class differed from her usual science-

heavy schedule.

"It is a way to broaden perspectives, so I see why they have it," Briceno said.

Lisa Paper, a 20-year-old UF journalism sophomore, said she enjoyed the class, but the workload was heavy.

"There was too much reading each week," Paper said. "I think it just overwhelmed people, so they didn't want to read it."

The course was made mandatory by the University Curriculum

Committee. About 6,300 students were enrolled in the class in Fall and Spring of the 2012-2013 school year.

Wolpert said he is looking to enhance the course by getting students more engaged and shrinking lecture class sizes. The goals of the requirement were to unite freshmen and educate students about the humanities.

"It's been an enormous learning experience," Wolpert said. "We're very pleased with how things went."

Hundreds of dreams were brought to life Saturday at the fourth annual Sweet Dreams "Touch-A-Truck."

Horns honked as families walked through the maze of service vehicles on Citizens Field. The event provided children with a hands-on educational experience, allowing them to climb into and onto any vehicle of their choice.

"This is fabulous," TJ Mong, 8, said as he hopped on the laurel green Fish and Wildlife Conservation airboat.

"How does this work?" Andrew Dube, 3, asked a firefighter.

"He loves trucks," Andrew's father, Matt Dube, said. "It's a good way for him to see the real thing and see how this equipment is used. And I want to give him a broader perspective on life."

By midday, smoke filled the air and families rushed toward the white picnic tables where Gainesville firefighters grilled hot dogs and hamburgers.

Next to the condiments lay a firefighter boot in which they collected donations.

Proceeds benefit Camp Amigo, the Children's Burn Camp of North Florida, which aims to build a network of support for children who have physical and emotional scars.

"This is a good chance for another few thousand people to know about us," Rusty Roberts, Camp Amigo's president and a Tallahassee firefighter, said.

Cassie Null, a 22-year-old burn survivor and Camp Amigo counselor, took a break from stuffing and distributing complimentary black and yellow tote bags to share her camp story.

"You know when you see someone who has the same shirt you have, you go, 'Oh my gosh! I have that same shirt.' Well, we're like, 'Oh my gosh! I have that same burn,'" Null said. "Yeah, it's weird, but

that's how much we bond."

Null was among the first group to attend Camp Amigo, and now she serves as a mentor.

"I got to get both sides," she said. "I'm not here for me anymore, you know."

YouTube charges for use of 54 channels

Catering to a population that spends just as much time watching television as they do working, sleeping and going to school, it is no surprise that online video sites have begun to charge users to stream their favorite shows and movies.

Recently, YouTube began launching 54 pay channels ranging from children's shows and stations dedicated to pet lovers, to LGBT entertainment and UFC fights.

These channels are supplied by YouTube partners and are priced between 99 cents and \$7.99 per month. The average channel cost is \$2.99. Users may purchase a subscription per channel using Google Wallet and enjoy a 14-day free-trial period. These channels are not all ad-free but at least 40 are.

"I think the prices are reasonable," 19-year-old UF public relations sophomore Calli Rudman, who uses YouTube most often to watch music videos and Netflix for movies, said. "But I

would like better to be able to hand pick a movie because it would be more specific to what I want."

However, paying for the monthly subscription gets the viewer access to various exclusive films and episodes, depending on what the channel delivers.





Florida eliminated in first round of SEC Tournament

With a chance for the Southeastern Conference title and a possible NCAA Tournament bid on the line, Florida needed someone to step up.

No one did.

"We didn't compete at the end," assistant coach Brad Weitzel said.

Down by two runs late in the game, the Florida offense collapsed. Seven of the last eight batters struck out against Texas A&M's starter Daniel Mengden, who sealed the Aggies' (32-25, 15-16 SEC) 6-3 win over the Gators (29-28, 14-17 SEC) in Hoover, Ala., on Tuesday.

"I thought we pitched well enough ... but we just weren't able to do enough offensively," coach Kevin O'Sullivan said.

Before the Gators' offense shut down, it got out to an early lead against Mengden.

Right fielder Justin Shafer got on base on an error by Aggies second baseman Blake Allemann and advanced to second on a balk. He made it to third on a wild pitch, and first baseman Vickash Ramjit drove him in on a groundout.

Florida got back-to-back hits from designated hitter Zack Powers and left fielder Harrison Bader and executed a double steal to put both runners in scoring position. Cody Dent hit an infield single to score Powers, but Bader was thrown out at home trying to score from second.

The Gators tacked on a third run after the

Aggies took a 3-2 lead in the fifth on a three-run homer by third baseman Hunter Melton. Florida third baseman Josh Tobias singled to start the inning and advanced to third on groundouts by Dent and Richie Martin. Tobias came around to score on a wild pitch.

But Florida's offense ended there.

After second baseman Casey Turgeon walked in the fifth inning, Florida did not get a man on base for the rest of the game. Tobias' single was the last ball a Gator hit out of the infield.

After giving up early runs, Mengden settled down and worked the Florida lineup. The sophomore right-hander struck out a career-best 11 batters and retired the last 13 hitters he faced.

"I think he mixed it up pretty well," Bader said. "He threw a lot of different types of pitches for strikes."

While Mengden was sitting down Florida batters, the Gators did not get a similar performance from starter Johnny Magliozi.

The sophomore – making only his third start of the season – began the game strong, setting the Aggies down in order in the first three innings. But Magliozi surrendered five runs in 6.2 innings of work and picked up his first loss as a starter this season.

"I thought I made one bad pitch," Magliozi said. "Other than that, I felt pretty good."

After being eliminated from the SEC Tournament, Florida rests its postseason hopes on the NCAA Tournament selection committee.

The Gators have not missed the NCAA Tournament since finishing 29-30 in 2007.

"Our RPI is really good," O'Sullivan said. "We've had our ups and downs, but we've had a lot of good weekends in between ... At

the end of the day, it's the committee's decision."

It's time for Gators fans to face the facts. This year's baseball team is not good.

Sitting at 29-28 – the worst record for the baseball program since 2007 – and with its season possibly over, everyone can acknowledge that this team did not have what it took to win this year.

The hitting wasn't there, especially at the end. In their last eight games, the Gators averaged 3.4 runs per game. Those numbers include a three-game series against Georgia – the worst team in the SEC – where Florida only scored seven runs.

Sluggers like Mike Zunino and Preston Tucker led last year's team. But the MLB Draft took its toll on the Gators and sapped all of their power.

Catcher Taylor Gushue was supposed to lead the Gators' offense and replace some of the lost power, but he finished the year with five hom-

ers. That would have tied for sixth on last year's team.

Second baseman Casey Turgeon had a similar season to his 2012 campaign that him named to Perfect Game's Freshman All-American team. But this year he was expected to be a premier player in the Gators' offense, and a .269 average didn't cut it.

The pitching wasn't where it needed to be, either.

Jonathon Crawford was supposed to be an ace. He had a great sophomore season in 2012 that was highlighted by a no-hitter – in the NCAA Regionals, no less.

But Crawford struggled to find consistency all season, and his ERA

Embree deserves to be in conversation of all-time UF greats

L auren Embree's list of collegiate accomplishments is nothing short of astounding.

She is more than simply one of the most successful women's tennis players in program history; Embree deserves mentioning in conversations discussing Florida's best athletes, in any sport, of all time.

I'm talking the greats: Tebow, Wambach, Noah, Spurrier, and the rest.

That's why Embree's performance this week is nothing short of shocking.

With the Gators in contention for their third consecutive national championship — Embree hand-delivered the previous two championships with match-clinching victories against Stanford in 2011 and UCLA in 2012 — the expectation was the nation's No. 1 player would finish her storied career by riding off into the sunset with another piece of hardware.

But reality often scoffs at fairy-tale endings.

Florida fell into a 3-0 hole against Stanford in the semifinals. The Gators battled back before Alex Cercone lost in a three-set war of a match to end UF's season. But the writing was on the wall when Embree walked off the court with her first loss in an NCAA dual match.

Read that again: Embree walked off the

court with her first loss in an NCAA dual match. Before falling 6-0, 6-1 to No. 13 Nicole Gibbs on Monday, Embree had won all 15 of her matches in NCAA dual competition.

No surprise, but that stands as a program record.

During Embree's four seasons — a career capped with the ITA naming her National Senior Player of the Year on Tuesday — UF never fell short of the semifinals. .

Literally, with a few more breaks — or better bounces — the Gators could have won four straight titles and become nothing short of a dynasty. Instead, they will have to settle for two championships — still enough to be considered the most successful program at UF as of late.

Florida's four-year run with Embree was nearly flawless. But it won't be repeated, no matter how many blue-chip prospects coach Roland Thornqvist can convince to come try to recreate Embree's magic.

Freshman long-distance runner garners conference honor

The outdoor track and field season isn't a sprint – it's a marathon.

Spanning roughly three months with meets scattered throughout, the key to having a successful season is to finish strong. It's a theme that's evident in events like the men's 10,000-meter.

Thanks to freshman Jimmy Clark, Florida has excelled in the men's 10k this outdoor season.

Clark was named the Southeastern Conference's Men's Freshman Runner of the Year and a member of the All-Conference First Team.

"It was nice winning," Clark said. "It was a great surprise. It's a great achievement, but there's still a lot of work to do."

Clark's production has shot up significantly this outdoor season. After competing in two indoor seasons and one season running cross country, Clark never placed better than fourth in any individual event.

"I wasn't eating the best," Clark said. "With the help from coach (Paul) Spangler and [nutritionist Kelsee Gomes], I was able to get on a good diet and I lost some weight. It's really helped my running so far."

Once outdoor season came around, so did Clark. He earned all of his personal bests this season, and he has won more than half of the events in which he has competed. His most recent victory came in the men's 10k at the SEC Championships in Columbia, Mo.

"Coach Spangler's done a great job with us this year," Clark said. "He had confidence in our abilities heading into the meet. We wanted to run well, especially in the 10k."

Clark and the Gators now focus on the season's penultimate meet – the

NCAA East Preliminary Rounds at North Carolina A&T State University in Greensboro, N.C.

The top 12 finishers in each individual event and top six finishers in each relay event at the preliminaries advance to the NCAA Outdoor Championships in Eugene, Ore.

Florida has 48 athletes (22 men, 26 women) competing in 29 events. The Gators are currently the top seed in seven events in the East region: both the men's and women's 4x400m relay squads, sophomore Ciarra Brewer in the women's triple jump, senior and NCAA-leader Omar Craddock in the men's triple jump, junior Cory McGee in the women's 1,500 meters, freshman Marija Vučenović in the women's javelin throw and senior Ugonna Ndu in the women's 400-meter hurdles.

Ndu, who is also running in the women's 100-meter hurdles, is one of five athletes competing in multiple individual events in Greensboro this weekend. The others are junior Darshay Davis in the women's 100 and 200 meters, sophomore Marquis Dendy in the men's long jump and triple jump, junior Lorraine Graham in the women's 100-meter hurdles and long jump and junior Agata Strausa in the women's 1,500- and 5,000-meter.

Florida's men hope to repeat after last year's finish as 2012 NCAA Outdoor Champions – the only time the school has garnered the title.

"We're just coming in confident," Clark said. "As a team, we have much bigger goals than just getting to nationals. We want a national title back in Gainesville. Everyone on the team is real focused. We're looking to do big things out in Eugene."

Added Clark: "We want to get as many people as we can out to Eugene so we can score some big points at nationals."

currently sits at 4.03 – .90 higher than his final ERA last year.

The staff behind Crawford didn't pick up the slack. Nine other pitchers made starts this season, some occasionally showing promise before suffering an injury or going back to the bullpen.

Florida struggled to get starters past the middle innings, and many a box score had half a dozen names listed as Florida pitchers.

The Gators' lack of depth is not necessarily coach Kevin O'Sullivan's fault. He lost the most talented group of upperclassmen Florida baseball has ever seen. Gone were nearly the entire offense, his two top starters and three best bullpen arms.

And the major leagues were not done pillaging his team. The Gators lost several top recruits in the draft, as well.

Gatorade Player of the Year Lance McCullers Jr. was supposed

to take the mound at McKethan Stadium this year, but the Houston Astros took him 41st overall. He has a 1.72 ERA in Single-A this season.

Outfielder Jesse Winker signed to play at Florida, but went to the Cincinnati Reds 49th overall. He has batted .326 in the Reds' system the last two years.

The remnants of a good recruiting class still benefited Florida – freshmen Richie Martin and Harrison Bader were the only starters to hit .300 – but the special, once-in-a-class player wasn't there.

Assistant coach Brad Weitzel said after the game Tuesday that the Gators would be dangerous in an NCAA regional.

Jockeying for a bid is all well and good, but saying that this team is dangerous to any decent college team is not true. The Gators aren't dangerous, they're just plain mediocre.

Florida catcher finding hitting stroke in NCAA Tournament

When Taylore Fuller arrived at Florida, the expectations were high.

Fuller joined UF as the No. 38 overall player and No. 6 catcher in the Class of 2012, according to ESPN. At Chiefland High, Fuller posted a .778 batting average and recorded 14 home runs, nine doubles, six triples and 33 RBI during her senior year.

The Trenton native was named the 2012 Florida Dairy Farmers Class 1A Player of the Year, among other accolades.

Through her first 59 games as a Gator, Fuller did not meet the sky-high expectations as a hitter. As of May 11, Fuller was batting .175 at the plate and had tallied 16 hits – three doubles, and two home runs for 14 RBI.

But during last weekend's Gainesville Regional, Fuller erupted.

The freshman doubled her home-run total for the year, knocking both of her solo blasts during Florida's first two days of action against Hampton and USF. Fuller went 3 of 6 with three RBI and two walks for the weekend,

"I really had nothing to lose," Fuller said.

In the fifth inning against Hampton on Friday, Fuller homered to left field, increasing Florida's advantage to 6-1 and putting the contest out of reach for the Pirates.

Against USF ace Sara Nevins on Saturday,

Fuller led off the second with a solo homer to center. It was only Nevins' sixth allowed this year.

The Gators went on to score four more runs in the inning for an 8-1 lead.

Facing Bulls reliever Sam Greiner in the third, Fuller began the inning with a double that bounced off the left-center field fence.

"I've been seeing the ball really well," Fuller said. "My timing is finally coming together for me. But just being able to produce for my team finally feels really good. They all get really excited for me."

Fuller was also hit by a Nevins pitch with the bases loaded on Sunday, scoring a run to give UF a 2-0 lead.

With a Super Regional matchup looming against Alabama-Birmingham (40-17) on Saturday at 1 p.m. at Katie Seashole Pressly Stadium, Fuller hopes to continue her recent hitting success.

She is one of 13 players for No. 2 seed Florida (55-7) who have never competed in a Super Regional.

"We're playing her for those moments," coach Tim Walton said. "We want more home runs and doubles from her ... She can put a little bit of sock ... at the end of the lineup."

Gators fall down the leaderboard at NCAA Championships

It was a new day on the golf course, but much of the same on the scorecard for Florida in the second round of competition at the NCAA Championships.

The Gators slid further down the leaderboard Wednesday after only improving by one shot from their first-round performance of 299 (+11). Florida's five golfers shot a 298 (+10), finishing in 19th on Wednesday.

Their two-round score of 597 (+21) put them 37 shots behind first-place USC midway through competition.

Freshman Ursula Orehek was a bright spot for the Gators, but her round got off to a rough start.

Orehek bogeyed her first hole and double-bogeyed her third. She recovered with four birdies against only two bogeys in her 15 remaining holes to end the day with a 73 (+1), the best performance for Florida by two strokes.

"I'm happy with the way Ursula played," coach Emily Bastel said in a release. "She hung pretty tough after a slow start. Overall, we had it going for a few stretches. We just haven't quite been able to put it together for an entire day, and that's what we'll be trying to do for the

next couple of days and keep moving up."

Senior Mia Piccio and sophomore Camilla Hedberg again matched each others' scores, but the results were two shots worse than their first round as both women carded two of Florida's three 75 (+3) rounds on the day.

Piccio's consistency in her first round – which included 12 straight pars – did not carry over to Round 2. The senior had three bogeys on the front nine and a double bogey on hole 15. Piccio's saving graces was bookending birdies on holes 10 and 18 of the back nine.

Hedberg's day ended poorly af-

ter playing 15 holes at either even par or one over. She bogeyed two of the last three holes to finish at 75 (+3).



Junior Elcin Ulu, who was the most consistent Gator in the second round, shot the other 75. After three straight bogeys on holes No. 2, 3 and 4, Ulu navigated

the rest of the course without error, paring the remaining 14 holes.

Sophomore Anna Young had another bogey-filled scorecard –

finishing with seven bogeys and a double bogey as well. Her three redeeming birdies – two of which came on an inconsistent stretch that included three bogeys – were only good enough to score a 78 (+6). She had only one birdie in her first round.

"We've gotten some momentum going, but then something will happen that kills it," Bastel said.

"This golf course will do that to you. It requires a lot of patience, but there are some unforced errors, too. It's not so much we need them to hit perfect shots every time, but your misses have to be smart. That's the sign of a good player."
