Turlington Dancer steps up with changed messages

The Turlington Dancer, once known for his messages of peace and love, is wearing the same booty shorts but rocking a new attitude.

Dennis Kane was trespassed from UF campus in August 2012. Roughly a year later, he has taken the corner of Buckman Drive and West University Avenue as one of his spots to preach to students about the dangers of being too attached to their cellphones and acting

“too cool for everybody else.”

UF students have said they heard Kane shout things like “No one will ever love you,” “You’re worthless,” and “You know the world is f**ed up when women are in positions of power.”

According to an email from University Police spokesman Maj. Brad Barber, Kane would be arrested after a warning if he were to step foot back on campus.

Thirty-eight-year-old Kane said his focus

has become computer programming. His rants on the maladjustments of today’s youth are frequently punctuated by calls of “programmers needed.” His website, www.whyirule.com, explains his creation of an operating system inside a Web browser will

“change the world as we know it.”

“The reason I can be this crazy is because I’ve got the proof to back it up,” Kane said.

He said he refrains from singling people out on the street when he’s in a “passionate” mood, though he admits he occasionally targets “Greek-type people” for their attitudes.

He said he’s been annoyed and angry with people, which is why he’s been dancing with his sign adorned with his website’s URL.

Man threatens with samurai sword

A Gainesville man was arrested Tuesday after threatening a lawn crew and an officer with a samurai sword.

Rishiraj Rajan Job, 34, was drinking inside his apartment in the 4200 block of Southwest 22nd Lane while the crew worked in his yard, according to a GPD report released Wednesday.

Job walked out the front door yelling and wielding a samurai sword like a baseball bat at shoulder height. When he approached the two workers, Placido Espinosa-Rangel and Arago Leroyj Welch, they dropped their equipment and

ran away from the area, according to the report.

When police arrived, Job had gone back inside his apartment. He answered the door holding the sword over his shoulder, and, according to the report, he yelled, “Come get me!” The officer pointed a gun at him and ordered him to drop the sword.

Job was arrested at about 2:30 p.m. and charged with two counts of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon without intent to kill. He was booked into the Alachua County Jail, where he remained as of press time with bond set at \$50,000.

GPD spokesman Officer Ben Tobias wrote in an email that it appeared Job had been drinking beer and using synthetic cannabis.

Job had four samurai swords and several large knives, Tobias wrote, which were taken as precaution with Job’s consent.

Startups can now solicit investments with some restrictions

For many entrepreneurs, persuading investors to fund startup companies has always been a struggle, but a federal law that took effect Monday and that’s expected to impact

Gainesville, may make it easier.

The law, Title II of the Jumpstart Our Business Startups Act of 2012 (JOBS), amends a law from 1933 that made it illegal for companies to use mass communication to solicit potential investors, said Tanya Prive, a contributor to Forbes.

Now, companies can put out print media and TV advertisements, and even post on social media to spread the word that they’re looking for investors.

“It is true that you can go ahead and tweet that you are fundraising and take an ad out on TV... but what comes with the privilege is additional responsibility that startups need to ensure that they fulfill,” Prive said in a phone interview.

Even though the asking is easier now, the law restricts whom startups can take investments from.

Parents are newest secret weapon for millennials' interviews

When Chrissy McLarty gets ready for a job interview, she makes sure she has a professional outfit, her resume — and her mom.

According to the Wall Street Journal, a new trend has been catching on among millennials where they seek to keep their parents as involved as possible in the job pro-

cess, even bringing them into their interviews.

The 22-year-old UF alumna has been on the job hunt, and her mother is never far behind.

"I've been to three of them now where we go to the interviews on Friday, and then we'll make a little weekend of it in whatever city," she said.

McLarty said her mother calls herself McLarty's "little entourage" because she helps her do her hair

and makeup in preparation for the interview.

"It helps with the traveling," she said. "I don't have to make the big decisions, so I'm oriented and focused on what needs to be done, which is getting the job."

But McLarty isn't the only Gator who has parents involved in her career, said Bianka Valbrun, an 18-year-old business administration sophomore and employee at the Career Resource Center. She said she's

had about five parents call her this semester looking for resources for their children.

"A lot of the time, I've had parents say that their kids are lazy, so they called for them," Valbrun said.

Ellen Aschenbrener, manager of How Do You Roll? sushi, said in her 20 years of interviewing, she's never seen a candidate bring their parents.

"A grown person has no reason to be bringing in their parents," she said.

Megan Buttell, a 23-year-old UF finance and management graduate student, said she's heard from several employers that one of their greatest turnoffs is when a candidate brings in his or her parents.

She said it's unprofessional and displays immaturity from the applicant.

"It's your career, your job. You're a big kid," Buttell said. "You're supposed to be able to handle this yourself."

He said students used to be friendlier

Valeria Yulee, a 20-year-old public relations junior, said she sees Kane around Midtown.

"He's definitely eccentric and a little out there," she said. "He stands out with his booty shorts and really deep V-neck."

The law could encourage budding entrepreneurs

Startups can only accept money from individuals who meet minimum annual-income requirements or have at least \$1 million in assets, Prive said.

The transactions must be recorded and submitted on federal documents, or a startup can be deemed a "bad actor." As a consequence, the entrepreneur would not be allowed to fundraise for a year.

"For a startup, that actually could mean death," Prive said.

Some local entrepreneurs expect the law will have a positive impact on Gainesville.

"With an increased opportunity to reach out to capital investors, our local startups will have a better chance at securing investment," said Adrian Taylor, the vice president of Innovation Gainesville.

Anjali Kundra, a UF alumna and one of four people who represented Gainesville at a global entrepreneur congress in March, cautioned that the JOBS Act isn't

the entire solution to the time-consuming task of gathering enough cash to get off the ground.

"A lot of companies here think that funding is the turnkey of success, but that's not always the case," Kundra said, instead urging entrepreneurs to self-fund projects first.

Julian Miller, a fellow UF alumna who joined Kundra at the congress, said the law will encourage more people to give entrepreneurship a shot — even if the race to solicit funds is chaotic at first.

"It's probably going to blow up and be really ugly for a while, but once it stabilizes, there will be power to create jobs where there were none," he said.

Jane Muir, director of the UF Florida Innovation Hub, said she hopes the new law helps startups get through "the valley of death" faster, but the actual effects are yet to be seen.

"I think the intention is good," she said. "I'm going to be interested to see what impact it will really have."

UF's Mark Bostick Golf Course was recently ranked by Golfweek magazine as the 20th best campus golf course among others nationally.

The 6,700 yard, par-70 course has placed in the top 20 for the past four years.

Scott Hampton, the course's director of golf, said he thinks the success of the course is due to its challenging holes, consistent maintenance and \$4 million 2001 face-lift, which included re-designed holes and new putting greens.

"The renovations contribute to the success, as

it helped upgrade the course to the standards it needed to be — making it a difficult golf course and challenging for the teams," Hampton said.

The semiprivate course supports the university's Division I men's and women's golf teams. It hosts daily practices, collegiate events, yearly fundraisers, cross-country races and high school events.

Michael Bobbitt, an assistant golf coach at P.K. Yonge High School, said the ranking reflects the course's improvements.

"It's amazing how the course takes time to host the men and women's Gator golf teams, alumni and students while giving us the space to have our high school matches here as well," Bobbitt said. "They are running a great organization here."

Cruz-in' for bruising': Even Republicans are sick of the senator

Much like a first-year college student, freshman Republican Sen. Ted Cruz tries too hard, talks too much and is hated by upperclassmen.

On Wednesday, John McCain criticized Cruz's dogged efforts to filibuster a bill that would stop funding for health care reform implementation — even though he and other Republicans pushed the House to pass a bill that would defund the Affordable Care Act, commonly known as Obamacare.

According to a transcription on MSNBC's Rachel Maddow's blog, McCain said, "In the 2012 election, 'Obamacare,' as it's called . . . was a subject that was a major issue in the campaign. I campaigned all over America for two months, everywhere I could, and in every single campaign rally I said, 'And we have to repeal and replace Obamacare.'"

"Well, the people spoke," he said. "They spoke, much to my dismay, but they spoke and they re-elected the president of the United States."

McCain's argument — that the majority of American people have decided that Obamacare is a worthwhile endeavor — differs from many other conservatives' arguments. As the House begins voting on government funding, a number of voices has contributed to the anti-Cruz conversation.

Many conservatives point to the obvious: Cruz is a moron, and his attempt to stop a bill that his own party supports is counterproductive. On Tuesday, he took to the Senate floor and said he'd speak as long as he could stand, even if that would lead to a government shutdown — which would hurt the GOP.

Dave Freddoso, a reporter for Conservative Intelligence Briefing, published an analysis Sunday of Cruz's flawed health care act defunding plan. Cruz said the GOP must vote to fund the government incrementally, focusing on the military and "simply omit funding for Obamacare," Freddoso said.

"Unfortunately, he's glossing over a major technical detail that sinks the whole thing: The funding for Obamacare does not depend on the government spending bill (the 'continuing resolution') that Cruz has now announced he will block from getting a vote on the Senate floor," Freddoso wrote. "Obamacare gets funded whether that bill passes or not. So there's no such thing as funding the rest of the government and 'leaving out' funding for Obamacare."

And what Cruz is doing isn't even a filibuster, according to The Atlantic. Twitter dubbed it a "fauxlibuster" because the vote to move forward with government-funding legislation began Wednesday, regardless of Cruz's performance.

Just like a college freshman who took a few too many bong rips at a frat party, Cruz can't stop running his mouth about his misguided and uninformed political beliefs. As voting for government-funding legislation began this week, at least Democrats and Republicans can agree on one thing: Cruz needs to just shut up.

Obama: Stop using violent drone strikes

Headlines abound with the humanitarian crisis in Syria, with our very own president at the forefront of denouncing the apparent human rights violations in the region.

There are no headlines for the minimum of 400 civilians, including about 200 children, killed in Pakistan alone by drones.

President Barack Obama is quick to decry others when they do wrong, but when it comes to him, there's no wrongdoing under the guise of "national security."

We've killed U.S. citizens. We've killed children. But how many, exactly? It's impossible to tell.

The Bureau of Investigative Journalism, which has done an excellent job of reporting on the drone war, doesn't even know. There is little transparency surrounding the murder of civilians.

In a democracy, transparency is critical for the electorate to make educated decisions when electing its leaders. But the Obama administration does everything not to be clear, including classifying any military-age male in a strike zone as an enemy combatant. That takes a lot of civilian casualties off the books.

There are arguments for the drone war, sure. The one I've heard most is that it's safer. Safer for whom?

The U.S. conducts signature drone strikes in Pakistan, which means that if someone is suspected of being an enemy, he can be killed strictly based on his behavior. President Obama doesn't have to know his name. But if he's of military age, no worries — it's written off as another militant killed, even if he was innocent.

Missiles are hardly precision weapons, and the strikes often kill civilians. Not only that, but the drone strikes — run by the CIA — use double-tap strikes. A second missile is fired moments after the first, intended to kill first responders to the carnage — an act labeled as a "possible war crime" by two U.N. investigators.

While drone operators may be physically safe from the

dangers of combat, they are not mentally safe.

Researchers with the Department of Defense found that drone pilots have the same rates of mental illnesses — such as post-traumatic stress disorder and depression — as pilots of manned aircrafts.

It makes sense: Drone pilots have a uniquely taxing job. They have to stare at the same piece of ground for hours at a time, looking at destruction they've caused. At the end of their shift, they go home and eat dinner with their families. Instead of being in the standard soldier environment — where one is deployed to fight and come back to civilian life — they live life at war.

The millions of dollars spent on predator drones and tens of thousands spent on the Hellfire missiles they fire beg the question — what good could that money be used for back home rather than the killing of innocent people?

The drone war illustrates another reason militants abroad can convert more people to radical ideology. I would, for example, want to retaliate against whoever killed my brother with a remote controlled plane I could neither see nor hear.

The solution is simple: Limit drone use as much as possible, and, when it's necessary, be completely transparent about it.

Transparency would ensure no questions of who was killed or why. There would be clear reasons for taking out targets rather than relying on signature strikes, allowing for less civilian casualties. If the U.S. is forthcoming about their motivations when ordering strikes, extremism would decrease — populations would know a foreign government wasn't firing indiscriminately at them.

Justin Timberlake, Anthony Mackie talk "Runner Runner" The Avenue interviewed them

Last week I lived every '90s girl's (and some boys') dream when I got to interview Justin Timberlake and Anthony Mackie about upcoming movie "Runner Runner."

The based-on-true-events movie, which premieres Oct. 4, follows Princeton University college student Richie Furst (Justin Timberlake) through Costa Rica to confront the head of an online gambling site that lost him his tuition money. There he is convinced to join Ivan Block (Ben Affleck) in his online gambling business and is tracked down by FBI Agent Shavers (Anthony Mackie), who hopes to bring Block down.

Although, I did devote the day to the interview because in the excitement of it all, I missed the part of the directions that told me to sign on to Google Hangouts at 11:50 a.m. PST, so I was three hours early.

From the moment Timberlake and Mackie joined the Hangout, the pair started joking with everyone.

The bad Internet connection messed up the predetermined order in which the journalists could ask their questions.

Between broken sentences, I heard the pair say the girl wearing red lipstick looked like

she had something to say.

I had just made the realization I was the only girl in red lipstick on the Hangout that afternoon when I heard a "Ma-jore-ee" come from the speaker. I internalized my natural fangirling and got professional.

"Marjorie," I said. "Hey, how are you guys?"

They said they were good and asked me where I was. I told them I was in Gainesville, interviewing them for the Avenue.

"So, you're a Gator," Mackie said and asked if I was going to do the Gator Chomp.

Of course, I did the Gator Chomp, and so did they. That led me right into my first question.

AM: I think if you look at Brad's other movie, he really has an interesting way of looking at the world. I think it shows in his movies with the way he shoots. With this movie, it's so bright and beautiful, you really give your character the opportunity to go as far as they can into the world they live in without becoming superficial or unbelievable.

Q: What about your character attracted you to the roles?

JT: I loved the idea of Richie, this character who's a good guy. He's trying to do the right thing, but he's got himself into a hole. It's kind of the idea of trying to dig yourself out of a hole, but you just keep digging yourself deeper and deeper into that hole. You know, I identify with a lot of things about him.

AM: For me, it was more so I enjoyed the ability to really just push Justin around. My character is such a bully in this movie, and I'm never given the opportunity to grow out my facial hair and look crazy and sweaty and smack up white dudes. So when I'm given that opportunity, I go for that 100 percent.

The bad Internet connection made the question-and-answer session run less smoothly than it could have, but between the jokes and insight to "Runner Runner," I sure was glad to have participated.

Don't cry over that gallon of expired milk: Brave a big gulp

Consumers misinterpret labels

If only our food could talk, then there would be no confusion about what was still OK to eat or what should be thrown out. But of course, talking tomatoes would lead to a lot of general confusion and conflicted vegetarians.

But without the direct input from food, we rely on "sell by," "use by" or "best before" labels to tell us when we can still drink that jug of milk or when it will result in stomach cramps a couple of hours later (and not the kind from having too much milk and cookies).

However, a recent study by the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC) reports consumers often misinterpret these labels and plenty of good, edible food goes in the trash. According to the council, the dates are not meant to indicate the safety of food but rather to suggest when the food is at its peak quality.

This misunderstanding results in the unnecessary disposal of billions of pounds of food every year, according to the NRDC. Nearly half the food in America never gets eaten. That's like throwing away \$165 billion dollar bills.

Confusion over date stamps leads nine out of 10 Americans to trash food that could have been consumed, according to a survey by the Food Marketing Institute. When many families are trying to save money, a seemingly simple thing like the method of labeling food is an important issue.

Yet, Keith Schneider, 50, a professor in UF's Department of Food Science and Human Nutrition, said it is not that simple. Schneider said companies are trying to maintain a certain quality level, and they don't want to give consumers a bad taste experience. For instance, he said if a company that sells crackers extends its product's shelf life, it might

still be edible by the end date, but the crackers may be slightly oxidized and stale.

"Consumers in the U.S. don't like anything that is not perfect," Schneider said. Food manufacturers are aware of this and are very conservative with how they label products.

UF anthropology senior Donna Smailes, 20, said it is bummer that so many things are thrown away, but it's business. "They are all in it to make money, so they want you

to like their product when it is the best," she said.

Also, companies may be afraid of being sued, Schneider said. A lot of the time milk is still safe to drink way past the "sell by" date, but corporations don't want to take the risk of someone becoming sick.

Milk producers cannot be certain that their customers are going to properly store their milk, so they take our shortcomings into account when labeling their cartons. For instance, many college students may have mini refrigerators in their dorms with a knob that turns to different levels of cold. However, without thermometers in their fridges, they can't ensure their milk is being stored at the correct temperature and will last the length of its optimum shelf life, so manufacturers are modest with their expiration dates.

So you may think if "the man" cannot be trusted, you can at least rely on your senses. But Schneider warns against the sniff test. You are not going to know if there are pathogens in the food by smelling it, he said. You will only be able to tell if it's spoiled.

Smailes admits she judges food by how it smells.

"Unless it is milk, I don't pay attention to sell by dates," she said.

Schneider recommends going by the "first in, first out" rule, so eating your food in rotation according to when you buy it. He says he tries not to overbuy food, but instead gets groceries more frequently.

The NRDC proposes clarifying and standardizing the current labeling system in order to better communicate with consumers. The challenge will be to balance the reduction of America's waste with its responsibility to keep its consumers safe.

Independent radio station lets its DJs grow

Volunteer disc jockey Ricky Marrero perched on a bar stool in front of a microphone. Ice-cold air conditioning blasted into a closet-sized room packed with music equipment and vinyl records.

"Welcome to 'America in the Evening,'" he said. "I'm your host, Rikkums." And the drums picked up the tempo for the first song of the show.

Grow Radio, a grassroots nonprofit station, depends on a broad variety of music and volunteers to stay running. The local, Internet-based station is in need of volunteers.

"The broadest criteria that we are looking for is people passionate about music," said Bill Bryson, general manager of the studio.

For volunteer DJs, radio shows are a weekly, two-hour commitment, and volunteers should be prepared to make a yearlong commitment.

Bryson started the radio station, found at growradio.org, in 2009 as an outlet for people who aren't interested in the type of music FM radio usually offers.

"Variety and diversity are where we like to focus our musical interests," he said.

Volunteer DJs have to be willing to stay away from sticking to a specific genre. Programming at Grow Radio follows a formatting that's typically called free-form. At any given time, any type of

music could be playing, Bryson said.

For "America in the Evening" host Marrero, variety is more of a freedom than a challenge.

Marrero typically picks his first song on the day of his show and follows the music from there, he said.

Free-form programming is different from the typical radio programming. Most stations don't give DJs the freedom to pick any song they like, Bryson said.

The station allows each DJ's taste to dictate the different music played.

"You're going to get sick of your own music," said Shawn Maschino, host of Grow Radio show "Lost Sharks," "but there's tons of exposure to new music, so it's a good place to be."

Not only are DJs allowed to play the music they want, but they also get to choose the format. Maschino tends to use vinyl to put on his show.

"I like vinyl — the aesthetic and the size," he said. "There's just something about holding the records."

When Bryson started the station, he hoped the experience of volunteering as a DJ for Grow Radio would foster personal growth as well as musical growth.

"If you're a college student spending any or all of your four years involved with a station like this, it will give a lot back in terms of the college experience."



M.I.A.'s middle finger to the NFL is back in spotlight

Andrew Baldizon didn't catch M.I.A.'s middle-finger gesture during the Super Bowl halftime show in 2012, but he heard about it and didn't think much of it.

One month after the Feb. 5, 2012, halftime performance, which nearly 167 million viewers tuned into, the NFL filed a lawsuit against English-Sri Lankan singer M.I.A. for giving the middle finger during her on-stage performance with Madonna.

Almost two years later, M.I.A. decided to make public the issue the NFL has been keeping a secret.

According to the Hollywood Reporter, the Federal Communications Commission and NBC — the network that aired the show — have not entered any legal proceedings regarding the incident, but the NFL will continue to pursue M.I.A. for tarnishing its "reputation for wholesomeness."

"I really didn't think (the middle finger) was a big deal, considering players do it on the field every so often, and the fans do it all the time on TV," said Baldizon, a 21-year-old UF political science senior.

On Monday, the singer gave a statement through a video on YouTube in response to the NFL's claims.

M.I.A.'s lawyer was quoted saying the league's claim of a "wholesome reputation" is pretty funny considering the violence that occurs on and off the field with the players, but UF professor Lyrrisa Lidsky said regardless of

where the league's values stand, it's a simple matter of contract.

"The time to say the NFL is being hypocritical is before you agree to [signing away certain rights]," the Levin College of Law professor said.

Clay Calvert, law professor and director of the Marion B. Brechner First Amendment Project at UF, agrees.

"Whether or not it hurts the NFL's image is one thing, but the contract probably forbade her from engaging in these gestures," he said.

In the video where she addresses the issue, M.I.A. said she's being used.

"They've scapegoated me into figuring out the goalposts on what is offensive in America," she said.

Lidsky said the NFL might have tried to keep this issue under wraps to avoid drawing negative scrutiny toward the league.

Calvert agreed, saying the NFL might not have wanted to call attention to the issue because "someone giving the middle-finger gesture during halftime performances (might) seem rather trivial to the public."

According to the details of the legal proceeding referenced by the Hollywood Reporter, the singer allegedly challenged the arbitration clause in the contract, failed to pay her share of the fine, failed to attend mediation and failed to take responsibility or apologize for her world-wide-broadcasted actions.

Baldizon said he was surprised that the singer was being fined a sum of \$1.5 million.

"The NFL usually fines players a couple of thousand [dollars] for the middle finger and sends them on their way," he said.



Easley out for season after suffering tears to ACL, meniscus

No. 20 Florida will be without another top playmaker for the rest of this season.

Senior defensive tackle Dominique Easley injured his right knee during a non-contact drill in practice Tuesday and suffered a season-ending tear to his ACL and medial meniscus, coach Will Muschamp said in a statement released Wednesday night.

"Watching any of your players go through this is one of the hardest things about being a coach," Muschamp said.

"Obviously, it is hardest on Dominique. We are disappointed for him, but we will be there for him every step of the way through his surgery and rehab process."

Earlier Wednesday, Muschamp said Easley would undergo further tests to determine the severity of his injury. However, it became apparent the senior defensive tackle's season would be finished when he posted on his private Twitter account (@MR_ChUcKiE_2) at 11:39 a.m.

"Gatornation [sic] thank you for all of 4 yrs of sticking with me but god has something else planned for and have no worries #believe," Easley posted.

The senior can petition for a medical redshirt because he did not play in more than four games this

season, past the sixth game of the year and can prove an actual injury.

However, after mulling the decision to go pro following his junior season, Easley could opt to enter the 2014 NFL Draft.

Sports Illustrated recently ranked the 6-foot-2, 285-pounder as the No.

15 overall prospect.

For Florida, losing Easley, who had become the team's vocal leader during his final season, is a significant blow to the nation's No. 2 unit.

Through three games, he had two tackles for a loss and was tied for the team lead with four quarter-

back hurries.

"Dominique is a guy that has a great motor — great enthusiasm as you can see on the field," defensive coordinator D.J. Durkin said. "He plays the game the way we want guys to play on defense."

The added attention Easley re-

quired from opposing offensive lines created opportunities for his teammates.

Buck linebacker Dante Fowler Jr. was named the Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Week after forcing two fumbles — he recovered one — while adding a sack to help Florida suffocate the Tennessee offense during a 31-17 victory on Saturday.

Fowler later thanked Easley for opening holes for him to make plays against a talented Volunteers offensive line.

"He busts his stuff up, and I'm outside, so when they see everything clogged up, the first they're gonna do is bounce outside, and that's all me," Fowler said.


Easley previously experienced a knee injury during his UF career.

He suffered an ACL tear in his left knee while playing against Florida State on Nov. 26, 2011, but returned for the start of the 2012 season, in which he started in 11 games as a junior, finishing with 8.5 tackles for a loss, four sacks and one fumble recovery.

Easley is the sixth UF player to suffer a season-ending injury this year.

Jeff Driskel (fractured right fibula), Chaz Green (torn labrum), Andre Debose (torn ACL), Matt Rolin (torn ACL) and Nick Washington (shoulder) are all done for the season.

"That's just the game we play," said offensive lineman Jon Halapio. "You just have to expect that people are going to get injured."

Gators offensive line healthy after numerous injuries to begin '13

Nearly a month into the season, No. 20 Florida will finally have its full complement of offensive linemen.

Since last summer, multiple linemen have suffered injuries that kept them out of games for extended periods of time, but almost all — Chaz Green is out for the season after suffering a torn labrum — are expected to play against Kentucky on Saturday at 7 p.m.

"I just want to stay healthy, personally," offensive guard Jon Halapio said, "and I want every-

body else to stay healthy."

Halapio kicked off the injuries on the line this season.

He suffered a partially torn pectoral muscle while lifting weights in July. The injury caused Halapio to miss training camp and UF's first two games of the season.

The redshirt senior returned to the field for Florida's game against Tennessee on Sept. 21 but missed more time due to an unforeseen injury.

Halapio said he went to cut block a defender who was trying to avoid him. The defender's hand got caught in the lineman's facemask, cutting his eye.

The injury took Halapio out

of his season debut, but he returned later in the game.

"I was definitely thinking, 'I can't catch a break,'" he said. "If it's not my pec, it is some-

thing else."

Added left tackle D.J. Humphries: "It looked like somebody knocked him out."

But while Halapio was able to play through his injury, the Gators were still missing someone on the right side of the line.

Redshirt sophomore Tyler Moore

(ankle) was scratched before the game on Saturday. Instead, Florida slid redshirt senior Kyle Koehne — typically a guard — out to tackle.

"I didn't think I'd be playing tackle much this year," Koehne said, "but numbers go down and my number's called."

Moore suffered his injury against Miami on Sept. 7. On Wednesday, coach Will Muschamp said Moore "looked good running [Tuesday]."

Other linemen suffered injuries as well.

Humphries, junior Max Garcia and redshirt senior Jon Harrison, have suffered minor injuries that have kept them out for varying amounts of time. Humphries (knee)

missed the second half against Miami, while Garcia and Harrison missed shorter amounts of time against the Hurricanes.

Humphries said the line has not suffered due to the injuries, but the Gators have struggled with what was supposed to be the bread and butter of their offense — a punishing interior running game.

Florida is averaging 199.7 yards per game on the ground, which ranks 12th out of 14 in the run-based Southeastern Conference.

Against the Volunteers, running backs Mack Brown and Matt Jones averaged 3.6 and 4.1 yards per carry,

Patton emerging as playmaker in final season with Gators

Solomon Patton did not play much his first three seasons.

He had a punt return here, a kick return there and the jet sweep that pigeonholed him as all speed.

Coach Will Muschamp approached Patton this offseason with a question: Do you just want to be a jet-sweep guy?

Through three games, Patton has answered with an emphatic no. His 212 yards and two touchdowns lead Florida receivers.

"I've always been hungry and wanting to play," Patton said. "I just took this offseason to focus on a lot of different things. It's starting to pay off."

His junior season ended walking off the field, head hanging, with his left arm in a sling. Georgia safety Shawn Williams tackled Patton by the neck on a vicious hit near the Florida sidelines.

The Gators, down a touchdown on their first drive and needing a spark, dialed up Patton's signature jet sweep on fourth and 1. The 5-foot-9 receiver went in motion, took the Jeff Driskel handoff and ran off left tackle only to miss the rest of the season. Florida didn't get the first down or the win.

Missing time left Patton with something to prove in his last season at UF. Patton put on 10-12 pounds to reach 179, he said. His listed weight was 169 in 2012.

He dedicated his offseason to route running and drinking protein shakes. But the added weight has not taken away from Patton's speed. On the second series with Tyler Murphy at quarterback against Tennessee, Patton took a screen pass 52 yards for a touchdown.

Patton made cornerback Devaun Swafford

miss, slipped through safety Brian Randolph's tackle and outran three Volunteers to the end zone.

The sideline scamper wasn't an eye opener. This is the player who had programs such as Alabama clamoring for his services coming out of high school. Patton even beat Julio Jones in the 100m dash running track in Mobile, Ala.

"I've always been hungry and wanting to play. I just took this offseason to focus on a lot of different things. It's starting to pay off."

To see his evolution, look no further than his 46-yard over-the-shoulder catch against Miami two weeks earlier. Patton adjusted with the ball mid-flight on a Driskel play-action pass and hauled it in for Florida's longest pass of the season.

Florida brought in former Kentucky coach Joker Phillips to revitalize its receivers corps. It's been night-and-day for Patton and receivers like Quinton Dunbar, who have helped fill the void left by tight end Jordan Reed.

Offensive coordinator Brent Pease noticed more explosive plays from the wideouts. Six of Patton's 10 receptions have gone for more than 15 yards. He scored his first career touchdown — a 21-yard catch — during the final minutes against Miami.

His 118 receiving yards marked the highest output by a Florida pass catcher in 16 games.

"We're learning how to run our routes the right way, (and) at the right depth," Patton said of Phillips.

"Technique-wise and catching the ball, he has made a real huge impact."

There's a new batch of raw talent among Florida's wideouts. Ahmad Fulwood, who has one reception for five yards, is the only one of seven true freshmen with a catch. Pat-

ton was there once.

"I just tell them, 'Look at me. This is my senior year, and I finally got my chance. I'm just taking advantage of it.'"

respectively.

"It's just getting in a groove," Humphries said. "The more we

play, the easier the running game will open up."

The line will need to open holes in the running game and secure gaps in the passing game.

Starting quarterback Jeff Driskel

suffered a season-ending fractured fibula against Tennessee, handing the reigns of the offense to redshirt junior Tyler Murphy, who did not attempt an official pass until Saturday.

Behind Murphy are Florida's two other scholarship quarterbacks — redshirt freshman Skyler Mornhinweg and freshman Max Staver. Neither quarterback has played a down of college football.

"We just have that sense of urgency when our starting quarterback goes down," Halapio said. "Tyler Murphy comes in — that's basically one of our last options. We've just got to protect him."
