# County mosquitoes could be carrying diseases

## Health department has issued an advisory

The Alachua County Health Department issued a mosquito advisory earlier this week, announcing that mosquitoes capable of transmitting diseases such as the West Nile virus are swarming the county.

Paul Myers, health department administrator, said they're the most potentially disease-carrying mosquitoes the county has seen in years.

Myers said the increase in population may be due to consistent rainfall and warm temperatures among other

conditions.

Phillip E. Kaufman, a UF associate professor of veterinary entomology, said most Florida counties have mosquito surveillance systems in place to track populations year-round.

Kaufman said the City of Gainesville usually does a good job of controlling mosquito populations, including treating still water at development sites with products only toxic to larvae. The city will also begin fogging if there are especially high numbers.

He said Alachua County does not have a mosquito control department due to cost and a low population of people in many areas of the county.

"It is more important to take the proper steps than to try home remedies," he said.

Myers said mosquito populations will decline as the weather begins to cool but will not completely go away until the first hard freeze.

For now, he suggests taking precautionary measures, including avoiding the outdoors during the times of dusk and dawn, wearing clothing that covers the skin and using good-quality repellent.

He also advised residents to drain standing water frequently, paying attention to bird feeders, house gutters and pool covers.

## Public sees plans for 2015 UF walking, biking trail

The Florida Department of Transportation presented the proposed route and design of a new walking and biking trail to be built on the UF campus in 2015 at an open house Thursday night.

The UF Campus Greenway trail will begin on the south side of Hull Road, west of Southwest 34th Street and will connect many of the already existing campus trails until it reaches South Newell Drive and ends at Archer Road.

"It's a safer and efficient way to get through university property," said Mike Osipov, vice president of Volkert Inc., the engineering firm in charge of designing the project.

With construction costs estimated between \$2.5 million and \$2.8 million, the trail funded federally.

The designers of the project chose to use different materials throughout the trail to fit the surrounding areas. They will better handle stormwater runoff and minimize effects on the natural environment, said Gene Quinn, principal in charge of the project.

Chandler Otis, 59, a bicycle salesman and mechanic, said he has been anticipating this trail for about 15 years.

The trail will ultimately connect Hawthorne to Archer so people will be able to ride their bicycles continuously through those areas, Otis said.

"This is going to be a wonderful thing," he said.

## Open online courses rarely finished

Online classes may be changing education, but students' study habits are not.

About 90 percent of students drop out of these massive open online courses, according to major course providers.

"MOOCs are courses that are, in general and certainly for UF students, are not taken for credit," said Andrew McCollough, assistant provost for teaching and technology. "As a consequence, it is not surprising that in terms of enrollees finishing the course, the number is relatively low."

However, this doesn't mean the mission of the courses has failed, he said. The main idea of this type of education was to provide higher education at low or no cost to everyone, which doesn't involve providing grades and credentials.

# Former NSA adviser speaks at UF about briefing Obama

Tom Donilon, former national security adviser to President Barack Obama, spoke Thursday night at the Phillips Center for the Performing Arts.

Donilon, whose speech was sponsored by UF's ACCENT Speakers Bureau, spoke to about 80 people about U.S. involvement in Afghanistan and Syria, global women's rights and the raid on Osama bin Laden.

He said he spent three to four hours each morning preparing briefs with the intelligence community and other White House staff, and making them into digestible products for the president.

He presented more than 700 briefings for Obama.

"One of the real challenges of the job was not letting the inbox dominate you each day," he said. "It was a four-and-a-half-year conversation, each brief built up on the last."

Donilon worked as national security adviser for about three years.

He said he remembers speaking to the president about deciding on whether to initiate the raid on bin Laden.

"At the end of the day, we ask our president to make these decisions," he said.

Jordan Grass, an 18-year-old UF sports management freshman, said she wished she could have heard more about how Donilon acquired his position.

"He's definitely a smart guy," Grass said. "He knows his stuff when it comes to politics."

exotic, and you enrolled, that if after the first few lectures, it became too technically involved for what you were interested in, you'd drop out," said McCollough.

UF's page on Coursera shows six massive open online courses.

McCollough calls these courses "altogether different" from online education, which UF has recently dived into with the creation of UF Online, the country's first entirely online university.

"The expectations will be similar in rigor to that of a regular student," he said.

This must be true, he said, because graduates of this program will receive the exact diploma as on-campus UF students.

"The student who enrolls in UF online will be motivated by the possibility of acquiring not only the knowledge but also a certification that they have acquired that knowledge," he said. "It's a much more traditional approach to education."

UF students like Kristopher Davis, a 21-year-old history junior, call the idea of these courses interesting.

"It sounds like something like the Gutenberg Project," he said. "Where you get a whole lot of free resources that will help you better yourself that might not have anything to do with what you're studying in an actual paid class."

Davis said he thinks that more research is probably necessary to refine the business model and to discover ways to motivate students to complete the classes.

# Former Walmart location could be a shopping center

Since the 13th Street Walmart relocated in January, the plans for the empty building have been on skids. Now, the property owner has taken the first step toward redeveloping the location.

At a Sept. 3 meeting, Gainesville's permit and development assistance agency First Step Center and property owner Kite Realty discussed plans to turn the site into a modernized shopping center with more tenants, trees and landscaping.

Nancy Testa, a permit and development coordinator for the First Step Center, also said no plans were certain for the area, but Kite Realty said it wants to remodel the former Walmart building and partition the interior into different parcels.

Testa said possible tenants have not been specified.

Erik Bredfeldt, the city's planning and development director, said the meeting was a first glance at future plans for the site.

"They were reviewing options for redevelopment of the property," he said. "Though it didn't appear they had any solid plans for it yet."

Testa said First Step Center is used by companies for new developments or remodeling projects to guide them through the permitting stages and to send up red flags early in the development process.

"Kite Realty had no red flags because they're basically just proposing a remodeling of the existing building," she said. "There's nothing now that could stop the project if they intend to go through with it."

While the city's planning department intends to aid Kite Realty in the redevelopment process, some Gainesville residents also plan on getting involved.

John Hudson, president of Hudson & Company Inc., a local building inspection company, said he is working with the City of Gainesville to start a committee of residents who will focus on coordinating public and private efforts for the redevelopment.

Hudson said a committee will ensure that cooperation among city government, the general public and developers enables the project to run smoothly.

"We have to work together to come up with answers that work for that property," he said.

Lavagnino said he got the idea for the website when he received a free Sports Authority gift certificate in the mail and wanted to "sell that feeling."

"I started this business because I was unemployed at the time, in transition between jobs, and I just ran into this idea," he said. "I saw the need, and I wanted to fill the need."

220 businesses in Gainesville, Alachua and Jonesville. Lavagnino said gift certificates are available for seven businesses in Midtown and seven in downtown, along with other Gainesville locations. Some local businesses offering the certificate are Beef 'O' Brady's, :08, Chili's, Dunkin' Donuts and 101 Downtown.

The website is free for both consumers and businesses. Lavagnino said his profit comes from advertisers on his website. The free app is available for download in the App Store and Google Play.

Lavagnino partnered with UF's annual Dance Marathon fundraiser this past Spring to create punch cards with offers for more than 10 local restaurants. He said Dance Marathon raised more than \$4,000 selling the cards.

Derek Guffin, an assistant director for academic and career advising

at the Warrington College of Business Administration, said he has been a member of the website since it started.

"It's really quite an effective business model," Guffin said. "The nice thing about this is that it supports local businesses."

Guffin said he uses the gift cards to help pay for dry cleaning and meals at the Flying Biscuit Cafe.

"A couple bucks here and there — those things add up," Guffin said. "It's quite an easy way to save some money."



## Starbucks has every right to ban guns

**H**ave you ever given a child a piece of candy and told them not to show it to their siblings?

Admitting that you have may entitle you to an administrative position at Starbucks, as you've demonstrated an understanding of its previous gun policy.

Starbucks used to assume an apathetic stance toward guns — a kind of "don't ask, don't tell" policy in which armed customers could purchase all the coffee they wanted as long as they didn't flaunt their firearms in front of other customers.

However, just like children, gun-toting coffee enthusiasts — or coffee-toting gun enthusiasts — couldn't resist the temptation and took indifference as endorsement and decided to stage a Starbucks Appreciation Day.

According to USA Today, two weeks ago, gun owners showed their appreciation for what they thought was endorsement by parading around Starbucks with their weapons, including in the Newtown Starbucks.

The calamity prompted a plea from Starbucks CEO Howard Schultz for all Starbucks patrons to leave their semi-automatic self-defense mechanisms at home.

In a guest column, fellow UF student Margaret Beck wrote that the request asks too much of citizens, who must "leave their rights at the door."

Beck also compared the Second Amendment right to other rights, arguing that a customer with a gun is equally entitled to enter Starbucks as the person with a rainbow-colored shirt.

Beck's article posed some moral questions such as whether you would want to be standing next to a registered gun owner or an unregistered "bad guy" in line.

This is a very common argument, as it expresses concern over the safety of gun-free zones.

According to USA Today, a woman carrying a gun

in St. Petersburg accidentally shot another woman when she dropped her purse, which caused the gun to discharge.

Luckily, Starbucks hasn't officially changed its policy, so the "good guy" with the gun was still able to get her iced latte.

The logic behind the outrage being projected at Starbucks is just bizarre.

According to The Huffington Post, Whole Foods and Disney World are among many other companies to ban weapons on their properties, so why are people so outraged at Starbucks?

There is an obsessive tendency among gun owners to act out whenever someone tells them not to bring their guns to the party.

I am humbled to announce that after a successful year of serving as a student senator for District C representing students in the 32607 zip code, I am running for re-election!



# Honda to fund Ocala Drive-in's digital projector upgrade

▶ IT WILL COST ABOUT \$80,000.

OCALA — The Ocala Drive-in Theatre received a digital projector after winning an online competition Monday.

The drive-in earned the projector as a prize for garnering a high

number of votes in Honda's Project Drive-in, which featured nine drive-in theaters across the country and invited people to vote for which ones should receive the upgrades. The voting period ended Saturday.

The program was originally only giving away five projectors but decided to give four more away to save additional theaters, said Charles Watzke, one of the Ocala Drive-in's owners.

In April, 21st Century Fox announced that by summer it would discontinue 35 mm film reels — the type the theater plays every week. Many American drive-ins have closed already due to the cost of switching from film to digital projection, which costs about \$80,000.

Watzke reopened the Ocala theater in 2011, after it had been closed down for eight years.

Representatives from Proj-

ect Drive-In originally contacted Watzke, asking him to participate in the contest, he said.

The project was created by Honda to help prevent American drive-ins from going out of business. When voting, participants were given the option to donate money toward the projectors.

Now that the contest has wrapped up, the program, which features a U.S. map with pinpoints indicating the locations of drive-

ins across the nation, will keep working toward saving as many drive-ins as possible, Watzke said.

Sara Ulrich, a 20-year-old UF advertising junior, used to go to the drive-in when she lived in Ocala.

"The drive-in theater was always so much fun to go to when I was younger," Ulrich said. "Now that they have the new projector, I want to go back and experience the drive-in again."

His redemption came against the Volunteers.

Now, the Gators' coaching staff hopes this Fowler — the freak athlete capable of disrupting opposing offenses with jarring hits — is here to stay.

"Dante really let it loose," defensive coordinator D.J. Durkin said.

"That was more indicative of what we feel like we can see from him every week."

For everything Fowler failed to do against the Hurricanes — he totaled just three tackles, one for a loss — he accomplished in full force against the Volunteers.

It all started on Tennessee's opening possession.

Beginning its drive at the UF 15-yard line after punter Kyle Christy botched a snap on fourth down, UT looked to run off right tackle on second and 8 from the UF 13-yard line.

Fowler had other plans.

The sophomore Buck line-

backer barreled into the backfield and pummeled Tennessee running back Rajion Neal, forcing a fumble.

Fowler pounced on the ball in the Volunteers' backfield, setting the tone for Florida's defense, which forced six turn-

overs in a 31-17 victory.

"I actually spiked the ball down," Fowler said. "Then I thought about it like, 'Oh snap, I'm going to get a personal foul.'"

He ended the game with two

## Freshman forward critical to UF's road success

In Savannah Jordan, the Gators trust.

When it comes to putting a powerhouse forward against Mississippi (8-1-1, 1-0 Southeastern Conference), Jordan will give Florida (7-1-1, 1-0 SEC) more than offensive talent at the Ole Miss Soccer Stadium at 8 p.m.

Jordan's strength in making high-line tackles will be important in limiting Ole Miss senior forwards Rafaella Souza and Mandy McCalla, who each scored 13 goals and accumulated 33 points to lead the SEC last season.

Coach Becky Burleigh said Ole Miss' midfielders target Souza and McCalla on

the field to produce multiple shot opportunities.

"They're as good as people we'll see the rest of the year," Burleigh said. "We have to make sure we know what we're doing against those two players."

Souza has been dynamic this season. Her total of 11 goals ties her with two others for the most in the nation in 2013.

McCalla has seven goals and three assists this season.

Jordan, the SEC Freshman of the Week, is one goal shy of Souza after notching her ninth and 10th of the season during Florida's 3-0 victory against Alabama on Sept. 20.

The freshman forward said the Gators need to continue the style of play that has proven to be effective when Florida faces Ole Miss.

"We just need to stay focused," Jordan said. "Especially on away trips, it's hard to play at other teams' facilities with all the fans against you and the teams against you."

Ole Miss has momentum coming off a four-game win streak. The Rebels have won four consecutive home matches.

"We're the type of team to thrive off a hostile environment," freshman Liz Slattery said. "That just builds more energy for us to go forward and think we're going to show

# Gators working to solidify defense

On Wednesday afternoon in the Lemerand Center gym, Dave Boos was invested in just one person: Nikki O'Rourke.

"Where's your angle?" UF's associate head coach asked before serving another ball across the net.

"To the right," the sophomore defensive specialist yelled back, moving her intertwined hands and locked arms a few inches up, ready to practice her serve receive.

In preparation for No. 3 Florida's (11-1) matchup with Mississippi State (9-5) tonight at 8 and Sunday's game against Ole Miss (10-3) at 2:30 p.m., Boos, the Gators' defensive coach, has been working one-on-one with more players to solidify the mechanics that make up an efficient defense.

"The defense that we run is a very advanced tactical system, but it can't be done at a high level until the players have the technical skills," coach Mary Wise said.

"And so the one-on-one that Dave does ... gives them that training to really advance their skill set."

Wise added that her four defensive specialists, who are responsible for passing the ball to setter Taylor Brauneis and dig-

ging any attacks that land their way, have improved their performances each time Boos picked apart their game in practice.

Taylor Unroe, who anchors the backcourt as a third-year libero, said the attention to detail by Boos — especially in the passing game — is the difference between a team trying to just survive and a team driving to win.

"It's not like algebra," she joked.

"You learn algebra once and then you never use it again. These skills are something that we actually do every single day. A foot here or an arm here or an angle here is actually something that will determine if you get a good pass or a bad pass."

The ability to deliver a consistent pass from Unroe to Brauneis has been stressed after nearly every match by Wise, who said the Gators cannot make any progress on the court without an effective first contact by the back row.

With Florida's match against an MSU squad that returns just five players from last year, Brauneis said communication, along with Boos' hands-on coaching, will help the passing game adjust against the new-look Bulldogs.

"Me and Taylor talk after every point," Brauneis said. "We talk about her pass and if it's good, if it needs to be higher (or) if it needs to be lower. With (Unroe's) pass, I'm more confident running balls to the middle, which is what we need to do."

Unroe said MSU provides the perfect challenge for Florida's passing strategy because the Bulldogs can keep a ball alive long enough to break the Gators out of their system.

"Sometimes, even if you're passing well, if someone just keeps the ball in play over and over and over again, sometimes it gets a little bit more difficult to keep going on those passing runs," she said.

But Boos said he has confidence in his defensive specialists to limit MSU's scoring attack and, in turn, provide Brauneis opportunities to set up the offense for potential attacks.

"That whole defensive crew that we have, any of them back there can be the highlight of the night," Boos said.

"Any of them can have the big night."

## Florida using meet as audition

With the Wisconsin adidas Invitational looming, Florida is looking to determine the top seven runners who will compete on Oct. 19 in Madison.

The first group to show what they've got is the men, who are running at the Florida Runners Invitational being held in Titusville today.

"We're going to give our top guys a chance to rest and train through this weekend," coach Paul Spangler said. "We have the big Wisconsin meet coming up. We're going to take a small group of guys (to Titusville) and give them an opportunity to race a 5K, which is something we don't normally get an opportunity to race."

The meet will help Spangler determine who will round out his top seven. According to Spangler, Florida's top four is effectively set with Jimmy Clark, Mark Parrish, Eddie Garcia and J.L. Hines. Carlos Miranda was UF's fifth runner at this year's Mountain Dew Invitational.

"Your top five guys make up your team score" Spangler said. "[Miranda] ran great."

With the top four set, three spots are left for 10 runners.

"All we need is one guy to really step it up," Spangler said. "That person to be our fifth we want to be as close to our fourth as possible."

The depth of the men's team is a luxury Spangler appreciates.

With many athletes competing at a high level, hoping to earn a spot at the heralded Wisconsin meet, motivation is not an issue.

"It's definitely a plus," Spangler said of the surplus of athletes. "You don't want to have to count on one guy. You'd love to have four or five (athletes) on any given day and have one step up."

### UF Cross Country

While the men have plenty of talent, the women's team is suffering from a lack of eligible runners.

Injuries and sickness have ravaged the squad, with Shelby Hayes and Stephanie Strasser out since the season opener at Western Carolina.

"Whereas the men are healthy, the women are a little banged up and sick, so (this break) will give the women a chance to recover and be ready to race in a couple of weeks," Spangler said.

The women's auditions for Wisconsin will be held at the Disney Cross Country Classic in Orlando, one week before Wisconsin.

Spangler, along with the rest of the team, hopes to have both Strasser and Hayes back by then.

"Steph and Shelby: possibly," Spangler said when asked if Strasser and Hayes will run at the Disney Classic. "We have a couple weeks to look at where they're at physically. Both of them are sick and a little banged up."

Fortunately for the women, they have another two weeks to recuperate.

For the time being, it's the men's turn. Today, Spangler hopes to solidify his fifth runner above all else.

"If one of those guys can get within 20 seconds of our fourth runner, we'll be alright," he said.

Associate head coach Dave Balogh, who has been at UF for 14 years, has led the team's Rivera Tennis Club outing for the past 13 years.

During that time, Balogh has coached seven All-American championship singles and doubles titles — the most recent being Lauren Embree's singles championship title last year.

"As long as you go into it knowing this is going to be tough you have a better chance of handling it the right way," Balogh said.

He has stressed mental and physical toughness going into the 10-day outing. Balogh expects battles on the court since the Gators will be up against the top players in the nation.

"You kind of see where you're at with the big kids," Balogh said. "We play some smaller tournaments here and there to get ready, but this is it."

forced fumbles, three tackles for a loss and one sack. Fowler's effort earned him Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Week honors.

"He's a guy that continues to improve and play well," coach Will Muschamp said.

"He played much better than he did his previous time out, and he's a guy that can be a very disruptive player for us."

Fowler's role will become even more important with senior defensive tackle Dominique Easley out for the season after suffering ACL and meniscus tears in his right knee during Tuesday night's practice.

Despite being just 19 years old and not even midway into his second full season with the Gators, Fowler is now considered one of the defense's leaders.

Football is a grown man's game. The SEC is a grown man's league. He is prepared to continue making a difference.

"We take defense really seriously, especially after the

year that we had last year," Fowler said.

"I know a lot of people had some doubt going into this year, so we wanted to play even harder and be better than last year."

Through three games, Fowler and fellow Buck linebacker Ronald Powell lead the Gators with four tackles for a loss each.

Fowler has added two forced fumbles, one sack and three quarterback hurries.

He has an opportunity to improve on those numbers when No. 20 Florida (2-1) faces Kentucky (1-2) on Saturday at 7 p.m.

Fowler and the Gators blanked the Wildcats 38-0 on Sept. 22, 2012, in Ben Hill Griffin Stadium.

Searching for their next shut-out and a playmaker to lead the charge, the Gators believe they have the correct player and a prime opportunity in front of them this weekend.

"He's just scratching the surface for what he can do, and he's starting to realize it," Durkin said.

"We're going to keep pushing him and coaching him like crazy."

Florida will begin its swimming and diving season today in the O'Connell Center at 10 a.m. at the Pinch A Penny All Florida Invitational.

The meet will run through the weekend with prelims starting at 9 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday followed by finals at 4 p.m.

Tonight's finals will begin at 7.

"This meet is unique because you have a lot of the Florida swimmers and divers together," coach Gregg Troy said.

"There are a lot of athletes that were recruited by all of the schools, so they all know one another."

The men's team returns 11 of the 13 All-Americans from last season and the entire NCAA champion 800-yard freestyle relay team, which is composed of redshirt senior Sebastien Rousseau, sophomore Pawel Werner, senior Marcin Cieslak and junior Dan Wallace.

Coming off her second NCAA title in March with a victory in the 400-yard individual medley, Elizabeth Beisel headlines the women's team.

The invitational is unique because of the amount of teams competing.

"It's a different format," Troy said. "No matter how well we swim, only three people can swim in the finals at night.

"We may be in a situation where we have six or seven people that could have scored, but only the first three can swim at night."

# Who will win the LSU-Georgia matchup?

Each week, two AlligatorSports columnists will debate the biggest looming matchup in college football. Today, Adam Pincus and Joe Morgan preview No. 6 LSU's showdown against No. 9 Georgia in Athens, Ga., on Saturday at 3:30 p.m. on CBS.

**Adam:** This is a game between two of the Southeastern Conference's best teams. LSU, a much healthier version of Florida, visits Georgia, which has the best offense in the SEC not led by Johnny Football.

It'll be an upset of sorts for LSU with Georgia favored by three points. The over-under is 61.5 points. I expect 20 Les Miles grass-tastes, two Zach Mettenberger touchdowns and a dominating performance from LSU's running backs led by sophomore Jeremy Hill and his 117 yards per game. Plus, I'm a huge fan of Cajun food. What do they even eat in Georgia? I thought Georgians were always busy choking in big games. Peach State native Joe Morgan should be able to answer this.

**Joe:** Well, Pincus, Miami guys like you are never around to see those chokes. Or the rallies. Y'all can't be bothered to stay until the end. Just ask Ray Allen. In this battle of Clemson's SEC victims, Georgia will defeat LSU on Saturday "Between the Hedges." Why? Because of what you said — the Bulldogs have the best offense in the SEC not quarterbacked by Johnny Manziel. Look no further than Georgia's own signal-caller Aaron Murray. He ranks fourth nationally with a 201.78 passer rating, fifth with 346.7 passing yards per game and sixth with a 72 percent completion rate. Even an elite defense like LSU will struggle to slow down a quarterback this experienced and this precise, especially on his home turf. And if this one devolves into a shootout, I fully expect Murray to outgun Mettenberger.

**Adam:** This should be a heck of a ballgame. College GameDay will ema-

nate from the site of an LSU game for the 11th straight season. I wouldn't mind making a pit stop in Athens before heading to Lexington, Ky., for the barn burner that will be No. 20 Florida against Kentucky.

Stat of the week for these two teams: LSU is 50-0 under Les Miles in his eight years at the school when holding opponents to fewer than 100 rushing yards while LSU eclipses the century mark on the ground. Mettenberger will continue his efficient season in which he ranks second in the SEC in passing efficiency. Georgia happens to be first, but LSU doesn't have to beat the 'Dawgs through the air. Mettenberger just has to be in the same ballpark as Murray when it's over. The key will be running the football.

In accordance with the corny college football tradition of wearing the same color shirts, Mark Richt called for a "redout" at Sanford Stadium on Saturday. C'mon Richt. How stupid can you guys be? Red just draws more attention to yourself. The LSU defensive line, led by Anthony Johnson, doesn't need any extra help.

My colleague Joe Morgan thinks Gurley and Co. will run the Tigers back to the Bayou. I'm going with LSU in this baptism by fire for the sixth-ranked team in the country. Need I also mention Aaron Murray's 5-11 record against top-25 teams? It may be unfair to the former Plant quarterback, but there's a reason these Bulldogs can't win the big game.

**Joe:** Granted, Murray and Richt have struggled in big games against ranked opponents. That was a huge hurdle for them coming into 2013 and losing at Clemson opening weekend did not help.
