# Butler Plaza stores evacuated after rooftop fire

## It is under investigation

Authorities evacuated patrons and pets from the Butler Plaza Best Buy and PetSmart stores Monday

afternoon after rooftop solar panels caught fire.

Gainesville Fire Rescue responded to reports of a fire just after 2 p.m., said Incident Commander Pat Lewis. Emergency personnel from GFR, Alachua County Fire Rescue

and Gainesville Police arrived a few minutes later, and the fire was hosed out by 2:19 p.m.

No humans or animals were injured in the fire.

Lewis said the scene was filled with "heavy smoke and flames." About 60 of the solar panels on a Best Buy storage facility roof caught fire, he said, but the cause is still under investigation.

der investigation.

Best Buy incurred minor water damage from the hose water leaking inside, but no other damages were reported at the time, he said.

Customers and employees were let back inside the store just after 3 p.m.

"We did two hours with zero revenue, so I have to make sure

we stay as busy as possible," said Brenda Banales, a store manager. She declined to comment further and referred reporters to Best Buy's corporate offices.

While waiting for the stores to open, one bystander joked the incident could be good for business.

"Come to Gainesville," he said. "We have the hottest deals."

# UF engineers dance with designs

UF dance professor Tzveta Kassabova yelled at engineering students wearing gym shorts and T-shirts. They responded by throwing their arms out, going limp and falling to the floor of the dance studio.

Among those exploding was Stephanie Bagiardi, a 23-year-old UF industrial and systems engineering senior. But a dance studio is the last place she thought she would be while studying engineering.

The design capstone in the College of Engineering is structured the same every semester: Students are challenged to take a problem presented from a company and develop a more efficient or cheaper product than what

they were given.

But for the first time, students are required to create an interpretive dance to go along with their final projects.

At the beginning of the semester, Bagiardi's design class was given five words and was told to portray them through dance moves.

"Those have been very interesting," she said. "Watching engineers dance is a fun thing."

On Wednesday at 4 p.m., the class will perform in select locations throughout the Samuel P. Harn Museum of Art. The dances range from four to 10 minutes long.

"We're like the guinea pig class for this," Bagiardi said.

Her group built a curriculum planning website that runs an algorithm to create a recommended college graduation plan. They will be performing an interpretive dance based on their project to an instrumental version of "Square One" by Coldplay.

# Spike in utility bills not due to rate increase, GRU says

Some apartment-dwellers say they are starting to see changes in their monthly bills due to Gainesville Regional Utilities rate increases, but GRU attributes higher bills to customer usage.

The addition of the biomass plant, a new renewable generation source in Gainesville, is the primary cause of the rate increases that took effect Oct. 1.

Stephen Capsanes, a 21-year-old UF industrial engineering junior, said he and his roommates had to pay about

\$10 more for utilities than the previous month, although their utility usage had not changed.

Capsanes said he doesn't agree that residents, especially students, should have to pay the increased rate.

"We have enough expenses already with classes and rent itself," he said.

But a GRU spokeswoman, Kendall Litton Jensen, said apartment residents shouldn't have seen a difference yet, and in fact, because of a lower fuel adjustment rate, gas and electric charges were lower this year for the month of October and November.

"Customers, like apartment residents, haven't actually seen any impacts

# New bike delivery peddles coffee to downtown businesses

Sweetwater Organic Coffee Company recently added pedal power.

A utility bike equipped with a small trailer began making deliveries last week for the fair-trade coffee roaster, located at 1331 S. Main St.

Since then, it's been making its way to local businesses and to the

farmers market. During Fest 12, the trailer was downtown providing samples of Sweetwater's custom ALL Blend, inspired by a punk band playing the festival.

"It'll be all around town," said Mike Weaver, a production manager of Sweetwater Coffee, which creates custom blends and sells wholesale and exclusively certified organic coffee.

Joe Ergle, the company's 24-year-old bike delivery rider, rides out of Sweetwater Coffee on Tuesdays and Thursdays to make the deliveries.

The first 248-pound delivery on Oct. 29 included stops to downtown corner store Pop a Top, Harvest Thyme, Sweetwater Branch Inn and UF campus. Ergle made a second trip to haul a large order for Ward's Supermarket.

He said he put campus last on the route because he needs a light load to maneuver in the high pedestrian traffic.

Sweetwater Coffee collaborated with Kanner Karts Bicycle Trailers to source trailers for the delivery service, Weaver said.

Steven Kanner, who started the trailer-manufacturing company in August 2012, built a custom trailer

for Sweetwater Coffee with signs installed on the side and a rear hitch that will allow additional trailers.

"My biggest passion is utilitarian cycling — showing people that a bike can be used for more than carrying people," Kanner said.

He said he's excited to see how the trailer works for the coffee company and hopes it inspires other businesses to do something similar.

# Despite Alabama decision, no worries for block seating at UF

Students who get their football tickets in block seating at UF can breathe a little easier. Privileges will not be taken away for leaving a football game early.

UF has no intention of mirroring the University of Alabama, which recently sus-

pending 20 of its 36 block sections for "excessive tardiness or early departure from the stadium."

Mike Hill, executive associate athletics director for external affairs, said there are no plans or discussions at all about taking block seating away from UF students, including the

larger Greek-life blocks, for leaving early.

"That's how it should be," said Jackson Crumit, a 21-year-old UF accounting sophomore, who is the ticket chairman for fraternity Sigma Chi. "It's our decision to leave early because we are paying to go to the games."

Students who belong to organizations at Alabama, mostly fraternities and sororities, that hold tickets to pre-designated sections in the stadium will still be allowed to attend games, but they'll have to find another place to sit.

Travis Leyndyke, who was promoted to director of ticket operations at UF two weeks

ago, said UF doesn't really track people leaving early.

"I guess it could be possible by looking because we know where their seats are, but we don't have any policies to where it'll be taken away," he said.

The only reason block seating gets taken away now is if there are issues during a game, Leyndyke said.

The last time the ticket office threatened to revoke block seating was about three years ago. Some blocks were "screaming vulgar things toward the opposing fans," Leyndyke said.



# Charlie Crist announces candidacy for Florida governor

## He'll run as a Democrat

Former Gov. Charlie Crist officially announced his candidacy in the upcoming 2014 gubernatorial election in St. Petersburg on Monday.

Except this time, he's running as a Democrat.

Crist will compete with Nan Rich in the Democratic primary with other candidates. Rich was a state senator until 2012 when term limits forced her to retire from the senate.

Crist served as the Republican governor of Florida from 2007 to 2011, after which he endorsed President Barack Obama for re-election in 2012. Months later, Crist changed affiliation from independent to the Democratic Party.

After an unsuccessful run as an independent for the U.S. Senate in 2010, Crist said he was running again to take back the state from incumbent candidate Gov. Rick Scott.

"We are a state that embraces outsiders, even outsiders like Rick Scott," Crist said in a speech Monday.

day. "We deserve a governor who believes all Floridians deserve a voice, not just those who agree with him, or who can write the biggest check."

Martinez, 20, and Crist discussed the importance of environmental issues as well as LGBT equality and immigration.

"He was obviously gauging support and trying to see what issues mattered most to Floridians for the upcoming elections," she said.

Martinez said she couldn't say if she supported the former governor in his past elections, however she will most likely campaign for him in the upcoming race.

"I do feel like I share more ideological views with him now than back then," she said.

UF College Republicans spokesman Michael Christ said Scott's record compares favorably to Crist's record, citing how unemployment has decreased and job creation has improved since Scott became governor after Crist.

He said UF College Republicans will support Scott for re-election.

"You clearly saw someone who was more concerned about his personal career and his own political ambitions than the state," the 20-year-old political science junior said. "He's about to run out of parties."

Although history and economics senior Josh Cole might not vote in the upcoming election, the UF Libertarians president said Crist seems to be somewhat libertarian on social and economic issues.

"Combining those two could make a powerful candidate who has hopefully recognized that economic restrictions hurt the most vulnerable among us," the 21-year-old said.

## Adults underestimate calorie counts

With the passing of a law requiring some restaurants to display the caloric information of their food products, a UF survey shows most adults still do not know how many calories they actually need.

The menu labeling law is part of the Affordable Care Act, said Lauren Headrick, lead author of a paper about the survey.

The law requires restaurants with 20 or more chains or 20 or more vending machines to show the calories in each item on their menus.

"We wanted to gauge whether or not the info on the menu would be useful," Headrick said.

The UF survey of 978 people of varying height and weight found adults overwhelmingly underestimated the amount of calories they need daily to maintain their current weight.

"What we hypothesized was that obese individuals would overestimate their calorie needs the most," said Michelle Zitt, a UF nutritional sciences doctorate student who conducted the survey with three other students. "We found just the opposite."

She said people who diet underestimated their caloric needs even more because of the focus on calorie counting, which overlooks other important aspects of nutrition.

Researchers were surprised to find that health professionals and students in health-related majors were no more educated on their caloric needs than other adults.

"Across the board, people underestimated their energy requirement," Headrick said.

Zitt blamed diet culture and a lack of nutritional education for adults misunderstanding their nutritional needs.

"It's not that we think that labeling on the menus is a bad idea," she said. "We just think it's important to educate people so they can use that and the menu labeling to make decisions."

- Half of your plate should be fruits and vegetables.
- Half of your grains should be whole grains.
- Keep meat and poultry portions small and lean.
- Twice a week, seafood should be the protein on your plate.
- Choose whole or cut-up fruits more often than fruit juice.

at this point," she said. "They'll probably start seeing it in their December billing."

For October 2012, the total cost of 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity was \$127.67. As of October 2013, the rate was \$124.15 — about \$3 cheaper, she said.

Litton Jensen said water rates have already increased 10 cents, but she said the higher utility charges residents are seeing could simply be usage issues.

"The water charge did go up a little bit, but each apartment complex is structured differently in how they handle their utilities, so it's hard to make the generic conclusion that (increased water rates) will apply to everyone," she said.

Litton Jensen said some apartment complexes have begun emailing residents informing them their bills would go up because of the increase. But utilities caps most likely won't change.

A manager for one local apartment complex acknowledged she is affected by the issue but could not comment at corporate management's request.

Wendy Roth, a 22-year-old UF nursing junior, said the bill decrease from September to October was true for her. She would be disappointed if she noticed a future climb in her utility rates.

"If I started to see a significant increase in my bill, it would really suck," she said.

# Gators offered \$1 to watch videos

## Animal rights group paid

A truck arrived on the Plaza of the Americas on Monday offering to pay students \$1 to watch a four-minute video for animal rights.

UF is the most recent stop on the year-and-a-half-long "10 Billion Lives" tour, said Stephanie Frankle, a 26-year-old tour assistant for Farm Animal Rights Movement, the program behind the campaign.

"We drive this truck all over the country, mainly to college campuses, music fests, anywhere with a lot of people," she said. The truck spends several hundred dollars per stop and is all donation-run. A normal day typically costs about \$300, Frankle said.

The mission of the campaign, Frankle said, is to encourage students to cut back on meat or to more seriously consider a vegetarian or vegan diet.

The four-minute video shows images of large-scale factory farming and animal slaughter that some students call "intense" and "graphic."

However, Asami Hayashi, a 21-year-old UF linguistics senior, said she didn't feel forced to watch the video or that there was undue pressure to convert to a meat-free lifestyle.

"It was a little uncomfortable to watch," she said. "I recently learned about it in my nutrition class, so it was very relevant to me. I was kind of curious to see it anyway."

# Grow Radio \$20K short of Indiegogo goal

It's hard to make the older format of radio play nicely with the Internet, but inside a studio downtown, a group of music lovers is trying to make it happen.

Grow Radio, a local Internet radio station that broadcasts from Gainesville, offers an eclectic mix of music featuring local disc jockeys.

The station joined many other independent businesses in September by going online to ask for needed funds to continue its operations. Of the \$25,000 it needs to pay bills and buy supplies, the station has made \$5,425. Fundraising ends Thursday night.

Unlike Kickstarter, Indiegogo gives campaigns the option of keeping donations even if the goal isn't met.

"Without the money to keep the power on, we can't broadcast," said Jeremy Murdock, a Grow Radio DJ.

General manager Bill Bryson created the online fundraising campaign page on Indiegogo at [goo.gl/JNd6L7](http://goo.gl/JNd6L7). After relying on a handful of donors for years, he decided the station needed to ask more of its listeners to contribute to rising costs. The station is in need of better technology and maintenance.

Bryson created Grow Radio in 2009 with a group of friends who

thought Gainesville lacked an alternative radio station.

"Nobody was playing any music that we liked," he said.

Indiegogo also requires campaigns provide tiered rewards, or perks, to donors. So Grow Radio collaborated with local businesses to offer guided tree climbs, welding lessons, passes to Fest, a subscription to Vice magazine and other items like T-shirts.

If the station doesn't meet its goal, Bryson intends to explore other options. He plans to sell merchandise and ask for donations year-round on the station's website.

Bryson said Internet stations like Grow Radio struggle to attract attention because it's competing with FM radio stations. Using Internet stations can require connecting a phone to car speakers, and he said most listeners prefer the passive experience of simply flipping on an FM station.

"That's all it takes to discourage some people," he said.

Some listeners, like 22-year-old UF alumnus Joseph Villavicencio, think it's worth the effort.

Grow Radio plays music people may have trouble finding on their own, he said.

DJ Leela Corman plays mostly Middle Eastern music on her show. Her goal is to expand the ears and minds of her listeners beyond auto-tuned pop robots, she said.

"Great radio serves the community it's in," Corman said. "This is something so valuable."

### How do we define ‘revolution’ in 2013?

What does revolution mean in today’s complex world?

The Occupy movement sparked a flame of revolution across the world in 2011. The Arab Spring and this year’s mass manifestations against government corruption in Turkey and Brazil prove that anarchy on the streets still exists and moves millions.

But as the world develops and technology advances, oppression becomes less tangible.

An analysis by the Guardian published last week explains how the National Security Agency has been collecting data — methods and scope reaching far beyond what was once proportioned to the defense organization.

The article explains the revelations that Edward Snowden made earlier this year. The former NSA employee has been both lauded as a heroic whistleblower and condemned as a treacherous spy.

But one thing Snowden did do is bring the NSA to our attention — again.

In 1978, the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) was passed to prevent the NSA from overstepping boundaries, especially because of the Americans who fell under their scrutiny: anti-war protesters, union leaders and civil rights activists.

Until 2008 when that act was amended, the NSA could only watch out for foreign suspects if it thought it was necessary to investigate. Since 9/11, fear of terrorism has urged Congress to give the NSA some more leg room.

In 2012, the amendment was renewed, allowing the NSA to watch virtually anyone.

Telecommunication and Internet companies have admitted to complying with NSA requests for user data and even weakened their own encryption services, according to the documents Snowden revealed.

We might not have anything to hide from the government, but it doesn’t mean our most intimate communications should be on display for a small group of people with unlimited access. That’s bordering totalitarianism.

Now, for all this talk of anarchy, I have to admit I believe a free society needs law and order to function. The supreme

law of the land is the U.S. Constitution. Modern society is complicated by abstract ideas our forefathers could never have imagined in 1787. What could James Madison know about tweets or source codes or IP addresses?

However, the document can help us realize how the government has gone too far and perhaps how we can loosen that invisible hand’s grip.

The Fourth Amendment of the constitution states “the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures.”

There’s no doubt the NSA has violated the supreme law of the land by searching and seizing our information on our virtual property. While the purpose of surveillance is to be a tool of defense, the collection of phone and email records is a serious infringement of that right to reasonable privacy.

Another amendment in the Bill of Rights was created to provide U.S. citizens with a way of self-defense and resistance to oppression. The right to keep and bear arms was once about letting Revolutionary-era Americans own weapons so they could rise up against a potentially corrupt system.

But we can also inform ourselves through the work of whistleblowers and “hacktivists,” like Snowden, or the hacker organization, Anonymous. The decentralized group has called for millions to march today. Its mission statement calls for a reformation of the infrastructure of the government, “to remind this world what it has forgotten, That fairness, justice, and freedom are more than just words.”

In 2013, owning a handgun and a militia mentality won’t protect you against the government’s invasion of privacy.

But we can arm ourselves with the same thing the government is using to assess and control the public: information.

# Can former Gov. Charlie Crist win?

With former Republican and former Florida Gov. Charlie Crist announcing his gubernatorial candidacy on Monday, all eyes will eventually rest on our state in 2014. He will most likely be the Democratic challenger to face off against current Gov. Rick Scott. The main question that will be asked is, "Can the turncoat win back his office?"

Florida is a purple state. Conservative Sen. Marco Rubio and liberal Sen. Bill Nelson represent the state in the Senate, and 17 Republicans and 10 Democrats serve in the House of Representatives. The state is led by Scott with a Republican legislature. President Barack Obama carried the state in the 2012 and 2008 presidential elections. If there is a state in which a former governor who declared no party affiliation to run for the Senate and then switched his party yet again to run for governor's office should be, Florida is definitely it.

But the question still remains: Can Crist win?

Democrats will vote for their guy, period. Their guy presumably will be Crist, due to his high profile and previous political experience. His status as a former Republican probably won't bother them.

But will Republicans vote for him?

During his tenure in Tallahassee, Crist vetoed a bill that would ban taxpayer-funded abortions, and he supported environmental policy that opposed offshore drilling. These are no-nos in the current state of the Republican Party. He also nominated judges and justices who varied in their political ideology. Crist was a moderate to left-leaning Republican governor.

In 2010, he challenged former state House Speaker Marco Rubio for Florida's vacated Senate seat. Even though Rubio has taken flak during the immigration debate not too long ago, he is still a popular, high-profile Republican. Many Republicans are still upset the moderate Republican Crist challenged Rubio for the seat.

History shows more Republicans than Democrats turn out to vote in non-presidential elections. Right-leaning independents and Republicans will make the difference in this election. They will decide if they want four more years of Crist at the helm or if his party change will affect their vote.

I propose that Crist will win the Democratic primary but lose to Scott in the general election.

But why? Demographics are shifting in the state and Florida voted for Obama in the last election.

Here are my reasons:

First of all, Florida is a pretty right-wing state. The state is pro-gun and pro-life, among other right-wing policy positions. Many municipalities — Miami, Orlando and Tampa to name a few — do have a large amount of Democrats. However, the state has a stronger rural population that supports Republicans and will turn out for the election.

Second of all, Florida voted for Obama 50 to 49 last year. That was a high-profile, high-stakes presidential election. Everybody who was likely to vote did just that — they voted. It was not a landslide victory for Obama in Florida. As previously stated, off-year elections favor Republicans and tend to have lower voter turnouts.

Third, the most galvanized group in the state — and the country, for that matter — is the right-wing populists. They do not like Crist, did not support him in the Senate race and will not support his changed "political views." They arguably have the strongest get-out-to-vote efforts and will mobilize supporters. Even though they may not support some of Scott's policies, they will certainly unite to defeat Crist.

Even though this prediction is like picking a football team to win the Super Bowl before the season even starts, it is important to realize that Florida will be in the national political spotlight for 2014. If history tells us anything, we have a lot to worry about.

This election will be divisive, dirty and will attract a lot of super PACs. Here's to looking forward to the madness.



# Shutdown causes consumer confidence to fall

Much like the rest of the nation, Florida's consumer confidence in the economy faltered in October.

In light of a 16-day partial government shutdown and other economic woes, consumer confidence — how people felt about their income and the overall economy — plunged to an index level of 71, down seven points from September and reaching its lowest level in almost two years, according to a UF survey.

The index has not dropped this low since December 2011, following the last debt ceiling showdown in August of that year, said Chris McCarty, survey director of UF's Survey Research Center.

McCarty said confidence among Floridians was already declining prior to the shutdown and debt ceiling debate.

This pessimism is partly due to higher-than-average unemployment rates for young age groups, he said.

"It's particularly those folks in their early 20s that are really taking it to the chin," he said.

Lidisis Machin, a 20-year-old UF finance junior, said the drop in consumer confidence is justified.

"It's hard to be optimistic about the future when the government is acting so childish," she said.

The heaviest blow was to people's perceptions about whether it's a good time to buy a big-ticket item, like a car or house, declining 11 points to 80, according to the survey.

Consumers were also more pessimistic about individual financial state and expectations for business conditions in the next year.

Despite this growing decline in consumer confidence of the economy, 21-year-old UF entomology and nematology senior C.R. Lewis said he still has high expectations for the country's government and economic future.

"I think the U.S. economy is going to keep growing, no matter what. We have a strong economic base, and the American people have a lot of ingenuity," he said. "So I'm very optimistic in that."

# Baby got brains: Butt size linked to smarts

The study linked big butts in females to intelligence due to the omega-3 fats that are connected to brain development. The study also said big butts are connected to lower risks for heart problems and diabetes.


Dr. Hal Brodsky of Gainesville Family Physicians said he is unfamiliar with the study, but there has been evidence for a decade in the field of di-



## Gators rallying around coach in bid for bowl eligibility

Nearly two months ago, Will Muschamp led No. 12 Florida into Sun Life Stadium as a three-point favorite against Miami. Now, the Gators are fighting to avoid both their first postseason without a bowl bid since 1990 and their first losing season since 1979.

"Everybody is real disappointed right now," defensive back Jaylen Watkins said. "We've lost three in a row and definitely canceled out our chances in the (Southeastern Conference) East. Now the main goal is to become bowl eligible."

Numerous injuries to key players such as quarterback Jeff Driskel, defensive tackle Dominique Easley and running back Matt Jones have compounded a precipitous decline. Florida has already doubled last year's total in the loss column with at least four games to go.

While the offense — ranked 113th nationally with 334.6 yards per game — sputters much like it did in 2012, the inexperienced defense has failed to overcome the loss of seven starters from last year's team. If you count Easley, who played only three games in 2013 before suffering a season-ending ACL tear in September, that number increases to eight.

One glaring struggle for the Gators on the defensive side

Fewer than three minutes later, Hill made another mental error.


After Lane made a three pointer to cut UF's lead to 28-23, Hill raced through the Moccasins' full-court press and attempted a pass to DeVon Walker.

But the ball sailed past Walker's hands and bounced by a pack of photographers on the baseline.

"[Coach Billy Donovan told me to] stop being so loose with the ball, stuff like that,"

Hill said.

"Don't be careless. Take every possession like it's your last possession."

14 points on 6-of-9 shooting.

Hill missed all four of his shots in the second half but finished No. 10 Florida's 110-88 exhibition win against Florida Southern with 17 points — the third-best mark on the team.

The 6-foot-1 McDonald's All-American also recorded three assists against three turnovers in 26 minutes of action as Florida's starting point guard.

Five of Hill's six successful field goals were layups, with three coming in transition.

Hill said he did well attacking in transition and getting open shots for his teammates, but admitted the pace of the college game is far

Despite committing two early turnovers and missing three of his first five shots, Hill calmed down and went on a tear to close out the first half.

The Eustis native made his next four field-goal attempts to end the half with

*Cooper catches three touchdowns as Eagles soar against Raiders*

*With Week 9 of the NFL season in the books, here are a few former Gators who made the most tangible impact for their respective teams.*

While Philadelphia Eagles quarterback Nick Foles enjoyed a historic game at Oakland on Sunday, one of his receivers, Riley Cooper, was also impressive.

Cooper caught three of Foles' seven touchdown passes as the Eagles cruised past the Oakland Raiders 49-20.

The former Gators receiver was targeted six times and caught five balls from Foles for 139 yards.

During a three-minute span in the second quarter, Cooper scored twice.

On third and 5 at the Raiders' 17-yard line, Foles dropped back from the line of scrimmage and threw to Cooper in the left corner of the end zone as his receiver beat Oakland rookie cornerback D.J. Hayden — a 2013 first-round pick — in coverage.

Cooper's second touchdown catch — his most dynamic of the afternoon — came with 11:17 remaining in the second quarter. On the play, Foles faked a handoff to LeSean McCoy, scanned the field and then threw a deep pass to Cooper.

Foles connected down the field with the fourth-year receiver as Hayden tripped before the catch and was burned in single coverage.

The play put the Eagles ahead 21-3 prior to halftime.

Cooper tacked on his final touchdown catch of the afternoon — a 5-yard reception — with

4:28 remaining in the third quarter.

The touchdown pass was Foles' seventh of the day, which made him only the seventh quarterback in NFL history to throw for seven scores in one game.

Cooper, who came under fire during the summer after video of him using a racial slur surfaced, has since become one of the Eagles' most reliable receivers.

He has now recorded at least 88 receiving yards in three of his past four games and has five touchdowns on the season.

**Notes:** During his team's 30-24 overtime victory against the San Diego Chargers on Sunday, Washington Redskins tight end Jordan Reed caught four passes for 37 yards.

His most important catch went for 12 yards on third and 8 for a first down during Washington's game-winning touchdown drive in overtime.

Miami Dolphins kicker Caleb Sturgis shanked his first kick from 34 yards out wide left Thursday night during his team's 22-20 overtime win against the Cincinnati Bengals.

But the rookie rebounded for the Dolphins, making his final two field goals — including a 44-yarder that tied the game at 20 and sent it into overtime.

Cleveland Browns cornerback Joe Haden recorded six tackles and two pass deflections during his team's 24-18 win against the Baltimore Ravens.

Following two straight games with 80 receiving yards, New York Jets wide receiver David Nelson caught just one pass for 19 yards during a 26-20 victory against the New Orleans Saints on Sunday.

coordinator Brent Pease said Oct. 15.

"He works hard in practice. He's starting to fit in, and his opportunities are coming."

**Morrison facing sophomore slump:** The most surprising aspect of Todd Gurley's 73-yard touchdown catch across the middle was not how open he was. It was the player who failed to get back in coverage.

After an impressive freshman season, middle linebacker Antonio Morrison has hit a rough patch despite leading the team with 46 tackles. Gurley ran him over on his 5-yard touchdown to begin the scoring on Saturday.

Gurley beat a blitzing Morrison on a release for the longest touchdown reception of his career to put UGA up 14-0 in the first quarter.

Muschamp pointed out that while the linebackers need to play better, everything could not be pinned on them with defensive linemen not taking up blockers.

"He missed some tackles Saturday," Muschamp said of Morrison. "That was uncharacteristic for him."

**Humphries still out:** D.J. Humphries will miss second-straight game due to a sprained left MCL he suffered during practice on Oct. 28.

Tyler Moore started in his place after starting five of the previous seven games at right tackle.

Trenton Brown joined him at right tackle against Georgia, making his first career start at Florida.

Collectively, the offensive line had perhaps its best game in recent weeks after surrendering 10 sacks to LSU and Missouri combined.

"I thought we improved and I thought Trenton did some nice things," Muschamp said. "He's a big man. He's a large body. It's hard to get on the edges on him. I thought he protected. They had him one time on the hold, which

was a good call. They bent the edge on him there, and he got his hand locked around the guy on his shoulder up there. But again, for a first start and going in that environment, I thought he played well."

**Staffer leaves team:** Jon Haskins, Director of Player Personnel, resigned from his post within the last two weeks, Muschamp announced Monday.

of the ball is starting slow. Through eight games, 45.3 percent of the points Florida has given up have come in the first quarter. On Saturday, Georgia added 17 more.

Muschamp said correcting the problem is difficult because the slow starts result from several different issues, ranging from third-down effectiveness to being cut off from gaps.

"We've just got to go back and put our guys in better situations to play," Muschamp said. "And that's on us as coaches. We've got to put our guys in better situations to feel more comfortable and react as opposed to think in some situations."

Given the continued ineffectiveness of the offense and the uncharacteristic struggles of the defense, Muschamp has faced criticism for failing to match or come close to the results of an 11-2 season that ended with a Sugar Bowl berth in New Orleans.

The Gators have even failed to match the expected drop-off predicted by media members during SEC Media Days in July.

Florida was picked to finish third — behind Georgia and South Carolina. Only 19 media mem-

bers in Hoover, Ala., selected UF to win the Eastern Division.

But in last week's AP Poll, only 14 media members deemed the Gators worthy of a ranking. This week, Florida failed to receive any AP Poll votes for the first time since the 7-6 Gators were left out of the final rankings in 2011.

### UF Football

"We expected to have a much better record this time of year, but we haven't played that way," quarterback Tyler Murphy said. "It's just unfortunate."

Florida's players say Muschamp's support has helped them deal with disappointment.

Muschamp's backing of his players ranges from passionate defense of Sharrif Floyd against the NCAA in 2011 and Jaynard Bostwick in the face of inaccurate media reports this season to saying Saturday's loss to Georgia "falls on my shoulders."

Now that Muschamp is under fire, the Gators are more than willing to stand behind him.

"To see somebody like that to really have our backs means a lot," Murphy said. "We try to put it all on the field for a coach like that."

Watkins added: "We definitely love the support he gives us, and we're going to support him right back."

sume the starting point guard duties.


Donovan admits he needs to do a better job of monitoring Hill's playing time while Wilbekin is out.

# Jordan honored following historic freshman season for Florida

Savannah Jordan has single-handedly rewritten Florida history.

The freshman forward was named the Southeastern Conference Offensive Player of the Year, the league announced Monday.

Jordan is the first freshman in SEC history to earn the honor, leading the team with 20 goals so far this season.

"It was definitely unexpected," Jordan said of her success this season. "I came in here with the intentions just to play and help the team out in whatever way I could. It's definitely an honor, and I'm thankful that it happened the way it did for me."

The freshman also joins teammates Christen Westphal and Havana Solaun as All-SEC First Team selections.

"It's a credit to the whole team," coach Becky Burleigh said. "Us winning helps get people recognized, so I think the people that were recognized were very deserving."

Jordan's player of the year accolade marks the 13th time in program history a Gator earned a SEC Player of the Year honor.

She is also this week's SEC Freshman of the Week, making it the third time this season she has earned the award.

The starting forward helped Florida clinch a share of the SEC regular season title, scoring two goals en route to a 5-1 win against Georgia to end the regular season.
