# 'Breaking Bad' creator talks chemistry

Vince Gilligan, creator of the hit television series "Breaking Bad," said he never took chemistry in high school — but that didn't stop him from creating meth-dealing chemistry teacher Walter White.

Gilligan, who was interviewed by UF journalism college master lecturer Mike Foley, spoke to a packed Phillips Center for the Performing Arts on Tuesday night.

Accent Speaker's Bureau paid Gilligan \$60,000 to talk about his own background as an aspiring moviemaker in

his younger years to the creative processes behind the curtains of "Breaking Bad."

Foley began the discussion with a spoiler alert, warning the crowd that anything in the show was fair game for discussion, and if anyone hadn't finished the show, it was his or her fault.

"To me, 'Breaking Bad' feels like catching lightning in a bottle," Gilligan told the crowd. "I don't know how I'd do it again."

He said his fascination with the "Breaking Bad" story came from the protagonist Walter White's transformation from a plain, boring "Mr. Chips" type of character to a more eccentric

"Scarface."

"I think all of us have a good side and a dark side," he said.

Gilligan said he drew inspiration from television shows like "The Wire," "The Shield" and "The Sopranos," even drawing a comparison between his Walter White and Barney Fife of "The Andy Griffith Show." Both harbor an amazingly detailed inner life, but they also carry with them damaged self-esteem and psyches.

He said he first worked with Bryan Cranston, the actor behind Walter White, for a few days on the set of "The X-Files."

# Pedro Bravo's lawyer to request later deadline

With almost two months left until Pedro Bravo's defense team is supposed to finish collecting depositions, the lead attorney told an Alachua County judge on Tuesday afternoon that he needed more time.

Michael Ruppert, who represents Bravo in his ongoing murder case, said during a case management hearing at the Alachua County Courthouse that he planned to file a written motion to extend the Jan. 14 deadline so he and his team could interview additional witnesses scheduled for later that month.

"We have a slew of depositions in January," he said.

State prosecutors objected to the motion. Judge Robert K. Groeb, who will replace Judge Denise Ferrero in overseeing the case in 2014, will review it and make a decision, said State Attorney's Office spokesman Darryl Lloyd.

Bravo, the 20-year-old former Santa Fe College student accused of kidnapping and murdering UF student Christian Aguilar, has already appeared in court a half-dozen times since 2012.

On Tuesday, he emerged from a side door in the courtroom, handcuffed and wearing a red jumpsuit. He glanced at a group of people, including his parents, sitting behind him.

Aguilar's family and several supporters, who drove more than four hours from Miami, wore white "Justice for Christian" T-shirts and sat quietly on the opposite side

# UF veterans show support for in-state tuition legislation

## Florida has pending legislation

As the Student Senate moved forward supporting a resolution granting in-state tuition

to undocumented students, Student Government, External Affairs and the Collegiate Veterans Society pushed for a similar cause.

UF administrators and student veterans from UF and Santa Fe College attended an

event supporting in-state tuition for nonresident veterans held at Pugh Hall on Tuesday night.

So far, 20 states have laws granting veterans in-state tuition, according to Student Veterans of America's website. Eight states have a university system for in-state residency for veterans, and 10 states have pending legisla-

tion, including Florida.

Two bills were introduced into the Florida Senate and Florida House of Representatives in September in favor of a one-year residency waiver to veterans only.

Student Body President Christina Bonarigo welcomed veterans and guests to the

# University system may get Gator chancellor

A Gator will likely soon help lead the State University System.

Marshall Criser III, the son of the former UF president Criser Hall is named after, was chosen Tuesday as a Board of Governors search committee's finalist for chancellor. Criser, president of AT&T Florida, has served on UF's Board of Trustees since 2010.

The chancellor is the chief executive and administrative officer of the Board of Governors, according to its website.

Criser's experience and ideas make him "the perfect fit to be our chancellor," committee vice chair Tom Kuntz said in a news release.

In his interview, Criser mentioned increasing communication between the board and university trustees.

Criser stressed he'd make decisions by looking at what's best for Florida — not favor UF, despite his history with the university.

"The types of things that I wake up in the morning and go to bed at night thinking through — I shouldn't say this in a public meeting — but a lot of times, they're focused on where the opportunity is in higher education in the state," he said.

The board will consider Criser's appointment at its meeting next week.

# City paid \$1.3 million to acquire former jail for social work

## Homeless, hungry served

Gainesville's 10-year plan to end homelessness is entering the home stretch.

On Tuesday, the city will acquire the former Gainesville Correctional Institution to convert it into a center for the disadvantaged.

"This site is really the capstone of that plan," said city spokesman Bob Woods.

Gainesville paid \$1.3 million for

the 30.85-acre property, 2845 NE 39th Ave., according to a city news release.

The center, which doesn't have an opening date set yet, will start with at least four buildings in use. One will be a kitchen and dining room, one will be a dormitory, one will house administrative offices, and the fourth will be a laundry facility, Woods said. The property includes access roads, a parking lot and other buildings that may be converted after a more concrete plan

is established.

The plan was launched eight years ago, Woods said. Much of the work completed since 2005 involved research and coordinating city and county efforts.

"Our biggest issue, frankly, has been finding a site to provide a full range of services," Woods said.

On Oct. 31, the city issued a request for proposal for potential vendors to outline how they plan to use the center.

Ideas range from community gardens to job training to mental health services and even storage facilities. The center will serve not only those

who are homeless, but also those who are hungry.

Woods said volunteers have done some work on the site such as repairing cracks and stabilizing buildings. Further renovations will depend on the requirements of the winning proposal.

Critics of the site believe it is too

far away from city life to be practical. Critic Annette Gilley is a member of Occupy Gainesville, which focuses on homelessness.

"We don't have a homeless problem so much as we have a homeless visibility problem," she said in an interview last month.

Although the center is a former correctional facility, Woods said it will be an open campus. He said the center doesn't have a name yet, but the working title is the Empowerment Center.

"That word, 'empowerment,' says it all. That's really the goal for this center," he said.

# Bone marrow drive grows stronger

UF is No. 1 in the nation for bone marrow donor registration.

The top-ranking drive was the result of a partnership between the Gift of Life Bone Marrow Foundation and Footprints, a pediatric oncology volunteer group.

Rachel Werk, 20-year-old UF behavior and cognitive neuroscience junior and co-director of the drive, said her organization registered 1,338 donors, breaking the record of 1,118 donors set by Syracuse University in 2007.

"The ability to go above and beyond that is really great," she said.

Werk attributes the higher number to better organization and the huge turnout of volunteers. More than 200 students helped register and swab potential donors during the two-day drive.

"We had so many volunteers that we had to open up two more locations at the last minute," she said.

Shayne Pilpel, 43, the recruitment coordinator for the foundation, said UF has run 18 drives since 2010 for a

grand total of 4,480 individual donors.

This is incredible, he said, in comparison to the closest competitor. Ohio University has run 105 drives since 2007, but their donor total is only 5,344.

UF has registered the most individual donors at a single drive, but Pilpel said UF has also registered the most donors so far this year.

Kirschner said learning how Gilligan went about making such a successful show was a great experience.

"I don't think any show can be fairly compared to 'Breaking Bad'," Kirschner said. "It's the perfect show."

of the room during the brief hearing.

More than a year after Bravo's arrest, a trial date has yet to be set.

Although Tuesday's hearing resulted in another delay, Carlos Aguilar, Christian Aguilar's father, said he and his family is frustrated with the case's slow pace as it moves into 2014.

"I understand this is part of the system. We don't want appeal after appeal," he said. "Nothing is going to bring Christian back, but I'll still be looking for justice."

David Kiliszek, Carlos Agu-

ilar's 31-year-old cousin from Broward County, agreed.

"It's overwhelming... when all the defense is telling you is that they need more time," he said.

Bravo's next case management hearing is scheduled for Jan. 14.

Aguilar, an 18-year-old

UF biomedical engineering freshman, was reported missing Sept. 20, 2012. A month later, two hunters found his half-buried body in a wooded area 40 miles southwest of Gainesville.

Gainesville Police arrested Bravo four days after Aguilar's disappearance. Bravo has since been charged with kidnapping, homicide, lying to police, providing false reports, mishandling human remains, tampering with physical evidence, and poisoning food and/or water with the intent to kill or injure a person, according to court records.

He remains in custody at the Alachua County Jail.

"Their dedication to ensuring all 50 states are kept safe is reason enough to allow our vets to be eligible for in-state tuition," she said.

Vice President for Student Affairs Dave Kratzer, who served as a general in the military, expressed his support for the bill. Close to 500 UF student veterans are currently on the GI Bill and another 180 are dependents who receive benefits from the GI Bill, he said.

"We need to make sure this gets done for Florida this year," Kratzer said. "It's simply the right thing to do."

The event follows the release of U.S. News and World Report's inaugural Best Colleges for Veterans rankings.

Analysts matched top-ranked schools in the Best Colleges ranking with those colleges that are members of the Servicemembers Opportunity Colleges Consortium, certified for the GI Bill and participants in the Yellow Ribbon Program. The list was broken down into national universities, liberal arts colleges, regional universities and regional colleges. UF made no appearance in any of the categories, neither the national level nor the regional level.

John Gebhardt, veterans advocate at SFC and UF, would not comment on UF not making it into the rankings.

"It's not because we don't do the job, that's for sure," he said. "In fact, we have the Veterans Success Center now, one of the premiere centers in the state. We have all the elements to be in the top ranking."

Along with Gebhardt, former president of Collegiate Veterans Society Michael Filipelli heralded the Collegiate Veterans Success Center, located in Yon Hall.

"That's where you find your true bonding with the other vets," he said. "It brought together a centralized location for people."

# Sunday Amazon delivery launches in select cities

Just in time for the holidays, Amazon and the U.S. Postal Service are partnering to offer Sunday package delivery to customers in two cities beginning this week.

left many without a seat at the meeting.

But the constituent overflow included those who were advocating for a resolution in support of tuition equity for undocumented students, up for its first reading.

In Florida, undocumented students pay out-of-state tuition, which costs about four times as much as in-state tuition.

Although resolutions do not change legislation, if this one passes, it would be sent to state leaders, expressing the Senate's support of a law granting undocumented students the right to in-state tuition.

The resolution, authored by Students for a Democratic Society lead organizer Conor Munro, Gators for Tuition Equity founder Liana Guerra and Sen. Joselin Padron-Rasines, was sponsored by Senate President Cory Yeffet.

"We think students who worked hard in high school and earned their spot in The Gator Nation shouldn't be kept from doing this," Munro said.

Representatives from Hispanic Students Association, Black Student Union and Asian American Student Union among 15 other organizations also spoke at the podium in support of the resolution.

Some senators believed the chambers were not an appropriate venue for the bill.

"We cannot speak for every student at the university," said Sen. Michael Christ. "This is an issue with a diversity of opinion."

After a majority vote, the resolution sailed onto its second reading to be debated next week. Padron-Rasines and Liana Guerra hugged in triumph.

Padron-Rasines thanked those who supported the resolution.

"We are going to rally this in Tallahassee in the Spring," she said. "And I know that students will be appreciative of your support with this."

### UF not responsible for drop in sexual health rankings

Yesterday, the Alligator reported that UF dropped three slots in the 2013 Trojan Sexual Health Report Card from No. 12 in 2012 to No. 15 this year.

In the article, the president of UF's branch of Vox: Voices for Planned Parenthood, mentioned sex-ed policies in schools.

"There's a lot of ignorance in our age group about sexual health, but it isn't really our fault," she said. "Florida teenagers are entering adulthood without any practical knowledge of their own anatomy or bodily functions."

Although UF offers a number of sexual-health resources, the crux of the problem lies in Florida schools' faulty, disjointed sex-ed programs.

According to ABC Action News, "In 2012, the CDC released startling statistics about Florida teens. There were 682 reported cases of HIV, more than 27,000 STD cases in general, and almost 16,000 babies born to teenagers."

Hillsborough County is planning to apply for a federal grant that's currently available in 32 school districts in Florida, and if it receives grant funds, county officials are looking to improve their sex-ed structure. The grant would provide teachers "extensive training in comprehensive sexuality and explain how to implement it in school."

Although this may seem like a step forward, the grant would still promote abstinence education, which has been proven ineffective.

PolicyMic.com reported, "Studies show that conservative states, due to other factors such as religious and moral beliefs, are most likely to implement abstinence-only sex education in schools. Ironically, it is these states that suffer the highest rate of teen pregnancies and STD infection."

"Stanger-Hall and Hall discovered that the states with the lowest teen pregnancy rates institute 'abstinence-plus' sex education, ensuring that abstinence and information about sexual health and contraceptives are both covered," PolicyMic stated.

Young adults need comprehensive sex education — not the "Mean Girls" don't-have-sex-because-you-WILL-get-pregnant-and-die abstinence-only drivel. It doesn't work, and it doesn't prepare high school kids for college, where morals are a little looser and casual sex is commonplace.

To be sure, abstinence education isn't a bad thing — after all, abstinence is the only birth-control method with a 100-percent-guaranteed success rate. Abstinence is a personal choice many people choose to make, and that's perfectly fine.

But not everyone wants to abstain, and those young adults who want to become sexually active should have access to educational resources. According to Planned Parenthood, Florida doesn't have any statewide standards for sex education, while 78 percent of Floridians support comprehensive sex education.

Sex education shouldn't be driven by a political agenda, and it should be accessible to high school kids across the state. If Florida doesn't implement a standardized sex-ed program, rates of teen pregnancies and STDs will remain stalemate at best or continue to climb at worst.

### Instead of death, fear the un-lived life

As I age into my early 20s, I realize now that over-used cliches are not as useless as their unoriginality might suggest. Take this one: "All that is necessary for the triumph of evil is that good men do nothing."

To elaborate, let us consider a chilling incident that occurred in New York City in 2010. One night in April, an assailant stalked and attacked an innocent woman. Luckily for her, someone was there to help.

A homeless man jumped to the aid of the woman. The hero himself was then stabbed by the assailant and fell to the sidewalk. You can partly blame the "diffusion of responsibility" that we delude ourselves into thinking, the notion that since there are so many people out there, someone else will take action. But that's not the full story.

Today, the default state of mind is indifference. Sure, the apathy we identify ourselves with doesn't translate to ignoring bleeding victims on sidewalks, but it is still dangerous.

Each of us has selfish instincts. Naturally, the urge to pay attention to the individual self is the top priority for everyone. The problem begins when the top priority becomes the only priority.

The amount of peace and justice is inversely pro-

# Voter ID laws threaten democracy

Former Rep. Jim Wright (D-Tex.) once held one of the most prominent political positions in the United States. From 1987 to 1989, Wright served as speaker of the House of Representatives. However, last Nov. 2, Wright found he might not even be able to cast a ballot in his state's elections.

The 90-year-old Wright was denied a voter ID card by the Texas Department of Public Safety because his driver's license had expired in 2010. Wright needed a valid form of identification to obtain a voter ID card because of a new law enacted by the Texas Legislature.

Similar measures have been enacted in numerous states in the last several years, including North Carolina and Alabama.

Former Rep. Wright is not the only one who has been affected by these harsh new voter ID laws. Although Wright encountered difficulties with the Texas voter registration system because of his age, the groups most likely to be affected by these laws are women and minority groups, particularly African-Americans and Hispanics.

According to Ari Berman of The Nation, Hispanic voters in Texas are 46 to 120 percent more likely than white voters to lack the forms of ID needed to cast a ballot in the state.

Sen. Chuck Grassley (R-Iowa) has argued that "common sense measures such as voter identification laws" are needed to combat the threat of voter fraud.

Contrary to the claims of these proponents of voter ID laws and similar measures, there is absolutely no evidence to suggest voter fraud exists in the United States to any significant degree.

There are currently more than 11 million registered voters in Florida. Igor Volsky of Think Progress found that according to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, just "178 cases of alleged voter fraud have been referred to the department since 2000."

It is clear the voter ID legislation proposed by Republicans around the country is a solution in search of a problem. What, then, is the true motivation for enacting such harsh and restrictive legislation?

In the 2008 and 2012 elections, members of ethnic and racial minorities voted overwhelmingly for President Barack Obama and other

Democratic candidates. African-Americans supported Obama over Mitt Romney by a margin of 93 percent to 6 percent. Hispanics also voted for Obama by a wide margin, 71 percent to 27 percent.

The overwhelming support for the Democratic Party among these demographic groups, combined with the rapid population growth of those groups relative to whites, poses an existential threat to the Republican Party.

Rather than reaching out to members of these demographic groups and trying to gain their political support, Republicans have instead chosen to make it as difficult as possible for them to vote.

The political benefit of voter ID laws to the GOP has been acknowledged by numerous Republican politicians. In 2012, Pennsylvania House leader Mike Turzai said the voter ID law enacted in his state would "allow Governor Romney to win the state of Pennsylvania."

Some supporters of the voter ID laws and similarly restrictive voting measures have been even more blunt about the true purpose of the legislation.

According to Think Progress, Don Yelton, a former precinct chair of the Buncombe County, North Carolina Republican Party, said if restrictive voting measures hurt "a bunch of lazy blacks that wants the government to give them everything, so be it."

Although Yelton resigned after making his blatantly racist remarks, he was only saying out loud what Republicans around the country know: If African-Americans, Hispanics and other minorities vote in large numbers, Republicans will lose election after election.

If the Republican Party wants to remain relevant in American politics, it should focus on adapting its policies to suit the interests and beliefs of a larger number of voters, particularly fast-growing demographics like Hispanics and African-Americans.

Attempting to rig the electoral system by making voting more difficult for millions of Americans is an attack on democracy itself and should not be tolerated.

there was something very wrong with Northwestern's uniforms: They were more or less American flags covered in fake blood.

You read that correctly. In a tribute to the wounded veterans, a football team wore uniforms that looked like an American flag covered in the

blood of a soldier.

Northwestern might be the most egregious offender, but they are certainly not alone. Since 2008, Major League Baseball has adorned its players in caps featuring camouflage or the American flag to support the troops. Some NFL teams also joined the fun, with players wearing camouflage uniforms.

Wearing camouflage or spraying fake blood on your uniform doesn't mean you support the troops and might be the most superficial way to "support the troops," even if some proceeds of merchandise sales benefit organizations like Wounded Warriors.

We must do more than buy hats or watch our favorite team wear camo costumes to honor our veterans and the fallen. I know it's easy to say and harder to do, but if we're all flag-loving Americans, it's due time to stand up and do something more than beat our chests with patriotic pride.

Donate a few bucks directly toward a group like Wounded Warriors, Welcome Back Veterans or even your local homeless shelter. Take a day off from work or school and volunteer at a shelter or help one of the country's true heroes with the day-to-day struggles of returning to normal life.

There is so much we can do as a nation to help those who serve, and it's the right thing to do — always.

These are men and women who sacrificed everything for us. Shouldn't we do the same for them?

# UF study abroad ranks No. 15 nationally, could improve

UF was ranked No. 15 for sending students abroad, but staff says there is still room for improvement.

The 2013 Open Doors Report on International Educational Exchange, released Monday, ranked New York University No. 1, with 4,378 students who studied abroad during the 2011-12 academic year.

UF sent 1,991 students.

Dena Roberts, UF Study Abroad Services assistant director, said a

national ranking is exciting, but the percentage of students studying abroad is still low.

According to the report, only 10 percent of American undergraduates study abroad.

Roberts said about 2 percent of UF students study abroad, but she hopes this number will continue to grow.

"It's the next step to figuring out who you are," she said. "It's also stepping out of your comfort zone."

Maxine Dubois, a 22-year-old UF criminology and law senior, is one

of thousands of UF students who has studied abroad.

Studying in Beijing last summer, she didn't let a little culture shock or a foreign lifestyle-induced upset stomach stop her from having a

good time.

Before leaving, she said she researched Chinese culture, so she wasn't surprised when strangers snapped photos of her on their phones or touched her dirty blond hair.

The amount of students from other countries coming to study in the U.S. also increased by 7 percent, according to Open Doors. In the 2012-13 leading institutions for hosting international students top 25 ranking, UF was No. 17.

Lyn Straka, director of UF ex-

change visitor services, said past international students have said they liked the openness of the UF community, especially the open relationships between students and professors.

Exchange students' experiences are not limited to just coursework at UF, she said. Their home universities might not have the dormitories or on-campus activities UF students take for granted.

"They don't just get a new academic experience," she said, "but a new cultural one as well."

## Gators March for Babies goals high

Just before the 10th annual Gators March for Babies 5K fundraiser, Florida received a D grade on the 2013 March of Dimes Premature Birth Report Card released this month.

Kyle Croft, March of Dimes community director for Alachua County, said although the grade was not a change from last year, the preterm birth rate in Florida has increased from 13 percent in 2011 to 13.7 percent in 2012. Croft said this increase is a temporary setback in efforts to reach a 9.6 percent preterm birth rate by 2020.

"I think there's a misconception that babies are born prematurely and all that means is they spend a couple of extra days in the hospital, run a few tests and go home," Croft said. "This report card really shows that premature birth truly is still a problem."

Claudia Weeks, director of staff for Gators March for Babies, said the low report grade indicates the importance of this year's walk, which will take place Nov. 24.

"The fact that we are still at a D rating shows that there's so much work that we can do, so much research that needs to be done and so much money that needs to be raised for that," said Weeks, a 19-year-old UF sustainability studies sophomore.

Croft said Gators March for Babies, the UF organization for March of Dimes, has set a record-high fundraising goal of \$100,000 for this year's walk in honor of its 10-year anniversary.

Students, faculty and staff can register to participate or make a donation anytime before or on the day of the walk. The walk will be on UF's campus, starting on Turlington Plaza at 2 p.m.

About \$70,000 has been raised for this year's walk so far, Croft said. Last year, Gators March for Babies raised \$62,000. The record for fundraising during the past 10 years is about \$80,000 in 2011.

"The goal is in sight," Croft said. "We could realistically reach that goal, but we definitely need all the help we can get."

tion senior, and her team were one of four Liti-Gators teams that competed in the Middle Tennessee State University's annual Middle Tennessee Invitational Mock Trial Tournament — one of the country's largest undergraduate mock trial competitions.

While facing Wheaton College, Ochogo's team decided to go with a risky move and create a "hostile witness" — someone who is used as a scapegoat for the defendant to establish reasonable doubt among the jurors.

"It's pretty much the most exciting thing you can do in a mock trial," she said.

Team Targaryen took home first place, and Team Lannister was fifth in its division. Gators won other awards as well.

To prepare for competitions, Laura Sjoberg, a UF associate professor of political science, coaches the mock trial competitive teams two evenings per week. Practices are

evenly divided up among constructing cases, cross examination and closing arguments. Then, they do scrimmages with different skill drills, Sjoberg said.

"[Students] really gain analytical skills and confidence," Sjoberg said. "And those things are not only applicable to the majority of them who want to go to law school but also to those who want to be actors and scientists."

Two of the four UF trial teams will travel to North Carolina for the next competition at Duke University, which begins Saturday.

# Alachua County included in solar panel grant to help locals

A grant may soon make setting up solar panels for residents and small businesses easier and more affordable.

The grant from the U.S. Department of Energy provides \$1.6 million to help improve the permitting process, promote financing options, generate publicity for clean energy and jobs, and create a standard for connecting solar systems to the power grid, according to a news re-

lease.

Alachua County was included as a recipient as part of the six-county Go SOLAR Florida team. The team also includes Broward, Miami-Dade, Monroe, Orange and St. Lucie counties.

Holly Banner, a planner for the Alachua County Growth Management Department, will oversee the county's participation in the initiative. She said it will mostly simplify the permitting and installation process locally.

"Data shows that 64 percent of

the cost of solar installations is related to the soft costs, not related to the cost of the panels themselves," she said.

Banner said reducing these soft costs will make the total ownership and installation price tag of solar

panels more predictable.

She said working with other counties that have already developed online permitting systems and marketing plans, like Broward County, will benefit Alachua County. Banner also said developing a guide to financing options would be part of the county's participation.

Barry Jacobson, president of Gainesville-based Solar Impact Inc., said he thinks these improvements will be helpful, but the solar business is already doing well on its own.

"I don't see it being a huge game

changer," he said, "because currently the financials for solar make a lot of sense as it is."

Antony Cato, a 19-year-old Santa Fe College political science sophomore, said programs like this that move the county forward in creating renewable sources of energy are a great use of taxpayer dollars.

"So often we see wasteful spending or spending that is very controversial," he said. "In this case, whether you're an environmentalist or a fiscally-conservative person, there is a benefit."

## Inmate executed for killing Orlando woman

STARKE — A man convicted in the 1991 sexual assault and murder of an aspiring artist in Orlando was executed Tuesday by injection.

Darius Kimbrough was pronounced dead at 6:18 p.m. at the Florida State Prison in Starke, officials said. He did not make any statement, telling officials, "No, sir," when asked if he had any last words.

Kimbrough was condemned to die for the October 1991 killing of 28-year-old Denise Collins, who was attacked in her apartment as she slept.

Collins' mother and sister were among 24 witnesses, including news media, who attended the execution. Her

mother, Diane Stewart, said the last 22 years have been "horrendous" while the family waited for appeals to play out.

"This is well deserved," Stewart told reporters. "Let's see if we can pick ourselves up a little more and get on with our life."

The sister, Annette Collins, said the execution was a numbing experience but also a relief.

"I'm just happy that Denise received justice. Wherever she is, I hope she is smiling down," she said.

It was the second time a new mix of drugs was used in Florida since a previous execution in October. Earlier Tuesday, Kimbrough ate his last meal, including pizza, fried chicken, fried green tomatoes and chocolate chip ice cream.



## Wisconsin hands Florida first loss

Florida made it a close game against Wisconsin, but one shot late in the contest ended the Gators' hopes Tuesday night.

Badgers guard Traevon Jackson made a jumper from the right elbow to put his team ahead by five points with eight seconds remaining in the game as No. 11 Florida fell to No. 20 Wisconsin 59-53 in the Kohl Center in Madison, Wis.

"We gave ourselves a chance," Florida coach Billy Donovan said. "[Jackson] made a tough shot."

With Florida (1-1) down 56-53 with 41.8 seconds left, UW guard Ben Brust missed a three-pointer. Center Patric Young battled for the rebound with Badgers guard Josh Gasser, came down with the ball and drew a foul.

Young went 1 of 2 from the line.

But during the next possession, Florida chose to not foul and allowed Wisconsin (2-0) to run down the clock.

After Jackson's shot, guard Michael Frazier II raced down the other end to find Jacob Kurtz on the wing. Kurtz drove down the lane past two defenders but saw his shot blocked by Frank Kaminsky, and the Badgers got the rebound.

Brust made his first free throw with 2.4 seconds left to effectively end the game.

"We have too many breakdowns in crucial situations,"

## Pease accepts criticism of struggling UF offensive unit

Brent Pease expected his second season as Florida's offensive coordinator to be smoother than his first.

He had another year to implement his system, a confident starting quarterback and several new toys in his arsenal that were expected to help the Gators develop a more dynamic offense.

But those thoughts have since been replaced by concerns regarding his job security amid continued struggles from Florida's offense and growing bitterness from fans.

"It's human nature to probably think about that," Pease said. "But I still got an obligation to this team, and the head coach, and the players I coach and the administration that I work for."

A year after enjoying an 11-2 season and a trip to the Sugar Bowl, the Gators (4-5, 3-4 Southeastern Conference) have lost four straight games and have fallen out of contention in the SEC Eastern Division.

Florida has not had a losing record this late in a season since going 0-10-1 in 1979, which is the last time the Gators finished with a losing record. That mark could fall this season, as UF will be a heavy underdog in two of its three remaining games and is at risk of missing a bowl game for the first time since 1990.

"You never want to have a losing record or not be able to make it to a bowl game, so we're just trying to win for our pride and for ourselves," Hunter Joyer said.

A lack of production from a stagnant offense has been a key contributor to Florida's decline.

The Gators are tied for 106th nationally in scoring offense and rank even lower in total offense.

After scoring just one total offensive touchdown during losses to LSU and Missouri, Florida was held without a touchdown in the first half of its 23-20 loss to Georgia. A week later, Vanderbilt clobbered Florida at home to earn its first win in Gainesville since 1945.

Each loss — and every poor offensive showing — increases the pressure on Pease, who is under contract through the 2015 season.

## Clowney presents steep challenge for Gators

Florida's offensive line will face arguably its toughest challenge on Saturday in Columbia, S.C.

Lining up on the opposing defensive line will be All-American defensive end Jadeveon Clowney, a projected top-three pick in May's NFL Draft.

"I don't know if you stop Clowney," offensive coordinator Brent Pease said.

Instead, Pease and the offensive line will do their best to slow him down — a tough task, as evidenced by the junior's 23 career sacks and 42 career tackles for a loss.

"He's a great player, not just good," fullback Hunter Joyer

said. "He's quick, has counter moves. He has everything a defensive end needs: strength, size. He's a complete player and that's why he's projected to go so high in the draft and everything."

Clowney has had success against Florida in the past.

As a freshman in 2011, he had only one tackle — which resulted in a 1-yard loss — while also forcing a fumble in South Carolina's 17-12

victory in Columbia.

Last season, the tables were turned, as the Gators dominated the Gamecocks in a 44-11 win.

However, Clowney had a more productive game, notching five tackles — including two for a loss — and an 8-yard sack.

# Former Gator scores first goal for U.S. Women's National Team

ORLANDO — Erika Tymrak put her hands on her head and smiled in disbelief.

In her second appearance with the U.S. Women's National Team, the former Gators midfielder scored her first goal in a 4-1 victory against

Brazil in an international friendly match at the Citrus Bowl in Orlando on Sunday night.

USWNT rookie Lindsey Horan fed the ball through to Tymrak at the left corner of the penalty arc.

Tymrak nudged it to the right and rifled a low, right-footed shot between two Brazil defenders closing in on her. The ball sank into the

left corner, just out of Brazil goalkeeper Thais' reach.

"I'm so overwhelmed, but in a good way," Tymrak said. "It was an incredible feeling that I could get my first goal in my home state."

USWNT forward and former Florida soccer great Abby Wambach shared in the excitement.

"I was jumping up on the side-

lines like a little kid," Wambach said. "Obviously, she's a former Gator, and I'm really proud of her for getting her first goal."

USWNT coach Tom Sermanni was proud to see Tymrak notch her first career goal.

"It's a dream come true," Sermanni said. "Scoring the goal, I don't think she knew quite what to do at first ... I'll take the credit for the substitution."

"Those are the kinds of things players dream about doing, and to come in the game for just two minutes and score, is just fantastic."

Getting the national team call up was something Tymrak worked toward for more than a year.

She ended her collegiate career as the 2012 Southeastern Conference Offensive Player of the Year, scoring nine goals and tallying 12 assists.

She is tied for third in program history, notching 40 assists in four years. She finished her career eighth in Florida history in goals with 32.

After college, Tymrak had no trouble adjusting to professional soccer. FC Kansas City drafted her in the second round of the National Women's Soccer League draft, and she got off to a quick start.

Tymrak started in 16 matches, scored six goals and notched four assists in just two months of play to earn the NWSL Rookie of the Year honor.

Less than a month later, the 22-year-old received her first cap on the U.S. senior team in an international friendly match against Mexico in Washington, D.C. on Sept. 3.

Sermanni started Tymrak in the midfield for that match, but she

ended the game without an offensive statistic.

To further prove herself ready for the international team, Tymrak trained in Germany with the FC Bayern Munich Women club team and scored twice in a German Cup match against TSV Crailsheim on Sept. 30.

"I think for a player like Erika, going and getting the experience of playing a different environment, a different style of soccer and a different culture, it's a balance," Sermanni said. "Being away from home, out of your comfort zone, all those things, I think, are good for players."

It paid off.

Tymrak's play abroad caught the attention of Sermanni again, and he added her to the U.S. roster against Brazil.

Tymrak said she appreciated the support Wambach gave her through training.


"[Wambach] helps me on and off the field," Tymrak said. "I feel really thankful and blessed to have a former Gator on the team looking out for me. I'm really lucky."

Tymrak will return to FC Bayern Munich to finish out training through Dec. 31.

With her professional soccer career taking off, the 22-year-old midfielder remains humble and remembers her beginning at UF.

"Florida taught me a lot," Tymrak said. "I owe a lot of it to my coaches over there and their support."

"It's just amazing that I could transition the way I have and play in front of everyone in my home state."

# Cooper continues to impress with two-touchdown performance

With Week 10 of the NFL season in the books, here are a few former Gators who made the most tangible impact for their respective teams.

**Riley Cooper, wide receiver:** Riley Cooper keeps making big plays for the Philadelphia Eagles.

During his team's 27-13 road win against the Green Bay Packers on Sunday, Cooper caught three passes for a team-high 102 yards and two touchdowns.

His second catch, a 45-yard touchdown reception from quarterback Nick Foles, put the Eagles ahead 17-3 with 11:21 remaining in the third. Foles faked a handoff to Bryce Brown, dropped back and then found Cooper. The fourth-year receiver beat two defensive backs to roll into the end zone.

Later in the quarter, Cooper caught a 32-yard touchdown pass to increase Philadelphia's lead to 27-10. On the play, Foles dropped back and found a wide-open Cooper, who ran down the left sideline untouched into the end zone.

Cooper has totaled at least 88 receiving yards in four of his past five games and has seven receptions of at least 25 yards. Through 10 games, he is 31st in the league in receiving yards with 555 on 28 catches and has seven touchdowns.

**Carlos Dunlap, defensive end:** During the Cincinnati Bengals' 20-17 overtime loss to the Baltimore Ravens, Carlos Dunlap filled up the box score.

The starting left defensive end forced a fumble for his second straight game and recorded two of his team's five sacks on Ravens signal-caller Joe Flacco for a loss of 17

yards. Dunlap also had five tackles. He has six sacks this season, tied for 19th in the NFL.

**Jordan Reed, tight end:** Although the Washington Redskins fell to the Minnesota Vikings 34-27 on Thursday night, rookie Jordan Reed had another large impact.

Reed caught six balls for 62 yards and a touchdown in the loss. His 11-yard touchdown reception put the Redskins ahead of the Vikings 17-14 with 5:02 remaining in the second quarter.

**Notes:** Seattle Seahawks wide receiver Percy Harvin (hip) did not play Sunday against the Atlanta Falcons but was activated Monday. He could play against his former team, the Vikings, this Sunday.

Miami Dolphins rookie kicker Caleb Sturgis went 2 for 2 during his team's 22-19 loss to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Monday night.

Donovan said. "We don't get the rebound after a missed shot. We fall asleep on a three-point shooter. We have a careless turnover. We fall asleep on a back cut. We foul with two seconds to go on the shot clock."

"Just little things like that that's got nothing to do with talent. It's got much, much more to do with experience and being in those situations a little bit more."

Florida struggled to defend the three-point line Tuesday. After starting 0 of 4 from behind the arc, Wisconsin hit 9 of its final 16 three-point attempts.

Frazier led the way for the Gators with 20 points on 7-of-11 shooting, including a 5-of-7 clip from behind the arc. Excluding Frazier, Florida was 0 of 7 from three-point range.

After a 28-point showing Friday against North Florida, forward Casey Prather added 12 points. Freshman point guard Kasey Hill, who fouled out with 3:25 remaining, went 2-of-11 shooting for four points, recorded four assists and grabbed three rebounds.

Donovan stressed after Florida's 77-69 win against UNF that his team needed to improve defensively and change its overall attitude. Those adjustments were present early.

Behind a trio of three-pointers on consecutive possessions by Frazier, Florida jumped out to a 16-4 lead about seven minutes into the game.

But the Badgers responded with a 13-0 run during a span of 7:15 late in the first half to enter halftime with a 29-26 lead.

The Gators trailed by as many as 11 points in the second half after a 14-4 Badgers run, but they used a 15-9 run during a span of 10 minutes to cut the deficit to three.

Florida shot 40.4 percent from the field, but missed 7 of its 17 free throws. Wisconsin shot 43.8 percent and outrebounded UF 31-28.

Despite the loss, Donovan saw his group — which was without Scottie Wilbekin, Dorian Finney-Smith and Damontre Harris due to suspension — make progress Tuesday night.

"This is really, really good for our team," Donovan said. "Just to see what we've got to do, where we need to continue to get better."

Florida's second-year offensive coordinator agrees the offense has underperformed this season and said he understands the anger many fans feel toward him.

"It's the same thing we tell the kids, you've got to be mentally tough," Pease said. "You've got to shut it out sometimes. And I understand what people are saying and frustrated with."

"I mean, do they understand all of the circumstances? Not all of the time. But you've got to work through it. In my situation, I don't think you can lose confidence in who you are and what you believe in and how you got to doing your job."


Pease and the Gators have had to deal with more than the usual number of distractions this season.

Florida's offense has lost its starting quarterback, running back, two offensive linemen and a wide receiver for the season due to injury. Several other players have also missed extended periods of time because of injury or suspension.

Tyler Murphy, who replaced Jeff Driskel earlier this season, is currently dealing with a sprained shoulder that has kept him out of practice this week and is questionable to play Saturday against No. 10 South Carolina.

"It's tough, and I mean what are you going to do?" Pease said of the injuries to offensive players.

"You got to play the cards you're dealt."

"We're going to have to do a lot of things with him in the pass [protection] game, whether it's double teaming him or stuff like that," guard Jon Halapio said.

Clowney has not lived up to the Heisman Trophy hype that surrounded him before the season began — the junior has not recorded a sack since Sept. 14 — but he could look to get on track against a banged-up Gators offensive line.

Florida has had trouble protecting its quarterback in recent weeks. Defenses have sacked redshirt junior quarterback Tyler Murphy 19 times in UF's last four games.

The Gators are missing three starters from their offensive line. Tackle Chaz Green (labrum) has missed the whole season, tackle Tyler Moore (elbow) is out for the rest of the year after a scooter accident and tackle D.J. Humphries (knee) is doubtful for Saturday's game.

"We're just going to have to make do with what we have," Halapio said. "I think we've got seven left. We're really going to have to grind it out this week and just go from there."

**Center explains ejection:** During the third quarter of Florida's game against Arkansas on Oct. 5, center Jon Harrison was ejected after apparently making contact

with a referee.

After the game, coach Will Muschamp did not comment on whether Harrison touched the official, saying Harrison "lost his temper and did something he shouldn't have done."

Harrison had a chance to tell his side of the story on Tuesday.

The redshirt senior said he was trying to explain that an Arkansas player was directing racial slurs at him, and Harrison wanted the referee to control the situation.

"I got called every version of the 'n-word' known to man," Harrison said. "And I went up to the ref and I'm like, 'Ref, please, you have to control this player. He's been calling me every racial slur.'"

Harrison said while gesturing, he accidentally touched the referee. He said he did not know he was penalized until he saw the flag, heard his number called and was escorted off the field.

"There was no malicious intent. I wasn't trying to be an a-hole or anything," Harrison said.

"I was honestly was just trying to tell the ref to get this player because I was getting attacked, I felt like I was getting harassed, and it was beyond football."

"Calling me the n-word and everything is not football anymore. It is just going out of your way."
